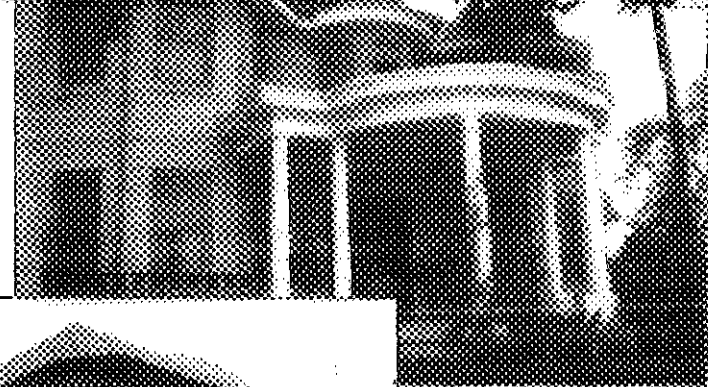
U. T. Arlington

- **Virginia Garrett Cartographic History Library**
 - Thousands of rare maps, atlases, globes, and other cartographic items.
 - Focuses on five centuries of exploration and mapping of the New World.
 - Maps documenting transcontinental migration, transportation surveys, and oil exploration.
 - 1,000 historical maps of Texas.
- Includes major donations from Jenkins and Virginia Garrett.



U. T. Brownsville

- **Fort Brown**
 - U.S. Army post established in 1846.
 - The hospital, commissary, and other buildings have been renovated for use as offices and classrooms.
- **Young Home**
 - Built in 1912; now houses the Cross Border Institute for Regional Development.
- **Alonso Building**
 - Dates to 1877; now serves as a reception hall.

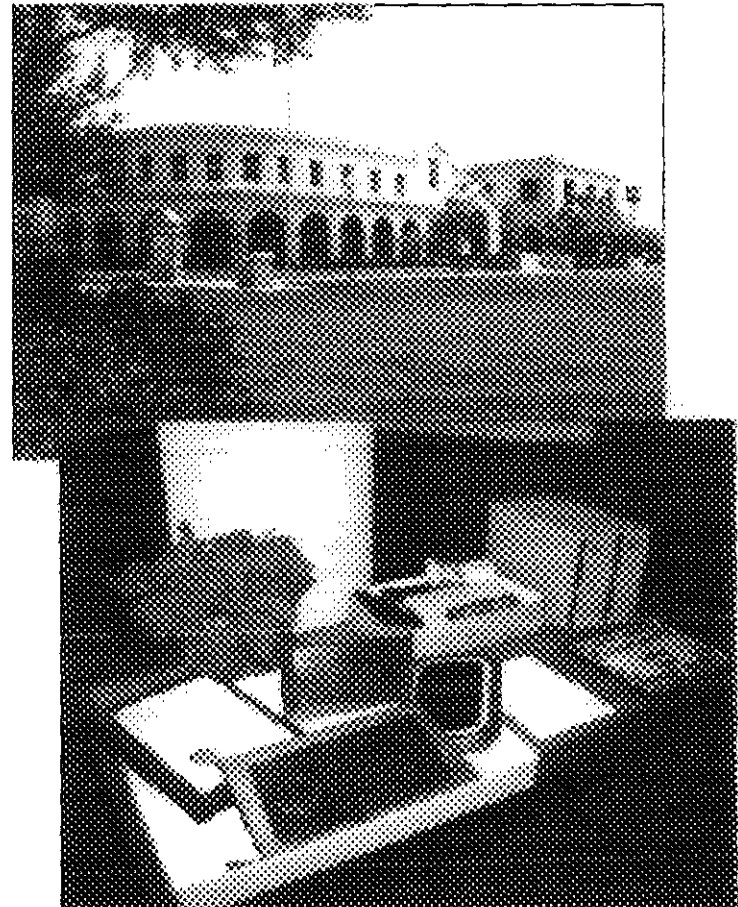

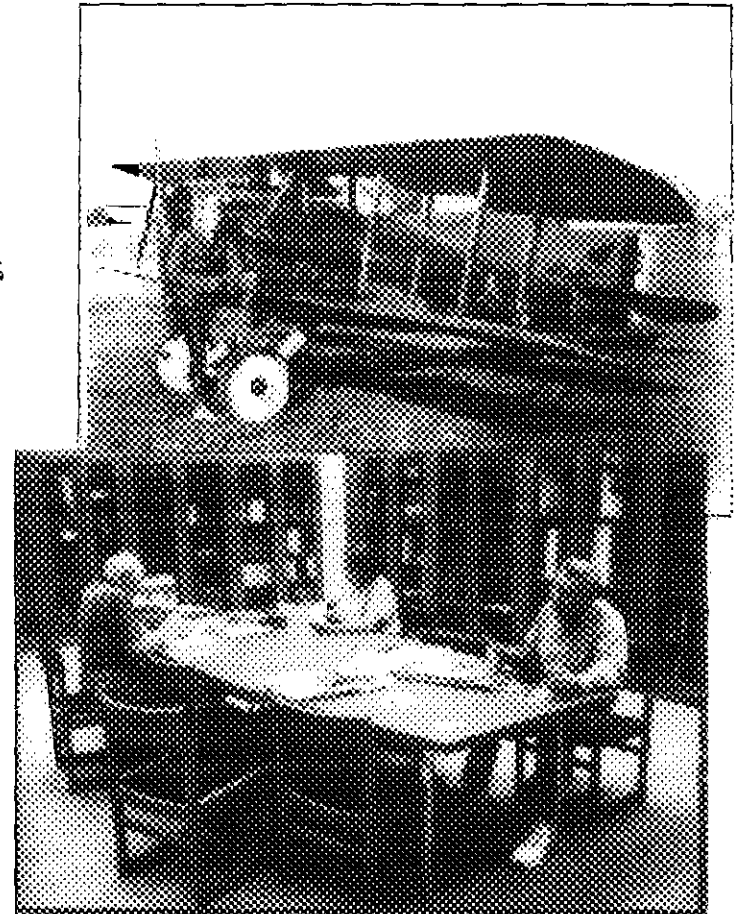
Papers of Menton Joseph Murray Sr.

