Austin, Texas, January 17, 1925

The Board of Regents of the University of Texas met in regular session on Saturday morning, January 17, 1925 at ten o'clock, with the following in attendance: Regents Stark (Chairman), Marsh, O'Hair, Storey, Whaley, Wooten and Wroe; President Splawn; and the Secretary.

The minutes of the meeting of November 26 were approved after the correction of a typographical omission as to the attendance.

WOTE OF THANKS TO STARK AND WROE. Mr. Storey made a motion, seconded by Mr. Wroe, that in view of the excellent services of Mr. Stark as a Regent, his term now expiring, and of his continuous record of loyalty and help-fulness to the University, the Board express its thanks and appreciation to him. Mr. Storey later amended his motion to include Mr. Wroe, whose term also is about to end. The amended motion was adopted and Mrs. O'Hair, Vice Chairman, appointed Mr. Storey and Dr. Wooten to prepare a suitable resolution.

Who is a trustee of the Littlefield estate, offered to the Board two checks, drawn in favor of H. A. Wroe and W. M. W. Splawn as trustees, one for \$100,000 to be applied on the Alice Littlefield Dormitory and the other for \$50,000 to be applied on the Littlefield Memorial Arch, as bills for these respective objects come in. On motion of Mr. Storey the Board accepted the checks and President Splawn endorsed them for deposit in the American National Bank.

that since the last meeting it had become common knowledge that certain dissatisfied heirs of the estate of the late Major George W. Littlefield had employed attorneys and that he had asked Mr. Dudley Woodward to study the will and investigate the situation. Mr. Woodward had done so and was ready with a report. On motion of Mr. Marsh the Board voted to hear Mr. Woodward at two o'clock.

APPOINTMENTS FOR 1925-1926. On motion of Dr. Wooten, seconded by Mr. Wroe, the Board made the following appointments for 1925-1926, recommended by the President:

1. George W. Stumberg, J.D., Yale University, Professor of Law, at \$4500.

2. George W. Stocking, Associate Professor of Economics, at \$3600.

3. Wiss Jet C. Winters, now on leave, to return with rank of associate professor.

4. Associate Professors Bennett and Ettlinger, in Pure Mathematics, to be advanced to \$3600.

5. W. F. Ledlow. Instructor in the History of Education, to have rank of adjunct professor, with the minimum salary of that rank, effective, June 8, 1925.

6. J. B. Trant, now Instructor at the University of Illinois, to be Adjunct Professor of Economics at \$3000.

IEAVES OF ABSENCE. A leave of absence for the session of 1925-1926, without pay, was granted to Professor C. S. Potts, and a leave for two months, also without pay, was granted Dr. E. H. Sellards, Chief Geologist in the Bureau of Economic Geology.

APPOINTMENTS FOR 1924-1925. On motion of Lowing recommendations from President Splawn for appointment for the current session:

1. Fowler V. Harper, M.A., instructor in English, at salary of \$950from January 24 through June 15.

2. Cyrus L. Day, M.A., instructor in English, at a sof \$900 from February 1 through June 15.

- 3. Roy Cleveland Phillips, Ph.D., adjunct professor of Romance Languages, at a salary of \$1666.66 from January 1 through June 15.
- 4. Gertrude Earhart, M.A., adjunct professor, at a salary of \$1800 from January 1 through June 15, in the Department of the Art of Teaching.
- 5. M. G. Pearce, M.D., Instructor (part-time) in Clinical Medicine, beginning January 1, at the rate of \$600 a year, to fill the vacancy caused by the transference of Dr. Lee to Obstetrics and Gynecology, Medical Branch.
- 6. Anna M. Carroll, full-time tutor, and Harris Williams, part-time tutor, at \$1000 and \$225, respectively, from January 1 for the remainder of the session to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Instructor E. K. Taylor, in Bacteriology, Medical Branch.
- 7. Gibbs Milliken, M.D., associate professor of Pathology, at \$4000 a year, beginning February 1, Medical Branch.

ROY BEDICHEK. On motion of Mr. Marsh the Board put Mr. Roy Bedichek on a ten-months basis, his period of service to begin August 15 and end June 15, effective this session, with the understanding that he is to render any needed service for his department during the additional two months.

TRANSFERS, REAPPROPRIATIONS AND ADDITIONAL APPRO-PRIATIONS. On motion of Dr. Wooten, seconded by Mr. Storey, the Board authorized the following budgetary changes for the current session:

- 1. Transfer \$200 from balance in J. P. Weller's salary to fund for tutors and assistants, department of Romance Languages.
- 2. Transfer \$200 from appropriation for annual audit to expense account, Auditor's Office, for purchase of two new typewriters.
- 3. Transfer \$266.12 from Building Equipment and Betterments to Equipment of President's Home for installation of a laundry and for repairing the plumbing and the furnace.
- 4. Transfer \$500 from Maintenance and Equipment, Publicity, for Longhorn Magazine, to Physics Department for salary of a caretaker, Earl Dickens, \$80 a month from January 1 through August 31.
- 5. Reappropriate \$2014.62 from general fund to Interscholastic League, Maintenance and Equipment, the same being receipts from the sale of League bulletins this year.
- 6. Add \$450 to the fund for instructors in English to apply on the salaries of two new instructors.

TRIPS BY PRESIDENT. Mr. Marsh moved that the President's physical location be determined by his own best judgment and that he report to the Board on out-of-the -state trips from time to time. The motion was adopted.

OUT-OF-STATE TRIPS. On motion of Dr. Wooten, seconded by Mr. Wroe, the Board authorized the following trips outside the state:

- 1. Mr. F. L. Reed, to St. Louis, to attend the Music Teachers National Association convention, December 28, 29, 30, 31, half of his expenses, approximately \$50, payable out of the maintenance fund of the Department of Music.
- 2. Mr. J. M. Bryant, to attend the meeting of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers, February 9-11, New York C. ty, and to stop off at Pittsburgh and Schenectady, to visit the plant of Westinghouse Electric Mfg. Co. and General Electric Co.

3. Mr. E. W. Winkler, to Chicago, December 29, 30, 31 to attend meeting of College and Reference Section of American Library Association, and to visit libraries at universities of Minnesota, Michigan, and Illinois, his expenses to and from Chicago payable out of Library General Expense, and the additional traveling expense incurred to be met by a special appropriation.

GRADUATE FACULTY. On motion of Dr. Wooten, seconded by Mr. Storey the President was requested to bring in a recommendation concerning the organization of a faculty for the Graduate School.

IITTLEFIELD MEMORIAL ARCH. Responding to an inquiry made by Mr. Wroe, the Board requested him and President Splawn to advise with Architect Greene and take whatever action seems wise with reference to the base of the Littlefield Memorial Arch.

BUDGET FOR BIENNIUM. On motion of Mr. Storey, seconded by Mrs. O'Hair, the Board gave the President authority in dealing with legislative committees, to make such changes in the budget submitted as seemed to him wise, and requested the three Austin regents to advise with the President and aid in any way they can to secure needed appropriations.

UNINVESTED BALANCE. On motion of Mr. Wroe the Board requested the Finance Co mmittee to confer with the State Treasurer and do their utmost to have invested properly a balance of more than ninety thousand dollars in the permanent fund now lying idle in the Treasury.

RECESS. At twelve o'clock the Board recessed until

#### Afternoon Session

The attendance in the afternoon was the same as in the forenoon.

LIVE OAK TREES. On motion of Mr. Marsh the Board authorized the President to have such live oak trees on the campus as may need it treated by a specialist.

AUDITORIUM. The President was authorized to investigate the cost of making the auditorium in the Main Building safe for use as such and report to the Board.

DEAN OF STUDENTS. Wr. Marsh moved that the Dean of Students represent the President in dealing with extracurricula student activities and that the President be empowered to represent the Board in budgetary matters before
the Legislature, including the resinstatement of the item
for the Dean of Students at a salary of \$5000 if possible.

PAYMENT OF OIL GAUGERS. With reference to a proposal to ask the Legislature to make provision outside of our budget for the payment of oil gaugers, etc., in Resgan County, it was referred, on motion of Mr. Marsh, seconded by Mr. Wroe, to Mr. Storey and President Splawn.

FACULTY LEGISLATION. On motion of Mr. Marsh, seconded by Dr. Wooten, the Board requested that the minutes of the General Faculty be kept on file in the President's Office and that he submit to the Board from time to time such portions as require authorization by the Regents.

B. B. A DEGREE. On motion of Dr. Wooten, seconded by Mr. Storey, the Board approved the following changes in the requirements for the degree of Bachelor of Business Administration recommended by the General Faculty:

1. Amend the catalogue of 1923-1924, p. 178 under "Required work in Business Administration" by substituting for No. 6 the following:

A two-thirds course in business statistics (No. 229).

Also add the following two sections:

- (7) Nine months of coordination work or its equivalent done to the satisfaction of the coordinator before completing the courses presented for the degree. In case of seasonal industries the nine months may be reduced to six at the discretion of the dean of the School of Business Administration.
- (8) One and two-thirds additional courses in business administration.
- 2. Amend the catalogue of 1923-1924, p. 178, under "Required work in the College of Arts and Sciences", striking out (4) and substituting for it the following:
  - (4) Economics 1 or 6, Government 10 or 1, and one additional course in the social sciences other than Psychology 46.

Also strike out No. (5), and change the present (6) to (5).

THIRD YEAR IN PHARMACY. On motion of Dr. Wooten, seconded by Mr. Whaley, the Board, acting upon a recommendation from the Medical Branch and the President, authorized the extension of the course in Pharmacy from two years to three.

PHOTOGRAPHIC LABORATORY. A letter from Honorable Felix Raymer, member of the Legislature from Travis County, with reference to the protest previously made against certain activities of the photographic laboratory at the University was read. Action was deferred pending the report of the Committee on Complaints and Grievances to which the protest in question has been referred.

WALDEN-BEARD FELLOWSHIP. President Splawn read the following statement from J. J. Walden and Roy J. Beard, of Ft. Worth, with reference to the founding of a fellowship by them. On motion of Mr. Storey, seconded by Dr. Wooten, the fellowship was accepted and the President requested to write them a letter of thanks.

"We, the undersigned, desire to create in the University of Texas, a Fellowship of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) a year, to be available each year for a member of the Faculty of the University, with the rank of Instructor, or Adjunct Professor. We stipulate that for the session of 1925-1926 that R. H. Montgomery, Adjunct Professor of Economics, shall be the recipient of the benefits of this Fellowship.

"Second, that beginning with the session 1926-1927, the Fellowship shall be awarded upon a competitive basis, the conditions of the competition to be worked out by the President of the University. It is also stipulated that the holder of this Fellowship shall agree to return to the State of Texas and teach in Texas Schools a period of three years. If he does not return to Texas it is understood that he will be required to repay the full amount of the Fellowship, which shall be applied as a part of the permanent sum finally to be set aside by the donors for the endowment of the fellowbe set aside by the donors for the endowment of the fellow-ship. If he should leave at the end of one year after reship. If he should leave at the fund two-thirds ceiving the Fellowship he will repay to the fund two-thirds of the Two Thousand Bollars. If he should leave after havening taught only two years, he would repay an amount equal to one-third of the Fellowship.

Third, that we will remit to the Auditor of the Univer-Texas, the amount of the Fellowship in ten install-\$200.00 each, beginning September 1, 1925, and we request that if our Bookkeeper should any month inadvertently overlook this remittance, that the Auditor shall promptly draw upon Southwestern Engraving Company for said installment thru the Texas National Bank, Fort Worth, Texas.

"Fourth, while it is our purpose to make this Fellowship permanent, we reserve the right to decide, efter a year of experimentation, if our businesses will be able to support such a permanent foundation.

Fifth, that in the event that we shall make this foundation permanent, as we now plan to do, we shall expect to keep the principal sum in our respective businesses until such time as we can afford to take from our businesses a sum sufficient to endow the Fellowship permanently. It is our purpose to create a reserve within our own businesses for the permanent endowment of this Fellowship, the details of that arrangement we, ourselves, shall work out.

"Sixth, we are establishing this foundation out of love of our Native State. We want to see the youth of Texas accomodated by as high type of instruction as are the young people of other states, and in order to hasten the development of such opportunities for the boys and girls of Texas, and to assure such facilities for instruction, we are establishing this foundation.

PROGRAM OF LECTURES IN 1886. Mr. J. W. Van Meter presented, through Dr. Splawn, a copy of the outline of a public lecture delivered in March, 1886, by Dr. Macfarlane, Professor of Physics, assisted by Mr. Van Meter. On motion of Dr. Wooten it was accepted with thanks and ordered framed.

MR. W. E. METZENTHIN. Based on an analysis of the growth of the German Department, the Board decided that Professor W. E. Metzenthin would not be needed next session and accordingly terminated his status as absent on leave with the close of the current session.

