HOGG FOUNDATION FOR MENTAL HEALTH

AND IMA HOGG FOUNDATION

Allocations were made from the Hogg Foundation for Mental Health and Ima Hogg Foundation to the following institutions and agencies:

1. Communities in Schools--El Paso, Inc.

Communities in Schools Project - \$13,000

The Hogg Foundation Executive Committee recommends for approval a third-year-and-final grant for the period August 1, 1987 to July 31, 1988. This grant is for continued support of a program designed to coordinate social service for students and their families and to initiate a youth employment program. The goal of the project is the reduction of school dropouts. Its major feature--repositioning personnel from numerous social services agencies so that services are available in the school and its surrounding area--is appropriate from the standpoint of both need and cost effectiveness. Mr. Robert Shaw, Director, will be responsible for the administration of the program.

2. Family Service Center

Domestic Violence Treatment Program - \$11,877

The Ima Hogg Foundation is recommending for approval a supplemental grant for the period September 1, 1987 to August 31, 1988. This grant will be used to strengthen and expand the evaluation of the program. This program promises to be an important demonstration of a unique approach to serving families experiencing domestic violence. Mr. E. F. Chirstman, Executive Director, will be responsible for administering the grant.

3. Family Service Center

Hogg Middle School Counseling Program - \$59,335

The Ima Hogg Foundation is recommending for approval a grant for the period August 31, 1987 to July 31, 1988. This grant will be used to implement a counseling program at the Hogg Middle School, a predominately Hispanic school in an impoverished area of Houston. The high school dropout rate for Hispanic children in Houston is over 50%. Through early intervention for mental health and behavioral problems, this program seeks to better the odds for these children to complete high school. Mr. E. F. Christman, Executive Director, will be responsible for the project.

4. High Sky Children's Ranch, Inc.

Counseling Support for Teaching Family Model and Continuum of Care Programs - \$27,000

The Executive Committee of the Hogg Foundation recommends for approval a one-year grant for the period August 1, 1987 to July 31, 1988. The purpose of the program is to upgrade the services of a traditional children's home beyond the basic care level. Because the needs of the typical client being assigned are becoming more complex, addition of intermediate care and residential treatment capabilities is necessary. Successful implementation will provide valuable information for similar facilities as they attempt to meet the mental health needs of abused and neglected children in traditional residental settings. Ms. Jackie L. Carter, Executive Director, will be responsible for administration of the project.

Laredo State Center Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation

Children's Services for Starr Country - \$9,280

The Hogg Foundation is recommending for approval a third and final grant for the period September 1, 1987 to August 31, 1988. These funds are from the DeRossette Thomas Fund, which was designated to meet the mental health needs of children in the Laredo/Webb County region. The grant will continue to support a children's mental health program in Starr County. Outreach services will be provided by the Laredo State Center's satellite office in Rio Grande City. Children needing specialized psychiatric services are taken to the Laredo State Center for treatment. The outreach services are essentially twofold: case management and psychotherapy. Ms. Delores V. Rodriguez, Director, will be responsible for the administration of the project.

6. Mental Health Association of Houston and Harris County, Inc.

Minority Resource Center - \$40,330

The Executive Committee of the Hogg Foundation recommends for approval a one-year grant for the period September 1, 1987 to August 31, 1988. These funds will be used to cover the costs required to produce the mental health directory, to translate the "Plain Talk for Parents" tapes, to hold the "Caught Between Two Worlds" conference, and to pay for other project related expenses. The proposed demonstration project is designed to increase the involvement of minority communities of the Houston/Harris County area in mental health related services. Betsy Schwartz, Executive Director, will be responsible for administration of the project.

7. Mental Health Association in Texas

Internal Assessment Program - \$7,804

The Hogg Foundation Executive Committee recommends for approval a one-time grant for the period August 1, 1987 through January 31, 1988. This grant is for the development of an internal assessment program to be used by the Association's 15 local affiliates. This diagnostic tool will assess basic internal management issues and permit the state association to target resources and interventions to those local affiliates at greatest risk. A self-assessment workbook covering governance, organization, financial management and budgeting, program, volunteers, and personnel will be developed and used by each local affiliate. Mrs. Stella C. Mullins, Executive Director, will be responsible for administration of the project.

8. Parents and Children Together, Inc.

SKIP (Support for Kids of Incarcerated Parents) - \$10,400

The Hogg Foundation is recommending for approval a third and final grant for the period October 1, 1987 to September 30, 1988. These funds will be used to support the project at the Federal Correctional Institute. During the past two years of its operation, the SKIP program has become a model for prisons across the United States. As of July 1, 1987, 527 children were enrolled in SKIP and average monthly attendance was 100 children. Ms. Debra R. Key, Executive Director, will be responsible for the administration of the grant.

9. Rio Grande Samaritan Counseling Center, Inc. McAllen, Texas

Hispanic Treatment Program - \$30,000

The Hogg Foundation recommends for approval a first-year grant for the period September 1, 1987 to August 31, 1988. The Center will develop a comprehensive treatment program to provide mental health services to Hispanic families who are experiencing distress due to socioeconomic and psychological factors. Linguistically and culturally relevant mental health services and training sessions will include primary prevention and mental health promotion activities, individual and group therapy, crisis intervention, and consultation and education. Dr. James Zacharias, Director, will be responsible for the administration for the project.

10. Texas Coalition for the Prevention of Child Abuse

Prevention Coalition Building Project - \$27,600

The Hogg Foundation is recommending for approval a one-year grant for the period October 1, 1987 to September 30, 1988. These funds will be used to create a supportive network for local grass roots child abuse coalitions that are emerging in the state of Texas. Coalition formation efforts are occurring at such a rate that volunteers cannot meet their needs. This grant will provide supportive services to both coalitions that have already formed independently and to those that will organize over the next few years. The goal of the Texas Coalition is for every county in Texas to be covered by a local coalition. Ms. Judy Hay, President of the Board of Directors, will be responsible for the administration of the grant.

11. University of Houston, Department of Sociology

Educational Reform, School Fiscal Policy, and Teacher Morale--Impact of H. B. 72 - \$1,275

The Executive Committee of the Hegg Foundation recommends for approval a supplemental grant for the period August 1, 1987 to February 29, 1988. The supplemental grant will enable the analysis of two new data sets, permitting the principal investigator to assess the magnitude of the level of burnout among teachers of gifted students and the impact of the Texas Teacher Assessment System on urban teachers. Dr. Anthony Gary Dworkin, Principal Investigator, will be responsible for administration of the project.

12. U. T. Austin, Department of Psychology

Responses to Violence: Child Rearing and Children's Behavior in Homes of Battered Women - \$13,336

The Hogg Foundation is recommending for approval a one-year grant for the period September 1, 1987 to August 31, 1988. These funds will be used to conduct a study of child rearing patterns and children's behavior in the homes of battered women. The research has a dual focus, one being the child rearing behaviors of battered women, and the second, the actual behaviors of children of battered women. The first of these emphases uses a most promising methodology, computer simulation of situations to which subjects can respond in a non-threatening way. Dr. George W. Holden, Assistant Professor of Psychology, will be responsible for the administration of the grant. (RBC D90)

13. U. T. Austin, Department of Educational Psychology

Factors that Mediate Healthy Adjustments to Intrafamilial Sexual Abuse - \$9,299

The Executive Committee of the Hogg Foundation recommends for approval a six-month grant for the period September 1, 1987 to February 29, 1988. The proposed research project will attempt to determine the variables that differentiate children who have been sexually abused by a family member and adjust emotionally, socially and behaviorally from those who do not; the process of recovery from the abuse over a one-year period; and the pattern of use of intervention services in Travis County by families where intrafamilial sexual abuse has occurred. The research is designed to cover a three-year period and is divided into six phases. Dr. Deborah Tharinger, Assistant Professor in the Department of Educational Psychology and the principal investigator, will be responsible for administration of the project. (RBC D88)

14. U. T. Austin, Department of Educational Psychology

Role of Family Process in Children's Competence and Vulnerability - \$13,737

The Hogg Foundation is recommending for approval a one-year grant for the period September 1, 1987 to August 31, 1988. These funds will be used to conduct research on the contribution of single-parent and step-family process to development of children's social and academic competance and vulnerability and to contrast those findings with data from intact families. The proposed research builds on an earlier analysis of intact families supported in part by the Spencer Foundation. Dr. Cindy Carlson, Assistant Professor in the Department of Educational Psychology, will be responsible for administration of the grant. (RBC D89)

15. U. T. Austin, Institute of Human Development and Family Studies

Strengthening and Fostering Interests and Activities in Gerontology - \$14,950

The Hogg Foundation Executive Committee recommends for approval a fifth and final grant for the period September 1, 1987 through August 31, 1988. The grant will enable the continued publication of a very informative and highly regarded newsletter which has been central to the gerontology program. During this final year of Hogg Foundation support, the Institute Director will seek support from other sources and explore the possibility of initiating a subscription fee so that continued publication will be possible after the expiration of Foundation funding. Dr. Ira Iscoe, Director, will be responsible for the administration of the grant. (RBC D87)

16. U. T. Austin, Learning Abilities Center

Learning Abilities Center Interdisciplinary Child/Family Clinic - \$19,600

The Hogg Foundation Executive Committee is recommending a third-and-final-year grant for the period September 1, 1987 to August 31, 1988. The great majority of support for the Center's program comes from four departments in three different colleges—Curriculum and Instruction, Educational Psychology, Psychology, and Social Work—which testifies to the truly interdisciplinary nature of the child/family services training clinic. Dr. William Harmer, Director, will be responsible for the administration of the grant. (RBC D91)

17. Timberlawn Psychiatric Research Foundation, Inc.

Program Evaluation of MHA Parents as Teachers Project - \$27,995

The Hogg Foundation Executive Committee recommends for approval a first-year grant for the period September 1, 1987 to August 31, 1988. This project promises to be an exciting new kind of educational program with a heavy involvement of volunteers to carry out the detailed educational activities. Many past programs have made claims for improved child rearing through better parenting skills that are presumably taught through education, but very few have actually been supported by scientifically valid evaluation research. This program will provide the basis for a thorough assessment of the Parents as Teachers project, paving the way for better programs to follow. Dr. John T. Gossett, Associate Director, will be responsible for the administration of the grant.

18. Child Advocates, Inc.

Court Appointed Special Advocate Program - \$12,000

The Ima Hogg Foundation is recommending for approval a second and final grant for the period September 1, 1987 to August 31, 1988. This grant will be used to continue to provide an emergency team that helps expedite permanency planning for abused children removed from their homes by Children's Protective Services. Ms. Martha E. Braniff, Executive Director, will be responsible for administering the grant.

19. U. T. Health Science Center - San Antonio, Department of Pyschiatry

Texas Consortium for Biological and Psychopharmacologic Psychiatric Research - \$30,234

The Hogg Foundation Executive Committee recommends for approval a second-year grant for the period October 1, 1987 to September 30, 1988. This cooperative research plan, involving all four medical schools under The University of Texas System, has successfully developed administrative planning and operational procedures to evaluate new kinds of treatment technologies with large number of depressed patients. Dr. Charles L. Bowden will be responsible for the administration of the grant.

1987-88 HOLIDAY SCHEDULE AND VACATION ALLOWANCE

The Appropriations Bill for fiscal year 1987-88 provides for 13 of the 15 holidays specified in Article 4591, <u>Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes</u>, as amended. The Appropriations Bill does not provide for the observance of Columbus Day and any day on which an election is held throughout the state (General Election Bay). Therefore, in fiscal year 1987-88, the resulting total is thirteen (13) days. The Appropriations Bill also provides for an additional three (3) days of special leave time specifying the day following Thanksgiving and the day before and after Christmas.

During the 1987-88 fiscal year, two (2) of the specified holidays fall on a Saturday or Sunday and cannot, therefore, be observed. Also following our past practice, we are reallocating twelve (12) hours ($1\frac{1}{2}$ days) from holiday time to vacation time in lieu thereof. The balance available for holidays will, therefore, be reduced by a total of twelve (12) hours resulting in nine and one-half ($9\frac{1}{2}$) days, the observance of which can be adjusted in order to provide more effective work schedules (Article 4591.3, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes). Added to these nine and one-half ($9\frac{1}{2}$) holidays are two (2) of the special leave days indicated in the preceding paragraph, namely November 27 and December 24, 1987. The day after Christmas, December 26, 1987, falls on a Saturday and, therefore, cannot be observed.

The results of the foregoing action will provide in 1987-88 eleven and one-half $(11\frac{1}{2})$ holidays and special leave days, and a total of twelve (12) working days annual vacation leave for University employees with less than two (2) years service. Vacation accrual for each of the other categories of service will be accordingly increased by one and one-half $(1\frac{1}{2})$ days (12 flours). See the following schedule:

Although all employees are encouraged to utilize vacation in the year which accrued, employees may carry forward unused vacation from one fiscal year to the next. The schedule presented above indicates maximum carry forward authorized by the Appropriations Bill (the one and one-half $\begin{bmatrix} 1 \\ 2 \end{bmatrix}$ days for holidays converted to vacation time must be taken in the 1987-88 fiscal year).

^{*}Sufficient personnel <u>must</u> be present for the conduct of official public business in accordance with Article V, Subsection 7c of the Appropriations Bill. Personnel comprising the skeleton work force will be granted compensatory time in lieu of the holiday.

An employee who wishes to observe an additional religious holiday or holidays may do so in lieu of any holiday or holidays for which the employee serves as a member of the skeleton work force required by Article V, Subsection 7c of the Appropriations Bill, or by taking vacation leave.

Senate Bill 485 amends Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes to provide that the third Monday in January be designated "Martin Luther King, Jr. Day" in observance of the birthday of Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr. The administrative head of a state agency may allow an employee of the agency to observe a holiday with pay on Martin Luther King, Jr. Day in lieu of any other state holiday that occurs on a week day for which a skeleton work force is required.

The foregoing holiday and special leave schedule and vacation allowance is recommended for approval to apply to The University of Texas System Administration and to any component institution in The University of Texas System that does not request a schedule specifically different.

1987-88 SYSTEM-WIDE PERSONNEL PAY PLAN RECOMMENDATION

The administration of each component institution has made recommendations for adjustments to those classifications utilized at their respective institutions. The Office of the Chancellor concurs in these recommendations which are to be reflected in the 1987-88 System-wide Personnel Pay Plan effective September 1, 1987. The 1987-88 System-wide Personnel Pay Plan Comparative is submitted for approval at this time.

The Personnel Pay Plan is supported by extensive studies which have been conducted by the respective institutional personnel offices. In arriving at the salary ranges, we have taken into account the State Classification Plan and the State Salary Schedule for September 1, 1987. Also considered were numerous salary surveys which we have conducted or in which we have participated, pay schedules for other institutions, and prevailing rates in the applicable areas of competition.

Institutional pay plans reflect no general increase in salary rates although a limited number of classifications were adjusted upward in an effort to remain competitive, fairly compensate employees, and attract qualified applicants in the current market. Each classification has been considered on its own merits and recommendations for adjustments have been made according to the individual requirements of each classification as appropriate.

MEDICAL/DENTAL INSURANCE PLAN RECOMMENDATION

After approval of terms and rates for the U. T. System 1987-88 medical/dental insurance plan with Aetna Life Insurance Company at the June 1987 Board of Regents' meeting, Aetna declined to honor that commitment based on changing trends in utilization experience at U. T. health component institutions.

Based on renegotiations with Aetna Life Insurance Company and quotes solicited from three additional carriers, the Office of the Chancellor accepted a new rate and plan quotation for employee group medical/dental insurance coverage with Aetna Life Insurance Company on August 6, 1987. The individual rates and plan design changes approved by the U. T. Board of Regents in June 1987 remain in place (see below), but additional plan design changes and/or conditions were required to reach agreement on the revised plan. The revised agreement follows. Points #1 through #5 cover remaining components as approved in June 1987. Points #A through H are the additional design changes and/or conditions agreed to by the Office of the Chancellor.

Re: SEPTEMBER 1, 1987 RATE STRUCTURE

This letter will describe the renewal rate structure and funding arrangements for the University of Texas System Group Medical Insurance Program to be effective September 1, 1987. We will agree to the funding components outlined in your letter of June 17, 1987, subject to the condition that, if it becomes necessary for you to terminate the medical coverage contract with Aetna and there is an experience deficit under the medical coverages, as determined by us, then an additional premium would be due of up to \$6.6 million.

