At a meeting of the Board of Regents held this day, J. S. Henderson, Chairman of the Board, and Regents Breckinridge, Spencer, Bryan, Gregory were present.

The morning session was spent in consideration of University business, without any specific action being taken. Adjourned to 3 p.m.

Regents Henderson, Breckinridge, Spencer were present, Regent Bryan not well.

The following report of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds was presented by said committee and adopted by the Board:

To the Board of Regents:

Water Supply.

To find upon best information obtainable that it will require 5000 feet of 6" 10" and 12" water pipe together with other specials are necessary to make connections with the new 6", 10" and 12" pipes so as best to protect the buildings and upon the grounds, and also the 3000 ft. long water tank, by enclosing the same building the tank.

This will cost \$1000.00, therefore, we estimate that the cost of pipe and necessary labor, cleaning, etc., to connect the new tanks and connection to the tanks, will cost \$10,000.00, to which other expenses still, in all probability, bring the sum up to \$12,000.00.

In addition we would suggest at least 10 ft. 6" diameter of a sort of irrigation system to irrigate the grounds and fields, costing \$500.00-\$1000.00. It will require about one acre of ground water, costing \$500.00-\$1000.00. To this will however add the cost of connecting stand-pipes to these two reservoirs the cost of which will be \$1000.00 and pipe with University building 200 feet at a cost of \$1000.00, about one mile of 6" 10" 12" pipe \$100.00 to connect the tanks, enclosing the tanks, and the cost of the irrigation system, leaving \$1000.00 to \$1500.00 to complete the work.

It was ordered that the action and report of
the Committee on Buildings and Grounds con-
cerning plans for the proposed Warren's building be
approved; and that the action heretofore taken by the
Board in instructing said committee to submit
the question of plans and specifications to competition
among all of the architects of the State be reconsidered
and decided on the ground that it is impracticable
and would cause unnecessary delay to do so; - and,
further, that the general plan of said building,
proposed for said location, may be English & Ayres,
or such architect or firm or persons as said Com-
mittee shall name; and that said architect be

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recommended to the Governor for appointment as the
Architects to superintend building, plans and specifications
and the expenses thereon of said buildings; and
that upon the appointment of said architect by the Governor,
said committee shall prepare legal and proper
contracts with said architect for said services; and fur-
ther, that said committee be directed to procure from
said architect final plans and specifications for said
building, and that such plans be prepared for a general
building and also for a few group buildings; and that said
committee forthwith communicate with the usual organ-
izations, in The Dallas News, Houston Post, Austin
Statesman, Austin Tribune, and San Antonio Express,
for bids for the construction of said building also for
five-story building (all bids to be subject to rejection); and
that, upon acceptance of a bid, said committee shall
prepare proper and legal contracts with such bidder
for (the) the construction of) said building, the same to be se-
cured by a good and solvent bond to be ~~supplied~~ by the
Chairman by the Board. All contracts to be executed on
behalf of this Board of Regents by the chairman thereof.
It is further directed that said building be erected
on the northwest corner of the University Campus.

Dear Sirs, Dr. Guy B. Bryan, Miss Kelly Bellinger Bryan, and Hon. Beauregard Bryan, Library Committee of the State Board, Dr. Guy B. The following report of the Medical College committee members and chapter, with the understanding that the same be submitted to the Board for its action, is respectfully submitted:

Report of Medical College Committee

Your Medical College committee beg leave to report, that in a former

report of August 9, 1900, (see pp. 486-87 of these minutes) it was indicated that the sum of \$2200.00 was available as a donation from the Central relief Committee of Galveston, and the same was appropriated to the repairs on the old hospital building for negroes which was moved to the north east end of the John Sealy Hospital grounds to be repaired and used for a home for trained nurses, and for the School of Clinical Medicine; and at that time a further sum was expected from the Relief Committee which would, in the aggregate, amount to \$5.00, but such expectation was not realized and only \$5.00 in all was received, and when on hand was turned into the State treasury to be used in making the aforesaid repairs; and there is but little hope of receiving any further sum from that source. The said repairs are nearing completion. The School of Clinical Medicine has moved in and occupied its portion of the building.

