### Houston, Texas, October 27, 1950 Meeting No. 509

The Board of Regents of The University of Texas met in regular session in the Normandy Room of the Shamrock Hotel, Houston, Texas, at 1:30 p.m., Friday, October 27, 1950, with the following present: Regents Woodward (Chairman); Warren (Vice-Chairman); Darden; Kirkpatrick; Rockwell; Swenson; Terrell; Tobin; and Tucker; President Painter; Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons; Vice-President Dolley; Vice-President Leake; Vice-President Elliott; President Elkins of Texas Western College; Dr. Gill, Assistant Dean of the Southwestern Medical School; Dr. Jack Ewalt, Dean of the Postgraduate School of Medicine; Mr. E. N. Cappleman; Mr. J. G. Taylor, Investment Officer; Director of News and Information Service Keys; Assistant to the President Granberry; and Secretary Holt and Assistant Secretary Stewart.

### BOARD OF REGENTS

APPROVAL OF MINUTES FOR SEPTEMBER 29 and 30, 1950.--Chairman Woodward brought to the attention of the Board the minutes of the meeting of September 29 and 30, 1950, in the form in which they had been mimergraphed and distributed by the Secretary. There being no additions or corrections thereto, he ordered that the minutes stand approved as submitted.

### TEXAS WESTERN COLLEGE

ADMINISTRATIVE ACTIONS. -- President Elkins presented to the Board a list of Agministrative Actions which he had taken since the last meeting of the Board copies of which had been furnished members of the Board under date of October 17, 1950, and recommended its appraval. On motion by Mr. Swenson, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board approved the list as precented. (A copy of this list is attached hereto and made a part of these minutes. Page<u>133</u>.)

APPROVAL OF FINAL PLANS AND TAKING OF BIDS FOR WOMEN'S GYMNASIUM.--President Elkins reported to the Board the completion of final plans and specifications for the construction of the new Women's Gymnasium at Texas Western College. He then recommended approval of the plans and authorization to advertise for bids to be opened on Friday, December 1, 1950. On motion by Mr. Swenson, seconded by Mr. Darden, the Board approved the recommendation.

LEASE TO PHI KAPPA SIGMA.--President Elkins recommended that the Board approve a lease of property belonging to Texas Western College to Phi Kappa Sigma Fraternity for a period of thirty years for a total consideration of \$2,250 to permit construction of a fraternity lodge on the site. On motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board approved the recommendation.

### COTTON ESTATE .---

EXTENSION OF THIRD STREET. -- President Elkins recommended that the Board dedicate to the City of El Paso sufficient Cotton Estate property to permit the extension of Third Street 865 feet. On motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Rockwell, the Board approved the dedication of the property.

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DEDICATION OF NEW STREET. -- President Elkins recommended that the Board dedicate to the City of El Paso a sufficient amount of Cotton Estate property to permit opening of a new street to permit the further development of Cotton Estate properties, the new street being 70 feet wide and 1,588.6 feet long. On motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Rockwell, the Board approved the authorization.

PETITIONS THAT NEGRO MEMBERS OF BORDER FOOTBALL CONFERENCE TEAMS BE PERMITTED TO PLAY ON KIDD FIELD OF TEXAS WESTERN COLLEGE. --Chairman Woodward discussed with the Board numerous petitions which had been received from interested persons throughout the state requesting that negro members of Border Football Conference teams be permitted to play in regular conference games at Kidd Field on the campus of Texas Western College. On motion by Mrs. Tobin, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board voted to permit the playing of negro members of conference teams as requested. The vote on the resolution was as follows:

Chairman Woodward then released the following statement concerning the matter:

STATEMENT BY DUDLEY K. WOODWARD, CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS IN HOUSTON, ON OCTOBER 27, 1950

Texas Western College, a branch of The University of Texas, is located in El Paso. A part of its assets consist of Kidd Field, a football stadium located on land belonging partly to the College and partly to the City of El Paso. The stadium was constructed with funds provided partly by the Citizens of El Paso and partly by the City of El Paso,

Texas Western College belongs to the Border Football Conference composed of five out-of-state teams and four Texas teams. By virtue of its geographical location it has no other conference membership upon to it.

Conference schools located outside the State have negro students and ocadisionally have football teams composed partly of negroes. These out-of-state schools have served notice on Texas Western College that they will no longer engage in football contests with Texas Western College un less the negroes who happen to be members of their teams are premitted to play on Kidd Field. This course, if followed, will completely destroy intercollegiate athletics at Texas Western College.