The remaining components of the rate structure are as follows:

- 1. The medical plan will be operated such that any employee discount for services rendered at University of Texas Medical facilities is shown on statements billed to Aetna.
- 2. The plan of benefits will be revised as follows:
 - i. Deductible applied to all covered expenses except for preadmission testing, second surgical opinion, and voluntary medical drug purchases.
 - ii. Coinsurance limits changed to: Plan A \$ 800 Plan B - \$1,300
 - iii. A Mail Order Drug Program will be installed.
- 3. The billing rates will be increased 20% over the current rates.
- 4. \$3.4 million of the consolidated Premium Stabilization Fund will be used to support the medical program.
- 5. Life Insurance and LTD surpluses will be used to offset any medical deficit.

The following outlines the other conditions of this arrangement:

- A. Aetna's Healthline program would be adopted to include hospital pre-authorization and focused psychiatric review.
- B. University of Texas hospitals, providers, clinics, etc. would bese their fees and charges on a fixed basis with the charge base "locked in" for the period September 1, 1987 to September 1, 1988. Our pricing assumes that the negotiated charge will approximate the charge level as of July 1, 1987.
- C. The University implements an outpatient precertification program effective September 1, 1987. This program would contain at least two (2) mutually agreed upon procedures as of September 1, 1987. We would then add additional procedures as soon as they could be agreed upon and put in place. It is anticipated that we would have approximately 40 procedures up and running by the end of the first quarter in 1988.
- D. The University System will operate as a preferred provider network for its employees. Services provided by the University of Texas Medical institutions for employees and dependents of the University would be subject to a 20% discount and would be reimbursed by the Group Insurance Program at 100%, subject to internal plan limits. Services provided by medical providers outside the System would be reimbursed according to the ordinary plan design. The deductible would apply irrespective of where the service was provided.
- E. There will be an effort to negotiate selective preferred provider arrangements where the provider would have a close proximity to University of Texas Academic locations.

- F. Aetna remains the carrier for Life Insurance, LTD, Medical and Dental coverages for the 1987-88 policy year.
- G. Rates for Life Insurance, LTD, and Dental coverages remain unchanged for the 1987-88 policy year.
- H. If the Life Insurance and LTD plan surpluses are less than the projected \$5.0 million, Aetna will have the right to make an additional call on the Consolidated Premium Stabilization Fund of up to \$2.0 million. This call is contingent upon Life Insurance and LTD plan experience only.

\$2,500,000 Supplemental Allocations from Available University Fund for U. T. Austin Library Enhancement

EXPLANATION

In June 1986, the U. T. System Board of Regents, as a part of the system-wide library enhancement program, approved a \$6.25 million library automation plan for U. T. Austin. At that time \$4.35 million was allocated from Permanent University Fund Bond proceeds to fund the first phase of the automation program. The additional \$2,500,000 is now being allocated from the Available University Fund to complete funding of that U. T. Austin Library Automation Plan.

Proposed Allocation from PUF Bond Proceeds for Library Special Collection

Based upon a request dated August 31, 1987 from Interim President Natalicio, an allocation of \$5,000 from the library special collection reserve is recommended.

In June 1986, a \$1 million reserve fund was established by the U. T. Board of Regents for special collections as appropriate opportunities consistent with institutional mission become available.

The proposed allocation is to be used by U. T. El Paso to purchase a collection of Mexican manuscripts containing a wealth of valuable historical data on social and economic conditions of Mexico from the 16th to 19th centuries. This purchase will significantly strengthen U. T. El Paso's nationally known collection of historical documents on Mexico.

The reserve now stands at \$949,135.

**Skeleton work force will be on hand.

The Appropriation Bill provides ten and one-half (10-1/2) working days of basic vacation allowance for employees of the State to be accrued on the basis of seven (7) hours per month. All regular staff employees will accrue seven (7) hours of vacation leave for each month employed.

Although all employees are encouraged to utilize vacation in the year which accrued, employees may carry forward unused vacation from one fiscal year to the next. The schedule presented above indicates maximum carry forward authorized by the Appropriation Bill.

An employee will earn vacation entitlement beginning on the first day of employment with the State and terminating on the last day of duty. Credit for one month's accrual will be given for each month or fraction of a month of employment with the State. Vacation with pay may not be granted until the employee has had continuous employment with the State for six (6) months, although credit will be accrued during that period.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

Parking and Traffic Regulations recommended for approval by the U.T. Board Regents have been approved by an attorney in the Office of General Counsel are based on model regulations approved by that office. These regulations ersede all prior Parking and Traffic Regulations.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

SECTION I

QUICK REFERENCE TO PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

PERMITS REQUIRED FOR ACCESS AND PARKING: Only vehicles conspicuously displaying proper University permits (as specified in Section VI, infra) may enter or park on the campus (as shown by the boundaries on the map accompanying these regulations). Only vehicles conspicuously displaying proper University permits (as specified in Section VI, infra) may enter or park in the Central Control Zone (as described in Section III) between the hours of 7:00am and 4:00pm, Monday through Friday during Fall and Spring Sessions, and between 6:00am and 3:00pm, Monday through Friday during Summer Sessions. (Motorcycles, mopeds (motor assisted bicycles) and motor scooters may drive through the Central Control Zone only after these hours, and may park only in areas designated for such vehicles or in motorcycle areas or in bicycle racks/concrete parking blocks as specified in Section IV, infra.)

DISPLAY OF PERMITS: Parking permits must be properly affixed to the vehicle(s) as described in Section VI. Decals which are taped or affixed by unauthorized materials or displayed on a vehicle other than the vehicle to which issued will subject the holder to citation. Additionally, the permit may be revoked and the holder may lose all parking privileges (Section VIII, infra)

REMOVAL OF PERMITS: Permits (decals) shall be removed when there is a change of vehicle ownership; when association with the University is terminated; when a replacement permit has been issued to take the place of a previously issued permit; or upon expiration or revocation (Section VI, infra).

CLASSES OF PERMITS: Class F permits will be issued to members of the faculty only.

Class S permits will be issued to members of the staff, non-classified personnel and to other persons approved by the Committee.

Class A permits will be issued to all students, including graduates.

Class H permits will be issued to disabled students. Class M permits will be issued to students with motorcycles, motor bikes, mopeds and motor accoters.

Class D permits will be issued to residents of the University Residence Halls.
Class V permits will be issued to residents of UTEP village.

Class R permits will be issued to participants of Student Share-A-Ride Program.

Class O permits will be issued to persons specified and approved by the Parking and Traffic Committee.

PERMIT RESTRICTIONS: Class F permit holders are permitted to park in any area designated for faculty, faculty-staff, or faculty-staff-visitor.

Class S permit holders are permitted to park in any area designated for staff, faculty-staff or faculty-staff-visitor, but not in an area designated for faculty only.

Class A permit holders are permitted to park in any areas designated for students only. Class A permit holders may park within the Central Control Zone between the hours of 4:00pm and 7:00am, Monday through Friday during Fall and Spring Sessions and between the hours of 3:00pm and 6:00am, Monday through Friday during the Summer Sessions. They may park in any area not restricted by proper sign or marking.

Class H permit holders may park in any faculty, staff or visitor parking area. or in marked Handicap spaces if severely disabled requiring wheelchair or walker. Class M permit holders are permitted to park in areas designated for motorcycles, or two wheeled vehicles, only.

Class D permit holders are permitted to park in areas designated for dormitory residents only. They are permitted to purchase a Class A permit to park in any other areas.

Class V permit holders are permitted to park in areas designated for Village parking only. They may purchase Class A permits to park in any other areas. Class R permit holders are permitted to park in designated student Share-A-Ride spaces. (Have the option to display a Class A permit if desired.) Class O permit holders are permitted to park in the space marked as reserved for the holder.

LOADING ZONE PERMITS: A Loading Zone Permit is required to use these spaces/areas Monday through Friday from 7:00am to 4:00pm unless otherwise posted. Permits (normally valid for 30 minutes) may be obtained from the guards at the traffic control stations. When the control stations are closed, call 5724 for assistance.

BICYCLE REGISTRATION: Bicycles operated or parked on the campus shall be registered with the University Police Department. Contact the Crime Prevention Officer at 747-56!! for assistance. There shall be no charge for this service.

BICYCLES, MOPEDS (MOTOR-ASSISTED BICYCLES) AND SKATES: Bicycles and Mopeds must be operated in accordance with, and skaters must conform to, the ordinances of the City of El Paso, the specific applicable provisions of these regulations concerning parking restrictions and traffic control as specified in Section IV, infra, and applicable State Law.

PARKING LOTS: On occasion during the year, certain parking lots, or portions thereof, may be closed upon recommendation by the Parking and Traffic Committee and approved by the President of the University.

SPEED LIMITS: The speed limit on all parts of the campus, whether on streets or in parking lots, is 15mph, unless otherwise posted. The speed limit on Sun Bowl Drive, from its intersection with Schuster Avenue to its intersection with Dawson Road, will be 20mph. The speed limit on Sun Bowl Drive, from its intersection with Dawson Road to a point immediately west of the Special Events Center, at its juncture with the City of El Paso Jurisdiction, will be 30mph.

POSTED SIGNS: Posted signs, whether permanent or temporary, must be obeyed at all times and take precedence over painted curbs, pavement markings and designations shown on any University maps.

PARKING IMPROPERLY: A vehicle shall not park on a street where angle parking is required, with the back of the vehicle towards the curb, nor shall a vehicle be parked opposite the flow of traffic in the traffic lane where parallel parking is required. Parking wholly within the marked boundaries of the parking space is required at all times. Vehicles shall not park in a manner that obstructs walkways, driveways, ramps, loading docks, marked cross-walks or inflicts damage to shrubbery, trees, grass, grounds or structures. Additionally, no vehicle may park on any unmarked or unimproved area which has not been marked or designated for parking.

REGISTRATION OF TWO VEHICLES: An alternate vehicle may be registered by faculty or staff at a fee of five (\$5.00) dollars. Students may register one additional vehicle upon separate application and by paying the required additional fee. Both vehicles may not enter or park on campus at the same time. (Section VI,infra).

ENFORCEMENT AND IMPOUNDMENTS: Failure to abide by these regulations may be the basis for disciplinary action against students, and faculty/staff (Section V, infra). Upon notice, violators may be subject to impoundment of their vehicle(s) pending payment of overdue charges (Section VII, infra). Students may also be barred from readmissions and have grades, degree, refunds or official transcripts withheld pending payment of overdue charges (Section VII, infra). Vehicles may also be impounded for specific impound violations.

APPEAL OF CITATION: University parking and traffic citations may be appealed, within 12 calendar days [10-working-days] from date of citation, by filing a Citation Appeal Form with the Parking and Traffic Administration Office in the Academic Services Center, (See Section VIII for detailed procedures). Court Appearance Citations are handled by the appropriate state or municipal court.

- 6. VISITORS: All visitors need permits to park on campus UNLESS parked at Athletic, Special Event or Extra-curricular Activities open to the public. OFFICIAL VISITORS are those who conduct business or who render an important service to the University and who are not otherwise eligible for annual parking permits. Official Visitors may obtain temporary parking permits from the guards at the traffic control stations, in the Police Dispatcher's Office or from officers on the street. These permits entitle the holder to park only in a space designated "Official Visitor". Permits must be conspicuously displayed on the driver's side of the vehicle. (Section VI, infra).
- 7. PEDESTRIAN RIGHTS AND DUTIES: Pedestrians must obey all traffic control devices. They have the right-of-way at marked crosswalks, in intersections and on sidewalks extending across a service drive, building entrance or driveway. Pedestrians crossing a street at any point other than within a marked crosswalk or within an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles on said street. Pedestrians shall not leave the curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is impossible for the driver to yield. Pedestrians may cross at an intersection diagonally only where permitted by special pavement marking.
- 3. INOPERABLE VEHICLES: If a vehicle becomes inoperable, a telephone call shall be placed to the University Police at 747-5611. The police will either render assistance or authorize temporary parking. Temporary parking shall not exceed 24 hours and must not create an obstruction or hazard.

SECTION II

GENERAL PROVISIONS

rsuant to the authority granted by Sections 51.201 et seq.; 54.005, 54.503, .31 and 69.02 of Title 3 of the Texas Education Code, the Board of Regents of e University of Texas System has promulgated Parking and Traffic Regulations regulate and control parking and traffic and the use of parking facilities, provide for the issuance of vehicle identification insignia (parking permit), d to provide for jurisdiction over offenses. This booklet contains those gulations and procedures applicable to any person who walks or drives and rks a motor vehicle or bicycle on the campus of The University of Texas at El so. These rules and regulations are supplementary to the ordinances of the ty of El Paso and the Statutes of the State of Texas which govern pedestrians i the use of motor vehicles and bicycles.

e operation of a motor vehicle or bicycle on The University of Texas at El co campus is a PRIVILEGE granted by the University and is not an inherent that of any faculty/staff member or student. All faculty, staff and students have motor vehicles in their possession or control for use, operation or thing in the University campus must register said vehicle with the Parking and office Administration Office in the Academic Services Center. Registration of actor vehicle does not guarantee a parking place on campus.

ivy vehicular and pedestrian traffic on campus; the existence of speed bumps i elevated manhole covers; and temporary traffic hazards on the streets such flowing water, sand and gravel, construction barricades, street and sidewalk

aintenance and repairs make it necessary that speed limits be established for ampus. Drivers who fail to operate vehicles within the speed limits stablished by the traffic and parking regulations of the University will be saued citations and will be responsible for the consequences of their actions.

he University is not responsible for fire, theft, damage to. or loss of ehicles parked or operated on the University campus. No bailment is created by ranting of any parking or operating privileges regarding a vehicle on any roperty owned, leased or otherwise controlled by the University.

he administration and enforcement of the regulations contained in this booklet re as follows:

NIVERSITY PARKING AND TRAFFIC COMMITTEE: This committee is composed of faculty, taff and students and is responsible for formulating regulations for the outrol of parking and traffic upon the campus in the form of recommendations to be President of the University. Within the limitations imposed by restricted acilities and staff, it attempts to provide reasonable regulations for the outrol of the very high density of vehicular and pedestrian traffic on the impus, toward the goal of optimum convenience and safety of all concerned. Equests for individual consideration or any communications concerning these egulations should be directed to this committee.

iRKING AND TRAFFIC ADMINISTRATION OFFICE: This office is responsible for all laministrative functions relating to the issuance of parking permits, the according of parking and traffic violation charges, the acceptance of appeals com such violations and the collection, through its representative in the irsar's Office in the Academic Services Center [Administration—Building], of larges for parking and traffic violations. Questions relating to these motions should be directed to Parking and Traffic Administration in the ademic Services Center [University-Police—Building].

UDENT TRAFFIC COURT: This panel is composed of three student justices pointed by the Student Association. Student Parking and Traffic Violation peals may be directed to this panel upon application through the Parking and affic Administration. Appeals may be made in writing or in person, eferably in person. Appeals for moving traffic citations must be made in rson. Decisions of the panel may be appealed further to the Student Supreme urt or the Dean of Students.

RKING AND TRAFFIC APPEALS BOARD: This panel, appointed by the President of the iversity, is composed of 2 faculty members and I staff member and rules on peals from citations issued to faculty and staff by University Police for olations of parking and traffic regulations.

RKING AND TRAFFIC REVIEW BOARD: This board is composed of the members of the rking and Traffic Appeals Board and the Student Traffic Court. It conducts mited hearings concerning impoundment, suspension of driving and parking ivileges on the campus, and cases to allow an individual an opportunity to ow that the vehicle in question was not owned, registered or used by the dividual or to show that the individual receiving notice of impending notions does not have unpaid parking and traffic charges.

IVERSITY POLICE: The University Police have the responsibility and the legal thority for the enforcement of the Parking and Traffic Regulations listed in Is booklet. University police officers may issue University citations or irt appearance citations enforceable in court. (See Section VIII). On ecial occasions and emergencies, such parking limitations may be imposed by the Chief of the University Police as are required by the conditions which wail. When conditions warrant such action, the Chief may waive parking mitations.

