In accordance with a notice being duly posted with the Secretary of State and there being a quorum present, Chairman Huffines called the meeting to order.

WELCOME TO EXECUTIVE VICE CHANCELLOR PRIOR, VICE CHANCELLOR MCDOWELL, AND MR. BRUCE ZIMMERMAN, PRESIDENT, CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER AND CHIEF INVESTMENT OFFICER OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS INVESTMENT MANAGEMENT COMPANY (UTIMCO).--Chairman Huffines welcomed Dr. David B. Prior, Executive Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs; Dr. H. Keith McDowell, Vice Chancellor for Research and Technology Transfer; and Mr. Bruce E. Zimmerman, President, Chief Executive Officer and Chief Investment Officer of The University of Texas Investment Management Company (UTIMCO), to their first Board meeting.

#### AGENDA ITEMS

### 1. U. T. Dallas: Appointment of Dr. Robert H. Rutford as President Emeritus

Dr. Robert H. Rutford was appointed President Emeritus at The University of Texas at Dallas where he served as President from 1982-1994. He was the initial holder of the endowed Excellence in Education Foundation Chair Number 1 and served as Professor in the Department of Geosciences until his retirement in Spring 2007.

Under Dr. Rutford's presidency, U. T. Dallas expanded to include a lower division of freshman and sophomore students and the first on-campus student housing was developed. In addition, Dr. Rutford provided direction and support for the founding of the Erik Jonsson School of Engineering and Computer Science.

Dr. Rutford, a renowned scientist and explorer in Antarctica, has been recognized with the naming of the Rutford Ice Stream and Mount Rutford, both in Antarctica, in his honor. Additionally, Rutford Avenue on the U. T. Dallas campus bears his name in recognition of his accomplishments in developing U. T. Dallas as an outstanding center of excellence in teaching, research, and service to the Metroplex and to the State of Texas.

2. <u>U. T. System Board of Regents: Authorization to negotiate and enter into an Auditing Services Contract with Deloitte & Touche, LLP, to perform audits of the funds managed by The University of Texas Investment Management Company (UTIMCO) for the fiscal year ending August 31, 2007</u>

Upon recommendation of The University of Texas Investment Management Company (UTIMCO) Board of Directors, the Board authorized University of Texas System staff to negotiate and enter into an auditing services contract with Deloitte & Touche, LLP, an independent auditor to (1) perform audits of the financial statements, (2) audit and report on management's assessment of the internal controls over financial reporting, and (3) audit the performance statistics for the fiscal year ending August 31, 2007, for the funds managed by The University of Texas Investment Management Company (UTIMCO) as listed below.

- Permanent University Fund (PUF)
- The University of Texas System General Endowment Fund (GEF)
- Permanent Health Fund (PHF)
- The University of Texas System Long Term Fund (LTF)
- The University of Texas System Intermediate Term Fund (ITF)

The contract will provide for the option to renew for four additional one-year terms.

Fiduciary responsibility for the PUF, GEF, PHF, LTF, and ITF (the Funds) rests with the U. T. System Board of Regents. *Texas Education Code* Section 66.08(f) requires that the U. T. System provide for an annual financial audit of the PUF, if the PUF is within the scope of funds managed by an external management corporation.

The Funds were audited by Deloitte & Touche, LLP, on an annual basis from UTIMCO's inception in 1996 through Fiscal Year 2002. On July 7, 2003, the Board of Regents authorized U. T. System staff to negotiate and enter into an auditing services contract with Ernst & Young, LLP, for one year with a right to

renew in one-year increments for four years. The contract was renewed by the Board of Regents on February 4, 2004, February 10, 2005, February 9, 2006, and February 8, 2007.

Ernst & Young, LLP, notified UTIMCO on April 13, 2007, that the firm had declined to perform the audit of the investment funds managed by UTIMCO for the year ending August 31, 2007. Stating that the reason for its decision was not unique to UTIMCO, the firm noted that, due to its interpretation of recent industry auditing changes, it was not possible to conduct a cost-effective audit approach for endowments similar to UTIMCO's that hold significant alternative investments with different year ends from the endowment year end. The firm noted the inherent delay between the reporting of valuations for certain alternative investments, which are audited at calendar year end, and the August 31, 2007, effective date of the investment funds' audit, could create associated risks.

Accordingly, U. T. System issued a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) to select new outside auditors for the Funds managed by UTIMCO and written proposals were received on June 4, 2007, from two firms: Deloitte & Touche, LLP, and Weaver and Tidwell, LLP.