There is no rule of the Regents governing the petitions filed by the City Council of the City of El Paso, the Chamber of Commerce, the Southwestern Sun Carnival and numerous other organizations and individuals requesting that teams composed partly of negroes be permitted to play on Kidd Field. These petitions are concurred in by 40 members of the current football squad, the remaining 3 not voting, by the staff, and by the President of Texas Western College. There have been no objections or protests to the granting of these petitions.

A majority of the Board of Regents is of the opinion that the denial of the petitions presented to it would result in irreparable injury to Texas Western College; it is further of the opinion that due regard for the convictions

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and wishes of the community in which Texas Western College is located and which throughout has accorded to the College support and assistance to an extraordinary degree should be recognized and respected.

The action here taken relates wholly to the peculiar conditions existing at Texas Western College. It constitutes no change in the policy of the Board of Regents with reference to any other branch of The University of Texas.

## POSTGRADUATE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE

LEASE FOR TEMPORARY QUARTERS OF POSTGRADUATE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE.--President Painter recommended on behalf of the Medical Committee that the Board approve a lease of Suite 207 of the Hermann Professional Building for the Postgraduate School of Medicine and that it ratify and confirm the action of Dr. Evalt in signing the lease agreement. The lease is for a period of one year beginning October 12, 1950, with monthly rental at a rate of \$142.90. Upon motion by Mr. Rockwell, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendation.

### SOUTHWESTERN MEDICAL SCHOOL

MEDICAL STUDIES WITH OTHER SCHOOLS.--President Painter recommended for the Medical Committee that with the approval of the Dean of the Southwestern Medical School, students enrolled in that school be permitted to persue certain parts of their medical studies within the confines of other approved medical schools of this country and abroad, subject to the following conditions:

1. That the student enroll and pay all fees at the Southwestern Medical School.

2. That the student pay the fees required by the Institution of his selection.

3. That on completion of study, appropriate credit at Southwestern Medical School be granted provided proof of satisfactory completion of studies in the other institutions is presented.

On motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendation.

WAIVERS OF NEPOTISM. -- President Painter recommended on behalf of the Medical Committee that the nepotism rule be waived in the following cases:

1. Fr. Floyd Norman, Clinical Assistant, Professor of Pediatrics at no salary, and Dr. Gladys Fashena, Professor of Pediatrics.

2. Dr. Dan Gill, Clinical Instructor of Surgery without salary and Dr. A. J. Gill, Professor of Pathology.

On motion by Dr. Terrell, seconded by Mr. Darden, the Board approved the recommendation.

WAIVER OF NEPOTISM.--President Painter recommended on behalf of the Medical Committee that the nepotism rule be suspended until July 1, 1951, in the case of Dr. Charles Bates, Instructor in Obstetrics and Gynecology at \$4,200 a year and his wife, Dr. Harriet Bates, Instructor in Pediatrics at \$3,600 a year. He explained that an acute shortage of teachers in the Department of Pediatrics currently exists as well as in Obstetrics and Gynecology and that when present appointces in the Department of Pediatrics assumed their duties, Dr. Harriet Bates will discontinue her services. On motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendation.

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### MEDICAL ERANCE

PAYMENT FOR HOSPITAL CARE OF OUT-PATIENT EMPLOYEES OF THE MEDICAL BRANCH.--President Painter discussed with the Board the need to clarify rules and regulations relative to payment for hospital care of out-patient employees of the Medical Branch and recommended for the Medical Committee that the following rules be adopted:

- 1. All employees of the institution admitted to the hospital for hospital care are to be admitted under the same conditions as would prevail if they were not employees of the institution except that a discount of 20% will be allowed as approved by the Board of Regents.
- 2. Out-Patient care will be provided all employees of the institution provided they clear through the Personnel Clinic now located in the Out-Patient Clinic. If the employee does not obtain a permit from the Personnel Clinic, charges will be made for services rendered as if that person were not an employee.
- 3. Drugs, medications, bandages, etc. will be paid at cost.

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4. Services such as X-ray and Physio-Therapy will be provided without cost for the usual routine examinations and treatments where the cost of materials used is inconsequential. Any unusual use of these facilities will be provided only after approval is obtained from the Hospital Administrator.

On motion by Mr. Rockwell, seconded by Mrs. Tobin, the Board approved the rules as recommended.

