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THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS RIO GRANDE VALLEY SCHOOL OF MEDICINE ADMINISTRATOR'S STATEMENT

The University of Texas Rio Grande Valley School of Medicine (UTRGV SOM or UT HEALTH RGV) submits the following Legislative Appropriations Request (LAR) for fiscal years 2028 and 2029 to the Office of the Governor and to the Legislative Budget Board.

BACKGROUND AND OVERVIEW

Over the past decade, the UTRGV School of Medicine has grown from a start-up medical school into the Rio Grande Valley's leader in academic medicine. Established to address longstanding physician shortages in South Texas, the School has built an integrated education, clinical, and research enterprise focused on training physicians who understand and serve the needs of the Valley—despite operating without a university-owned academic medical center or teaching hospital.

Today, the School serves as the region's anchor for physician workforce development. Since opening in 2016, UTRGV has graduated seven medical school classes and 420 residents and fellows, creating a workforce pipeline of more than 760 medical school and residency graduates connected to Valley communities and healthcare systems across Texas.

UTRGV has also expanded graduate medical education, collaborated with hospital partners, and developed clinical infrastructure in medicine, surgery, cancer care, neurosciences, diabetes care, gastroenterology, and primary care. These investments improve access to care, support physician recruitment and retention, and create the training environments needed for continued workforce growth.

As UTRGV enters its second decade, continued investment in medical education, residency expansion, specialty training, clinical care, and research will advance the State's original vision: a transformational academic medicine institution that improves access to care, strengthens the healthcare workforce, and creates lasting health and economic benefits for the Rio Grande Valley.

EDUCATING A PHYSICIAN WORKFORCE FOR TEXAS

The mission of the UTRGV School of Medicine (SOM) is to transform the health of the Rio Grande Valley and beyond through innovative education, life-changing research and discoveries, high-quality patient-centered care, service to the community, and sustainability. Central to that mission is educating physicians who are prepared to serve the region's patients and communities.

The SOM has graduated seven medical school classes, producing 341 physician graduates, and currently enrolls more than 220 medical students across all four years of the curriculum. Ten-year data shows that 34% of graduates and 62% of students in the incoming class come from the Rio Grande Valley or completed undergraduate degrees at UTRGV. In addition, nearly 45%, or 51 graduates from the Valley, matched into residency programs in the region.

These outcomes demonstrate a locally connected workforce strategy. By expanding pathways into medical education for students with ties to South Texas, UTRGV is helping build the physician workforce needed to address chronic disease, primary care access, behavioral health, cancer, diabetes, dementia, and other high-priority regional health concerns.

GRADUATE MEDICAL EDUCATION

Graduate Medical Education (GME) remains one of the strongest strategies for retaining physicians in Texas and the Rio Grande Valley. UTRGV has led GME growth in South Texas while continuing to serve as the regional anchor for physician training through changing hospital partnerships and program transitions.

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Over the past decade, UTRGV has graduated 420 residents and fellows. Of these, 60% are practicing in Texas, and more than half of those practicing in Texas remain in the Rio Grande Valley. Together with current residents and fellows, this training enterprise continues to expand the number of physicians connected to communities across South Texas.

Future growth should remain deliberate and sustainable. The SOM's strategy is to reinforce existing programs, develop targeted fellowships, align expansion with academic and hospital partnerships, and plan for more stable UTRGV-sponsored training models. These steps will improve retention, strengthen specialty access, and increase the number of physicians trained locally.

PATIENT CARE

UT Health RGV, the clinical arm of the School of Medicine, is essential to the SOM's research, education, and workforce mission. A strong clinical enterprise provides patient care settings, specialty services, faculty practice environments, and revenue capacity needed to sustain medical education, GME, research, and faculty development.

UTRGV has nearly 60 board- and fellowship-trained primary and specialty care physicians delivering patient-centered care in 20 UT Health RGV-operated clinics across 100 miles of the Rio Grande Valley. In FY 2025, UT Health RGV providers completed 123,974 Texas patient encounters, demonstrating the care volume and clinical infrastructure that support student and resident training.

The opening of the Cancer and Surgery Center in 2025 represents a major regional milestone, bringing advanced surgical oncology, radiation therapy, infusion services, and specialty care under one academic roof. These investments create high-quality learning environments, support recruitment and retention of physician faculty, and improve access to specialty care closer to home.

RESEARCH

The UTRGV School of Medicine's research enterprise has evolved into a growing engine of scientific discovery and innovation, with recognized strengths in genetics, Alzheimer's, cancer, diabetes, population health, and immunology. These programs align with the School's mission and focus on diseases and conditions that disproportionately affect the Rio Grande Valley and South Texas.

Research growth supports education, clinical care, and workforce development by strengthening faculty recruitment and retention, creating scholarly opportunities for medical students and residents, expanding access to clinical trials, and helping translate discoveries into improved patient care.

The School's strategy focuses on expanding extramural funding, increasing clinical and translational research, growing clinical trial activity, and building nationally recognized programs aligned with regional health priorities.

As the Rio Grande Valley's leader in academic medicine, UTRGV is positioned to integrate research, education, and patient care. Continued investment in research capacity will attract external funding, support economic development, expand access to innovative therapies and clinical trials, and strengthen the physician workforce needed to serve South Texas.

