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INTRODUCTION

1.1 Description of The University of Texas System

For more than 130 years, The University of Texas System ("**UT System**" and "**University**") has been committed to improving the lives of Texans and people all over the world through education, research and health care.

The University of Texas System is one of the nation's largest systems of higher education, with 14 institutions that educate more than 217,000 students. Each year, UT institutions award more than one-third of all undergraduate degrees in Texas and almost two-thirds of all health professional degrees. With about 20,000 faculty – including Nobel laureates – and more than 70,000 health care professionals, researchers student advisors and support staff, the UT System is one of the largest employers in the state.

The UT System ranks third in the nation in patent applications, and because of the high caliber of scientific research conducted at UT institutions, the UT System is ranked No. 1 in Texas and third in the nation in federal research expenditures. In addition, the UT System is home to three (3) of the nation's National Cancer Institute Cancer Centers – UT MD Anderson, UT Southwestern and UT Health Science Center-San Antonio – which must meet rigorous criteria for world-class programs in cancer research.

Chancellor William H. 1.2 Background and Special Circumstances

University Lands manages the surface and mineral interests of 2.1 million acres of land across nineteen (19) counties in West Texas for the benefit of the Permanent University Fund ("**PUF**").

The PUF is one of the largest university endowments in the United States and benefits more than twenty (20) educational and health institutions across both The University of Texas System and Texas A&M University System.

The intent of this RFP is to select one (1) or multiple firms to provide services described in **Sections 1.3, 5, 6, 7** and **8** of this RFP.

1.3 Objective of Request for Proposal

The University of Texas System is soliciting proposals in response to this Request for Proposal No. 720-1702 (this "**RFP**"), from qualified vendors to provide auditing and evaluation services (the "**Services**") more specifically described in **Sections 6, 7** and **8** of this RFP:

Section 6 – Audit Services;

Section 7 – Revenue Enhancement Opportunities Evaluation Services;

Section 8 – Product Marketing Opportunities Evaluation Services.

Proposer may bid on any or all Sections mentioned above.

<u>Proposer must submit one complete Proposal, under separate cover, per Section if proposing more than one (1) Service.</u>

1.4 Group Purchase Authority

Texas law authorizes institutions of higher education (defined by Section 61.003, Education Code) to use the group purchasing procurement method (ref. Sections 51.9335, 73.115, and 74.008, Education Code). Additional Texas institutions of higher education may therefore elect to enter into a contract with the successful Proposer. In particular, Proposer should UT System composed of fourteen (14)institutions described is http://www.utsystem.edu/institutions. UT System institutions routinely evaluate whether a contract resulting from a procurement conducted by one of the institutions might be suitable for use by another, and if so, this could give rise to additional purchase volumes. As a result, in submitting its proposal in response to this RFP, Proposer should consider proposing pricing and other commercial terms that take into account such higher volumes and other expanded opportunities that could result from the eventual inclusion of other institutions in the purchase contemplated by this RFP.

The successful Proposer, if any, selected by University through this RFP will be the Proposer that submits a proposal on or before the Submittal Deadline that is the most advantageous to University. The successful Proposer is referred to as "Contractor."

Proposer is encouraged to propose terms and conditions offering the maximum benefit to University in terms of (1) service, (2) total overall cost, and (3) project management expertise.

The evaluation of proposals and the selection of Contractor will be based on the information provided in the proposal. University may consider additional information if University determines the information is relevant.

2.5 Historically Underutilized Businesses

- All agencies of the State of Texas are required to make a good faith effort to assist historically underutilized businesses (each a "HUB") in receiving contract awards. The goal of the HUB program is to promote full and equal business opportunity for all businesses in contracting with state agencies. Pursuant to the HUB program, if under the terms of any agreement or contractual arrangement resulting from this RFP, Contractor subcontracts any of the Services, then Contractor must make a good faith effort to utilize HUBs certified by the Procurement and Support Services Division of the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts. Proposals that fail to comply with the requirements contained in this Section 2.5 will constitute a material failure to comply with advertised specifications and will be rejected by University as non-responsive. Additionally, compliance with good faith effort guidelines is a condition precedent to awarding any agreement or contractual arrangement resulting from this RFP. Proposer acknowledges that, if selected by University, its obligation to make a good faith effort to utilize HUBs when subcontracting any of the Services will continue throughout the term of all agreements and contractual arrangements resulting from this RFP. Furthermore, any subcontracting of the Services by Proposer is subject to review by University to ensure compliance with the HUB program.
- 2.5.2 University has reviewed this RFP in accordance with <u>Title 34</u>, <u>Texas Administrative Code</u>, <u>Section 20.13 (a)</u>, and has determined that subcontracting opportunities are probable under this RFP.
- 2.5.3 A HUB Subcontracting Plan ("**HSP**") is a required as part of Proposer's proposal. The HSP will be developed and administered in accordance with University's Policy on Utilization of Historically Underutilized Businesses attached as **APPENDIX THREE** and incorporated for all purposes.

Contractor will not be permitted to change its HSP *unless*: (1) Contractor completes a new HSP in accordance with the terms of **APPENDIX THREE**, setting forth all modifications requested by Contractor, (2) Contractor provides the modified HSP to University, (3) University approves the modified HSP *in writing*, and (4) all agreements resulting from this RFP are amended in writing to conform to the modified HSP.

Proposer's failure to submit two (2) completed and signed originals of Proposer's HUB Subcontracting Plan may result in University's rejection of the proposal as non-responsive due to material failure to comply with advertised specifications; such a proposal will be returned to the Proposer unopened (ref. **Section 1.5** of **APPENDIX ONE** to this RFP). **Note**: The requirement that Proposer provide two (2) originals of the HSP under this **Section 2.5.4** is separate from and does not affect Proposer's obligation to provide University with the number of copies of its proposal as specified in **Section 3.1** of this RFP.

3.3 Proposal Validity Period

Each proposal must state that it will remain valid for University's acceptance for a minimum of one hundred and twenty (120) days after the Submittal Deadline, to allow time for evaluation, selection, and any unforeseen delays.

3.4 Terms and Conditions

The terms and conditions contained in the attached Agreement (ref. **APPENDIX TWO**) or, in the sole discretion of University, terms and conditions substantially similar to those contained in the Agreement, will constitute and govern any agreement that results from this RFP. If Proposer takes exception to any terms or conditions set forth in the Agreement, Proposer will redline attached Agreement (ref. **APPENDIX TWO**) and include redlined Agreement as part of its proposal in accordance with **Section 5.2.1** of this RFP. Proposer's exceptions will be reviewed by University and may result in disqualification of Proposer's proposal as non-responsive to this RFP. If Proposer's exceptions do not result in disqualification of Proposer's proposal, then University may consider Proposer's exceptions when University evaluates the Proposer's proposal.

SPECIFICATIONS AND ADDITIONAL QUESTIONS

5.1 General

The minimum requirements and the specifications for the Services, as well as certain requests for information to be provided by Proposer as part of its proposal, are set forth below. As indicated in **Section 2.3** of this RFP, the successful Proposer is referred to as the "**Contractor**."

Contract Term: University intends to enter into an agreement with Contractor(s) to perform the Services for an initial three (3) year base term, with the option to renew for two (2) additional one (1) year renewal periods, upon mutual written agreement of both parties.

Proposing Multiple Services: Per **Section 1.3** of this RFP, Proposer may submit multiple *complete* proposals in response to this RFP if Proposer can provide more than one (1) of the Services (ref. **Sections 6, 7** and **8**) described in this RFP. For example, if Proposer desires to provide Revenue Enhancement Opportunities Evaluation Services and Audit Services, then Proposer must submit one (1) complete proposal that addresses all requirements of the RFP for the Revenue Enhancement Opportunities Evaluation Services option and a second complete proposal that addresses all requirements of the RFP for the Audit Services. **Proposals must be submitted under separate cover.**

Multiple Awards: It may be determined that having Services (ref. **Sections 6, 7** and **8** of this RFP) provided by various Contractors is more appealing to the University. Therefore, University reserves the right to make multiple awards against this RFP.

