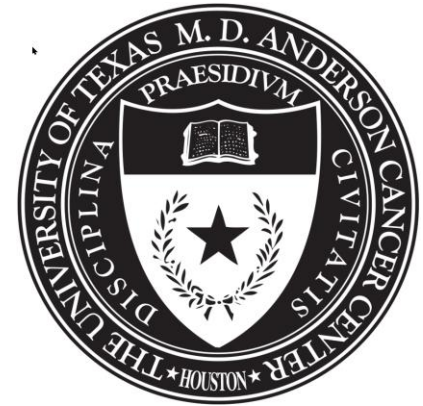

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The University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center was created in 1941 as part of The University of Texas System and became one of the nation's original three comprehensive cancer centers designated by the National Cancer Act of 1971. UT MD Anderson is one of the world's most respected centers devoted exclusively to cancer patient care, research, education and prevention. Its sole mission is to end cancer for patients and their families around the world.

The institution is in central Houston in the Texas Medical Center and provides cancer care at several locations throughout the Greater Houston Area while collaborating with hospitals, health systems and organizations across the U.S. and around the world to advance our mission to end cancer. U.S. News & World Report's "Best Hospitals" rankings have named UT MD Anderson the nation's top hospital for cancer care in 2026. The institution has been named one of the nation's top two hospitals for cancer care every year since the survey began in 1990.

Magnitude of the Cancer Problem

Cancer is the second most common cause of death in the United States. While cancer strikes at any age, 88% of all cancers occur in people aged 50 and older. Over 150,000 Texans are estimated to be newly diagnosed with cancer in 2025 and approximately 45,000 Texans are estimated to die of the disease this year.

According to the American Cancer Society, an estimated 18.5 million Americans are living with a history of surviving cancer. The five-year survival rate for all forms of cancer combined has risen to 70%, up significantly from 49% in the 1970s. As a result, more Americans are living longer after a cancer diagnosis and require ongoing medical care. Even for those not cured, advances in prevention, early detection and treatment have extended survival, increasing the need for long-term healthcare resources and follow-up.

Institutional Strategy

UT MD Anderson continues to execute its strategic plan, launched in 2021, which aspires to maximize our impact on humanity to finally end cancer. Anchored in three themes of Reach, Breakthroughs, and Value, our strategic outcomes from FY25 demonstrate strong momentum and progress. The Strategy is supported by the institution's Financial Plan, one of four integrated pillars of UT MD Anderson's Strategic Direction.

Reach: Make it easier for the patients and communities we serve to access our expertise to ultimately prevent disease and improve health.

UT MD Anderson aims to increase the number of Texans served by broadening our reach throughout the Texas Medical Center, Greater Houston, and Texas. We have sustained our virtual reach to patients in and beyond Houston, with virtual visits now accounting for 22% of all patient visits. With the support of a historic philanthropic gift, we began serving a subset of patients at Kinder Children's Cancer Center, a joint venture of UT MD Anderson and Texas Children's, with the goal to expand access to pediatric cancer care and clinical trials for more families. We have also secured approval for a new state-of-the-art patient care building, and opened a Colorectal Center, which brings specialized colorectal cancer care together in one integrated location at a moment when cases of young onset colorectal cancer continue to climb.

Breakthroughs: Drive high-impact discovery research focused on unmet medical needs and accelerate translation into meaningful improvements in health outcomes, strengthening UT MD Anderson's position as the nation's leading cancer center and a global leader in cancer research.

In FY 2025, our scientific experts published more than 3,300 peer-reviewed articles, including 406 in high-impact journals, and shared their discoveries at major oncology conferences around the world. UT MD Anderson's academic programs saw record enrollment as we trained the next generation of oncology professionals. Our Therapeutics Discovery team forged partnerships with biotechnology leaders in Artificial Intelligence (AI) drug discovery, integrating generative AI and deep learning

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into UT MD Anderson's data ecosystem. These collaborations have exemplified the difference between AI-informed drug design versus traditional approaches. The first AI-designed programs have accelerated timelines with nomination of new drug candidates in 2026, followed by testing in clinical trials at UT MD Anderson in early 2027. With the rapid acceleration of AI, UT MD Anderson is continuing to harness its transformative potential while ensuring the highest standards of safety, reliability and efforts include the institution's collaboration alongside the UT System and its network of healthcare institutions to establish UT REAL HEALTH AI.

Value: Set new standards for high-touch, high-value cancer care.

In 2025, UT MD Anderson received a five-star rating from Vizient, the nation's leading healthcare performance improvement organization. Achieving this distinction for the fifth consecutive year exemplifies the institution's commitment to Quality and Safety. Our teams continue to focus on driving "high touch, high value" care through the implementation of initiatives such as goal concordant care, enabling empathic conversations with patients and their families with nearly 75% of patients completing advanced care planning by their third visit. With a goal of elevating the patient's experience, the institution expanded its Patient Navigation program to remove barriers to care and ensure each patient felt informed and supported, from referral to survivorship and every step in between. In FY 2025, UT MD Anderson's 200 navigators supported more than 36,000 patients at every stage of their care. Finally, UT MD Anderson launched its Urgent Symptom Clinic, a center for medically stable adult patients who need same-day or next-day evaluation and treatment, which quickly become a vital part of how it cares for our patients, serving about 200 patients a month. With a new self-scheduling capability, the clinic offers peace of mind and flexibility to patients when they need it the most.