ACCREDITATION

The UTRGV School of Medicine will undergo a Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME) site visit for continued full accreditation in February 2028. As part of the accreditation process, the SOM must demonstrate that it has sufficient financial resources, faculty, staff, educational infrastructure, and clinical training capacity to support its medical education program and fulfill its mission.

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SCHOOL OF PODIATRIC MEDICINE

The UTRGV School of Podiatric Medicine (SOPM) is the first and only podiatric medical school in Texas and one of only eleven nationwide. Established to address workforce needs in lower-extremity, diabetic, and preventive foot care, the SOPM expands educational opportunities while helping to build a healthcare workforce equipped to serve communities across Texas.

The SOPM gained its candidacy status accreditation in June 2022 and initial accreditation in 2025 by the Council on Podiatric Medical Education (CPME). It seated its first class in August 2022 and graduated its first class of podiatrists in May 2026. On its inaugural Match Day in March 2026, the SOPM matched 17 of 18 students to residency programs across the United States with 9 staying in Texas. The SOPM is preparing future podiatric physicians to diagnose, treat, and prevent conditions affecting the foot and ankle, with emphasis on diabetes, obesity, vascular disease, and related complications. This mission is especially important in the Rio Grande Valley, where diabetes prevalence exceeds state averages and contributes to preventable disability and limb loss. Including a podiatrist in the care team of a diabetic patient can reduce their risk of amputation of lower limbs by up to 85%.

The SOPM works closely with the UTRGV SOM, UT Health RGV, and the South Texas Diabetes and Obesity Institute to advance education, clinical care, and research focused on conditions that affect South Texas communities. Students gain hands-on experience through community-based clinical training and outreach activities that expand access to care while preparing graduates to serve medically underserved populations. The SOPM currently operates clinical training sites in Harlingen, McAllen, Weslaco and Brownsville and in July 2025 launched a podiatric medicine residency program in Brownsville.

Continued state investment remains essential as the SOPM advances toward long-term sustainability. Strategic support will help ensure adequate faculty, staff, student services, clinical training opportunities, and educational infrastructure needed to maintain program quality, support accreditation requirements, and develop the next generation of podiatric physicians for Texas.

FUNDING PRIORITIES

As UTRGV enters its second decade, continued state investment will help sustain and accelerate this momentum by supporting medical and podiatric student education, residency and fellowship growth, physician recruitment, clinical innovation, and research that addresses the health needs of South Texas. The return on this investment is clear: more physicians trained, more physicians retained, greater access to care, and stronger health and economic outcomes for the Rio Grande Valley and the State of Texas.

RESTORATION OF BUDGET REDUCTIONS

Because both the UTRGV School of Medicine (SOM) and the School of Podiatric Medicine (SOPM) are approaching critical accreditation reviews, maintaining funding for their existing operations is essential to ensure continued compliance with accreditation standards, support faculty and student success, and sustain educational quality. As a result, the proposed 3% reduction is being applied to the Cancer Center/Cancer Research non-formula support funding rather than to the SOM or SOPM. While this approach preserves the institutional resources necessary to support accreditation readiness, the reduction will nonetheless affect the Cancer Center's ability to expand research programs, recruit specialized oncology faculty and researchers, enhance clinical services, and advance development of the region's first comprehensive academic Cancer Center. Accordingly, UTRGV respectfully requests that the State restore the 3% cuts to the base budget.

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Continuation of Non-formula funding for SOM

The continuation of non-formula funding is the UTRGV School of Medicine's highest priority. These funds support the faculty, staff, student services, and educational infrastructure required to educate physicians, maintain accreditation standards, and sustain the Rio Grande Valley's only hub for multidisciplinary academic medicine. Continued state investment strengthens the physician workforce pipeline by supporting medical student education, residency training, faculty recruitment, and clinical training opportunities. This investment directly contributes to increasing the number of physicians trained and retained in South Texas and across Texas, helping address critical healthcare workforce shortages while improving access to care for the region's growing population.

Continuation of Non-Formula Support for Cancer Center/Cancer Research for SOM

The SOM also seeks continued non-formula support for its Cancer Center/Cancer Research. The cancer burden in the Rio Grande Valley is magnified by market data showing a 16% growth in cancer cases over the next 10 years. The UTRGV School of Medicine's South Texas Center of Excellence on Cancer Research (ST-CECR) is focused on research to improve women's health and conduct other translational research in hepatocellular, prostate, liver, colorectal, pancreatic, and liver cancers. Researchers are housed at UTRGV School of Medicine's Biomedical Research facility in McAllen and are using their expertise in cell and molecular biology, immunology, nanoparticle technology and mouse model systems to examine the development, detection, and treatment of human cancers. This funding will be used to continue research to develop advanced diagnostic, imaging, and therapeutic modalities—including immunotherapies, vaccines, nanomedicine, and preventive strategies—for combating cancer in the Rio Grande Valley region. The new Surgery and Cancer Center not only brings cancer care closer to home, it also builds opportunities for patients to participate in clinical trials.

Continuation of Non-Formula Support for School of Podiatric Medicine

The UTRGV School of Podiatric Medicine (SOPM) seeks continued state support to sustain Texas' first and only state-supported school of podiatric medicine and strengthen the healthcare workforce needed to address the growing burden of diabetes, vascular disease, and lower-extremity complications across Texas.