Approval by the Board of Regents: No Agreement resulting from this RFP will be effective for amounts exceeding one million dollars (\$1,000,000) until approved by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System.

AUDIT SERVICES

6.1 Scope of Work

Contractor must work with University Lands to ensure University Lands receives the full monetary value associated with royalty obligations generated by sales of minerals produced from University Lands. An audit must determine whether any additional royalties are due to University that may be due to, but not limited to, the following factors: under-reported sales volumes, incorrect price, incorrect application of royalty percentage, incorrect allocation of sales volumes, inaccurate measurement, non-payment or under payment of non-sales dispositions, and non-allowable deductions for the determination of royalty due to University Lands as described by the applicable lease agreements*. Past audits performed by the UT System audit office have demonstrated that oil and gas audits can result in additional collection of oil and gas royalty due to University Lands. Additional audits initiated with Contractor must provide greater assurance that University Lands is receiving all royalties, of any type, due to University Lands, for deposit into the Permanent University Fund ("**PUF**").

Contractor will provide the following services to University:

- A. Audit of royalty volumes reported and associated royalties paid.
- B. Comprehensive review of deductions taken on royalty reporting.
- C. Identification and support in the collection of unpaid or underpaid royalties.
- D. Evaluation of gas metering and Lease Automatic Custody Transfer unit functionality.
- E. Dispute resolution support.
- F. Audit closure, submission of work papers, and summary of audit findings in both paper and electronic format.

Proposer also certifies that it understands that all costs relating to preparing a response to this RFP will be the sole responsibility of the Proposer.

PROPOSER IS CAUTIONED TO READ THE INFORMATION CONTAINED IN THIS RFP CAREFULLY AND TO SUBMIT A COMPLETE RESPONSE TO ALL REQUIREMENTS AND QUESTIONS AS DIRECTED.

1.2 Inquiries and Interpretations

1. Scope of Work

- 1.1 Contractor acknowledges that this Agreement is a non-exclusive agreement. Neither University nor an Institution is obligated to request services from Contractor under this Agreement. CONTRACTOR UNDERSTANDS AND AGREES THAT UNIVERSITY HAS MADE NO REPRESENTATION, ASSURANCE, WARRANTY OR GUARANTY THAT UNIVERSITY OR AN INSTITUION WILL REQUEST CONTRACTOR TO PERFORM ANY SERVICE AND THAT UNIVERSITY HAS AND DOES SPECIFICALLY DISCALIM ANY SUCH REPRESENTATIONS, WARRANTIES, ASSURANCES OR GUARANTIES.
- 1.2 Contractor will perform the scope of the work (**Work**) in **Exhibit A**, Scope of Work, to the satisfaction of University and in accordance with the schedule (**Schedule**) for Work in **Exhibit B**, Schedule. Time is of the essence in connection with this Agreement. University will have no obligation to accept late performance or waive timely performance by Contractor.
- 1.3 Contractor will not replace or substitute staff for those staff Contractor has identified to University without notifying University, including the reasons for such replacement or substitution and the qualifications of replacement personnel. Any such substitution or replacement that University reasonably finds unacceptable, and which is not rectified to University's satisfaction, may result in election of University not to enter into a Project Addendum with Contractor or to terminate an affected active Project Addendum without liability to University.
- 1.4 Contractor will obtain, at its own cost, any and all approvals, licenses, filings, registrations and permits required by federal, state or local, laws, statutes, regulations and ordinances (collectively, **Applicable Laws**), for the performance of Work.

2. Projects

- Prior to Contractor's commencement of any work, the Contractor and the Requesting Institution must complete and enter into the Project Addendum attached hereto as **Exhibit B**, which will contain a description of the Project and a schedule for performance of Work to be completed by Contractor. All of terms and conditions contained in this Agreement are incorporated into each Project Addendum for all purposes. Once a Project Addendum is executed by both parties, Contractor will have the exclusive right to represent University with respect to the Project until the Project is complete or this Agreement or the relevant Project Addendum is otherwise terminated.
- 2.2 To enable University to make a determination whether to request the service of Contractor for any particular Project, Contractor, at the request of University and at a mutually convenient time and place, will make an oral presentation of no more than 2 hours to University personnel. The purpose of the presentation will be to summarize Contractor's proposal for and approach to the specific leadership search/recruitment being considered.
- 2.3 In keeping with University's commitment to diversity and inclusion, Contractor will deliver a

diverse slate of candidates for the Requesting Institution's consideration for each Project. In each instance, Contractor will take all actions necessary to assure that the search / recruitment conforms to UTS 187. Contractor will document and inform University of all efforts and outreach undertaken to deliver and maintain a diverse candidate pool through the selection of finalists for every Project.

4 Payment Terms

- At least ten (10) days after the end of each calendar month during the term of this Agreement, Contractor will submit to University an invoice at the appropriate time covering the services performed for University in compliance with Exhibit C and the Project Addendum, Payment for Services. Each invoice will be accompanied by documentation that University may reasonably request to support the invoice amount. University will, within twenty-one (21) days from the date it receives an invoice and supporting documentation, approve or disapprove the amount reflected in the invoice. If University approves the amount or any portion of the amount, University will promptly pay (each a "Progress Payment") to Contractor the amount approved so long as Contractor is not in default under this Agreement. If University disapproves any invoice amount, University will give Contractor specific reasons for its disapproval in writing.
- 4.2 Within ten (10) days after final completion and acceptance of Work by University or as soon thereafter as possible, Contractor will submit a final invoice (Final Invoice) setting forth all amounts due and remaining unpaid to Contractor. Upon approval of the Final Invoice by University, University will pay (Final Payment) to Contractor the amount due under the Final Invoice.
- 4.3 Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, University will not be obligated to make any payment (whether a Progress Payment or Final Payment) to Contractor if Contractor is in default under this Agreement.
- 4.4 The cumulative amount of all Progress Payments and the Final Payment (defined below) will not exceed the Contract Amount in Exhibit C, Payment for Services.
- 4.5 No payment made by University will (a) be construed to be final acceptance or approval of that part of the Work to which the payment relates, or (b) relieve Contractor of any of its duties or obligations under this Agreement.
- 4.6 The acceptance of Final Payment by Contractor will constitute a waiver of all claims by Contractor except those previously made in writing and identified by Contractor as unsettled at the time of the Final Invoice for payment.
- 4.7 University will have the right to verify the details in Contractor's invoices and supporting documentation, either before or after payment, by (a) inspecting the books and records of Contractor at mutually convenient times; (b) examining any reports with respect to the Project; and (c) other reasonable action.
- 4.8 Section 51.012, Texas Education Code, authorizes University to make payments through electronic funds transfer methods. Contractor agrees to accept payments from University through those methods, including the automated clearing house system (ACH). Contractor agrees to provide Contractor's banking information to University in writing on

Contractor letterhead signed by an authorized representative of Contractor. Prior to the first payment, University will confirm Contractor's banking information. Changes to Contractor's bank information must be communicated to University in accordance with **Section 11** in writing at least thirty (30) days before the effective date of the change and must include an IRS Form W-9 signed by an authorized representative of Contractor.

5 Tax Exemption

University, an agency of the State of Texas, is exempt from Texas Sales & Use Tax on the Services in accordance with Section 151.309, *Tax Code*, and Title 34 *Texas Administrative Code* ("**TAC**") Section 3.322.

