OVERVIEW

Overview

The Texas Internal Auditing Act passed by the Seventy-first Legislature requires in Section 6 (1) that the internal auditor report directly to the governing board with access to the Chancellor. The Attorney General's Opinion No. JM-1183 supports this portion of the Act. The State Auditor's Office subsequently issued an "Internal Audit Policy Statement" describing how they will assess compliance with provisions of the Act.

We are committed to comply with the Texas Internal Auditing Act and the State Auditor's interpretation in their "Internal Audit Policy Statement." By viewing the System as the entity, the System Director of Audits will be the internal auditor for the System and as such report to the Board of Regents' Personnel and Audit Committee. This will comply with the State Auditor's Office "Internal Audit Policy Statement." The System Director of Audits will continue to submit a monthly report of all audit activity to the Chancellor. The Directors of Internal Audit at each component institution will continue reporting to their respective President.

The FY 1990-91 audit plan was developed from a System-wide risk assessment and will be implemented by the System Audit Office and coordinated with the institutional internal auditors to insure coverage without duplication. Follow-up will be accomplished on all significant prior year findings.

The System-wide audit plan was designed based on a risk analysis which allocates available resources to auditing those areas which have the highest risk. Factors considered in designing the risk analysis were (1) materiality, (2) quality of internal controls, (3) asset liquidity, (4) management interest, (5) complexity of operations, (6) results and time since last audit, and (7) changes in system, processes, or procedures.

Standard 300 from the Professional Practice of Internal Auditing addresses scope of work as follows.

The scope of the internal audit should encompass the examination and evaluation of the adequacy and effectiveness of the organization's system of internal control and the quality of performance in carrying out assigned responsibilities.

Internal auditors should:

Review the reliability and integrity of financial and operating information and the means used to identify, measure, classify, and report such information.

Overview Audit Plan for FY 1990-91

Review the systems established to ensure compliance with those policies, plans procedures, laws, and regulations which could have a significant impact on operations and reports and determine whether the organization is in compliance.

Review the means of safeguarding assets and, as appropriate, verify the existence of such assets.

Appraise the economy and efficiency with which resources are employed.

Review operations or programs to ascertain whether results are consistent with established objectives and goals and whether the operations or programs are being carried out as planned.

The audit plan generally follows the lines of responsibilities of the Audit Manager positions created in the FY 1989-90 budget: System Administration, Academic Components and Health Components.

SYSTEM ADMINISTRATION

System Administration Audit Plan

The Audit Manager assigned to System Administration is primarily responsible for all functional areas within System Administration. The primary areas of responsibility include: Endowments and Trusts, Finance Office, Endowment Real Estate, Business Affairs, University Lands Accounting Office, West Texas Lands Offices, and Third Party Royalty audits.

In FY 1990-91 the budget for auditing System Administration is \$233,684, which includes the audit manager, 5 auditors and 1 Senior Secretary. The current staffing includes the audit manager and 5 auditors.

Endowments and Trusts

Follow-up on Cash Receipts Audit - Determine whether internal control weaknesses have been corrected.

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ACADEMIC AND HEALTH COMPONENT INSTITUTIONS

Academic and Health Component Institutions Audit Plan

The System Audit Office performs annual internal audits of all 14 component institutions, which are coordinated with the institutional internal auditors to accomplish the System-wide audit plan.

In FY 1990-91 the budget for auditing the component institutions is \$671,796, which includes the Director, 3 Audit Managers, 1 EDP Auditor, and 12 Staff Auditors. The current staffing includes the Director, 2 Audit Managers, 8 auditors and 1 EDP Auditor.

AUDIT PLAN FOR FY 1990-91

Cash - Timely reconciliation of state appropriations and demand and time deposits. Identify instances of lapsed state appropriations. Internal controls over institutional investing.

Capital Inventory - Museums, Art Collections and Rare Book Collections are adequately protected and accounted for in the financial statements. Removal of equipment from campus is approved and adequately documented. Sale of surplus equipment is adequately controlled. The removal of equipment from inventory as lost or stolen is appropriately investigated.

Consumable Inventory - Internal controls over the inventory of pharmaceutical drugs (including controlled substances and steroids) and microcomputer stores on campus.

Expenditures - Adequate supporting documentation and appropriateness of travel and entertainment.

Payroll - Payroll disbursements supported by the budget. Accurate and timely payroll tax withholdings and reports. Payroll deduction liability accounts are reconciled and deductions are remitted timely.

Academic and Health Component Institutions Audit Plan for FY 1990-91

Purchasing - Compliance with bid requirements for local funds. Annual institutional contracts are bid and used for purchases of items in the contracts. Consultant contracts comply with UT System policies.

Professional Fees - Accurate and timely recording and collection of the charges generated from services.

Sales and Service of Hospitals - Accurate and timely recording and collection of the charges generated from services.

Service Departments - Review fund balances for deficits or excess balances. Review whether charge schedules are based on the cost of service.