SOPM appropriations are separate from School of Medicine funding and support the faculty, staff, student services, clinical education, and educational infrastructure required to operate a high-quality podiatric medical education program. As a relatively new health professions school, the SOPM continues to build enrollment and scale operations for full formula funding. Dedicated state support provides the stable and predictable funding necessary to maintain program quality, support accreditation requirements, and ensure long-term sustainability.

The SOPM plays a critical role in addressing workforce shortages in podiatric medicine while expanding access to specialized care for Texans. This need is particularly significant in South Texas, where diabetes prevalence exceeds state averages and contributes to preventable disability, hospitalization, and limb loss. Podiatric physicians are essential members of multidisciplinary healthcare teams that help prevent complications and improve outcomes for patients with diabetes and vascular disease. In fact, including a podiatrist in the care team of a diabetic patient can reduce their risk of amputation of lower limbs by up to 85%.

State support for the SOPM represents an investment in the state's only podiatric school as well as workforce development, diabetes prevention, limb preservation, and access to specialty care. Continued funding will help Texas build a sustainable pipeline of podiatric physicians while supporting better health outcomes for communities facing some of the highest rates of diabetes and related complications in the nation.

Additionally, the UTRGV School of Medicine seeks new exceptional item funding for the following:

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Exceptional Item: Non-Formula Support for Medical Residency Training (\$6,227,500 million annually)

UTRGV School of Medicine's GME strategy is to expand physician training capacity in the Rio Grande Valley through targeted investment in residency and fellowship programs that address the region's most urgent workforce needs. By sustaining core programs in internal medicine, family medicine, and surgery; maturing newer programs such as neurology and orthopedics/sports medicine; and launching high-demand specialties including gastroenterology, cardiology, hematology/oncology, child and adolescent psychiatry, and healthcare administration, the SOM is building a stronger, more self-sufficient physician pipeline for South Texas. This approach directly responds to physician shortages by training more doctors locally, where they are most likely to remain: UTRGV has graduated 420 residents, with 255 practicing in Texas and 143 serving in the RGV. State investment will further help close funding gaps that limit residency growth and support a projected 35% biennial expansion from 107 to 144 residents and fellows.

FACILITIES

Should the Legislature consider funding for Capital Construction Assistance Projects (CCAP), UTRGV requests:
Health Workforce Education and Advanced Care Facility

- \$150 million for a new Health Workforce Education and Advanced Care facility in Harlingen.
- The 94,500-GSF facility will expand clinical training capacity, support outpatient specialty care, and serve as an integrated education and care delivery hub for the Rio Grande Valley.
- Planned components include education space, simulation labs, a fully equipped outpatient surgical suite, and UTRGV's primary clinical practice location in Harlingen.
- The facility will anchor a Diabetes Center of Excellence and Limb Preservation Center to support prevention, diagnosis, treatment, and management of diabetes-related complications, including advanced wound care and vascular management.

POLICY ON CRIMINAL HISTORY RECORDS

UTRGV conducts employment criminal background checks as required by Government Code Section 411.094 and Education Code Section 51.215. UTRGV's policy is to obtain criminal history information on finalists considered for employment in security sensitive positions.

CONCLUSION

Since opening in 2016, the UTRGV School of Medicine has become the Rio Grande Valley's academic medicine leader and primary physician workforce development institution. What began as a transformational state investment is now delivering measurable returns for Texas—graduating seven medical school classes, expanding residency training, strengthening physician recruitment and retention, and building a healthcare workforce pipeline that serves communities across the Valley and throughout the state.

The SOM's impact extends beyond workforce development. Through expanded clinical services, groundbreaking research, the Cancer & Surgery Center, and Texas' first School of Podiatric Medicine, UTRGV is improving access to care, addressing critical workforce shortages, and advancing better health outcomes in one of Texas' most underserved regions. Continued investment in the School of Medicine and School of Podiatric Medicine will strengthen Texas' healthcare workforce, improve access to specialty care, reduce long-term healthcare costs, and ensure that all Texans—regardless of geography—have access to high-quality healthcare close to home.

WHAT'S NEW AT UTRGV SOPM

- Currently 122 students across four (4) classes.