INSTAILATION OF HEATERS IN BUSINESS OFFICE.--President Painter recommended for the Building Committee that the Board approve the installation of space heaters in the Tilt Slab Building recently constructed in Galveston and presently occupied by the Business Office. He presented an estimate that the cost of the installation of appropriate heaters would cost approximately \$2,200 and further recommended that the sum of \$2,200 be transferred from the Unappropriated Surplus to the Physical Plant Appropriation to be captioned "Heating Equipment for Shop Building No. 1". On motion by Mrs. Tobin, seconded by Mr. Darden, the Board approved the recommendation.

PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS FOR ARCADE. -- President Painter recommended for the Medical Committee that the University Architect be authorized to prepare plans and specifications for an arcade connecting the Out-Patient Building with the present Laboratory Building. He explained that the arcade is urgently needed, that there is presently an unencumbered balance in building funds at the Medical Branch of \$230,242.86, and that the relatively simple arcade proposed is estimated to cost around \$50,000.00. On motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Darden, the Board approved the recommendation.

RENTAL OF PARKING LOT.--President Painter recommended for the Medical Committee that the Board authorize the rental of the Sealy and Smith Foundation of a parking lot prepared by them for a charge of \$50.00 a month. On motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Syenson, the Board approved the recommendation.

DIVISION OF AUDIOLOGY AND SPEECH CORRECTION. --President Fainter recommended on behalf of the Medical Committee that the Board authorize a new division in the John Sealy Hospital entitled "Audiology and Speech Correction Clinic". He further recommended that Mr. Clarence 0. **Division** be appointed Director at an annual salary of \$2,400, and \$400.00 a year be appropriated for Maintenance, Equipment and support. On motion by Dr. Terrell, seconded by Mr. Rockwell, the Board approved the recommendation.

# M. D. ANDERSON HOSPITAL FOR CANCER RESEARCH

TRANSFER OF FUNDS. --President Painter presented to the Board a request by Dr. R. Lee Clark, Jr., Director of the M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research that \$220,000.00 be transferred from the uncommitted funds in the Regents' Budget for salaries to a budget item entitled "Reserve for Hospital Utilities and Technical Hospital Equipment," effective October 1, 1950. The specified items from which transfers are recommended and the emounts there are to be on the basis of an itemized list to be furnished by Dr. Clark and approved by President Painter. On motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board approved the transfer of funds as recommended.

### MAIN UNIVERSITY

UTILITIES IMPROVEMENT PROJECT NO. 2 - 1950.--Mr. Tucker presented the following recommendation of the Building Committee:

That the Board of Regents accept the low bid of Joe Bland Construction Company on the Utilities Improvement Project No. 2-1950 on the following basis:

That the Board of Regents accept the low bid of E. B. Snead Construction Company, Inc. for the Spray Pond Besin, in the emount of \$35,600.00

On motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Tucker, the Board approved the recommendation.

SCIENCE BUILDING CONTRACT, PAVING OF TWENTY-FOURTH STREET.--Mr. Tucker presented the following recommendation of the Building

That the Board of Regents authorize an addition to the Nathan Wholfeld General Contract for the Science Building in the amount of \$2,200.00 to provide for the cost of paving Twenty-fourth Street opposite the Science Building site. The item is in dispute and this authorization involves the acceptance of a compromise proposal submitted by the Contractor and recommended by the Associate Architects

On motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Darden, the Board approved the recommendation.

LAND COMMITTEE MATTERS .--

EASEMENT NO. 456, STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons presented the following report of the Land Committee:

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The Land Committee has had under consideration a request from the State Highway Commission for an easement for a borrow pit and a drainage channel in Section 16, Block 51, and Section 22, Block 42, respectively, University Lands in Crockett County, Texas, covering a total of approximately 2.31 acres, in connection with the construction and maintenance of Ranch-to-Market Highway No. 33.

The Committee recommends that an easement as outlined above be granted for a nominal consideration of \$1.00 and that the Chairman of the Board be authorized to sign an appropriate instrument which has been prepared by the University Land Attorney.

Upon motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the report.

EASEMENT NO. 457, STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons presented the following report of the Land Committee which was adopted upon motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Swenson:

The Land Committee has had under consideration a request from the State Highway Commission for a road right-ofway and drainage channel easement across various sections in Bluck 35, University Lands in Ector County, Texas, covering a total of approximately 25.329 acres, in connection with the construction and maintenance of Farmto-Market Highway No. 1210.

The Committee recommends that an easement as outlined above be granted for a nominal consideration of \$1.00 and that the Chairman of the Board be authorized to sign an appropriate instrument which has been prepared by the University Lend Attorney.