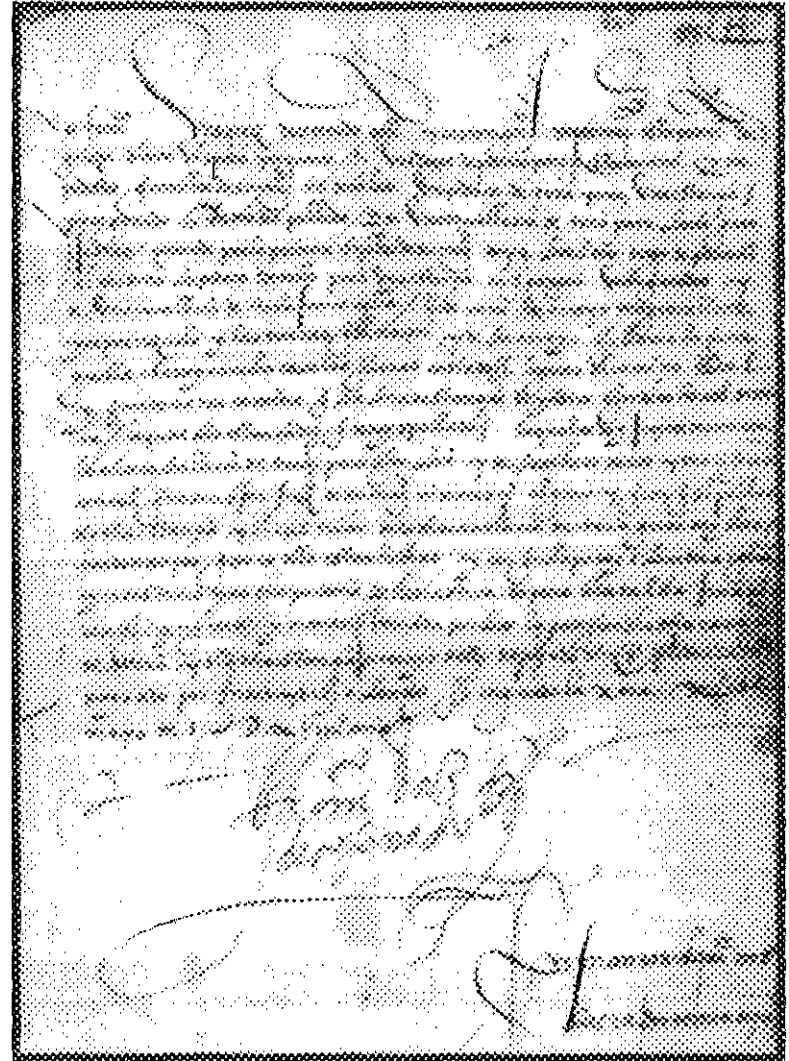

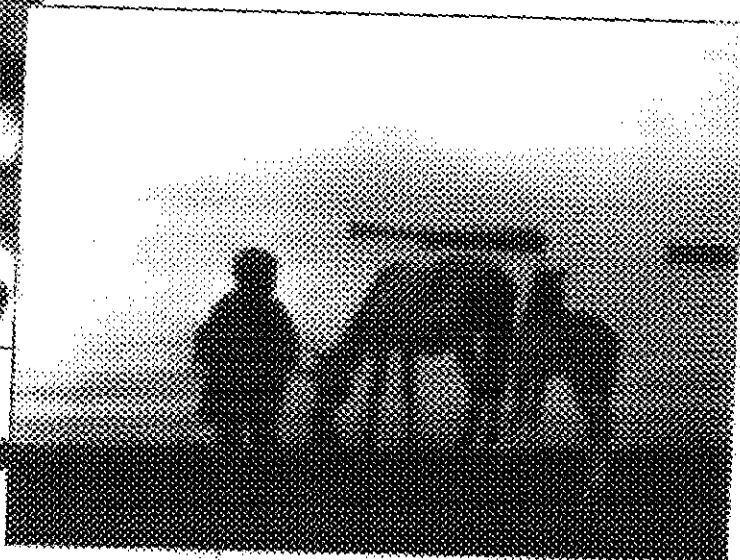
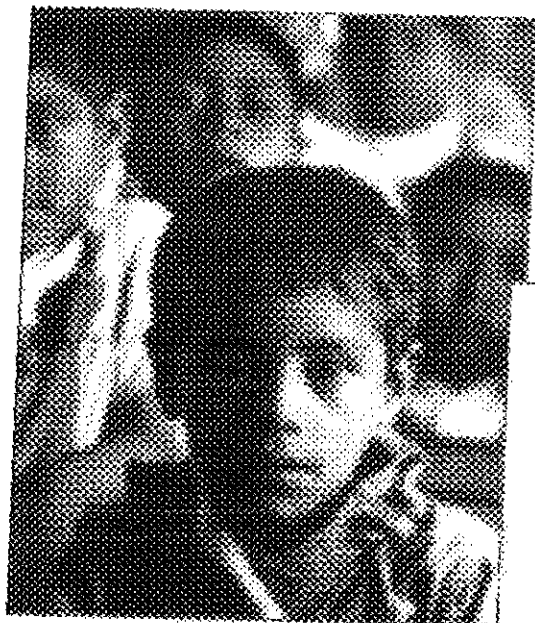


