When the Board of Regents awarded a contract for procurement of switchgear to General Electric Company, after the Notice of Award General Electric refused to sign the contract stating it had inadvertently omitted certain business terms it had intended to include. OFPC had to demand redemption of the bid bond submitted by General Electric and, by this time, the bids submitted by other firms had expired and the contract could not be awarded to next lowest bidder.

Because the equipment was needed so the completion date of the Research Building could be met, it was decided to purchase the switchgear by change order issued to Dal-Mac Construction, Inc., the general contractor for the Research Building. The cost of the project from Dal-Mac is approximately \$1,050,000 compared to the Board of Regents' contract award of \$1,009,233 which was rejected by General Electric.

Authorization was requested and received from UT System for OFPC to make the necessary change orders to Dal-Mac Construction, Inc. and to transfer the funds.