3. <u>U. T. Austin: Authorization to exercise an option to purchase approximately 2.436 acres of land located at 2200 East Sixth Street, Austin, Travis County, Texas, from Mr. Perry Lorenz for a purchase price of \$1.5 million for the campus of The University of Texas Elementary School and authorization to transfer a total of \$1.945 million from Available University Fund (AUF) reserves to include funding for other items related to the Elementary School</u>

On behalf of The University of Texas at Austin, the Board

- authorized the exercise of an option to purchase approximately
   2.436 acres of land located at 2200 East Sixth Street, Austin, Travis
   County, Texas, from Mr. Perry Lorenz for a purchase price of
   \$1.5 million, plus closing costs and other costs and expenses to complete the acquisition of the property as deemed necessary or advisable by the Executive Director of Real Estate for the campus of The University of Texas Elementary School;
- b. authorized the Executive Director of Real Estate to execute all documents, instruments, and other agreements, subject to approval of all such documents as to legal form by the Office of General Counsel, and to take all further actions deemed necessary or advisable to carry out the purpose and intent of the foregoing action; and
- c. appropriated an additional \$1.5 million in Available University Fund (AUF) reserves to U. T. Austin to fund the purchase.

Further, the Chancellor was authorized to approve a transfer of funds totaling \$1.945 million in AUF reserves to fund the land purchase and to fund the following related to The University of Texas Elementary School:

- a. transfer to U. T. Austin of \$350,000 to cover the purchase price, land cleanup, and soil testing for adjacent property purchased from Capital Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Capital Metro) in 2007;
- b. transfer to U. T. Austin of \$70,000 to reimburse the cost of the classroom project built in 2004; and
- c. transfer to U. T. Austin of \$25,000 for use in funding The University of Texas Elementary School's gymnasium project.
- U. T. Austin requested authorization to exercise its purchase option to acquire the subject property, which is the campus of The University of Texas Elementary School located at 2200 East Sixth Street. On November 15, 2002, the State Board of Education granted a charter to The University of Texas Elementary Charter School at Austin. The U. T. System Board of Regents authorized the establishment of the elementary school on December 20, 2002, and U. T. Austin opened the school in August 2003, which it operates under the name "The University of Texas Elementary School."

Also on December 20, 2002, the Board of Regents authorized the lease or acquisition of the subject property. An Option/Real Estate Contract was entered into in January 2003, which granted the Board of Regents an option to purchase the property and enabled U. T. Austin to place modular buildings on the site in order to open the school in August 2003. The option contract provides for annual option fee payments and allows the Board of Regents to purchase the property between January 1, 2006 and December 31, 2007, at its then fair market value. Mr. Lorenz recently offered to accept a payment of \$1.5 million, approximately \$1 million less than the property's current fair market value, to enable U. T. Austin to complete the purchase.

The subject property is adjacent to a tract containing approximately 21,000 square feet located at 2201 Hidalgo Street. In accordance with the approval from the Board of Regents on August 10, 2006, that tract was purchased on April 27, 2007, from Capital Metro for \$313,236.80 and will be used in conjunction with the subject property for the campus of The University of Texas Elementary School. Additional modular facilities were installed on the site in 2004 and a permanent facility for the school was added to the FY 2004-2009 Capital Improvement Program (CIP) on February 10, 2005.

4. <u>U. T. Pan American: Approval of authorization and changes related to a sports recreation and wellness facility fee; incidental and other fees; and course-related incidental fees effective Fall 2007</u>

The following authorizations and changes related to special, incidental, and course-related fees at The University of Texas - Pan American for Fall 2007 were approved:

- a. a Sports Recreation and Wellness Facility Fee of \$75 per student per semester for the sports recreation and wellness facility scheduled to open in August 2007 as well as facility charges for nonstudents as set forth on Page <u>7</u>. These facility charges were additional recommendations before the Board on yellow paper.
- charge of the Alternative Certification Program (ACP)/Alternative
   Certification Program Extension Fee either directly to the students
   participating in the ACP or to the school district employing ACP students,
   at the discretion of the ACP director;
- c. a Graduate Program Fee of \$75 per semester for students in the graduate Clinical Psychology or Experimental Psychology programs;
- d. Course-Related Fees ranging from \$5 to \$40, as attached on Pages 8 12; and
- e. renaming of the approved Computer Access Fee as the Information Technology Access Fee.

The new special fee for the sports, recreation and wellness facility was approved by students in a referendum held March 29 - April 1, 2004, authorized by the 79th Texas Legislature in 2005, and codified in Section 54.5421 of the *Texas Education Code*.