U. T. El Paso

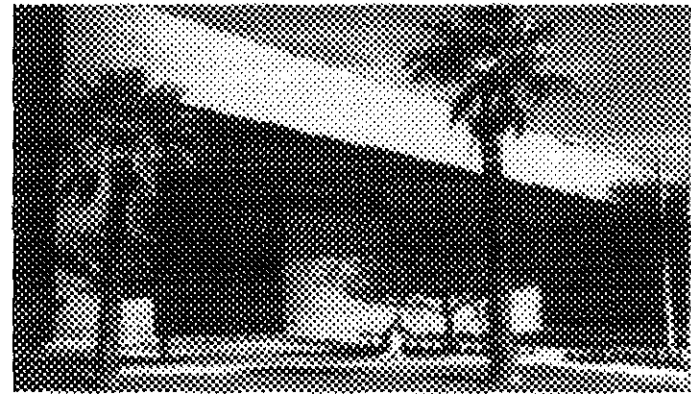

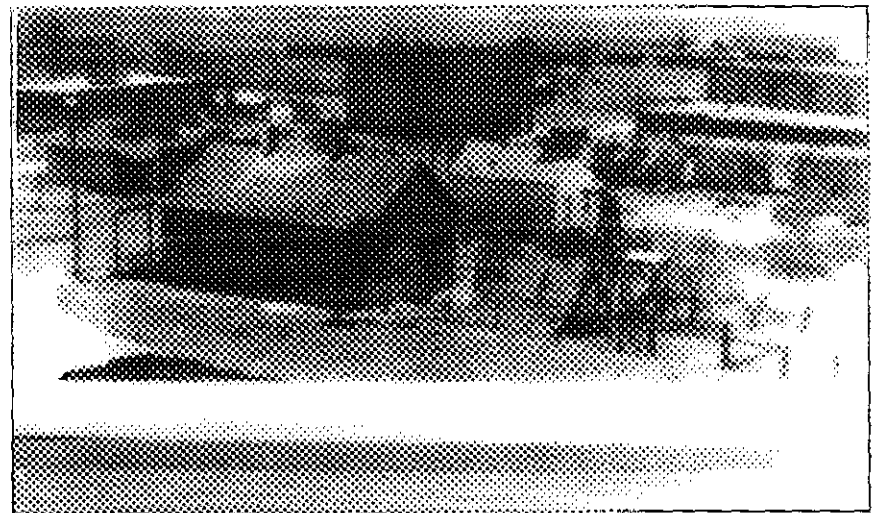
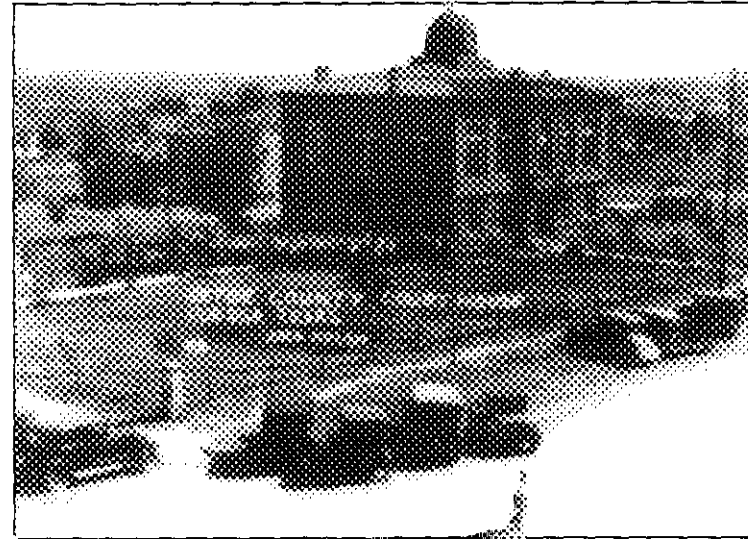


- Shary is known as the father of the Texas citrus industry. His papers are at the University Library .