Mission Overview

Patient Care

In 2025, more than 197,000 patients sought care at UT MD Anderson and over 37,000 of them were new patients. Over 10,700 patients participated in therapeutic clinical research exploring novel treatments, the largest cancer program in the nation.

The institution is accredited by the Joint Commission, an organization that ensures patients receive the best and safest healthcare possible. UT MD Anderson is among a select group of hospitals nationwide who have earned six consecutive Magnet Recognition Program® designations from the American Nurses Credentialing Center. This designation recognizes exceptional professional nursing staff and the ways their practice translates into excellent patient care and quality outcomes.

A significant challenge for UT MD Anderson is managing growth amid increasing patient demand. The institution must balance the number of patients with the resources available to care for them while accounting for the rising costs of healthcare. In FY 2025, UT MD Anderson provided \$415 million in uncompensated care to uninsured and underinsured patients.

The Legislature provides funding to support UT MD Anderson's primary mission of patient care. It established the Cancer Center Operations Formula designed to support the institution's growth in patient care in the same way that the current Health-Related Institutions (HRI) Instruction and Operations (I&O) Formula supports student growth for HRI. Based on Texas cancer patients served each year, the maximum increase in the Operations Formula cannot exceed the average increase in the I&O Formula for all HRI. Sustaining this critical support, which recognizes UT MD Anderson's unique mission, is the institution's highest budget priority.

Research

Significant Research Accomplishments

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Our researchers are reshaping how scientists understand cancer – not simply as a disease driven by mutated cells, but as a complex and dynamic system influenced by early cellular changes surrounding tissues and even microbes. As the field focuses on tumor ecosystems rather than individual cancer cells, our investigators are leading discoveries that are transforming cancer prevention, detection, and treatment.

In late 2024, a group of researchers found that in healthy women, some seemingly healthy breast cells may contain abnormalities typically associated with invasive breast cancer. By analyzing breast tissue from 49 healthy women, the researchers found that at least 3% of otherwise normal cells contained gains or losses of entire chromosomes. These altered cells expanded and accumulated with age. The findings question conventional thinking on the genetic origins of breast cancer, impacting early cancer detection methods, and were published in Nature.

Another team advanced our understanding of tumor ecosystems by studying more than 14 million cells across 10 different cancer types. Instead of looking at cells individually, they examined where each cell sits and interacts with nearby cells inside a tumor.

Their work focused on cancer-associated fibroblasts, support cells that help shape the tumor environment. The researchers found that distinct spatial patterns of these cells were linked to different aspects of tumor growth, treatment response, and disease progression.

To support this work, the team developed a computational tool capable of identifying and analyzing these cellular patterns, making it easier to study tumors as integrated biological systems rather than collections of individual cells. This work was published in Cancer Cell and makes way for smarter, more personalized care, and led to the establishment of the Center for Cellular Language Intelligence in May 2026.

A third team discovered how bacteria can drive treatment resistance in patients with oral and colorectal cancer. Their work showed how certain bacteria can manipulate the immune system in ways that allow tumor cells to evade detection and resist chemotherapy. The study, published in Cancer Cell, in October 2025 and opened the door to designing smarter therapies that could make even the toughest cancers more treatable.

The Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas (CPRIT) has played a transformative role in advancing this work at UT MD Anderson by strengthening faculty recruitment, expanding research funding, supporting critical prevention, outreach, research and infrastructure programs. Over the past two years, CPRIT support has helped recruit 13 new faculty members, including internationally recognized leaders and emerging stars in immunotherapy, protein biology, drug discovery, and the cancer microbiome.

Since FY24, our faculty has been awarded more than \$89 million in CPRIT-supported research funding to advance both individual investigator-driven projects and large collaborative efforts, including through programs such as the Multi-Investigator Research Award. CPRIT investments have also fueled major prevention and outreach initiatives across Texas, including lung cancer screening programs in Northeast Texas, tobacco-free workplace initiatives, colorectal and cervical cancer screening efforts, and expanded mammography and genetic evaluation services.

In research, CPRIT funding has enabled innovative studies spanning therapeutic resistance in acute myeloid leukemia, novel adoptive T-cell therapies for melanoma, epithelial biology in pancreatic cancer progression, engineering approaches to overcome barriers to CAR-T therapy, AI applications for radiotherapy planning, and strategies to intercept early-stage lung cancer by targeting high-risk nodules.

Beyond individual discoveries, CPRIT has helped establish and expand critical shared research resources, including the Advanced Spatial Genomics Core Facility and

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the Texas Decision Science Core Facility. These investments strengthen collaboration across disciplines, accelerate scientific discovery, and enhance cancer research capabilities both at UT MD Anderson and throughout the Texas Medical Center ecosystem.