It is with abiding sorrow that your committee has to report the death of Mrs E.J. Carmelly, former student of the clinical instructor in nursing. In consequence of this misfortune, the Chairman of the Medical College Committee authorized the temporary appointment of Miss Marie Old Overton to the discharge of the duties of the position, and which action is respectfully submitted to the wisdom of the Board for ratification.

Your Committee herewith places before the Board a communication from professor Alien J. Smith, Dean of the Medical Faculty, making report of many things in connection with the Department for the action of the Board. The building of the new negro hospital renders it expedient that the stable should be removed from the Sealy hospital grounds to a place in the rear of the College building, and this is respectfully submitted for the action of the Board.

Our chairman made a contract with Mr C.A. Sias, engineer of the city of Galveston, to provide and furnish the necessary material and work to stop the undercutting of water beneath the wall on the North East corner of the hospital grounds, for the sum of \$134.04. This agreement, and an appropriation to meet said obligation is respectfully asked.

We also recommend an appropriation of \$ to pay the claim of architect George B. Stove which has been approved by the chairman of the Medical College committee.

With reference to the time at which the salaries of Miss Magnenat, stenographer and librarian, and of Mr J.O. Kemp, demonstrator of pharmacy, shall commence, we beg to submit the matter to the Board for its action.

Referring to the matter suggested in section 10 of the report of the Dean of the Medical College, your committee recommend that the professor of surgery be authorized to transfer \$50.00 of the appropriation to the School of Surgery to that of anatomy.

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The chairman of the Medical committee, under authority of the Board of Regents, made a contract with May and Wainright for the plumbing and gas fitting in the building being repaired, and we respectfully suggest that an appropriation be made to pay the same.

In pursuance of the communication of the Dean of the Medical faculty, dated January 27, 1902, and addressed to the Medical College committee, we recommend the adoption of ~~Section~~^{the} suggestion No 2, that a laboratory fee of five dollars be charged each student of the Junior class of that school of clinical medicine, for the use of that plant.

Other matters in said communication shall be submitted to the Board for any action they may deem desirable. (Signed: F.M. Spencer, Ch'm Medical

College Committee.)

The following letter from Hon. Lewis Hancock
was read:

Austin, Texas, Oct. 29, 1901.

President Wm J. Prather, University of Texas, Austin, Texas.
Dear Sir: You may remember that we had, some weeks ago, a short conversation bearing on the condition of economic thought in the University and in our community generally. We agreed, I believe, that any aid, however small, extended to the development of an active and practical interest in economic questions would be of value to the University and to Texas. With the object of aiding such a development I will give to the University the sum of two hundred ~~dollars~~ and fifty dollars, to be awarded at the end of the University year, as a prize or fellowship, upon the conditions stated below; provided they meet your approval and that of the government of the University.

The conditions referred to are as follows: The award to be made to the student:

- (a) Of good standing in the University.
- (b) Who has had one University course in Economics.
- (c) Who, under the supervision of the school of political science, prepares the most creditable thesis on some economic question relating to Texas, the theses to be passed upon by the professors of Political Economy Science, Philosophy and History.
- (d) The fellow to continue his work in Texas economics during his fellowship year.
- (e) The fellow not to be required to give any of his time to instruction.
- (f) The award to be made without reference to the financial status of the candidate.

I hope to be able to continue offering this sum, but do not promise it.

In view of my recent donation, the donation of Mr. Hancock was accepted on the terms set forth in his letter, and the President was requested to draft resolution of thanks for the same.

The following resolution was drawn by the President and adopted by the Board in reference to Mr. Hancock's gift: "Whereas Mr. Lewis Hancock, of Austin, Texas, has, by letter under date of Oct. 29, 1901, offered to donate to the University of Texas the sum of two thousand and fifty dollars cash, as a prize or fellowship to be awarded at the end of the current University year to the Student [as stated in a. b. c. d. e.] of the foregoing letter from Mr. Hancock; therefore be it resolved by the Board of Regents that this generous offer on the part of Mr. Hancock be, upon the terms named, accepted by the Board, and that there

corded on the minutes an expression of sincere appreciation of the purpose of the gift.
 Resolved, further that the letter of Mr. Hancock be entered upon the minutes of the Board and file by the Secretary with the archives of the University for preservation; and that a copy of these resolutions be transmitted to Mr. Hancock by the Secretary, under the seal of the University.