Auxiliary Enterprises - Review fund balances for deficits or excess balances. Review whether charge schedules are based on the cost of service. Review vending contracts for compliance with commission provisions.

Restricted Funds - Appropriately classified in correct fund group. Investment income is credited to correct account. Expenditures are in accordance with donor's wishes.

Hazardous Material - Determine if procedures exist to purchase, store, and dispose of hazardous material.

Follow-up - Follow-up on significant findings from the prior year.

Intercollegiate Athletics - Perform the NCAA required audits at Arlington, El Paso, Pan American, and San Antonio.

Peer Reviews - To comply with the Standards for the Professional Practice of Internal Auditing and the Texas Internal Auditing Act, we respond to requests for peer reviews of the internal audit functions at component institutions. Currently, we have requests for peer reviews from UT Dallas and UT Southwestern Medical Center.

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EDP AUDITOR

AUDIT PLAN FOR EDP AUDITOR

Although the EDP Auditor is budgeted under the component institution auditors, he will devote the majority of his time assisting the Audit Manager for System Administration reviewing automated system at System Administration.

The EDP Auditor will also review the General Controls of the Administrative Computing Systems of UT Pan American and perform a follow-up at UT Tyler.

The General Controls which will be reviewed are:

Physical Security - To determine if physical security controls are in place to reasonably guard against accidental or malicious destruction or unauthorized use of data and equipment.

Access Controls - To identify controls that are in place to prevent unauthorized use, damage, loss or modification of data files.

Backup and Recovery - To identify procedures used for the backup of critical data on a routine basis and the plan to recover data and programs if operations should be unexpectedly interrupted.

CONTINUING PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION

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Continuing Professional Education

Our goal is to meet the requirements of Standard 270 from the Professional Practice of Internal Auditing:

"Internal auditors are responsible for continuing their education in order to maintain their proficiency. They should keep informed about improvements and current developments in internal auditing standards, procedures, and techniques. Continuing education may be obtained through membership and participation in professional societies; attendance at conferences, seminars, college courses, and in-house training programs; and participation in research projects."

The Texas State Board of Public Accountancy and the Institute of Internal Auditors, Inc. (IIA) require forty hours of continuing professional education annually to maintain certification. The American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA) requires forty hours of CPE for continued membership. Generally Accepted Governmental Auditing Standards require all auditors performing governmental audits to obtain forty hours of CPE annually.

The training needs of each auditor are assessed annually and training objectives are established relevant to their assigned duties. Auditors will be provided the opportunity to attend training courses related to assessed needs within the constraints of the departmental budget.

The System Audit Office will attempt to provide the recommended training for auditors through in-house training or training through the following sources:

• Government

State Auditor's Office training seminars Interagency Auditor Training Program (Graduate School, USDA)

• Industry

Association of College and University Auditors Texas Association of College and University Auditors Institute of Internal Auditors National Association of College and University Business Officers

• Other Sources

Specialized training in fields such as Oil and Gas, Investments, Fraud, etc. from private groups such as Professional Development Institute.

Proposed Allocation from PUF Bond Proceeds for Library Special Collection

Based upon a request dated October 29, 1990, from President Nedderman, The University of Texas at Arlington, an allocation of \$216,639 from the PUF library special collection reserve is recommended to purchase a package of six historically significant collections. The materials have an appraised value of \$433,278, one-half of which will be covered by gifts-in-kind (\$186,559) and cash raised by U. T. Arlington from other sources (\$30.080).

The package of six collections is comprised of three 19th century Mexican manuscript collections (Peon Family Papers, Manuel Gonzalez Papers, and Jose Salazar Ilarregi Papers) and three collections of atlases and geographies (Murray Hudson School Atlas and Geography Collection, Murray Hudson Commercial Atlases, and Virginia Garrett Atlas and Geography Collection). The three collections of atlases and geographies would complement the nationally known holdings of the University's Cartographic History Library, one of the strongest collections in the nation on Texas and the Greater Southwest. The acquisition of the Hudson and Garrett atlas collections would give the division perhaps the most comprehensive American geography and atlas collection in existence. All six collections would further strengthen resources available to students and scholars as U. T. Arlington continues its efforts to build a first-rate research collection focusing on Texas, Mexico, and cartographic history.

Mrs. Garrett is donating her collection, valued at \$90,000, with the stipulation that the donation be used as part of the matching requirements for this proposal. If Mrs. Garrett's offer is accepted, this transaction may lead to future donations from her extensive collection. Maritza Arrigunaga, a U. T. Arlington library staff member will donate her half interest in the Peon Family Papers which have a total appraised value of \$125,638.

In June 1986, \$1 million was appropriated by the U. T. System Board of Regents for special collections. This amount was placed in reserve for institutional requests when unusual acquisition opportunities exist. The reserve now stands at \$491,635 and will stand at \$274,996 upon approval of this allocation.
