Proposed Reallocation from PUF Bond Proceeds for Repair and Renovation Projects

Based upon a request dated June 22, 1990, from President Rutford, it is recommended that \$49,000 of PUF Bond Proceeds originally allocated in 1987 for replacement of PCB laden transformers be reallocated for renovation in the basement of the Founders Building at U. T. Dallas.

The University of Texas at Dallas received an allocation of \$450,000 from PUF Bond Proceeds in 1987 from the Repair and Rehabilitation Reserves for the purpose of replacement of PCB laden transformers. Through use of internal resources and a good bidding climate, the project was completed under projection by \$49,000. A major renovation of the Founders Building has been included in the approved Capital Improvement Plan for FY 1992 at an estimated cost of \$5,500,000.

By using carry-over funds from the transformer project to handle renovation work in the basement of Founders now, the institution will be able to proceed with proper installation of two high pressure rock presses which are essential to a research project by Dr. Dean Presnall in the institutions's Geosciences Program, a research project funded by both NSF and the Texas Advanced Research Program for over \$500,000. Since the basement renovation was included as a part of the larger Founders renovation project scheduled for FY 92, not only will the immediate research needs be met but this part of the FY 92 work will be completed ahead of schedule.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

The following is the initial submission of the proposed Parking and Traffic Regulations of The University of Texas - Pan American. They have been approved by the appropriate Executive Vice Chancellor and are based upon model regulations approved by the U. T. Board of Regents. These regulations supersede all prior Parking and Traffic Regulations.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS FOR 1990-91

A. <u>Purpose</u>

Pursuant to the authority granted by Sections 51.201 <u>et sec.</u>; 54.005, 54.503, 65.31 and 77.02 et seq. of Title 3 of the <u>Texas Education Code</u>, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System has promulgated Parking and Traffic Regulations to regulate and control parking and traffic and the use of parking facilities, to provide for the issuance of vehicle identification insignia (parking permit), and to provide for jurisdiction over offenses. This booklet contains those regulations and procedures applicable to any person who walks or drives and parks a motor vehicle or bicycle on the campus of The University of Texas-Pan American.

B. Quick Reference to Parking and Traffic Regulations

- 1. Permits Required for Access and Parking:
 - a. The University of Texas-Pan American's parking permit for four wheel motor vehicles is a transferable hanging permit (hereinafter called "hanging permit"). Two-wheel vehicles will require the self-adhering parking permit.
 - b. Only vehicles conspicuously displaying proper University permits (as specified in Section F, infra) may enter or park on the campus (as shown by the boundaries on the map accompanying the regulations) Monday through Friday from 7:00 a.m. thru 11:00 p.m. (motorcycles, mopeds (motor-assisted bicycles) and motor Scooters may drive through the campus and may park in areas designated for such vehicles and in motorcycle areas or in bicycle racks as specified in Section F, infra).
- 2. Display of Permits: Parking permits must be properly affixed to the vehicle(s) as described in Section F. Decals which are taped or affixed by unauthorized materials or displayed on a vehicle other than the vehicle to which issued will subject the holder to a citation. Additionally, the permit will be revoked and the holder may lose all parking privileges (Section H, infra).
- 3. Removal of Permits: Permits (decals) shall be removed when there is a change of vehicle ownership; when association with the University is terminated; when a replacement permit has been issued to take the place of a previously issued permit; or upon expiration or revocation (Section F).
- 4. Specific Classes of Permits:
 - Class "A" designated reserved parking (only for full time faculty/staff).

- b. Class "B" Reserved parking (faculty/staff, excludes teaching assistants and workstudies).
- c. Class "C" General parking (faculty/staff and students).
- Class "D" General Parking (students residing in residence hall; some restrictions).
- Class "H" Handicap reserved parking (disabled faculty/staff and students).
- 5. Permit Restrictions:
 - a. RESERVED parking areas restricted faculty/staff members. All vehicles parked in a reserved parking area/space must display a reserved parking permit. Class "A" or Class "B" parking permit is required.
 - b. General Parking for both faculty/staff and students. Class "C" parking permit is required.
 - c. Handicapped faculty/staff and students who qualify for handicap parking privileges in accordance with Section F must obtain a handicap parking permit before parking in especially designated handicapped parking areas/spaces.
 - d. Student residence parking permits are restricted for students who reside on residence halls and are authorized to park on the campus general parking areas, with the exception of parking lots "B" and "H." Class "D" parking permit required.
 - e. Parking spaces reserved for visitors are restricted to individuals who are not currently affiliated with The University of Texas-Pan American. These spaces should not be utilized by faculty/staff and students or persons who use facilities on a regular basis. Individuals who need to park on campus for the purpose of using any facility should contact the University Police Department (381-2737), for parking instructions.
- 6. Loading Zone/Service Driveways: A loading zone temporary parking permit is required to use these areas/spaces, unless otherwise posted. Permits (normally valid for 30 minutes) maybe obtained from the guards or police officers on patrol or by calling the University Police Department at 381-2737 for assistance.
- 7. Bicycle Registration: Bicycles operated or parked on campus shall be registered with the University Police Department. Contact The University of Texas-Pan American Police Department at 381-2737 for registration.
- 8. Bicycles, Moped (Motor-Assisted Bicycles) and Skates: Bicycles and mopeds must be operated in accordance with, and skaters must conform to, the ordinances of the City of Edinburg, the specific applicable provisions of these regulations, all revisions of these regulations, all provisions of these regulations concerning parking restrictions and traffic Control Section B and applicable state law.