 The President reported that, in pursuance of the resolution (pp 501-2 of the book) passed by the Board to obtain additional room for the classes in Engineering, the room (No 49) hitherto used for Chemistry on the first floor of the Main building, opposite to the room used by the class in Drawing, had been assigned to the drawing class in Engineering, and the desks in the History room removed to other rooms; and that a re-assignment of class rooms had been made so as to harmonize with this change including the assignment of the classes in Botany to the Thesaurus and Rock Litterary Society rooms Halls; and that room No 1, in the north west corner of the basement of the west wing had been transferred from the school of Chemistry to the school of Physics.

On motion made and carried, the foregoing action of the President was approved.

It was ordered that the joint resolution passed by the Board of Regents and the Board of Directors of the Agricultural and Mechanical College relating to the admission of students expelled from either of these institutions be published in the next catalog of the University, and that the A. and M. College be requested to publish the same in their next catalog.

 Treasurer - In consequence of a statement made by the President that there are several thousand dollars ~~due~~ in the State Treasury belonging to the permanent

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funds of the University and not invested as the law requires, the finance committee were requested to examine the law pertaining thereto and have such action taken as the law requires.

The following, offered by regent Gregory, was adopted:

 Resolved - That the Auditorium shall be used for proper University functions and of entertainment conducive to mental culture alone, and that the President is authorized to allow its use within these limitations and on terms satisfactory to him. All money received for its use to be donated, under direction of the President, to some worthy student organization.

 Dr. Francis Henderson appeared before the Board with regard to the sale of a tract of University land to a citizen of Yancey County. The matter was referred to the Land Committee for report to the Board.

 On motion of regent Spencer the sum of ten dollars was appropriated for the payment of the annual fee to the National Association of Presidents of Colleges and Universities in the United States, for the promotion of higher education in said institutions.

 The President presented the report of Dr. Phillips on the mineral survey for the months of October, November and December, 1901.

(Handwritten notes on the left margin)
 The sum of (\$500.00) five hundred dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary was appropriated to cleaning out and utilizing the basement of the main building, under the direction of the President.

(Handwritten notes on the left margin)
 The President had some communications addressed to him with regard to the employment of a machinist for the University buildings no action taken.

(Handwritten notes on the left margin)
 In consideration of statements made in a communication from F. Warner Curtis, Physical Director for the University, and at his request,

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for the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, was appropriated to be suspended - if deemed advisable by the President - in the construction of a greater ride running track on the University Athletic field.

In the recommendation of the Athletic Committee of the University, transmitted by its chairman, Dr. J. E. Herzer, it was ordered that, next year, the sum of five dollars be paid in to the Proctor of the University for by all male members of the Freshman class for the purchase of a Gymnasium suit, with the promise 1 - That if the said suit cost less than the amount specified the balance shall be returned; and 2, that any student who brings the Proctor a written statement from the Physical Director to the effect that he has a satisfactory gymnasium suit shall be exempt from the payment of \$4.25 of the said five dollars. This five dollars is intended to cover the following items, to wit: Sweater Jersey, \$1.50, Tumepants, 1.75, Tennis Slippers, 75, Belt, .25, Locker fee, .50, Deposit on locker key, .25 = \$5.00.

The sum of four thousand dollars was appropriated for the purchase of "several books of views" and "large pictures of the Main University." The Registrar asked for \$350 worth of the former and \$150.00 worth of the latter. Bill, \$400 being appropriate. It was ordered that preference be given to the "several book of views." These publications are intended for general distribution as advertising agencies.

House The petition of Miss Anna House and others for permission to use the University Ladies Gymnasium for basket ball practice in exchange for the use of their basket ball court in the city, on the grounds of Mr. E. H. House, was ~~denied~~ refused on the ground that to grant it would set a precedent. That it would be unwise to follow.

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On motion of regent Oryan, it was ordered that the matter of the repayment to regent Brockenridge of the sum of \$3,000 paid by him on University Hall Steam-heating plant, be referred to the Finance Committee with the suggestion that the committee secure the opinion of the Attorney General on the subject, if they think best.

Also that the sum of \$134.04 be appropriated for the payment of the bill of W. D. Sien. It was ordered that the salary of Florence Magenat, librarian and stenographer for the Medical College, begin October 10, 1901, and that the payment of salary of J. P. Kemp, demonstrator in Pharmacy, begin October 15, 1901.