U. T. Pan American currently bills the ACP fees to the school districts that employ ACP students and the school district then collects the charges from the students via a payroll deduction. U. T. Pan American requested approval to have the option to charge the fee directly to students interning at school districts that do not or cannot recoup program costs. The fee is used to defray the cost of administering the ACP, including on-site internship supervision, evaluation and travel costs, seminars, and mentoring. This fee is consistent with applicable statutory requirements under Sections 54.504 and 55.16 of the *Texas Education Code*.

The new Graduate Program Fee will be used to defray the cost associated with the maintenance of administering standard practices, professional level psychological tests, and the associated scoring and interpretative software, as well as to purchase instructional materials. This fee is also consistent with applicable statutory requirements under Sections 54.504 and 55.16 of the *Texas Education Code*.

New course-related fees will be used to defray specific costs associated with offering various courses in communications and the arts. These fees are consistent with applicable statutory requirements for incidental fees under Section 54.504 of the *Texas Education Code*.

The current Computer Access Fee is used to defray administrative costs incurred in providing access to and supervision of computer labs. Changing the name to the Information Technology Access Fee allows the fee to defray costs incurred in students' use of information technology including the provision of access to and supervision of computer labs, supplying network access and infrastructure, servers and other information technology-related hardware, software, and services. This fee is consistent with applicable statutory requirements under Sections 54.504 and 55.16 of the *Texas Education Code*.

#### 6. <u>U. T. San Antonio: Approval of revised Mission Statement</u>

The Mission Statement for The University of Texas at San Antonio as set forth below was approved and will be forwarded to the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board for approval.

#### Mission Statement

The University of Texas at San Antonio is dedicated to the advancement of knowledge through research and discovery, teaching and learning, community engagement and public service. As an institution of access and excellence, UTSA embraces multicultural traditions, serving as a center for intellectual and creative resources as well as a catalyst for socioeconomic development for Texas, the nation and the world.

Note from the General Counsel to the Board: For the record, the current Mission Statement that was before the Board had been vetted by the institution but had not been submitted for Board of Regents' approval.

# 7. <u>U. T. Austin: Honorific naming of the College of Engineering as the Cockrell School of Engineering and change from College to School</u>

Upon recommendation of President Powers and Dean Ben G. Streetman, the Board approved the honorific naming of the College of Engineering at The University of Texas at Austin in honor of the late Ernest D. Cockrell, Jr., and the College was renamed as a School. The College was renamed the Cockrell School of Engineering.

Dean Streetman disclosed that he serves on an advisory board for Pinto Technology Ventures, Inc., an investment fund company owned by Mr. Cockrell's son, Ernest H. Cockrell. He said he serves with others from The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Cancer Center and The University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas. His service has been reviewed by The University of Texas System and no conflict of interest is found related to this recommendation.

The General Counsel to the Board updated the Regents' *Rules and Regulations*, Series 40601, concerning entities comprising The University of Texas System institutions.

8. <u>U. T. System: Report on revised Accountability and Performance framework and reporting schedule</u>

Vice Chancellor for Strategic Management Malandra reported on the revised University of Texas System Accountability and Performance framework and reporting schedule.

9. <u>U. T. System Board of Regents: Report on Highlights of the 80th Texas Legislature, Regular Session</u>

Vice Chancellor McBee reported on highlights of the 80th Texas Legislature, Regular Session. His <u>presentation</u> is on file in the Office of the Board of Regents.

RECESS TO EXECUTIVE SESSION.--At 2:25 p.m., Chairman Huffines announced the Board would recess to convene in Executive Session pursuant to *Texas Government Code* Sections 551.071, 551.072, and 551.074 to consider those matters listed on the Executive Session agenda.

 U. T. El Paso: Authorization and related terms of marketing and sale of the surface only of approximately 58.115 unimproved acres out of Section 2, Block 81, Township 2 and Section 37, Block 81, Township 1, Texas and Pacific Railroad Surveys, El Paso, El Paso County, Texas

Upon motion by Regent Barnhill, the Board authorized the Executive Director of Real Estate, on behalf of The University of Texas at El Paso, to

- a. market and sell the surface only of approximately 58.115 unimproved acres out of Section 2, Block 81, Township 2 and Section 37, Block 81, Township 1, Texas and Pacific Railroad Surveys, El Paso, El Paso County, Texas, through a competitive offer process. The property is described by metes and bounds in Exhibit A on Page 19; and
- b. execute all documents, instruments, and other agreements, subject to approval of all such documents as to legal form by the Office of General Counsel, and take all further actions deemed necessary or advisable to market and sell the real property in accordance with the parameters outlined in Executive Session.

The motion was seconded by Vice Chairman Krier and carried unanimously.