- 9. Parking Lots: On occasion during the year, certain parking lots may be closed upon recommendation by the Chief of Police and approval by the President of the University.
- 10. Speed Limit: Unless otherwise posted, the speed limit on roads and streets of the campus is 20 mph and the speed limit on all parking lots and service drives is 10 mph (Section D, infra).
- 11. Posted Signs: Posted signs, whether permanent or temporary, must be obeyed at all times and take precedence over painted curbs, pavement markings and designations shown on any University maps. (Section D, infra).
- 12. Parking Improperly: A vehicle shall not park where angle parking is required, with the back of the vehicle toward the curb, nor shall a vehicle be parked opposite the flow of traffic in the traffic lane where parallel parking is required. Parking wholly within the marked boundaries of the parking space is required at all times. Vehicles shall not park in a manner that obstructs walkways, driveways, ramps, trash containers, loading docks, marked cross-walks or inflicts damage to shrubbery, trees, grass, grounds or structures. Additionally, no vehicle may park on any unmarked or unimproved ground area which has not been marked or designated for parking.
- 13. Registration of Two Vehicles: An alternate vehicle may be registered by faculty/staff at no extra cost, who has been issued a reserved parking permit. Students may register one additional vehicle upon separate application and by paying the required additional fee. Both vehicles may not enter or park on campus at the same time. (Section F. infra).
- 14. Enforcement and Impoundments: Failure to abide by these regulations may be the basis for disciplinary action against faculty/staff and students (Section E, infra). Upon notice, violators may be subject to impoundment of their vehicle(s) pending payment of overdue charges (Section H, infra). Students may also be barred from readmission and have grades, degree, refunds or official transcripts withheld pending payment of overdue charges (Section H, infra). Vehicles may also be impounded for specific impound violations.
- 15. Appeal of Citation: University parking and traffic citation may be appealed within ten (10) working days from date of citation by filing a Citation Appeal From with the University Police Department, (See Section H for detailed procedures). Court Appearance citations are handled in the appropriate state of municipal court.
- 16. Visitors: All visitors need permits to park on campus UNLESS parked at Lots A2 and A6. OFFICIAL VISITORS are those who conduct important business with or who render an important service to the University and who are not otherwise eligible for annual parking permits. Official Visitors may obtain temporary parking permits from the guards and police officers on patrol or University Police Department. These permits entitle the holder to park only in a space designated "Official Visitor". Permits must be conspicuously displayed, clearly visible, and hanging from the interior rearview mirror on all fourwheel motor vehicles and self-adhering permits must be properly affixed to all two-wheel motor vehicles as described in Section F, infra.

- 17. Pedestrian Rights and Duties: Pedestrians must obey all traffic control devices. They have the right-of-way at marked crosswalks, in intersections and on sidewalks extending across a service drive, building entrance or driveway. Pedestrians crossing a street at any point other than within a marked crosswalk or within an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles on said street. Pedestrians shall not leave the curb or the place of safety and walk or turn into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is impossible for the driver to yield.
- 18. Inoperable Vehicles: If a vehicle becomes inoperable, a telephone call shall be placed to the University Police Department at 381-2737. The police will either render assistance or authorize temporary parking. Temporary parking shall not exceed 24 hours and must not create an obstruction or hazard.
- 19. Auditing Students: Auditing students are required to purchase a parking permit.
- 20. Responsibility for Parking Permits: The individual who purchases a parking permit will be responsible for parking violations by any vehicle bearing the permit.

C. <u>General Provisions</u>

The operation of a motor vehicle or bicycle on The University of Texas-Pan American campus is a privilege granted by the University and is not an inherent right of any faculty/staff member or student. All faculty, staff and students who have motor vehicles in their possession or control for use, operation or parking on the University campus must register said vehicle with the University Police Department. Registration of a motor vehicle does not guarantee a parking place on campus.

The University is not responsible for fire, theft, damage to, or loss of vehicles parked or operated on the university campus. No bailment is created by granting of any parking or operating privileges regarding a vehicle on any property owned, leased on otherwise controlled by the University.

The administration and enforcement of the regulations contained in this booklet are as follows:

- 1. Institutional Parking and Traffic Committee
 - a. The University of Texas-Pan American Parking and Traffic Committee's purpose is to review the Parking and Traffic Regulations and to develop recommendations for revisions in these regulations as are necessary to an efficient parking and traffic system as it relates to differential parking zones, parking fees, penalties for violations of regulations, arrangements for bicycles, motorcycles and pedestrian traffic.
 - b. The Parking and Traffic Committee consists of two faculty, two staff, and two students (one graduate and one undergraduate), the Physical Plant Director (Ex-officio without vote). Faculty/staff shall serve two-year terms. Students serve a one year term.

2. Institutional Traffic Appeals Board

a. Appeals from University Citation(s): Any person who has received a University citation may file a request to have the citation reviewed. This appeal must be filed with the University Police Department no later than ten (10) working days after the citation was issued. If an appeal is not filed within this time the citation is deemed final.

Appeals shall be prepared in writing on the "Citation Appeal" form provided by the University Police Department. Appeals may be based solely on the written statement or the appealing party may also request a personal appearance. Failure to request a personal appearance or failure to appear at the hearing (as requested) will result in the decision being rendered on the basis of the written statement (including any supporting material submitted) and the information as shown on the citation(s).

b. Review of Appeal of University Citation(s):

The Appeal form will be referred to the Dean of Students. The traffic appeals board will convene twice each month, time and place to be determined by the Dean of Students. The traffic appeals schedule and location will be posted at the beginning of each semester at the traffic and security office and in the Dean of Students's Office.

Upon receipt of the appeal form the Dean of Students shall send by mail a traffic appeals schedule to the appellant. The appellant will have one month from the date the schedule was mailed during which to appeal. Failure to appeal within the designated time will result in forfeiture of the appeal.

The decision of the University Traffic Appeals Board shall be final.

- c. The University of Texas-Pan American Traffic Appeals Board exists to hear appeals of traffic citations by any member of the University community. The Board serves as final authority on the appellant's responsibility for the citations. No further appeal is allowed.
- d. The Traffic Appeals Board consists of 5 faculty and 5 staff employees who serve on hearing panels on a rotating basis. Each panel consists of three persons.
- e. Hearings before the Traffic Appeals Board are informal but the following rules and procedures are followed to ensure fairness to the participants.
- 3. Traffic Appeals Board Rules and Procedures

These rules and procedures shall be read at the beginning of each hearing:

- a. All three members of the hearing panel must be present.
- b. A presiding chairperson, who shall be a panel member, shall be appointed by the Dean of Students to conduct the hearing.

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PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS FOR 1990-91 (Continued)

- c. The appeal is an administrative process and the role of private attorneys will be limited to advising individuals. Attorneys will not be permitted to make an oral presentation or participate in the hearing, but may submit a written statement on behalf of their client.
- d. The University Police may be represented by one employee designated by the chief of the department. The officer may or may not be the one who issued the citation in question.
- e. Both appellant and University Police may present witnesses and documentary evidence to support their cases.
- f. The appellant shall be present during all testimony.
- g. If the hearing panel wishes, it may deliberate in private. However, if one side is present during deliberation, the other must also be allowed to be present.
- h. Only one witness may testify at a time. All other witnesses must leave the room when not testifying.
- i. Opportunity shall be given first the appellant and then the University Police to present arguments, witnesses and evidence. Appellant, University Police and panel members may ask questions during the hearing.
- j. Opportunity for rebuttal shall be given both sides in the same order.
- k. The panel chairperson shall maintain order to the hearing and ensure that these procedures are followed.
- 1. The panel shall deliberate and announce its decision in writing, giving one copy to the appellant, one to the University Police, and one to the Dean of Students.
- m. The panel's decisions shall be limited to either upholding the citation and the full fine or dismissing the citation. No reduced fines will be permitted.
- 4. Institutional Parking and Traffic Administration Office
 - a. The University Police Department Traffic records office receives and processes all appeals received within 10 working days of date of the citation and submits all valid appeals to the Dean of Students for review. The traffic records office maintains records of all parking permits and all campus citations issued.
 - b. The Chief of Police or designee shall review all appeals before forwarding the appeals to the Dean of Students.