DIABETIC FOOT HEALTH

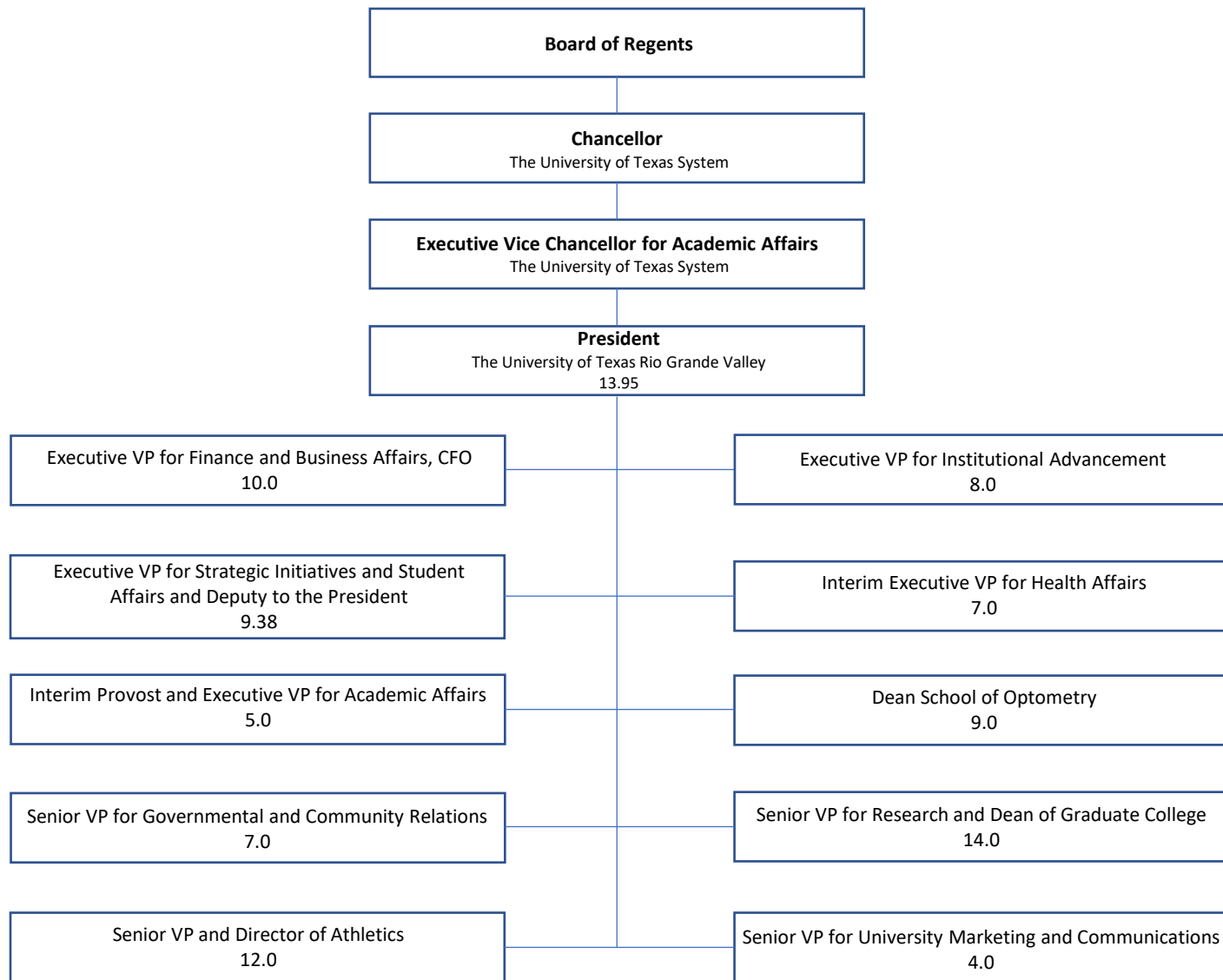
INVESTMENT IN CARE

The **President** has overall authority and responsibility for the university.

The **Executive Vice President for Finance and Business Affairs, CFO** is the chief fiscal officer and provides for the management of the institution's fiscal affairs.

The **Dean School of Optometry** oversees the overall management of the School of Optometry.

The **Senior Vice President for Research and Graduate College** is responsible for research efforts as well as economic development activities.

The **Senior Vice President for University Marketing and Communications** is responsible for marketing strategy and coordination, creative services, digital marketing and analytics, news and internal communications, strategic events, and public relations.

Since this time, 238 students have graduated, and 220 students are enrolled across the four years of the medical education program.

We continue to grow our clinical and research footprint for the benefit of the Rio Grande Valley. Our research teams are conducting investigations into diabetes, cancer, and neurological disorders with the goal of discovering new treatments for diseases that disproportionately impact the community.

Legislative funding at an appropriate level is essential to supporting our school’s mission, planned growth, and efforts to maintain full accreditation by the Liaison Committee of Medical Education (LCME) as we prepare to increase our enrollment.

STRATEGY DESCRIPTION AND JUSTIFICATION:

The UTRGV School of Podiatric Medicine's (SoPM) mission is to foster student success by inspiring, educating, and developing a student body fully prepared for podiatric residency training, becoming dedicated podiatric physicians, research scientists, public health professionals, and educators.

The SoPM was granted candidacy in June 2022 by the Council on Podiatric Medical Education (CPME), making it the first podiatry school in Texas and only the 11th in the nation. There is a great need in Texas to educate and train generations of podiatric physicians to diagnose, assess, manage, and treat conditions and diseases of the foot and ankle as well as serve the diabetic population in Texas. Including a podiatrist in the care team of a diabetic patient can reduce their risk of amputation of lower limbs by up to 85%.

The requested appropriation is needed to support operations and employees until full formula funding materializes and to meet requirements of stable and predictable revenue as the SoPM moves towards accreditation. Initially, the plan was to create a cost savings by having 1st and 2nd year podiatric medicine and medical students follow the same curriculum and learn together, but neither of the accrediting bodies recommended that approach. Instead, UTRGV separated the programs and is currently teaching podiatric medicine in Harlingen at the UTRGV Clinical Education Building.