The James P. Allison Institute & The Institute for Data Science in Oncology & The Institute for Cell Therapy Discovery & Innovation

The James P. Allison Institute

In 2022, The University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center launched the James P. Allison Institute™, a research and innovation hub designed to foster groundbreaking science, develop new treatments and support the next generation of researchers as they pursue the promise of immune-based therapies. The Institute builds upon the legacy of its namesake, James P. Allison, Ph.D., a CPRIT-supported recruit, who was awarded the 2018 Nobel Prize in Physiology of Medicine for his fundamental discoveries in T-cell biology and his invention of ipilimumab, the first immune checkpoint inhibitor to treat cancer. Since then, the Allison Institute™ has established itself as a leader in immunotherapy research, extending its reach across scientific disciplines and geographic boundaries.

The Institute for Data Science in Oncology

The Institute for Data Science in Oncology (IDSO) advances our mission by transforming complex clinical and research data into insights that improve patient outcomes, operational efficiency, and scientific discovery. Over the last biennium, IDSO strengthened its national leadership through new initiatives in Decision Analytics, AI-enabled clinical trial design, and emerging AI-robotics research, while establishing UT MD Anderson as the global hub for cancer digital twins through the Faster Cures Program and the annual Digital Twins Summit. The Joint Center for Computational Oncology advanced statewide innovation with 25 funded pilot projects, including three new awards, and supported four postdoctoral fellows. IDSO launched the Cancer Data and Decision Science Graduate Program, the first interdisciplinary degree of its kind, and continues to expand its footprint at TMC3, grow its community of 67 affiliates, recruit over 15 new faculty, and sustain a robust Fellows Program with 18 active fellows and 36 alumni.

The Institute for Cell Therapy Discovery and Innovation

Founded in 2024, the Institute for Cell Therapy Discovery and Innovation was established to advance transformative cell-based therapies through the integration of expertise in NK-cell biology (immune cells), cancer immunology, and clinical translation. The Institute serves as a collaborative hub for the development, manufacturing, and clinical advancement of next-generation cellular immunotherapies designed to improve the outcomes for patients with cancer and other serious diseases. Since its founding, the Institute has expanded its translational and clinical research enterprise through a highly collaborative institutional model that now includes 21 clinical principal investigators across UT MD Anderson. This network has enabled the growth of clinical trials spanning early-phase investigator-initiated studies to multicenter translational programs, with additional trial funding awards to support a Phase 1 study evaluating allogeneic CAR T-cell therapy for T-cell lymphomas, while also providing approximately \$560,000 in seed funding for early-stage translational research focused on emerging therapeutic strategies including CAR-NK therapies, NK-cell modulation, and bispecific cellular therapies (cell therapies engineered to recognize multiple disease targets).

The Institute continues to strengthen UT MD Anderson's leadership in cell and gene therapy through operational excellence in regulatory development, manufacturing innovation, and institutional collaboration. Coordinated efforts among scientific, regulatory, manufacturing, and clinical teams have streamlined FDA submission processes and allowed the transition of novel cellular therapies from preclinical development into clinical evaluation. Looking ahead, the Institute is investing in next-generation closed-system manufacturing technologies to improve scalability, product consistency, and manufacturing reliability for future CAR-NK cell production platforms. In parallel, the Institute is working with institutional leadership on the development of a vector manufacturing facility within the UT MD Anderson Zayed

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Building, which will complement existing GMP manufacturing infrastructure and further position UT MD Anderson as a comprehensive center for the development and manufacturing of cell and gene therapies.

The Institute is deeply grateful to the Texas Legislature for the \$30 million appropriated during the 89th Legislative Session, which has enabled the rapid advancement of these innovative technologies, manufacturing capabilities, and clinical research programs.

Given the state's expected revenue limitations next biennium, the institution decided not to request another exceptional item for the Institute. Instead, UT MD Anderson is requesting Unexpended Balance authority for the FY 2028 – 29 biennium. If allowed, the Cell Therapy Institute would like to spend the remaining funds over the next three fiscal years to better demonstrate return on the investment and the impact of the state appropriation on the Institute's research efforts and strong patient outcomes in this very promising area.

Education

In FY 2025, over 5,900 trainees took part in educational programs, including physicians, scientists, nurses, and many health professionals. UT MD Anderson offers degrees in ten bachelor's programs and three master's programs in allied health disciplines in its School of Health Professions, educating 386 students. Notably, 90% of surveyed graduates remained in Texas, working in hospitals and diagnostic laboratories – an area of critical need as demand for allied health professionals continues to grow.

More than 1,600 clinical residents and fellows come to UT MD Anderson each year to receive specialized training in the investigation and treatment of cancer. More than 400 graduate students are working on advanced degrees at the Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences, which UT MD Anderson operates jointly with UT Health. In addition, over 1,176 research trainees are taught in UT MD Anderson's laboratories. The School of Health Professions relocated to a newly renovated space within the 1MC Building in the TMC. The project included a renovation of approximately 135,000 square feet across three floors to create modern classrooms, teaching laboratories, and administrative space that will continue to support the continued growth of its allied health education programs. The project is expected to reach operational occupancy in 2026, enhancing UT MD Anderson's capacity to train the next generation of health professionals.

