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## 1990-91 TRAFFIC AND PARKING RULES AND REGULATIONS

The following are the proposed changes to the Traffic and Parking Rules and Regulations of The University of Texas at Arlington. They have been approved by the appropriate Executive Vice Chancellor and are incorporated in model regulations approved by the U. T. Board of Regents. These regulations supersede all prior parking and traffic regulations.

## QUICK REFERENCE TO PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

- Display of Decals: Parking decals must be properly affixed to the vehicles as described in Section VI. Decals which are taped or affixed by unauthorized materials or displayed on a vehicle other than the vehicle owned or operated by the decal holder {to which issued} will subject holder to a citation. Additionally, the decals will be revoked, and the holder may lose all parking privileges (Section VIII).
- 4. Specific Classes of Vehicles: Decals issued are for four-wheeled vehicles (faculty/staff or student), motorcycles and bicycles. No vehicle larger than 3/4-ton may be parked [registered to park] on The University of Texas at Arlington campus without permission from the Chief of Police or designated representative.
- 16. VISITOR PARKING: A visitor is defined as a person who is neither a student, an employee of the University, nor is he or she a person who uses campus parking facilities for the benefit of a student or employee. The vehicles of immediate family members are not visitor's vehicles and are required to have a decal unless the student or employee obtains a temporary hang-tag [visitor pass] prior to the vehicle being parked on campus in accordance with the following guidelines:
  - A. The immediate family of the student or employee must live outside a 50 mile radius of The University of Texas at Arlington campus, or
  - B. Be coming to campus for a special event or activity.

The student or the employee is responsible and will be held accountable for parking citation(s) issued to vehicles being operated by (registered to) their immediate family. Visitor Parking areas are located throughout the campus and include the Parking Garage. These areas are designated on the parking map and by posted signs. Visitors may, prior to parking on campus, call the Parking Office at 273-3907 to receive information on obtaining temporary Hang-Tags, which will enable them to park as visitors in areas other than the designated visitor parking areas. These Hang Tags must be properly displayed on the rear view mirror of the visitor's vehicle.

- 21. REMOTE REDUCED-RATE PARKING: Persons desiring to park at Maverick Stadium (Lot 86) or the Athletic Complex (Lot 87) and ride the shuttle bus system between 7:30 a.m. and 5:30 p.m. weekdays, may pay the same rate as for night parking. The night rate is shown in Part VI, Parking Decals, Table 1. The shuttle bus will run from 7:30 a.m. through 5:30 p.m. at fifteen [five] minute intervals.
- PRE-REGISTRATION AND REGISTRATION PARKING: [The east portion of] Faculty #11 (Davis Hall) parking will be reserved for students the week of fall and spring [two weeks preceding] registration preceding the start of classes. During this period, faculty/staff will be permitted to park in Trinity Dorm parking subject to availability as determined by the Chief of Police. Should Trinity Dorm parking be unavailable, the overflow will go to Faculty 10 east of Cooper Street and south of University Hall.

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1990-91 Traffic and Parking Rules and Regulations

#### II. GENERAL PROVISIONS

The operation of a motor vehicle or bicycle on The University of Texas at Arlington campus is a PRIVILEGE granted by the University and is not an inherent right of any faculty/staff member or student. All faculty, staff, and students who have motor vehicles in their possession or control for use, operation or parking on the University campus must register said vehicle with The University of Texas at Arlington Police Department Parking Office.

Purchasing and receiving a parking decal [Registration of a motor vehicle] does not guarantee a parking space on campus.

The Parking and Traffic Appeals Panel consists of Faculty, Staff, Student members appointed by the President of the University. Persons wishing to appeal a university citation should complete the "Traffic and Parking Appeal Form" located at the U.T.A. Police Department Parking Office.

The Parking and Traffic Administration Office is located at 700 S. Davis Street in the University Police Building under the administration of the Police Chief or designated representative [Assistant Chief of Police].

University Police: The University Police have the responsibility and the legal authority for the enforcement of the Parking and Traffic Regulations listed in this booklet. University police officers may issue university citations or municipal court appearance citations enforceable in municipal court (See Section VIII). On special occasions and emergencies, such parking limitations may be imposed by the Chief of University Police as required by the conditions which prevail. When conditions warrant such action, the Chief may waive parking limitations.

The University Police reserve the right to enforce parking and traffic regulations:

4. by requiring either the vehicle owner or the person who has registered the vehicle, with The University Parking Office, or the person who was issued the parking decal displayed on the vehicle to appear in municipal court or at a university hearing for non-payment of outstanding charges.

#### IV. GENERAL TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

B. The provisions of these regulations must be complied with on all parts of the campus throughout all hours of the day and night with the following exceptions: Any vehicle with a current university decal may park in any Student Area A parking or Faculty-Staff parking during the following periods: 5:00 p.m. through 7:00 a.m. on weekdays and all day and night Saturday and Sunday. Open parking is defined as the parking of any vehicle with a current university faculty, staff, or student decal parked in any university parking lot between 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. on weekdays and all weekend up to 7:00 a.m. Monday, except parking in those areas listed in Section IV C.

Students will be permitted to park in [the east portion of] Faculty #11 (Davis Hall) parking the week [of New Student Registration] preceding the start of classes for the Fall and Spring.

F. The University Police have authority to direct and control the flow of traffic within the jurisdictional boundaries of [upon] the campus at all times in accordance with existing conditions.

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## 1990-91 Traffic and Parking Rules and Regulations

- G. The University of Texas at Arlington reserves the right to remove and impound all vehicles parked so as to obstruct ingress or egress to buildings or to obstruct vehicular or pedestrian traffic and to impound vehicles <u>displaying decals</u> registered to individuals with unpaid traffic fees after proper notice. The owner of such vehicles shall be responsible for payments of all costs incurred in the removal and storage of such vehicles and neither the University nor its authorized personnel shall be liable for any loss or damage resulting from such removal and storage of the vehicle in question. When an impounding vehicle violation occurs and the owner or driver appears on the scene before the removal by wrecker, and the wrecker driver has either made a hookup, or has signed the police report for custody of the vehicle, the following will apply:
  - the vehicle will not be impounded:
  - and the owner or driver will be expected to pay the wrecker driver a fee in lieu of towing.
- H. No vehicle may be operated or parked upon the campus unless it bears a properly displayed current <u>parking</u> [<u>registration</u>] decal.
- J. No vehicle shall be parked in any areas on the campus except those in which the parking [registration] decal authorizes such vehicle to be parked.

#### V. PARKING REGULATIONS

The various classes of parking decals and their eligibility requirements, privileges and limitations are described in detail in Section VI.

On University holidays, only those parking restrictions which regulate parking at all times shall remain in effect.

#### B. PARKING AREA:

1. Controlled parking areas include all parking lots [on the campus] and all streets within the jurisdictional boundaries of the campus and all streets abutting the campus. Signs and markings have been placed to designate controlled parking areas.

#### C. PARKING TECHNIQUES:

- 4. The following parking is not permitted:
  - a. In a backed-in position where diagonal parking is permitted.
  - b. For periods longer than those specifically designated.
  - c. With double or other forms of multiple parking.

#### VI. PARKING DECALS

A. All students, staff, faculty members and rent property tenants of The University of Texas at Arlington who park motor vehicles within the <u>jurisdictional boundaries</u> [controlled areas] must

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receive a parking decal and have the decal properly affixed to the vehicle [register their vehicles with the Parking Office, in the University Police Building at 700 S. Davis Street], on or before the date that the vehicle is to be operated or parked on the campus. Controlled areas are all areas within the Legislative defined boundaries of The University of Texas at Arlington.

- All disabled veterans whose vehicles display the specially designed license plates issued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the words "Disabled Veteran" printed thereon in accordance with the provisions of V.C.S. 6675a-5e and all permanently disabled persons whose vehicles display the specially designed symbols, tabs or other devices issued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the word "Disabled" printed thereon in accordance with the provisions of V.C.S. 6675a-5e.1 are exempt from parking decal fees and time limits. These exemptions do not permit parking a vehicle at a place or time that parking is prohibited. Proof of disability must be shown at the Parking Office in order to receive the proper decal [at time of registration of any vehicle].
- E. Students, faculty or staff who pay the required fee for one vehicle may obtain multiple <u>parking</u> [registration] decals for other vehicles which they may own, provided no more than four vehicles are registered and proof of ownership is shown for each vehicle at the time of registration.
- F. Temporary parking HANG-TAGS, good for a period of ten consecutive school days, may be obtained for a fee of \$1.00 [\$5.00]. The HANG-TAG will allow students, faculty, and staff members who have not previously received a decal for [registered] their vehicles to bring that vehicle on campus for short periods of time.
- G. Examples:
  - 1. If you originally <u>drove</u> [registered] one automobile and it becomes necessary to <u>drive</u> [register] an additional automobile, you may do so by turning in the remnants of your decal, pay the additional fee of \$1.00, and provide proof of ownership of both automobiles. If the original decal cannot be returned, an additional fee of \$5.00 will be charged. You will be issued (2) decals with the same number. However, only one such vehicle may be parked on campus at one time.
  - 2. If you originally <u>drove</u> [register] one automobile and it becomes necessary to <u>drive</u> [register] a motorcycle also, you may do so by paying the additional fee of \$1.00 and providing proof of ownership of both your automobile and your motorcycle. You will then be issued a motorcycle decal. The decal for your car will remain the same. When registering an automobile and motorcycle, regardless of which is registered first, the full rate is charged for the automobile and the motorcycle is always the secondary vehicle.
  - 3. If you originally <u>drove</u> [register] a motorcycle and it becomes necessary to <u>drive</u> [register] an automobile you may do so by paying \$1.00 plus the difference between the fee for registering an automobile and motorcycle for the semester in which you are registering in accordance with the fee schedule in Table II, and showing proof of ownership of both your motorcycle and automobile. You will be issued an

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automobile decal, the decal for your motorcycle will remain the same. Multiple decals entitles the holder to park only one vehicle on campus at any given time.