DESCRIPTION / JUSTIFICATION:

Texas is relying on the state's medical schools to expand physician training capacity. The UTRGV School of Medicine serves the Rio Grande Valley and surrounding border communities with a critical mission to grow the physician workforce while advancing access to high-quality care in an underserved region.

Through evolving partnerships with regional hospitals and clinical affiliates, the School of Medicine has built a collaborative training model that supports clinical education, patient care, and academic excellence. These partnerships position UTRGV to expand residency training opportunities aligned with state workforce priorities and regional healthcare needs.

The medical school is seeking to sustain and strategically grow its Graduate Medical Education (GME) programs to meet increasing demand for physicians. Funding will support faculty, staff, and resident positions necessary to maintain current programs and expand training capacity by 37 positions during the biennium.

GME programs are foundational to the school's operations, supporting medical student education, strengthening accreditation readiness, and advancing clinical quality. Continued investment will enhance academic-clinical partnerships, support faculty recruitment and retention, and increase the number of physicians trained to serve South Texas.

This request will strengthen the school's academic partnerships, support the physician workforce pipeline, and ensure continued training opportunities for medical students while maintaining accountability to state appropriators through transparent and measurable outcomes.

The 3% reduction is being applied to the Cancer Center/Cancer Research non-formula support funding rather than to the School of Medicine and School of Podiatric Medicine items in order to maintain the operating funds essential for continued compliance with accreditation standards, supporting faculty and student success, and sustaining educational quality. While this approach preserves the institutional resources necessary to support accreditation readiness, the reduction will nonetheless affect the Cancer Center's ability to expand research programs, recruit specialized oncology faculty and researchers, enhance clinical services, and advance development of the region's first comprehensive academic Cancer Center. Accordingly, UTRGV respectfully requests restoration of the 3% cut to the base budget.

DESCRIPTION / JUSTIFICATION:

This project will add 94,500 GSF to strengthen and consolidate UTRGV's clinical operations in Cameron County, expanding access to coordinated outpatient care. The facility will anchor a Diabetes Center of Excellence and a Limb Preservation Center to address chronic disease, prevent complications, and improve patient outcomes, while also supporting clinical training through education space, simulation labs, and a fully equipped outpatient surgical suite.

EXTERNAL/INTERNAL FACTORS:

The UTRGV Health Workforce Education and Advanced Clinical Care Facility in Harlingen expands UT Health RGV's mid-Valley footprint by integrating a diabetes/limb preservation center with School of Medicine clinical education and simulation to strengthen the care continuum, improve local access, and accelerate workforce development. Planned warm-shell space enables phased growth and long-term scalability. If the project is not advanced, UTRGV may prolong training and simulation capacity constraints, lose momentum for partnerships and recruitment, and delay improved access to coordinated diabetes complication care for the community—limiting the University's ability to demonstrate measurable regional impact.

Project Description

The UTRGV Health Workforce Education and Advanced Clinical Care Facility in Harlingen expands UT Health RGV's mid-Valley footprint by integrating a diabetes/limb preservation center with School of Medicine clinical education and simulation to strengthen the care continuum, improve local access, and accelerate workforce development. Planned warm-shell space enables phased growth and long-term scalability. If the project is not advanced, UTRGV may prolong training and simulation capacity constraints, lose momentum for partnerships and recruitment, and delay improved access to coordinated diabetes complication care for the community—limiting the University's ability to demonstrate measurable regional impact.

(2) Mission:

The Rio Grande Valley (RGV) faces severe gaps in cancer care as one of Texas' most medically underserved regions. Cancer cases are projected to grow by 16% over the next 10 years based on the latest market analysis, while the nearest NCI-designated cancer center is over 250 miles away. Limited access leads to delayed diagnoses, advanced disease, and poorer outcomes for vulnerable Texans.

The UTRGV School of Medicine (SOM) is addressing this crisis through the South Texas Center of Excellence on Cancer Research, advancing studies on cancers that disproportionately affect the region's population, including cervical, liver, breast, and colorectal cancers. In 2025, the SOM opened the first comprehensive academic Cancer Center in the RGV, designed with input from MD Anderson Cancer Center, to provide integrated oncology care, advanced diagnostics, infusion services, rehabilitation, and expanded clinical research and training.

Funding is essential to sustain cancer research, faculty, and laboratory operations, support Cancer Center operations and expansion, recruit specialized oncology physicians and clinical staff, and grow oncology, surgery, imaging, radiation therapy, infusion and rehabilitation services.

The state's investment is helping to build a nationally recognized center focused on immunotherapy and translational research, is keeping patients in the region for care, and improving outcomes for vulnerable patients; it is critical to expanding access to specialized oncology.

(3) (a) Major Accomplishments to Date:

- Opened the first comprehensive academic Cancer Center in the Rio Grande Valley, designed with input from MD Anderson Cancer Center.
- Established the South Texas Center of Excellence on Cancer Research to unify cancer research across UTRGV and focus on cancers that disproportionately affect the region, including cervical, liver, breast, colorectal, gallbladder, and GI cancers.
- Built a cancer-focused research enterprise within the Department of Medicine and Oncology.
- Recruited cancer research faculty, creating a collaborative team of investigators focused on cancer biology, immunotherapy, translational research, and cancers affecting the region.
- Secured competitive external research funding, including NIH and CPRIT support.
- Expanded regional clinical capacity by recruiting specialized oncology physicians and clinical staff.
- Launched integrated oncology services including medical, surgical, and radiation oncology, advanced diagnostics, surgery, infusion services, and rehabilitation.
- Developed state-of-the-art research infrastructure through the Biomedical Research Facility, including 16 laboratories, a vivarium, imaging and microscopy centers, and core facilities.
- Strengthened national, international, and regional collaborations with research institutions, health systems, and genomics experts.
- Created a foundation for clinical research and future physician training, helping build long-term cancer care and research capacity.