Prevention

Cancer prevention is central to the mission of UT MD Anderson Cancer Center to end cancer. Through its Division of Cancer Prevention and Populations Sciences, UT MD Anderson advances research on the biological, genetic, environmental, behavioral, and social drivers of cancer, translating these insights into evidence-based strategies that reduce risk and improve outcomes.

In Fiscal Year 2025, the Lydia Hill Cancer Prevention Center delivered 48,652 patient visits for screening and risk-reduction services, while 6,454 individuals received tobacco cessation support through the Tobacco Research and Treatment Program.

Tobacco use remains a leading cause of preventable death, responsible for about 30% of U.S. cancer deaths and nearly 500,000 deaths annually. UT MD Anderson's EndTobacco® initiative addresses this burden through coordinated efforts in policy, education, and community-based services.

Human Resources and Facilities

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UT MD Anderson Cancer Center is the largest freestanding cancer center in the world, with 26,892 employees which includes 2,058 faculty members. The institution continues to be recognized as a leading workplace, earning placement on Forbes' lists of America's Best Employers and Best Employers for Women, and consistently ranking among the nation's best places to work by Glassdoor. UT MD Anderson also has been recognized among the Healthiest Employers in Texas and has received Gold-level distinction from the American Heart Association for its commitment to employee wellness and workplace culture.

Our facilities within the Texas Medical Center span more than 16 million square feet, supporting world-class patient care, research, prevention, and education.

UT MD Anderson continues to expand access to high-quality cancer care across Texas through strategic collaborations. In partnership with The University of Texas at Austin, the institution is advancing plans to partner with the University as part of the UT Austin Medical Center, integrating clinical care, research, and education to serve patients across Central Texas.

In addition, UT MD Anderson and Texas Children's Hospital are working together to end childhood cancer by joining forces to create the Kinder Children's Cancer Center. Our goal is to expand access to pediatric cancer care and clinical trials for more families. The new joint program will provide care to patients at Texas Children's within the Texas Medical Center. A new building for the Kinder Children's Cancer Center is planned.

In 2021, UT MD Anderson received \$70 million in Capital Construction Assistance projects (CCAP) revenue bond support for its dedicated research facility in the innovation hub. If the state considers CCAP's in the 90th Texas Legislature, we respectfully request consideration of funding support the construction of an integrated education and research space on the Legacy Campus to expand clinical training, workforce development and advance translational and clinical research. The program enhances simulation and procedural training, supports clinical trials and research aligned with patient care, and strengthens the Texas healthcare workforce pipeline while improving patient outcomes.

Significant Achievements

UT MD Anderson's faculty is one of the most esteemed in the nation, including 1 Nobel Laureate, 9 members of the National Academy of Medicine, 8 National Academy

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of Sciences members, 6 American Academy of Arts and Sciences members and 54 American Association for the Advancement of Science fellows, 23 Association of American Physician members and 37 American Society of Clinical Investigation members.

The Historically Underutilized Business (HUB) and Federal Small Business Program in FY2025 achieved a significant milestone, surpassing \$261MM HUB expenditures for the year. This is a testament to our unwavering commitment to the HUB Community. UT MD Anderson received the Supplier Diversity Champion Award from the Subcontractors USA-Texas in both 2024 and 2025 and was further recognized as an Opportunity Champion in 2026. In addition, the program's director was honored with the Greater Houston Business Procurement Forum Award of Merit in 2025 for her outstanding advocacy, leadership, and support of diverse business communities. These achievements underscore the institution's continued commitment to advancing inclusive procurement practices and expanding opportunities for HUB and small business participation.

State Support

General Revenue

The General Revenue (GR) appropriation of more than \$257 million in FY2026 remains a foundational component of UT MD Anderson's ability to deliver mission-driven patient care, research and education for the benefit of Texas. The institutional request for the FY2028-29 biennium reflects approved baseline funding levels except debt service associated with existing bond authorizations. The institution appreciates the Legislature's continued support in maintaining formula funding levels that have supported growth across the state and requests consideration of continued formula funding support during the upcoming legislative session. In FY2025, the institution generated \$36.4 in additional funding for cancer care, education and research for every \$1 of GR received, and \$44.10 in research support for every \$1 of state research formula funding, demonstrating a strong return on investment for Texas.

Tobacco Settlement Funds

The Legislature established a permanent \$100 million endowment for UT MD Anderson in 1999. The fund provided \$8.0 million in FY 2026 for tobacco-related research programs. A separate endowment created by the Legislature called the Permanent Health Fund for all HRIs provided the institution with \$2.9 million for these purposes, for a total of \$10.9 million. The following programs received settlement funds in FY 2026: \$7.5 million for Cancer Prevention initiatives including: Tobacco Treatment Program; Tobacco Research and Treatment Program; Tobacco Research and Treatment training program; EndTobacco® Program; and Cancer Prevention & Control Platform. It also provides \$0.7 million for Breast Medical Oncology, Imaging Physics, and \$2.7 million for Research Equipment.