- c. The University Police have the responsibility and the legal authority for the enforcement of the Parking and Traffic Regulations listed in this booklet. University Police officers may issue University citations or Court Appearance citations enforceable in court. (See Section H) On special occasions and emergencies, such parking limitations may be imposed by the Chief of the University Police as are required by the conditions which prevail. When conditions warrant such action, the Chief may waive parking limitations.
- d. The University reserves the right to enforce parking and traffic regulations:
 - through the issuance of University citations and the collection of administrative enforcement charges for offenses;
 - 2) through the impoundment of vehicles interfering with the movement of vehicular or pedestrian traffic or blocking a sidewalk, ramp, loading dock, trash container, cross-walk, entrance, exit, fire lane or aisle and through the impoundment of vehicles for unpaid charges after proper notice as provided by these regulations;
 - by the suspension or revocation of permits;
 - 4) by requiring either the vehicle owner or the person who has registered the vehicle with the University Police Department, to appear in court or at a University hearing for non-payment of outstanding charges;
 - 5) by barring the readmission and withholding the grades, degrees, refunds and official transcripts of any student for non-payment of outstanding charges;
 - by disciplinary action against employees or students who fail to abide by these regulations;
 - by denying parking permits to those with overdue charges;
 - by the issuance of Court Appearance Citations requiring an appearance in the appropriate state or municipal court; and
 - 9) by such other methods as are commonly employed by city governments or state agencies in control of traffic regulation enforcement.
- e. Proof of the fact that any parking or traffic control device, sign, parking meter, signal or marking was actually in place at any location on campus of The University of Texas-Pan American, shall constitute prima facie evidence that the same is official and was installed under the authority of applicable law and these regulations.

- f. When any person is charged with having stopped, parked and left standing a motor vehicle on the campus of The University of Texas-Pan American, in violation of any provision of the Parking and Traffic Regulations of The University of Texas-Pan American, proof that said vehicle was, at the date of the offense, bearing a valid University of Texas-Pan American parking permit shall constitute prima facie evidence that said vehicle was then and there stopped, parked and left standing by the holder of the parking permit. However, if the vehicle does not bear a valid University of Texas-Pan American parking permit, proof that said vehicle at the date of the offense alleged, was owned by an individual is prima facie proof that said vehicle was then and there stopped, parking and left standing by said individual.
- g. The University assumes no responsibility for any vehicle or any duty to protect any vehicle or its contents at anytime the vehicle is operated or parked on the campus.
- h. The University may deem a motor vehicle including a motorcycle, or motor scooter, or moped or bicycle parked on the University campus for more than 48 hours to be abandoned and may dispose of such vehicle as provided in Section 10 of Chapter VII, Part Two of the Regents' <u>Rules and Regulations</u>.

D. <u>Definitions</u>

The following defined terms are in addition to the definitions and terms of the Texas Motor Vehicle Laws which shall apply on the campus.

- 1. University or UTPA The University of Texas-Pan American.
- 2. Campus The property under the control of The University of Texas-Pan American.
- 3. University Police The University Police Department of The University of Texas-Pan American acting directly or through its duly authorized officers and agents.
- Chief of Police The Chief of The University Police Department of The University of Texas-Pan American.
- Driver Any person who drives, operates or is in actual physical control of a vehicle.
- Vehicles Includes automobiles, buses, trucks, trailers, motorcycles, motor scooters, motorbikes, mopeds, bicycles, and tractors.
- Visitor Any person who has no affiliation, association, connection, or relationship with the University as a faculty/staff member or student.
- Student Any person duly registered, enrolled and attending classes at The University of Texas-Pan American (including special students, part-time students and auditing students).
- Employee Faculty/Staff of the University except teaching assistants and workstudies.

- Parking Permit Hanging permits for four-wheel motor vehicles, and self-adhering permits for two-wheel motor vehicles sold by The University of Texas-Pan American shall be displayed on all vehicles parked on campus.
- Resident Student Any person duly registered, enrolled and attending classes at The University of Texas-Pan American and residing in the Men's Residence Hall or Women's Residence Hall.
- 12. Substitute Vehicle A vehicle not registered at The University Police Department, but being operated on University property by a student, or faculty/staff member on a temporary basis.

E. <u>General Traffic Regulations</u>

- 1. Speed Limit 20 miles per hour on campus streets. In parking lots the speed limit is 10 miles per hour.
- Right of Way Vehicles shall yield to pedestrians crossing the street in marked crosswalks and within 50 feet of an intersection.
- 3. Passing Prohibited in crosswalks or within 50 feet of an intersection.
- Pedestrians shall yield right-of-way to vehicles while walking on or crossing streets at places other than crosswilks. Pedestrians are required to use crosswalks when available.
- 5. Traffic Control Signs Shall be observed at all times, including entrance and exit signs in all parking lots.
- Parking Is strictly limited to spaces on pavement between marked-off painted lines. Any space not so designated may not be used for parking. Parking with any part of the vehicle over the lines is a violation.
- Loading/Unloading Passengers Should be done in parking lots and is prohibited on campus streets and service drives.
- 8. Motorcycle Parking Property registered motorcycles are permitted to park on the white cross striped areas at the end of the vehicle parking row (within their respective areas as designated by class permit on vehicle) or in regular parking spaces. No parking is permitted in the yellow cross striped areas. Motorcycles are prohibited from parking in bicycle racks with the exception of moped types.
- Bicycles Shall not be ridden through covered walkways or in corridors of campus buildings. Bicycles shall not be parked in stairwells, stairways or in halls. The campus provides bicycle racks at every building for those who ride bicycles.
- 10. Moving Violations:
 - Operating a motor vehicle in a service drive without a loading zone temporary parking permit.
 - b. Making a U-turn in a street or service drive.