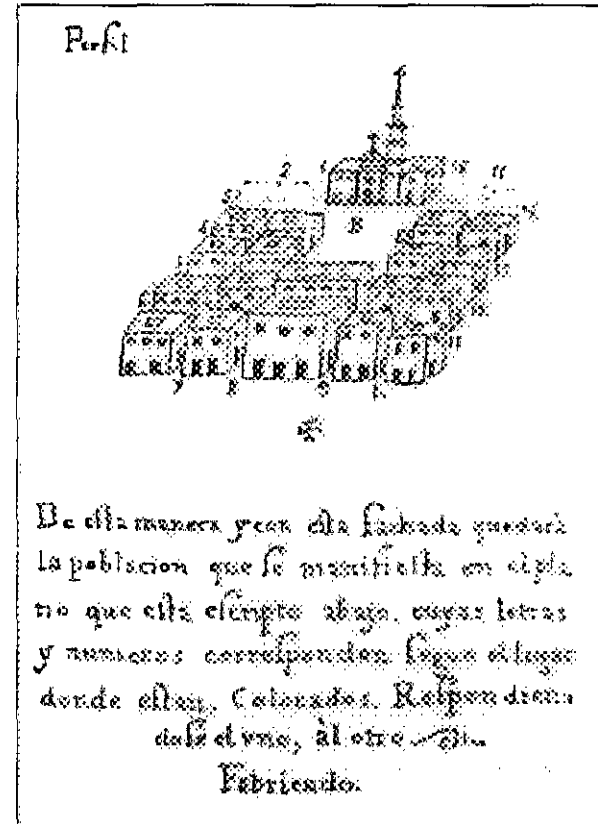

- **Groundbreaking was held on April 12, 2001.**

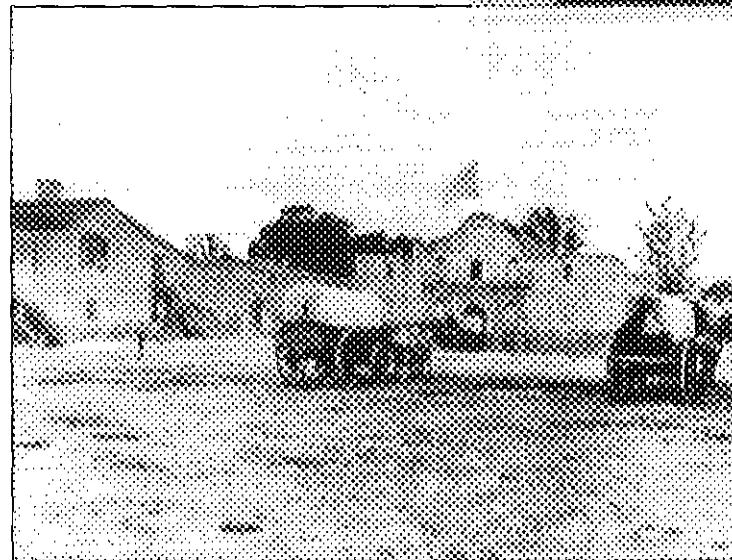
U. T. San Antonio

 - **Primary and Secondary source materials on the history of South Texas, Bexar County, and San Antonio since the Spanish Colonial period.**



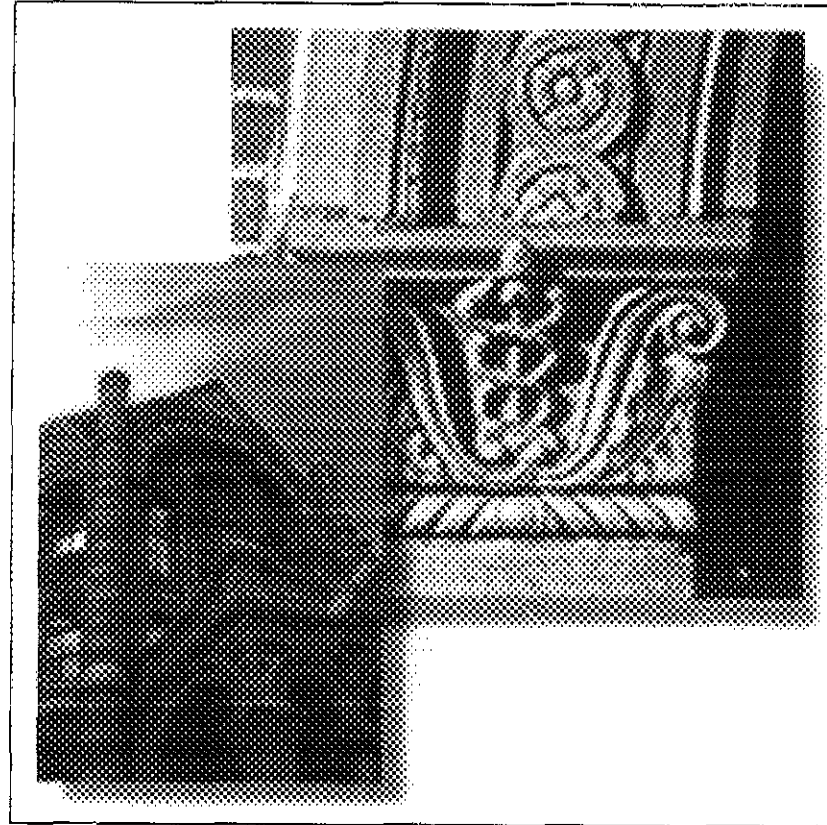
UTSA - Institute of Texan Cultures

- Host of annual Texas Folklife Festival.