EASEMENT NO. 458, SINCLAIR OIL AND GAS COMPANY .-- Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons presented the following report of the Land Committee:

The Land Committee has ocnsidered an application from Sinolair Oil and Gas Company for a pipe line easement covering a two-and one-half inch pipe line 160 rods in length across University Lends in Andrews County, Texas, with consideration of \$40.00 for a ten-year period beginning August 1, 1950, The proposed easement is on the University's standard form, has been approved as to form by the University Land Attorney, and is at the standard rate. Payment in full of the consideration involved has been tendered by the Company.

The Committee recommends that the Board grant this ensement and authorize the Chairman of the Board to sign the agreement.

Upon motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the report.

EASEMENT NO. 459, GULF OIL CORPORATION.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons presented the following report of the Land Committee which was adopted upon motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Swenson:

The Land Committee has had under consideration an application from Gulf Oil Corporation for renewal of Pipe Line Easement No. 144 covering 194 rods of twoinch pipe line across University Lands in Ector County Texas, which expired September 30, 1950. The new easement is for a ten-year period beginning October 1, 1950. The rental is at the regular University rate of \$0.25 per rod, payable in full at the beginning of the tenyear period, and a check for \$48.50, the total consideration, has been tendered with the application. The Committee recommends that the Board grant the easement and authorize the Chairman of the Board to sign the agreement which has been approved as to form by the University Land Attorney.

EXTENSION ON LAND NOTE OF VIRGIL L. WELCH.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons presented the following report of the Land Committee:

The Land Committee has considered the application of Mr. Virgil L. Welch to grant an extension of the maturity date of a purchase money note from October 1, 1951, to October 1, 1956, in connection with the sale of a portion of the original Fifty Leagues covering a tract of 188 acres in Cooke County, Texas, and in this connection recommends that the Board of Regents adopt the following resolution providing for the extension.

Upon metion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board adopted the following resolution:

### RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF RECENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS

WHEREAS, Acting under the authority of Chapter 18, Acts of 1895, page 19, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas agreed to sell to James Barentine by contract of sale, GLO File No. 4648, dated October 1, 1901, a tract of 188 acres of land out of Subdivision 2, Section 5, League 76, University Lands, Cooke County, Texas, the purchaser agreeing to pay the sum of \$7.00 per acre therefor; and

WHEREAS, Of said consideration the purchaser paid the sum of \$35.40 cash and to secure the payment of the balance thereof executed and delivered an obligation to pay the principal sum of \$1316.00 in 40 equal annual installments, together with interest thereon from date until paid at the rate of five per centum per annum, both interest and principal being made payable on July 1, of each year thereafter until the full amount was paid; and

WHEREAS, Said contract of sale expired by operation of its terms on October 1, 1941, leaving an unpaid balance of the principal of said original indebtedness of \$969.56; and thereafter, based on the application of the original purchaser, Mr. J. B. Barentine, and upon the payment by him of all interest due on said unpaid amount of principal to November 1, 1941, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas at its meeting No. 419 held on January 24, 1942, did grant an extension of 10 years from the original maturity date of said contract and obligation, that is to say, from October 1, 1941, to October 1, 1951; and

WHEREAS, On October 27, 1941, the said J. B. Barentine and wife, Effie L. Barentine, did sell and convey their equity in said land to John K. Bergen, as evidenced by a deed of said date, a copy of which is on file in the General Land Office of Texas; and

WHEREAS, Virgil L. Welch, of Gainesville, Texas, desires to purchase from John K. Bergen his interest in said equity and Mr. Bergen is willing to sell and convey to him said interest, provided the Board of Regents of The University of Texas will grant Mr. Welch a five-year extension of the maturity date of the present note from October 1, 1951 to October 1, 1956, and the Board of Regents of The University of Texas is willing to grant such extension, provided a payment of at least \$200.00 is made to be applied on the unpaid principal balance of \$969.56 and interest is paid to November 1, 1950, and the remainder of said unpaid balance of principal is agreed to be paid off in equal annual installments beginning October 1, 1956, with interest thereon until paid at the rate of five per centum per annum.