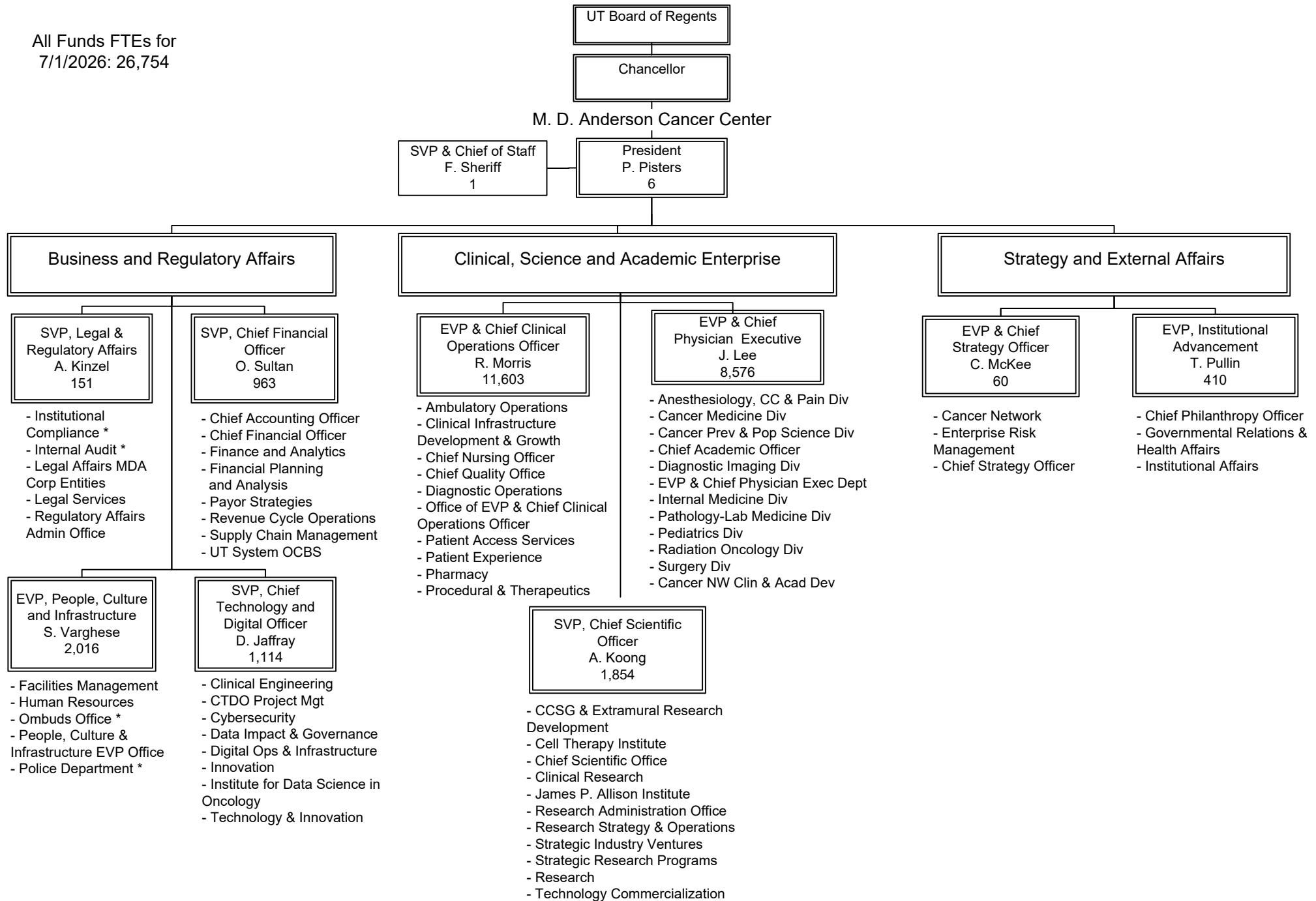
Required Statement on Criminal History

The program includes simulation-based procedural training, interdisciplinary education space, and embedded research environments supporting clinical trials, specimen processing, and translational science.

Directly supports state, institutional, and UT System priorities by expanding healthcare workforce capacity, improving access to specialized oncology care, and advancing research and innovation. Aligns with MD Anderson's Legacy Campus strategy and Patient Care Building 1 (1PC) development to integrate education, research, and clinical care. Increases training throughput, reduces time to competency, and strengthens Texas' position as a national leader in cancer care, clinical trials, and workforce development while supporting recruitment and retention of high-demand specialties.

B. Assessment of Attainment of HUB Procurement Goals

Attainment:

FY24: The institution exceeded its projected goals in the Special Trade, Other Services, and Commodities categories. However, performance fell below projected goals in the Building Construction and Professional Services categories.

FY25: The institution exceeded its projected goals in the Building Construction, Special Trade Construction, Professional Services, and Other Services categories. However, performance fell below the projected goal in the Commodities category.

Applicability:

The "Heavy Construction" category was not applicable to agency operations in either FY2024 or FY2025.