6. <u>Contractor's Obligations</u>

- 6.1 Contractor will perform the Services in compliance with all applicable federal, state and local, laws, regulations, and ordinances ("**Applicable Laws**"). Contractor represents and warrants that neither Contractor nor any firm, corporation or institution represented by Contractor, or anyone acting for the firm, corporation or institution, (1) has violated the antitrust laws of the State of Texas, Chapter 15, *Business and Commerce Code*, or federal antitrust laws, or (2) has communicated directly or indirectly the content of Contractor's response to University's procurement solicitation to any competitor or any other person engaged in a similar line of business during the procurement process for this Agreement.
- 6.2 Contractor represents and warrants that (a) it will use commercially reasonable efforts to perform Work in a good and workmanlike manner and in accordance with commercially reasonable standards of Contractor's profession or business, and (b) all Work to be performed will be of the quality that prevails among similar businesses engaged in providing similar services in major United States urban areas under the same or similar circumstances.
- 6.3 Contractor will call to University's attention in writing all information in any materials supplied to Contractor (by University or any other party) that Contractor regards as unsuitable, improper or inaccurate in connection with the purposes for which the material is furnished.
- 6.4 University at all times is relying on Contractor's skill and knowledge in performing Work. Contractor represents and warrants that Work will be accurate and free from any material defects. Contractor's duties and obligations under this Agreement will not be in any way diminished by reason of any approval by University. Contractor will not be released from any liability by reason of any approval by University.
- 6.5 Contractor will, at its own cost, correct all material defects in Work as soon as practical after Contractor becomes aware of the defects. If Contractor fails to correct material defects in Work within a reasonable time, then University may correct the defective Work at Contractor's expense. This remedy is in addition to, and not in substitution for, any other remedy for defective Work that University may have at law or in equity.
- 6.6 Contractor will maintain a staff of properly trained and experienced personnel to ensure satisfactory performance under this Agreement. Contractor will cause all persons connected with Contractor directly in charge of Work to be duly registered and licensed under all Applicable Laws. Contractor will assign to the Project a designated representative who will be responsible for administration and coordination of Work. Contractor will furnish efficient business administration and coordination and perform Work in an expeditious and economical manner consistent with the interests of University.
- 6.7 Contractor represents and warrants it is duly organized, validly existing and in good standing under the laws of the state of its organization; it is duly authorized and in good standing to conduct business in the State of Texas; it has all necessary power and has received all necessary approvals to execute and deliver this Agreement; and the

individual executing this Agreement on behalf of Contractor has been duly authorized to act for and bind Contractor.

- Contractor represents and warrants that all of Contractor's Personnel contributing to Work Material (ref. **Section 7**) under this Agreement will be required to (i) acknowledge in writing the ownership of Contractor (for the benefit of University) of Work Material produced by Personnel while performing services pursuant to this Agreement, and (ii) make all assignments necessary to effectuate such ownership. **Personnel** means any and all persons associated with Contractor who provide any work or work product pursuant to this Agreement, including officers, managers, supervisors, full-time employees, part-time employees, and independent contractors.
- Contractor represents and warrants that: (i) Work will be performed solely by Contractor, its full-time or part-time employees during the course of their employment, or independent contractors who have assigned in writing all right, title and interest in their work to Contractor (for the benefit of University); (ii) University will receive free, good and clear title to all Work Material developed under this Agreement; (iii) Work Material and the intellectual property rights protecting Work Material are free and clear of all encumbrances, including security interests, licenses, liens, charges and other restrictions; (iv) Work Material will not infringe upon or violate any patent, copyright, trade secret, trademark, service mark or other property right of any former employer, independent contractor, client or other third party; and (v) the use, reproduction, distribution, or modification of Work Material will not violate the rights of any third parties in Work Material, including trade secret, publicity, privacy, copyright, trademark, service mark and patent rights.
- 6.10 If this Agreement requires Contractor's presence on University's premises or in University's facilities, Contractor agrees to cause its employees, representatives, agents, or subcontractors to become aware of, fully informed about, and in full compliance with all applicable University Rules, including those relative to personal health, security, environmental quality, safety, fire prevention, noise, smoking, and access restrictions.

7. The Contract Amount.

- 7.1 University will pay Contractor for the performance of Work in accordance with **Exhibit C**, Payment for Services.
- 7.2 The Contract Amount includes all applicable federal, state or local sales or use taxes payable as a result of the execution or performance of this Agreement.
- 7.3 University (a State agency) is exempt from Texas Sales & Use Tax on Work in accordance with §151.309, *Texas Tax Code* and 34 *Texas Administrative Code* (TAC) §3.322. Pursuant to 34 TAC §§3.322(c)(4) and (g)(3), this Agreement is sufficient proof of University's tax exempt status and University is not required to provide further evidence of its exempt status.

8. Ownership and Use of Work Material.

- 8.1 All drawings, specifications, plans, computations, sketches, data, photographs, tapes, renderings, models, publications, statements, accounts, reports, studies, and other materials prepared by Contractor or any subcontractors in connection with Work (collectively, **Work Material**), whether or not accepted or rejected by University, are the sole property of University and for its exclusive use and re-use at any time without further compensation and without any restrictions.
- 8.2 Contractor grants and assigns to University all rights and claims of whatever nature and whether now or hereafter arising in and to Work Material and will cooperate fully with University in any steps University may take to obtain or enforce patent, copyright, trademark or like protections with respect to Work Material.

- 8.3 Contractor will deliver all Work Material to University upon expiration or termination of this Agreement. University will have the right to use Work Material for the completion of Work or otherwise. University may, at all times, retain the originals of Work Material. Work Material will not be used by any person other than University on other projects unless expressly authorized by University in writing.
- 7.4 Work Material will not be used or published by Contractor or any other party unless expressly authorized by University in writing. Contractor will treat all Work Material as confidential.

9. Default and Termination

- 9.1 In the event of a material failure by a party to this Agreement to perform in accordance with its terms ("**default**"), the other party may terminate this Agreement upon fifteen (15) days' written notice of termination setting forth the nature of the material failure; <u>provided</u>, <u>that</u>, the material failure is through no fault of the terminating party. The termination will not be effective if the material failure is fully cured prior to the end of the fifteen-day (15-day) period.
- 9.2 University may, without cause, terminate this Agreement at any time upon giving thirty (30) days' advance written notice to Contractor. Upon termination pursuant to this Section, Contractor will be entitled to payment of an amount that will compensate Contractor for Work satisfactorily performed from the time of the last payment date to the termination date in accordance with this Agreement; provided, that, Contractor has delivered all Work Material to University. Notwithstanding any provision in this Agreement to the contrary, University will not be required to pay or reimburse Contractor for any services performed or for expenses incurred by Contractor after the date of the termination notice, that could have been avoided or mitigated by Contractor.
- 9.3 Termination under **Sections 9.1** or **9.2** will not relieve Contractor from liability for any default or breach under this Agreement or any other act or omission of Contractor.
- 9.4 If Contractor fails to cure any default within fifteen (15) days after receiving written notice of the default, University will be entitled (but will not be obligated) to cure the default and will have the right to offset against all amounts due to Contractor under this Agreement, any and all reasonable expenses incurred in connection with University's curative actions.