- 6. The fees for decals to allow the [registering and] parking of motor vehicles on the campus of The University of Texas at Arlington are shown in Table I. All parking fees are payable at the Parking Office, 700 S. Davis Street, or Bursars Office, first floor, E. E. Davis Hall. [at the time of registering the motor vehicle with the Parking Office]
- 7. Students, faculty or staff members who terminate their enrollment or their employment, prior to spring registration and who have paid a vehicle <u>decal</u> [registration] fee for both fall and spring semesters, may receive a partial refund of the fee in accordance with Table II, provided they turn in the remnants of their decal on or before the census date of the spring semester. No refunds on parking decals will be given after January 31 [30].
- 8. Any change affecting the [registration of] ownership of a vehicle, on [for which] which a decal has been displayed [issued], must be reported promptly to the Parking Office. Failure to report such a change will result in cancellation of parking privileges.
- 9. Due to the reserve nature of parking, Dormitory students will receive {be allowed to register} only one (1) decal {vehicle}. Should the need arise to bring an undecaled {unregistered} vehicle on campus, a temporary Hang-Tag may be obtained as outlined in Section VI, Parking Decals, F.
- 11. REMOTE REDUCED-RATE PARKING: A reduced rate equal to the night rate for each classification of decal will be provided for those faculty, staff or students choosing to park at Maverick Stadium (Lot 86) or the Athletic complex (Lot 87) and ride the shuttle bus to the main campus. This reduced-rate decal will be valid only in remote parking (lot 86 and 87). The Shuttle Bus will begin each school morning at 7:30 a.m., operate until 5:30 p.m., and will run at fifteen [five (5)] minute intervals.

#### H. DISPLAY OF DECALS

- Decals are not transferrable and must be affixed to the vehicle owned/operated by the person issued the decal [for which they are issued].
- 7. If after having purchased a parking decal, it becomes necessary to use a non-decaled [registered] vehicle for emergency or other reasons, a special parking HANG-TAG must be obtained from the Parking Office, and affixed to the vehicle in the proper manner. A special temporary HANG-TAG will be given for periods not to exceed ten (10) consecutive school days, and no more than two (2) HANG-TAGS in succession for fall, spring, or first and second semester. After two (2) HANG-TAGS have been issued during any one session, a fee of \$1.00 [\$5.00] is charged for each additional HANG-TAG.
- 8. A resident of University dorms may <u>park</u> [<u>register</u>] only one vehicle [<u>to park</u>] at their dorm. When the need exists to park a second vehicle, a temporary HANG-TAG must be obtained prior to parking that will be valid for ten (10) consecutive school days. The fee for Dormitory Parking is \$36.00. Dorm decals

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are valid only in the designated dorm parking except during periods of open parking (refer to Part IV GENERAL TRAFFIC REGULATIONS, Section B).

- 9. A resident of a University apartment may receive [register] no more than two (2) decals [vehicles] to park vehicles at the apartment complex. The fee will be \$36.00 for the first decal [vehicle registered] and \$1.00 for the second decal [vehicle] for students. Proof of ownership must be shown for both vehicles to receive two decals [register two vehicles]. Student Rental Property Decals are valid only in Rent Property Parking Lots, except during periods of open parking (refer to Part IV. GENERAL TRAFFIC REGULATIONS, SECTION B).
- K. PAYMENT OF FEES: When an application is made for a parking decal, the fee charged will be for a complete year or for the entire unexpired portion of the University's decal year. Payment of the fee must be made before the decal will be issued.
- A request for refund will not be honored unless it is М. REFUNDS: filed with the Parking Office during the University's fiscal year in which payment for the decal was made. A request for refund must be accompanied by the remnants of the appropriate decal. Refunds will be made to members of the faculty and staff upon request and only in the event service is terminated by a resignation or a leave of absence without pay. The refund will be based on the number of full months remaining in the University's decal year. No refunds will be made after January 31 [30] of the spring semester. Refunds will be made, upon request, to students who withdraw from the University at the end of the fall semester, but refunds will not be made to students who withdraw from the University after January 31 [30]. A request for a refund will not be honored when a person's privilege to park and drive on campus has been suspended or if outstanding charges or other debts remain unpaid.

#### VIII. ENFORCEMENT

- A. Police officers of The University of Texas at Arlington are authorized to issue University citations or the City of Arlington citations for violations of these parking regulations.
  - 4. An enforcement and administration fee of \$15.00 will be assessed for each University citation for violators improperly displaying the parking decal as outlined in VI. PARKING DECALS or for displaying a forged or altered decal. The student, staff or faculty member who receives citation may within ten (10) consecutive school days from the date of the citation, have the \$15.00 enforcement fee waived if the problem with the decal is corrected and approved by the Parking Office. [This ten (10) day grace period will not apply when a decal is displayed on a vehicle that is not registered to park on The University of Texas at Arlington campus.]
  - 5. An enforcement and administration fee of \$24.00 will be assessed for each University citation issued to any vehicle not displaying a current University parking decal. The student, faculty or staff member will be given the opportunity to purchase [register] their decal [vehicle]

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in lieu of the first no decal citation enforcement fee if the citation is brought to the University Parking Office within ten (10) consecutive school days from the date of the citation. All remaining citations will be paid at the full assessment fee.

- 7. If a student or faculty/staff member receives a citation for not displaying a current University parking decal on a second car that is family-owned, when he had previously received [registered] a decal [first vehicle], the enforcement fee of \$24.00 will be reduced to \$10.00 upon the showing of proof that the second vehicle was a family-owned vehicle. In addition to paying the \$10.00 enforcement fee, it will be permissible to register the first and second vehicles with the decal displaying the same decal number. A reduction in the enforcement fee will only affect the first citation received for this violation.
- Parking offenses are recorded either in the name of the person F. in whose name the vehicle is registered with some official state motor vehicle registration department or agency, or in the name of the person who has signed the financial responsibility agreement for parking violation which is on file with the Parking Office. Other offenses are recorded in the name of the person driving said vehicle and in the name of the person who was issued the decal [has registered it with the Parking Office] or maintains the vehicle. Non-payment of enforcement fees may result in the removal and impoundment of the vehicle. Prior to the vehicle being placed upon the impoundment list for failure to pay past due enforcement fees, the person involved will be properly notified [by letter of action] as to what action be taken if all past due enforcement fees have not been paid within ten (10) consecutive school days after the date of the notification, and the procedure for appeal. If the records indicate the vehicle has not been registered with the Parking Office, the notification of unpaid enforcement fees will be sent to the address of such person as shown in the records of the Parking Office.
- J. Persons with unpaid charges recorded in their names shall be ineligible to receive parking decals while such charges remain unpaid. To obtain a decal, a person shall either pay the charge or request a University hearing with the [Assistant] Chief of Police or designated representative.
- K. IMPOUNDMENT OF VEHICLES, BARRING OF READMISSION AND WITHHOLDING OF GRADE REPORTS, DIPLOMAS, OFFICIAL TRANSCRIPTS AND REFUNDS;

When unpaid charges are recorded, the Parking Office shall cause a proper notification to be affixed to said vehicle [send return receipt letter to the last known address of the person in whose name the charges are recorded].

- 1. Such notice [letter] shall state that unless
  - (a) payment of all accumulated charges is made within ten (10) consecutive school days after the date of such <u>notice</u> [<del>letter</del>] or
  - (b) a written request is made within ten (10) consecutive school days to appear before a University hearing committee concerning impoundment of the vehicle in case of faculty, staff, student or visitor, or for barring of readmission and/or withholding of grade reports, diplomas, official transcripts and refunds in the case of students as authorized in the Regent's Rules and

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Regulations, Part One, Chapter VI, Section 9 and state law, the appropriate enforcement action, will take place without further notice.