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RESOLVED, That the interest on said obligation having been paid to November 1, 1950, and a payment of \$200.00 having been made on the balance of principal, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas does hereby grant a fiveyear extension of the maturity date of said obligation from October 1, 1951, to October 1, 1956, with the remainder of the unpaid principal on said obligation to be paid off in equal annual installments beginning with October 1, 1952, end ending with the final installment on October 1, 1956, together with interest thereon from date until paid at the rate of five per centum per annum, but in the event of failure to pay said installment of principal and interest due thereon, when due, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas shall have the right, at its option, to cancel such sale and declare said contract of nc further force and effect and said cancellation and forfeiture shall be evidenced by resolution of said Board, a certified copy of which is to be filed in the General Land Office of Texas.

WATER LEASE 43, MID CONTINENT PETROLEUM CORPORATION.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons reported for the information of the Board and for official entry in the minutes that in accordance with authorization given by the Board ° Regents, he had signed and delivered Water Lease No. 43 to Mid-Continent Petroleum Corporation granting permission to use water from water well on Block 13, University Lends in Andrews County, Texas, for the purpose of arilling one oil well on non-University Lends. Consideration of \$500.00 has been paid.

Upon motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Buard ratified and approved the report.

FINANCE COMMITTEE MATTERS .---

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PURCHASE FOR PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons presented the following report of the Finance Committee:

We ask that these transactions receive the approval of the Board.

OIL AND GAS LEASE TO SINCLAIR OIL AND GAS COMPANY .-- Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons presented the following report of the Finance Committee:

The Finance Committee has had under consideration a proposed Oil and Gas Lease dated October 11, 1950, to Sinclair Oil and Gas Company covering twenty acres off of the north end of a forty-two acre tract out of the Bear Camp Plantation in the S. F. Austin 3-1/6 League Grant in Wharton County, Texas. The University's interest in the tract is a 1/16 of the oil, gas, and other minerals. The proposed lease is for a three year period and includes the obligation to drill a well beginning within ninety days from the date of signature of the lease. The lease further provides for a cash bonus at the rate of \$60.00 per acre and for delay rentals of \$50.00 per acre per year. The lease provides for a 1/8 royalty of all oil and gas produced. The lease has already been executed by all of the other owners of mineral interests including the Hogg Oil Company.

Your Committee recommends that the Board of Regents approve the lease as described above and authorize the Chairman of the Board to sign the instrument.

Upon motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Darden, the Board approved the report.

AUTHORIZATION TO READJUST INDEBTEDNESS ON STADIUM IMPROVEMENT BONDS, SERIES 1948.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons presented the following report of the Land Committee which was approved on motion by Mr Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Darden:

Pursuant to discussions with Mr. C. D. Simmons, Vice-President and Comptroller, and Mr. J. G. Taylor, Investment Officer, the holders of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas  $2\frac{1}{27}$  Stadium Improvement Bonds, Series 1948, have offered the following terms and conditions for a readjustment of the indebtedness, in lieu of calling the bonds and the sale of a refunding issue.

- The interest rate on the bonds shall be reduced from 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>/<sub>4</sub> to 2<sup>4</sup>/<sub>5</sub> per annum, effective January 1, 1951.
- The call price shall be reduced to 101 for retirement purposes but shall remain at 102 for refunding purposes. Any bonds called on January 1, 1951, shall be at the price of 102.
- 3. The present bonds outstanding after January 1, 1951, and coupons thereon shall be stamped as to the new interest rate and call price. In all other respects, the terms of the bonds shall remain unchanged.

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4. The firm of Gibson and Gibson of Austin, Texas, shall be retained at the University's expense of \$100.00 to prepare the necessary legal papers to effect the above conditions. The agreement, if necessary in the discretion of the University, shall be subject to the approval of the Attorney General of the State of Texas.

The above terms will result in a substantial dollar savings over the life of the bonds. The net results of the above proposal should be fully in line with any terms which would likely be obtained through the medium of a refunding issue in the bond market at the present time, and in addition, more flexibility of retirement will be provided.

Accordingly, it is recommended that the Board of Regents accept the proposal as outlined above and authorize Mr. C. D. Simmons, Vice-President and Comptroller, to carry out the terms of the agreement.

REFUNDING OF UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS HOSPITAL BONDS.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons presented the following report of the Finance Committee which was approved on motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Darden:

Your Finance Committee has for sometime had under consideration the possibility of refunding the \$930,000 par value Board of Regents of The University of Texas 3% Hospital Bonds which will be outstanding after the January 1, 1951, maturity payment. These bonds are redeemable on thirty days' written notice at  $101\frac{1}{2}$  on any interest payment date and are **bo**ld by the State of Texas Permanent School Fund.

Based on an offer in hand from investment dealers, it appears that these bonds can be refunded at a considerable saving to the University over the life of the bonds, with the new effective interest rate being at  $2\frac{1}{25}$  or less.