MR. F. W. GRAFF. The Board authorized the transfer of Mr. F. W. Graff, Professor of Business Administration, because of domestic troubles, to the Extension Center at Houston for the remainder of the current session beginning January 15 on his same salary, provided he makes a proper division with his wife, and voted to terminate his connection with the University on June 15, 1925. Mr. C. Aubrey Smith was moved from the Houston Extension Center to Austin to carry on Mr. Graff's work, his salary to be the same as heretofore.

CAMPUS SEWER SYSTEM. Professor E. C. H. Bantel was employed to design a sewer system for the entire campus, and immediately for the Biology Building, the basis of compensation to be the same as that for Professor Weaver while working on a power plant scheme.

FIRE RISK IN MEN'S GYMNASIUM. A letter from the State Fire Marshall calling attention to the fire hazard in the Men's Gymnasium by reason of the windows! being barred was referred to the Business Manager for attention.

ARCHITECT GREENE. The President read a letter from Architect Greene requesting that the approval of the Dean of Women, and not that of the Faculty Building Committee, be required in the case of the Alice Littlefield Dormitory. The Board reviewed the rules recently adopted governing routine procedure, thought they were proper and right, and on motion of Mr. Marsh, asked the President so to inform Mr. Greene.

LITTLEFIELD HOME. On motion of Dr. Wooten, seconded by Mr. Marsh, the Secretary was requested to ascertain whether or not a deed conveying the Littlefield residence to the University has actually been executed and if it has not to see that it is done at once.

LITTLEFIELD WILL. Mr. Dudley Woodward came before the Board and made a clear statement of the provisions of the will of the late George W. Littlefield and of the present situation with reference thereto. At the conclusion the following motion was made by Regent Marsh, seconded by Regent Wooten and passed by the Board:

"That the matter of the signing and approving by the Regents of the University of Texas of a certain contract between the Littlefield properties, the Yellow House Land Company and the South Plains Trust Company be delegated to a special committee consisting of the President of the University and Regents Storey and Wooten, with power to act:

"That the Regents of the University approve in principle the general plan of the proposal as outlined by its special counsel, D. K. Woodward, at the Board meeting, January 17, 1925;

Proval and sign a document expressing its approval only upon the advice, consent, and approval of the Attorney General of the State of Texas;

"That should such approval and action be taken by the special committee of the Board of Regents, in accordance with the approval of the Attorney as above stated, the same shall constitute specific approval by the Board of Regents as a whole, and said Committee is specially authorized to sign any and all papers necessary to carry out the intent of this resolution."

Regent Wroe stated that because of his personal interest in the will he did not vote on this motion. The Chairman was empowered to fill any vacancy that might occur in the committee provided by the above motion.

ROYALTY OIL An alternative proposition for the purchase of our royalty oil was presented from Walter K. Campbell and J. F. Darby. Both propositions were referred to a committee consisting of the President, Regent Storey and the Land Committee, with power to act.

ASSISTANT TO THE PRESIDNET'S SECRETARY. Because of an increase in work at this season the Board on motion of Mr. Storey, seconded by Mrs. O'Hair, provided an assistant to the President's Secretary for three months at \$100 per month.

TUTOR IN THE LAW SCHOOL. On motion of Mr. Marsh the Board authorized an additional assistant in the Law School and appropriated therefor the sum of \$500.

The Board adjourned at six o' flock.

Austin, Texas, February 23, 1925.

The Board of Regents of the University of Texas met in the President's Office at nine thirty on Monday morning, February 23, 1925. Fresent: Regents Stark (Chairman), O'Hair Storey, M. E. Foster of Houston, Ed Howard of Wichita Falls, Sam Neathery of McKinney, S. C. Padelford of Ft. Worth, Mart H. Royston of Galveston, and George W. Tyler of Belton; President Splawn; and the Secretary.

This being the first meeting of the biennium and there being six new Regents, Chairman Stark took a few minutes in which to explain general policies and practicies of the Board.

REORGANIZATION. In accordance with the Rules and Regulations the Chairman stated that the reorganization of the Board was due at this meeting and declared nominations in order for the chairmanship for the ensuing two years. Mr. Storey nominated Mr. Stark to suceed himself as Chairman. Mrs. O'Hair took the chair. Mr. Stark's nomination was seconded by Judge Tyler. Mr. Foster nominated Mr. Royston. The Board recessed for one hour. At eleven o'clock the Board reconvened and elected Mr. Stark unanimously. In taking the chair Mr. Stark expressed his warm appreciation of the honor and declared it to be his sincerest purpose to give his best to the University and the State, in cooperation with all.

Nominations for Vice-Chairman were now called for. Judge Tyler nominated Mrs. O'Hair, who requested that this honor go to one of the new members. Mr. Storey proposed Mr. Foster, who, in turn, named Mr. Royston.for this position. A vote was taken on each. Mr. Foster receiving a plurality was given a unanimous election as Vice-Shairman.

The Chairman then declared nominations for Secretary to be in order. Mr. Mathews stated that while it was a pleasure and an honor to serve as the Board's Secretary, which he had done since the death of Judge James B. Clark in December, 1908, he felt that in view of the tremendous growth of the University and the consequent increase in his duties as Registrar and Assistant Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, a change would be advisable and he therefore asked to be relieved of the secretaryship. President Splawn recommended Mr. C. D. Simmons, Editorial and Statistical Assistant in the Registrar's Office, to be Secretary of the Board of Regents and, on motion of Mr. Storey, he was unanimously elected. At the request of the Board Mr. Simmons came in and entered at once upon his duties.

RETIRING SECRETARY THANKED. On motion of Mr. Neathery the Board gave a vote of thanks to the retiring Secretary for faithful service.

EXPENSES OF REGENTS. Attention was called to the fact that the present plan of allowing five dollars a day for all of the expenses of a regent, in attending meetings except railroad and pullman fares is not adequate. Judge Tyler moved that actual expenses be reported. Mr. Storey offered as a substitute that the allowance be ten dollars a road and pullman fares. The substitute was adopted.

LITTLEFIELD WILL. So many of the Regents being new, the President had Mr. Dudley Woodward come again and explain the provisions of the Littlefield will. Mr. Wood-ward also presented the request of the Yellow House Land Company that other legatees, desiring land, be posmitted to each ange bonds for notes. On motion of Mr. Neathery, second such exchange.

Chairman Stark reported that upon the authority conferred upon the Chairman at the last meeting he had appointed Mrs. O'Hair in place of Dr. Wooten on the special committee to execute a certain contract with the Littlefield Properties, the Yellow House Land Company, and the South Plains Trust Company.

LAND ACQUISITION BOARD. Mr. Guy Collett, Chairman of the University Land Acquisition Board, came before the Regents with the information that all of the parcels involved have been purchased except about five, including the Doom and Kavanaugh tracts, that these were in the process, that on the basis of the offers made on these tracts the appropriation made by the Legislature for this purpose would fall short of the requirements by \$84,698.96, and that, in his judgment, the Board of Regents should request the Legislature for an appropriation of \$220,000, being a reappropriation of the present balance of about \$119,000 plus an additional sum to cover the shortage plus a small margin. After the purchase by the State the citizens of Austin will pay the shortage. On motion of Mr. Storey, seconded by Mrs. O'Hair, the Board referred this matter to the Legislative Committee, in conference with Mr. Collett, with power to act.

UNIVERSITY LAND AGENT. Mr. R. E. L. Saner, University Land Agent, came before the Board with information about the University's lands, stating that our land rentals now amount to \$235,000 a year. On motion of Mr. Storey, seconded by Mrs. O'Hair, the Board declared its appreciation of Mr. Saner's services in handling our lands.

CHARGES AGAINST FACULTY MEMBERS. The Board request ed the President to inform the faculty that a member of the faculty against whom a charge had been made to the Board would always be granted a hearing if he desired it before being relieved of his position.

GIFTS TO UNIVERSITY LIBRARY. President Splawn announced two gifts to the University Library, one of fifty-seven bound volumes of sheet music and fifty-five unbound pieces from the library of the late William F. North, presented by Mr. O. H. Millican of Austin; the other consisting of six books from Mr. M. B. Brown, Superintendent of the State School for the Blind. The Board accepted the gifts with a vote of thanks to the donors.

TORNADO INSURANCE. On motion of Mr. Neathery, seconded by Mr. Foster, the Board appropriated the sum of \$3368.27 for the renewal for one year of the tornado insurance now being carried at the Main University.

COMPLETION OF REPAIRS AT GALVESTON. The President advised the Board that the alterations in the Main Building at Galveston had been completed and accepted as satisfactory by all concerned. The Board ordered final payments to be made.

BUBBLE DRINKING FOUNTAINS. On motion of Mrs.

O'Hair the Board appropriated \$116.00 additional for the installation of Halsey Taylor Puritan Type drinking fountains in the new building at Galveston in lieu of the ones specified in the contract.

REAGAN COUNTY OIL FIELDS. A proposed right of way contract with the Humble Pipe Line Co. and a request from Mr. J. P. Kittrell for a permit to dig holes, sink poles and erect wires necessary to enable him to operate an electric transit conductor line at Best to supply the town of Big Lake with electric lights and power, were referred, on motion of Mr. Storey seconded by Mr. Neathery, to the Land Committee with power to act.

STADIUM DIRECTORS. On motion of Mrs. O'Hair, seconded by Mr. Royston, the Board appointed the following directors for the Texas Memorial Stadium to serve for one year beginning January 1, 1925, the same being recommended by the President:

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R. T. Fleming, State at large; W. T. Caswell and D. C. Reed, Austin; W. H. Richardson, Frost Woodhull and Ed C. Connor, Ex-students; E. C. H. Bantel and L. Theo. Bellmont, Faculty; Eldon Dyer, Cecil Chamberlin and William L. McGill, Students; and H. J. L. Stark, Board of Regents.

APPOINTMENTS. The Board appointed Charles Paul Boner, M.A., Instructor in Physics from February 15 to June 15 at the rate of \$1800 a year, out of the salary balance of Dr. Romberg, to be absent on leave; and Miss Mary Vincent, a graduate of the Boston School of Physical Education, Instructor in Physical Training for Women, from January 1 to June 15, succeeding Miss Florence Curtis, resigned, at the same salary.

INTERSCHOLASTIC LEAGUE. On motion of Mr. Neathery the Board transferred \$1141.25 received by the Interscholastic League from the sale of their bulletins to the maintenance fund of the League.

NEW APPROPRIATIONS. On motion of Mr. Storey the Board made the following additional appropriations:

- 1. For a new assistant in the Department of Philosophy and Psychology, \$180.
- 2. For a lecture from Professor J. Hardemand while he is in this country this spring, \$100 to the Committee on Public Lectures.
- 3. For the inauguration of President, Splawn, \$1200.

LEAVES OF ABSENCE. On motion of Mr. Neathery the Board granted a leave of absence, without pay, to Dr. Arnold Romberg, Professor of Physics, from February 15 to September 15, to study in Europe, and to Mr. E. E. Hale, Adjunct Professor of Economics, for the session of 1925-1926, to study toward his Ph.D. degree at the University of Wisconsin.

LEAVES WITH PAY. Dr. M. S. Handman, Professor of Sociology, requested that the leave, with pay, granted him for the spring term of this session be postponed until the spring of 1926-1927, he not being able to get away from his work before that time. On motion of Mr. Royston the Board replied that it is inclined to believe the policy of granting leaves with pay is of doubtful wisdom and that the whole question will be studied anew and a decision reached later.

OUT-OF-STATE TRAVEL. On motion of Mrs. O'Hair seconded by Mr. Neathery, permission was given for the following trips:

- 1. Miss Lucy J. Newton, Dean of Women, to attend a meeting of the deans of women to be held in Cincinnati this month. \$140 appropriated therefor.
- 2. Miss Laura Murray, Head of the Industrial Teacher-Training Division of the Bureau of Extension, to attend a meeting of the Vocational Education Association of the Middle West in Chicago on February 12-15.
- 3. Dr. William Keiller to attend a meeting of the Association of American Medical Colleges to be held in Boston on Mary, 5-7.
- 4. Dr. W. T. Mather, President of the Board of Directors of the University Y. M. C. A., to go to Chicago on February 28 for a conference with Dr. Mott and others in an affort to secure an endowment of our work-here by the Rockefeller Board.

BIOLOGY BUILDING. On motion of Mr. Foster, the Board appropriated \$400 for lowering the grade about the Biology Building.

SEWERAGE PLAN. On motion of Mr. Royston, seconded by Judge Tyler, the Board appropriated \$4.250 for laying a 12 sewer pipe down 24th Street from the Biology Building to Duval Street, connecting there with the North Austin Main, thereby providing sewerage not only for the Biology Building but for all other buildings north of 24th Street and east of Whitis Avenue.

GALVESTON LABORATORY BUILDING. On motion of Mrs. O'Hair the Board appropriated \$272.00 for an extension of the machine shop and \$176.00 for changing the shelving, both in the new laboratory building at Galveston.