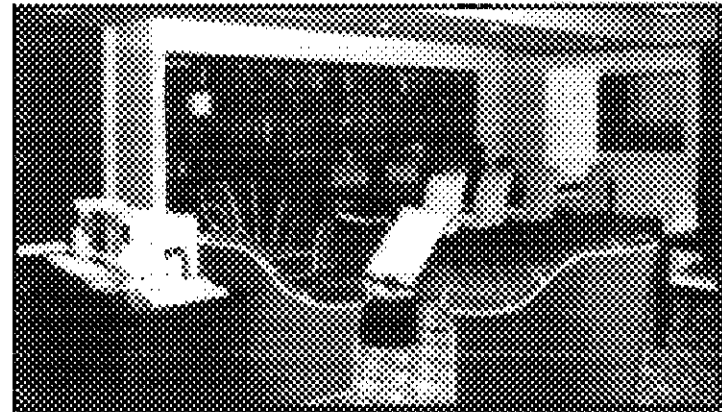

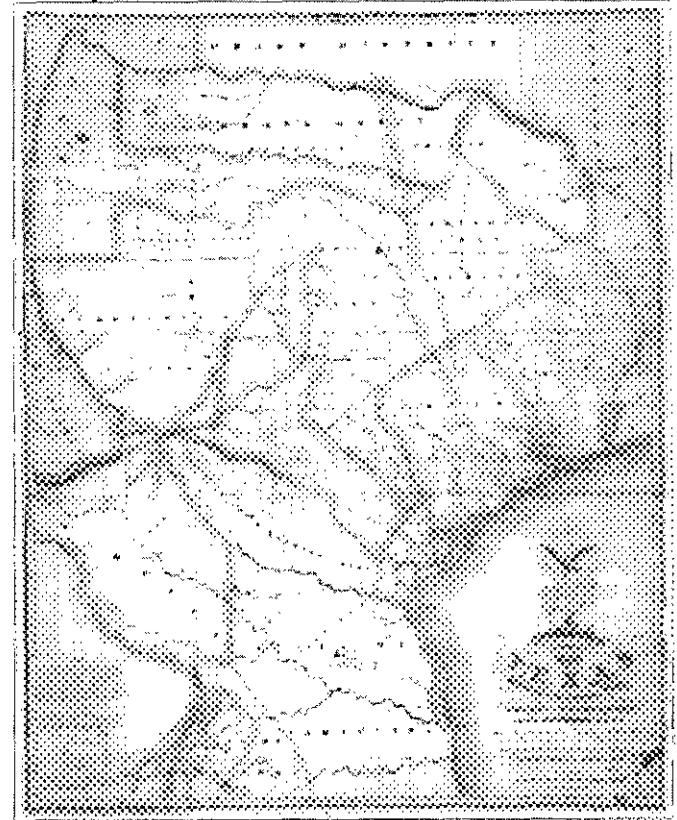
- **Pat Ireland Nixon

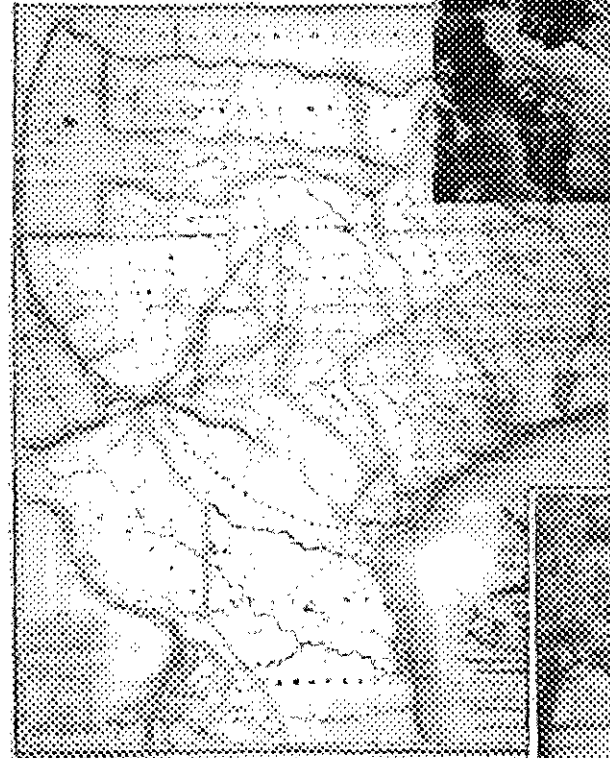
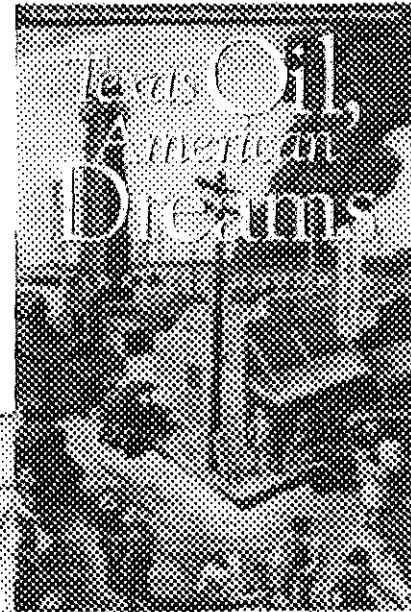
Special collections and programs that contribute to the documentation, preservation, and study of the history and culture of Texas