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he University reserves the right to enforce parking and traffic regulations:

- . through the issuance of University citations and the collection of administrative enforcement charges for offenses;
- . through the impoundment of vehicles interfering with the movement of vehicular or pedestrian traffic or blocking a sidewalk, ramp, loading dock, cross-walk, entrance, exit, fire lane or aisle and through the impoundment of vehicles for unpaid charges after proper notice as provided by these regulations;
- . by the suspension or revocation of permits;
- , by requiring either the vehicle owner or the person who has registered the vehicle with the University Parking and Traffic Administration Office in the Academic Services Center, to appear in court or at a University hearing for non-payment of outstanding charges;
- by barring the readmission and withholding the grades, degrees, refunds and official transcripts of any student for non-payment of outstanding charges;
 by disciplinary action against employees or students who fail to abide by these regulations;
 - by denying parking permits to those with overdue charges;
 - by the issuance of Court Appearance Citations requiring an appearance in the appropriate state or municipal court; and
 - by such other methods as are commonly employed by city governments or state agencies in control of traffic regulation enforcement.

oof of the fact that any parking or traffic control device, sign, parking ter, signal or marking was actually in place at any location on campus of the iversity of Texas at El Paso, Shall constitute prima facie evidence that the me is official and was installed under the authority of applicable law and ese regulations.

en any person is charged with having stopped, parked and left standing a motor hicle on the campus of The University of Texas at El Paso, in violation of any ovision of the Parking and Traffic Regulations of The University of Texas at Paso, proof that such vehicle was, at the date of the offense, bearing a lid University of Texas at El Paso parking permit shall constitute primafacie idence that said vehicle was then and there stopped, parked and left standing the holder of the parking permit. However, if the vehicle does not bear a lid University of Texas at El Paso parking permit, proof that said vehicle at a date of the offense alleged, was owned by an individual is prima facie idence that said vehicle was then and there stopped, parked and left standing said individual.

- University assumes no responsibility for any vehicle or any duty to protect vehicle or its contents at anytime the vehicle is operated or parked on the apus.
- University may deem a motor vehicle, including a motorcycle, or motor noter, or moped or bicycle parked on the University campus for more than 48 irs to be abandoned and may dispose of such vehicle as provided in Article 17-9, Texas Revised Civil Statutes.

SECTION III

DEFINITIONS

- 1. UNIVERSITY CAMPUS: All property owned or under the control of The University of Texas at El Paso.
- 2. CENTRAL CONTROL ZONE: The Central Control Zone is that area enclosed by the manned traffic control points and any other barriers erected on access streets running into or through the University Campus.
- 3. PARKING AREA: Any area on campus which has been designated and marked for parking, whether on streets or in lots.
- 4. DESIGNATED PARKING SPACE: That area outlined by white painted boundary lines on the pavement of any parking area. Areas not marked by boundary lines are not parking spaces.
- 5. NO PARKING ZONE: In addition to zones warked by posted signs, any yellow-painted curbs or yellow-painted zones on pavements designated no parking at any time.
- TOW-AWAY ZONE: An area designated by an official posted sign which constitutes public notice that a vehicle parked in violation will be removed.
- 1. LOADING ZONE: A zone marked by posted signs and yellow-painted curbs or zones reserved for loading/unloading only.
- 3. VEHICLE: Includes automobiles, buses, trucks, trailers, motorcycles, motor bikes, motorscooters, mopeds tractors or any other self-propelled vehicle.
-). VISITORS: A person who is neither a student nor a faculty/staff member.
-), STUDENT: Every person duly registered, enrolled and attending classes at the University, either full or part time.
- DRIVER: Every person who drives, operates, or is in actual physical control of a vehicle.

SECTION IV

GENERAL TRAFFIC REGULATION

- . The purpose of these regulations is to facilitate the safe and orderly conduct of University business and to provide for the control of traffic and parking.
- . On special occasions or in emergencies, parking and traffic limitations may be imposed or changed by the Chief of the University Police as conditions warrant.
- . The operation of a vehicle shall be restricted to the campus drives, streets and parking lots.
- . The Speed Limit on the campus is 15 miles per hour on all drives and streets and 10 miles per hour in all parking lots, unless otherwise posted. The Speed Limit on Sun Bowl Drive shall be 20 miles per hour from its intersection with Schuster Avenue to its intersection with Dawson Road, and 30 miles per hour from its intersection with Dawson Road to a point directly west of the Special Events Center at its juncture with the City of El Paso jurisdiction.
 - It shall be a violation to commit any act prohibited by these regulations or to fail to do any act required by these regulations.
 - No person shall fail or refuse to comply with any lawful order or direction of any University Police Officer, Police Guard or Police Parking Controller invested by law or these regulations to direct, control or regulate traffic.

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7. If any part of these parking and traffic regulations is held to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions which can be given effect without the invalid provision, and to this end the provisions of these regulations are declared to be severable.

SECTION V

PARKING REGULATIONS

he various classes of parking permits and their eligibility requirements, rivileges and limitations are described in detail in Section VI.

n University holidays, only those parking restrictions which regulate arking at all times shall remain in effect.

ailure to abide by parking and traffic regulations may be the basis for isciplinary against students and employees. Students may be subjected to enalties ranging from disciplinary probation to expulsion from the Institution soutlined in Section 3.13 of the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Regents f The University of Texas System, Chapter VI, Part One. Employees may be abjected to disciplinary penalties including termination of employment as atlined in Section C of the Handbook of Operating Procedures. When an employee as accumulated three or more unpaid parking or traffic violations and/or marges of \$25.00 or more, the employee's Dean, Director or Administrative efficial shall be notified by the Parking and Traffic Administration Office apervisor. When a student is placed on the bar list for unpaid parking or raffic violations, the Dean of Students shall be notified by the Parking and raffic Administration Office Supervisor.

SECTION VI

PARKING PERMITS

FACULTY AND STAFF: A parking permit will be issued upon application to the Parking and Traffic Administration Office or the Parking and Traffic Administration Office Representative in the Academic Services Center [Bursar's Office]. Fees must be paid [in] at the Bursar's Office in the Academic Services Center. Permits will be issued to the vehicle for which the faculty or staff member, spouse or parent is the registered owner. If the registered owner is other than above, (1) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must be either related to or domiciled with the applicant, and (2) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must not be otherwise eligible for a University Parking Permit.

Holders of Class F and S permits may register an alternate vehicle by paying an additional fee of \$5.00 in the Bursar's Office at the Academic Services Center, provided that both vehicles are owned by the applicant or another person as specified above, with the understanding that both vehicles shall not be parked on campus at the same time unless one is parked at a meter. Proof of ownership may be required with such applications.

- B. STUDENTS: A parking permit will be issued for a vehicle owned by the student, spouse, parent or guardian. If the registered owner is other than above, (1) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must be either related to or domiciled with the applicant, and (2) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must not be otherwise eligible for a University Parking Permit. Students may register ONE additional motor vehicle, motor-cycle, motor-assisted bicycle, or motor scooter upon separate application and payment of the required fee to the Bursar's Office in the Academic Services Center, however, both may not be operated or parked on the campus at the same time. In addition, students must present a paid fee receipt for the current semester. Students may pay the required parking permit fees at time of regular registration.
- C. DISPLAY OF PERMITS: Permit(s) must be displayed on the vehicle to which it was issued. Permits (decals) shall be affixed on the vehicle according to the instructions furnished with the decal. Taping or otherwise affixing the decal will result in citations being issued.
-). REMOVAL OF PERMITS: Permits (decals) shall be removed:
 - 1. whenever there is a change of vehicle ownership;
 - 2. when association with the University is terminated;
 - 3. when a replacement permit (decal) has been issued to take the place of a previously issued permit (decal); or
 - 4. upon expiration or revocation of the permit or decal.

A Class F or S permit allows the holder to enter the Central Control Zone and park in any area designated for their particular class of permit. Holders of these permits may also park in areas outside the Central Control Zone designated for their particular class of permit.

A Class A permit allows the holder to park in any area designated for student parking. Holders of these permits may not enter or park within the Central Control Zone except between the hours of 4:00pm and 7:00am Monday through Friday during the Fall and Spring Semesters and between the hours of 3:00pm and 6:00am Monday through Friday during Summer Sessions.

A Class H Permit allows the holder to enter the Central Control Zone and park in any area designated for parking except for those spaces specifically marked as reserved. Designated Handicapped spaces should be utilized by persons with severe walking disabilities (wheelchair or walker assisted).

All disabled veterans whose vehicles display the specially designed license plates issued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the words "Disabled Vet" printed thereon in accordance with provisions of Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes Article 6675a-5e and all permanently disabled persons whose vehicles display the specially designed symbols, tabs or other devices (to include a vehicle in which a temporarily disabled person identification card is placed in the lower left hand side of the front windshield) issued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the word "Disabled" printed thereon in accordance with the provisions of Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes Article 6675a-5e.1 are exempt from parking fees and from parking meter fees and times limits. These exemptions permit parking only in spaces where parking would otherwise be appropriate and do not permit the parking of a vehicle at a place where parking is restricted or prohibited.

A Class M permit will be honored only after it has been properly and completely affixed on the front fender of the vehicle so that it may be readily seen when viewed from the front of the vehicle. NOTE: IF no front fender is available, mount permit on the right front fork so that it may be readily seen when viewed from the front of the vehicle. Permits may not be affixed by tape or any other unauthorized method. The permit is not transferrable and must be affixed to the vehicle for which it was issued.

PARKING:

- A. Motorcycles and Motor Scooters shall park only in designated Class M parking areas at all times.
- B. Motor-Assisted Bicycles and Mopeds (with a total engine displacement of less than 50cc) may park in either designated Class M areas or in those bicycle racks/blocks located outside the Central Control Zone during hours that zone is restricted for student parking as outlined in Section 1. After those hours, these vehicles may park in either a Class M area or in any bicycle rack/block provided for bicycle parking.

NOTE: Motorcycles, Motor Scooters, Mopeds and Motor-Assisted Bicycles shall not be parked or otherwise secured in unauthorized places e.g. sidewalks, posts, railings, trees, etc. Neither may these vehicles use spaces marked for passenger cars or trucks.

OPERATION:

Motorcycles, Motor Scooters, Mopeds and Motor-Assisted Bicycles shall not be ridden or operated on pedestrian walkways or sidewalks. On University streets, operators shall comply with ALL traffic control devices e.g. one-way signs, stop signs, etc.

A Class D permit allows the holder to park in ONLY the area designated for residents of University Residence Halls. Residents may purchase a Class A permit if they desire to park in other authorized student parking.

A Class V permit allows the holder to park in ONLY the area designated for residents of UTEP Village. Residents may purchase a Class A permit if they desire to park in other authorized student parking.

A Class R permit allows the holders to park in areas designated and marked for STUDENT SHARE-A-RIDE participants. Each member of the car pool must display a current Class R validation decal on the vehicle being used. (Class R permit holders may purchase and display a Class A permit if desired.)

A Class O permit allows the holder to park in a space designated for the holder. These spaces are reserved at all times and the use of the space may not be informally assigned to anyone other than the holder. These permits will only be issued to persons specified and approved by the Parking and Traffic Committee.

A Loading Zone permit allows the holder to park in designated Loading Zones for a period of time only long enough to conduct the actual loading or unloading operations. Loading Zone permits are valid only for the date and time issued and must reflect an expiration time. Loading Zone permits may be obtained from the Traffic Control Station officers or the Parking and Traffic Administration Office in the Academic Services Center.

A visitor permit allows the holder to park in designated visitor spaces or in any area specified at the time of issuance. Visitor permits may be issued at the Traffic Control Stations or through the Parking and Traffic Administration Office.

A temporary permit allows the holder to park in areas authorized by the regular class permit held by the person requesting the temporary permit. Temporary permits will be issued for periods not to exceed two weeks when needed by regular permit holders in cases where the registered vehicle is in need of repair or similar reasons. Temporary permits may also be issued to persons with official business on campus for short periods of time, or as authorized by the Parking and Traffic Committee.

Special permits may be issued to persons retired from the University or other persons as authorized by the President and who render a continuing, valuable service to the University.

PAYMENT OF FEES: When an application is made for a permit, the fee charged will be for a complete year or for the entire unexpired portion of the University's permit year. Payment of the fee must be made before the permit will be issued.

REPLACEMENT CHARGES: Any time replacement permits are issued there will be a \$.50 charge made. Remnants of old permits are to be returned at that time. If remnants are not returned, replacement permits will be at the REGULAR RATE.

REFUNDS: A request for refund will not be honored unless it is filed with the Parking and Traffic Administration Office in the Academic Services Center during the University's fiscal year in which payment for the permit was made. A request for refund must be accompanied by the remnants of the appropriate permit. Refunds will be made to members of the faculty and staff upon request and only in the event service is terminated by a resignation or leave of absence without pay. The refund will be based on the number of full months remaining in the University's permit year. No refunds will be made after the end of the spring semester. Refunds will be made, upon request, to students who withdraw from the University at the end of the fall semester, but refunds will not be made to students who withdraw at the end of the spring semester. A request for a refund will not be honored when a person's privilege to park or drive on campus has been suspended nor if outstanding charges or other debts remain unpaid. Requests for refunds of the entire amount paid will be subject to a \$5.00 administrative and handling charge.

If the administrative enforcement charges are not paid within 12 calendar days after issuance of the citation, a \$5.00 late charge will be assessed.

SECTION VIII

ENFORCEMENT

- A. PARKING AND TRAFFIC CITATIONS: University Police are authorized to issue two types of citations for violation of University Parking and Traffic Regulations:
 - 1. UNIVERSITY CITATIONS Those handled by the University, subject to University administrative enforcement charges and a right to appeal within the University (Paragraph E below).
 - 2. COURT APPEARANCE (CA) CITATIONS Those issued by the University Police constituting a summons to appear in either municipal court or a justice court.
- . POLICY WITH RESPECT TO COURT APPEARANCE (CA) CITATIONS: The University reserves the right to issue a CA citation for any violation. It is the general policy of the University, however, to issue CA citations at the University's option as follows:
 - 1. for moving violations;
 - 2. for any violation when the individual's driving or parking privileges have been suspended (See Paragraph E below); or
 - 3. when an individual receives a University citation and all reasonable attempts at collection have failed.
 - PROCEDURE FOR UNIVERSITY CITATIONS: University citations are issued for offenses described in Section VII. The administrative enforcement charges are as shown. If the charge is not paid within 12 calendar days after issuance of the citation, a \$5.00 late charge will be assessed.

Every person receiving a University Citation shall remit the amount of the charge to the Bursar's Office in the Academic Services Center. Payment must be received within 12 calendar days after issuance of the citation, to avoid a late charge.

If a person desires to appeal a University citation, he/she shall comply with Paragraph E below within 12 calendar days after issuance of the citation.

Requests for exceptions to the above referenced calendar days, will be considered on an individual basis, if mitigating or unusual circumstances exist. Such requests shall be submitted in writing to the Parking and Traffic Administration Office in the Academic Services Center and shall detail the reason(s) such a request is being made. Requests based solely on alleged non-receipt of a copy of the citation will not be honored.

Unpaid charges for parking offenses will be recorded in the name of the person who has registered the vehicle with the Traffic Administration Office. If the vehicle is not registered with the Traffic Administration Office, unpaid charges for parking offenses will be recorded in the name of the owner in whose name the vehicle is registered with an official state motor vehicle registration department or agency.

Unpaid charges for other offenses (e.g. moving violations) will be recorded in the name of the person driving the vehicle.

[Unpaid-charges-for-parking-offenses-are-recorded-either-in-the-name-of-the person-in-whose-name-the-vehicle-is-registered-with-some-official-state motor-vehicle-registration-department-or-agency;-or-in-the-name-of-the person-who-has-registered-the-vehicle-with-the-Parking-and-Traffic Administration-Office;

When Court Appearance citations are issued, the University citations will be cancelled. Failure to discharge CA citations may result in the issuance of a warrant for the arrest of such person.

Persons with unpaid charges recorded in their names shall be ineligible to receive parking permits while such charges remain unpaid. To obtain a permit, a person shall either pay the charge or timely request a University hearing.

IMPOUNDMENT OF VEHICLES, BARRING OF READMISSION AND WITHHOLDING OF CRADES, DEGREES OFFICIAL TRANSCRIPTS AND REFUNDS: When unpaid charges are recorded, the Parking and Traffic Administration Office shall send a return receipt letter to the last known address of the person in whose name the charges are recorded.