10. Indemnification

10.1 TO THE FULLEST EXTENT PERMITTED BY APPLICABLE LAWS, CONTRACTOR WILL AND DOES HEREBY AGREE TO INDEMNIFY, PROTECT, DEFEND WITH COUNSEL APPROVED BY UNIVERSITY, AND HOLD HARMLESS UNIVERSITY AND ITS RESPECTIVE AFFILIATED ENTERPRISES, REGENTS, OFFICERS, DIRECTORS, ATTORNEYS, EMPLOYEES, REPRESENTATIVES AND AGENTS (COLLECTIVELY, "INDEMNITEES") FROM AND AGAINST ALL DAMAGES, LOSSES, LIENS, CAUSES OF ACTION, SUITS, JUDGMENTS, EXPENSES, AND OTHER CLAIMS OF ANY NATURE, KIND, OR DESCRIPTION, (COLLECTIVELY, "CLAIMS") BY ANY PERSON OR ENTITY, ARISING OUT OF, CAUSED BY, OR RESULTING FROM CONTRACTOR'S PERFORMANCE UNDER OR BREACH OF THIS AGREEMENT AND THAT ARE CAUSED IN WHOLE OR IN PART BY ANY NEGLIGENT ACT, NEGLIGENT OMISSION OR WILLFUL MISCONDUCT OF CONTRACTOR, ANYONE DIRECTLY EMPLOYED BY CONTRACTOR OR ANYONE FOR WHOSE ACTS CONTRACTOR MAY BE LIABLE. THE PROVISIONS OF THIS SECTION WILL NOT BE CONSTRUED TO ELIMINATE OR REDUCE ANY OTHER INDEMNIFICATION OR RIGHT WHICH ANY INDEMNITEE HAS BY LAW OR EQUITY. ALL PARTIES WILL BE ENTITLED TO BE REPRESENTED BY COUNSEL AT THEIR OWN EXPENSE.

10.2 IN ADDITION, CONTRACTOR WILL AND DOES HEREBY AGREE TO INDEMNIFY, PROTECT, DEFEND WITH COUNSEL APPROVED BY UNIVERSITY, AND HOLD HARMLESS INDEMNITEES FROM AND AGAINST ALL CLAIMS ARISING FROM INFRINGEMENT OR ALLEGED INFRINGEMENT OF ANY PATENT, COPYRIGHT, TRADEMARK OR OTHER PROPRIETARY INTEREST ARISING BY OR OUT OF THE PERFORMANCE OF SERVICES OR THE PROVISION OF GOODS BY CONTRACTOR, OR THE USE BY INDEMNITEES, AT THE DIRECTION OF CONTRACTOR, OF ANY ARTICLE OR MATERIAL; PROVIDED, THAT, UPON BECOMING AWARE OF A SUIT OR THREAT OF SUIT FOR INFRINGEMENT, UNIVERSITY WILL PROMPTLY NOTIFY CONTRACTOR AND CONTRACTOR WILL BE GIVEN THE OPPORTUNITY TO NEGOTIATE A SETTLEMENT. IN THE EVENT OF LITIGATION, UNIVERSITY AGREES TO REASONABLY COOPERATE WITH CONTRACTOR. ALL PARTIES WILL BE ENTITLED TO BE REPRESENTED BY COUNSEL AT THEIR OWN EXPENSE.

11. Relationship of the Parties

For all purposes of this Agreement and notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, Contractor is an independent contractor and is not a state employee, partner, joint venturer, or agent of University. Contractor will not bind nor attempt to bind University to any agreement or contract. As an independent contractor, Contractor is solely responsible for all taxes, withholdings, and other statutory or contractual obligations of any sort, including workers' compensation insurance.

12. <u>Insurance</u>

- 12.1 Contractor, consistent with its status as an independent contractor will carry and will cause its subcontractors to carry, at least the following insurance, with companies authorized to do insurance business in the State of Texas or eligible surplus lines insurers operating in accordance with the <u>Texas Insurance Code</u>, having an A.M. Best Rating of A-:VII or better, and in amounts not less than the following minimum limits of coverage:
 - 12.1.1 Workers' Compensation Insurance with statutory limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with limits of not less than \$1,000,000:

Employers Liability - Policy Limit	\$1,000,000

Workers' Compensation policy must include under Item 3.A. of the information page of the Workers' Compensation policy the state in which Work is to be performed for University.

12.1.2 Commercial General Liability Insurance with limits of not less than:

The required Commercial General Liability policy will be issued on a form that insures Contractor's and subcontractor's liability for bodily injury (including death), property damage, personal, and advertising injury assumed under the terms of this Agreement.

- 12.1.3 Business Auto Liability Insurance covering all owned, non-owned or hired automobiles, with limits of not less than \$1,000,000 single limit of liability per accident for Bodily Injury and Property Damage;
- 12.1.4 Professional Liability (Errors & Omissions) Insurance with limits of not less than \$1,000,000 each occurrence, \$3,000,000 aggregate. Such insurance will cover all Work performed by or on behalf of Contractor and its subcontractors under

this Agreement. Renewal policies written on a claims-made basis will maintain the same retroactive date as in effect at the inception of this Agreement. If coverage is written on a claims-made basis, Contractor agrees to purchase an *Extended Reporting Period Endorsement*, effective twenty-four (24) months after the expiration or cancellation of the policy. No Professional Liability policy written on an occurrence form will include a sunset or similar clause that limits coverage unless such clause provides coverage for at least twenty-four (24) months after the expiration or termination of this Agreement for any reason.

- 12.2 Contractor will deliver to University:
 - 12.2.1 Evidence of insurance on a Texas Department of Insurance approved certificate form verifying the existence and actual limits of all required insurance policies after the execution and delivery of this Agreement and prior to the performance of any Work by Contractor under this Agreement. Additional evidence of insurance will be provided verifying the continued existence of all required insurance no later than thirty (30) days after each annual insurance policy renewal.
 - 12.2.1.1 All insurance policies (with the exception of workers' compensation, employer's liability and professional liability) will be endorsed and name the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System and University as Additional Insureds for liability caused in whole or in part by Contractor's acts or omissions with respect to its on-going and completed operations up to the actual liability limits of the required insurance policies maintained by Contractor. Commercial General Liability Additional Insured endorsement including ongoing and completed operations coverage will be submitted with the Certificates of Insurance. Commercial General Liability and Business Auto Liability will be endorsed to provide primary and non-contributory coverage.
 - 12.2.1.2 Contractor hereby waives all rights of subrogation against the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System, and University. <u>All insurance policies</u> will be endorsed to provide a waiver of subrogation in favor of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System and University. No policy will be canceled until after thirty (30) days' unconditional written notice to University. <u>All insurance policies</u> will be endorsed to require the insurance carrier providing coverage to send notice to University thirty (30) days prior to any cancellation, material change, or non-renewal relating to any insurance policy required in this **Section 11**.
 - 12.2.1.3 Contractor will pay any deductible or self-insured retention for any loss. Any self-insured retention must be declared to and approved by University prior to the performance of any Work by Contractor under this Agreement. All deductibles and self-insured retentions will be shown on the Certificates of Insurance.
 - 12.2.1.4 Certificates of Insurance and *Additional Insured Endorsements* as required by this Agreement will be mailed, faxed, or emailed to the following University contact:

Name: Address: Facsimile Number: Email Address: 12.3 Contractor's or subcontractor's insurance will be primary to any insurance carried or self-insurance program established by University or The University of Texas System]. Contractor's or subcontractor's insurance will be kept in force until all Work has been fully performed and accepted by University in writing.