(9) Impact of Not Funding:

- UTRGV's rapidly expanding cancer research and clinical enterprise would face significant setbacks at a critical stage of growth.
- Major gaps in cancer prevention, early detection, specialty treatment, and access to clinical research would continue.
- Patients would have limited access to advanced services and would have to travel more than 250 miles for specialized cancer care.
- Key research investments—including the South Texas Center of Excellence on Cancer Research, the Division of Immunology and Microbiology, laboratory operations, core facilities, and the regional tumor biorepository—would be at risk.
- Reduced research capacity would weaken UTRGV's competitiveness for NIH, CPRIT, philanthropic, and industry funding and limit opportunities for strategic partnerships.
- Recruitment and retention of specialized oncology physicians, researchers, and clinical staff would become more difficult, slowing expansion of essential cancer services.
- Growth in infusion therapy, rehabilitation, radiation oncology, surgical oncology, and clinical trial programs could be significantly constrained.
- Patient access to innovative treatments, clinical trials, and comprehensive cancer care would be reduced, negatively affecting outcomes across South Texas.

(10) Non-Formula Support Needed on Permanent Basis/Discont

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Permanent funding is critical because the cancer burden in the Rio Grande Valley (RGV) is ongoing, not temporary. Stable support is needed to sustain the infrastructure UTRGV has built—specialized clinicians and researchers, laboratories, clinical operations, and multi-year research programs focused on cancers that disproportionately affect RGV communities.

It also ensures continuity of patient care by supporting the recruitment and retention of oncology physicians, pharmacists, rehabilitation specialists, and research faculty and staff. Without permanent funding, essential services such as diagnostics, infusion therapy, radiation oncology, rehabilitation, and clinical trials could be disrupted, limiting access to care and forcing patients to continue traveling long distances for treatment.

In summary, permanent funding protects the state’s investment, sustains cancer research and clinical innovation, strengthens the oncology workforce, and ensures the RGV has long-term access to high-quality cancer care.

(2) Mission:

The Rio Grande Valley (RGV) faces persistent physician shortages in both primary and specialty care, limiting access to essential healthcare. The UTRGV School of Medicine (SOM) seeks to sustain and strategically expand its Graduate Medical Education (GME) programs to meet growing physician workforce needs. State funding would support faculty, staff, and resident positions needed to maintain existing programs and increase residency training capacity by 37 positions during the biennium.

While federal (CMS) and state (THECB) funding support residency training, they do not cover the full cost of operating and expanding GME programs. CMS funding caps and financial constraints faced by local hospital partners create a funding gap that limits growth in high-demand specialties. State investment would help close that gap, allowing UTRGV and its partners to train more physicians locally, where they are most likely to practice and serve. Funds would support a portion of the 130 FTEs associated with GME programs.

GME programs are critical to the SOM's mission, supporting medical student education, accreditation readiness, and clinical quality. Continued state support would strengthen academic-hospital partnerships, ensure continuity of medical student and resident training, and expand a sustainable physician workforce pipeline aligned with Texas healthcare and access-to-care priorities.

(3) (a) Major Accomplishments to Date:

- Established Graduate Medical Education (GME) at the UTRGV SOM as one of the strongest strategies for retaining physicians in Texas and the Rio Grande Valley.
- UTRGV has led GME growth in South Texas while continuing to serve as the regional anchor for physician training through changing hospital partnerships and program transitions.
- Over the past decade, UTRGV has graduated 420 residents and fellows. Of these, 60% are practicing in Texas, and more than half of those practicing in Texas remain in the Rio Grande Valley.
- The UTRGV SOM training enterprise continues to expand the number of physicians connected to communities across South Texas.

(3) (b) Major Accomplishments Expected During the Next 2 Years:

- Biennial Growth: This funding will directly support rapid multi-year programming in Graduate Medical Education (GME). During the upcoming biennium, current residency programs are projected to grow by 35%, expanding total capacity from 107 to 144 residents and fellows.
- Keeping Doctors in Texas: Of those graduates from GME programs, UTRGV expects that more than 60% will actively practice in Texas, especially across the Rio Grande Valley.

Without state support, UTRGV and its hospital partners will be unable to sustain the planned pace of GME expansion. This could delay new programs, limit growth in high-need specialties, reduce physician retention opportunities, and slow progress toward addressing regional physician shortages in South Texas. Generally, if funding is not available, residency slots go unfilled, GME programs are not started, and existing ones are forced to wind down and close.

(11) Non-Formula Support Associated with Time Frame:

The requested funding provides critical bridge support during a period in which the UTRGV School of Medicine continues to develop a stable, long-term clinical training infrastructure. Because the school does not currently have a permanent teaching hospital relationship that can fully support GME costs, continued state investment is necessary to preserve existing residency programs, support planned growth, and ensure an uninterrupted training capacity for the physician workforce pipeline serving the Rio Grande Valley.

