Titles for the degree of "Master of Business Administration in Business" is changed to simply "Master of Business Administration."

In the common body of knowledge required of all MBA majors, one Accounting course is replaced by an Information Systems course and one Management course is replaced by another.

Additionally, the total number of hours for MBA is reduced from thirty-six to thirty-three with the deletion of one Management course from the core requirements. Also, in these requirements, one Accounting course is replaced by another.

Requirements for new concentrations in Business Economics, Finance, Information Systems, Management of Technology, and Management Science are listed, PENDING APPROVAL FROM THE COORDINATING BOARD. All these concentrations require the fulfillment of a twenty-one-hour core, plus twelve hours of electives in the area of concentration. Among the electives, all concentrations, except Management Science, specify one to three particular courses that must be selected. Information Systems, Management of Technology, and Management Science list specific courses from which the electives may be chosen.

In the Master of Business Administration in International Business, the total number of hours is reduced from thirty-six to thirty-three with the deletion of a Management course from the core. In the list of electives, an Economics course is replace with one in Finance, and one Management course replaces another.

In the Master of Professional Accounting degree, the requirements for students with admission deficiencies now include additional courses in Information Systems and Accounting. Also, in this category, one Management course replaces another.

The total number of hours for the MPA is reduced from thirty-six to thirty. Within the concentrations, the options are eliminated, certain Accounting courses are specified, and it is stipulated that nine hours of electives must be taken outside of the taxation and accounting fields.

In the COLLEGE OF FINE ARTS AND HUMANITIES, all students seeking a Master of Fine Arts Degree must pass a first semester review of their progress before being allowed to continue in the program.