Factors Affecting Attainment:

UT MD Anderson Cancer Center continues to face unique challenges in achieving the statewide HUB goals due to its highly specialized mission of cancer patient care, research, education, and prevention. Significant expenditures for pharmaceuticals, medical devices, laboratory supplies, scientific instrumentation, and specialized healthcare services limit the availability of qualified HUB-certified suppliers. In addition, the institution relies extensively on group purchasing organization (GPO) contracts, strategic sourcing initiatives, and sole-source manufacturers to ensure continuity of patient care, research operations, regulatory compliance, and best-value procurement practices.

Despite these challenges, UT MD Anderson strengthened its HUB Program through expanded outreach initiatives, supplier education programs, business matchmaking events, increased engagement with Sourcing and Contract Management staff, and enhanced subcontracting oversight. The institution also implemented process improvements to strengthen compliance, transparency, data integrity, and reporting capabilities; positioning the program for continued growth in HUB

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utilization opportunities.

C. Good-Faith Efforts to Increase HUB Participation

Outreach Efforts and Mentor-Protégé Programs:

During FY2024 and FY2025, UT MD Anderson continued to invest in HUB supplier education, development, and capacity-building initiatives to increase the competitiveness of HUB-certified firms seeking institutional contracting opportunities. The institution expanded HUB Program resources by adding a HUB Coordinator position, increased Sourcing and Contract Management staff engagement through HUB-focused outreach goals, and implemented technology enhancements that streamlined regulatory, UT System, and state reporting requirements.

The institution also supported HUB business development through participation in the State of Texas Mentor-Protégé Program. A formal mentor-protégé relationship was established between CDW Government LLC and Tanches Global Management, Inc. This partnership was designed to enhance the protégé firm's operational capacity, business development capabilities, and long-term competitiveness for state and institutional contracting opportunities. Additionally, the HUB Program secured more than 25 speaking engagements with chambers of commerce, business advocacy organizations, and community partners.

HUB Program Staffing:

"The UT MD Anderson HUB Program consists of a Director, Program Manager, and HUB Coordinator dedicated to increasing HUB participation, ensuring regulatory compliance, supporting supplier development, and enhancing institutional reporting and outreach efforts.

The Director provides strategic leadership and oversight for the HUB Program, including planning, policy implementation, compliance monitoring, stakeholder engagement, and collaboration with institutional leadership, sourcing teams, advocacy organizations, and community partners.

The Program Manager oversees HUB reporting, audit support, training initiatives, mentor-protégé activities, supplier education efforts, and federal small business compliance requirements, while serving as a key liaison to sourcing and contracting teams.

The HUB Coordinator manages HUB compliance activities, HUB Subcontracting Plan reviews, second-tier reporting oversight, certification verification, data monitoring, and related program administration activities that support institutional HUB goals and reporting requirements. "

Current and Future Good-Faith Efforts:

MD Anderson continues to conduct a positive and proactive HUB outreach, solicitation, and development program designed to create opportunities and promote HUB participation and utilization in all its procurement processes. Normal distribution of the current bid list to advocacy groups, including Houston Minority Supplier Development Council, Women's Business Enterprise Alliance, Houston Minority Business Administration, and local trade centers for dissemination to their memberships to increase HUB bid participation. In addition, the institution hosted "How to Do Business with MD Anderson" sessions and business matchmaking events that connected HUB-certified firms with prime contractors, sourcing professionals, and key institutional stakeholders. UT MD Anderson remains committed to making a good-faith effort to increase purchases from and contract awards to HUB-certified firms in support of the State of Texas HUB Program objectives and economic development initiatives.

(2) Mission:

The Institute for Cell Therapy Discovery and Innovation at MD Anderson is dedicated to advancing innovative cell therapies for patients with cancer. Cell therapy is a unique form of immunotherapy which bolsters the body's immune system to attack cancer cells. MD Anderson has developed a novel form of the treatment using Natural Killer (NK) cells, which has fewer side effects and the capability to produce "off-the-shelf" products, increasing accessibility and reducing the costs of treatment. Our goal is to expand our capabilities beyond umbilical cord-blood derived NK cells to induced pluripotent stem cells (iPSCs), which are reprogrammed adult stem cells able to turn into many different cell types. Our aim is to deliver targeted cell therapies to patients with cancer that are safe and highly effective. We will accomplish this by leveraging our existing platform to develop novel cell therapies to address the unique challenges presented by different cancer types, thus providing patient benefit and maintaining our global leadership in cell therapy.

(3) (a) Major Accomplishments to Date:

1. The Institute has built an integrated portfolio of cell therapy platforms, including CAR-NK cells, dual CAR-NK cells for glioblastoma, T-cell receptor (TCR) -engineered cells, Pluriceptor technologies and CRISPR gene-editing platforms. These programs use engineering tools to train immune cells to better recognize, attack or regulate disease. The Institute has activated 20 clinical trials and is on track to open 5 additional trials by the end of CY 2026, expanding access to innovative therapies across multiple cancers.
2. Building on its cancer expertise, the Institute has also opened its first autoimmune cell therapy trial and is enrolling patients with lupus and systemic sclerosis in collaboration with UTHealth Houston.
3. The Institute serves as the central supplier of rimiducid, a drug that activates a built-in safety switch in engineered cells if serious toxicity occurs. MD Anderson acquired access to this platform to support safer clinical translation and multicenter studies.
4. State funding has also supported critical capital infrastructure, including manufacturing capacity, specialized equipment, quality systems and process-development capabilities.
5. The Pipeline Review Committee is fully established and has provided more than \$500,000 in seed funding for translational studies across MD Anderson, as well as \$3 million awarded through a competitive internal RFA to support a CAR-T clinical trial.