- 4. If timely payment is not received and either the registered owner or the person who was <u>issued the University parking decal [has registered the vehicle with the University]</u> has failed to appear at the requested University impoundment hearing or has appeared and has failed to meet his or her burden of proof, the vehicle will be impounded pending payment of all outstanding charges, including towing and storage charges, without further notice.
- L. SUSPENSION OF PRIVILEGE TO DRIVE AND PARK ON CAMPUS: The loss of the privilege of driving and parking a motor vehicle on campus shall commence ten days after the (Parking and Traffic) Office mails a letter to the person, at the address of such person as shown in the records of that office, stating that such person's privilege of driving and parking a motor vehicle on campus has been suspended. Such letter shall state the term of the suspension and will give notification of possible impoundment for parking offenses committed during the period of suspension and shall state the reason for such suspension.

#### 1. Any person who

- (e) parks or drives a vehicle to which there has been affixed a decal which the registered owner, or regular driver, did not purchase, shall lose the privilege of driving or parking on the University campus for six (6) months. While a person's privilege of driving or parking a vehicle on campus is suspended, it is unlawful
  - (1) for that person to drive or park any motor vehicle on the campus and
  - (2) for any person to drive or park a vehicle displaying a decal {registered} in the name of such person on campus.

#### IX. APPEALS

The Appeals Board is not a part of the University Police Department but information is included as a courtesy to inform all faculty, staff and students of the right to appeal and the procedure for appealing a University citation.

- A person receiving a University citation who believes they have ample justification or mitigating circumstances leading to their receiving a citation should first request an interview with the [Assistant] Chief of Police or designated representative. The purpose for the interview is to review th citation for technical errors which may alleviate the person from any further inconvenience. If after having the interview, the person has failed to receive satisfaction, the person then files for an appeal.
- B. A person receiving a University citation may appeal the citation to the Parking and Traffic Appeals Committee within ten (10) consecutive school days from the date of receiving the citation by filing a Parking and Traffic Appeal Form which is available at the Parking Office, 700 S. Davis Street, or the Bursar's Office, First Floor, E.E. Davis Hall. The reason should be

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given, either to dispute whether the violation occurred at all, or to claim that the action was justified by circumstances. When the hearing is scheduled, the person appealing will be notified of the time and place so that he or she may attend and will be allowed up to five minutes for a personal presentation. If the person appealing is not present, the appeal will be decided on the basis of the written reasons on the Parking and Traffic Appeal Form. Appeals should not be made for the purpose of changing the rules, which are not made by the Appeals Committee, but by the University Parking Committee. The appealing party will be notified, in writing, of the decision.

#### X. SHUTTLE BUSES

A Shuttle Bus System operates on a circular route throughout the campus Monday through Friday, 7:30 a.m. - 5:30 p.m. on school days. Persons who use the shuttle bus may park at either Maverick Stadium (Lot 86), Lot 83 or the Arlington Athletic Complex (Lot 87) pickup sites if the vehicles bears any properly displayed current UTA decal. (Reduced rates available, refer to Part VI, Section G-11. Special routes are run between the Maverick Stadium and Davis Hall, and Lot 83 and the Library referred to as the Express Bus. Routes and hours of operation are altered to meet the University community needs. Consult the UTA Shuttle Bus brochures for route updates.

#### XI. MAVERICK PARKING GARAGE

The Maverick Parking Garage will be available on a first-come, first-served basis to anyone willing to pay the fee for parking in accordance with the following rates when the lot is not reserved for specific functions.

One hour or less\$2.00	[ <del>\$1_00</del> ]
Each additional hour(up to four hours) \$1.00	•
Up to maximum for all day\$5.00	[ <del>\$4.00</del> ]

Semester passes will be available at the rate of \$200.00 [\$185.00] for day students plus a \$10.00 refundable deposit for the access card, and \$60.00 [\$49.00] for night students plus a \$10.00 refundable deposit for the access card. Individuals purchasing semester passes will be provided a Hang-Tag Decal allowing them to park in Area A Student Parking for students and Faculty/Staff Parking for faculty/staff at times the garage may be filled due to reservations for special functions. THE HANG-TAGS MUST BE DISPLAYED FROM THE REAR-VIEW MIRROR ANY TIME THE VEHICLE IS PARKED OUTSIDE THE GARAGE, even in Time Limit and Customer Parking areas. Parking Garage rates are established by Ridgemont Co., owner/lessor, and are subject to change at their discretion.

Maverick Parking Garage will be utilized to provide reserved parking for specific functions when approval is obtained in advance of the function. The reservation fees are  $\frac{\$5.00}{\$4.00}$  per day per space required up to a maximum of 160 spaces in the Garage.

#### PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

The following changes to the Parking and Traffic Regulations as set forth below in <u>congressional style</u> are recommended for approval by the U. T. Board of Regents. They have been approved by the Executive Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs and the Office of General Counsel and are based on model regulations approved by that office. These regulations supersede all prior Parking & Traffic Regulations.

#### SECTION I QUICK REFERENCE TO PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

- 1. PERMITS REQUIRED FOR ACCESS & PARKING: Only vehicles conspicuously displaying proper University permits (as specified in Section VI, infra) may enter or park on the main campus Monday through Friday from 7:30 a. m. to 4:00 p.m. Purchase of a permit does not guarantee a parking place on campus. (Section II, infra)
- 2. DISPLAY OF PERMITS: Parking permits must be properly affixed to or displayed on the vehicles (s) as described in Section VI (infra).
- 5. HANGING PERMITS: Class A, C, D, and G applicants will be issued one hanging or transferable parking permit. The applicant may transfer this hanging permit to any vehicle he/she wishes; however, the applicant will be responsible for parking violations by any vehicle bearing their permit. (Section VI, infra)
- 4. REMOVAL OF PERMITS: Permits shall be removed from a vehicle (s) when there is a change of vehicle ownership; when association with The University is terminated; when a replacement permit (decal) has been issued to take the place of a previously issued permit (decal); or upon expiration or revocation. (Section VI, infra)
- 5. OWNERSHIP OF PERMIT: Ownership of the parking permit remains with The University. Individuals may not transfer ownership of the parking permit. Purchase of a parking permit signifies that an individual has been granted the privilege of parking a motor vehicle on University property. (Section VI, infra)
- 6. CLASS "A" PERMITS: Holders of Class "A" permits shall park only in Class "A" parking areas (except car pool areas), Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Holders may park in other parking areas at other times except when restricted or prohibited by posted signs or markings. Additionally, vehicles bearing a current "A" permit may park in any Class "C" parking area (except car pool spaces) after 2:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. (Section VI, infra).

Revisions to the Parking and Traffic Regulations (cont'd):

Note: Certain spaces have been reserved after these hours for vehicles bearing a current Class "A" permit. These spaces are located as follows (each area is specifically posted as to times/days, etc.):

- a. Lot 14 All spaces except for those designated as "F-14 permits at all times".
- b. Lot 15 All spaces in that part of the lot north of the Experimental Science Building (unless otherwise posted).
- c. Lot 16 Certain marked spaces located in the lot west of W. R. Woolrich Laboratories.
- 7. CLASS "C" PERMITS: Holders of Class "C" parking permits shall park only in Class "C" parking areas, except car pool spaces, Monday through Friday from 7:50 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Holders may park in other parking areas at other times except when restricted or prohibited by posted signs or markings. (Section VI, infra).
- 8. CLASS "D" FERMITS: Holders of Class "D" permits shall park only in Class "D" spaces Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Holders may park in other parking areas at other times except when restricted or prohibited by posted signs or markings. When no spaces are available a temporary permit may be issued by traffic control station personnel which will authorize parking in other designated areas for limited periods of time. (Section VI, infra).
- 9. CLASS "F" PERMITS: Holders of Class "F" permits shall park only in the area (lot) designated on their permits, from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. NOTE: The first two digits of the "F" permit number denote the lot number. Holders may park in other parking areas at other times except when restricted or prohibited by posted signs or markings. When no spaces are available or there is an urgent need, a temporary "F" permit (for another lot) may be issued by The University Police or the Uniformed Officers in the traffic control stations. (Section VI, infra).

Note: Certain spaces have been reserved after these hours for vehicles bearing a current Class "F" permit. These spaces are located and marked as follows (each area is specifically posted as to times/days, etc.):

- a. Lot 14 All spaces except for those designated as "F-14 permits at all times".
- b. Lot 15 All spaces in that part of the lot north of the Experimental Science Building (unless otherwise posted).

- c. Lot 16 Certain marked spaces located in the lot west of
   W. R. Woolrich Laboratories.
- 10. CLASS "G" FERMITS: Holders of Class "G" permits shall park only in designated Class "G" parking areas Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. They also may pass by the control stations during these hours but shall park only where authorized. Holders may park in other parking areas after these hours except when restricted or prohibited by posted signs or markings. (Section VI, infra).