- **Nettie Lee Benson Latin American Collection**
 - an outstanding Mexican American history library and archive
- **Texas Memorial Museum**
 - an extensive collection of Texas history artifacts and drawings
- **Blake Alexander Architectural Archive of the General Libraries**
 - a valuable collection of architectural drawings and plans
- **Center for Studies in Texas History**
 - includes oversight of the Junior Historian chapters in public schools, publication of the Southwestern Historical Quarterly, and the Handbook of Texas Project
- **Texas Archeological Research Laboratory**
 - major excavations at historic sites, including the Pavo Real site in Bexar County

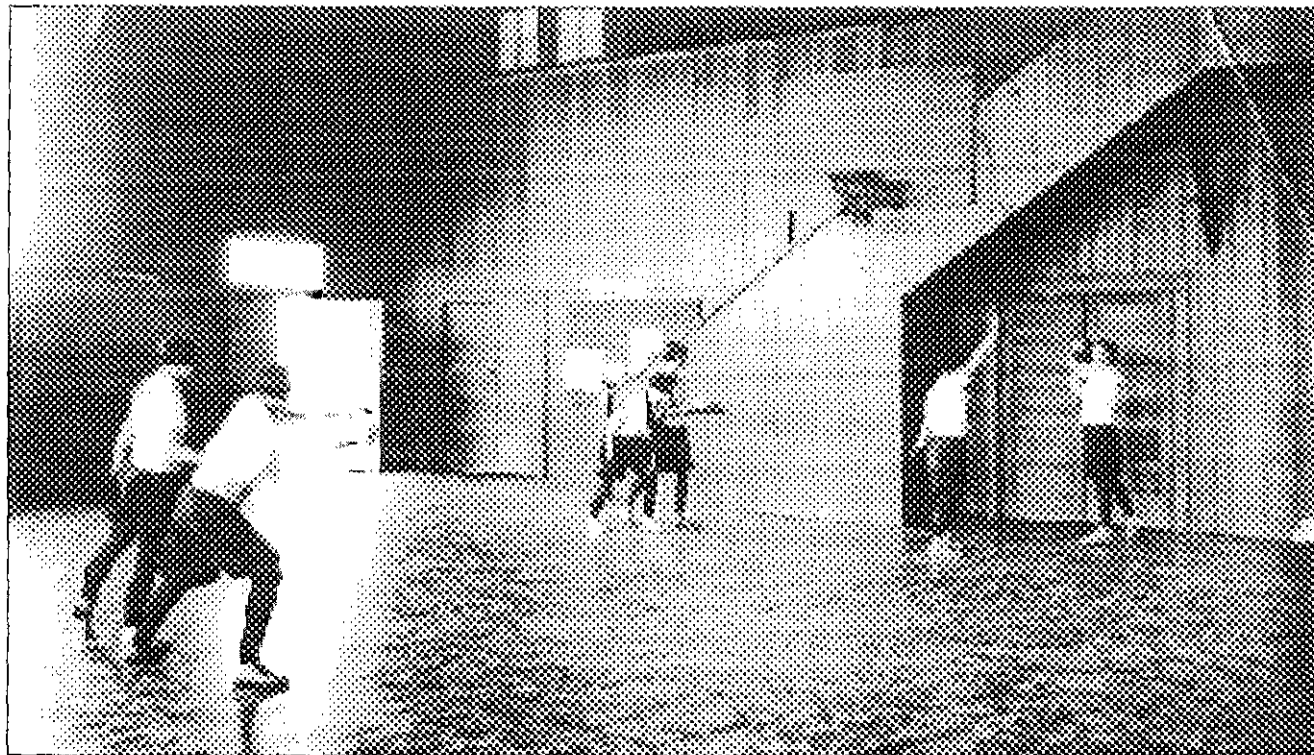

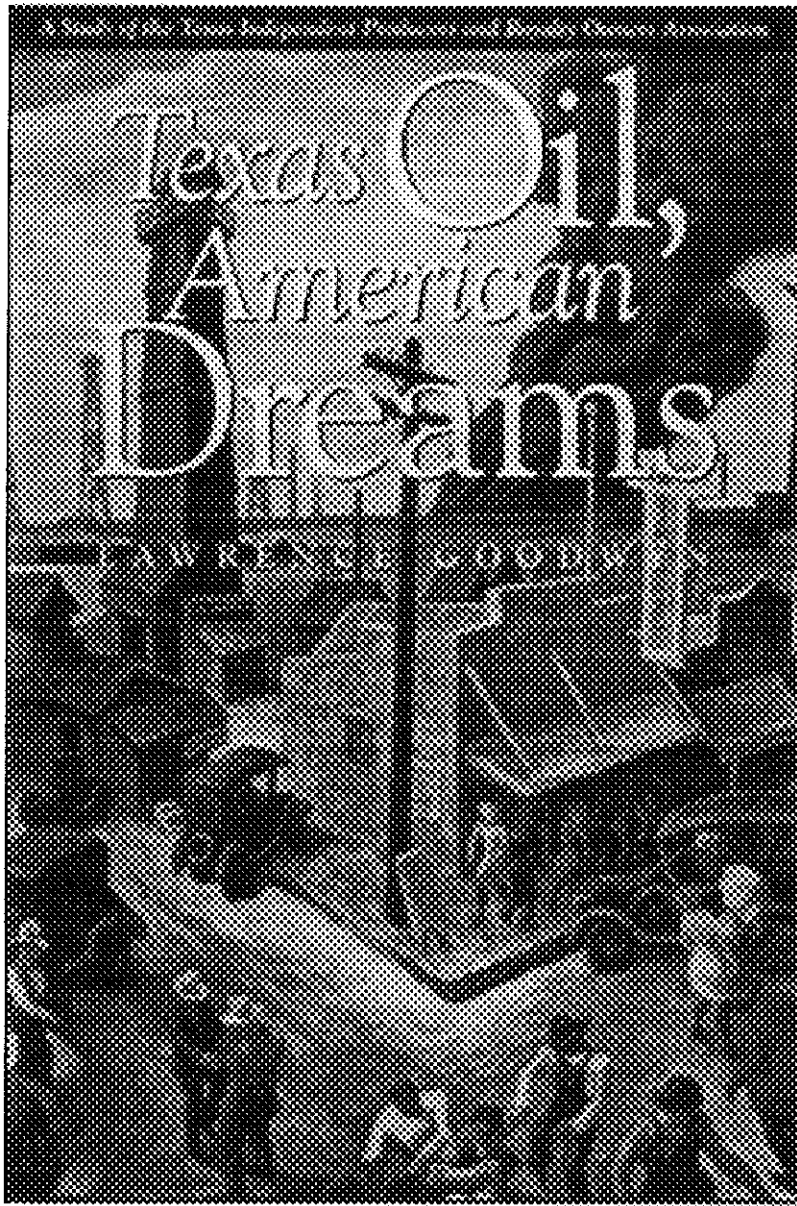

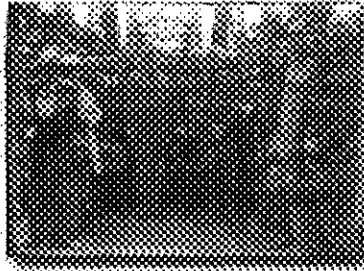