The temporary appointment of Miss Marie Olhausen to the position of Superintendent of Nurses vice Mrs Emma Lee Bartwell, deceased, was ratified and confirmed; and it was ordered that her salary begin on the 1st day of January, 1902, as she has discharged the duties of the position since that date. (See letter of Dr James F. Thompson, John Sealy Hospital, dated Jan. 14, 1902.)

The President read to the Board an opinion by the Law Society of the University, prepared at the Presidents request, concerning the provisions of the appropriation bill passed by the 2nd legislature so far as they affect the University of Texas.

this day, Regents Henderson, Brackenridge, Spencer, Bryan and
Gregory were present.

The following report was presented by Regent Bryan,
Chairman of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds:

"Your Committee on Buildings and Grounds respectfully
report that we have had under consideration the improvement of the
grounds immediately surrounding and touching the main building of the
University, and report and recommend that the ground around the main
building be graded down about four feet, which will throw the grade
level to one foot below the basement floor. The plans have been
made by J. L. O'Connor, Architect, and specifications for this work
we have had made by Professor T. U. Taylor of the Engineering Depart-
ment. The exact cost of this improvement we cannot now submit, but
are informed by the Architect and Professor Taylor that it will be
approximately \$5,000.00 according to the plans and specifications
herewith attached and marked Exhibit A and B.

Your Committee respectfully urge the adoption of these
plans and specifications, and that the sum of \$5,000.00 be set
aside out of the available fund of the University to do this work.
The purpose of doing the grading, as indicated in the plans submitted
by Architect O'Connor and Professor Taylor, is to relieve the base-
ment of being flooded by storm waters, and at the same time the
buildings of the University will be thrown out more in relief,
thus adding to their appearance and effect.

to so modify such plans as they in their wisdom may find necessary
and best for the interest of the University as the work progresses;

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\$5,000 and the sum of \$5,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds available for that purpose.

For your The Committee on Buildings and Grounds begs to report that it has finally and definitely decided upon the general outline and plan for the woman's building, and respectfully asks for your consideration of bids which are to be opened this day.

In addition to what was suggested by your Committee at your last meeting with reference to establishing a water works plant and the improvement of the grounds, we beg to report that we thought it necessary in connection with the water supply and irrigation, to adjust the levels and grades so as to make it permanent and at the same time relieve the foundation of the building from water by draining and grading according to plans and specifications herewith submitted, which we beg that you will consider and give such directions as you may think proper, at least in a general way approving or suggesting changes in the plans submitted by your Committee.

Your Board of Managers of the Asclepiad Hall beg to offer the following report for the year 1901-1902.

The building has during the session, as during the preceding year, been occupied by the Nurses of the Sealy Hospital Training School and by the women students of the College proper, and has not available therefor for the use of the men students as a home, as originally intended. With the return of the women students to the University Hall and the removal of the nurses to the Nurses' Home, it is expected to arrange for a modest amount of furniture for the building, and the establishment of the Club for the coming session.

The interest of the purchase money has been paid for the first year and although nothing could be done toward cancelling the original debt, it is hoped that by the time of the next report some progress in this direction may have been accomplished. Little can be done however toward repairing the building and for some time to come it is feared that the general appearance of the property must remain unsatisfactory; although when the debt of the Club is well in hand every effort to repair and beautify the property will be made.

At a meeting by the Board of Regents held this day, Regent Henderson, Brewsterridge, Bryan, Spencer, and Gregory were present.

The minutes of the meeting held by the Board in Galveston on May 31, 1902 were read and an motion made and carried, the action then taken was ratified, approved and adopted, and made a part of the proceedings of this meeting.

At a meeting of the Board held this day, T. S. Henderson, Secy. W. Brockensridge, J. W. Gregory, Beauregard Bryan, were present.

The Medical College Budget for 1903-4 and 1904-5 was read by the President and referred to the Finance Committee for report to the Board.

The following memorandum prepared by the President was read in Mr. Brockensridge's presence, and was ordered of record:

"Mr. Brockensridge stated that he would contribute to the Woman's Building the sum of \$18,000.00 which would include the \$3,000 heretofore advanced by him for heating University Hall, and \$15,000.00 additional, aggregating \$18,000.00, which approximately covers the difference in price of making said Building fire proof and adding flues p[er]f[er]ed."