13. <u>Miscellaneous.</u>

- 13.1 Assignment and Subcontracting. Except as specifically provided in Exhibit E, Historically Underutilized Business Subcontracting Plan, Contractor's interest in this Agreement (including Contractor's duties and obligations under this Agreement, and the fees due to Contractor under this Agreement) may not be subcontracted, assigned, delegated, or otherwise transferred to a third party, in whole or in part, and any attempt to do so will (a) not be binding on University; and (b) be a breach of this Agreement for which Contractor will be subject to all remedial actions provided by Applicable Laws, including Chapter 2161, Texas Government Code, and 34 TAC §§20.101 20.108. The benefits and burdens of this Agreement are assignable by University.
- 13.2 **Texas Family Code Child Support Certification**. Pursuant to §231.006, Texas Family Code, Contractor certifies it is not ineligible to receive the award of or payments under this Agreement, and acknowledges this Agreement may be terminated and payment withheld if this certification is inaccurate.
- 13.3 **Tax Certification.** If Contractor is a taxable entity as defined by <u>Chapter 171, Texas Tax Code</u>, then Contractor certifies it is not currently delinquent in the payment of any taxes due under Chapter 171, Contractor is exempt from the payment of those taxes, or Contractor is an out-of-state taxable entity that is not subject to those taxes, whichever is applicable.
- Payment of Debt or Delinquency to the State. Pursuant to §§2107.008 and 2252.903, Texas Government Code, Contractor agrees any payments owing to Contractor under this Agreement may be applied directly toward any debt or delinquency Contractor owes the State of Texas or any agency of the State of Texas, regardless of when it arises, until paid in full.
- Loss of Funding. Performance by University under this Agreement may be dependent upon the appropriation and allotment of funds by the Texas State Legislature (Legislature) and/or allocation of funds by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System (Board). If Legislature fails to appropriate or allot necessary funds, or Board fails to allocate necessary funds, then University will issue written notice to Contractor and University may terminate this Agreement without further duty or obligation. Contractor acknowledges that appropriation, allotment, and allocation of funds are beyond University's control.
- 13.6 Entire Agreement; Modifications. This Agreement (including all exhibits, schedules, supplements and other attachments (collectively, Exhibits)) supersedes all prior agreements, written or oral, between Contractor and University and will constitute the entire Agreement and understanding between the parties with respect to its subject matter. This Agreement and each of its provisions will be binding upon the parties, and may not be waived, modified, amended or altered, except by a writing signed by University and Contractor. All Exhibits are attached to this Agreement and incorporated for all purposes.
- 13.7 **Force Majeure.** Neither party hereto will be liable or responsible to the other for any loss or damage or for any delays or failure to perform due to causes beyond its reasonable control including acts of God, strikes, epidemics, war, riots, flood, fire, sabotage, or any other circumstances of like character (**force majeure occurrence**). <u>Provided, however</u>, in the event of a force majeure occurrence, Contractor agrees to use its best efforts to mitigate the impact of the occurrence so that University may continue to provide the services during the occurrence.

- 13.8 **Captions.** The captions of sections and subsections in this Agreement are for convenience only and will not be considered or referred to in resolving questions of interpretation or construction.
- 13.9 **Venue; Governing Law.** Travis County, Texas, shall be the proper place of venue for suit on or in respect of this Agreement. This Agreement and all of the rights and obligations of the parties hereto and all of the terms and conditions hereof shall be construed, interpreted and applied in accordance with and governed by and enforced under the laws of the State of Texas.
- 13.10 **Waivers.** No delay or omission in exercising any right accruing upon a default in performance of this Agreement will impair any right or be construed to be a waiver of any right. A waiver of any default under this Agreement will not be construed to be a waiver of any subsequent default under this Agreement.
- Confidentiality and Safeguarding of University Records; Press Releases; Public Information. Under this Agreement, Contractor may (1) create, (2) receive from or on behalf of University, or (3) have access to, records or record systems (collectively, University Records). However, it is expressly agreed that University will not provide to Contractor, and Contractor will never seek to access, any University Records that contain personally identifiable information regarding any individual that is not available to any requestor under the Texas Public Information Act, Chapter 552, Texas Government Code, including "directory information" of any student who has opted to prohibit the release of their "directory information" as that term is defined under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, 20 USC §1232g (FERPA) and its implementing regulations. Contractor represents, warrants, and agrees that it will: (1) hold University Records in strict confidence and will not use or disclose University Records except as (a) permitted or required by this Agreement, (b) required by Applicable Laws, or (c) otherwise authorized by University in writing; (2) safeguard University Records according to reasonable administrative, physical and technical standards (such as standards established by the National Institute of Standards and Technology and the Center for Internet Security) that are no less rigorous than the standards by which Contractor protects its own confidential information; (3) continually monitor its operations and take any action necessary to assure that University Records are safeguarded and the confidentiality of University Records is maintained in accordance with all Applicable Laws and the terms of this Agreement; and (4) comply with University Rules regarding access to and use of University's computer systems, including UTS 165. At the request of University, Contractor agrees to provide University with a written summary of the procedures Contractor uses to safeguard and maintain the confidentiality of University Records.
 - 13.11.1 Notice of Impermissible Use. If an impermissible use or disclosure of any University Records occurs, Contractor will provide written notice to University within one (1) business day after Contractor's discovery of that use or disclosure. Contractor will promptly provide University with all information requested by University regarding the impermissible use or disclosure.
 - 13.11.2 **Return of University Records.** Contractor agrees that within thirty (30) days after the expiration or termination of this Agreement, for any reason, all University Records created or received from or on behalf of University will be (1) returned to University, with no copies retained by Contractor; or (2) if return is not feasible, destroyed. Twenty (20) days before destruction of any University Records, Contractor will provide University with written notice of Contractor's intent to destroy University Records. Within five (5) days after destruction, Contractor will confirm to University in writing the destruction of University Records.
 - 13.11.3 **Disclosure.** If Contractor discloses any University Records to a subcontractor or agent, Contractor will require the subcontractor or agent to comply with the

same restrictions and obligations as are imposed on Contractor by this **Section 12.11**.

- 13.11.4 Press Releases. Except when defined as part of Work, Contractor will not make any press releases, public statements, or advertisement referring to the Project or the engagement of Contractor as an independent contractor of University in connection with the Project, or release any information relative to the Project for publication, advertisement or any other purpose without the prior written approval of University.
- 13.11.5 **Public Information.** University strictly adheres to all statutes, court decisions and the opinions of the Texas Attorney General with respect to disclosure of public information under the *Texas Public Information Act* (**TPIA**), Chapter 552, Texas Government Code. In accordance with §§552.002 and 2252.907, Texas Government Code, and at no additional charge to University, Contractor will make any information created or exchanged with University pursuant to this Agreement (and not otherwise exempt from disclosure under TPIA) available in a format reasonably requested by University that is accessible by the public.
- 13.11.6 **Termination.** In addition to any other termination rights in this Agreement and any other rights at law or equity, if University reasonably determines that Contractor has breached any of the restrictions or obligations in this Section, University may immediately terminate this Agreement without notice or opportunity to cure.
- 13.11.7 **Duration.** The restrictions and obligations under this Section will survive expiration or termination of this Agreement for any reason.
- 13.12 **Binding Effect.** This Agreement will be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties hereto and their respective permitted assigns and successors.
- 13.13 **Records.** Records of Contractor's costs, reimbursable expenses pertaining to the Project and payments will be available to University or its authorized representative during business hours and will be retained for four (4) years after final Payment or abandonment of the Project, unless University otherwise instructs Contractor in writing.
- Notices. Except as otherwise provided by this Section, notices, consents, approvals, demands, requests or other communications required or permitted under this Agreement, will be in writing and sent via certified mail, hand delivery, overnight courier, facsimile transmission (to the extent a facsimile number is provided below), or email (to the extent an email address is provided below) as indicated below, and notice will be deemed given (i) if delivered by certified mailed, when deposited, postage prepaid, in the United States mail, or (ii) if delivered by hand, overnight courier, facsimile (to the extent a facsimile number is provided below) or email (to the extent an email address is provided below), when received:

- 13.15 Severability. In case any provision of this Agreement will, for any reason, be held invalid or unenforceable in any respect, the invalidity or unenforceability will not affect any other provision of this Agreement, and this Agreement will be construed as if the invalid or unenforceable provision had not been included.
- 13.16 **State Auditor's Office.** Contractor understands acceptance of funds under this Agreement constitutes acceptance of authority of the Texas State Auditor's Office or any successor agency (**Auditor**), to conduct an audit or investigation in connection with those funds (ref. §§51.9335(c), 73.115(c) and 74.008(c), Texas Education Code). Contractor agrees to cooperate with Auditor in the conduct of the audit or investigation, including providing all records requested. Contractor will include this provision in all contracts with permitted subcontractors.
- 13.17 Limitation of Liability. Except for University's obligation (IF any) to pay Contractor certain fees and expenses University will have no liability to Contractor or to anyone claiming through or under Contractor by reason of the execution or performance of this Agreement. Notwithstanding any duty or obligation of University to Contractor or to anyone claiming through or under Contractor, no present or future affiliated enterprise, subcontractor, agent, officer, director, employee, representative, attorney or regent of University, or The University of

TEXAS SYSTEM, OR ANYONE CLAIMING UNDER UNIVERSITY HAS OR WILL HAVE ANY PERSONAL LIABILITY TO CONTRACTOR OR TO ANYONE CLAIMING THROUGH OR UNDER CONTRACTOR BY REASON OF THE EXECUTION OR PERFORMANCE OF THIS AGREEMENT.