Such letter shall state that unless (1) payment of all accumulated charges is made within 12 calendar days after the date of such letter or (2) a written request is made within 12 calendar days to appear before a University hearing committee concerning impoundment of the vehicle in case of faculty, staff, student or visitor, or for barring of readmission and/or withholding of grades, degree, official transcripts and refunds in the case of students as authorized in the Regent's Rules and Regulations, Part One, Chapter VI, Section 9 and state law, the appropriate enforcement action will take place without further notice.

Such a hearing is not an appeal of the Parking and Traffic citations but is a limited hearing to allow the individual an opportunity to show that the vehicle in question was not owned, registered or used by the individual or to show that the individual receiving notice of impeding senctions does not have unpaid Parking and Traffic charges.

At such a hearing, which will be held after a reasonable period of time, the person requesting the hearing will assume the burden of showing why the appropriate enforcement action should not take place.

If timely payment is not received and either the registered owner or the person who has registered the vehicle with the University has failed to appear at the requested University impoundment hearing or has failed to meet his or her burden of proof, the vehicle may be impounded pending payment of all outstanding charges, including towing and storage charges, without further notice.

If timely payment is not received from a student and the student has failed to appear at the requested hearing or has appeared and has failed to meet his or her burden of proof, the student may be barred from readmission and grades, degrees, official transcripts and refunds may be withheld, without further notice.

E. APPEALS FROM UNIVERSITY CITATION(S): Any person who has received a University citation may file a request to have the citation reviewed. This appeal must be filed with the Parking and Traffic Administration Office no later than 12 calendar days after the citation was issued. If an appeal is not filed within this time the citation is deemed final.

Appeals shall be prepared in writing on the "Citation Appeal" form provided by the Parking and Traffic Administration Office in the Academic Services Center. Appeals may be based solely on the written statement or the appealing party may also request a personal appearance. Failure to request a personal appearance or failure to appear at the hearing (as requested) will result in the decision being rendered on the basis of the written statement (including any supporting material submitted) and the information as shown on the citation(s).

Each "Citation Appeal" form will be reviewed by the appropriate University Appeals Panel for a decision and the appealing party will be notified, in writing, of the decision. The Appeals Panel may order the payment of the administrative enforcement charge(s) in whole or in part or the cancellation of such charge(s). If the appeal is denied and the appealing party fails to pay the charge(s) or to request a review of the appeal (See Paragraph F below) within 12 calendar days after date of notification, a \$5.00 late charge will be assessed on the citation(s).

F. REVIEW OF APPEAL FROM UNIVERSITY CITATION(S): Any person who has appealed a University citation(s) and who is not satisfied with the decision by the appropriate appeals panel, may have the decision reviewed by the Student Supreme Court or Dean of Students in case of students, Vice President of Academic Affairs in case of faculty or the Vice President of Business Affairs or Dean of Students in case of respective staff. Such request shall be submitted in writing to the Parking and Traffic Administrative Office within 12 calendar days from the date of the original decision.

This written request shall set forth the grounds on which the appealing party believes the decision was improper or inequitable. Such written request shall be submitted in an original plus 2 legible copies (reproduced copies are acceptable) and include the following:

- 1. citation number(s);
- license number of vehicle(s);
- 3. date of notification of original decision;
- 4. date review requested; and
- printed or typed name, address, and signature of person requesting the review.

Each review will be considered by the appropriate appeals authority. The authority may uphold the decision of the appropriate appeals panel or they may reverse the decision in whole or in part, as deemed appropriate.

The decision of the appropriate University Appeals Authority shall be final.

3. SUSPENSION OF PRIVILEGE TO DRIVE AND PARK ON CAMPUS: The loss of the privilege of driving or parking a motor vehicle on campus shall commence 12 calendar days after the Parking and Traffic Administration Office mails a letter to the person, at the address of such person as shown in the records of that office, stating that such person's privilege of driving or parking a motor vehicle on campus has been suspended. Such letter shall state the term of suspension and will give notification of possible impoundment for parking offenses committed during the period of suspension and shall state the reason for such suspension.

Any person who (a) forges or alters a permit; (b) uses a forged or altered permit; (c) transfers a permit, affixes a permit to a vehicle other than for which it was issued, or fails to destroy a permit when required to do so by these regulations with the intention of providing any person with parking privileges he/she is not entitled to under these regulations; (d) provides false information to obtain a parking permit with knowledge thereof; or (e) parks or drives a vehicle to which there has been affixed a permit which the registered owner, or regular driver, did not purchase, shall lose the privilege of driving or parking on the University campus for six months. While a person's privilege of driving or parking a vehicle on campus is suspended, it is unlawful (1) for that person to drive or park any motor vehicle on the campus and (2) for any person to drive or park a vehicle registered in the name of such person on campus.

If a person whose privilege of driving or parking on campus has been suspended receives a University citation by reason of having a vehicle on campus during the period of suspension, the period of suspension shall be extended so that it expires twelve months from the date the person received such additional suspension. In addition, the violation of the suspension shall be reported to the Dean of Students if the person is a student, or to the appropriate Dean, Director or Administrative Official for possible disciplinary action if the person is a faculty or staff member.

A person receiving notice that his/her privilege of driving or parking a vehicle on campus has been suspended may appeal the suspension within twelve calendar days on the grounds that the imposition of such suspension is improper or will create serious and substantial hardship. Such appeal will be governed by the provisions of Part D above. No appeal shall be considered if there are any unpaid citations outstanding at the time such appeal is filed, unless special arrangements are made with the Parking and Traffic Administration Office.

H. DESTRUCTION OF PERMIT WHEN SUSPENDED: Every person receiving notice that his/her privilege of driving or parking on the campus has been suspended shall remove the parking permit(s) from every vehicle registered in his/her name and return the remnants thereof to the Parking and Traffic Administration Office within twelve days after date of such notice. Failure to do so shall be reported to the Dean of Students if the person is a student, or to the appropriate Dean, Director or Administrative Official, if the person is a faculty or staff member.

- I. ELIGIBILITY TO OBTAIN NEW PERMIT DURING PERIOD OF SUSPENSION: A person whose privilege of driving and parking on the campus is suspended and not reinstated, shall be ineligible to receive a parking permit of any type during the period of suspension.
- J. TWO VEHICLES ON CAMPUS: When an applicant who has registered two vehicles is found to have both vehicles parked on campus at the same time in violation of the Alternate Vehicle Policy (Section VI, infra), the following shall apply:
 - First Offense The Parking and Traffic Administration Office shall notify the permit holder that he/she has violated these regulations and that any further violation will result in the loss of the permit for the alternate vehicle. Additionally any citation(s) which may have been issued are due and payable.
 - 2. Second Offense The Parking and Traffic Administration Office shall notify the permit holder that he/she has again violated these regulations. Such written notice will inform the permit holder that he/she must surrender the permit from the alternate vehicle in addition to making payment for any citation(s) which may have been issued for this offense. Additionally, the permit holder shall not be able to register an alternate vehicle for the remainder of the current permit year. Failure to abide by this second notice will subject the permit holder to all enforcement sanctions including those described in Section V.
- K. IMPOUNDMENT: The term "impoundment" includes towing, removal, immobilization, and storage of the vehicle in question.

In addition to any charge that may be levied by the University for an offense resulting in removal or immobilization, the owner of an impounded vehicle must also pay a commercial wrecker service fee and storage charges after the first 24 hours. When an IMPOUND VIOLATION and the owner or driver of the vehicle appears on the scene before the arrival of the wrecker, the vehicle will not be impounded. If the owner or driver appears on the scene after the arrival of the wrecker and the wrecker driver has made a hookup, the following will apply:

- 1. The vehicle will not be impounded; and
- 2. the owner or driver will be expected to pay the wrecker a fee, in lieu of towing.

If the vehicle is impounded, the registered owner or permit holder will be sent a notice at the address on file with the Parking and Traffic Administrative Office.

The third Monday in January has been designated as Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. Employees of The University of Texas at San Antonio will be allowed a holiday with pay on this date in lieu of any other state holiday that occurs on a weekday for which a skeleton work force is required.

In summary, the Regulations provide that:

If the student desires a hearing, a hearing officer will be selected by the University President to hear evidence, to adjudicate guilt or innocence, to render a written decision with findings-of-fact, and to impose a penalty if one is due. Students registering for final hours or in absentia are exempt from the minimum tuition requirements and will pay tuition based upon the number of credit hours for which they enroll.

Installment Payments

Residence Classification

Residence status is determined by statutory provisions of the Texas Education Code and Rules and Regulations of the Coordinating Education, Texas College and University System.

Generally, individuals must have resided in the state for twelve months preceding the time of enrollment to be eligible to be classified as residents. (Such individuals, if dependent, must have resided with their parent(s) or quardian(s) in the state for twelve months immediately preceding enrollment.)

A nonresident classification is presumed to be correct as long as the residence of the individual in the state is primarily for the purpose of attending an educational institution.

Applicants whose residence status is not clearly established should complete a Residence Questionnaire, available from the Registrar's Office, so that an official opinion can be rendered. The University may request that a student claiming Texas residency for tuition purposes complete a Residence Questionnaire and provide substantiating documents to establish Texas residency.

Nonresidents who may qualify to pay tuition at the resident rate include:

Military personnel assigned to duty in Texas and their spouse and children;

Faculty employed at least one-half time on a regular monthly basis at a state institution of higher learning and their spouse and children;

Teaching or research assistants employed at least one-ha)f time in a position which is related to the assistant's degree program;

A student who holds a competitive academic scholarship for at least \$200 which was awarded in competition with Texas students by a scholarship committee recognized by the University and the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System.

Fage 36 Assistantships

A number of graduate and teaching assistantships are eveilable-te students-and-are awarded on the-basis-of-schelarship-and-need on a competitive basis by each program. Prospective students who wish to be considered for award of an assistantship should apply directly-by-letter to the Graduate Advisor of the program in which they propose to carry out graduate study. No special application form is required. Students who receive such assistantships (20 hours per week) pay-tuitien-at-the-resident rate qualify to pay tuition at the resident rate, receive a stipend, and are eligible for employee benefits.

Because-of-limitations-of-physical-facilities-in-the-Bental-School;-the opportunity-to-repeat-a-course-is-dependent-upon-space-being-available and-cannot-be-guaranteed-by-the-School;

Deficiencies must be corrected as follows:

- (1) An 1 (Incomplete) must be corrected no later than one week prior to the beginning of the next academic year;
- (2) Other deficiencies must be corrected through successful remediation or repetition before the student will be considered for promotion.

The grade assigned for remediation/repetition will be the grade earned by the student under the academic standards set for that course. Both will appear on the student's transcript. However, only the grade earned in remediation/repetition will be used in calculation of the grade point average.

The student's remediation of a course must be recommended by the Promotions Committee and approved by the Dean. The remediation program is designed by the course director and approved by the Curriculum Committee. Remediation of a course is considered the same as repetition of a course in relation to promotion and dismissal guidelines. With the approval of the Dean, a student may choose to repeat the academic year in lieu of remediation.

Academic Dismissal

Academic dismissal of a student will be considered under any of the following circumstances: (1)-Unsatisfactory-performance-in-two-or-more-courses-in different-disciplines;*-(2)-Unsatisfactory-and/or-minimally-acceptable performance-in-four-or-more-courses-in-different-disciplines:* (1) Failure to achieve a GPA of a least 2.0 in all basic science and dental didactic courses and all preclinical laboratory and clinical courses undertaken in an academic year:

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(3) Failure to successfully remediate/repeat a failed course;
(3) Failure to demonstrate to the faculty the intellectual, ethical, and behavioral attributes necessary to perform the duties required of members of the dental profession.

Appeals Process

Students may appear decisions of the Promotions Committee, which are reviewed by the Dean, to the Dental School Faculty Council. Procedural appeal may be made to the President of the Health Science Center.

GRADUATION

The degree Doctor of Dental Surgery is awarded by the Board of Regents upon recommendation of the faculty to the Dean, and certification by the Dean to the President. Candidates-must-be-of-good-moral-character,-comply-with-all necessary-legal-and-financial-requirements,-and-offer-evidence-of-having satisfactorily-fulfilled-the-academic-requirements-of-the-dental-curriculum. Candidates must satisfactorily fulfill the academic requirements of the dental curriculum, have a cumulative GPA of 2.0 or above, be of good moral character, and comply with all necessary legal and financial requirements.

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TUITION

Tuition for nonresident students is an amount per year equal to four times the rate that a resident student pays ouring the corresponding academic year.

The University may request that a student complete a residence questionnaire if the student is claiming Texas residency for tuition purposes.

See Classification for Tuition Purposes in the Appendixes.

REQUIRED FEES

The student services fee of \$100 per year is required of all students and is prorated-for-less-than-twelve-months. The fee helps to cover the cost of activities and the Student Health Service.

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Parking Fee

Students who park vehicles in campus lots will be assessed a parking fee of \$12 per year. One decal is issued when the fee is paid. Additional decals for a second or replacement vehicle are-\$1-cach are provided at no charge. The fee for motorcycle parking is \$1.50 per year.

Clinic Jackets

Clinic jackets traditionally worn by students throughout the Dental School program are required and may be purchased through the Bookstore at the approximate cost of \$1518 each. The number of coats necessary is a matter of individual choice.

Instruments and Supplies and Textbooks

A list of required equipment is developed for each year of the dental curriculum and is made available to each class at the time of registration. Kits containing instruments, manuals, and supplies for each class are placed on reserve in the Bookstore and must be purchased at the time of registration. The estimated east of the kit for each year is given in the summary of expenses fellowing. Instruments and supplies other than those available in the kits are not acceptable. The list of required instruments and materials is reviewed annually by the faculty, and revisions are made when necessary.

Textbooks

A list of required textbooks is prepared for each class each year. Some recommended textbooks may also appear on the list, and students should consult the instructor about the advisability of purchasing these volumes. Textbooks are available from the Bookstore. Used books, if they are the edition required by the list, are acceptable. The approximate cost of books and manuals required for each class may be found in the summary of expenses which follows:

Instruments, supplies and books for each year of dental studies are estimated to cost:

*First year: \$5900 Second year: \$4150 Third year: \$ 300 Fourth year: \$ 250

*Dental instruments which the student will use in dental school and later in practice are purchased in a kit available through the bookstore. The kit also contains some dental gold required in the curriculum. Entering students are required to purchase the regulation kit at registration.

Install Payments of Tuition and Fees

Payment of tuition and required fees in installments is an option for dental students. The following alternatives are available:

- (1) Full payment of tuition and fees in advance of the beginning of the academic year; or
- (2) One-half payment of tuition and fees in advance of the beginning of the academic year and one-half payment prior to the start of the nineteenth class week; or
- (3) One-fourth payment of tuition and fees in advance of the beginning of the academic year and separate one-fourth payments prior to the ninth, eighteenth a,d twenty-seventh class weeks.

A fee of \$15 will be assessed for handling of installment payments of tuition and iees and a \$10 fee will be assessed for each late payment.

Late payments will result, at the University's option, in one or more of the following actions: (a) the student's being barred from class until payment is made; (b) withholding of credit if payment is not made by the end of the semester, with the University adjusting its records to reflect the student's failure to have properly enrolled for that academic year; or (c) bar against readmission and withholding of grades, degree, and official transcript.

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COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

Microscopic Anatomy First-Semester

CSBL 50532 5.0 Credit Hours

Lectures, conferences, demonstrations, and laboratory work studying the microscopic structure of the basic tissues and organs of the human body followed by details of the embryologic development and microscopic structure of the various organs of the oral cavity. Current concepts in cellular and molecular biology are presented during the portion of the course in which they are most relevant. The general purpose of this course is to give students the opportunity to become acquainted with the basic embryology, cytology, and histology of normal human tissues and organs, thereby providing a foundation of knowledge for the understanding of normal activity and disease processes.

Dental Anatomy (Lecture)
First-and-Second-Semesters

RESD 50204 2.0 Credit Hours

This course offers freshmen students an opportunity to learn anatomical, morphological, and functional aspects of the oral cavity. Dentition and their

Dental Anatomy (Laboratory)

supporting structures are emphasized.