Note: Certain spaces have been reserved after these hours for vehicles bearing a current Class "G" permit. These spaces are located and marked as follows (each area is specifically posted as to times/days, etc.):

- a. Lot 14 All spaces except for those designated as "F-14 permits at all times".
- b. Lot 15 All spaces in that part of the lot north of the Experimental Science Building (unless otherwise posted).
- c. Lot 16 Certain marked spaces located in the lot west of W. R. Woolrich Laboratories.
- 11. CLASS "M" PERMITS: Holders of Class "M" permits shall park only in designated Class "M" areas Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Motorcycles or mopeds may not be driven past the traffic control stations Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., except at Balcones Research Center. (Section VI, infra).
- 12. LOADING ZONE PERMITS & WHERE TO OBTAIN: A Loading Zone permit is required to use these spaces/areas Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. unless otherwise posted. Permits (normally valid for 20 minutes) may be obtained at the traffic control stations. When the control stations are closed, call 471-4441 for assistance. (Section VI, infra).
- 13. BICYCLE REGISTRATION: Bicycles operated or parked on the main campus shall be registered with the University Police Department. Contact UTPD on the west side of Gregory Gymnasium (weather permitting) on Wednesdays from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. for free registration. (Section IV, infra).
- 14. BICYCLES AND SKATES: Bicycles must be operated in accordance with the ordinances of the City of Austin, the specific applicable provisions of these regulations, all provisions of these regulations concerning parking restrictions and traffic and applicable state laws. Roller skating (including skate boards) is not permitted on

any part of the campus. (Section IV, infra).

- 15. CLOSURE OF PARKING LOTS: On occasion during the year, certain parking lots may be closed upon recommendation by the Parking and Traffic Policies Committee, and approval by the President of The University. (Section V, infra)
- 16. SPEED LIMIT: The speed limit on all parts of the main campus, whether on streets or in parking areas, is 15 mph (unless otherwise posted). (Section IV, infra).
- 17. POSTED SIGNS: Posted signs, whether permanent or temporary, must be obeyed at all times and take precedence over painted curbs, pavement markings and designations shown on any University map (Section V, infra). Before perking a vehicle or entering a parking lot or area, please read the posted sign in its entirety.
- 18. PARKING IMPROPERLY: A vehicle shall not park opposite the flow of traffic. This includes, but is not limited to, parking on a street where angle parking is required, with the back of the vehicle toward the curb. A vehicle also may not park opposite the flow of traffic on a two-way street where parallel parking is required. Motorcycles may not park perpendicular to curbs UNLESS parked in designated Class "M" areas. Parking wholly within the marked houndaries of the parking space is required at all times. Other improperly parked vehicles do not constitute an excuse for improper parking. Vehicles shall not park so as to obstruct walkways, ramps, loading docks, crosswalks or to inflict darnage to shrubbery, trees, grass, grounds or structures. (Section VII, infra).
- 19. NO FARRING ZONES: In addition to zones marked by posted signs, ALL yellow-painted curbs or pavements denote NO PARKING AT ANY TIME. (Section V, infra)
- 20. RESISTRATION OF TWO VEHICLES: Holders of Class "F" and "O" permits may register an alternate vehicle at no charge. All applicants may register one additional motorcycle/moped upon payment of the required fee. (Section VI, infra).

  Note If an alternate vehicle is registered, both vehicles shall not be parked on campus at the same time unless one is parked at a paid meter or in the parking garage. If both vehicles are found to be parked otherwise, then the alternate vehicle permit may be revoked for the remainder of the permit year. (Section VIII, infra).
- 21. ENFORCEMENT AND IMPOUNDMENTS: Failure to abide by these regulations may be the basis for disciplinary action against students, and faculty/staff (Section V, infra). Upon notice, violators may subject their vehicle (s) to impoundment pending payment of overdue charges (Section VIII, infra). Students may also be barred

from re-admission and have grades, degree, refunds or official transcripts withheld pending payment of overdue charges (Section VIII, infra). Vehicles may also be impounded for specific violations. (Section VII, infra).

- 22. AFFEAL OF CITATION: University parking and traffic citations may be appealed, within five (5,) working days from date of citation, by making an appointment with the Parking and Traffic Office (See Section VIII for more information to include detailed procedures). Court Appearance citations are handled by the appropriate state or municipal court.
- parked at a paid parking meter; at the University Visitor Center; or, in the parking garage. \*\*OFFICIAL VISITORS\*\* are those who conduct important business with or who render an important service to The University and who are not otherwise eligible for annual parking permits. Official Visitors may obtain temporary ("V") permits from the guards at the traffic control stations. These "V" permits entitle the holder to park anly in a space specifically designated for "V" permits. Permits must be clearly visible and hanging from the rear view mirror support. (Section VI, infra).
- 24. PEDESTRIANS (RIGHTS AND DUTIES): Pedestrians are subject to all official traffic control devices. They have the right-of-way at marked crosswalks, in intersections and on sidewalks extending across a service drive, building entrance or driveway. Pedestrians crossing a street at any point other than within a marked crosswalk or with-in an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles on said street. Pedestrians shall not leave curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is impossible for the driver to yield. They may cross an intersection diagonally only where permitted by special pavement markings. (Section IV, infra).
- 25. INCPERABLE VEHICLES: If a vehicle becomes inoperable, a telephone call shall be placed to The University Police Department (471-4441). The police will either render assistance or authorize temporary parking. Temporary parking shall not exceed 24 hours and must not create an obstruction or hazard. Vehicles shall not be left without written permission from UTPD. Hand written notes are NOT acceptable. (Section V, infra).

## SECTION II GENERAL PROVISIONS

Pursuant to the authority granted by Section 51.201 et seq. 4.005, 54.505, 65.31 and 67.21 of Title 3 of the Texas Education Code, the

Board of Regents of The University of Texas System has promulgated Parking and Traffic Regulations to regulate and control parking and traffic and the use of parking facilities, to provide for the issuance of vehicle identification insignia (parking permit), and to provide for jurisdiction over offenses. This booklet contains those regulations and procedures applicable to any who would walk or drive and park a motor vehicle or bicycle on the campus of The University of Texas at Austin. These rules and regulations are supplementary to the ordinances of the City of Austin and the statutes of the State of Texas which govern pedestrians and the use of motor vehicles and bicycles.

The operation of a motor vehicle or bicycle on The University of Texas at Austin campus is a PRIVILEGE granted by The University and is not an inherent right of any faculty/staff member or student. All faculty, staff and students who have a motor vehicle in their possession or control for use, operation or parking on The University campus must register said vehicle with the Parking and Traffic Office. Registration of a motor vehicle does not guarantee a parking place on campus.

The University is not responsible for fire, theft, damage to, or loss of such vehicle parked or operated on The University campus. No bailment is created by granting of any parking or operating privileges regarding a vehicle on any property owned, leased or otherwise controlled by The University.

The administration and enforcement of the regulations contained in this booklet are as follows:

PARKING AND TRAFFIC POLICIES COMMITTEE: This standing committee is composed of four faculty, four staff (two of whom represent organizations located primarily at Balcones Research Center), and two students. The function of this committee is to advise the President in establishing parking and traffic regulations; to review annually a system of priorities for permits to be issued for parking in restricted areas; to participate in the facilities planning process and recommend ways and means of meeting the parking and traffic needs of faculty, staff, students and visitors on The University of Texas at Austin campus; and, to recommend to The University Council any changes in the composition and operation of the Parking and Traffic Appeals Panel. Suggestions for changes to these Regulations; requests for individual consideration; or, any other communication concerning these Regulations should be directed to this Committee via the Parking and Traffic Administration Office.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC APPEALS PANEL: This panel is composed of faculty, staff and students and rules on review requests (Section VIII, paragraph E, infra); and, conducts hearings concerning impoundment or barring from readmission, the withholding of grades, degrees, refunds or official transcripts based on overdue charges. (See Section VIII, paragraph F, infra). This panel also rules on appeals from proposed suspensions of campus driving and parking privileges (Section VIII, parking G, infra).

PARKING AND TRAFFIC ADMINISTRATION: This office is responsible for all administrative functions relating to the issuance of parking permits; the collection of administrative enforcement charges for parking

and traffic violations; the acceptance of appeals from such violations; the processing of refund requests upon withdrawal from The University; and, for the operation of Parking Facility No. 1. Questions relating to these functions should be directed to Parking and Traffic Administration, Service Building, Room 1.

UNIVERSITY POLICE: The University Police have the responsibility and the legal authority for the enforcement of the Parking and Traffic Regulations listed in this booklet. University police officers may issue citations enforceable in court (see Section VIII, infra). On special occasions and emergencies, such parking limitations may be imposed by the Chief of The University Police as are required by the conditions which prevail. When conditions warrant such action, the Chief may also waive parking limitations which are ordinarily imposed.