- c. Driving through a barricaded area.
- d. Driving on lawns, turfs, or sidewalks area.
- 11. Non-Moving Violations:
 - a. Parking on campus streets (blocking one lane of traffic).
 - b. Parking on lawns, turfs, or in construction areas.
 - c. Obstruction of sidewalks.
 - d. Parking or stopping in service drives (unless vehicle is loading/unloading bulky packages of supplies or heavy equipment); no loading/unloading of passengers.
 - e. Parking in areas marked by red paint on curb (firelanes).
 - f. Parking in painted yellow "maintenance" zones (unless employee is engaged in maintenance).
 - g. Parking in No Parking Zone (painted yellow curbs yellow striped areas).
 - h. Parking so as to obstruct the servicing of a trash container.
 - i. Obstruction of crosswalk.
 - j. Parking with front of vehicle facing traffic aisle.
 - k. Failure to display valid vehicle registration parking permit.
 - 1. Improperly displaying parking permit.
 - m. Improper registration of vehicle for parking permit.

In addition to the above, all Texas Motor Vehicle Laws apply to traffic within the University.

12. Tow-Away and Immobilization of Vehicles:

Tow-away and immobilization of improperly parked vehicles will be enforced!

- a. The immediate impoundment of vehicles will take place when the vehicle blocks vehicular or pedestrian traffic or blocks a sidewalk, loading dock, ramp, cross-walk, entrance, exit, fire lane, or service drive.
- b. The University will impound vehicles after proper notice has been given as provided in these regulations for:
 - Vehicles parked in unauthorized areas.
 - Vehicles on campus without a parking permit and whose operators are difficult to identify.
 - 3) Vehicles bearing no license plates or plates expired in excess of one year.

- 4) Vehicles parked on campus whose owner/operator has refused to move vehicle after being advised by The University of Texas-Pan American Police Officer to move.
- 5) Vehicles abandoned on The University of Texas-Pan American campus.
- Vehicles which have been issued five (5) or more citations which have not been cleared.

13. Pedestrian Violations:

- Failure to yield right-of-way to vehicles on campus at places other than crosswalks.
- b. Stopping in crosswalks.
- c. Walking in center of driving lane thus obstructing traffic flow in parking lots.
- d. Loading/unloading of pedestrians in streets or service drives.
- 14. Designated Parking Spaces:
 - Handicap spaces, maintenance spaces, services drives, firelanes, and tow-away zones shall remain clear of all unauthorized vehicles at all times.
 - b. Parking spaces marked "Reserved" or marked "Reserved" and with a number become unreserved after 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, on weekends, and on holidays with the exception of Lots "D" and "H"; which become unreserved after 7:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, weekends and on holidays. Dead days and other days when school is not in session are not holidays; therefore parking rules and regulations shall be observed.
 - c. Vehicles must be registered each academic year (September 1 through August 31). This may be done as part of the academic registration procedure or at the time the vehicle is brought on campus. All parking permits expire on August 31. The University Police Department has Traffic Rule: and Regulations available to all members of the University and visitors.

F. Parking Regulations

- The various classes of parking permits and their eligibility requirements, privileges and limitations are described in detail in Section F.
- 2. On University holidays, only those parking restrictions which regulate parking at all times shall remain in effect.

3. Failure to abide by parking and traffic regulations may be the basis for disciplinary action against students and faculty/staff. Students may be subject to penalties ranging from disciplinary probation to expulsion from the Institution as outlined in section 3.13 of the <u>Rules and Regulations</u> of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System, Chapter VI, Part One. Faculty/Staff may be subjected to disciplinary penalties including termination of employment as outlined in Section 9.2.9 of the Handbook of Operating Procedures. (Note: When a faculty or staff member has accumulated three or more unpaid parking or traffic violations and/or charges of \$25.00 or more, the employee's Dean, Director or Administrative Official shall be notified by the University Police Department. When a student is placed on the "bar enrollment" list for unpaid parking or traffic violations, the Dean of Students shall be notified by the University Police

G. <u>Parking Permits</u>

1. Faculty and Staff: A parking permit will be issued upon application to The University Police Department located at the ASF Building. Permits will be issued to the employee applying.

Holders of Class A and B permits may register an alternate vehicle at no additional cost provided that both vehicles are owned by the applicant or another person as specified above, with the understanding that both vehicles shall not be parked on campus at the same time.

- 2. Students: A parking permit will be issued for a vehicle owned by the student, spouse, or guardian. If the registered owner is other than above, (2) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must be either related to or domiciled with the applicant, and (2) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must not be otherwise eligible for a University Parking Permit. Students may register one, additional motor vehicle, motorcycle, motor-assisted bicycle, or motor scooter upon separate application and payment of the required fee to The University Police Department; however both may not be operated or parked upon the campus at the same time. In addition, students must present a paid fee receipt for the current semester.
- 3. Display of Permits: Hanging parking permits must be clearly visible, wording and numbers are to be facing outward and in an upright position and hanging from the interior rearview mirror on all fourwheel motor vehicles. Self-adhering permits must be properly affixed to all two-wheel motor vehicles on the front fender of the vehicle. NOTE: If no front fender is available, mount permit on right front fork. Taping or otherwise affixing the decal will result in citations being issued.
- 4. Removal of Permits: Permits (decals) shall be removed:
 - a. whenever there is a change in vehicle ownership;
 - b. when association with the University is terminated;
 - c. when a replacement permit (decal) has been issued to take the place of a previously issued permit (decal); or
 - d. upon expiration or revocation of the permit or decal.

Motorcycles and Motor Scooters: Eligible for any class of parking permit according to status of the owner/operator.

a. Permits (Decal):

Parking Permit (decal) will be honored only after it has been properly and completely affixed on the front fender of the vehicle so that it may be readily seen when viewed from the front of the vehicle. NOTE: If no front fender is available, mount permit on right front fork so that it may be readily seen when viewed from the front of the vehicle. Permits (decals) may not be affixed by tape or any other unauthorized method. The permit (decal) is not transferrable and must be affixed to the vehicle for which it was issued. (A fee of \$1.00 and the remnants of the old permit are required for any permit (decal) replacement.)

b. Parking:

- Motorcycles and Motor Scooters may park on the white cross striped areas at the end of the vehicle parking row (within their respected areas designated by class permit on vehicle) or in regular parking spaces. No parking is permitted in the yellow cross striped areas. Motorcycles are prohibited from parking in bicycle racks with the exception of moment types. A current permit (decal) is required Monday thru Friday 7:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m.
- 2) Motor Assisted Bicycles and Mopeds (with a total engine displacement of less of 50cc) may park in an authorized parking area/space according to class of parking permit or in those bicycle racks located outside campus buildings provided that a current parking permit is affixed.
- NOTE: Motorcycles, Motor Scooters, Moped and Motor-Assisted Bicycles shall NOT be parked or otherwise secured in unauthorized places e.g. sidewalks, posts, railings, trees, etc. Neither may these vehicles use spaces marked for passenger cars or trucks.