- 13.18 **Survival of Provisions.** No expiration or termination of this Agreement will relieve either party of any obligations under this Agreement that by their nature survive such expiration or termination.
- 13.19 **Breach of Contract Claims.** To the extent that Chapter 2260, Texas Government Code, is applicable to this Agreement and is not preempted by other applicable law, the dispute resolution process provided for in Chapter 2260 and the related rules adopted by the Texas Attorney General pursuant to Chapter 2260, will be used by University and Contractor to attempt to resolve any claim for breach of contract made by Contractor that cannot be resolved in the ordinary course of business. The chief business officer of University will examine Contractor's claim and any counterclaim and negotiate with Contractor in an effort to resolve the claims. The parties specifically agree (i) neither execution of this Agreement by University nor any other conduct, action or inaction of any representative of University relating to this Agreement constitutes or is intended to constitute a waiver of University's or the state's sovereign immunity to suit; and (ii) University has not waived its right to seek redress in the courts.
- Undocumented Workers. The Immigration and Nationality Act (8 USC §1324a) 13.20 (Immigration Act) makes it unlawful for an employer to hire or continue employment of undocumented workers. The United States Immigration and Customs Enforcement Service has established the Form I-9 Employment Eligibility Verification Form (I-9 Form) as the document to be used for employment eligibility verification (8 CFR §274a). Among other things, Contractor is required to: (1) have all employees complete and sign the I-9 Form certifying that they are eligible for employment; (2) examine verification documents required by the I-9 Form to be presented by the employee and ensure the documents appear to be genuine and related to the individual; (3) record information about the documents on the I-9 Form, and complete the certification portion of the I-9 Form; and (4) retain the I-9 Form as required by Applicable Laws. It is illegal to discriminate against any individual (other than a citizen of another country who is not authorized to work in the United States) in hiring, discharging, or recruiting because of that individual's national origin or citizenship status. If Contractor employs unauthorized workers during performance of this Agreement in violation of the Immigration Act then, in addition to other remedies or penalties prescribed by Applicable Laws, University may terminate this Agreement in accordance with **Section 8**. Contractor represents and warrants that it is in compliance with and agrees that it will remain in compliance with the provisions of the Immigration Act.
- 13.21 Limitations. The Parties are aware there are constitutional and statutory limitations (Limitations) on the authority of University (a state agency) to enter into certain terms and conditions that may be part of this Agreement, including terms and conditions relating to liens on University's property; disclaimers and limitations of warranties; disclaimers and limitations of liability for damages; waivers, disclaimers and limitations of legal rights, remedies, requirements and processes; limitations of periods to bring legal action; granting control of litigation or settlement to another party; liability for acts or omissions of third parties; payment of attorneys' fees; dispute resolution; indemnities; and confidentiality, and terms and conditions related to Limitations will not be binding on University except to the extent authorized by the laws and Constitution of the State of Texas.

13.22 Ethics Matters; No Financial Interest. Contractor and its employees, agents, representatives and subcontractors have read and understand University's Conflicts of http://www.utsystem.edu/board-of-regents/policy-Policy Interest at library/policies/int180-conflicts-interest-conflicts-commitment-and-outside-, University's Standards of Conduct http://www.utsystem.edu/sites/utsfiles/documents/policies-rules/ut-systemadministration-standards-conduct-quide/ut-system-administration-standards-conductguide.pdf, and applicable state ethics laws and rules at http://utsystem.edu/offices/general-counsel/ethics. Neither Contractor nor its employees, agents, representatives or subcontractors will assist or cause University employees to violate University's Conflicts of Interest Policy, University's Standards of Conduct Guide, or applicable state ethics laws or rules. Contractor represents and warrants that no member of the Board has a direct or indirect financial interest in the transaction that is the subject of this Agreement.

Further, Contractor agrees to comply with §2252.908, Texas Government Code (Disclosure of Interested Parties Statute), and 1 TAC §\$46.1 through 46.5 (Disclosure of Interested Parties Regulations), as implemented by the Texas Ethics Commission (TEC), including, among other things, providing the TEC and University with information required on the form promulgated by TEC. Proposers may learn more about these disclosure requirements, including the use of TEC's electronic filing system, by reviewing the information on TEC's website at https://www.ethics.state.tx.us/whatsnew/FAQ_Form1295.html.

- Accessibility Warranty) the electronic and information resources and all associated information, documentation, and support Contractor provides to University under this Agreement (EIRs) comply with applicable requirements in 1 TAC Chapter 213 and 1 TAC §206.70 (ref. Subchapter M, Chapter 2054, Texas Government Code). To the extent Contractor becomes aware the EIRs, or any portion thereof, do not comply with the EIR Accessibility Warranty, then Contractor represents and warrants it will, at no cost to University, either (1) perform all necessary remediation to make the EIRs satisfy the EIR Accessibility Warranty or (2) replace the EIRs with new EIRs that satisfy the EIR Accessibility Warranty. If Contractor fails or is unable to do so, University may terminate this Agreement and, within thirty (30) days after termination, Contractor will refund to University all amounts University paid under this Agreement. Contractor will provide all assistance and cooperation necessary for performance of accessibility testing conducted by University or University's third party testing resources, as required by 1 TAC §213.38(g).
- 13.24 Historically Underutilized Business Subcontracting Plan. Contractor agrees to use good faith efforts to subcontract Work in accordance with the Historically Underutilized Business Subcontracting Plan (HSP) (ref. Exhibit E). Contractor agrees to maintain business records documenting its compliance with the HSP and to submit a monthly compliance report to University in the format required by Texas Procurement and Support Services Division of the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts or any successor agency (collectively, **TPSS**). Submission of compliance reports will be required as a condition for payment under this Agreement. If University determines that Contractor has failed to subcontract as set out in the HSP, University will notify Contractor of any deficiencies and give Contractor an opportunity to submit documentation and explain why the failure to comply with the HSP should not be attributed to a lack of good faith effort by Contractor. If University determines that Contractor failed to implement the HSP in good faith, University, in addition to any other remedies, may report nonperformance to the TPSS in accordance with 34 TAC §§20.101 through 20.108. University may also revoke this Agreement for breach and make a claim against Contractor.
 - 13.24.1 **Changes to the HSP.** If at any time during the Term, Contractor desires to change the HSP, before the proposed changes become effective (a) Contractor must comply with 34 TAC §20.14; (b) the changes must be

reviewed and approved by University; and (c) if University approves changes to the HSP, this Agreement must be amended in accordance with **Section 13.24** to replace the HSP with the revised subcontracting plan.