(3) (b) Major Accomplishments Expected During the Next 2 Years:

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1. The Institute will advance promising therapies from early-phase studies toward multicenter clinical trials by strengthening manufacturing, regulatory, contracting and operational infrastructure. The first multicenter trial is targeted for summer 2027 and is expected to support what could become the first academic-led registrational CAR-NK cell trial. If successful, this program could generate data for FDA approval and make an affordable, off-the-shelf CAR-NK product accessible to patients in Texas and beyond.
2. The Institute will also expand beyond cord blood-derived NK cells by advancing iPSC-based technologies and engineering additional immune cell types, including T cells, macrophages and myeloid cells. These platforms will diversify the therapeutic pipeline and create renewable, scalable cell sources.
3. Major capital priorities include establishing an in-house viral vector manufacturing facility to reduce dependence on external vendors, shorten timelines, lower cost and improve supply reliability.
4. The Institute will also implement closed-system manufacturing to improve consistency, reduce contamination risk and support larger multicenter and registrational trials. Together, these efforts will build the scientific, clinical and capital foundation needed to deliver safer, scalable and more accessible cell therapies.

Failure to fund this request could delay the initiation and completion of clinical trials, ultimately slowing the delivery of potentially life-saving cell therapies to patients with urgent unmet medical needs. Without dedicated state support, these funding constraints will continue to limit the expansion of innovative cell therapies across multiple cancer types.

By scaling production, we have the potential to drive the cost of NK cell therapy down from a current average cost of \$250,000 per dose to as little as one-tenth that cost. MD Anderson has established the best-in-practice manufacturing process for off-the-shelf NK cell therapy that is accomplished in 15 days. This much quicker process relative to our competitors also allows for scaling, so we can reach populations of patients who otherwise would not have been able benefit from this treatment.

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Cord Blood & Cellular Therapy Research Program**(1) Year Non-Formula Support Item First Funded:** 2002

(2) Mission:

Funding currently supports the Cord Blood Bank and Good Manufacturing Laboratory (GMP) with the development and management of critical research protocols for cord blood transplantation and other cellular therapies, including rapid and exciting developments of chimeric antigen receptor (CAR) T cell therapy and CAR natural killer (NK) cell treatments for hematologic and solid tumors. These novel therapeutic approaches harness the body's own immune system to effectively fight cancers by killing abnormal cells. Umbilical cord blood provides a source of adult stem cells for transplant for minority patients who often have no registered donors. MD Anderson serves an unmet need as 72% of the cord blood units in the bank are of Hispanic, Black or Asian origin and the institution finds units for patients that otherwise would not have donors.

(3) (a) Major Accomplishments to Date:

More than 164,000 cord blood units have been collected from 15 hospitals, and 3,324 of those units have been transplanted into patients with no other therapeutic options. This repository has allowed the team to pioneer the use of novel cord blood-derived cells for cancer treatment. Katy Rezvani MD PhD has developed genetically manipulated cord blood natural killer cells to express a chimeric antigen receptor (CAR) targeting CD19+ tumors. These CAR-NK cells produce impressive responses in leukemia (CLL) and lymphoma patients with no toxicity and an overall response rate of 87%. These results will likely change the movement toward standard of care for patients with otherwise fatal cancers, Elizabeth Shpall MD has developed strategies to expand cord blood hematopoietic cells (stem cells that create all the different blood and immune cells) in the laboratory to make the doses higher and thus the recovery faster when transplanted into patients. Both strategies have demonstrated more rapid recovery, making transplants safer from infections and bleeding. Her team is also developing cord blood tissue-derived support cells found in many tissues that can help repair and regulate the environment around other cells and can be lifesaving when used to treat graft versus host disease (GVHD), and have led to 15 different immunotherapy protocols targeting liquid and solid tumors for patients with diseases expressing proteins found on the surface of cancer cells.

(3) (b) Major Accomplishments Expected During the Next 2 Years:

CAR-NK-CAR cells are being developed to target other cancers including acute myelogenous leukemia, T cell leukemia and several solid tumors including brain, lungs, pancreas and ovarian cancers. We are combining cord blood expansion and fucosylation to maximally enhance the recovery time of the cells when infused into patients which may allow us to do cord blood transplants as an outpatient treatment. Cord blood tissue-derived MSCs and MSC-derived exosomes (packages sent out by repair cells to help other cells heal or communicate) will be used for the eradication of GVHD, and to treat cancer patients who have developed cardiac injury from chemotherapy and cancer patients who have developed respiratory failure. Additionally, we are developing cord tissue MSCs, and MSC-derived exosomes as vehicles to deliver gene therapy to patients with otherwise fatal tumors such as glioblastoma and pancreatic cancer. We are developing an extremely novel approach to generate umbilical cord derived megakaryocytes to make platelets which will address the global platelet shortages in Texas and the rest of the United States. In the next two years listed protocols will become trials including the proteins CD70 for refractory Hodgkin's Lymphoma and CD5 for T cell Leukemia and Lymphoma. The unique platform for umbilical cord derived megakaryocyte clinical trial has been approved by the FDA and will be moving to the clinic in the coming months.

