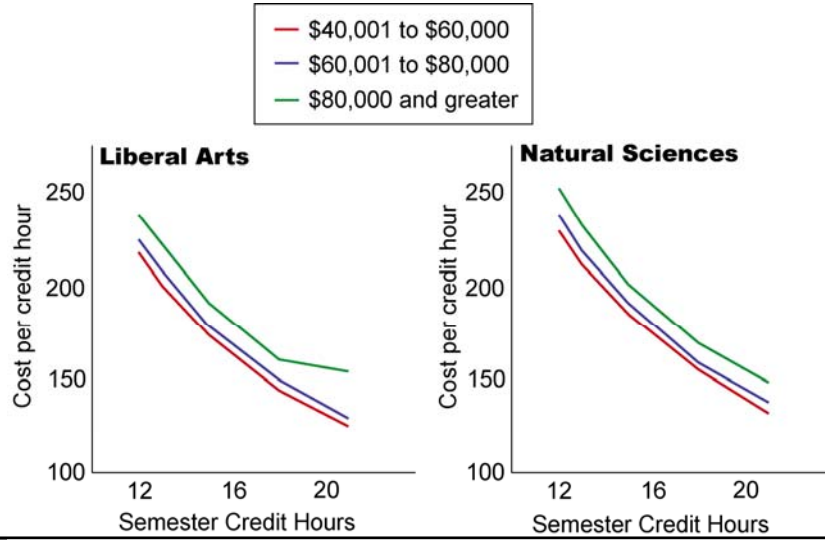

- Cost-savings with higher course loads
- Opportunity costs of staying out of labor force are large
- Living costs for staying in college do not change
- Students tend to take out more loans as number of semesters increases

Innovations

- Tuition discounts for courses at off-peak hours (UTT)
- Tuition discounts for summer school (U.T. Austin)
- Differential tuition for academic colleges or majors (UTA, U.T. Austin)
- Flat rate tuition (U.T. Austin)
- Tuition and fees capped at certain credit hour load (UTPA)
- Cap or freeze on future fees (U.T. Austin, UTD, UTSA, UTT)
- Tuition rebates for students who return to finish last 15 hours and graduate (UTSA)

Innovations

- **Earned tuition credit for senior year (UTPB, UTT)**
- **Discount for early or timely tuition payment (UTA)**
- **Tuition and fee increase hold-harmless for financially needy students (ALL)**
- **Grants for part-time and community college transfer students (UTA, UTD)**
- **No-interest loans for education majors and loan forgiveness for those who teach for a certain number of years (UTSA)**
- **Campus jobs for financially needy students with unmet need (UTD, UTEP, UTT)**
- **Financial assistance for middle income students who do not qualify for other aid (UTSA, UTPB, UTT)**
- **No-interest loans to buy books at the beginning of semesters (UTEP)**