c. Operation:

Motorcycles, Motor Scooters, Moped and Motor-Assisted bicycles shall NOT be ridden or operated on pedestrian walkways or sidewalks. On University streets, operator shall comply with ALL traffic control devices, e.g. one-way signs, stop signs, etc.

d. Disabled:

All disabled veterans whose vehicles display the specially designed license plates issued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the words "DISABLED VET" printed thereon in accordance with the provisions of Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes Article 6675a-5e and all permanently disabled persons whose vehicles display the specially designed symbols, tabs or other devices (to include a vehicle in which a temporarily disabled person identification card is placed in the lower left hand side of the front windshield) issued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the word "DISABLED" printed thereon in accordance with the provisions of Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes Article 6675a-5e.1 are exempt from parking permit fees and from parking meter fees and time limits. These exemptions permit parking only in spaces where parking would otherwise be appropriate and do not permit the parking of a vehicle at a place where parking is restricted or prohibited.

Persons who are physically handicapped must first apply at the University Student Health services for eligibility of a special handicap parking permit.

- 6. Payment of Fees: When an application is made for a permit, the fee charged will be for a complete year or for the entire unexpired portion of the University's permit year. Payment of the fee must be made before the permit will be issued.
- 7. Replacement Charges: Any time replacement permits are issued there will be a \$1.00 charge made. Remnants of old permits are to be returned at that time.
- 8. Refunds: A request for refund will not be honored unless it is filed with the University Police Department during the University's fiscal year in which payment for the permit was made. A request for refund must be accompanied by the remnants of the appropriate permit. Refunds for reserved parking permit will be made to members of the faculty/staff upon request and only in the event service is terminated by a resignation or leave of absence without pay. The refund will be based on the number of full months remaining in the University's permit year. No refunds will be made after the end of Spring semester for reserved parking permits. No refunds will be made for General parking permits. A request for a refund will not be honored when a person's privilege to park and drive on campus has been suspended or if outstanding charges or other debts remain unpaid.
- 9. Temporary Permits: A visitor operating a vehicle on campus for more than one day must obtain a temporary parking permit, available free of charge from the University Police Department.

A current permit holder operating a substitute vehicle on campus must obtain a temporary parking permit available free of charge from the University Police Department.

H. Disciplinary Action and Penalties

The University Police Department is not responsible for a ticket being removed from a vehicle after said ticket has been placed on the vehicle by an officer.

1. Vehicle Immobilization Attachments:

Vehicle immobilizer shall not be removed until the owner/operator of the vehicle is properly identified by The University of Texas-Pan American Police Department. Should a vehicle immobilizer be placed on your vehicle, do no attempt to remove it. Contact the University Police Department.

- 2. Violations Which May Result in Immediate Disciplinary Action:
 - a. Failure or refusal to show proper identification or a University of Texas-Pan American I.D.
 - b. Interfering with University Police Officer in the performance of his or her duties.
 - c. The removal of, tampering with, or defacing of any barricade or any traffic regulating device.
 - Refusing to give information pertaining to a traffic accident or crime.
 - e. Tampering, removing, or defacing a valid parking permit, except by permission of vehicle registrant or proper University authority.
 - f. Deliberately inconveniencing, tampering with, or causing damage to another person's vehicle.
- 3. Penalties for Violations:
 - a. Citations: Parking citations are \$5.00 each with the exception of those violations in which a vehicle is subject to immobilization or tow-away. The University Police Department is not responsible for a ticket being removed from a vehicle after said ticket has been placed on the vehicle by an officer.
 - b. Immobilizer: The penalty for a vehicle immobilizer is \$20.00. The owner/operator of a vehicle on which a vehicle immobilizer has been placed is liable for any and all damages incurred to the vehicle and the immobilizer caused by attempting to drive the vehicle once the immobilizer has been properly installed, or removing the immobilizer, or theft of the immobilizer, and is subject to penalty imposed by these regulations, by statute or both.
 - c. Tow-Away: The owner/operator of a motor vehicle shall be responsible for all costs incurred in removing, impounding, and storing of the vehicle and for any citations issued.

Students who have accumulated ten or more violations during an academic year will be referred to the Dean of Students. In addition, the students may be required to appear before the Hearing Officer for action which may result in suspension.

Students, ex-students and employees of the University must clear all citations with the University Police Department each semester. Failure to clear citations will result in a "hold" being placed on students' registration packets. This pertains to ex-students and employees who attempt to register as well. A "hold" on University records will also prevent violators from registering or from obtaining financial assistance or university records such as official transcripts.

4. Payment of Citations:

Payment should be made at the University Police Department. If fees are not paid, violators will be sent a statement of account. When paying by mail, please submit the citation along with social security number and payment to: University Police Department, The University of Texas-Pan American, Edinburg, Texas 78539-2999.

I. <u>Enforcement</u>

- Parking and Traffic Citations: University Police are authorized to issue two types of citations for violations of University parking and traffic regulations:
 - a. University Citations Those handled by the University, subject to University administrative enforcement charges and a right to appeal within the University (Paragraph H.5 below).
 - b. Court Appearance (CA) Citations those issued by the University Police constituting a summons to appear in either municipal court or a justice court.
- Policy with Respect to Court Appearance (CA) Citations: The University reserves the right to issue a CA citation for any violation. It is the general policy of the University, however, to issue CA citations at the University's option as follows:
 - a. for moving violations;
 - for any violation when the individual's driving or parking privileges has been suspended (See paragraph H.5 below); or
 - c. when an individual receives a University citation and all reasonable attempts at collection have failed.
- 3. Procedure for University Citations: University citations are issued for offenses described in Section G. The administrative enforcement charges are as shown.

Every person receiving a University citation shall remit the amount of the charge to the University Police Department. Payment must be received within ten (10) working days after issuance of the citation, to avoid a late charge.

If a person desires to appeal a University citation, he/she shall comply with Paragraph H.4 below within ten (10) working days after issuance of the citation.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS FOR 1990-91 (Continued)

Requests for exceptions to the above referenced working days, will be considered on an individual basis, if mitigating or unusual circumstances exist. Such requests shall be submitted in writing to the University Police Department and shall detail the reason(s) such a request is being made. Requests based solely on alleged non-receipt of a copy of the citation will not be honored.

Unpaid charges for parking offenses are recorded either in the name of the person in whose name the vehicle is registered with some official state motor vehicle registration department or agency, or in the name of the person who has registered the vehicle with the University Police Department.