RESD 50205 2.0 Credit Hours

This laboratory portion of Dental Anatomy provides an opportunity for students to learn to develop manual dexterity and eye-hand coordination by carving and waxing ivorine teeth. It is expected that students reach the proficiency level required to satisfactorily perform the laboratory and clinical tasks assigned in subsequent courses.

Biochemistry First-Semester

BIOC 50413

4.0 Credit Hours

Primarily lectures and conferences designed as a survey course for dental students. The content deals with the chemistry and metabolism of carbohydrates, amino acids, lipids, proteins and nucleic acids and special topics relating to the biochemistry of the oral cavity.

School-Based Prevention

COMD 50015 O Credit Hours

Students have the opportunity to participate in a public health preventive program in elementary schools, supervising a fluoride rinse program and providing small-group instruction in toothbrushing. The program aims to demonstrate to dental students effective group prevention and to foster more widespread adoption of such preventive programs in the community.

Preventive Methodologies

COMD 50519 0.5 Credit Hours

This course is designed to offer dental students an opportunity to learn how to assess past and present caries activity and the present indicators of periodontal disease from an etiologic perspective. Now to plan and implement appropriate office and home primary preventive measures in relation to dental disease risk is also presented.

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Preventive Dentistry First-Semester

COMD 50221 2.0 Credit Nours

The five generally accepted methods of prevention and control of caries and periodontal disease (fluoride therapy, use of pit fissure sealants, plaque control procedures, sugar discipline, and education) are presented. Lectures consider the theoretical background of these preventive approaches, the techniques necessary to apply them, and the different environments in which preventive dentistry is practiced. Additional lectures focus on the hazards of environmental, physical, and mental stress encountered by students and dentists in practicing.

Biomaterials First-and-Second-Semesters RESD-5020150101 21.0 Credit Hours

The-first-semester-provides aAn introduction to fundamental physical, mechanical, and chemical properties of materials is provided. Lectures include basic introductions to the fields of metals, polymers, and ceramics. Gross and Head & Neck Anatomy First-and-Second-Semester

CSBL 50616 6.0 Credit Hours

Laboratory study of the structure of the human body with emphasis on functional anatomy is provided—in—the—first—semester the focus. The method utilizes regional dissection and individual study of prosections, models, skeletons, and other demonstration materials. Important aspects of human morphology are emphasized by lectures and films. Second—semester—emphasis—is entirely—devoted—to—regional—dissection—of—the—head—with—emphasis—on functional—anatomy——Lectures—and—films—accentuate—the—organizational—aspects of the structure of the head and neck, accentuating the organizational aspects of these regions; functional and clinical correlations are drawn by the use of lectures and radiological demonstrations.

Crown and Bridge (Lecture) Second-Semester

RESD 50116

1.0 Credit Hours

A lecture series designed to acquaint beginning dental students with the basic principles of crown preparation and the techniques involved in constructing a cast restoration for an extracoronal tooth preparation.

Crown and Bridge (Laboratory) Second-Semester

RESD 50517 0.5 Credit Hours

The laboratory component of Crown and Bridge involves cutting $\underline{\text{full}}$ veneer crown preparations on maxillary and mandibular first molars in a dentoform. Students will also have an opportunity to fabricate two full veneer crowns through the lost wax technique.

Physiology Second Semester

PHYL 50612 6.0 Credit Hours

Focuses on the function of the healthy stomatognathic system with major emphasis on the basic principle of mandibular movements and positions.

Operative Dentistry (Laboratory)

RESD 50114

1.0 Credit Hours

Instructions, demonstrations, and laboratory exercises in the instrumentation techniques for preparation of the Class I, II and V amalgam and Case I and V direct gold cavities. Laboratory exercises in the placement of the Class I, II and V silver amalgam restoration and the Class I direct gold restoration are also provided.

Professional Ethics

O Credit Hours

An introduction to the principles of ethics emphasizing automony, beneficence, and justice as they apply to the professional ethics of the dental profession.

Clinical Case Conferences

INTD 50515 0.5 Credit Hours

A series of eight conferences designed to enhance interaction between the basic and clinical sciences while offering a participative learning experience. The integrative, multidisciplinary academic format is designed to promote development of analytical, critical thinking and problem solving skills essential for successful clinical practice. Freshman conferences emphasize the relevance of clinical material which will be presented in the junior and senior curriculum to the basic science information which predominates in the freshman curriculum.

COMD 60110 1.0 Credit Hours

A study of dental research methods and the interpretation and evaluation of scientific dental literature. The goal is to prepare students to make sound critical judgements regarding the acceptance of new procedures and products.

General Pathology First Semester

PATH 60419 4.0 Credit Hours

The fundamentals of human pathology emphasizing practical clinical applications. Lectures and, independent study and laboratory experience are used in a review of the principal diseases of major organ systems.

Dental Radiology First Semester

BRNTDIAG 60132 1.0 Credit Hours

A-comprehensive-lecture-course-in-radiological-interpretation-of-normal anatomy;-anomalies;-caries;-periapical-disease;-periodontol-disease;-eysts; traumay-and-various-pathological-lesions-of-the-jaws-and-associated structures. Introduction to dental radiology, including didactic and clinical instruction in radiation physics, radiation biology, radiation hygiene, film processing, and radiological interpretation of normal anatomy, caries, periodontal disease and periapical disease.

Nutrition Firet-Semester

CCMD 60120 1.0 Credit Hours

Elements of nutrition are presented in a lecture series. Special attention is given to those aspects of nutrition that relate to dental health and the prevention of dental diseases.

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Oral Surgery First-Semester

OSUR 60151 1.0 Credit Hours

Didactic presentation of oral surgery principles. Detailed instruction in biopsy technique, suturing, tooth removal, preparation of the mouth for dentures, and minor oral surgery.

Local Anesthesia Pirst-Semester

OSUR 60156 1.0 Credit Hours

A didactic course dealing with all aspects of local anesthesia as they relate to dental practice. Neuroanatomy, physiology, and pharmacology of local anesthesia is presented as well as the prevention and management of complications and emergencies encountered in clinical local anesthesia.

Operative Dentistry (Lecture) First-and-Second-Semesters

RESD 6020161501 2-01.5 Credit Hours

heetures, demonstrations and laboratory exercises in the instrumentation and techniques for restoring teeth in three basic dental materials; silver amalgam, cast gold, and composite resin. Special emphasis is placed on the simulation of clinical conditions. Lectures provide basic restorative philosophy and techniques in cavity design, instrumentation, and restorative materials manipulation used in modern dentistry. These lectures are designed to augment the preclinical projects conducted in the laboratory which provide simulation of clinical conditions.

Operative Dentistry (Laboratory)
First-and-Second-Semesters

RESD 6030261502 3:01.5 Credit Hours

Chairside-instruction-in-the-administration-of-local-analgeoia-and-the application-of-the-rubber-dam:-haboratory-exercises-include-excavation-of dental-caries; the-mixing-and-placement-of-interim-treatment-restorations-and bases; and opportunity to practice skills presented in the lecture course. Exercises include mixing and placement of interim restorative materials, bases, silver amalgam, and composite resin. Students have the opportunity to fabricate and place a cast gold inlay and onlay restoration.

Oral Diagnosis
First-and-Second-Semesters

-PRNPDIAG 60235 2.0 Credit Hours

Emphasizes the importance of an accurate diagnosis and patient evaluation upon which to base a rational treatment plan. Lectures and-demonstrations on the normal appearance and presentation of abnormalities and disease as they relate to various areas of the oral cavity with special emphasis on the soft tissues. Methodology in diagnosis includes case history, general and oral clinical examination, clinical laboratory and other supplementary examinations. The second-half-fecuses-on-understanding-the-carious-process-as-it-progresses through-the-enamel-to-involvement-of-the-pertapex. Clinical and radiographic characteristics, histologic appearance as well as signs and symptoms of caries are discussed. Lectures and-demonstrations stress the examination of the teeth and their supporting structures as they relate to the accurate diagnosis of caries, pulpal pain, and diseases which could mimic pulpal pain. Applications-of-the-techniques-of-patient-evaluation-is-accomplished-on-two comprehensive-care-patients.

Crown and Bridge (Lecture) First-and-Second-Semesters

RESD 60211 2.0 Credit Hours

A lecture series designed to give students the opportunity to study the basic concepts and principles of fixed prosthodontics; rationale and methodology of full and partial veneer tooth preparation to receive a cast metal restoration; techniques involved in construction of cast restoration for a prepared tooth.

Crown and Bridge (Laboratory)
First-and-Second-Semesters

RESD 62512 2.5 Credit Hours

Laboratory exercises to include fabrication of anterior and posterior three-unit bridge with a major emphasis on pontic design and temporization; restoration of endodontically involved teeth; facrication of an anterior ceramo-metal restoration.

Removable Partial Denture Prosthodontics (Lecture)
First-and-Second-Semesters

PROS 60294 2.0 Credit Hours

A preclinical lecture course stressing the association of biological and mechanical principles in planning and constructing removable partial dentures. Emphasis is placed on the student establishing a proper working relationship with commercial dental laboratories.

Nitrous Oxide Conscious Sedation

OSUR 60540 0.5 Credit Hours

A didactic course presenting the fundamentals of patient anxiety control through the use of nitrous oxide conscious sedation for both the adult and child patient.

Growth and Development

PEDO 61501

1.5 Credit Hours

A course designed to present a comprehensive approach to the morphologic, biochemical, and physiologic aspects of human growth and development. A review of the control and influence of genetic, hormonal, and environmental factors on the various tissues and organ systems from the embryonic period to maturity with particular emphasis devoted to the functional development of the oral and perioral structures. Etiology of certain oro-facial abnormalities of developmental nature are covered. This is a joint presentation by faculty of Pediatric Dentistry and Orthodontics departments.

Oral Pathology

PATH 60221 2.0 Credit Hours

A didactic course which introduces the basic pathological changes which occur in oral tissue. Lectures are supplemented by kodachrome illustrations with emphasis placed upon histoclinical correlation.

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Removable Partial Denture Prosthodontics (Laboratory)
First-and-Second-Semesters

PROS 60295 2.0 Credit Hours

Laboratory exercises associated with the lecture course including diagnosis, treatment planning, survey and design, and the construction technique of removable partial dentures.

Specific topics include periodontal examination, diagnosis, prognosis, treatment planning, plaque control, subgingival therapy, and local modifying etiologic factors. The second semester expands the information on therapy. Specific methods for diagnosing and treating acute periodontal disease are described. Emphasis is given to systematic diseases which mimic periodontal disease and modify therapy. The importance and rational of maintenance in stressed. Current information concerning chemotherapeutics in periodontics is also presented.

Orthodontics (Lecture)
First-and-Second-Semesters

ORTH 61575 1.5 Credit Hours

An introduction to orthodontics including definitions, scope, and occlusion from the orthodontic viewpoint - classification and etiology.

Orthodontics (Laboratory)
Second-Semester

ORTH 60176

Introduces the instruments and materials used in orthodontics and construction and assembly of various types of appliances used in preventive orthodontics. (Up to 20% of the class may choose orthodontics as a clinical elective for the junior and senior years; selection to be approved by the orthodontic faculty after the student has completed the sophomore year.)

Pharmacology Second-Semester PHAR 60406

4.0 Credit Hours

A study of the general principles of action of drugs used for the treatment and alleviation of symptoms of medical and dental diseases including pharmacodynamics of major drug groups, toxicology, and contemporary prescription writing.

Occlusion
First-Semester

RESD 60111

1.0 Credit Hours

Introduction to occlusion of the natural teeth. Consideration is given to growth and development and variations therein that affect the arrangement of the teeth. Emphasis on the temporomandibular joint, its interrelationships with the occluding teeth as well as the neuromuscular mechanisms involved. Occlusal discrepancies which trigger the temporomandibular joint syndrome are examined closely. Includes adjustment of the natural dentition by selective grinding. In the second semester, emphasis is on the indications, goals, and techniques for occlusal adjustment and occlusal bite plane splints.

<u>Neuroscience</u>

INTD 62542

2.5 Credit Hours

In this study of the anatomy and physiology of the nervous system (primarily the central nervous system), special emphasis is on cranial nerves and related structures. The course includes lectures and clinical presentations pertaining to dentistry.

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Endodontics (Lecture) Second-Semester ENDO 60141

1.0 Credit Hours

A 16-hour course designed to introduce the student to the concepts-of endodontics-and-to-provide-a-broad-base-of-understanding-and-utilization-of the-fundamentals-of-root-canal-therapyfundamentals of clinical endodontics.

Second-Semester

ENDO 60142

1.0 Credit Hours

Introduction to Pediatric Dentistry, including lectures on history taking, diagnosis, treatment planning, child behavior and management, current fluoride therapy, operative dentistry for the child patient, pulpal therapy, development of the dentition, habits, space maintenance, and an overview of the medically labile child.

Pediatric Dentistry (Laboratory) Second-Semester

PEDO 60542 0.5 Credit Hours

Designed-to-offer-students-an-opportunity-to-develop-proficiency-in-the-skills used-in-restoration-of-carious-or-fractured-primary-and-young-permanent-teeth-The-procedures-carried-out-include-Class-II-cavity-preparation;-Class-II matrix-to-adaptation-and-wedging--and-stainless-steel-crown-preparation-and adaptation. Students have the opportunity to develop proficiency in the skills used in preparing primary teeth to receive silver amalgam or stainless steel crown restorations and to preserve space using a crown/loop maintainer. The procedures performed will include Class I, II, III type cavity preparations, matrix adaptation, stainless steel crown preparation and adaptation, and fabrication of a crown/loop maintainer. Techniques for placement of rubber dam and arch impressions will be Gemonstrated.

Clinic Second-Semester INTD 60288

2.0 Credit Hours

Involves delivery of patient care in a clinical setting. Students will have the opportunity to experience patient management in the areas of oral diagnosis, operative dentistry, oral surgery, pediatric dentistry, and periodontics, rendering treatment procedures on a rotating basis in preparation of ensuing clinical years.

Professional Ethics

COMD 60031 O Credit Hours

The application of ethical principles in the everyday practice of dentistry, such as informed consent, truth-telling, and record keeping will be the focus of this course.

Physiology of Plaque

COMD 60145 1.0 Credit Hours

A unified approach to oral physiology, dental plaque, and dental disease with a special emphasis on dental caries is the presentation in this course. Students have the opportunity to develop an understanding of the basic structure of the tooth and its interface with the oral environment; the nature

and composition of oral secretions; the nature, structure and ecology of dental plaque; and the epidemiology and natural course of dental caries and periodontal disease.

Clinical Case Conferences

INTD 60501 0.5 Credit Hours

One of a series of eight conferences designed to enhance interaction between the basic and clinical sciences while providing a participative learning experience for students. The integrative, multidisciplinary academic format promotes an apportunity for students to develop the analytical, critical thinking, and problem solving skills essential for successful clinical practice. Sophomore conferences emphasize the direct relevance of clinical material to the basic science information presented in the freshman and sophomore years.

Operative Dentistry (Lecture) First-and-Second-Semesters

RESD 70210

2.0 Credit Hours

Series of lectures designed to present more sophisticated didactic material in areas not included in the first and second year preclinical courses. Serves as a forum for discussion of individual clinical problems and their solutions which are of interest to the class as a whole.

Operative Dentistry (Clinic)
First-end-Second-Semesters

A didactic course in which students are instructed in the removal of impacted teeth and the prevention, evaluation, and treatment of oral surgery complications. Additional instruction in the use of prescription drugs relative to oral surgery is given.

Clinical Oral Surgery (Clinic)
Pirst-and-Second-Semesters

OSUR 70251

2.0 Credit Hours

A rotational experience at the Robert B. Green Hospital which provides clinical experience in performing minor oral surgery on patients who, in many instances, are in acute distress and/or have acute odontogenic infection. Students extract teeth and perform minor oral surgery under supervision in the Dental School clinics.

Crown and Bridge (Lecture) First-and-Second-Semesters

RESD 71518

A course designed to be adjunct to and to complement the preclinical course so that the student correlates previous instruction in the clinical care of patients in need of crowns and/or fixed partial dentures.

Preventive Dentistry (Clinic)

COMD 70150

A clinical and laboratory course designed to acquaint students with innovative and promising tests and procedures whose application is having or may have an impact on dental disease and dental practice. The course is designed so that students with some clinical experience have the opportunity to become more critical in evaluating dental disease and clinical procedures for assessment, prediction, prevention and treatment.