ALTERATIONS IN MAIN BUILDING AT GALVESTON. On motion of Mrs. O'Hair the Board voted to request the Legislature to include in their emergency bill an item of \$50,000 for repairing the remainder of the Main Building at Galveston.

ROCKWALL COUNTY GEOLOGICAL FORMATIONS. In a letter from Mr. F. P. Holland, President of the Texas Farm and Ranch Publishing Co., he proposed an examination of a certain geological formation in Rockwall County in cooperation with the University, he to defray the expenses and the University to loan our Professor Pearce, Department of Anthropology, and Mr. Patton from the Bureau of Economic Geology, for a short time. On motion of Mr. Neathery the proposal was accepted.

OIL ROYALTIES. Certain propositions from Walter K. Campbell and J. F. Barby for the purchase of University royalty oil were referred to the Land Committee with power to act.

- D. 4. Change to read: "All candidates for the Bachelor of Music degree must by examination demonstrate attainments and technical proficiency in applied music satisfactory to the Department of Music."
- 5. Thanksgiving Season. Thanksgiving recess is understood to include Thanksgiving Day only. On Friday and Saturday immediately following all classes shall be met as usual, and all absences on those days shall be duly reported and recorded. Members of the instructing staff who are in attendance upon the sessions of the Texas State Teachers Association shall make whatever provision seems to them desirable for the work of their classes during their absence, but this provision should not take the form of a written quiz. The Committee on Student Social Affairs is requested to take under advisement the desirability of limiting the social functions of Thanksgiving week.
- 6. Calendar for 1926 and Thereafter. That January 2 be the official registration day for new students entering the winter term, and March 18 registration day for new students entering the spring term.

YELLOW HOUSE LAND COMPANY. Just before adjournment Mr. M. H. Reed of Austin, a member of the Yellow House Land Co., came asking that he be given an opportunity to show that permission to legatees under the Littlefield will to exchange bonds for notes would be beneficial to the University. On motion of Mr. Foster the matter was referred to the Land Committee with power to act, provided the decision reached is unanimous.

PUBLICITY. On motion of Mr. Storey, seconded by Mr. Howard, the Board asked Regents Foster and Howard and President Splawn to serve as a publicity committee.

PHOTOGRAPHIC LABORATORY. The complaint concerning the Photographic Laboratory was referred to the new Committee on Complaints and Grievances. The President requested that the matter be handled as a case in court.

The Board adjourned at seven o'clock.

The Board of Regents of the University of Texas met in the President's office at ten o'clock on Wednesday morning, March 11, 1925. Sent: Regents Stark (chairman), Foster, Howard, Neathery, O'Hair, Padelford, Royston, Tyler; President Splawn; and the Secretary.

On motion of Mr. Royston, seconded by Mr. Neathery, the minutes of the meeting of February 23 were approved.

The minutes of the meeting of January 17 were ordered approved

OIL ROYALTIES. Judge Padelford brought up for discussion the question of oil royalties received from University lands. He stated that, in his opinion, royalties from oil were personal property. Judge Padelford gave in substance the holding of the Supreme Court of Texas in Jones vs. O'Brien, 251 S.W. 208:

"that the ... subject of the contract ... was the one-eighth royalty, as commonly understood; that is, an interest in the cil after being separated from the soil and placed in pipe lines or other depositories, or an interest in the money value thereof."

The opinion quoted cites Bender vs. Brooks, 103 Texas 329, which affirms the holding of Kelley vs. Ohio ( 1 Co., 57 Ohio St. 517, that

"Petroleum oil is a minera, and while in the earth it is part of the realty, and should it move from place to place by percolation or otherwise, it forms part of that tract of land in which it tarries for the time being, and if it moves to the next adjoining tracts it becomes the time being, and if it moves to the next adjoining tracts it becomes the time part and parcel of that tract; and it forms part of some tract, until it reaches a well and is raised to the surface, and then for the first time it becomes the subject of distinct ownership separate from the realty, it becomes the subject of distinct ownership separate from the realty, and becomes personal property, the property of the person into whose well are also and this is so whether the oil moves, percolates, or exists in pools or deposits. In either event, it is property of, and belongs to, the person who reaches it by means of a well and severs it from the realty and converts it into personalty."

LAND ACQUISITION BOARD. The Board entered into a discussion of the progress made by the Land Acquisition Board. Dr. Splawn reported on the progress of proposals to protect the University's interests. Dr. Splawn's report was followed by statements from Judge Fadelford and Judge Royston as to the technical procedure in the acquisition of land by condemnation proceedings.

Following the discussion, a committee, consisting of Judge Royston, Mr. Neathery, and Judge Padelford, was appointed to examine the bond given to guarantee the purchase price of the lam; to see that proper steps have been taken to prevent the bond from lapsing; and to communicate with the Board of Acquisition and the Attorney General with a view to hastening the acquisition of the Campus extension, the committee to have power to act for the Board of Regents.

WESTBROOK BILL. On motion of Mr. Neathery, seconded by Judge Tyler, Judge Padelford was appointed a committee of one to confer with the Governor in regard to the Westbrook Bill (H.B. 246, providing, among other things, that the royalties from oil out of University lands be placed in the Available Fund instead of the Endowment Fund), giving his opinion as to its constitutionality, and urging the Governor to sign it.

OUT OF STATE TRAVEL. On motion of Mr. Neathery, seconded by Judge Tyler, permission was given for the following trips:

1. Mr. B.C. Tharp to Tucson, Arizona, at the expense and on invitation of the Carnegie Institution, from March 8 through March 12, for the purpose of conferring with Dr. F.E. Clements about the progress of the investigations upon the ecology of East Texas vegetation.

2. Dr. J.T. Patterson to Washington, D.C., April 23 through 29, to attend the annual meeting of the Division of biology of the National Research Council.

B. HALL AFFAIR. Dr. Splawn reported that, immediately following angattack on Brackenridge Hall on the night of March 1 by mambers of the freshman class, he had charged the Administrative Council with the responsibility of making a thorough investigation, reporting their findings together with such recommendations as they saw fit. The Administrative Council's sub-committee conducted an exhaustive investigation and incorporated their findings and recommendations in the following report to the Administrative Council, which body approved and adopted it. There being no dispute as to the facts, and no one desiring to contest the findings of facts submitted by the sub-committee and approved by the Administrative Council, the President submitted to the Board of Regents the conclusions of the Council and their decision as to what should be done. After some discussion the Board, on motion of Mr. Neathery, seconded by Judge Tyler, approved the findings of the faculty committee and made it the action of the Board. (For copy see the President's files.)

CIFTS TO UNIVERSITY LIBRARY. President Splam announced the gift of Volumes 1 to 23 of the Confederate Veteran to the University Liprary by Mr. And Mrs. Richard Pope Reese, of Pensacola, Florida. The Board accepted the gift with a vote of thanks to the donors.

TRANSFER AND APPROPRIATION. The Board ordered made the following transfer and appropriation:

- 1. Transfer \$300 of the unexpended balance for the services of an instructor in Surgery, Medical Brench, to the fund for student assistants, same department.
- 2. The appropriation of \$500 for the use of the Library in purchasing 100 copies of the Ex-Students' Directory to be used for Library exchange purposes. 5
- J. FRANK DOBIE, ADJUNCT PROFESSOR OF ENGLISH. The Board appointed J. Frank Dobie to be an adjunct professor of English, at \$2800, beginning September 15, 1925.

LIGHTING STREETS NEAR CAMPUS. The Board authorized the President to make an agreement with the city of Austin whereby the latter shall furnish the power and the University shall supply the equipment for proper lighting of the campus and property adjacent to the campus, the specifications as to materials, and the details of the contract to be worked out later.

PHOTOGRAPHIC BUREAU. Upon recommendation of President Splawn, the Board adopted a motion made by Mr. Howard and seconded by Judge Royston, to suspend the operation of the Photographic Bureau, Division of Extension, with the close of the fiscal year, ending August 31, 1925. It is further understood that the firm receiving the contract for the Cactus engraving shall be required to maintain a photographic studio adjacent to the University Campus.

The Board adjourned to meet on the regular May meeting date unless called sooner by Chairman Stark or President Splawn.

The Board of Regents of the University of Texas met in the President's office at ten o'clock on the morning of April 13, 1925. The meeting, called primarily at the suggestion of the Land Committee to enable them to report definite suggestions resulting from their consideration of the bill undertaking to place royalties from oil on University land in the available (or building) fund, was authorized by Vice-Chairman Foster, in the absence from the state of Chairman Stark. Present: Regents Howard, Neathery, Padelford, Royston, Storey, Tyler; President Splawn and the Secretary.

In the absence of the Chairman and the Vice-Chairman, Judge Tyler, on motion of Judge Padelford seconded by Er. Storey, was elected to preside as temporary chairman.

On motion of Mr Storey, action on the minutes of the meeting of March 11 was deferred until the next regular meeting.

Dr. Splawn was given permission to present certain routine matters before the Board took up the special topics for which the meeting was called.

by Mr. Storey, the Board accepted with a vote of thanks the gifts

- 1. From Mrs. Howell Bunton, Austin, a life-size bust of General Sum Houston, and a painting on vellum, presented by General Houston to Mrs. Bunton's father; also approximately 500 medical books for the Medical Branch, Galveston.
- 2. Four volumes from the library of Mr. M.B. Brown, Superintendent of the State School for the Blind.

Judge Padelford announced that he would in the near future present to the University Library a copy of the first biography of Judge Mansfield ever written.

APPOINTMENTS FOR 1925-1926. On motion of Mr. Storey, seconded by Mr. Neathery, the Board approved the following recommendations of President Splann for appointments.

- 1. A. Torres Rioseco, adjunct professor of Romance Languages at \$2800, effective September 15, 1925.
- 2. Douglas S.Beers, instructor inEnglish at \$2200, effective September 15, 1925.
- 3. Miss Gertrude Earhart, adjunct professor of Elementary Education, at \$2800, effective September 15, 1925, for two years, her reappointment to be considered at the end of that time.

DEAN OF WOMEN. President Splawn asked authority to close a contract with a dean of women if a suitable applicant should appear before the May meeting. On motion of Mr. Storey, seconded by Mr. Neathery this authority was granted, the contract to be subject to the approval of the Board.

GRADUATE PROFESSORS. President Splawn pointed out the necessity of immediate action if the new graduate professorships provided in the appropriation bill were to be filled to the best advantage. On motion of Mr. Storey, seconded by Mr. Neathery, the Board instructed Dr. Splawn to proceed (pending the report of the General Faculty relative to the organization of the Graduate School) to fill the new positions as in the case of other positions under present regulations.

ALIEN RESOLUTION. Dr. Splawm called the attention of the Board to a resolution passed by the Regents in 1917, prohibiting the employment of aliens by the University. On motion of Mr. Neathery, seconded by Judge Royston, the Board voted to amend the resolution by substituting the word enemy alien for the word alien, it being the sense of the Board that competent American citizens should be employed by the University, everything else being equal, otherwise friendly aliens be employed.

DR. HACKETT-LEAVE OF ABSENCE. On motion of Mr. Storey, the Board granted leave without pay for 1925-1926 to Dr. C.W. Hackett, associate professor of latin American History, to enable him to accept an offer to teach at Harvard University during the absence of Professor Haring of that University.

DR. SCHOCH-LEAVE OF ABSENCE. The Board granted permission to Dr. E.P. Schoch to make several days' trip to Breckendidge to appear as expert witness in the district court, and to Waxhachie to pass on fire damage to the private papers of C.M. Alexander.

OUT OF STATE TRAVEL. On motion of Judge Royston, seconded by Mr. Storey, permission was given for the following out of state trips:

- 1. DE; Carl Hartman to Cleveland and Philadelphia, to attend the Anatomists Convention at Cleveland, and the Telebration of the TwentiethAnniversary of the Organization of the Advisory Board of the Wistar Institute.
- 2. Dean Spurgeon Bell to attend the meeting of the Association of Collegiate Schools of Business, during the first week in May.
- 3. Miss Mary E. Gearing to make a trip East in order to secure the best available persons to fill vacancies in the Home Economics faculty next year.

4. Professor J.M. Bryant to Columbus, Ohio, Cleveland, Schenectady, Albany, New York, and other points in the East to visit laboratories and testing stations, in connection with the new law on automobile headlighting, his expenses paid from the funds available under the bill.

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- Professor Bryant to St. Louis, April 13-17, to attended the American Institute of Electrical Engineers, his expenses paid by the Institute.
- 5. Mr. E.J. Mathews to Boulder, to attend the American Association of Collegiate Registrars, April 14-17.
- 6. Mr. T.H. Shelpy to the University of Virginia to attend the meeting of National Extension Association, and to the University of North Carolina to visit extension work there, during the latter part of April and the first of May.
- 7. Dr. W.A. Felsing to visit a number of universities in the North and East for the purpose of studying chemical laboratories, at the request of the Building Committee of the Faculty.
- 8. Dean Bellmont, Mr. S.C.P. Vosper, and Dr. W.J. Battle, to Urbana, to consult with Professor James M. White with reference to a gymnasium-auditorium.