13.24.2 **Expansion of Work.** If University expands the scope of Work through a change order or any other amendment, University will determine if the additional Work contains probable subcontracting opportunities not identified in the initial solicitation for Work. If University determines additional probable subcontracting opportunities exist, Contractor will submit an amended subcontracting plan covering those opportunities. The amended subcontracting plan must comply with the provisions of 34 TAC §20.14 before (a) this Agreement may be amended to include the additional Work; or (b) Contractor may perform the additional Work. If Contractor subcontracts any of the additional subcontracting opportunities identified by University without prior authorization and without complying with 34 TAC §20.14, Contractor will be deemed to be in breach of this Agreement under **Section 8** and will be subject to any remedial actions provided by Applicable Laws, including Chapter 2161, Texas Government Code, and 34 TAC §20.14. University may report nonperformance under this Agreement to the TPSS in accordance with 34 TAC §§20.101 through 20.108.

13.25 Responsibility for Individuals Performing Work; Criminal Background Checks. Each individual who is assigned to perform Work under this Agreement will be an employee of Contractor or an employee of a subcontractor engaged by Contractor. Contractor is responsible for the performance of all individuals performing Work under this Agreement. Prior to commencing Work, Contractor will (1) provide University with a list (List) of all individuals who may be assigned to perform Work, and (2) have an appropriate criminal background screening performed on all the individuals. Contractor will determine on a case-by-case basis whether each individual assigned to perform Work is qualified to provide the services. Contractor will not knowingly assign any individual to provide services on University's campus who has a history of criminal conduct unacceptable for a university campus or healthcare center, including violent or sexual offenses. Contractor will update the List each time there is a change in the individuals assigned to perform Work.

Prior to commencing performance of Work under this Agreement, Contractor will provide University a letter signed by an authorized representative of Contractor certifying compliance with this Section. Contractor will provide University an updated certification letter each time there is a change in the individuals assigned to perform Work.

- 13.26 **Quality Assurance.** Contractor will (a) comply with all applicable standards of the Joint Commission (**Joint Commission**); (b) implement and monitor a quality assurance process that complies with Joint Commission standards; (c) comply with applicable Joint Commission privileging standards for licensed independent practitioners; (d) upon request, provide assurance to University of a licensed independent practitioner's privileging file; and (e) provide University with periodic reports of its quality assurance indicators and/or permit University to conduct periodic quality assurance audits of Work.
- Debarment. Contractor confirms that neither Contractor nor its Principals are suspended, debarred, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from the award of contracts from United States (U.S.) federal government procurement or nonprocurement programs, or are listed in the List of Parties Excluded from Federal Procurement or Nonprocurement Programs (http://www.sam.gov/) issued by the U.S. General Services Administration. "Principals" means officers, directors, owners, partners, and persons having primary management or supervisory responsibilities within a business entity (e.g. general manager, plant manager, head of a subsidiary, division or business segment, and similar positions). Contractor will provide immediate written notification to University if, at any time prior to award, Contractor learns

that this certification was erroneous when submitted or has become erroneous by reason of changed circumstances. This certification is a material representation of fact upon which reliance will be placed when University executes this Agreement. If it is later determined that Contractor knowingly rendered an erroneous certification, in addition to the other remedies available to University, University may terminate this Agreement for default by Contractor.

- 13.28 Office of Inspector General Certification. Contractor acknowledges that University is prohibited by federal regulations from allowing any employee, representative, agent or subcontractor of Contractor to work on site at University's premises or facilities if that individual is not eligible to work on federal healthcare programs including Medicare, Medicaid, or other similar federal programs. Therefore, Contractor will not assign any employee, representative, agent or subcontractor that appears on the List of Excluded Individuals issued by the United States Office of the Inspector General (OIG) to work on site at University's premises or facilities. Contractor will perform an OIG sanctions check quarterly on each of its employees, representatives, agents, and subcontractors during the time the employees, representatives, agents, or subcontractors are assigned to work on site at University's premises or facilities. Contractor acknowledges that University will require immediate removal of any employee, representative, agent, or subcontractor of Contractor assigned to work at University's premises or facilities if the employee, representative, agent, or subcontractor is found to be on the OIG's List of Excluded Individuals. The OIG's List of Excluded Individuals may be accessed through the following Internet website: http://exclusions.oig.hhs.gov/
- Access to Documents. To the extent applicable to this Agreement, in accordance with §1861(v)(I)(i) of the Social Security Act (42 USC §1395x) as amended, and the provisions of 42 CFR §420.300 et seq, Contractor will allow, during and for a period of not less than four (4) years after the expiration or termination of this Agreement, access to this Agreement and its books, documents, and records; and contracts between Contractor and its subcontractors or related organizations, including books, documents and records relating to same, by the Comptroller General of the United States, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and their duly authorized representatives.
- 13.30 **EIR Environment Specifications**. **Exhibit**, Environment Specifications, establishes specifications, representations, warranties and agreements related to the environment specifications of EIR that Contractor is providing to University under this Agreement. The specifications, representations, warranties and agreements in **Exhibit**_____, Environment Specifications, are binding on Contractor. Contractor agrees to perform Work in compliance with **Exhibit**_____, Environment Specifications.
- 13.31 Security Characteristics and Functionality of Proposer's Information Resources.

 Exhibit _____, Security Characteristics and Functionality of Proposer's Information Resources, establishes specifications, representations, warranties and agreements related to the products and services Contractor is providing to University under this Agreement. The specifications, representations, warranties and agreements in Exhibit _____, Security Characteristics and Functionality of Proposer's Information Resources, are binding on Contractor. Contractor agrees to perform Work in compliance with Exhibit _____, Security Characteristics and Functionality of Proposer's Information Resources.
- 13.32 **Project Notifications and Reports**: Contractor will, upon execution of any project addendum (**Exhibit B**) under this Agreement, send a fully executed copy to the address for the University of Texas System External Relations in which the Contractor is performing services:

13.33 Contractor Reports

In addition to the reports and deliverables required under the Agreement between the Contractor and the Institution who contracts for specific services, Contractor shall, on a quarterly basis, submit a report detailing all projects performed for any Requesting Institution, which will include the project name, project status (open / closed), total fees billed, total expenses billed, and completion date.

Contractor is aware of the Requesting Institution's Conflicts of Interest Policy and Standards of Conduct Guide, and Contractor and its employees, agents, representatives, and subcontractors understand and will comply with these policies.
Contractor is aware of <u>UTS 187</u> and understands the University's commitment to diversity in recruiting. In performing the Services, Contractor agrees to take all actions necessary to support this commitment.

POLICY ON UTILIZATION OF HISTORICALLY UNDER UTILIZED BUSINESSES (HUBs)

Introduction

In accordance with the Texas Government Code, Sections 2161.181-182 and Title 34, Section 20.13 of the Texas Administrative Code (TAC), the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System, acting through the Office of HUB Development shall make a good faith effort to utilize Historically Underutilized Businesses (HUBs) in contracts for construction services, including professional and consulting services; and commodities contracts. The HUB Rules promulgated by the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts (the "Texas Comptroller"), set forth in 34 TAC Sections 20.10-20.28, encourage the use of HUBs by implementing these policies through race, ethnic and gender-neutral means.

The purpose of the HUB Program is to promote full and equal business opportunities for all business in State contracting in accordance with the following goals as specified in the State of Texas Disparity Study:

- 11.2% for heavy construction other than building contracts;
- 21.1% for all building construction, including general contractors and operative builder's contracts;
- 32.9% for all special trade construction contracts;
- 23.7% for professional services contracts;
- 26% for all other services contracts, and
- 21.1% for commodities contracts.

The University of Texas System shall make a good faith effort to meet or exceed the above stated goals to assist HUBs in receiving a portion of the total contract value of all contracts that UT System expects to award in a fiscal year. The University of Texas System may achieve the annual program goals by contracting directly with HUBs or indirectly through subcontracting opportunities in accordance with the Texas Government Code, chapter 2161, Subchapter F.