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Crown and Bridge (Clinic)

Clinical course consisting of diagnosis and treatment planning, making complete and partial veneer crown preparations and modifications, management of supportive tissues, providing adequate pain control for restorative procedures, fabrication and insertion of provisional as well as cast restorations, and instructions to patients in the care and maintenance of restorations.

Periodontics (Lecture)
First-and-Second-Semesters

PERI 70181 1.0 Credit Hours

An-expansion-of-the-foundation-provided-in-the-sophomore-year:--Written practice-cases are-utilized-to-give-the-student-experience-in-treatment planning-and-selection-of-therapeutic-methods:--Emphasis-is-on-total-treatment planning-to-include-any-phase-of-dentistry-required-to-treat-a-particular patient: An expansion of the foundation presented in the sophomore year. Surgical treatment planning, rationale, techniques, and wound healing are emphasized. A three-hour surgical laboratory exercise is included. Periodontal interrelationships with prosthodontics, endodontics, and orthodontics are examined in case presentation formats with student participation.

Periodontics (Clinic) First and Second Semesters PERI 70282 2.0 Credit Hours

Students-have-the-opportunity to-perform-sealing, root-planing, and gingived curetment-procedures-under-direct-supervision; Students-assist-instructor-in management-of-complex-periodontal-surgical-cases-and-are-given-an-opportunity to-perform-simple-surgical-procedures-with-instructor-as-the-assistant; Sentinuing-emphasis-is-placed-upon-student's-role-as-monitor-of-the-patient's personal-dental-care-efforts; Progression-into-periodontal-therapy-as-part-of comprehensive-management-of-the-patient; The management of patients with gingivitis and adult periodontitis is the focus. Emphasis includes periodontal evaluation and diagnosis, incorporation of periodontal therapy in a comprehensive treatment plan, delivery of initial periodontal therapy, periodontal re-evaluation, and maintenance of the treated patient. Students have the opportunity to perfect manual skills in periodontal examination, in scaling of teeth, and in root planing as well as in demonstrating the ability to analyze information and synthesize plans of therapy.

Removable Partial Denture Prosthodontics (Lecture) Second Semester

PROS 70191 1.0 Credit Hours

A didactic course designed to acquaint the student with a variety of approaches that may be used in treating the partially edentulous mouth. Lectures cover critical steps in treatment of the partially endentulous patient, stabilizing periodontically weakened teeth, intraccronal and other attachments used in partial denture construction, swinglock dentures, vitreets earbon-implants; subperiosteal-and-blade-implants; eleft-palate-and maxillofacial-prosthesis; radiotherapy and denture-construction; and prosthodontics, a complete denture opposing a removable partial denture, athletic mouthquards. Guest speakers present some of the lectures.

Removable Partial Denture Prosthodontics (Clinic)
First-and-Second-Semesters

PROS 70292 2.0 Credit Hours

A clinical experience designed to place continued emphasis on diagnosis, treatment planning, design principles, mouth preparation, and dental laboratory coordination. The student correlates biological and mechanical information in clinical care of patients requiring removable partial dentures. The student is required to complete treatment for one partial denture patient during the junior year.

Pediatric Dentistry (Lecture) First-and-Second-Semesters PEDO 70141 1.0 Credit Hours

Classification-and-management-of-tranmatic-injuries;-gingival-disease-in-the childy-surgical-procedures-for-the-child-patient;-pharmacology-of premedication;-dental-care-for-the-handicapped-child;-genetic-disorders; preventive-and-intercaptive-orthodontics;-practice-management-in-pediatric dentistry;-and-child-abuse: This course covers development of the dentition, preventive and interceptive orthodontics, trauma and pulp therapy in primary teeth, pediatric oral pathology and surgery, preventive dentistry, behavior management, and special problems in children.

Pediatric Dentistry (Clinic) First-and-Second-Semesters PEDC 70242 2.0 Credit Hours

Actual clinical experience with child patients giving students the opportunity to gain clinical judgement and proficiency in relation to comprehensive dentistry for children. Areas of competency include prevention, examination, diagnosis and treatment planning, local anesthesia, operative dentistry, pulpal therapy, oral injuries, oral surgery, preventive and interceptive orthodontics, behavior management, maintenance care, and periodontics.

Nitrous Oxide Conscious Sedation

OSUR 70524 0.5 Credit Hours

Students are given the opportunity to utilize nitrous oxide conscious sedation in a clinical setting under faculty supervision.

Foundations of Health Economics

GENP 70134

Economic concepts and terminology prerequisite for more advanced topics in public dental health policy and applications in dental practice are introduced. The course is designed to help future dentists cope with problems resulting from involvement of consumers, industry, private foundations, government agencies, legislative bodies, etc. in decisions about health and dental services.

<u>Bicmaterials</u>

RESD 70202

A didactic introduction to dental materials by classification, this course is designed to describe the manipulative and technic aspects of each existing material category as well as to relate the basic physical, mechanical, and chemical properties to the desired end use so that intelligent choices may be made as new materials become available.

Clinical Case Conferences

INTD 71515 1.5 Credit Hours

One of a series of eight conferences designed to enhance interaction between the basic and clinical sciences while providing a participative learning experience for students. The integrative, multidisciplinary academic format of the conferences promotes the development of the analytical, critical thinking, and problem solving skills essential for successful clinical practice. The junior conferences accentuate the direct applicability of basic science information to the competent practice of clinical dentistry.

Neuroscience

INTD 70142

This clinical neuroscience course relates basic principles of neuroscience to the clinical setting. Sensory and motor dysfunction is described and analyzed in reference to the normal neuroanatomy of the central nervous system. Clinical case presentations are made where appropriate.

A comprehensive clinical experience in dental roentgenology giving students experience in making and processing intraoral and estraoral radiographs of assigned patients. Instruction is given in the principles of radiologic interpretation, and students are required to prepare radiological reports of assigned patients.

Dental Radiology II

DIAG 70136 1.0 Credit Hours

A comprehensive didactic course in dental radiologic interpretation of diseases of the jaw including differential radiological diagnosis of developmental abnormalities and pathological lesions of the teeth and jaws.

Practice Administration Second-Semester

COMD 70126

1.0 Credit Hours

An introduction to the basic principles of the management of a dental practice with emphasis upon personal relationships and efficient time utilization.

Oral; -Maxillofacial-and-Reconstructive Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery First-and-Second-Semesters

OSUR 80554 0.5 Credit Hours

General Practice Clinic First-and-Second-Semesters GENP 83277 32.0 Credit Hours

Clinical experience for senior students under supervision of the General Practice Department with heavy emphasis on teaching comprehensive patient care in an atmosphere that closely simulates the private practice environment. In accomplishing procedures from each discipline of dentistry, students receive instruction from a faculty of general dentists. Various specialty departments provide didactic material, rotations in specialty clinics, and consultation. Senior Seminars, conducted by the Department of General Practice, entail lectures, problem solving sessions and presentations of selected cases designed to enhance the students' knowledge of comprehensive clinical dentistry.

General Anesthesia and Pain Control

OSUR 80160 1.0 Credit Hours

Various methods of pain and anxiety control are examined. An extensive exploration of general anesthesia as well as indications, contraindications, and techniques for intravenous sedation and nitrous oxide conscious sedation are included. Airway management techniques are also presented.

General Practice Seminar

GENP 80278 2.0 Credit Hours

This seminar presents topics relevant to clinical practice, including dental materials, their application and selection; an overview of dental equipment; and clinical techniques. It is intended to reinforce philosophies presented

by the specialty disciplines; to provide the opportunity to discuss dental topics of current interest; and to promote dialogue between students and faculty.

Geriatric Dentistry

DIAG 80141 1.0 Credit Hours

Lectures and seminars emphasizing dental management of the geriatric patient will cover such topics as normal aging, treatment planning, pharmacologic considerations, management and communication techniques, dementias, dentistry for nursing home and homebound elderly, and clinical care.

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Simulated Private Practice First-and-Second-Semesters

GENP 80075 0 Credit Hours

Combination didactic presentations and clinical experience emphasizing principles of work simplification. Students spend ene-week three weeks of their clinical time managing and delivering dental services to patients using a chairside dental assistant.

Community-&-Public-Health-Bentistry & Special Patient Care First-Semester

COMD 8153180131 1.51.0 Credit Hours

The rele-of-legislation, politics, secto-economic-status, cultures, and ethnic groups in the community as they relate to an oral health delivery system. Emphasizes that private practice cannot be isolated from the political, economic, or social events occurring in the surrounding community. Combination of lectures directed to the philosophy, goals, and practice of public health with emphasis on the dental health of population groups. Scope and responsibilities of public health, dental epidemiology, prevention of dental disease, and delivery of dental eare for a community as a patient. Principles of the care of the special patient, including the handicapped and the geriatric patient. This course provides didactic instruction in the dental treatment of the medically compromised patient. The most common systemic diseases will be discussed and how dental care should be modified for treatment of people with such diseases. Close communication with medical personnel in the treatment of the special patient will be emphasized.

Pediatric Dentistry First-Semester

PEDO 80541 0.5 Credit Hours

Eight-one-hour-seminars-dealing-with-the-management-of-the-difficult-child patient-and-a-review-of-the-current-advances-in-pediatric-dentistry: A lecture series dealing with child abuse, management of the difficult patient, adolescent dentistry, treatment of the handicapped and medically-compromised patient as well as recent advances in restorative dentistry for the pediatric patient will be covered.

Clinical Case Conferences

INTD 80215 2.0 Credit Hours

A continuation of a series of conferences in each year of dental studies designed to enhance interaction between the basic and clinical sciences. The senior conferences accentuate the direct applicability of basic science information to the competent practice of clinical dentistry.

Dental Economics

GENP 80135

An introduction to dental service industries, focusing on specific problems of productivity measurement, supply and demand estimates, investment decisions, market characteristics and performance, and alternative modes and settings of dental practice. Emerging professional and public health issues will be discussed.

Dental Ethics

COMD 80031

This course examines ethical principles as sources of laws affecting dentists. Analysis of the ethical principles published by the American Dental Association and the Texas Dental Association will be part of the course. The role of the Texas State Board of Dental Examiners in the application of ethical principles in the practice of dentistry including advertising, professional competence, employment and supervision of dental assistants and hygienists, and malpractice will be considered.

Dental Jurisprudence

COMD 80532 0.5 Credit Hours

An in-depth review of the Texas Dental Practice Act and the Rules and Regulations of the Texas State Board of Dental Examiners will be presented as preparation for the Dental Jurisprudence examination given by the Board. General review of the interface of the law and dental practice including dental torts, malpractice, partnerships, and the dentist as employer will be given.

Pharmacotherapeutics

PHAR 70109

The emphasis of this course is on understanding the rationale, indications, and contraindications for prescribing pharmacologic agents in dentistry. Consideration of the pharmacologic agents the patient may be taking at the time of the dental visit will be emphasized.

Postdoctoral dental studies at The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio consist of specialty certificate programs, graduate degree programs, an advanced education program, and residencies. The combined resources of the Dental School, the Medical School, the Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences and affiliated patient care institutions in the community provide opportunities for flexibility in offerings in order to meet the demands of today's dental practitioner.

The certificate and master's degree programs are directed toward providing opportunities for the development of well trained clinicians competent to provide broad spectrum care and teachers with a comprehensive background of clinical experience, current basic science knowledge relevant to dentistry, and an understanding of research methodology. Certificate programs are administered by the Dental School; master of science degrees are granted by the Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences. The core curricula for both the certificate and master's degree programs are essentially the same through the first two years. Students have the option of entering a graduate program in three of the specialties at the conclusion of the first year of the certificate program.

Dental Diagnostic Science, Periodontics, and Prosthodontics programs offer certificate and master's degree programs. Certificate programs only are available in Endodontics and Pediatric Dentistry. Certificate programs are 24 months in length while the master's degree programs require 30-36 months. The graduate degree requires a thesis based on investigative projects, additional teaching activities, and further clinical experience.

Four students are admitted each year to the programs in Dental Diagnostic Science, Pediatric Dentistry, Periodontics, and Prosthodontics. The program in Endodontics admits two students annually.

In addition to the certificate and degree programs, several associated programs offer advanced training in dental specialties. The Dental School's Department of General Practice administers a one-year residency as well as an advanced education program in general dentistry. There is an affiliation between the Dental School and the Medical School's Department of Surgery which offers a residency in Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery. In concert with the Graduate School, the Dental School offers an opportunity for students to pursue specialty certificates as part of the Dentist-Scientist Program which culminates in a Ph.D. (See ASSOCIATED PROGRAMS.)

Tuition

Tuition for resident students enrolled in postdoctoral certificate programs in the Dental School are currently based on an interim rate scale until the fall semester of 1995 when the full tuition rate set by the Legislature will go into effect.

Associated Programs

General Practice Residency

Four to six postdoctoral students are accepted annually for the one-year residency conducted by the Department of General Practice. Applications must be submitted before the deadline of October 1; the program begins in July. Stipends and health and liability insurance are provided. Further information is available from the Department of General Practice of the Dental School.

Advanced Education in General Dentistry

The Advanced Education in General Dentistry (AEGD) program is designed to offer intensive clinical training. Administered by the Department of General Practice, the AEGD involves the direct delivery of comprehensive dental care through the UTHSCSA dental clinic as well as off-campus sites. Applications must be submitted before the deadline of October 1; the program begins in July. Applicants must hold a degree from an accredited dental school. Further information is available from the Department of General Practice of the Dental School.

Dentist-Scientist Ph.D. Program

The Dentist-Scientist Program in Pathobiology of Oral Diseases culminates in a Ph.D. degree from the UTHSCSA Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences. The program offers advanced clinical training leading to a specialty certificate in Endodontics, Periodontics, or Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery and independent research. In addition to the required dental curriculum, students select a Ph.D. program in the basic sciences and meet requirements for the degree. Further information is available from the Department of Periodontics of the Dental School.

Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery Residency

This residency program is composed of two tracks leading to a certificate in oral and maxillofacial surgery in conjuntion with meeting the requirements of a medical degree of a Ph.D. in one of the basic sciences. (See Dentist-Scientist Ph.D. Program above.) Further information is available from the Division of Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery, Department of Surgery, UTHSCSA Medical School.

INTERDISCIPLINARY COURSES

The following are basic science courses and interdisciplinary courses or courses common to the curriculum of two or more programs:

PHYSIOLOGY

PHYL 50216

2.0 Credit Hours

This course reviews selected topics in physiology in order to promote the student's understanding of the physiologic basis of dentistry.

MICROANATOMY

CSBL 50237

2.0 Credit Hours

A review and update of the development and histology of the face and oral cavity is presented. Subject cover structure; basic tissues; development of the face, teeth, and oral cavity; and histology of oral tissues. Correlation of material with clinical and research application is emphasized.

GROSS ANATOMY

CSBL 50217/50317* 2.0/3.0 Credit Hours

A comprehensive review of the anatomy of the head and neck, presenting relevant clinical applications. Concepts are correlated to preparing students for specialty training. *Programs which require the laboratory portion of this course award 3 hours credit.

MICROBIOLOGY

MICR 50115

Beginning with a review of the basic science aspects of microbiology, the course then focuses upon oral infections and strategies for therapy. New developments and current approaches to preventing infectious diseases in patients and dental personnel are discussed.

PHARMACOLOGY

PHAR 50115 1.0 Credit Hours

A review of general principles of pharmacology and discussion of pharmacologic agents commonly used in dentistry are presented. Drugs prescribed for the dental patient's medical problems are considered in terms of clinical significance.

BIOCHEMISTRY

BIOC 50115

1.0 Credit Hours

This graduate course presents the biochemical aspects of human dental disease and biochemical approaches to preventive dentistry.

ORAL HISTOPATHOLOGY

PATH 5013C

1.0 Credit Hours

Microscopic examination of histopathologic specimens from all areas of surgical pathology encompassed by dental practices will be studied.

ORAL PATHOLOGY

PATH 50235

2.0 Credit Hours

Clinicopathologic correlations, differential diagnosis, and therapeutic rationale are emphasized. The integration of history, physical findings, and clinical laboratory data with pertinent radiographic findings, clinical presentations, and anatomic pathology will be emphasized.