The University reserves the right to enforce Parking and Traffic Regulations:

- through the issuance of University citations and the collection of administrative enforcement charges for offenses;
- through the impoundment of vehicles interfering with the movement of vehicular or pedestrian traffic or blocking a sidewalk, ramp, loading dock, crosswalk, entrance, exit, fire lane or aisle and through the impoundment of vehicles for unpaid charges after proper notice as provided by these regulations;
- by the suspension or revocation of permits;
- by requiring either the vehicle owner or the person who has registered the vehicle with the University Parking and Traffic Office, to appear at a University hearing for non-payment of outstanding charges;
- 5. by barring the readmission and withholding of grades, degrees, refunds and official transcripts of any student, for non-payment of outstanding charges;
- by disciplinary action against employees or students who fail to abide by these regulations;
- 7. by denying parking permits to those with overdue charges;
- by the issuance of Court Appearance Citations requiring an appearance in the appropriate state or municipal court; and
- by such other methods as are commonly employed by city governments or State agencies in control of traffic regulation enforcement.

Proof of the fact that any parking or traffic control device, sign, parking meter, signal or marking was actually in place at any location

on campus of The University of Texas at Austin, Austin, Texas, shall constitute prima facie evidence that the same is official and was installed under the authority of applicable law and these regulations. When any person is charged with having stopped, parked and left standing a motor vehicle on the campus of The University of Texas at Austin, in violation of any provisions of the Parking and Traffic Regulations of The University of Texas at Austin, proof that said vehicle was, at the date of the offense, bearing a valid University of Texas at Austin parking permit shall constitute prima facie evidence that said vehicle was then and there stopped, parked and left standing by the holder of the parking permit. However, if the vehicle does not bear a valid University of Texas at Austin parking permit, proof that said vehicle at the date of the offense alleged, was owned by an individual is prima facie proof that said vehicle was then and there stopped, parked and left standing by said individual.

The University assumes no responsibility for any vehicle or any duty to protect any vehicle or its contents anytime the vehicle is operated or parked on the campus.

All vehicle operators are encouraged to lock or otherwise secure their vehicle (s) when parked on the campus.

The University may deem a motor vehicle including a motorcycle, moped or bicycle parked on The University campus for more than 48 hours to be abandoned and may, after proper notice, dispose of such vehicle as provided in Section 10.6 of Chapter VII, Part Two of the Regent's *Rules and Regulations*.

#### SECTION III DEFINITIONS

UNIVERSITY CAMPUS: All University of Texas at Austin owned or controlled property whether or not within the confines of the traffic control stations.

MAIN CAMPUS: All University owned or controlled property within the boundaries shown on the map accompanying these regulations. For the purpose of these regulations, Balcones Research Center is considered part of the main campus.

OFFICIAL VISITOR: Individuals not normally eligible for University parking permits who come to the main campus to conduct important business with The University or who render an important service.

PARKING AREA: Any area on the University campus which has been designated and marked for parking whether on streets or in lots.

NO PARKING ZONE: In addition to zones marked by posted signs, ALL yellow-painted curbs or pavements denotes no parking at any time. (Section V, infra).

Revisions to the Parking and Traffic Regulations (cont'd):

FIRE ZONE: An area designated by a posted sign and yellow-painted curbs or pavement which denotes no parking at any time.

TOW AWAY ZONE: An area designated by a posted sign which constitutes public notice that a vehicle parked in violation may be removed.

LOADING ZONE: An area, dock or zone marked by posted signs which are reserved for loading or unloading only. (Section V and VI, infra).

MOPED: A motor-driven cycle with an engine piston displacement of less than 50cc (or motor which produces NOT MORE than two brake horsepower) and which does not require the operator to shift gears.

MOTORCYCLE: Any motor-driven cycle with an engine piston displacement of 50cc or more. For the purposes of these regulations motor-scooters are considered the same as motorcycles.

# SECTION IV GENERAL TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

Unless specifically authorized, no vehicle may enter or park upon the main campus without displaying a current permit Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Permits are not required at other times nor on designated University holidays. All must abide by the Parking and Traffic Regulations listed in this booklet which are supplementary to the ordinances of the City of Austin and the statutes of the State of Texas which govern pedestrians and the use of motor propelled vehicles and bicycles.

The following special rules apply to bicycles:

- 1. Bicycles operated or parked on the main campus shall be registered with the University Police Department. Contact UTPD on the west side of Gregory Gymnasium on Wednesdays (weather permitting) from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. or during other specifically publicized periods, for information on free registration.
- 2. Bicycles shall be parked ONLY in bicycle racks/concrete parking blocks provided for this purpose.
- 3. Bicycles shall MOT be ridden on pedestrian walkways or sidewalks.
- Bicycles parked or otherwise secured in unauthorized places, e.g. posts, railings, trees, etc., are subject to impoundment.
- Bicycles shall not be placed, used, parked or otherwise left within any University building at any time.
   Note: During periods of no classes and on University holidays,

dormitory residents may temporarily store one hicycle in their assigned room with the advanced approval of the Director of Housing and Food Service. Under no circumstances are bicycles to be stored in administrative or academic areas, e.g., offices, labora tories, classrooms, etc.

6. On University streets, operators of bicycles shall comply with all stop signs, yield signs, and other official *traffic control devices* except that bicycles may proceed in either direction on Inner Campus Drive only.

The speed limit on all parts of the main campus is 15 MILES PER HOUR at all times, unless otherwise posted. All vehicles, including bicycles, are required to stop completely at stop signs and to proceed with caution. Once a vehicle has legally entered an intersection, pedestrians shall yield Right-of-way until the vehicle clears the intersection. A flashing yellow light requires slowing the vehicle and proceeding with caution. A flashing red light requires stopping the vehicle completely before proceeding with caution.

Pedestrians are subject to all official traffic control devices. They have the right-of-way at marked crosswalks, in intersections and on sidewalks extending across a service drive, building entrance or drive-way. Pedestrians crossing a street at any point other than within a marked crosswalk or within an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles on said street. Pedestrians shall not leave curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is impossible for the driver to yield.

With the exception of a wheelchair (s), no personally owned wheeled vehicle such as a passenger automobile, truck, trailer, motorcycle, or moped shall be placed, used, parked or otherwise left within any University building at any time.

Roller skating (including skate boards) is not permitted on any part of the campus.

# SECTION V PARKING REGULATIONS

The various classes of parking permits and their eligibility requirements, privileges and limitations are described in detail in Section VI. Parking meters are in use from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday except on designated University holidays. Parking is PROHIBITED AT ALL TIMES where indicated by signs, yellow-painted curbs or yellow-painted pavement markings. Parking adjacent to orange-painted curbs is restricted to AUTHORIZED VEHICLES ONLY as shown on posted signs. Parking at unpainted curbs is controlled by area parking signs. Posted signs must be honored at all times and take precedence over painted curbs, pavement markings and designations shown on the enclosed map.

Revisions to the Parking and Traffic Regulations (cont'd):

Privately owned motor homes, trailers and other over-size vehicles whose individual or combined length is in excess of twenty feet shall not be operated or parked on the campus without authorization.

Only vehicles conspicuously displaying proper University permits (as specified in Section VI, infra) may enter or park on the main campus Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The penalty for illegal possession or use of a lost, stolen or forged permit shall be an amount equal to the original value of the permit plus any citations issued; and revocation of parking privileges for a period of one year. Additionally, the vehicle (s) in which the stolen or forged permit (s) was found shall be barred from parking on campus for the same one year unless the registered owner makes special arrangements with the Parking and Traffic Office (see Section VIII, Paragraph G). Other restrictions concerning parking and driving on the Main Campus are shown in Section VII, DRIVING AND PARKING OFFENSES.

The absence of sufficient authorized parking space on The University campus during a particular period of time will not be considered as valid justification for violation of parking and traffic regulations. The mere fact that citations are not issued for any offense does not indicate that these regulations have been modified to exclude the offense. On occasion during the year, certain parking lots may be closed upon recommendation by the Parking and Traffic Policies Committee, and approval by the President of The University.

All posted restrictions apply whether or not classes are in session. On designated University holidays, only those parking restrictions which regulate parking at all times shall remain in effect.

If a vehicle becomes inoperable, a telephone call shall be placed to The University Police Department (471-4441). The police will either render assistance or authorize temporary parking. Temporary parking shall not exceed 24 hours and must not create an obstruction or hazard. Vehicles shall not be left without specific written permission from UTPD. Hand written notes are NOT acceptable.

Failure to abide by parking and traffic regulations may be the basis of disciplinary action against students and employees. Students may be subjected to penalties ranging from disciplinary probation to expulsion from the Institution as outlined in Section 3 of the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System, Chapter VI, Part One. Employees may be subjected to disciplinary penalties including termination of employment as outlined in Section 9.49 of the HANDBOOK OF OPERATING PROCEDURES.