NOTE: If a student has the same family name and/or home address as the registered owner, then the unpaid charges will also be recorded in the student's name. Unpaid charges for other offenses (such as moving violations) may be recorded in the name of the person driving said vehicle, in the name of the person who has registered it with the University Police Department or in the name of the registered owner.

When Court Appearance citations are issued, the University citations will be cancelled. Failure to discharge CA citations may result in the issuance of a warrant for the arrest of such person.

Persons with unpaid charges recorded in their names shall be ineligible to receive parking permits while such charges remain unpaid. To obtain a permit a person shall either pay the charge or timely request a University hearing.

4. Impoundment of Vehicles, Barring of Readmission and Withholding of Grades, Degrees, Official Transcripts and Refund: When unpaid charges are recorded, the University Police Department shall send a return receipt letter to the last known address of the person in whose name the charges are recorded.

Such letter shall state that unless (1) payment of all accumulated charges is made within ten (10) working days after the date of such letter or (2) a written request is made within ten (10) working days to appear before the Traffic Appeals Board concerning impoundment of the vehicle in case of faculty, staff, students or visitor, or for barring of readmission and/or withholding of grades, degree, official transcripts and refunds in the case of students as authorized in the Regents' <u>Rules and Regulations</u>, Part One, Chapter VI, Section 9 and state law, the appropriate enforcement action will take place without further notice.

Such a hearing is not an appeal of the Parking and Traffic citations but is a limited hearing to allow the individual an opportunity to show that the vehicle in question was not owned, registered or used by the individual or to show that the individual receiving notice of impending sanctions does not have unpaid Parking and Traffic charges.

At such hearing, which will be held after a reasonable period of time, the person requesting the hearing will assume the burden of showing why the appropriate enforcement action should not take place.

If timely payment is not received and either the registered owner or the person who has registered the vehicle with the University has failed to appear at the requested University impoundment hearing or has appeared and has failed to meet his or her burden of proof, the vehicle may be impounded pending payment of all outstanding charges, including towing and storage charges, without further notice.

If timely payment is not received from a student and the student has failed to appear at the requested hearing or has appeared and has failed to meet his or her burden of proof, the student may be barred from readmission and grades, degrees, official transcripts and refunds may be withheld, without further notice.

Additionally, the vehicle registered to the student may be subject to impoundment.

5. Suspension of Privilege to Drive and Park on Campus: The loss of the privilege of driving or parking a motor vehicle on campus shall commence five (5) days after the Dean of Students Office mails a letter to the person, at the address of such person as shown in the records of that office, stating that such person's privilege of driving or parking a motor vehicle on campus has been suspended. Such letter shall state the term of the suspension and will give notification of possible impoundment for parking offenses committed during the period of suspension and shall state the reason for such suspension.

Any person who (a) forges or alters a permit; (b) uses a forged or altered permit; (c) transfers a permit, affixes a permit to a vehicle other than for which it was issued, or fails to destroy a permit when required to do so by these regulations with the intention of providing any person with parking privileges he or she is not entitled to under these regulation; (d) provides false information to obtain a parking permit with knowledge thereof; or (e) parks or drives a vehicle to which there has been affixed a permit which the registered owner, or regular driver, did not purchase, shall lose the privilege of driving or parking on the University campus for six (6) months. While person's privilege of driving or parking a vehicle on campus is suspended, it is unlawful (1) for that person to drive or park any motor vehicle on the campus and (2) for any person to drive or park a vehicle registered in the name of such person on the campus.

If a person whose privilege of driving or parking on campus has been suspended receives a University citation by reason of having a vehicle on campus during the period of his/her suspension, the period of suspension shall be extended so that it expires twelve months from the date the person received such additional citation. In addition, the violation of the suspension shall be reported to the Dean of Students if the person is a student, or to the appropriate Dean, Director or Administrative Official for possible disciplinary action if the person is a faculty or staff member.

A person receiving notice that his or her privilege of driving or parking a vehicle on campus has been suspended may appeal the suspension within ten (10) calendar days on the grounds that the imposition of such suspension is improper or will create serious and substantial hardship. Such appeal shall be governed by the provisions of Section H.4 above. No appeal shall be considered if there are any unpaid citations outstanding at the time such appeal is filed, unless special arrangements are made with the University Police Department.

- 6. Destruction of Permit When Suspended: Every person receiving notice that his/her privilege of driving or parking on the campus has been suspended shall remove the parking permit(s) from every vehicle registered in his/her name and return the remnants thereof to the University Police Department within ten (10) days after date of such notice. Failure to do so shall be reported to the Dean of Students if the person is a student, or to the appropriate Dean, Director or Administrative Official, if the person is a faculty or staff member.
- 7. Eligibility to Obtain New Permit During Period of Suspension: A person whose privilege of driving and parking on the campus is suspended and not reinstated, shall be ineligible to receive a parking permit of any type during the period of suspension.
- Two Vehicles on Campus: When an applicant who has registered two vehicles is found to have both vehicles parked on campus at the same time in violation of the Alternate Vehicle Policy (Section F, infra), the following shall apply:
 - a. First offense The University Police Department shall notify the permit holder that he or sime has violated these regulations and that any further violation will result in the loss of the permit for the alternate vehicle. Additionally any citation(s) which may have been issued are due and payable.
 - b. Second offense The University Police Department shall notify the permit holder that he or she has again violated these regulations. Such written notice will inform the permit holder that he or she must surrender the permit from the alternate vehicle in addition to making payment for any citation(s) which may have been issued for this offense. Additionally, the permit holder shall not be able to register an alternate vehicle for the remainder of the current permit year. Failure to abide by this second notice will subject the permit holder to all enforcement sanctions including those described in Section E.
- Impoundment: The term "impoundment" includes towing, removal, immobilization, and storage of the vehicle in question.

In addition to any charge that may be levied by the University for an offense resulting in removal or immobilization, the owner of an impounded vehicle must also pay a commercial wrecker serve fee and storage charges after the first 24 hours. When an IMPOUND VIOLATION occurs and the owner or driver of the vehicle appears on the scene before the arrival of the wrecker, the vehicle will not be impounded. If the owner or driver appears on the scene after the arrival of the arriver has made a hookup, the following will apply:

a. The vehicle will not be impounded; and

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b. the owner or driver will be expected to pay the wrecker a fee, in lieu of towing.

If the vehicle is impounded, the registered owner or permit holder needs to contact the University Police Department to inquire about the location of the impounded vehicle.