TRANSFERS AND APPROPRIATIONS. The following transfers and new appropriations, on motion duly adopted, were ordered:

- 4. Appropriation of \$300 for the purpose of cooperating with the Carnegie Institution of Washington, in ecological research in East Texas under the direction of Professor Tharp.
- 5. Transfer of \$96 from the totor and assistant rund of the Department of Civil Engineering to the same fund in the Department of Architecture.
- 6. Transfer of \$100 from the Department of Engineering and Mathematics to the Department of Metallurgy; and \$125 from the Department of Geology--College of Mines and Metallurgy.
- 7. Authorization to use \$200 of the Library fund, College of Mines and Metallurgy, for financial assistance of the "Flow Sheet," annual publication of the students, provided 100 copies are delivered to the Library at the College.

FACULTY LEGISLATION. On motion of Mr. Storey seconded by Judge Padelford, the Board voted to put into effect the following proposed faculty legislation, when, as, and if passed by the General Faculty.

RECITATION BUILDING. On motion of Mr. Neathery, seconded by Mr. Howard, the Regents' Building Committee was authorized to advertise for bids after conference with Architect Greene, for the construction of the Recitation Building, these bids to be opened at the regular meeting on May 19, the Board to reserve the right to reject any or all bids. Judge Tyler, acting chairman, asked to be recorded as voting in favor of the motion.

REPAIRS TO MAIN BUILDING, GALVESTON. President Splawn explained the necessity for repairs on the Mein Building at the Medical Branch, Galveston, Judge Royston supplementing the report. On motion of Judge Padelford, seconded by Mr. Storey, the Board appropriated \$50,000 for repairing and renovating the Main Building.

MOVING HOUSES FROM LITTLEFIELD DORMITORY SITE. President Splaws presented estimates compiled by the Business Manager as to the cost of removing five nouses from the west side of University Avenue and the east side of Whitis Avenue between 25th and 26th Streets (the site selected for the erection of the Alive Littlefield Memorial Dormitory). On motion of Mr. Storey, the Board authorized the removal of these nouses, and the clearing of the south None-half of the blocks just north of 24th Street and between Whitis wonue and Speedway for use as tennis courts and athletic grounds for women, the University to advertise for bids on the work.

GYMNASIUM LOCATED. On motion of Mr. Storey the Board approved the recommendation of the Faculty Building Committee that the Men's Gymmasium, when constructed, be located on the block bounded by 21st Street, Speedway, 22d, and Tom Green Streets.

DEDICATION ADDRESSES -- BIOLOGY BUILDING. On motion of Mr. Neath- 2 2 ery, seconded by Judge Royston, the Board voted to publish the addresses to be delivered upon the dedication of the Biology Building. .

PUBLIC SPEAKING PRIZES. President Splawn presented a request from Mr. Griscom, chairman of the Department of Public Speaking, that the Regents authorize: First, that all public speaking prizes be awarded at the June commencement; second, that the donors of the money prizes be requested to pay the money to the Auditor; and third, that the Auditor be requested to notify the donors each September that they may pay him. On motion of Judge Royston, seconded by Mr. Howard, the request was

PETITION RE DEPARTMENT OF JOURNALISM. On motion of Mr. Storey, petition from the students of the Department of Journalism, relative to its discontinuence was referred to the Committee on Complaints and Grievances, this committee to report on the petition at the meeting of May 19. (A copy of the petition was supplied each Regent by the students, and a copy is on tile in the President's office.

#### Afternoon Session

The Eoard having recessed for lunch at 11:40 a.m., reassembled at 2:00 p.m., the same members being present as in the morning.

It was decided to hold the next regular meeting, May 19, at the livez, and Judge Royston was asked to make the necessary reservation the hotel for the meeting. Hotel Galvez, and Judge Royston was asked to make the necessary reserva-

tuted at once to determine the validity of the act. The Board then discussed the matter at some length, following which it was voted, on motion of Lr. "WHEREAS, at a meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Texas duly called and held in the city of Austin on the 13th day of April, A.D., 1925, there was duly adopted by said Board a resolution of which the following is an exact copy:

WHEREAS, the Littlefield Properties, a Trust Estate created by a certain declaration of trust dated February 24th, 1921, recorded in Volume 112, pages 109 to 137, of the Deed Records of Travis County, Texes, have sold and conveyed to various purchasers certain lands which by deed dated February 24th, 1921, had been conveyed to said The Little field Properties by Mrs. Alice P. Littlefield joined by Whitfield Harral, H.A. Wroe, and J.P. White, Executors of the Will of George W. Littlefield deceased, including, among others, certain lands formerly belonging to the community estate of George W. and Alice P. Littlefield, situated in Lamb and Hockley Counties, Texas;

"AED, WHENEAS, on the conditions hereinafter stated the trustses of the said The Littlefield Properties, have tendered to the Board of Regents of the University of Texas bonds of the Plains Investment Company, a corporation, in the total principal sum of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars, and secured by a certain trust deed of indenture executed by said Plains Investment Company dated March 6th, 1925, to The American mational Bank of Austin, Texas, as Trustee, to which instrument and the record thereof in the records of Lamb and Hockley Counties, Texas, reference is here made;

"THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Board of Regents of the University of Texas as follows:

"First: That the location of the University of Texas shall not be removed from its present position in the City of Austin, Teras, but it is to be understood that branches of the University may be haintained or established elsewhere, but that the main university shall remain at its present location, and that if sufficient ground cannot be secured in the immediate neighborhood of said campus for construction of buildings for said university such ground may be secured elsewhere in the City of Austin, Texas, but that the present campus or available ground in the neighborhood shall be utilized so far as is consistent with they space there available before any buildings are constructed elsewhere;

"'Second: That said bonds or the proceeds thereof (whether derived from their sale or the payment thereof) are to be used for the construction of a main building, or if that shall have been otherwise provided for, then for the construction of one or two other buildings, all to be constructed on the campus now used and occupied by the Univercity of Texas and Mowhere else; it being expressly understood that no

Degrees continued PRESIDENT'S REPORT. President Splawn reported on the growth of the student body, the progress made by the faculty in the conduct on page 383) of the University work, and the outlook for the coming year. He also reported that as a result of further investigation into the B. Hall episode, the penalties previously imposed had been modified. (The modified penalties are on file in the President's Office.) A comprehensive

report of the action of the University in other discipline cases was made.

B. HALL PENAMIES APPROVED. On motion of Judge Tyler, seconded by Mr. Foster, the Board voted unanimously to approve the action of the President in modifying the penalties imposed upon participants in the B. Hall episode and the action taken in other discipline cases.

PLANS FOR NEW BUILDINGS. A motion was adopted to instruct the University Architect to proceed with the preparation of plans for the extension to the Library Building, for the Chemistry Building, for the Power Plant.

AMOUNT OF WORK INSTRUCTORS MAY TAKE. The following motion was adopted: A person employed by the University as a full-time instructor shall not be permitted to take more than one full course of three hours a week for the year, in addition to his teaching duties.

RESIGNATIONS. President Splawn announced the following resignations from the University faculty:

- 1. Dr. H.G. James, professor of Government, effective June 15, 1925, in order to accept the deanship of the College of Arts, at the University of Nebraska.
- 2. Dr. C.G. Haines, professor of Law, effective June 15, 1925 to accept a professorship in Political Science in the Southern Branch of the University of California.

The Board voted to accept the resignations with regret.

PITTENGER APPOINTED ACTING DEAN OF THE SCHOOL OF EDUCATION. In view of the illness of Dr. Sutton, dean of the School of Education, the Board authorized the appointment of Dr. B.F. Pittenger as acting dean until August 51, 1925, in the hope that Dr. Sutton, relieved of this responsibility, may soon be restored to health.

TRANSFERS AND APPROPRIATIONS. The following transfers of funds were authorized and appropriations made.

- 1. Registrar's Office-transfer \$300 from the maintenance account to the clerical account.
- 2. School of Law--transfer \$193.15 from the balance remaining in the salary of Lecturer Graves to the maintenance account, and authorize the use of this amount for the traveling expenses of Dean Hildebrand to attend the meeting of the American Law Institute.
- 5. Library--transfer \$550 from the salary account of a typist to the maintenance and equipment account for the purchase of material needed for the catalogue department.
- 4. Library Science-appropriate \$15 to the maintenance account.
- 5. Art of Teaching--appropriate \$50 for the traveling expenses of Professor J.L. Henderson, to attend the annual meeting of the Congress of Farent-Teachers' Association at Wichita Falls, Texas.
- 6. Mechanical Engineering-appropriate \$500 to the maintenance account, this amount having been credited to the general fund from the sale of a spindle wood shaper which the department received from the Camp Mabry equipment.
- 7. Oil gauger-appropriate \$616.53 for salary and/upkeep of car for the remainder of the fiscal year.

DR. UDDEN-LEAVE OF ABSENCE. The request of Dr. J.A. Udden for a leave of absence for three months beginning about June 1, was

RECITATION BUILDING PLANS. Fresident Splawn read to the Board a letter from the State Building Inspector, approving the plans for the Recitation Building, as submitted by Architect Greene.

BIOLOGY BUILDING. The Board authorized the following additional appropriations to cover the cost of changes in the plans for the equipment of the Biology Building:

- 1. To cover the additional cost of installing an automatic elevator, \$95.
- 2. To cover the cost of additional case work, coat and hat hook trim, blackboard, and a lead sink, \$434.

MAY 19 1925

RADIO EQUIPMENT. The Board adopted the President's recommendation that the equipment remaining in the Radio Station be turned over to the Department of Physics.

NEW POWER PLANT. The President reported that Mr. Hal C. Weaver had been unable to make the study of a new power plant, under the authority granted by the Board on May 15, 1924. The Board approved the renewal of the arrangement for the summer of 1925, and directed that Mr. Weaver be placed on the payroll from June 15 to long session.

Weaver's Trip. The Board authorized Mr. Weaver to take advantage of a trip to the plant of the Western Electric Company to visit certain institutions suggested by the Faculty Building Committee, in order to study their plants. His expenses over and above those paid by the Western Electric Company are to be paid by the University.

REMISSION OF FEES OF DOCTOR GEHMAN. The Board authorized the waiving of all fees, including matriculation, library, medical, and other fees, in the case of Dr. M.H. Gehman, National Research Fellow in Mathematics, who plans to pursue research in the University of Texas. The Board approved in principle the waiving of fees of all comes up.

GRADUATE SCHOOL. On motion of Judge Tyler, seconded by Mr. Howard, the Board adopted the following plan for the organization of the Graduate School:

#### THE GRADUATE SCHOOL

Pursuant to the action of the Regents in 1910, authorizing a graduate school, the Regents now deem it an appropriate time to list apart a graduate faculty as in the case of other schools.

### The Graduate Faculty

Appointments to the graduate faculty shall be made by the president with full advice from the departments concerned, transmitted through the respective undergraduate dean with his comments of approval or disapproval to the dean of the Graduate School, who in turn will pass the recommendation on to the president, with any comments or requests he may desire to present.

The president is advised to proceed with due deliberation in appointing professors to the graduate faculty. It is suggested that at this time he shall appoint a few members to the graduate faculty, and add others from time to time. Two years is not too long a period for this task.

In choosing members of the graduate faculty, the president and all called upon herein to advise him shall consider (1) graduate training, (2) length and character of teaching experience, (5) publications, particularly those following the doctor's thesis, (4) membership in learned societies, (5) invitations to address learned societies, (6) aids received from research grants, et cetera.

#### The Dean of the Graduate School

A dean of the Graduate School shall be appointed each two years by the president, as in the case of other deans.

### Compensation of Members of the Graduate Faculty

The salaries of members of the graduate faculty shall be their salaries as members of their respective undergraduate schools or colleges. However, the regents may, upon the recommendation of the president, add to such compensation on the condition that the beneficiary shall not teach classes in this or any other university during the vacation period. This is provided so that vacations may be used for study, for travel, and for research, with a view to higher efficiency luring the nine months in which instruction is given.

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#### Jurisdiction of the Graduate Faculty

The graduate faculty shall have exclusive jurisdiction over the requirements for the degrees: Master of Arts, Master of Business Administration, Master of Science in Engineering, Doctor of Philosophy, and other graduate degrees subsequently created by the Board of Regents. The graduate faculty shall have jurisdiction over such matters as requirements for admission to graduate standing and to candidacy for graduate degrees, the requirements for graduate degrees, the awarding of scholarships and fellowships to graduate students, research publications, research grants, and other matters properly within the scope of the graduate faculty.

The graduate faculty may determine what committees it will require. Upon request, the president will appoint a committee.

The graduate faculty, like other faculties, shall adopt and publish necessary regulations.

#### Instructional Staff

In addition to the members of the graduate faculty, the instructional staff shall include all members of the general faculty and of the faculty of the Medical Branch who give the courses of instruction which are accepted by the graduate faculty for graduate degrees.