It is recommended that Mr. C. D. Simmons, Vice-President and Comptroller, with the approval of the Chairman of the Finance Committee, be authorized to do all things necessary to effect the refunding of the bonds, including, among other things, the advertising for competitive bids for the refunding bonds, establishing the terms of the refunding bonds, opening the bids for the refunding bonds and accepting or reject any or all of said bids, selection of bond counsel, and calling for redemption the cutstanding bonds of the original issue. The new maturity schedule shall be the same as for the refunded bonds; and the effective interest rate for the new bonds, considering the redemption penalty on the old bonds, shall not exceed 2.65%.

### M. D. ANDERSON HOSPITAL FOR CANCER RESEARCH

APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL FUNDS FOR M. D. ANDERSON HOSPITAL FOR CANCER RESEARCH.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons reported that upon authorization by President Painter he had signed Part 2, Revised, of the application for Federal Funds for the M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research and requested that the Board ratify and approve his action in so doing. He further recommended that he be authorized to sign Part 4 thereof including all related documents necessary. On motion by Mr. Kirkpetrick, seconded by Mr. Darden, the Board adopted the following resolution:

"BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas that the action of Vice-President and Comptroller C. D. Simmons in signing Part 2, Revised, of a Project Construction Application with the U. S. Public Health Service for a grant to be used in connection with the M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research, Houston, Harris County, Texas, be and the same is hereby ratified and confirmed, and, be it further resolved that Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons be and he is hereby authorized to take such other and further steps as

may be necessary in processing this application, including authority to sign any contracts with the U.S. Public Health Service necessary in implementing the project or in making effective the grant thereunder."

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR M. D. ANDERSON HOSPITAL FOR CANCER RESEARCH.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons reported for the Building Committee that the Committee had considered a supplemental proposal dated October 20, 1950, from Farnsworth and Chambers Company, Inc., offering various reductions in their bid for the construction of the M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research, so as to bring the cost of construction within the total resources available for the project. The proposed reductions and the recommended contract award are set out in a report from MacKie and Kamrath, Architects, to the Board of Regents, dated October 25, 1950, as follows:

In accordance with the request of Dr. R. Lee Clark, Director of the M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research, we submit herewith in duplicate for your consideration a negotiated contract price for construction of the above building as proposed by the Farnsworth and Chambers Company, Inc., original low bidder.

The Farnsworth and Chambers Company, Inc. have been most cooperative in their negotiations for reductions in cost. Your attention is invited to the two paragraphs following Item #37 in their negotiated proposal, whereby all extras or credits will be submitted at 5% fee, and any deductions accepted at this time may be added to the contract at the same cost within six (6) months of the signing of the contract. These contractural statements appear to be most generous.

Mr. Simmons then explained that the sward of a contract in the amount recommended would require the full amount of the U.S. Public Health Service grant of \$1,500,000.00 which has been granted out of current funds and the full amount of the grant of \$525,000.00 from Federal Funds from the next fiscal year. He then reported that the Building Committee recommendation was that the contract be awarded on the basis outlined above.

On motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Rockwell, the Board sdopted the following resolution:

RESOLVED by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas that the bid of Farnsworth and Chambers Company, Inc., in the amount of \$5,242,104.00 for the construction of the M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research be and the same is hereby accepted subject to the following conditions:

(a) The representative of the Hospital Survey and Construction Division, Texas State Department of Health, has informed us that contracts for the construction of our hospital project cannot be signed until after Part 4, Project Construction Application, is signed by the Surgeon General. It is the intent of this Board to award the contract to the low bidder on this project as soon as Part 4, Project Construction Application, based on the figures reflected in the attached low bid and other necessary hospital costs, is approved by the Surgeon General.

(b) The contract is subject also to the approval of the State Board of Control.

Government, in connection with inventions and discoveries under the contract. The contract expired 30 June 1950; no inventions resulted from the research program. The work was directed by Dr. H. S. Coleman, Associate Professor of Physics, and Director, Optical Research Laboratory.

REAPPROPRIATION OF BALANCES FOR 1949-50: In the budget for 1949-50 adopted by the Board of Regents on July 14, 1949, for the Main University and the Extramural Divisions, there appeared in paragraph 3, page ix, the following rule:

> "The unexpended balance in any maintenance account on August 31, when such balance does not exceed 10% of the total amount budgeted to that account, will be automatically reappropriated without prejudice . ..."