J. <u>Review</u>

This policy shall be reviewed annually by the University Chief of Police.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

The following revisions to Parking and Traffic Regulations as set forth in <u>congressional style</u> are recommended for approval by the U. T. Board of Regents. They have been approved by the Executive Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs and the Office of General Counsel and are based on model regulations approved by that office. These regulations supersede all prior Parking and Traffic Regulations:

THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS AT SAN ANTONIO

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS [1989-1990] 1990-1991

SECTION 1

QUICK REFERENCE TO PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

1. PERMITS REQUIRED FOR ACCESS AND PARKING (visitors excepted)

A. The University of Texas at San Antonio's parking permit for four-wheel vehicles is a transferable hanging permit (hereinafter called "hanging permit") made of sunlight resistant polyvinyl and is printed on both sides.

Two-wheel vehicles will require the self-adhering parking permit.

B. Only vehicles conspicuously displaying proper University permits (as specified in Section VI, infra) may enter or park on the campus (as shown by the boundaries on the map accompanying the regulations). Special parking areas are provided for the handicapped and for two-wheel vehicles.

DISPLAY OF PERMITS

- A. Hanging permits must be clearly visible and hanging from the interior rearview mirror on all four-wheel vehicles as described in Section VI.
- B. Self-adhering permits must be properly affixed to all two-wheel vehicles as described in Section VI.

3. REMOVAL OF PERMITS

Parking permits are to be returned to the University Police Traffic Office when association with The University is terminated or the permit is revoked. (Section VI, Item 3.H.).

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[ClASS-L--Student-Resident-(Resident-Hall-Only)]

CLASS P Carpool (Faculty and Staff)

CLASS S Carpool (Student)

CLASS T Vendors, Salespersons, Technical Representatives, and Other Servicing Personnel

5. PERMIT RESTRICTIONS

- A. Parking permits are available for GENERAL parking or MINI-CAR [vehicles fifteen (15) feet or less in length] parking for both students and employees.
- B. Disabled students and/or employees who qualify for handicapped parking privileges in accordance with Section VI must obtain a Handicapped parking permit <u>before</u> parking in specially designated HANDICAPPED parking areas.
- C. All two-wheel vehicles must be parked in those areas specially designated for TWO-WHEEL vehicles except for bicycles which should be parked in any of the BICYCLE parking areas.
- D. RESERVED parking areas are restricted to faculty members and staff members. All vehicles parked in the RESERVED parking areas <u>must</u> display a Reserved parking permit.
- E. CARPOOL parking permits are available for two or more students or employees. All members of the carpool must be present when requesting carpool parking privileges (see Section VI, Item 7, for rules and regulations regarding carpool).
- F. Spaces marked for VISITOR parking are restricted to individuals who are not currently affiliated with either The University of Texas at San Antonio (UTSA) or The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio (UTHSCSA) and should not be utilized by students, employees, or persons who use the facilities on a regular basis. Individuals who need to park on the UTSA campus for purposes of using any of the facilities should contact the University Police Traffic Office, MS 1.02.04 (691-4246), for parking instructions.
- [G----Student-Resident-parking-permits-are-restricted-to-students-who-r---in-the-Residence-Hall-and-are-authorized-to-park-on-campus-in-parking areas-designated-by-permit.]

- I. Dual Parking permits are available for commuting students and employees who own both mini and large vehicles.
- LOADING ZONE PARKING

Permission to utilize the loading dock areas must be obtained from the University Police Dispatcher upon entering the service drive through any of the controlled access gates. Parking in any of the service drive areas not otherwise marked is restricted to a 30--minute time limit. Any vehicle parked in excess of the 30-minute time limit will be subject to receiving a parking violation citation.

7. BICYCLES, MOPEDS (MOTOR-ASSISTED BICYCLES) AND SKATES

Bicycles and mopeds must be operated in accordance with, and skaters must conform to, [the-ordinances-of-the-Gity-of-San-Antonio,] the specific applicable provisions of these regulations, all provisions of these regulations concerning parking restrictions and traffic control, and applicable state law.

SECTION III DEFINITIONS

The following defined terms are in addition to the definitions and terms of the Texas Motor Vehicle Laws which shall apply on the campus.

UNIVERSITY or UTSA

The University of Texas at San Antonio, Texas.

CAMPUS

The property under the control of The University of Texas at San Antonio.

CHIEF OF POLICE

The Chief of the University Police Department of The University of Texas at San Antonio.

UNIVERSITY POLICE

The University Police Department of The University of Texas at San Antonio acting directly or through its duly authorized officers and agents.

DRIVER

Any person who drives, operates or is in actual physical control of a vehicle,

VEHICLE

Includes automobiles, buses, trucks, trailers, motorcycles, motor scooters, motorbikes, mopeds, bicycles, and tractors.

VISITOR

A person who is neither a student nor an employee of The University of Texas at San Antonio or the UT-Health Science Center at San Antonio; nor is said person someone who uses University facilities for the benefit of any student or employee of either aforementioned institution.

STUDENT

Any person duly registered, enrolled and attending classes at The University of Texas at San Antonio or the UT-Health Science Center at San Antonio (including special students, part-time students and auditing students).

EMPLOYEE

Any person employed by The University of Texas at San Antonio or the UT-Health Science Center at San Antonio, regardless of whether the person is employed with salary or without salary; to include those persons who perform services on campus.

PARKING PERMIT

Hanging permits for four-wheel vehicles, and self-adhering permits for two-wheel vehicles sold by The University of Texas at San Antonio shall be properly displayed on all vehicles parked on the campus by persons other than visitors.

STUDENT RESIDENT

Any person duly registered, enrolled and attending classes at The University of Texas at San Antonio and residing in the dormitory.

GENERAL PARKING

General Parking is permitted in all campus parking lots and on streets with [Any] lined parking spaces not marked "Reserved," "Visitor," "Carpool," "Handicapped," or "University Vehicle." There are no general parking spaces in MINI-CAR parking lots (Lot 1 North and Lot 6).

MINI-CAR

A four-wheel vehicle measuring fifteen (15) feet or less in length from bumper to bumper.

WORKING DAY

A day in which The University is officially open to conduct business, including the days skeleton staffing is required.

NO PARKING AREAS/ZONES

Red curbs; yellow diagonal stripes (Zebra stripes); "X" between parallel parking spaces; loading zones; "No Parking" painted on surface, curbs, and "No Parking" signs; on crosswalks and bus terminals.