NITROUS OXIDE/IV SEDATION

OSUR 50140

1.0 Credit Hours

An advanced education course in the management of pain, fear, and anxiety control consists of both didactic and clinical training. The didactic portion precedes the clinical portion and consists of lectures, seminars and laboratory activities. The student is expected to review and report on assigned literature. The clinical portion consists of supervised adminstering of intravenous conscious sedation in dental procedures.

BIOSTATISTICS

PATH 50121

1.0 Credit Hours

Students have the opportunity to learn to critically evaluate statistics used in dental research literature, how to use simple statistical tests, and how and when to seek the assistance of a statistician.

CLINICAL PATHOLOGIC CONFERENCE I

PATH 6<u>013</u>5

1.0 Credit Hours

Formal review of clinical, radiographic, and histopathologic presentations of various conditions affecting the head and neck area and the oral cavity in particular is presented. A variety of cases are presented for group discussion with a view toward obtaining a differential diagnosis.

CLINICAL PATHOLOGIC CONFERENCE II

PATH 60136

1.0 Credit Hours

A continuation of activities begun in Clinical Pathologic Conference 1.

PERIODONTIC-PROSTHODONTIC INTERRELATIONSHIPS

INTD 50555

0.5 Credit Hours

A seminar designed to instruct the student in those aspects of prosthodontic teaching necessary to the treatment of the periodontically involved dentition. Discussions of periodontal prostheses, sequence of therapy, and types of splinting with indications and contraindications are included.

INTERDISCIPLINARY SEMINAR

INTD 60190

1.0 Credit Hours

This seminar course is designed to relate the various dental specialty fields to each other in relation to patient care. Reinforcement of the basic sciences as they are clinically applied will be provided. Students will have an opportunity to extend their clinical knowledge beyond their own specialty areas of training and to become cognizant of current concepts and developments in other specialized fields.

ADVANCED DENTAL NUTRITION

COMD 50123

1.0 Credit Hours

Current concepts about nutrition as it relates to general health and oral health will be considered. The role of nutrition in the etiology of general and oral disease is emphasized.

PSYCHODYNAMICS

COMD 50150

1.0 Credit Hours

Topics in the field of human behavior which are of special interest to dental professionals will be presented. Group discussions will center on case materials, previous experiences, and future applications of concepts.

DENTAL PHOTOGRAPHY

DIAC 50581 0.5 Credit Hours

This course presents basic photographic terms, advice on equipment, discussions of lenses, film, lighting, and practice in techniques—including intraoral, extraoral photography; photographing small objects, making photographs of radiographs, and photographing the printed page.

ORAL PHYSICAL DIAGNOSIS

DIAG 50120

1.0 Credit Hours

The techniques and rationale for the physical examination of the head and neck regions, the integument, and the upper extremities are presented in this course. Topics to be covered also include principles of interviewing; history taking; methods of examination; recording vital signs; clinical laboratory aids to diagnosis; radiographic aids to diagnosis; and principles of biopsy.

FUNDAMENTALS OF DENTAL RADIOLOGY

DIAG 50150

1.0 Credit Hours

This lecture course reviews the basics of diagnostic radiography and introduces the latest techniques. Review includes sessions on exposure factors, projection techniques, film processing, radiation protection. The major extraoral technique stressed in the course is panoramic radiography, including normal anatomy, technique errors, and interpretation. Skull projections are reviewed and basic principles and indications of special techniques such as xeroradiography, CT nuclear medicine and others are presented as time allows.

ORAL MEDICINE

DIAG 50123

1.0 Credit Hours

Participants will have the opportunity to learn to diagnose common orally related primary and secondary conditions and to prescribe pharmacologic approaches for their treatment.

ADVANCED ORAL MEDICINE

DIAG 50223

2.0 Credit Hours

Correlation of findings leading to the diagnosis with current treatment modalities for specific disease entities will be the focus of this course. Problems such as xerostomia, facial pain, and allergies will be covered. Difficult diagnostic cases and management of the medically compromised patient will be discussed.

ADVANCED ORAL DIAGNOSIS

DIAG 50222

2.0 Credit Hours

A comprehensive review of the conditions which the dentist may be called upon to diagnose and treat as the result of the physical examination of the patient is the focus of this course. Topics include extraoral findings such as general appearance of the hands, eyes, ears, nose, and neck; intraoral findings

such as leisions as in lip swelling or palatal swelling; color changes, surface changes, and other problems such as pain, functional disorders, and conditions associated with oral sex.

CURRENT CUNCEPTS IN ENDODONTICS

ENDO 50160

1.0 Credit Hours

modern thoughts and concepts in endodontics will cover diagnosis, the dental pulp and peripex, pulpalgia, and referred pain; vital pulp therapy; treatment of the acute apical abcess, cellulites, restorative considerations for the endodontically treated tooth, endodontic surgery, and the cracked tooth. Other topics include avulsions, endodontic-periodontic interrelationships, current concepts in endodontics and an overview of endodontic research.

ADULT TOOTH MOVEMENT

ORTH 50565

0.5 Credit Hours

This course provides an introduction to planning and integrating limited orthodontic treatment into comprehensive specialty and interdisciplinary dental delivery systems. Preclinical laboratory exercises simulate orthodontic appliances which can be used to treat occlusal disharmonies in adults.

TOPICS IN CLINICAL GENETICS

PERI 50160/60160 1.0 Credit Hours

A seminar series that reviews the principles of genetics as they relate to developmental disorders and familial diseases likely to be encountered in the practice of dentistry.

ORAL IMMUNCLOGY

PERT 51542 1.5 Credit Hours

An introduction to the study of immune responses, this course is designed to provide a basis for understanding and interpreting the immunologic components of oral diseases. Emphasis is placed upon the rold of the immune response in the pathogenesis of periodontal disease.

INTRODUCTION TO ROSPITAL & OPERATING ROOM PRACTICES AND PROCEDURES

PRCS 50541 0.5 Credit Hours

A clinical course designed to extend existing knowledge of postdoctoral students. Theory and laboratory exercises focus on hospital routines and standards and practice in sterile techniques used in the O.R. Clinical observations give students an opportunity to compare ambulatory surgery routines in two institutions.

RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

OSUR 51594

1.5 Credit Hours

This course is an introduction to methods and techniques used in dental research. Topics will include basic assumptions and concepts of scientific research, selecting research topics, specifying objectives and hypotheses, literature reviews and experimental design.

RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

OSUR 50595 0.5 Credit Hours

This course is a continuation of OSUR 51594.

TMJ DISTURBANCES: DIAGNOSIS AND TREATMENT

OSUR 61586 1.5 Credit Hours

A comprehensive, multidisciplinary approach to the diagnosis and management of mandibular dysfunction patients is presented. Lectures are reinforced by clinical demonstrations of diagnostic and treatment procedures.

SUPERVISED TEACHING

DIAG, ENDO, PEDO, PERI, PROS 50267, 50270, 50271, 60269, 60270, 60271, 60272, 50171, 60171 1.0/2.0 Credit Hours

Graduate students are assigned to the various clinics, laboratories, and classes for the opportunity to acquire experience in teaching undergraduate students in a variety of situations. Supervision and evaluation of teaching performance is provided by the graduate faculty.

RESEARCH

DIAG, ENDO, PEDO, PERI, PROS 50097/60097

Variable Credit Hours

This course offers the student an opportunity to review the literature and to design and complete a laboratory or clinical research project under the direction of a faculty advisor. Research should result in a paper suitable for publication in a peer-related journal by certificate students. Students in the Master's programs will be expected to collect and analyze data for a thesis which must be defended as the culmination of research efforts.

THESIS

DIAG, PERI, PROS 60098 Variable Credit Hours

Prerequisite: Admission to Candidacy for the Master of Science Degree

Completion of an acceptable thesis is required for the Master of Science degree. Registration in this course for at least one semester is required of all degree candidates.

Course Descriptions

Courses peculiar to the program in Dental Diagnostic Science are listed below.

Offerings which are common to one or more programs are described under

Multidisciplinary Courses.

Introduction to Clinical Dental Diagnostic Science

DIAG 50511 0.5 Credit Hours

An opportunity for clinical application of fundamental principles of dental diagnostic science in the clinic is made available through this course. Students perform under the tutorship of faculty clinicians.

Advanced Radiological Techniques

DIAG 50151

Technical skills required for the clinical aspects of the radiography of the head and neck areas are presented. Designed to cover intraoral, panoramic, and extraoral techniques as well as linear tomography, the course is a combination lecture/laboratory which also encompasses darkroom technique and autoprocessing.

Diagnostic Science Seminar

DIAG 50591/50192/50193 60191/60192/60193/60194/60195 Variable Credit Hours

Presentations, reviews, and discussions of current cases from the Dental Diagnostic Science Clinic as well as cases of interest from the teaching file is the format for this course. Students will have the opportunity to present assigned literature review topics and to participate in the journal club.

Treatment Planning

DIAG 60110 1.0 Credit Hours

This lecture, seminar, and clinical format provides opportunity for diagnostic and treatment planning practice in the areas of prosthetics, periodontics, restorative dentistry, general practice, endodontics, community and preventive dentistry, and orthodontics.

Basic Radiation Biology

DIAG 50143 1.0 Credit Hours

An introductory course in the basic concepts of radiation biology, appropriate for dentists desiring an opportunity to gain additional knowledge of the biological effects of diagnostic and therapeutic levels of x-radiation.

Concepts of designing an office for optimum radiation protection are also presented.

Radiation Physics

DIAG 50245

2.0 Credit Hours

This course presents the fundamental principles of radiation physics as they apply to medical and dental diagnostic radiology. Topics include the nature and production of x-rays, interactions of x-rays with matter, the physics of films and intensifying screens, the nature of the radiographic image, fundamentals of radiation protection, principles of tomography, panoramic radiography, xeroradiography, and fluoroscopy.

Clinical Dental Diagnostic Science

DIAG 50212/50213/60112/ 60213/60214/60115 Variable Credit Hours

Practice in clinical skills required for diagnosis, management, and treatment of oral and perioral diseases, including such special procedures as sailography, cytological smearing, biopsy and culture taking is offered. Students have the opportunity to develop selective skills related to his/her field of interest: oral diagnosis, oral and maxillofacial radiology, oral medicine, or hospital dentistry.

Radiographic Interpretation

DIAG 50256 2.0 Credit Hours

This course is designed to cover aspects of oral and maxillofacial radiographic interpretation, including intraoral, skull, sinus, TMJ, panoramic and other views; coverage of sailography, nuclear scans, CAT scans, and arthograms. Interpretative materials will range from normal to pathologic changes in the jaws, skull, and maxillofacial complex.

Principles of Forensic Odontology

DIAG 50181

A didactic course covering such topics as forensic photography, forensic radiology, dental identification, mass disaster techniques, bite mark analysis, child abuse, and courtroom protocol. Students will be encouraged to investigate specific areas in more detail.

Hospital Rotations

DIAG 60146/60147 1.0 Credit Hours

Opportunities to study clinical skills in related medical fields as foundation for competent evaluation of patients and consultation with physicians—allowing for management of the oral aspect, when presented, in conjunction with medical treatment required for total care is offered by this course. Potential rotation areas are: Dermatology, Ear, Nose & Throat, Clinical Pathology, Anesthesiology, Radiology, Radiation Therapy, Nuclear Medicine, Medicine, Neurology, Forensic Pathology, Forensic Odontology, and Forensic Anthropology.

Teaching Skills for Dental Educators

DIAC 60372 3.0 Credit Hours

This course, designed to assist graduate students and faculty in acquiring teaching skills is composed of four modules, each covering a range of topics from lecture and clinical teaching to instructional development to assessing student achievement.

Electives

Advanced Forensic Anthropology Lab

0.5 Credit Hours

Practice in the application of laboratory skills in anthropology through the facilities of the Center for Archeological Research at The University of Texas at San Antonio, the US Army Central Identification Laboratory in Hawaii, the Oklahoma State Medical Examiner's Office, the Southwest Foundation for Biomedical Research and other locations. Students are expected to develop selective skills related to their area of interest within the field.

Advanced Forensic Odentology Lab

DIAG 60084 Variable Credit Hours

Advanced practice in the laboratory and field skills in forensic odontology in the areas of routine identifications, mass disaster preparedness and management, bit mark evidence and analysis, child abuse detection, and jurisprudence. Students are "on call" to do cases as needed and introduced to new and innovative teachings in the field. Students are allowed to develop selective skills related to their area of interest.

Advanced Forensic Science Lab

DIAG 60588 0.5 Credit Hours

practice in the laboratory and field skills of forensic odontology, forensic pathology, forensic anthropology, forensic toxicology, and jurisprudence are offered. The facilities of several institutions in and around San Antonio are utilized to apply the principles of forensic science to actual situations. Special arrangements can be made for study at other locations. Students are expected to develop selective skills related to their area of interest within the field.

Advanced Radiation Biology

DIAG 60143

An in-depth study of radiation biology, emphasizing such topics as radiation risk, dosimetry, theories of radiation damage, radiation hygiene and protection, and the effects of therapeutic levels of radiation on the oral tissues.

Clinical Genetics Rotation

PEDO 60162 1.0 Credit Hours

Twelve four-hour periods of a clinical rotation at the Santa Rosa Hospital Birth Defect Evaluation Center, with students having the opportunity to take an active part in the evaluation of birth defects. Practice in physical examination, genetic counseling, and management of patients with birth defects is provided.

Clinical Oral Diagnosis/Oral Medicine I & II

DIAG 60124/60125 1.0 Credit Hours

A clinical course for candidates interested in additional training in oral diagnosis and/or oral medicine. Opportunities for interaction with other medical and dental specialities are provided. Patients with a variety of problems will be examined and treated or referred and followed.

Clinical Radiology I & II

DIAG 60155/60156 1.0 Credit Hours

Opportunities for further clinical training in oral and maxillofacial radiology are offered. Patients are seen on a referral basis and, when specified, a standardized radiographic report is generated and presented to the referring party. Specialized equipment and technical assistance is provided in a separate clinic. Opportunities to perform and interpret studies requiring use of the Franklin Head Stand as well as panoramic radiographs, sailograms, and intraoral studies are provided.

Forensic Anthropology

DIAG 60586 0.5 Credit Hours

U.5 Credit Hours

A study of the application of basic anthropology to forensic situations is the focus of this course. Specific emphasis is placed on osteobiography, the scene investigation, determination of the time of death, basic anthropologic variables of identification, individualization, and cause and manner of death.

Forensic Dental Photography Lab

0.5 Credit Hours

A lecture and laboratory course designed to acquaint the student with dental photography in the morque setting, studio and darkroom procedures necessary for special photographic techniques, and the preparation of appropriate case exhibits for the courtroom.

Forensic Odontology Lab

DIAG 60083

Demonstration and application of information and principles presented in the introductory course in laboratories of the Health Science Center and the Bexar County Medical Examiner's office. Successful completion of Principles of Forensic Odontology and this course will fulfill requirements for membership in the American Academy of Forensic Sciences.

Forensic Pathology

DIAG 60585/60085 0.5 Credit Hours

A practical lecture and laboratory course concerned with the medicolegal investigation of injury and death. Special emphasis is placed on the medical examiner/coroner system, criteria for death, the medicolegal autopsy, forensic toxicology, and the medicolegal autopsy report.

Forensic Science Lab

DIAG 60587

0.5 Credit Hours

An opportunity to study the clinical and laboratory skills in related forensic fields as a foundation for competent evaluation of cases and consultations with other forensic specialists, this course looks at management of the odontological aspect when presented in conjunction with a total forensic evaluation.

Jurisprudence

DIAG 60565 0.5 Credit Hours

A lecture course which focuses upon applying the principles and practice of the various fields of dentistry to the elucidation of doubtful questions in a court of justice. Topics include negligence, malpractice, personal injury, peer review, dental fraud, and testimony.

Surgical Pathology I & II

PATH 60126/60127 1.0 Credit Hours

Exercises in preparing complete, written reports of cases from the oral pathology case record files are provided in this course. Students are assigned one case at each class session.

Neuroscience

INTD 50142 1.0 Credit Hours

Lectures and discussions designed to present the principles of neuroscience essential for problem-oriented evaluation of the dental patient are provided. Special emphasis is placed upon presenting the anatomy and physiology of pain, chemosensory functions, and the neuromuscular system. Residents discuss the pathophysiology of neuralgias, headaches, temporomandibular syndrome, neuropathies, chemosensory dysfunctions, and palsies and develop appropriate diagnostic and therapeutic strategies.