APPOINTMENT OF MISS RUBY R. TERRILL, DEAN OF WOMEN. On motion of Judge Royston, seconded by Judge Padelford, the Board approved the appointment of Liss Ruby R. Terrill dean of women and associate professor of Classical Languages, at a salary of \$3,600 a year, effective September 15, 1925. Mrs. O'Hair asked to be recorded as voting No.

HUMBLE OIL COMPANY CONTRACT. Judge J hn C. Townes, Jr., representing the Humble Oil and Refining Company, presented a proposed contract giving the Company the right to lay a pipe line across the University oil lands in Reagan County. The Board authorized Judges Padelford, Royston, and Tyler to take such action as they deemed proper with the proposal. (Later in the day, the Board, upon recommendation of this committee, voted to defer action on the proposed contract.)

APPROPRIATION FOR BUILDING AT MEDICAL BRANCH. On motion of Judge Tyler, seconded by Mrs. O'Hair, the board adopted the following resolution (drawn by Judge Royston at the suggestion of the Board):

Whereas, the Ex-Medical Students of the University of Texas have started a movement to raise funds by contribution from Ex-Medical Students of the University of Texas for the purpose of erecting a building on the premises of the Medical Branch of the University of Texas, at Galveston, Texas, to be used by said University as an outdoor clinic, or other purpose in connection with said University; and

Whereas, it is expected that said building will cost approximately \$125,000.00, and its erection and gift being undertaken and made in appreciation of the benefits heretofore received by the donors:

Therefore, be it resolved by the Board of Regents of the University of Texas, that the sum of \$25,000.00 is hereby appropriated to be used on connection with and in addition to the sum of \$100,000.00 to be raised by the Ex-Medical Students of the University of Texas, for the purpose heretofore set forth; the said \$25,000.00 hereby appropriated is not to become available for said building unless and until the sum or sums raised by the Ex-Medical Students of the University of Texas shall have reached the total of \$100,000.00, exclusive of the \$25,000.00 here appropriated.

CHANGE IN FEES. On motion of Mr. Foster, seconded by Mr. Howard, the Board adopted the following motion: In order to meet an imperative necessity for additional runds, the Board hereby authorizes and orders put into effect the changes made below in the fee requirements at the Main University, at Austin. These changes become effective with the opening of the session of 1925-1926. All other rees and deposits remain as printed on pages 62 to 65 of the Catalogue, Bulletin No. 2517.

- 1. Abolish the following fees: Library Fee, \$2.00; Medical Fee, \$8.00; Directory and Handbook Fee, twenty-
- 2. Create a new fee, to be known as the Service and Maintenance Fee, or \$20.00 for the Long Session and \$7.00 for the Summer Session. This ree is not returnable.

PROPOSED CHANGES IN REGENTS' RULES. President Splawn presented a draft of proposed changes in the Regents' Rules, the changes bearing the approval of the Administrative Council. The Board instructed the Secretary to prepare copies for each Regent; postponing action on the proposed changes until the June 9 meeting.

At one p.m., the Board recessed for lunch, reconvening at

OIL ROYALTIES. Judge Padelford addressed the Board on the subject of the disposition of the University oil royalties, and University lands in general, reviewing the constitutional and statutory provision relative thereto. He recommended that the Board seek at an early date to have the courts construe the law as applied to the oil and mineral leases and the oil royalties.

Judge Roystom reported on the Land Committee's steps to secure an attorney to represent the Board in proposed oil royalties litigation. On motion of Judge Tyler, seconded by Mr. Howard, the Board authorized the Committee, consisting of the members of the Land Committee with Judge Roystom added, to proceed at once to employ counsel and to take such steps, after consultation with counsel, as they saw fit to have the laws relating to oil and mineral leases construed.

BUDGET FOR 1925-1926. The Board took up the budget presented by the President and examined it carefully, one department at a time. The appointment of all deans was deferred until the June meeting, due to the proposed change whereby deans may be employed on a twelve months basis. Except for the appointment of deans, the budget, as found on pages 345 to pages 36, was finally adopted. Separate motions were adopted for the departments of Journalism, Library Science, Music, the Main University, the Medical Branch, the College of Mines and Metallurgy, and then for the budget as a whole.

UNIVERSITY HRAIMH SERVICE. After discussion, the Board voted, on motion of ir. Foster, seconded by Judge Tyler, Judge Rayston, and Mrs. O'Hair, to continue the policy of employing University physicians on a full-time basis as at present, and requested the President to recommend physicians at a later meeting. The office of dean of the University Health Service was abolished.

COMPILATION OF RULES. The Board adopted a motion requiring the rules of the Board now in force to be brought together and submitted to each member of the Board, along with the proposed changes, mentioned above in these mimutes.

DR. GRAVES--HESIGNATION. President Splawn presented the resignation of Dr. M.L. Graves, as professor of Medicine, reporting that every effort had been made to induce Dr. Graves to remain. On motion of Mrs. O'Hair, seconded by Mr. Foster, the Board voted to accept the resignation with much regret.

DR. STONE-LEAVE OF ABSENCE. On motion of Judge Tyler, seconded by Mrs. O'Hair, the Board suproved the recommendation of President Splawn that Dr. C.T. Stone, associate professor of Clinical Medicine, be granted permission to visit various medical colleges from June 15 to September 1, 1925; that he be granted leave of absence, without pay, from September 1, 1925 to August 51, 1926, for the purpose of pursuing

postgraduate study at various institutions in America and abroad; that upon his return to the Medical Branch of the University on September 1, 1926, he will assume the rank and duties of professor of medicine, succeeding Dr. M.L. Graves.

PIDS FOR REPAIR OF MAIN BUILDING AT GALVESTON. The Board opened bids submitted for the repair and remodelling of the Main Building at the Medical Branch. After careful consideration of all bids, the Board voted to reject all bids and re-advertise for bids to be opened on June 9.

The Board adjourned to meet in Austin. June 9.

The Board of Regents of the University of Texas met in regular session Tuesday morning, June 9, 1925, at 10 a.m. in the President's Office. Present: Regents Stark (chairman), Foster, Howard, Neathery, Mrs. O'Hair, Padelford, Storey, and Tyler; President Splawn and the Secretary. Absent: Regent Royston.

After minor corrections were made therein, the minutes of the meeting of May 19 were ordered approved.

THEE SURGERY BILL. The account of Dr. M. H. Blume for \$5,217.00 to cover the cost of tree surgery on the University Campus—this work having been previously authorized by the Board—was presented, the itemized statement having been viséed by the Chairman and found in proper order. On motion by Mrs. O'Hair, seconded by Judge Padelford, the account was ordered paid.

TRANSFER AND APPROPRIATIONS. Upon motion by Judge Tyler, seconded by Judge Neathery, the following transfer and appropriations for the current year were authorized:

- 1. Pure Mathematics--appropriate \$18.37 to the Maintenance and Equipment account.
- 2. Faculty Building Committee-appropriate \$1,200 to an Expense account.
- 3. Brackenridge Lands-appropriate \$17.65 to the account.
- 4. Regents' Expense -- appropriate \$500 to the account.
- 5. President's Traveling and Office Expense—to this account transfer \$500 from the Assistant to the Secretary to the President and appropriate an additional sum or \$700.
- 6. Institutional Membership Dues--appropriate \$130 to this account.
- 7. Headlight Testing Station-appropriate \$1500 to the Maintenance and Equipment account, this amount having been appropriated by a special act or the Legislature, and authorize Professor J. M. Bryant to approve vouchers for the expenditure of this fund.
- 8. Real Estate Rentals -- the Auditor was authorized to close this account; the President to report the total of the account at the first meeting of the Board after the close of the fiscal year.

9. Architect's Commissions--same action as for Real Estate

- 10. President's Home-Appropriate \$1000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, for repair and furnishing the President's Home.
- 11. Workmen's Compensation Insurance—authorize the Business
  Manager to take out workmen's compensation insurance for
  those engaged in repair work on the Main Building, Medical
  Branch, Galveston, and appropriate necessary funds therefor.

BUREAU OF ECONOMIC GEOLOGY. President Splawn explained to the Board that, in order to enable Dr. J. A. Udden, Director of the Bureau of Economic Geology, to devote his entire time to research and in writing, he had arranged to relieve Dr. Udden of all administrative duties, it being felt that the distinct service rendered the University and the State of Texas by Dr. Udden merited this recognition. The administrative duties of the Bureau are to be performed by Dr. E. H. Sellards who is to have the title of Associate Director. The Board expressed their approval of the arrangement and of the valuable work done by Dr. Udden and their hope and mineralogic research.

DEANS APPOINTED. On motion of Mr. Neathery, seconded by Judge Tyler, the following deans were, on recommendation of President Splawn, appointed on a twelve months basis to serve from September 1, 1925 to

- 1. Dr. H. Y. Benedict, professor of Applied Mathematics and Astronomy, and dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, at \$6500, \$1500 of which is to be paid out of the Summer School Budget.
- 2. Dr. H. W. Harper, professor of Chemistry and dean of the Graduate School, at \$6500, \$1500 of which is to be paid out of the Graduate School Budget.
- 3. Mr. Spurgeon Bell, professor of Business Administration and dean of the School of Business Administration, at \$6000, \$1000 of which is to be paid out of the Summer School Budget.
- 4. Fixing the salary of the Dean of the School of Education at \$6000, \$1000 of which is to be paid out of the Summer School Budget. The appointment of the Dean is to be held in abey
- 5. Mr. T. U. Taylor, professor of Civil Engineering and dean of the College of Engineering, at \$6000, \$1000 of which is to be paid out of the Summer School Budget.
- 6. Judge I. P. Hildebrand, professor of Law and dean of the School of Law, at \$6500, \$500 of which is to be paid out of the Summer School Budget.
- 7. Mr. T. H. Shelby, dean of the Division of Extension, at \$6000, \$1000 of which is to be paid out of the Summer School Budget.

CORRESPONDENCE FEE. The Board, upon motion duly adopted, authorized the fee for correspondence instruction to be increased from \$7.00 to \$10.00, effective September 1, 1925, \$7.00 of the fee to go to the instructor and \$3.00 to the University General Fund. This proposal has the unanimous approval both of the Extension Council and the Administrative Council.

RULES -- CORRESPONDENCE INSTRUCTION. The following report on fules governing correspondence instruction made by the committee appointed by the President for that purpose, having been approved by the Administrative Council, was recommended for adoption by President Splawn. On motion by Mr. Foster, the Board approved the recommendation.

- 1. Any practice adopted should be uniform throughout the University.
- 2. The present practice of using residence teachers for extension Steaching must be continued and there are, moreover, good pedagogical reasons for such continuance.
- 3. No full time residence teacher may be assigned over 100 extension registrations at any given time.
- 4. The stages may be listed as rollows:
  - (1) Missionary. One to fifteen students, much more work than
  - (2) Ordinary. Fifteen to fifty students, work and pay in a rude relation to each other.
  - (3) Part time. Fifty students or more. Pay a regular salary plus \$300.00.
  - (4) Full time. The teachers should have the rank and pay and promotion ceteris paribus of residence teacher.

5. Recommendation to the President for the appointment of part time and full time instructors for extension teaching shall rest, finally, with the Dean of Extension, provided that such recommendation shall be endorsed by the appropriate resident Dean concerned. The initiating of such appointment may rest either with the head of the department concerned or with the Dean of Extension.

In case it becomes necessary to employ for extension teaching persons from outside the resident faculty, the Dean of Extension shall take the initiative. His recommencation shall, however, receive the approval of the Resident Dean concerned before going to the President.

- 6. It shall be the duty of the Extension Division to keep careful check on the number of correspondence students assigned to any full time instructor, and when the number exceeds rirty, the Division shall begin plans for transferring a portion of the excess of students to another instructor and shall actually make such transfer, if in the judgment of the Resident Dean or the Dean of Extension such action is desirable.
- 7. It is understood that the instructor in charge of a correspondence course shall personally read the reports and examine the papers sent in by the student, and shall make such corrections and comments as, in his judgment, are necessary to assist the student in the mastery of the subject.

In case the enrollments become so numerous that the instructor is unable to read all the papers, or in case the pressure of residence teaching work renders this impracticable, the Extension Division may arrange for the instructor to supervise the teaching and may employ readers to attend to the grading of the papers, with such division of compensation as is equitable. Such readers shall be employed by the Extension Division after consultation with the dean concerned.

BUDGET CHANGES -- PHYSICAL TRAINING. Upon motion of Mrs. O'Hair, the rollowing adjustments in the Budget or Physical Training (as adopted May 19) made in view of the fact that the Athletic Council has agreed to supplement the Budget of Physical Training in the sum of \$10,000 and approved by President Splawn, were authorized:

PHYSICAL EDUCATION. Upon motion duly adopted, the work of teacher-training in Physical Activities, formerly known as Physical Education, was transferred to the School of Education under the title of

HOLLAND--ASSISTANT IN LAW SCHOOL. On motion of Mrs. O'Hair, seconded by Mr. Foster, the Board authorized the payment to Robert F. Holland the sum of \$50 for services as assistant in the Law School.