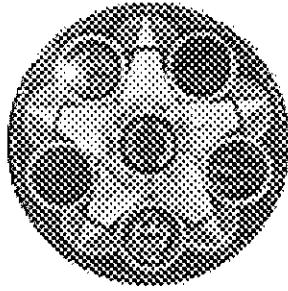






The South Texas Border,

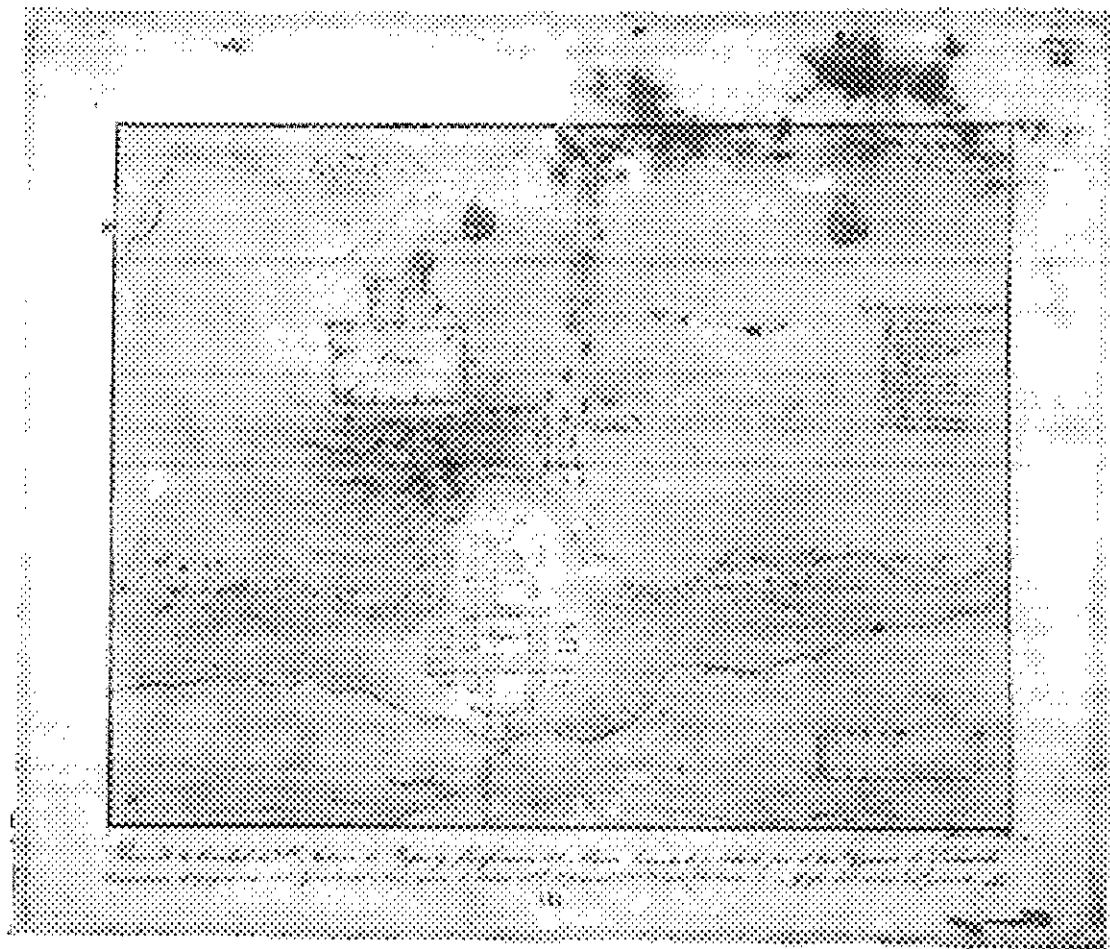

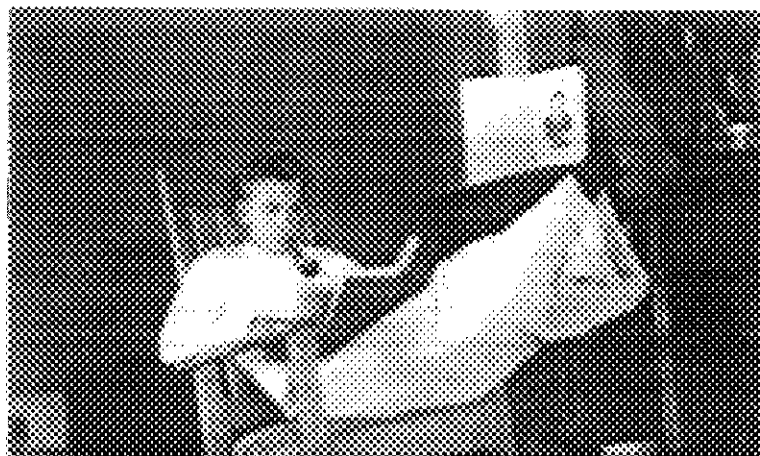
HOGG, IMA (1882-1975). Ima Hogg, philanthropist and patron of the arts, daughter of Sarah Ann (Stinson) and Governor James Stephen Hogg,^{qv} was born in Mineola, Texas, on July 10, 1882. She had three brothers, William Clifford Hogg,^{qv} born in 1875; Michael, born in 1885; and Thomas Elisha Hogg,^{qv} born in 1887. Ima was named for the heroine of a Civil War^{qv} poem written by her uncle Thomas Elisha and was affectionately known as Miss Ima for most of her long life. She was eight years old when her father was elected governor; she spent much of her early life in Austin. After her mother died of tuberculosis in 1895, Ima