Courses peculiar to the program in Endodontics are listed below. Offerings which are common to more than one program are described under Multidisciplinary Courses.

Introduction to Advanced Endodontics

under simulated clinical conditions.

ENDO 52520 2.5 Credit Hours

This course is a laboratory and lecture review of endodontic concepts and techniques starting at the basic level and progressing to the advanced.

Students will have an opportunity to clean, shape, and obturate the root canal system using a variety of techniques and materials. Procedures are performed

Literature Review

ENDO 50173/50473/50474 60373/60473/60474 Variable Credit Hours

These courses are designed to familiarize the student with pertinent articles (classic, topical, and current) related to endodontics. The articles, selected from the dental, medical, and basic science literature, are assigned to the student to critically abstract and evaluate for research design, findings, and conclusions.

Clinical Endodontics

ENDO 52510/52511 60310/60311/60312 Variable Credit Hours

An extensive clinical experience in the broad spectrum of endodontic practice is offered on the graduate level. Each student has the opportunity to maintain a comprehensive endodontic practice under the supervision of the director of the postdoctoral program in Endodontics.

Clinical Seminar

ENDO 50017/50118 60517/60117/60118 Variable Credit Hours

Seminars offering discussions on the broad subject of clinical endodontics provide information necessary to become sophisticated diagnosticians and skillful clinicians. Case presentations by students and faculty and lectures by faculty as well as visits by consultants provide a comprehensive information exchange.

Anesthesia Rotation

ANES 60381 3.0 Credit Hours

The physiology and psychology of pain and its control along with pharmacology for pain control is the focus of this rotation. The techniques of general anesthesia, intravenous, and nitrous oxide sedation are presented in lectures, discussed in seminars, and demonstrated. Application of techniques is performed under supervision. Special attention is given to the management of emergencies and the apprehensive patient.

Mospital Endodontic Rotation

ENDO 60131/60132 1.0 Credit Hours

Credit

Conducted at the Audie L. Murphy Veterans Administration Hospital, this rotation consists of the diagnosis, treatment planning, and clinical treatment of endodontically-involved teeth and supporting structures. Approximately 40 percent of the patients treated are inpatients, and some 50 percent are medically compromised.

Course Descriptions

Courses peculiar to the program in Pediatric Dentistry are listed below.

Offerings which are common to one or more programs are described under Multidisciplinary Courses.

Orthodontic Diagnosis and Treatment Planning

PEDO 50155 1.0 Credit Hours

Students will be given the opportunity to create an orthodontically based problem list and sequential treatment plan and to practice developing the communication skills necessary to present and discuss this patient with colleagues and parents. Emphasis will be upon the development of skills necessary to interrelate normal occlusion, cephalometric anatomical landmarks, arch peripheral space analysis, basic facial analysis, panoramic radiographs, models, and visual assessment. Using findings, students will then be required to develop a diagnosis and treatment plan to relate information in three planes of space over time.

Biomechanics for Interceptive Orthodontics

 $\begin{array}{c} \underline{\text{PEDO}} \ 50121 \\ 1.0 \ \text{Credit Hours} \end{array}$

The goal of this course is to help students develop an understanding of and the skills to use various types of wires and prescription brackets which constitute orthodontic forces. The magnitude, direction, and duration of forces within biological principles will be studied. The physiological responses of hard and soft tissue with regard to prescription brackets will be discussed.

Orthodontic Clinic I

PEDO 50525 0.5 Credit Hours

Students will be assigned orthodontic patients for evaluation, diagnosis, and treatment planning. A database including health history, photographs, impressions, cephalometric films, panoramic films, and bite wings will be assembled. When necessary, students will be required to obtain periapical radiographs and to review physical development with the parents.

Treatment-planned patients will be assigned to each student in addition to patients whose treatment completion is reassigned from departing students.

Orthodontic Laboratory Procedures in Pediatric Dentistry

PEDO 50519

0.5 Credit Hours

This is a seminar and laboratory exercise course which discusses appliance use. Students will be required to construct minor orthodontic appliances for space maintenance, crossbite correction, and habit control.

Orthodontic Diagnosis in Pediatric Dentistry I & II

PEDO 50156/50157 1.0 Credit Hours

Students will be required to present completed diagnostic summaries and proposed treatment plans before peers and faculty from the Departments of Pediatric Dentistry and Orthodontics. Cases will be selected on the basis of interceptive orthodontic needs for patients of the dental age of 12 years or younger.

Development of the Dentition

PEDO 50235 2.0 Credit Hours

This course is designed to help students gain an understanding of the normal dentition in order to properly diagnose malocclusions. A review of occlusion, the dentition, dental arch formation, oral pharyngeal function airway, facial proportion, speech, and the muscles of mastication will be presented. Subjects will be related to the skeletal base which supports the musculature and dentition.

Biological Principles of Interceptive Orthodontics

PEDO 50224 2.0 Credit Hours

Dental archeircumference problems, a manifestation of tooth mass and bone mass relationship discrepancies, will be discussed. Problems and solutions with an historical perspective in serial extractions, bicuspid or molar extractions, and tooth guidance principles will be discussed. The course will relate the history, types and use of various headgears, and anterior-posterior mechanics.

Both the transverse and saggital type of fixed and removable appliances will be examined. Typodont appliances of orthodontic brackets with wire placement will be used to demonstrate tooth movement. The bracket prescriptions will be illustrated through a laboratory exercise in which a utility arch will be constructed.

Functional Appliances

PEDO 50534 0.5 Credit Hours

The homeostatic and physiologic response to functional appliances will be studied in detail with a review of the theory and the outcome of both short-term and long-term therapy. The combination of functional appliances with other full-banded modalities required for complete orthodontic care will be discussed. The goal of the course is to give students an opportunity to become competent in the administration of patient care with a range of functional appliances.

Orthodontic Clinic II & III

PEDO 50126/50127 1.0 Credit_Hours

A continuation of Orthodontic Clinic I, this clinic offers an opportunity for implementation of all techniques and guidelines presented in the orthodontic portion of the curriculum. Emphasis will be directed toward straight-wire techniques which combine edgewise, bioprogressive, and labio-lingual mechanics.

Orthodontic Diagnosis in Pediatric Dentistry III & IV

PEDO 60158/60159 1.0 Credit Hours

A continuation of formal presentations of orthodontic cases now in the final or completed state. The objective is to demonstrate the reasons for the success of technique or its failure and what modification should have occurred during the course of treatment. The didactic component consists of faculty discussions on case retention and dental changes secondary to orthodontic mechanics. The cephalometric overlay technique is used to demonstrate orthodontic changes related to mechanics used in the resident's cases.

Orthodontic Clinic IV & V

PEDO 60128/60129 1.0 Credit Hours

A continuation of Orthodontic Clinic III, this course includes study of straight-wire, edgewise, bioprogressive, labio-lingual, extraoral force, saggital-transverse, and functional appliances with clinical guidance provided by both the orthodontic and pediatric faculty. In this clinical course, students are required to demonstrate comprehension of the basic principles of serial extraction, eruption guidance procedures, autotransplant techniques and gingival grafts.

Orthodontic Clinic VI

PEDO 60130 1.0 Credit Hours

It is the goal of this clinic to provide students an opportunity to complete all interceptive orthodontic care of patients or to arrange for an orderly transfer of patients to the care of incoming students.

Craniofacial Anomalies

PEDO 60179 1.0 Credit Hours

Facial anomalies presented by syndromes representing various defects from mild to severe are discussed in seminar format. The need of orthodontic and routine restorative care in the primary, mixed, and permanent dentition with either removable or fixed expansion mechanics are presented. Problem areas and timing are studied as well as indications for referral to specialists. This course is designed to develop the participant's ability to conceptualize the problems faced in the treatment of craniofacial anomalies. Growth and development seminars are a prerequisite.

Current Clinical Practice in Pediatric Dentistry

PEDO 50537/52538/52539

62540

Variable Credit Hours

These are comprehensive didactic courses which cover current principles and techniques in pediatric dentistry. The many phases of pediatric dentistry are examined in individual seminars.

Clinical Pediatric Dentistry

PEDO 50145/53546/50347

60048

Variable Credit Hours

These courses offer an opportunity for clinical experience in all phases of pediatric dentistry. Topics include emphasis on restorative dentistry, behavior management—including sedation, treatment under general anesthesia, and treatment of the medically compromised patient. Clinical experience is available in a private children's hospital and an intercity clinic.

Growth & Development

PEDO 50131

1.0 Credit Hours

A presentation of the biology of the supporting tissues, theories of craniofacial growth, regional cross-sectioned and longitudinal study of craniofacial growth, this course also includes an overview of pre- and postnatal somatic growth and discussion of relevant hormones active in the circumpubertal growth spurt.

Pediatric Dentistry Case Conference

PEDO 50172/50173 60181/60182

Variable Credit Hours

One hour per week is devoted to one or two cases which present especially challenging problems of diagnosis and treatment. Cases are diagnosed and treatment options suggested by faculty and residents.

Pediatric Dentistry Grand Rounds

PEDO 50562/60561/60562 0.5 Credit Hours

Each resident is required to give one grand rounds presentation at some time during the two years of the program. The presentation is a detailed one-hour lecture illustrated with slides. The lecture covers a particular disease entity or treatment mode and is presented to faculty, residents, and private practitioners. A thorough review of the literature and extensive references must be part of the presentation.

Pediatric Physical Diagnosis

PEDO 50151 1.0 Credit Hours

The full spectrum of physical evaluation of a child's various systems in preparation for general anesthesia is presented in this didactic course taught by a pediatrician.

Oral Surgery Rotation

OSUR 52541 2.5 Credit Hours

This rotation provides students with opportunities for experience in performing minor hard and soft tissue surgery on healthy as well as medically-compromised patients.

Topics in Clinical Genetics

PERI 60160

1.0 Credit Hours

This is a seminar series that reviews the principles of genetics as they relate to development disorders and familial diseases likely to be encountered in the practice of dentistry.

Board Literature Review

PEDO 60177/60178 1.0 Credit Hours

Students review articles from the reading list of the American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry in preparation for the board's written examination.

Current Literature Seminar

PEDO 60173/60174 1.0 Credit Hours

Both faculty members and students review one or two articles from the current literature concerning a topic relevant to pediatric dentistry in each session.

General Anesthesia Rotation

ANES 60480

4.0 Credit Hours

A two-month rotation with the Department of Anesthesiology, this course gives the student an opportunity to learn hospital protocol and proficiency in the management of the child undergoing general anesthesia.

Investigative Project

PEDO 60183/60184 1.0 Credit Hours

Each student is required to participate in an investigative project that may be laboratory, clinical, or library based--depending upon the interests of the student. Projects must be submitted in the form of a manuscript of publishable quality (unless otherwise indicated) for Pediatric Dentistry.

Pediatric Dentistry Practicum .

PEDO 60075

Variable Credit Hours

This practicum in the last six weeks of the program provides additional time for students to perfect or complete the treatment of assigned patients.

Course Descriptions

Courses peculiar to the program in Periodontics are listed below. Offerings which are common to more than one program are described under Multidisciplinary Courses.

Basic Periodontics I

PERI 50231 2.0 Credit Hours

This is an introductory course consisting of departmental and clinical orientation as well as lectures on examination and diagnosis, instrument sharpening, photography, charting, initial therapy, introduction to research opportunities, case presentations and literature review format, epidemiology and disease progression, reevaluation and periodontal maintenance.

Basic Periodontics II

PERI 50232 2.0 Credit Hours

A review of topics in current textbooks supplemented by more recent articles in the literature are presented. Following a seminar format, the course requires students to read assigned materials and present synopses in class, with faculty acting as moderators.

Basic Periodontics III

PERI 50233 2.0 Credit Hours

A continuation of PERI 50232.

Clinical Periodontics

PERI 50110/50111/50112 61510/60211/60212/60313/60215 Variable Credit Hours

students have the opportunity to gain clinical experience as they treat patients in the postdoctoral clinic. Cases gradually increase in complexity and severity and include treatment of the medically compromised patient, implant cases, and interdisciplinary cases.

Literature Seminar

PERI 50373/50374 60373/60374/60175 Variable Credit Hours

This course is designed to familiarize the student with the historical and contemporary literature related to Periodontics. First year course is concerned mainly with basic science literature while second—and third—year courses concentrate on the clinical literature. Students have the opportunity to evaluate the data in the literature, critique experimental design, abstract articles, critically evaluate research findings, and learn to use library resources.

Case Presentation Seminar

PERI 50125/60225/60126 Variable Credit Hours

Following the format set by the American Board of Periodontology, the course consists of presentation of clinical cases. Students have the opportunity to prepare to defend their approaches to therapy and gain experience in oral presentation of cases.

Advanced Periodontics

PERI 60231/60232 2.0 Credit Hours

A series of slide presentations on current approaches to periodontal therapy and emerging areas of interest in periodontal research are designed to keep students up to date on advances in the specialty.

Mock Board Exams

PERI 60576 0.5 Credit Hours

This course is a simulation of the exams given by the American Board of Periodontology, with students presenting their cases orally with slides to faculty examiners and taking an oral examination.

The Master's Program

Course Descriptions

Courses peculiar to the program in Prosthodontics are listed below. Offerings which are common to one or more programs are described under Multidisciplinary Courses.

Clinical Prosthodontics

PROS 51527/50031/50328 60429/60332/60234 Variable Credit Hours

The objective of these courses is to provide extensive clinical experience in the broad spectrum of prosthodontics on a graduated basis. Each postdoctoral student will have the opportunity to maintain a comprehensive prosthodontic practice involving fixed, removable and maxillofacial treatment procedures.

<u>Literature Seminar</u>

PROS 50173/60172/60173 60174/60175/60176 1.0 Credit Hours

The broad field of prosthodontic literature is systematically reviewed with the objective of providing the postdoctoral student with a background of prosthodontic knowledge and history.

Advanced Prosthodontics

PROS 52520/60121/60122 Variable Credit Hours

These courses are designed to provide the postdoctoral student with the opportunity to gain the prerequisite background and clinical experience in prosthodontic procedures. Fixed, removable and overdenture concepts and treatment procedures will be emphasized.

Advanced Complete Dentures

PROS 61552 1.5 Credit Hours

A seminar and clinical course in which selected consultants discuss and demonstrate clinical and laboratory procedures indicated for complex treatment situations in the endentolous patient, this course is open to master's degree students only.

Dental Materials and Research

INTD 50210 2.0 Credit Hours

Students have an opportunity to become acquainted with sophisticated research equipment through hands-on exposures. Measurements of mechanical, physical, and chemical properties of commonly used dental materials give the student the opportunity to envision and formulate research projects in dental materials.

Hospital Procedures Rotation

OSUR 60140

1.0 Credit Hours

The objective of this course is to provide experience in the management and treatment of hospitalized patients.

Concepts of Occlusion

PROS 50115

1.0 Credit Hours

Various concepts of occlusion with special emphasis on the clinical application of gnathology is the focus of this course. The laboratory phase includes the development of a functional occlusion through the cusp-fosa additive wax method and an occlusal equilibration technique.

Maxillofacial Prosthodontics Rotation

PROS 60435

4.0 Credit Hours

This two-month rotation on the maxillofacial prosthodontics service provides the opportunity for students to gain experience, under the supervision of a prosthodontist, in treating patients with a variety of congenital and acquired oral and craniofacial anomalies.

Dental Practice Management

PROS_60588

0.5 Credit Hours

A series of seminars dealing with the business aspects of beginning and developing a specialty practice, this course includes consideration of locating, establishing, administering, and marketing a practice.

Teaching Skills for Dental Educators

PROS 61576

1.5 Credit Hours

Graduate students have an opportunity to acquire basic teaching skills, with special emphasis on lecturing, small group teaching, clinical teaching, and evaluation in this course. Seminars and microteaching sessions provide opportunities for students to practice teaching skills.

Special Patient Care Rotation Kerrville State Hospital PROS 60240 2.0 Credit Hours

This clinical rotation on the dental service at the Kerrville State Hospital provides the graduate student with additional in-patient clinical experience under the supervision of the attending staff.