LAND COMMITTEE REPORT. Mr. Storey, chairman of the Land Committee, reported that the Land Committee had held several meetings to carry out the Board's instructions as to the oil royalty problem, that they had tendered to Judge Victor Brooks an appointment as special counsel, that Judge Brooks had after consideration declined the appointment, that they were now negotiating with Judge Charles L. Black to serve as counsel, and that more time was needed for the matter. It was stated

that there were two important questions involved; first, whether the royalty from oil out of University land could under the constitution be put in the available fund, and, second, whether the leases now in force were or were not null and void. It was further stated that it would be impossible to get a decision from the Supreme Court until after the summer recess.

The Land Committee was asked to continue its study and was authorized to employ Judge Black, if it saw rit, to render an opinion on both questions involved and to advise the Board whether to bring suit on either or both questions.

On motion by Judge Tyler, the Board unanimously voted nearty approval of the untiring efforts of the members of the Committee and appreciation for the splendid brief prepared by Judge Padelford on the oil royalty question.

OCTOBER MEETING. The Board adopted a motion rixing the October meeting on Monday, October 19, to be held in El Paso.

At this time, Mr. Neathery withdrew from the meeting to catch a train, expressing regret; that urgent business required his departure.

RECITATION BUILDING. Bids submitted for the erection of the Recitation Building were opened in the presence or members or the Board, the President, the Secretary, Architect Greene, Business Manager Lochridge, Captain Henrickson, Resident Architect White, and Clerk of the Works-Laboratory Building, Yantis. After being tabulated, the bids were referred to the Regents' Building Committee with a request that they report back to the Board at 2 p.m.

The Board then recessed for lunch, reassembling at 2 p.m.

Upon recommendation of the Regents' Building Committee, the following bids for the construction or the Recitation Building were accepted, the contracts to be in the form of the fourth edition of the American Institute of Architects standard contract and general specifications conditions, and to be subject to the legal opinion of the. Attorney General.

> McKinzie Construction Company, San Antonio, General Contract, \$309,900.00; 1st alternate, \$520.00; 2d alternate, \$8500.00; 300 working days.

John L. Martin, Austin, Heating, \$9,891.00; Plumbing, \$7,251.00

The general contract was let to the second lowest because of a saving of 90 working days which were considered worth more than the slight increase over the lowest bid. The heating and plumbing bids accepted were the lowest submitted.

Architect Greene was instructed to proceed with the preparation of the contract for signature, after adequate bond has been furnished in each case, and after the contract has been approved by the Attorney General. The Chairman of the Board was authorized to sign the contract for the Board of Regents.

On motion, the Board voted to include a cornerstone for the building, this not being included in the plans as drawn, and to have tile wainscoating in the basement, first floor, and stairways of the building, this being provided in the second alternate in the plans.

GRADUATE SCHOOL FACULTY. On motion of Judge Tyler, seconded by Mr. Storey, the following Graduate Faculty, recommended by the President was appointed, their duties to be as provided in rules adopted on May 19 1925, and they to replace the present Craduate Council. The salary scale, adopted by legislative action, provides the same salaries as in other colleges and schools of the University, except that the Dean may be paid \$6500, and full professors from \$3750 to \$5500 for a term of nine months. It is understood that those professors mentioned below who are given salaries of \$5000 or more will be expected to avoid contracts during the three months they are not teaching at the University, which will during that time interfere with their studies, their investigations and their ability to advise and direct candidates for the degree of. Doctor of Philosophy, and they will be expected to teach only nine months

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LABORATORY BUILDING -- ADDITIONAL EQUIFMENT. On motion by Mr. Storey, the Board appropriated \$1582.00 to supply additional equipment for the Laboratory Building, Galveston, as follows: projection booth, \$254; three concrete cadaver tanks, \$558; incinerator, \$770.

DR. BATTLE TO INSPECT LIBRARY BUILDINGS. On motion the Board authorized Dr. Battle, chairman of the Faculty Building Committee, to make an investigation of other institutions with reference to building problems, especially library buildings.

DEPARTMENT OF RURAL EDUCATION. On motion of Mrs. O'Hair, seconded by Mr. Storey, the Board voted to request funds of the next legislature for the establishment of a Department of Rural Education in the School of Education, it being understood that Miss Annie Webb Blanton, now adjunct professor of Educational Administration, may at that time be available.

APPOINTMENTS -- MEDICAL BRANCH. The following recommendations for appointments to the taculty of the Medical Branch of the University, upon motion of Mr. Storey, were approved:

MATRON OF THE HALL. Upon motion, the Board approved the appointment of:

LEAVES OF ABSENCE. On motion of Mrs. O'Hair, the rollowing leaves of absence were authorized:

- 2. Dean Spurgeon Bell, to go to Columbus, Ohio.

DR. EBY--RESEARCH LECTURER. President Splawn announced that the Graduate Council had unanimously elected Dr. Frederick Eby, Ph.D., LL. D., professor of the History of Education and director of the Summer Session, to be University Research Lecturer for the session of 1925-1926.

DEPARTMENT OF COMPARATIVE LITERATURE. Upon motion of Mr. Storey, seconded by Judge Padelford, the Board voted to consolidate the Department of Comparative Literature with the Department of English, effective at the end of the session of 1925-1926.

FRESHMEN TESTS. The Board on motion approved a request of the General Faculty legalizing the administration or treshmen tests when such tests are authorized by any college or school of the University.

REGISTRAR TO ASSIGN CLASSROOM AND OFFICE SPACE. On motion, of the Board voted to amend the third from the last sentence of Section 5, Article II of the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Regents for the Government or the University, to make it read as follows:

> "He (the Registrar) shall serve as chairman of the Schedule Committee of the General Faculty, and shall, with the advice of the committee, prepare all schedules of hours, classes, and examinations, and shall assign space for office and classroom purposes with a view to maximum efficiency and economy."

FUNDS FOR BUSINESS RESEARCH. The Board approved the request or Dean Spurgeon Bell for permission to solicit funds for business research from a small selected group of well-to-do business men in the state.

GIFT TO THE LIBRARY. The Board accepted with thanks the gift from the Explorers' Club, 47 West 76th Street, New York, or seven log books of William Scoresby, Sr., noted English whaler and explorer.

HILDEBRAND -- STADIUM DIRECTOR. The Board approved the appointment of Judge I. P. Hildebrand as a member of the Board of Directors of the Texas Memorial Stadium, as the representative of the faculty, for the year 1925.

STILWELL REQUEST TO DRILL FOR OIL. The request of Arthur E. Stilwell for a permit to drill for oil on the right of way of the Kansas City, Mexico, and Orient Railway on University land, was, on motion, referred to the Land Committee with power to act.

ROAD -- COLLECE OF MINES CAMPUS. The Board requested President Splawn to look into the need of a road through the campus of the College of Mines and Metallurgy, El Paso.

JUNIOR COLLECE-DIVISION OF EXTENSION. Following discussion, the Board, on motion, authorized the establishment of junior college work in one Extension Teaching Center (to be selected by the President) under the following conditions:

- 1. The High School Board in the city selected shall agree to furnish the use of their building, including heat, light, and janitor service, from 5 p.m. to 10 p.m. without cost to the University.
- 2. The University shall provide a teaching starr of necessary instructors, and guarantee a total amount to be paid as salaries of not to exceed \$15,000.
- 3. Students taking; work in the junior college so established shall pay instruction fees at the rate of \$55 a term, or \$105 for a nine months' session, in addition to the fees ordinarily paid at the Main University.
- 4. It is recognized that this plan is largely an experiment and that the rees for the first year will likely be less than the salaries to be paid for the instructional staff.

SWANN-SCHULLE FURNITURE BILL. The Board, on motion by Mr. Storey, seconded by Mrs. O'Heir, authorized the payment of three-fourths of the amount due Swann-Schulle Furniture and Carpet Company, of Austin, for furniture and furnishings delivered for use in the Biology Building, the remaining one-fourth to be paid when the material is satisfactorily installed.

MARIAND OIL COLPANY COMPRACT. On motion of Judge Tyler, second ed by Mrs. O'Hair, the Board referred the proposed contract with the Marland Oil Company to the Land Committee with power to act.

BUILDING FIND AND SELF-SUPPORTING INSTITUTION BUDGET. The budget for the University Building Fund and the Self-Supporting Institutions, as listed below, was, on motion of Judge Tyler, seconded by Mr. Howard, approved. (See Secretary's files.)

REGENTS' RULES REVISED. On motion of Judge Tyler, seconded by Mr. Howard, the following changes in the Regents' Rules, suggested to the Board by President Splawn at the May meeting, a copy of which was mailed to each member of the Board, were adopted. (See Secretary's files)

RULES TO BE PRINTED. On motion, the Board voted to have all existing By-Laws and Rules of the Board codified and printed, the Secretary to do this work under the supervision of the President.

REPAIRS TO MAIN BUILDING, CALVESTON. The Board confirmed a vote taken by mail approving the following recommendations of the Regents Building Committee with reference to the repair of the Main Building at the Medical Branch, Calveston.

The Building Committee of the Board of Regents met at 9:30 a.m., May 20, 1925, in the Hotel Galvez, Galveston. Present were Mrs. O'Hair (chairman of the Committee), Judge Royston, Mr. Stark (chairman of the Board of Regents), President Splawn, and Secretary Simmons.

Those present unanimously agreed to accept the lowest bid on plumbing and the lowest bid on furniture opened by the Board or Regents,

It was also agreed by those present that the Board should delegate to the Building Committee of the Board of Regents full power to make such modifications, changes, or adjustments in the plans and specifications for the repairing of the Main Building at the Medical Branch of the University as might be deemed wise by the Committee.

It is the understanding that the entire cost of the repair job is not to exceed the \$50,000 appropriated therefor."

The Board of Regents of the University of Texas met in a called session Thursday morning, July 16, 1925, at 10 o'clock in the President's Office. Present were: Regents Stark (Chairman), Howard, Neathery, Mrs. O'Hair, Padelford, Royston, Storey, and Tyler; President Splawn and the Secretary.

The purpose of the meeting as stated in the call was to hear the opinion of Charles L. Black, attorney employed by the Land Committee to advise the Board as to the validity of cilcleases on University land, to consider what action to take with reference to the matter, and to transact routine business.

CORRECTION OF MINUTES. After the following corrections were made in the minutes, they were ordered approved:

- 1. The stitle of Dr. William Keiller to be Professor of Anatomy and Dean of the Medical Branch.
- 2. Add to the list of the members of the Graduate Faculty the following names: Romance Languages -- Professor E. J. Villavaso and Associate Professor C. C. Glascock; Engineering -- Professor T. U. Taylor. The salaries of these three are to remain as fixed in the budget already adopted.

RAILROAD HEARING -- PRESIDENT SPLAWN. President Splawn announced that Senator Bledsoe of Lubbock and Judge Kinder, of Plainview, were present and wished to appear before the Board. The Board expressed their willingness to hear these men, who were then presented. They explained that the citizens of West Texas desired permission of the Board to use the services of Dr. Splawn in a hearing before the Interstate Commerce Commission with reference to the extension of railroad lines in West Texas, the first hearing to be held in West Texas and a later one in Washington, D. C. It was explained that the request was made in the interest of the development of the country and not in the interest of particular railroads. The visitors then retired and the Board, following discussion, granted President Splawn permission to render the requested service, it being their belief that the extension of railroads in West Texas is essential to the full development of that section. The time involved in attending these hearings is to be chargeable against the President's vacation period, this being his request.

On motion of Mr. Storey, seconded by Mr. Neathery, the Board voted to grant the President a vacation, with pay, of thirty days, or so much thereof as he desired.

OIL ROYALTIES -- LAND COMMITTEE REPORT. Mr. Storey, Chairman of the Land Committee, made the following report with reference to the oil royalty situation:

- 1. That in pursuance to instruction from the Board, the Committee had tendered appointment as counsel to Judge Victor Brooks, of Austin, to advise the Board relative to the constitutionality of House Bill 246 which directs oil royalties from University land to be placed in the available funds. After Judge Brooks had given some thought to the matter, the question was raised by Judge Padelford as to the validity of the oil leases now in force, whereupon Judge Brooks reported himself disqualified to render an opinion, he having once represented one of the present lease holders.
- 2. That the Committee then employed Charles L. Black, of Austin, to render an opinion as to the validity of the oil leases.
- 3. That the Committee has received and files as a part of this report, to become a part of the minutes of the Board, the opinion of Judge Black advising that the oil leases now in force are valid.