#### SECTION VI PARKING PERMITS

A. FACULTY AND STAFF: Upon application to the Parking and Traffic Office (located in the Service Building, Room One), the appropriate parking permit will be issued to those faculty or staff members who are employed on the main campus. Holders of Class F or O permits may register an alternate vehicle at no additional cost with the

understanding that both vehicles shall not be parked on campus at the same time unless one is parked at a paid parking meter or in the Farking Facility (garage). A citation will be issued by The University Police Department and in addition, the permit for the alternate vehicle will be revoked. (Section VIII, infra) Note: Class A, D and G applicants will be issued one hanging permit. This hanging permit is transferable to any passenger vehicle being operated by or for the permit holder. Applicants may register one additional motorcycle, moped or motor scooter upon separate application and payment of the required fee.

- B. STUDENTS: Upon application, to the Parking and Traffic Office (located in the Service Building, Room One), the appropriate hanging permit will be issued to those students who are registered for classes. This hanging permit is transferable to any passenger vehicle being operated by or for the permit holder. Students may register ONE, additional motor scooter, motorcycle or moped upon separate application and payment of the required lee to the Parking and Traffic Administration Office. In addition students must present a paid fee receipt for the semester involved.
- C. DISPLAY OF PERMIT: A parking permit shall be displayed on the vehicle according to the instructions provided at the time of issuance. Additionally, the permit shall not be altered or defaced in any manner.
  - 1. Hanging or transferable permits must be clearly visible and are normally hung from the rear view mirror of the vehicle when parked on the campus. If no rear view mirror post is available, permit may be either taped to the windshield, in the lower center or otherwise displayed so that it is readily visible from outside the vehicle. If the hanging permit in anyway interferes with the driver's vision, the permit should be removed while driving the vehicle.
  - 2. Decais shall NOT be taped or affixed by unauthorized means. Externally mounted decais shall be issued for all motorcycles or mopeds. Do not mount any decai directly on anti-lacerative (Securofles,) windshields.
- D. REMOVAL OF PERMITS: The original registrant may be held responsible for any citation (s) issued to a vehicle displaying permits that have not been removed. Stolen or lost permits should be reported immediately to the Parking and Traffic Office (471-4761). Permits shall be removed:
  - 1. whenever there is a change of vehicle ownership; or,
  - 2. when association with The University is terminated; or
  - when a replacement permit has been issued to take the place of a previously issued permit; or

- 4. upon expiration or revocation of the permit.
- E. PERMIT OWNERSHIP: A parking permit signifies that an individual has been granted the privilege of parking on University property. Ownership of the parking permit remains with The University. Individuals are not allowed to transfer ownership of the permit. All permits reported lost or stolen shall be returned to the Perking and Traffic Office immediately upon recovery. Possession or use of a lost or stolen permit or a forged permit shall result in an administrative charge (Section VII, infra.) and loss of parking privileges. (Section VIII, infra.)
- F. CLASSES OF PERMITS AND FEES: All permits expire on August 31 each year unless otherwise noted on the permit. *Note:* Annual Class A permits expire June 30 each year.

All disabled veterans whose vehicles display the specially designed

license plates issued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the words "DISABLED VET" printed thereon in accordance with the provisions of VERNON'S ANNOTATED TEXAS CIVIL STATUTES ARTICLE-6675a-5e and all permanently disabled persons whose vehicles display the specially designed symbols, tabs or otherdevices (to include a vehicle in which a temporarily disabled person identification card is placed in the lower left hand side of the front windshield) issued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the word "DISABLED" printed thereon in accordance with the provisions of VERNON'S ANNOTATED TEXAS CIVIL STATUTES ARTICLE-6675a-5e.1 are exempt from parking permit fees and from parking meter fees and time limits. These exemptions do not permit parking a vehicle at a place where parking is specifically restricted or prohibited.

- G. PAYMENT OF FEES: When an application is made for a permit, the fee charged will be as noted in paragraph F above. Payment of the fee must be made before the permit will be issued.
- H. REPLACEMENT CHARGES: 1. Any time a replacement decal (s) is issued there will be a five dollar charge. Remnants of old decal (s) are to be returned at the time. If remnants are not returned, replacement decal (s) will be at the REGULAR RATE. 2. The theft or loss of a hanging permit shall be reported immediately to the Parking and Traffic Office. After a report has been filed, a lost or stolen permit will be replaced the first time for a \$5.00 fee; Two or more times, full price of the permit.
- I. REFUNDS: Refunds will be made to members of the faculty and staff, upon request, only in the event their service is terminated by resignation or leave of absence without pay. A request for refund must be accompanied by a sizable portion of the decal or the return of the hanging permit. A request for a refund will not be honored unless it is filed with the Parking and Traffic Office during The University's fiscal year in which payment of the permit was made; nor will it be honored if less than four months remain in the permit year. The refund will be based on the number of full months remaining in the University's permit year.

Refunds will be made, upon request, to students who withdraw from The University at the end of the fall semester, provided a written request is received not later than the 12th class day of the spring semester. Refunds will not be made to students who withdraw from The University at the end of the spring semester.

A request for a refund will not be honored when a person's privilege to park and drive on campus has been suspended, nor if outstanding charges or other debts remain unpaid. Requests for refunds of the entire amount paid will be subject to a \$2.00 administrative and handling charge.

J. CLASS 0 PERMITS: Class 0 parking permits will be issued only to

those officials authorized by the President.

K. CLASS D PERMITS: Class D parking permits shall be issued to those members of the faculty, staff or student body who have lost, or lost the use of, both legs or who are so severely disabled as to be unable to ambulate without the aid of a wheelchair or other mechanical devices. If the applicant is confined to a wheelchair the permit will be so marked. Other members of the faculty, staff or student body whose physical infirmities dictate a need to park near their work or classroom may be issued a specific Class F parking lot assignment or a Class D permit. Normally Class D permits will be issued only where a specific lot assignment is not available or its location will not meet the walking distance criteria. All applications for Class D permits or a parking priority for reasons of health will require certification by the Medical Director of the Student Health Center. Applicants with a permanent certification approved or concurred in by the Medical Director of the Student Health Center within the previous five year period, and on file with the Parking and Traffic Office, need not obtain an annual certification. All other applicants will require certification by the Medical Director of the Student Health Center before the permit may be issued.

Automobiles bearing a current Class D parking permit normally shall park only in spaces specifically designated for Class D permits, Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Holders may park in other parking areas at other times except when restricted or prohibited by posted signs or markings. If no spaces are available, or if there is an urgent need, holders of Class D permits shall obtain a temporary permit from traffic control station personnel which will authorize parking in other designated areas for a limited period of time.

L. CLASS F PERMITS: Members of the faculty holding the rank of Instructor or above; Lecturers, and non-faculty members (including Classified Staff) who meet the salary criteria as specified on the application, are eligible to apply for Class F permits provided further that the applicant is employed on the main campus. If appointed less than full time, an "F" applicant may not also be enrolled as a student in The University for more than three hours per semester. Monthly salary shall be the amount as reflected on the current appointment or re-appointment form plus any longevity pay to which the employee may be entitled. Other compensation e.g. social security offset, premium sharing, consulting fees, etc., may not be used to compute monthly salary. Lot assignments will then be drawn in a computer based lottery system according to faculty title or salary. Class F parking areas shall be restricted to vehicles bearing permits for that specific area, Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Holders may park in other parking areas at other times except when restricted or prohibited by posted signs or markings. If no spaces are available in the designated area or if there is urgent need, temporary permits will be provided at traffic control

stations for F permit holders to park on particular occasions for a limited period of time in other available areas.

- M. CLASS A PERMITS: Class A parking permits may be issued to any of the following:
  - 1. Any full-time employee of The University of Texas at Austin.
  - 2. Any part-time employee who is not registered as a student in The University for more than three hours per semester.
  - Students, upon cartification by the Medical Director of the Student Health Center.
  - 4. Post-doctoral fellowship recipients, Visiting Scholars and Consultants (varified by letter from department).

Class A permit holders shall park only in a designated Class A parking area, except car pool areas, Monday through Friday, from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and may park in Class C lots (except "C" car pool spaces) after 2:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Holders may park in other parking areas at other times except when restricted or prohibited by posted signs or markings.

- N. CLASS G PERMITS: Class G parking permits may be issued to any of the following:
  - 1. Graduate students registered in The University for courses of instruction and who are employed by The University for at least twenty hours per week. (Verified by a signed copy of the appointment or re-appointment form).
  - 2. Teaching assistants with less than a half-time appointment whose jobs involve a supervisory role in the public schools (verified by letter from department).
  - 3. Pre-doctoral fellowship recipients whose monthly stipend meets the full-time rate specified in the instructions (fellowship status and stipend to be verified by a copy of the signed fellowship appointment form).

Class G permit holders may park in any designated Class G parking area, Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Also, they may pass by the traffic control stations during these hours but shall park only where authorized.

MOTE: All the Inner Campus Drive parking spaces are restricted to Class A, F, D, G and O permits only, Mondays through Thursdays, from 4:00 p.m. to 7:30 p.m., unless otherwise posted.