Regent Bryan stated that he had received the nose made by Huber Stone of Brenham, Texas, for the sum of \$250.00, the amount given by Mr. Jennings Bryan as foundation for a prize for the best essay on good government by a student of this University.

The sum of \$95.95 was appropriated to pay the expenses of Judge O.O. Williams coming to Austin and returning home as witness for the University in the suit for the Llano Elyard lands; said sum having already been paid by order of the Chairman of the Board of Regents.

On motion of Regent Baberwick it was ordered that Coughlin & Ayres, Architects for the University, investigate the plumbing contract with M. Dornishke and report in writing to the Committee on Buildings and grounds, who are authorized to take such steps as they may think necessary with regard to the plumbing of said Building.

The action of the Chairman of the Board authorizing publication by Prof. D.W. Taylor of this University, of his article on irrigation in this state was approved and ratified.

The sum of \$300⁰⁰ was appropriated to equip a Post Office in the main University Building.

The matter of Dr. McLaughlin and Dr. Sappington connected with the Medical Department of the University was referred to the President of the University, and the Chairman of the Medical Committee, to investigate the rights of the University in the building and take such action as they may deem best.

The Board then adjourned until to-morrow, the 16th, at 9 a.m.

Board met pursuant to adjournment, Regents. Sanderson, Baskerville, Gregory, Bryan, Spencer being present.

On invitation of the Board, Judge Humphreys, Mr. Spencer and Mr. Camp presented their claim for reduction of the rents of university lands leased to them at 7cts per acre. This claim was supported by the reading of a number of sworn statements as to the rental value of said lands, and by an address delivered by Mr. Camp. After the retirement of Mr. Camp and the other two gentlemen, the matter of their application was referred to the Land Committee of the Board for such action as they may think proper to take.

The following resolution by Regents Gregory was read and adopted:

"Resolved that it is the sense of the Board of Regents, (1) that all candidates for admission to the Main University, when properly qualified, should be allowed to matriculate at any time during the session or standing whatever examination may be required to show that they are qualified to take up the work of the classes they desire to enter at the stage the work has reached.

(2). That no additional fee should be charged candidates who apply for admission after any particular date.

(3). That the attention of the Faculty be called to these resolutions with the request that they take action accordingly."

The budget for presentation to the Legislature for 1903-4 and 1904-5 was presented by the Finance Committee and adopted by the Board.

It was resolved and carried that Mr. B. Phillips, Prof. of Economics and Field Geology, in addition to his present position, be designated as acting Prof. of Mining and Metallurgy, and discharge the duties of that position in the University without extra salary therefor.

Sep. 16, 1902.

The President reported that, with the concurrence and approval of the Committee on Instructors, Mr. A. Endress had been appointed Instructor in Mechanical Drawing, at a salary of \$1200⁰⁰ per annum. On motion the action of the President and Committee was approved.

The President read a communication from Prof. W. B. Phillips, Director of the Mineral Survey; whereupon the Board directed the President, in preparing the report of the Board of Regents to the Legislature, to give a brief history of the work of the Survey and ask an appropriation of \$25,000⁰⁰ therefor.

It was reported by the President that the sum of over \$11,000⁰⁰ of the permanent University fund remains invested in the Treasury.

~~See post. The sum of \$100.00 was appropriated to Mr. Waller, one of the Chemists in the Mineral Survey for extra work done for Mr. Palmer in his absence, Mr. Palmer being another one of the Chemists of the Mineral Survey.~~

The resignation of Dr. H. R. Dodgeon, of the Medical College, was accepted, and it was ordered that the vacancy caused thereby be filled temporarily, subject to approval of the Board.

The sum of \$250⁰⁰ was ordered to be paid to Prof. Medis in consideration of his services as Dean of the Academic Faculty.

Miss Mattie A. Austin was elected Fellow in History at a salary of \$250⁰⁰ per annum.

The President announced the resignation of Mr. J. F. Loring as his stenographer, whereupon the appointment by him of Mr. W. A. Board to fill the place, at a salary of \$720.00 per annum. This action of the President was noticed and approved by the Board.

The President reported the resignation by Mrs. J. Potts of the fellowship in political science in this University, and said that he would confer with Prof. Thos. W. Page with regard to the selection of some one to take the position so made vacant.