(12) Benchmarks:

During the 2028–2029 biennium, UTRGV SOM will use state support as bridge funding while advancing a transition plan for long-term GME sustainability. Key milestones include completing a GME cost and funding assessment, identifying CMS and hospital partner funding opportunities, selecting a preferred long-term clinical training structure, and negotiating durable hospital affiliation agreements. By the end of the biennium, UTRGV SOM expects to have a documented transition strategy with partner commitments, shared financing responsibilities, and accountability measures to reduce reliance on state bridge funding while maintaining residency training continuity.

(2) Mission:

Since opening in summer 2016 with an inaugural class of 55 students, the medical school has grown significantly. As it celebrates its 10th anniversary, the school has graduated 341 physicians and currently enrolls 220 students across all four years. Continued legislative funding support is critical to sustaining this momentum and ensuring that the institution can meet its long-term commitments to both the Rio Grande Valley and the state.

In addition, the school is actively expanding its clinical and research footprint to improve health outcomes in the Rio Grande Valley. Faculty and research teams are leading investigations in high-impact areas such as diabetes, cancer, and neurological disorders—conditions that disproportionately affect the region—with the goal of advancing new treatments and improving community health.

Funding is also necessary to attract and retain top-tier faculty and staff who are essential to fulfilling the school's mission in education, research, and clinical care.

Legislative funding at an appropriate level is vital to supporting the school's continued growth, maintaining full accreditation, strengthening its research enterprise, and expanding physician training capacity to meet the healthcare needs of Texas.

(3) (a) Major Accomplishments to Date:

1. Received Preliminary Accreditation October 2015.
2. Graduated seven classes or 341 students since 2020 and welcomed the eleventh class of 55 students in June 2026. 62% of students in the incoming class are from the Rio Grande Valley or completed their undergraduate degree at UTRGV.
3. Developed pipeline programs such as JAMP, Vaqueros M.D. and the Early Decision Program to support the recruitment of top students from the Rio Grande Valley and Texas.
4. Infrastructure established for Years 1 through 4 of Medical Education: Faculty, Staff, Student Services, Academic Resources, Clinical Sites and Partnerships, Facilities, and Technology
5. Nine GME Programs across Rio Grande Valley hospital sites at HCA – Rio Grande Regional Hospital, HCA - Valley Regional Hospital, Valley Baptist Medical Center, and Knapp Medical Center.
6. Development of the South Texas Center of Excellence for Cancer Research in McAllen and the Institute of Neuroscience in Harlingen.
7. Establishment and continued growth of faculty practice plan, UT Health RGV.
8. Received continued Full Accreditation in October 2025.
9. Opened a Cancer and Surgery Center in McAllen with advisory services from MD Anderson in October 2025.

(3) (b) Major Accomplishments Expected During the Next 2 Years:

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- 1.Maintain Full Accreditation in June 2028.
- 2.Expand graduate medical education programs in primary and specialty care. During the upcoming biennium, current residency programs are expected to grow by 35%, expanding total capacity from 107 to 144 residents and fellows.
- 3.Expand class size from 55 to 75 in 2028 and from 75 to 100 in 2029.
- 4.Successfully operate the new Cancer and Surgery Center to generate clinical revenue to support mission priorities in education, research and continued investments in patient care.

(9) Impact of Not Funding:

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- Full Accreditation would be at risk. Accreditors require the SOM to maintain sufficient financial resources, faculty, and infrastructure to sustain the medical education program and achieve its institutional and programmatic objectives, placing the institution out of compliance. A site visit for full accreditation will occur in February 2028.
- The school's ability to hire and retain faculty needed to deliver high-quality instruction would be limited. It would also hinder development of the clinical practice plan, which is essential for generating revenue to help offset the costs of medical education and sustain research initiatives.
- Could close existing residency programs or delay and cancel new programs, directly reducing the number of trained physicians entering the workforce and weaken the region's healthcare pipeline.
- The school's ability to recruit and retain high-caliber researchers would be significantly constrained, limiting ongoing and future research in critical areas such as diabetes, cancer, and neurological disorders—conditions that disproportionately impact the Rio Grande Valley (RGV).
- Plans to expand class size would be delayed, limiting the number of future physicians trained to serve Texas, and expansion of research and clinical programs designed to benefit the RGV community would be postponed, reducing the school's overall economic and public health impact.

(10) Non-Formula Support Needed on Permanent Basis/Discont

Ongoing permanent state support is essential to ensure long-term sustainability of the UTRGV School of Medicine. While the SOM has steadily increased formula funding and practice plan revenues, these sources are not yet sufficient to fully support medical education, clinical operations and research.

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School of Podiatric Medicine**(1) Year Non-Formula Support Item First Funded:** 2024

(2) Mission:

The UTRGV School of Podiatric Medicine's (SOPM) mission is to foster student success by inspiring, educating, and developing a student body fully prepared for podiatric residency training, becoming dedicated podiatric physicians, research scientists, public health professionals, and educators.

In October 2020, the THECB approved a request from UTRGV to create a Doctor of Podiatric Medicine (DPM) degree, paving the way for it to become the first podiatry school in Texas and only the 11th in the nation. The SoPM was granted candidacy by the Council on Podiatric Medical Education (CPME) in 2022 and initial accreditation in November 2025 by CPME.