SECTION V PARKING REGULATIONS

- 1. The various classes of parking permits and their eligibility requirements, privileges and limitations are described in detail in Section VI.
- 2. Parking and traffic regulations on campus are in effect at all times.
- 3. Failure to abide by parking and traffic regulations may be the basis for disciplinary action against students and employees.
 - A. STUDENTS

Students may be subjected to penalties ranging from disciplinary probation to expulsion from the institution as outlined in Section 3.13 of the <u>Rules and Regulations</u> of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System, Part One, Chapter VI, and the UISA <u>Institutional Rules</u> on <u>Student Services and Activities</u>. When a student has accumulated four (4) or more unpaid parking or traffic citations and/or charges of \$25.00 or more, the Dean of Students shall be notified by the UTSA Parking and Traffic Committee. See Section VIII (infra) for rules regarding disciplinary action.

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B. EMPLOYEES

Employees may be subjected to disciplinary penalties including termination of employment as outlined in the <u>Handbook of Operating Procedures</u> and the institutional "Policies and Procedures for Discipline and Dismissal and Grievances of Employees." When an employee has accumulated four (4) or more unpaid parking or traffic citations and/or charges of \$25.00 or more, the employee's Dean, Director or Administrative Official shall be notified by the UTSA Parking and Traffic Committee and appropriate disciplinary action shall be taken.

- 4. GENERAL PARKING REGULATIONS
 - A. Only vehicles which have a valid parking permit issued by The University may park on campus.
 - B. Parking is restricted to lined parking spaces. Vehicles shall be parked within the boundaries of the designated lined spaces. The fact that other vehicles are parked improperly shall not constitute an excuse for parking with any part of the vehicle over the line.
 - C. Bicycles shall not be parked anywhere except in the bicycle parking areas.
 - D. Parking is not allowed where prohibited by signs either permanently or temporarily posted, red or yellow curbs, or other markings on streets and parking lots.
 - E. Parking is prohibited on any lawn, curb, sidewalk, or any area not designated as a parking space or lot, or in any restricted or unauthorized area.
 - F. It is prohibited to park a vehicle in any place where it may create a traffic hazard or where it blocks or impedes pedestrian or vehicular traffic.
 - G. Parking a vehicle on campus for more than twenty-four (24) continuous hours requires approval of the University Police Department. Vehicles which are the property of The University are excepted.
 - H. VISITOR parking areas may NOT be utilized by UTSA faculty, staff members, or students at any time. See Section VI for permit information.
 - I. When four-wheel vehicles are parked diagonally or perpendicular to a curb the front wheels must be within twelve (12) inches of the face of the curb.
 - J. Parking spaces designated for the handicapped may be used only by persons who have a parking permit for that space.
 - K. Every vehicle parked upon a two-way roadway shall be so parked with the right-hand wheels parallel to and within eighteen (18) inches of the right-hand curb.
 - L. Every vehicle parked upon a one-way roadway shall be so parked parallel to the curb in the direction of authorized traffic movement, with its right-hand wheels within eighteen (18) inches of the right-hand curb, or its left-hand wheels within eighteen (18) inches of the left-hand curb.

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- M. Vehicles found parked in violation of any state law. [Eity-Ordinance] or in violation of these regulations or parked in such a manner as to create a traffic hazard may be impounded, relocated or immobilized at the expense of the violator. The University shall not, nor shall any of its authorized personnel, be liable or assume any responsibility for any loss or damage suffered because of such impoundment, immobilization or relocation.
- N. Passenger vehicles or trucks shall not be parked in spaces reserved for motorcycles or bicycles.
- 0. Motorcycles, motor scooters, motorbikes or bicycles shall not be parked in spaces designated for passenger vehicles or trucks.
- P. Vehicles shall not be parked so as to obstruct the entrance or exit of a building.
- Q. Vehicles shall not be parked in any area other than that designated by the permit on the vehicle.
- R. On special occasions and during emergency periods, the Chief of Police may prohibit or extend parking and traffic regulations or any portion thereof.
- No person shall stop, park or leave standing any vehicle within an intersection, on a crosswalk, or on a sidewalk.
- T. Temporary parking in the Student Health Service parking lot is restricted only to students requiring emergency or scheduled medical assistance at the Student Health Service facilities.
- U. Parking in loading zones and service drives is restricted to a maximum time limit of thirty (30) minutes and will be allowed only for the actual process of loading and unloading equipment, supplies, and merchandise.
- V. Dormitory [parking-is-restricted-to-vehicles-displaying-BORMIFORY] residents are required to purchase "D" parking permits.

SECTION VI PARKING PERMIT REGULATIONS

1. FACULTY AND STAFF

- A. A hanging permit or self-adhering permit will be issued upon application and the payment of parking fees to the University Police Traffic Office located in MS 1.02.04.
- B. New faculty and staff members must purchase a parking permit on their first day of employment. Parking permit fees are due and payable at the time of vehicle registration.
- C. Any faculty or staff member who is unable to pay for the parking permit at the time of vehicle registration must obtain a temporary parking permit from the University Police Traffic Office on their first day of work. This temporary permit shall expire on the fifth day following the first pay period of said faculty or staff member. All parking permit fees must be paid upon expiration of the temporary parking permit.

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- D. When both spouses are employed by The University, or if one spouse is a student at The University, and they need to park two vehicles on campus on or about the same time, each spouse shall purchase their own individual permit.
- E. Employees hired after the beginning of the fiscal year will be charged for the entire month in which their employment begins and for each full month remaining in the fiscal year.
- 2. STUDENTS
 - A. A hanging permit or a self-adhering permit will be issued upon application and the payment of parking fees either at academic registration or to the University Police Traffic Office located in MS 1.02.04.
 - B. Students must present a current student identification card when making application for a parking permit.
 - C. Student parking fees are not prorated and are assessed at the time of purchase.
 - D. Special students, part-time students and auditing students shall be treated as regular students and must pay the appropriate fee for the type of permit issued.
- 3. GENERAL INFORMATION AND REQUIREMENTS FOR FACULTY, STAFF AND STUDENTS
 - A. DISPLAY OF PERMITS
 - (1) The hanging permit must be clearly visible and hanging from the interior rearview mirror of the vehicle. This permit may be transferred from vehicle to vehicle.
 - (2) Self-adhering permits shall be affixed on the vehicle according to the instructions furnished with the permit.
 - (3) Taping or affixing the permit in any other manner will result in citations being issued for improperly displaying the permit.
 - B. Faculty and staff parking permits must be displayed on the first day of employment.
 - C. Student parking permits must be displayed on the first day of classes.
 - D. Self-adhering permits should be removed from a vehicle whenever said vehicle is sold.
 - E. RETURN OR REMOVAL OF PERMITS
 - (1) Permits shall be returned or removed:
 - (a) when association with The University is terminated; or
 - (b) upon revocation of permit.
 - (2) When a replacement self-adhering permit is needed, the previously issued permit must be removed from the vehicle and the remnants must accompany the application for the replacement permit.