SUMMARY OF REQUIREMENTS Historically Underutilized Business (HUBs) Subcontracting Plan (HSP)

It is the policy of The University of Texas System and each of its component institutions, to promote and encourage contracting and subcontracting opportunities for Historically Underutilized Businesses (HUBs) in all contracts. Accordingly, UT System has adopted "EXHIBIT H, Policy on Utilization of Historically Underutilized Businesses". The policy applies to all contracts with an expected value of \$100,000 or more. The Board of Regents of The University of Texas System is the contracting authority.

- In all contracts for professional services, contracting services, and/or commodities with an expected value of \$100,000 or more, The University of Texas System, "UT System" or the "University" will indicate in the purchase solicitation (e.g. RFQ, RFP, or CSP) whether or not subcontracting opportunities are probable in connection with the contract. A HUB Subcontracting Plan is a required element of the architect, contractor or vendor Response to the purchase solicitation. The HUB Subcontracting Plan shall be developed and administered in accordance with the Policy. Failure to submit a required HUB Subcontracting Plan (HSP) will result in rejection of the Response.
- 2. If <u>subcontracting opportunities are probable</u> UT System will declare such probability in its invitations for bids, requests for proposals, or other purchase solicitation documents, and shall require submission of the appropriate HUB Subcontracting Plan with the Response.
 - a. When <u>subcontracting opportunities are probable</u>, and the Respondent proposes to subcontract any part of the work, the Respondent shall submit a HUB Subcontracting Plan as prescribed by the Texas Comptroller identifying subcontractors [34 TAC §20.14 (d) (1)(A)(B)(C)(D) (2) (3)(A)(B)(C)(D)(E)(F) (4)(A)(B)].
 - b. When <u>subcontracting opportunities are probable</u>, but the Respondent can perform such opportunities with its employees and resources, the Respondent's HUB Subcontracting Plan shall include **Section 3**-Self Performance [34 TAC §20.14 (d) (5) (A) (B) (C) (D)].
- 3. If <u>subcontracting opportunities are not probable</u> UT System will declare such probability in its invitations or bids, requests for proposals, or other purchase solicitation documents and shall require submission of the appropriate HUB Subcontracting Plan with the Response.
 - a. When <u>subcontracting opportunities are not probable</u>, and the Respondent proposes to perform all the work with its employees and resources, the Respondent shall submit a HUB Subcontracting Plan that includes **Section 3 Self Performance Justification**.
 - b. When <u>subcontracting opportunities are not probable</u>, but the Respondent proposes to subcontract any part of the work, the Respondent shall submit a **HUB Subcontracting Plan as prescribed by the Texas Comptroller** identifying subcontractors.
- 4. Respondents shall follow, but are not limited to, procedures listed in the Policy when developing a HUB Subcontracting Plan.
- 5. **Competitive Sealed Proposals (CSP):** Respondents shall submit a HUB Subcontracting Plan (packaged separately) twenty-four (24) hours following the Response submission date and time or as prescribed by the project manager. Submit one (1) original and one (1) PDF copy on CD, DVD, or flash drive of the HUB Subcontracting Plan (HSP).
- 6. In making a determination whether a good faith effort has been made in the development of the required HUB Subcontracting Plan, UT System shall follow the procedures listed in the Policy. If accepted by the

University, the HUB Subcontracting Plan shall become a provision of the Respondent's contract with UT System.

<u>Revisions necessary to clarify and enhance information submitted in the original HUB subcontracting plan may be</u> <u>made in an effort to determine good faith effort.</u> Any revisions after the submission of the HSP shall be approved by the HUB Coordinator.

- 7. **Design Build (DB) and Construction Manager @ Risk (CM@R) responses:** Respondents to a "design build" or "construction manager-at-risk" purchase solicitation shall include the Letter of HUB Commitment in their Response attesting that the Respondent has read and understands the Policy on Historically Underutilized Businesses (HUBs), and a HUB Subcontracting Plan for all preconstruction and construction services including a HUB Subcontracting Plan as prescribed by the Texas Comptroller specific to construction services identifying first, second and third tier subcontractors. Respondents proposing to perform Part 1 preconstruction services with their own resources and employees shall submit, as part of their HSP, the Self Performance Justification. Submit one (1) original and one (1) PDF copy on CD, DVD, or flash drive of the HUB Subcontracting Plan (HSP).
- 8. **DB and CM@R HUB Contract Requirements:** Contractors engaged under design-build and construction manager-at-risk contracts shall submit a HUB Subcontracting Plan for all preconstruction and construction Phase Services, and, must further comply with the requirements of this Policy by developing and submitting a HUB Subcontracting Plan for each bid package issued in buying out the guaranteed maximum or lump sum price of the project. The HSP shall identify first, second and third tier subcontractors.
- The University of Texas System shall reject any Response that does not include a fully completed HSP as required.
 An incomplete HUB Subcontracting Plan is considered a material failure to comply with the solicitation for proposals.
- 10. Changes to the HUB Subcontracting Plan: Once a Respondent's HSP is accepted by UT System and becomes a provision of the contract between Respondent and UT System, the Respondent can only change that HSP if (a) the Respondent complies with 34 TAC Section 20.14; (b) the Respondent provides its proposed changes to UT System for review; (c) UT System (including UT System's HUB Coordinator) approves Respondent's proposed changes to its HSP; and (d) UT System and the Respondent amend their contract (in writing signed by authorized officials of both parties) in order to replace the contract's existing HSP with a revised HSP containing the changes approved by UT System.
- 11. **Expansion of Work:** If, after entering into a contract with a Respondent as a result of a purchase solicitation subject to the Policy, UT System wishes to expand the scope of work that the Respondent will perform under that contract through a change order or any other contract amendment (the "additional work"), UT System will determine if the additional work contains probable subcontracting opportunities not identified in the initial purchase solicitation for that contract. If UT System determines that probable subcontracting opportunities exist for the additional work, then the Respondent must submit to UT System an amended HUB Subcontracting Plan covering those opportunities that complies with the provisions of 34 TAC Section
 - 20.14. Such an amended HSP must be approved by UT System and the Respondent (including UT System's HUB Coordinator) before (a) the contract may be amended by UT System and the Respondent to include the additional work and the amended HSP and (b) the Respondent performs the additional work. If a Respondent subcontracts any of the additional subcontracting opportunities identified by UT System for any additional work (i) without complying with 34 TAC Section 20.14 or (ii) before UT System and that Respondent amend their contract to include a revised HSP that authorizes such subcontracting, then the Respondent will be deemed to be in breach of its contract with UT System. As a result of such breach, UT System will be entitled to terminate its contract with the Respondent, and the Respondent will be subject to any remedial actions provided by Texas law, including those set forth in Chapter 2161, Texas Government Code, and 34 TAC

Section 20.14. The University may report a Respondent's nonperformance under a contract between that Respondent and UT System to the Texas Comptroller in accordance with 34 TAC Sections 20.10 through 20.18.

- 12. A Response may state that the Respondent intends to perform all the subcontracting opportunities with its own employees and resources in accordance with the Policy. However, if such a Respondent enters into a contract with UT System as a result of such a Response but later desires to subcontract any part of the work set forth in that contract, before the Respondent subcontracts such work it must first change its HUB Subcontracting Plan in accordance with the provisions of Section 10 above.
- 13. The University of Texas System shall require a professional services firm, contractor or vendor to whom a contract has been awarded to report the identity and the amount paid to its subcontractors on a monthly basis using a HUB Subcontracting Plan (HSP) Prime Contractor Progress Assessment Report (PAR) as a condition for payment.
- 14. If the University of Texas System determines that the successful Respondent failed to implement an approved HUB Subcontracting Plan in good faith, UT System, in addition to any other remedies, may report nonperformance to the Texas Comptroller in accordance with 34 TAC Section 20.14, (g) (1) related remedies of nonperformance to professional services firms, contractor and vendor implementation of the HSP.
- 15. In the event of any conflict between this "Summary of Requirements" and the remainder of the HUB Policy, the remainder of the HUB Policy will control.