- O. CLASS C PERMITS: Class C parking permits may be issued to any applicant who is enrolled as a student in The University. Class C permit holders may park in designated "C" parking areas, except car pool spaces, Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. They are not permitted to park in other areas or to pass by the traffic control stations during these hours, except at BRC. Holders may park in other parking areas, at other times, except when restricted or prohibited by posted signs or markings.
- P. CLASS M PERMITS: Class M parking permits may be issued to faculty, staff and students for motorcycles, (to include motor scooters and mopeds). Motorcycles shall park ONLY in designated Class M parking areas, Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. They are not permitted to pass by the traffic control stations during these hours, except at BRC. Holders may park in other parking areas, at other times, except when restricted or prohibited by posted signs or markings. NOTE: When parking in a four-wheel vehicle space, motorcycles shall park in the same manner as a four wheel vehicle. Motorcycles shall park perpendicular to the curb whenever they park in designated "M" areas.
- Q. CLASS H PERMITS: Class H permits will be issued without fee by the Director of the Speech and Hearing Clinic to clients, while they are being treated in the clinic. Limited space adjacent to the clinic is reserved for these permits, which are invalid elsewhere.
- R. CLASS T PERMITS: Class T parking permits will be issued without fee by the Manager of Texas Student Publications (TSP) to assigned personnel who, for a limited period of time, must come either to TSP or KTSB to complete their work. Spaces adjacent to the TSP Building and on the east side of Gregory Gymnasium, are reserved for these permits which are invalid elsewhere.
- S. CLASS K PERMITS: Class K permits will be issued without fee by the Director, Center for Telecommunication Services. Six Class K permits are allocated to the Center: three are issued to the Southwest Texas Public Broadcasting Council (KLRU-TV) for its needs; and three, are issued to the broadcast production staff of the Center. If the permit is displayed on a vehicle belonging to any employee of either organization, then a current University parking permit shall also be displayed along with the Class K permit. Spaces near the Communications Building are reserved for these "K" permits, which are invalid elsewhere.
- T. CARPOOL PERMITS: All members of the carpool must be employed or registered on the main campus. Each member of the carpool must complete his/her portion of the application. Carpool members shall be ineligible to obtain additional permits of any type. Motorcycles, motor scooters and mopeds are excluded from carpool permits. For carpools with two members, each must have a separate

## Revisions to the Parking and Traffic Regulations (cont'd):

motor vehicle (s) and a different domicile. Carpools with three or more members, at least two must have separate motor vehicles and different domiciles. Faculty and Staff members with the same domicile shall not normally be allowed to become members of different carpools.

Carpool permits will be issued to park in designated Class A, C or F parking lots from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. The carpool leader must qualify for the type permit for which s/he applied in accordance with these regulations. The fee charged for a carpool permit will be the same as that charged for a similar regular type permit.

#### CLASS F CARPOOLS

- All Class F carpools will be assigned to a specific lot; however, no specific spaces will be set aside for Class F carpools.
- 2. Each Class F carpool will compete in the random selection process in accordance with the following ranking (unless the leader qualifies for a higher rank):
  - a. carpools with two or three members receive a rank 2
  - b. carpools with four or more members receive a rank 1

Note: Membership in Class F carpools is restricted to faculty or staff members only.

 Applications will be received and entered into a computer based lottery system (paragraph L above). Carpool assignments will not exceed ten percent of the specific lot's capacity.

#### CLASS A CARPOOLS

- 1. All Class A carpools will be assigned to specific A lots which will have spaces reserved for carpools. Currently spaces are reserved in A lots 53, 61 and the eastern part of Lot F-11 (6 spaces).
- 2. Priorities shall be assigned as follows:
  - a. four or more members priority 1
  - b. three members priority 2
  - c. two members priority 3
- All applications will be received on a first come first served basis and given a priority (as in 2, above) for the specific lot requested.

Note: Membership in Class A carpools is restricted to eligible applicants only (paragraph M above).

CLASS C CARPOOLS

- 1. Must have a minimum of three members
- 2. Specific spaces are reserved for Class C carpools and currently these spaces are located in lot C-75.
- All applications will be on a first come first served basis.
- 4. Priorities will be assigned, using factors such as distance traveled (one-way), number of people, etc.
- U. RETIRED FACULTY/STAFF PERMITS: Faculty and staff members retired under the teacher retirement system continue to be eligible for the class of permit for which they were eligible at the time of retirement. Upon request, retired faculty and staff members may be initially issued a complimentary Retired Staff permit with drive-through privileges at any time and Class A parking privileges after 3:00 p.m. weekdays.
- V. NON-UNIVERSITY PERSONNEL: Personnel working for, belonging to or otherwise affiliated with, organizations or agencies located on the campus, may be issued an annual parking permit upon application. If an applicant is not otherwise eligible for a University permit then determination of the class of permit will be made by the Parking and Traffic Office using existing guidelines as specified above.
- W. CLASS R PERMITS: Class R permits may be issued to members of the Business and Professional Program upon certification by the Director, Recreational Sports Division. Holders may park only in the lots designated on their permit.
- X. Class E PERMITS: Class E permits may be issued to those participants registered in University sponsored Adult Fitness Programs upon certification by the Department of Kinesiology and Health Education. Holders may park only in lots, and at the times specified, on their permits.
- Y. TEMPORARY PERMITS: A temporary permit to park on campus will be honored only if it is hanging from the rear view mirror support on the front windshield (if available) or conspicuously displayed on the dashboard of the driver's side of the vehicle, so that it may be readily seen from the outside. Temporary permits are valid only for the date and time issued and must contain the signature of the official authorized to issue the permit.
  - i. LOADING ZONE PERMIT: Persons desiring to use a posted Loading Zone space, Monday through Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., shall obtain a loading zone permit and may be parked there only long enough to conduct the actual loading or unloading operation, whather on University business or otherwise. Loading zone (LZ) permits are valid only for date and time issued and must reflect an expiration time (normally 20 minutes). LZ permits may be obtained from

## Revisions to the Parking and Traffic Regulations (cont'd):

the traffic control station personnel or from The University Police Department. When the traffic control stations are closed, call The University Police (471-4441) for assistance. Vehicles may be parked in loading zones and service drives only for whatever length of time actual loading and unloading operations are in progress. When not actually engaged in loading and unloading, these vehicles must park in other spaces.

2. OFFICIAL VISITOR PERMITS: Arrangements for the individual use of official visitor (V) spaces are to be made at the gate of entry. Where groups of ten or more are involved, advanced arrangements must be made by the appropriate Dean, Chairperson, Director or equivalent administrator who shall complete the Parking Request form and submit it to the Parking and Traffic Office which will then coordinate the visit and obtain the required approvals.

3. COMMERCIAL VISITOR PERMITS: Advanced arrangements for parking by other persons coming to The University campus for business matters may be made with the office of the Chief, University Police Department by identifying the person, the firm being represented and the date (s) needed. A temporary parking permit may be issued to such a visitor.

#### SECTION VIII ENFORCEMENT

- A. PARKING AND TRAFFIC CITATIONS: University Police are authorized to issue two types of citations for violation of University parking and traffic regulations:
  - 1. UNIVERSITY CITATIONS Those handled by The University, subject to University administrative enforcement charges and a right to appeal within The University (paragraph D below).
  - 2. COURT APPEARANCE (CA) CITATIONS Those issued by The University Police but constituting a summons to appear in either municipal court or a justice court. Failure to discharge CA citations may result in the issuance of a warrant for the arrest of such person.
- B. POLICY WITH RESPECT TO COURT APPEARANCE (CA) CITATIONS: The University reserves the right to issue a CA citation for any violation. It is the general policy of The University, however, to issue a CA citation (s) at The University's option as follows:
  - 1. For a moving violation (s).
  - 2. For any violation when the individual's driving or parking privileges has been suspended (see paragraph G below).
- C. PROCEDURE FOR UNIVERSITY CITATIONS: University citations are issued for offenses described in Section VII. The administrative enforcement charges are as shown. If payment is not received or

Revisions to the Parking and Traffic Regulations (cont'd):

post-marked within twelve calendar days after issuance of the citation, a \$5.00 late charge will be assessed. If payment is not received or post-marked on or before the date shown in the billing notice (See Para F below), an additional late charge of \$5.00 will be assessed.

Every person receiving a University citation shall remit the amount of the charge to the Parking and Traffic Office. Payment must be received or post-marked within twelve calendar days after issuance of the citation, to avoid a late charge.

If a person desires to appeal a University citation he/she shall comply with Paragraph D below within five working days after issuance of the citation.

Unpaid charges for parking offenses will be recorded in the name of the permit holder or the person who has registered the vehicle with the Parking and Traffic Office. If the vehicle is not registered with the Parking and Traffic Office, unpaid charges for parking offenses will be recorded in the name of the owner in whose name the vehicle is registered with an official state motor vehicle registration department or agency.

Unpaid charges for other offenses (e.g. moving violations) will be recorded in the name of the person driving the vehicle.