It was ordered that the sum of two hundred dollars be paid to Steve H. Merrill in the Mineral Survey during the present year, so as to make his salary of \$1,000, in consideration of his doing the analytical and assay work of the Survey since the resignation of Charles H. Harwood, a former member of this Board, for the excellent example he set of himself, presented by them to the University of Texas, and the Proctor is hereby instructed to have the same placed on the wall of the Regents' Room.

"Resolved, further, That ~~a copy~~ resolution be entered upon the minutes of the Board, and a copy thereof transmitted by the Secretary to the family."

The President presented to the Board an agreement signed by delegates of all the fraternities and sororities in this University not to solicit, pledge or ask any first year students to join a fraternity until after the 16th day of January of each session. This on condition that the resolution passed by the Board of Regents (June 11, 1902, p. 548, work B of Minutes) be modified to accord with the said agreement; and that the matter of carrying out this agreement and proportion to the fraternities themselves. On motion of Regent Braverman, the change suggested by the fraternities, and the other modifications suggested by them, were agreed to by the Board.

This donation was accepted by the Board of Regents, and the President was requested to express to Mr. Willard their thanks for the same and to give the donor's letter to the press.

The sum of eight dollars was appropriated for gas cut-offs on each floor of Roberts Memorial Hall.

The employment of C. L. F. Butte, as Assistant Registrar, beginning Oct 1, 1902, at fifty dollars per month, was ratified and approved by the Board.

The sum of \$350.00 (Three hundred and fifty dollars) was appropriated for the purchase of a Microle machine for making distilled water for the School of Chemistry, to be imported from Germany if the President thinks that the most suitable way of procuring it.

Prof. of Electrical Eng. J. O. Fisher was elected full professor of Electrical

Engineering, at a salary of \$2500 per annum, to begin Jan. 1, 1903.

A communication from the Faculty on the subject of delayed registration in this university was read to the Board, but no action was taken. (See page 22, Dec. 2, 1902, p. 723.)

A report from the Athletic Council was presented to the Board, and consideration thereof postponed to the regular meeting in January, 1903.

The appointment of J. B. Scarrey, as fellow in Political Science, to succeed P. D. Parks resigned, was ratified and approved. Mr. Scarrey's salary was fixed at the rate of \$2500 per annum.

The sum of \$100.00 was appropriated for repair of elevators in the Main Building - including new cables and plastering.

Milton B. Porter and Henry Mandell Benedict were elected Associate Professors of Mathematics in this University, - each to receive a salary of \$2400 per annum, - and Mr. Porter to be head of the School.

The President further was authorized to supply Miss Edwards and Miss Nellie Hall as cataloguers in the library.

A communication from Registrar of Ms. A. Lomax concerning a deficit in funds for new books of last year was presented, and consideration thereof was deferred to the next regular meeting in Jan., 1903.

It was ordered that a tablet be placed in the vestibule of Roberts Memorial Hall, inscribed with the names of the Board of Regents, the President of the University, and the Secretary of the Board of Regents.

Letter from a letter from the Otis Elevator Company, to Regent Brackenridge, concerning a defect in an elevator in the Woman's Building now in course of erection, was read and ordered to be filed. (See entry for this meeting.)

Jan. 21 & 22, 1903.

No business was transacted by the Board this day and adjourned to 10 a. m. to-morrow.

January 22, 1903.

At a meeting of the Board of Regents held to-day, Regents Henderson, J. Bryan, Spencer, Gregory, were present.

Chairman of the Board, T. D. Henderson reported, verbally, that the Land Committee, to whom was referred the application of Messrs. Humphreys, Spencer and Bryan for reduction of the rental of certain lands hitherto leased to said application; that the chairman had communicated said decision to Judge Humphreys; and that Judge Humphreys had declared his desire to appeal to the Board from the decision of the committee. - No action upon this matter was taken by the Board. The chairman also presented letters on the subject from Regent Brackenridge to him; from him to Judge Humphreys, and reply from Judge Humphreys. Judge Humphreys' letter was read to the Board, and all three of said letters ordered to be received and filed. (See to be set by the Board.)

Regent Gregory, chairman of the Finance Committee, agreed to attend to the drafting of a law regulating the investment of the permanent University fund, said draft to be submitted to the 28th legislature for enactment.