There is a great need in Texas to educate and train generations of podiatric physicians to diagnose, assess, manage, and treat conditions and diseases of the foot and ankle as well as serve the diabetic population in Texas. Including a podiatrist in the care team of a diabetic patient can reduce their risk of amputation of lower limbs by up to 85%.

The requested appropriation is needed to support operations and employees until full formula funding and sustainable clinical revenue materialize. State appropriations contribute significantly to fulfilling accrediting body requirements to demonstrate stable and predictable revenue as the SOPM moves forward with accreditation.

(3) (a) Major Accomplishments to Date:

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- Candidacy status accreditation received: 6/9/22
- Inaugural Dean hired: 7/1/22
- Faculty hires as of 7/1/2026: 23.6 FTE
- Staff hires as of 2/2/2026: 23
- Students enrolled over 5 years: 140
- Initial accreditation received: 11/10/2025
- Inaugural Match Day in March 2026, matching 17 of 18 students to residency programs across the United States with 9 staying in Texas
- Graduated first class of podiatrists: May 2026

Since receiving candidacy status in June 2022, the School of Podiatric Medicine (SOPM) has recruited faculty and staff essential to launching and successfully advancing the program. Faculty expertise supports a comprehensive educational experience, while SOPM has established key operational infrastructure, including admissions, student services, finance, assessment, accreditation, and student support. To date, 19 professional staff members have been hired to support these functions and the school's continued growth.

Due to accreditation requirements, SOPM could not recruit students until receiving candidacy status in June 2022. Despite the shortened recruitment timeline, the program has enrolled 149 students across its first five cohorts and continues to attract highly qualified applicants. Strong demand reflects both the need for podiatric medical education in Texas and UTRGV's success in developing a pipeline of future podiatric physicians.

(3) (b) Major Accomplishments Expected During the Next 2 Years:

SOPM will continue enrollment growth toward full operational maturity, maintaining cohort sizes of up to 40 students and strengthening Texas' podiatric workforce pipeline.

SOPM will advance students through the DPM curriculum while supporting strong academic performance, retention, graduation, and residency placement, including at partner hospitals, the Area Health Education Centers and UT Health RGV clinics.

SOPM will expand clinical training opportunities in regional health clinics, hire additional faculty and staff, and support development of the Diabetes Center of Excellence and Limb Preservation Center to improve diabetes-related care and reduce preventable amputations.

The program is expecting 40 new students for AY 2026-2027 and estimates to generate about \$5,249,700 in formula funding for all students enrolled in the program.

Non-statutory tuition generated by program enrollment will be used to help offset operating costs.

Student health clinics have begun to generate minimal revenue beginning in FY 2026. Clinical revenue is expected to remain minimal considering the substandard patient payor mix in the Rio Grande Valley and the high level of indigent care provided.

(9) Impact of Not Funding:

Failure to provide adequate Non-Formula Support funding would jeopardize the long-term sustainability and growth of the School of Podiatric Medicine (SOPM) at a critical stage of development. Accrediting bodies require evidence of stable and predictable financial resources to support academic and clinical operations, and insufficient funding could impair the SOPM's ability to maintain accreditation milestones and continued program development. Reduced funding would also limit the SOPM's ability to recruit and retain qualified faculty and staff, resulting in larger student-to-faculty ratios, diminished educational quality, reduced student support services, and fewer clinical training opportunities.

As Texas' first School of Podiatric Medicine and the nation's first state-supported podiatry school, SOPM plays a unique role in addressing physician workforce shortages and improving access to specialized foot and ankle care, particularly for patients with diabetes and other chronic conditions. Insufficient funding would slow the SOPM's ability to expand enrollment, graduate future podiatric physicians, and build the clinical and residency training infrastructure needed to meet Texas' growing healthcare workforce demands. Ultimately, the State would lose a critical opportunity to strengthen healthcare access, improve health outcomes, and reduce the long-term costs associated with diabetes-related complications and preventable amputations.

(11) Non-Formula Support Associated with Time Frame:

Yes, although not on a definitive time frame, the Non-Formula Support funding will be requested until the point that enrollment growth and associated growth in formula funding, patient care and research revenues will be sufficient to support operations.

(12) Benchmarks:

The most important benchmarks for a new professional school at the collegiate level have to do with enrollment and retention:

- Recruit, admit, and seat the inaugural class of students in year one, two, three and four.
- Ramp up to full enrollment of each cohort in subsequent years (current full enrollment is approved at 40 students per class).
- Maintain retention rates at an acceptable level.
- Faculty performance above 3.5 Likert scale based on student evaluations and student satisfaction.

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(13) Performance Reviews:

Several performance metrics will be used to assure the increase of class size and retention of students:

- SOPM will measure the effectiveness of educational platforms to optimize student success by surveying each student.
 - SOPM will monitor yearly student retention and attrition rates with a goal of <10%.
 - SOPM will measure APMLE 1 national boards passing rate with a goal of >95%.
 - SOPM will measure APMLE 2 national boards passing rate with a goal of >95%.
 - Residency placement with a goal of >95%.
 - SOPM will monitor its faculty retention and success as it positively influences increasing class size.
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