#### -- See Secretary's Files --

- 4. That it is the opinion of the Majority of the Committee, -namely Mr. Storey, Judge Royston, and Mr. Neathery, -that the Board should accept the advice of Judge Black that
  the leases are valid and that the Board take no action at
  this time seeking to attack the validity of the oil
  leases. Mr. Storey explained that Judge Padelford had
  not agreed with the majority report.
  - Mr. Storey moved, seconded by Mr. Neathery, that the Board adopt the report of the Committee and take no action at this time.
  - Judge Padelford Dissents. Judge Padelford explained to the Board that he did not favor the report as made by the Committee and that he did not favor its adoption by the Board, it being his opinion that the oil leases on University lands are invalid. He stated that the Attorney General had expressed the willingness to bring suit to test these leases if the Board should request him to do so. Judge Padelford expressed himself firmly in favor of asking the Attorney General to bring such a suit. He submitted for incorporation in the minutes his written opinion on the

- The matter was discussed at length by Mr. Neathery, Mr. Storey, Judge Royston and Mr. Howard, with numerous questions and remarks from the other members present. Finally, the motion to adopt the Committee's report was passed by the following vote: Aye -- Howard, Neathery, Mrs. O'Hair, Royston, Stark, Storey, Tyler; No -- Padelford. The report was declared adopted.
- On motion of Judge Royston, seconded by Mr. Neathery, the Board unanimously voted to instruct the Secretary to notify the attorney General of the action just taken, attaching a copy of the opinion of Judge Black and the opinion of Judge Padelford with the request that if, in his opinion, the action of the Board does not protect the interests of the University, that he take such steps as he may deem necessary to protect the interests of the University.
- Mr. Storey explained, for the purpose of record, that the reason the legal questions discussed above had not been submitted originally to the Attorney General was that the Attorney General had rendered an opinion in which he had

declared House Bill 246 unconstitutional. The Board then undertook a further study of the question, with the results recorded above.

JUDGE BLACK'S FEE. On motion of Mr. Storey, seconded by Mr. Neathery, the Board authorized the payment to Judge C. I. Black the sum of \$2500, this amount being the fee charged by Judge Black for legal services rendered.

BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT. Mrs. O'Hair, Chairman of the Building Committee, reported that the committee had been instructed by the University Architect that the Biology Building at Austin, and the Labcratory Building at Galveston were complete and ready to be turned over to the Board. The Architect has certified to a delay of over two hundred days in the completion of the Biology Building. Mrs. O'Hair stated that it was the Committee's recommendation that the Board accept these buildings subject to the adjustment of minor differences, including the delay, to be worked out by the Building Committee of the Regents with the advice of the Chairman of the Faculty Building Committee. On the motion of Mrs. O'Hair, seconded by Judge Tyler, the report was adopted.

HOUSE FOR OIL INSPECTOR. Upon recommendation of the Regents Building Committee, the Board voted an appropriation of \$4000, or as much thereof as may be necessary, for the erection of a house at Best, Texas, to be used by the University Oil inspector, the plans and details of construction to have the approval of Mrs. O'Hair, Chairman of the Building Committee.

At this time, Regents Neathery, Royston, and Storey retired from the meeting in order to catch a train, it being understood that a quorum would still be present for the transaction of business.

ANNUAL AUDIT. On motion of Mr. Howard, seconded by Mrs.
O'Hair, the Board authorized their Auditing Committee to make a contract for the annual audit of the University's books.

The Board, on motion of Judge Tyler, approved the recommendation of the Faculty Building Committee the Administrative Council and the General Faculty that the Recitation Building, being constructed on the Campus, be known as Garrison Hall in honor of Dr. George Pierce Garrison, Professor of History in the University Formany years.

PARKING ON CAMPUS. On motion of Judge Padelford, the Board asked the President to enforce more stringently the rule forbidding parking of cars on the Campus, and authorized him to have the East and North Entrances to the Campus closed.

JUNIOR COLLEGE. On motion duly adopted, the Board authorized the preparation of a plan to organize freshman and sophomore work at the main University as a junior college.

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GIFT TO LIBRARY. The Board accepted with a vote of thanks a gift to the University Library by the Earl of Crawford and Balcarres, London, of a set of the Catalogue of the Bibliotheca Lindesiana, comprising eight volumes privately printed by the donor for distribution to other libraries.

VOTE BY MAIL. Upon motion of Judge Tyler, the Board confirmed a vote taken by mail authorizing the following actions:

- 1. Appropriated \$1700 to build and equip a bunkhouse, garage, and office building for the use of the oil gaugers.
- 2. Increased the salary of oil-gauger Hughes from \$130 to \$150 per month effective June 1, 1925.
- 3. Appointed Clark Petit oil gauger at a salary of \$125 per month for three months from June 27, 1925, and at \$150 per month thereafter.
- 4. Appropriated \$300, or so much thereof as may be needed, for the construction of sidewalks about the Biology Building, and authorized the Business Manager to let contracts for this work.
- 5. Authorized the sale of the houses situated on the site selected by the Alice Littlefield Memorial Dormitory, it being more economical to sell certain of these houses than to move and rehabilitate them.

EXTRA FOR BIOLOGY BUILDING. A request by the Architect for an appropriation of \$450 to pay for steam used in heating the Biology building during the period of construction was referred to the Regents Building Committee with power to act.

PRESIDENT SPLAWN -- TRIP TO FAST. On motion of Judge Tyler, the Board authorized President Splawn to make a trip to Eastern Universities for the purpose of interviewing prospective faculty appointees at such time as the President might think best.

The Board then adjourned to meet Thursday, September 17, 1925, at Austin.

ADDITIONAL APPOINTMENT TO JUNIOR COLLEGE FACULTY. Upon motion of Judge Tyler, the Board voted to leave to the discretion of the President the appointment to the Junior College Faculty of the San Antonio Extension Center of Mrs. Evelyn Kerns Taylor, part-time instructor in Botany, at \$1,333.33 for nine months effective September 15, 1925, the President reporting that the need for her services was contingent upon the size of the enrollment.

BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT. Mrs. O'Hair; Chairman of the Regents' Building Committee, made the following report:

Biological Greenhouse. The contract for the construction of the Biological Greenhouse, in accordance with authority delegated to the Committee by the Board, was awarded on August 31, 1925, as follows: General Contract, J. F. Johnson, \$5,150; Glazed Superstructure, Lord and Burnham, \$1,297; Plumbing and Heating, Fox and Schmidt, \$1,519.

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House at Best. The house authorized for the use of the University Oil Inspector at Best has been completed and the building is now occupied by Mr. Graves. The Comptroller should be authorized to approve vouchers for the final payments on the house.

Upon motion of Judge Tyler, the Board voted to approve the report of the Committee and to thank Mrs, O'Hair for her splendid service in committee activity during the summer.

ANNUAL AUDIT. Upon motion of Mrs. O'Hair, the Board approved the recommendation of Judge Royston (for the Auditing Committee) that the Comptroller, after conference with the Auditor, advertise for bids of Certified Public Accountants for the annual audit of the University's books of account, the bids to be filed with the Comptroller who shall deliver them unopened to the Regents' Auditing Committee. The Regents' Auditing Committee was authorized to award the contract in the name of the Board.

FINANCE COLLITTEE REPORT. Mr. Foster made the following recommendation of the Finance Committee: The money received for the Littlefield bonds and money in other University trust funds should be invested in guaranteed first mortgage real estate bonds, the investments being selected with a view to a proper geographical distribution of risk. The Regents' Finance Committee, the President, and the Auditor shall be charged with the responsibility of selecting securities to be purchased. Upon motion of Judge Royston, the Board approved the report and authorized the investment of the funds as stipulated.

OIL ROYALTIES. After a general discussion of the oil royalty situation, participated in freely by all present, the following motion was made by Judge Royston and seconded by Judge Tyler: A committee consisting of Regents Storey, Neathery and Royston be appointed with authority to take up the matter of royalties from the oil wells on the University's land and seek by conference to have the Comptroller, the Treasurer, and the Land Commissioner agree to place the money received as royalty either in the Permanent Fund or in the Available Fund and, in the event of failure to secure such action on the part of the three officers, that the Committee be instructed and authorized to institute mandamus proceedings against the Comptroller to compel him to certify for deposit in the Available Fund, under the act of the last Legislature the royalties received. Five regents, including the Chairman, voted aye. Judge Padelford and Mrs. O'Hair voted No. The motion was declared adopted and the committee appointed as named in the motion.

The Board then adjourned to meet October 19 at the Hotel Paso del Norte, El Paso.

OIL FIELD. Chairman Stark reported to the Board a tour of inspection made by President Splawn and himself through the University's oil field in Reagan County.

OIL INSPECTOR'S HOUSE. Upon motion of Mr. Neathery the Board authorized the following:

> 1. Appropriation of an additional sum of \$48.48 to finish paying for the house erected at Best, Texas, for use

of the University Oil Inspector.

2. Erection of a fence around the lot on which the house is located, and appropriation necessary therefor.

VOTE OF THANKS TO MRS. O'HAIR. Upon motion of Mr. Neathery, the Board adopted a unanimous vote of thanks to Mrs. O'Hair for her efforts in supervising the planning and construction of the Oil Inspector's house at Best, the report of President Splawn and Chairman Stark being that the house had been completed in a most satisfactory manner.

OUT-OF-STATE TRAVEL. On motion of Mr. Neathery, the following were authorized to make out-of-state trips:

GRAZING RENTALS IN ARREARS. President Splawn called attention to the fact that a considerable sum of grazing rentals was in arrears. Upon motion duly adopted, the matter was referred to the Land Committee for necessary action, the Committee to confer with Judge R. E. L. Saner.

HOUSES ON ALICE LITTLEFIELD DORMITORY SITE. Upon motion of Mr. Neathery, the Board authorized the sale for the best price of the houses on the site selected for the Alice Littlefield Memorial Dormitory for Girls, the purchaser being required to remove the houses from the site at once.

BIIS FOR ALICE LITTLEFIELD DORMITORY. Upon motion duly adopted, the Regents Building Committee was authorized to open bids and award a contract for the construction of the Alice Littlefield Memorial Dormitory for Girls.

JUDGE ROYSTON ACTING CHAIRMAN BUILDING COMMITTEE. Chairman Stark, with the consent of the Board, appointed Judge Royston temporary chairman of the Regents Building Committee, to serve during the absence from the state of the regular chairman, Mrs. O'Hair.

LANDSCAPE ARCHITECT. Upon motion of Mr. Neathery, President Splawn was requested to negotiate for the services of a landscape architect to assist in the preparation of the campus plot plan, and to bring in a recommendation to the Board.

UNIVERSITY PRESS BUILDING. Upon motion duly adopted, the Board voted to cooperate with the University Press and the Students Publications, Incorporated, in the erection of a building for the University Press and the Student Publications, the site of the building to be selected by the Regents Building Committee.

At 11:45 o'clock the Board recessed to take lunch as the guests of the El Paso Chamber of Commerce. At 2 P.M. the meeting was resumed at the Paso del Norte Hotel, the same persons being present as in the morning.

DEAN KIID'S REPORT. Dean Kidd, by invitation, appeared before the Board to report the conditions at and the needs of the College of Mines and Metallurgy.

PUBLICITY FOR COLLEGE OF MINES AND METALLURGY. Judge Padelford called attention to the need of more publicity for the College of Mines

FORT BLISS SITE. On motion of Mr. Foster the Board voted (1) to cancel at its expiration the present lease with the United States consult rental of \$2000.

COMMUNICATION FROM THE A. & M. BOARD OF DIRECTORS RELATIVE TO THE UNIVERSITY'S PERMANENT FUND. On motion of Mr. Foster the question of A. & M. C llege's claim to a share of the University's Permanent Fund was referred to the Land Committee for study and report.

HEATING PLANT. Wr. Foster, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported that in his judgment the Board should provide for the construction of a heating plant at the Main University. Upon motion of Mr. Neathery, the Regents Finance Committee was empowered to arrange for financing the construction of a heating plant.

PLANS FOR HEATING PLANT. On motion of Mr. Neathery, the Board voted to have the plans and specifications for the heating plant brought to completion.

WATTINGER BROTHERS SETTLEMENT. President Splawn presented a state ont from Judge Hildebrand that the American Surety Company desired the University to make final payments to the creditors of Wattinger Brothers, general contractor of the Biology Building, upon receipt of release to the University (settlements formerly were made upon release to the University, the Surety, and the Contractor). Upon motion of Mr. Neathery, the Board authorized payment of the balance due the general contractor to the unpaid creditors upon this basis, the form of the release to be approved by Judge Hildebrand.

OIL ROYALTIES QUESTION. President Splawn transmitted to the Board a report from Mr. Storey, Chairman of the special committee, to the effect that the committee had made some progress toward a settlement of the Oil Royalties question, but that further time was required. Mr. Neathery, the only member of the committee present, corroborated this report and expressed hope that an early adjustment might be practicely.

The Board then adjourned to meet in Austin on December 8, 1925.

The Board of Regents of the University of Texas held their regular meeting Tuesday morning, December 8, 1925, at 10 o'clock in the Office of the President. Present were: Regents Stark (Chairman), Howard, Neathery, Padelford, Storey; President Splawn and Secretary Simmons. Absent were: Regents Foster, O'Hair, Royston, and Tyler.