Persons with unpaid charges recorded in their names shall be ineligible to receive a perking permit while such charges remain unpaid. To obtain a permit, a person shall either pay these charges or request a University Hearing.

D. APPEALS FROM UNIVERSITY CITATION (8): Any person who has received a University citation may obtain an appointment to have the citation reviewed. This appointment must be made with the Parking and Traffic Office (Service Building Room 1) no later than five working days after the citation was issued. Requests for exceptions to either the five working days or the need to appear in person, will be considered on a individual basis if mitigating or unusual circumstances exist. Such requests shall be submitted in writing to the Parking and Traffic Office and shall detail the reason (s) such a request is being made. Requests based solely on alleged non-receipt of a copy of the citation will not be honored. If an appointment is not made within this time the citation is deemed final.

Appeals shall be heard by the Manager of the Parking and Traffic Office or a designated Hearing Official. Failure to appear at the scheduled appointment date and time will result in cancellation of the appeal. The citation (s) will then become due and payable including any late charges which may have accrued.

The appealing party will be notified, in writing, of the decision on their appeal. The Hearing Official may order the payment of the administrative enforcement charge (s) in whole or in part, or the cancellation of such charge (s). If the appeal is denied and the appealing party fails to pay the charge (s) or to request a review of the appeal (see paragraph E below) within twelve calendar days from the date of decision, a \$5.00 late charge will be assessed

Revisions to the Parking and Traffic Regulations (cont'd):

on the citation (s).

- E. REVIEW OF APPEAL FROM UNIVERSITY CITATION (S): Any person who has appealed a University citation (s) and who is not satisfied with the decision by the Parking and Traffic Office, may file a written request to have the decision reviewed by The University Parking and Traffic Appeals Panel. Such request shall be submitted, in writing to the Parking and Traffic Office (Service Building, Room 1), within twelve calendar days of the decision date shown on the appeal form. This written request shall set forth the grounds on which the appealing party believes the original decision was improper or inequitable. Such written request shall be submitted in an original plus six legible copies (reproduced copies are acceptable) and include the following:
  - 1. citation number (s)
  - 2. license number of vehicle (s)
  - 3. date of original decision
  - 4. date review requested; and
  - 5. printed or typed name, address and signature of person requesting the review.

When a review request is filed, the appealing party will be required to post a bond with the Parking and Traffic Office in the amount of the original charge (s) in dispute.

Each review request will be considered by a subpanel of The University Appeals Panel consisting of faculty, staff and student members. The subpanel may uphold the original decision, or they may reverse the decision in whole or in part, as deemed appropriate.

When the Parking and Traffic Office is advised, in writing, of the decision rendered by the subpanel, the bond will be released and the proceeds will then, either be refunded to the appealing party, or used to pay the charge (s) then due.

The decision of The University Appeals Panel shall be final.

F. IMPOUNDMENT OF VEHICLES, BARRING OF READMISSION AND WITH-HOLDING OF GRADES, DEGREES, OFFICIAL TRANSCRIPTS AND REFUNDS: When unpaid charges are recorded, the Parking and Traffic Administration Office shall send a letter to the last known address of the person in whose name the charges are recorded.

Such letter shall state that unless (1) payment of all accumulated charges is received by the date specified in such letter or (2) a written request is made by the same due date to appear before a University hearing concerning impoundment of the vehicle in case of faculty, staff, student or visitor, or for barring of readmission and/or withholding of grades, degree, official transcripts and refunds in case of students as authorized in the Regent's *Rules and Regulations*, Part One, Chapter VI, Section 9, and state law, the appropriate enforcement action shall take place without further notice.

Such a hearing is not an appeal of parking and traffic citations but is a limited hearing to allow the individual an opportunity to show that the vehicle in question was not owned, registered or used

## Revisions to the Parking and Traffic Regulations (cont'd):

by the individual or to show that the individual receiving notice of impending sanctions does not have unpaid parking and traffic charges.

At such hearing, which will be held after a reasonable period of time, the person requesting the hearing will assume the burden of showing why the appropriate enforcement action should not take place.

If timely payment is not received and either the registered owner or the person who has registered the vehicle with The University has failed to appear at the requested University impoundment hearing, or has appeared and failed to meet his or her burden of proof, the vehicle may be impounded pending payment of all outstanding charges, including towing and storage charges, without further notice.

If timely payment is not received from a student and the student has failed to appear at the requested hearing or has appeared and failed to meet his or her burden of proof, the student may be barred from readmission and grades, degrees, official transcripts and refunds may be withheld without further notice. Additionally, the vehicle registered to the student may be subject to impoundment.

G. SUSPENSION OF PRIVILEGE TO DRIVE AND PARK ON CAMPUS: The loss of the privilege of driving or parking a motor vehicle on campus shall commence twelve days after the Parking and Traffic Office mails a letter to the person, at the address of such person as shown in the records of that office, stating that such persons' privilege of driving or parking a motor vehicle on campus has been suspended. Such letter shall state the date on which the suspension commences and the date on which the suspension ends and will give notification of possible impoundment for parking offenses committed during the period of suspension and additionally, shall state the reason for such suspension.

Any person who (a) alters a permit; or, (b) fails to return a permit when required to do so by these regulations; or, (c) provides false information to obtain a parking permit; or, (d) parks or drives a vehicle with a permit which the registered owner, or regular driver, did not purchase, shall lose the privilege of driving or parking a vehicle on The University campus for six months.

Note: Possession or use of a lost/stolen or forged parking permit shall result in the loss of parking privileges for twelve months. While a person's privilege of driving or parking a vehicle on campus is suspended, it is unlawful (1) for that person to drive or park any motor vehicle on the campus and (2) for any other person to drive or park a vehicle registered in the name of such person on the campus.

If a person whose privilege of driving or parking on campus has been suspended receives a University citation by reason of having a vehicle on campus during the period of his/her suspension, the period of suspension shall be extended so that it expires twelve menths from the date the person received such additional

Revisions to the Parking and Traffic Regulations (cont'd):

citation(s). In addition, the violation of the suspension shall be reported to the Dean of Students if the person is a student, or to the appropriate Dean, Director or Administrative Official for possible disciplinary action if the person is a faculty or staff member.

A person receiving notice that his privilege of driving or parking a vehicle on campus has been suspended may appeal the suspension within twelve calendar days on the grounds that the imposition of such suspension is improper, or will create serious and substantial hardship. Such appeal shall be governed by the provisions of Part F above. No appeal shall be considered if there are any unpaid citations outstanding at the time such appeal is filed, unless special arrangements are made with the Parking and Traffic Office.

- H. REMOVAL OF PERMIT WHEN SUSPENDED: Every person receiving notice that his/her privilege of driving or parking on the campus has been suspended shall remove the parking permit (s) from every vehicle registered in his/her name and return the remnants thereof to the Parking and Traffic Office within twelve days after date of such notice. Failure to do so shall be reported to the Dean of Students if the person is a student, or to the appropriate Dean, Director or Administrative Official, if the person is a faculty or staff member.
- I. ELIGIBILITY TO OBTAIN NEW PERMIT DURING PERIOD OF SUSPENSION:
  A person whose privilege of driving and parking on the campus is
  suspended and not reinstated, shall be ineligible to receive a parking
  permit of any type during the period of suspension.
- J. TWO VEHICLES ON CAMPUS: When an applicant who has registered two vehicles is found to have both vehicles parked on campus at the same time, in violation of the Alternate Vehicle Policy (Section VI, infra), the following shall apply:
  - 1. First Offense The Parking and Traffic Office shall notify the permit holder that they have violated these regulations and that any further violation will result in the loss of the permit for the alternate vehicle. Additionally any citation (s) which may have been issued is due and payable.
  - 2. Second Offense The Parking and Traffic Office shall notify the permit holder that he/she has again violated these regulations. Such written notice will inform the permit holder that he/she must surrender the permit from the alternate vehicle in addition to making payment for any citation (s) which may have been issued for this offense. Additionally the permit holder shall not be able to register an alternate vehicle for the remainder of the current permit year. Failure to abide by this second notice will subject the permit holder to all enforcement sanctions including those described in Section V (infra).

# Revisions to the Parking and Traffic Regulations (cont'd):

K. IMPOUNDMENT: The term "impoundment" includes removal or immobilization of the vehicle in question.

In addition to any charge that may be levied by The University for an offense resulting in removal or immobilization, the owner of an impounded vehicle must also pay a commercial wrecker service fee and storage charges after the first 24 hours. When an IMPOUND VIOLATION occurs and the owner or driver of the vehicle appears on the scene before the arrival of the wrecker, the vehicle will not be impounded. If the owner or driver appears on the scene after the arrival of the wrecker and the wrecker driver has made a hook-up, the following will apply:

1. The vehicle will not be impounded; and

2. The owner or driver will be expected to pay the wrecker driver a fee, in lieu of towing.

If the vehicle is impounded the registered owner or permit holder will be sent a notice at the address on file.