Not funding this program would limit the ability to continue the cutting-edge research which will allow us to treat cancer patients who have very few options. This includes those with refractory cancers for whom we are developing CAR-NK-CAR therapies. It also includes cancer patients with refractory GVHD which is often fatal without MSCs as well as cancer patients with chemotherapy induced heart and lung disease, all of whom may be cured with cord blood tissue derived MSCs.

The MD Anderson Cord Blood Bank is accredited by the Foundation for the Accreditation of Cellular Therapy (FACT), accepted into the networks of the National Marrow Donor Program (NMDP) and Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and has recently received its FDA Biological license (one of 8 cord banks in the world to receive this license) which moving forward will be required to release clinical cords for transplant in the United States.

(2) Mission:

The Breast Cancer Research Program strategy funds programmatic research for Inflammatory Breast Cancer (IBC), a rare and often lethal type of breast cancer, with an incidence of 1-5% of all breast cancers but representing ~10% of breast cancer mortality. Our mission is to eliminate IBC from Texas, USA, and the world. We would like Texas to continue to be recognized as the preeminent worldwide leader fighting this rare and deadly disease.

Since the program was established in 2007, the “Morgan Welch Inflammatory Breast Cancer (IBC) Research Program and Clinic” at UT MD Anderson continues to be the global leader in diagnosis, treatment, translational research, trials, collaboration and community education and outreach for this aggressive disease.

(3) (a) Major Accomplishments to Date:

1. Increased annual volume from ~70-90 pts to ~140 pts per year in IBC multi-team and cross campus clinics as planned.
2. Patients who are treated in IBC-MTC at MD Anderson have improved local recurrence (5% compared to 20% historical) and survival outcomes (HER2+) compared to historical/previously published data
3. Expanded collaborations through partnership with Dana Farber Cancer Institute and Susan G. Komen to validate a new diagnostic tool now used in over 100 countries.
4. Expanded IBC Connect Network from 18 to 23 institutions including UT programs across Texas.
5. Optimized clinical trial portfolio to open 2 new investigator-initiated clinical trials, and 2 lab studies with 3 trials in the pipeline for ER+ IBC and HER2-IBC in 2026-27.
6. Expanded the IBC clinical database and biorepository - the world's largest registry, now > 1400 patients, drives scientific advances.
7. Obtained new grants and continued the IBC Metamorphosis platform (2 flagship projects, bench to clinical trials in 3 years), to support and accelerate breakthroughs in IBC research and treatment. The IBC Program has secured \$24.3 million in grant funding and \$1.9 million in research contract support, based on contributions from our 7 multidisciplinary IBC faculty investigators.

(3) (b) Major Accomplishments Expected During the Next 2 Years:

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1. Further expand IBC Multi-Team Clinic access across Texas, improve IBC local disease control and survival outcomes to an annual volume increase of 150 patients.
2. Expansion of IBC Clinical Research - We anticipate 4 new IBC protocols (in development) in 202-28, to be activated in 6-12 months and will complete accrual of the multicenter study with potential to revolutionize treatment of ER+ and HER2-expressing IBC in 2027 and beyond.
3. Ongoing efforts will leverage our biospecimens, strategic collaborations, and therapeutic development initiatives to drive new discoveries and research opportunities over the next biennium. We've facilitated 3 new patents for IBC discoveries and partnered with UT Austin to develop new therapeutics.
4. Expansion of IBC Research Collaborations- expand neoadjuvant study in collaboration with Dana Farber Cancer Center.
5. Create data alignment and resource-sharing opportunities to advance IBC team-science collaborations, co-develop protocols, and innovate newer modalities of care.
6. Continued improvement of community outreach efforts, patient and physician education, and electronic health record embedded education regarding IBC.
7. Continued development of roadmap to connect IBC expertise throughout the MDA and UT System across the State of Texas to enhance trial access and accelerate discovery to reduce the number of patients who suffer with IBC.

In the absence of state funding, we would not be able to support the infrastructure for advancing new science and trials, and be unable to continue educating and supporting IBC communities and institutional collaborators.

IBC has a median overall survival of only 4.75 years compared to 13.4 years for non-IBC patients. The median age of patients diagnosed with IBC is 5.25 years younger than that of non

-IBC patients. Clinically, the program currently has 9 ongoing clinical trials with 188+ patients. These clinical studies are supported by an additional 9 laboratory studies with 1870+ patients and 4 trials under development.

 10. Train a minimum of two trainees per year, developing clinical or research expertise to contribute to the future of this disease.