attended the Coronal Institute in San Marcos, and in 1899 she entered the University of Texas. In 1901 Ima, who had played the piano since the age of three, went to New York to study music. Her father died in 1906. From 1907 to 1909 she continued her music studies in Berlin and Vienna. She then moved to Houston, where she gave piano lessons to a select group of pupils and helped found the Houston Symphony Orchestra,^{qv} which played its first concert in June 1913. She served as the first vice president of the Houston Symphony Society and became president in 1917. She became ill in late 1918 and spent the next two years in Philadelphia under the care of a specialist in mental and nervous disorders. She did not return to Houston to live until 1923.

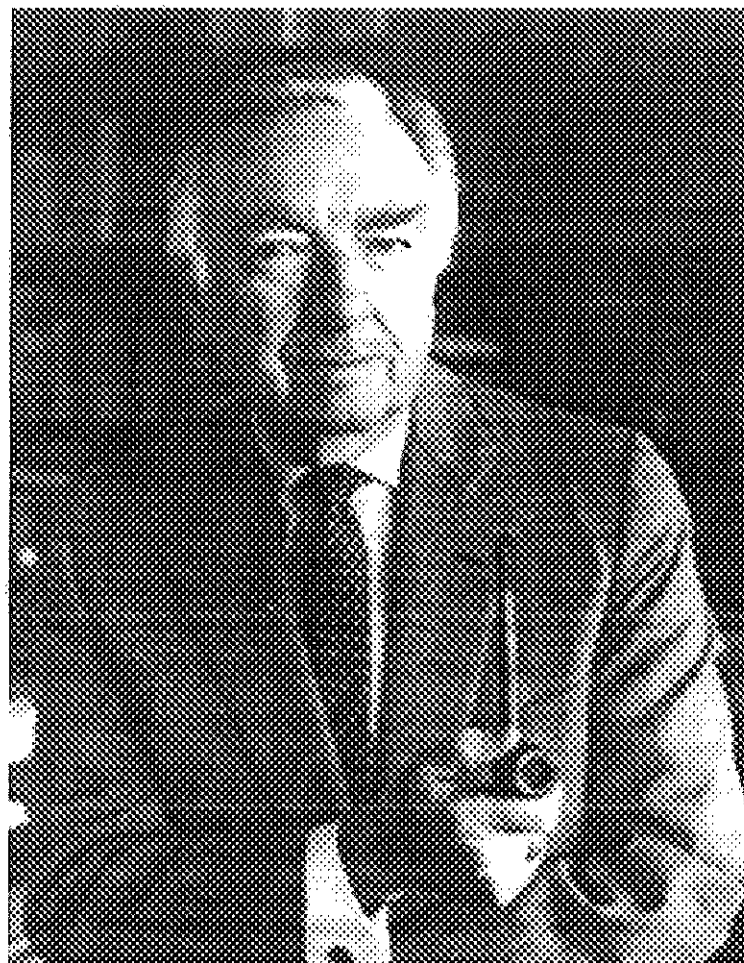