The minutes of the meeting of October 19 were ordered approved.

FELICITATIONS TO CHAIRMAN STARK. Upon motion of Mr. Neathery, the Board voted (with Mr. Neathery presiding) to congratulate the Chairman, Mr. H. J. Lutcher Stark, upon the occasion of his birthday.

BY-LAWS AND RULES. The Board began the consideration of the compilation of By-Laws of the Board of Regents and Rules and Regulations for the Government of the University of Texas which had been sent in advance to each member of the Board. A motion was adopted to eliminate Section 5 of Article IV of the By-Laws, page 7. Upon recommendation of the President and motion by the Board, the following words were added to Section 4 of Article I of the Rules, page 9:
"No religious qualification shall be required for admission to any office or privilege connected with the University, and no sectarian instruction shall be given therein." Upon recommendation of the President the Board voted to add the words "or 12 to 4 p.m." to Section 5 of Article V of the Rules. Following a complete discussion, the Board voted, on motion of Mr. Storey, seconded by Mr. Neathery, to approve and adopt the By-Laws and Rules and Regulations as amended and to have the rules printed.

FACULTY LEGISLATION APPROVED. Upon motion of Mr. Storey seconded by Mr. Howard, the Board voted to approve the following regulations passed by the General Faculty:

1. Amending the Catalogue of the University of Texas
for 1924-25, page 97, section 2, under "B. Special Requirements,"
so as to read: "The student must pass a general four-hour
written examination on his major subject on May 7 (May 8 if
May 7 falls on Sunday) of the spring term of his senior year
at a place fixed by the Chairman of the Department and under the super

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vision of the Chairman. August candidates may take this examination in May or on August 10 (August 11 if August 10 falls on Sunday). Students taking this examination will not be counted as absent from classes while actually taking it. In setting this examination the faculty of the Department may take into account the particular courses elected by the student, but will expect a more mature and comprehensive knowledge than is required in the regular term examination.

- 2. Amending the Catalogue of the University for 1924-25, page 98, under "Classical, or Greek and Latin Group," so as to read: "Minor subject: Two courses in the ancient language not chosen for the major subject."
- 5. Amending the Catalogue of the University for 1924-25, page 90, by striking out Paragraphs 1, 7, and 10, and inserting the following new paragraphs, the first one to become the new fifth paragraph, and the others to become Paragraphs 7 to 20, respectively:

Reports: Reports on the scholarship standing are made twice a term, at mid-term and at the end of the term. In this way parents are informed fairly frequently of the scholastic progress of their children. At mid-term only failing grades are ordinarily reported. The term reports give the grades made by the student: in all his courses. Mid-term reports are sent to the student and parent by the Dean; term reports are sent to the parents from the office of the Registrar of the University.

Conferences: The Deans of the College of Arts and Sciences will confer with all students in the College who are doing unsatisfactory work, both at mid-term and at the end of the term. The object of these conferences will be to advise with the student for his improvement, to offer him opportunity for renewed effort with such assistance as parents and instructors may be able to furnish, and to encourage or to warn him as the case may demand.

Failures: The University has prescribed a certain minimum of work which a student must pass at mid-term and at the end of the term or be dropped from the University. Before a student is dropped from the University for failure in work he will be given two trials or chances, called respectively Special 6

Special Observation: The first failure of a student to pass in the required minimum of work will place such student under Special Observation, which is a sort of first warning to both student and parent or guardian that the student is doing unsatisfactory work. Sometimes the first failure is so serious that the parents are advised (but not required) to withdraw the student at once from the University. Immediate withdrawal after serious failure often enables the student to make other arrangements for his education without loss of time.

A student under Special Observation who does not show marked improvement in his work by the end of the period in which he is under observation should be withdrawn from the University.

A student under Special Observation who absents himself from any class exercise, or neglects any class work, except for drop his name from the University rolls for the Temainder of the session.

Absence and neglect on the part of such student, not explained to the Dean within one day of its occurrence — beforehand if possible — will be presumed without excuse, and will effect the dropping above mentioned.

Parents or guardians will be promptly notified of such dropping from the rolls.

Final Trial: The second failure of a student to pass in the required minimum of work, if the first and second failure occur withi? three consecutive terms of residence, puts the student on Final Trial. This is a last and final warning to student and parent. A failure after Final Trial at any time

time within three consecutive terms of residence will drop the student automatically from the University for a certain period of time.

Final Trial will be for a definite period, during which the student, while still in attendance upon his classes, must show marked improvement in his studies, in default of which his connection with the University will terminate with the period.

A student on Final Trial who absents himself from any class exercise, or neglects any class-work, except for reasons imperative in the judgment of the Dean, will thereby drop his name from the University rolls for the remainder of the session.

Absence and neglect on the part of such student, not explained to the Dean within one day of its occurrence—before—hand if possible—will be presumed to be without excuse, and will effect the dropping above mentioned.

Parents or guardians will be promptly notified of such dropping from the rolls.

Return after Failure: A student dropped from the University by reason of failure in work may register again, if dropped during the long session, not earlier than the next Summer School, or the beginning of the next long session. A student failing to pass in the required minimum of work at the end of the spring term may register in the next term of Summer School, Stut not in the next long session earlier than the winter term except as provided under the Required-Minimum-of-Work Rule.

- 4. Amending the Catalogue of 1924-25, page 104, under "Bachelor of Journalism, A. Prescribed Work," Section 10, by the following interpretation of the term 'six courses in journalism': 'English 3 will during the session of 1925-1926 be accepted for the Bachelor of Journalism degree provided that the student also offers English 2; similarly Government 1 will be accepted for Journalism 1 provided that the Student also offers Economics 1.\*
- 5. Fixing the date for the 1926 Commencement as printed in the catalogue-Monday, June 7; and fixing the date for subsequent Commencements on the first Monday in June, except when Monday comes on either June 1 or June 2, in which event the second Monday in June shall be the Commencement date.
- 6. Amending the "Rules Governing Participation in Official extra-curricular student activities" as found in the Handbook for the Guidance of Students in the Main University, edition of 1925-26, by inserting after the second sentence of rule 1 under "eligibility" on page 23, the following: "Any person suspended or expelled from the University shall be ineligible during the period of his suspension or until reinstatement."

INVESTMENT OF FEE FUND BALANCES. Upon motion of Mr. Neathery the Board woted to authorize, empower, and direct the Finance Committee of the Board to enter into a contract with the Security Trust Company of Austin, Texas, for the deposit of one hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000) received by the University in fees from students and from other sources with said trust company subject to call at any time by the University, the trust company to pay interest on the deposit at the rate of three and three-fourths per cent to and to execute a good and satisfactory bond in a solvent surety company in the sum of one hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000) payable to the Board of Regents of the University to secure the faithful performance of said contract and the return of said aum of money with all interest due thereon, together with all court costs and attorneys! fees, should suit be necessary to enforce said bond; said contract and bond when so drawn and executed by the trust company and a bonding company to be approved by Regent S. C. Padelford, or a lawyer member of the Finance Committee, and by the Attorney General, and when so approved to be executed by the Finance Committee for the Board.

BIDS OF DEPOSITORIES FOR UNIVERSITY BALANCE, Upon motion of Mr. Storey seconded by Mr. Howard, the Board voted to authorize the President to secure bids of banks for the deposit of the University's daily balance and to submit to the Board by mail his recommendation for the selection of a depository.

TRANSFER--DEPARTMENT OF BOTANY. Upon motion of Mr. Storey the Board voted to authorize the transfer of \$120 from the Maintenance and Equipment account of the Department of Botany to the Tutors and Assistants account of that department.

ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATIONS. Upon motion of Mr. Howard seconded by Mr. Storey, the Board voted to authorize the following new or additional appropriations:

Botanv--

The sum of \$3000 for research, in cooperation with the Carnegie Institution of Washington, the work to be done under the direction of Professor B. C. Tharp, the Institution to appropriate \$500 for this purpose.

Comparative Literature-The sum of \$1200 to the Tutors and Assistants account.

Public Lectures-

The sum of \$500, or so much thereof as may be necessary.

Building Repairs-

The sum of \$1800, or so much thereof as may be necessary, for repairs and remodeling of W Hall.

President's Home-

The sum of \$500, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to complete payment on the installation of oil burner and furnace, and to cover the cost of such other items as may be needed during the year.

Insurance-

The sum of \$2000 to enable the Comptroller to renew certain three-year policies at a saving in the premium to be paid.

Chapel Service-

A sufficient sum to cover the purchase price of an uppight piano for the use of the Chapel Committee, this price to be the lowest consistent with good service.

Physics--

The sum of \$500 for the equipping of a broadcasting studio.

The sum of \$100 to provide for the payment of \$10 additional to each of the ten janitors and laboratory attendants at the Medical Branch for the interest and care they took in moving the furniture and equipment from the old to the new building. This extra \$100 may be paid from the cash fund and the cash fund reimbursed by voucher against the above appropriation.

Tennis Courts--

The sum of \$15,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, for the construction of tennis courts for girls, the courts to be west of Speedway and north of Twenty-fourth

REFUND -- NUTRITION AND HEALTH EDUCATION BUREAU. Upon motion of Mr. Neathery, the Board voted to authorize the Auditor to refund to the account of the Nutrition and Health Education Bureau the amounts paid in by the various communities to offset the expenses of field workers

ADDITIONAL EQUIPMENT FOR BIOLOGY AND AIMINISTRATION MUSEUM BUILDINGS. Upon motion of Mr. Storey, the Board authorized the following appropriations from the Building Fund:

- 1. Equipment for Administrative Museum Building, Galveston, \$3,938.84.
  - 2. Steel Cases and Chairs, Biology Building, \$3,272.10.

PREMIUM ON AUDITUR'S TOYD. Upon motion of Mr. Howard, the Board voted to authorize the payment of \$150, the premium now due on the Auditor's Bond, and to require that the bond be filed with the

ANNUAL AUDIT. The Board, upon motion of Mr. Neathery, voted to re-advertise for bids for a detailed audit, the scope of the audit to

DEC 8 1925 "By a detailed audit is meant a verification of all receipts as shown on the records of the University of Texas and its branch colleges, together with a verification of the sources of these receipts in order to ascertain whether all of the recipts as sent to the University are duly recorded on their books The auditor is expected to check and verify all disbursements and inspect all bills to see whether same have been properly approved and goods received and that these disbursements were made by actual payment of cash or check. He is expected to render a report of his findings showing a statement of assets and liabilities as taken from the books of Mr. Long's office supported by a detailed statement of revenues and expenditures for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1925.

"The auditor is expected to incorporate in his report such suggestions and recommendations as may seem best adapted to improve the accounting system now in use. All of the above is to apply to the main University and its branches and all departments of the University. "

APPOINTMENTS. Upon motion of Mr. Neathery seconded by Mr. Storey, the Board approved the recommendation of the President for the appointment of the following:

1. Robert F. Kile, instructor in Mechanical Engineering, at a \$200 a month, beginning December 1, 1925.

2. Miss Lila Moore, secretary to the Chief of the Package Loan Library Bureau, at an annual salary of \$1,300, effective November 1, vice Miss Frances McClellan, resigned October 31

3. Mrs. J. E. Nelson, instructor in English in the University Junior College at San Antonio, for the first semester, effective October 1, at a salary of \$66.66 a month, or \$200 for the semester.

MIRIAM LUTCHER STARK GIFT. President Splawn announced to the Board that it was the wish of Chairman Stark's mother, Mrs. Miriam Lutcher Stark, to give to the University of Texas a collection of rare and valuable paintings, books, and other works of art, as the foundation for a fine arts museum and that she also wished to place a building on the campus for the purpose of housing the collection, the building to cost up to \$150,000. Mr. Stark stated that the value of the collection had been appraised at a figure in excess of six hundred thousand dollars. Mr. Stark further stated that in case the gift were presented to the University, his mother would wish the privilege during her lifetime of removing temporarily for private exhibits, certain of the articles of the collection; that she would desire to have the collection properly housed, protected, and preserved; and that the collection and building be known as the Miriam Lutcher Stark Museum. In the discu sion following the announcement, it was brought out that the Faculty Building Committee was recommending the construction of an entirely new library building, and that in such case the present library would be a suitable building for conversion into a fine arts museum in which to house the Miriam Lutcher Stark collection, the Wrenn Library, and the Garcia Library. Mr. Stark stated that his mother would be willing to apply the sum of \$150,000, mentioned above, to the remodeling of the library building for that purpose. He further suggested that inasmud as the present library could not be moved for at least two years, his mother would favor a binding agreement between herself and the Board whereby the sum of \$150,000 offered by her should be placed immediately at the disposal of the Regents (who shall have the advice of the Faculty Building Committee) in furthering their building program, provided a like sum be expended by the Board for the remodeling of the present library building for a fine arts museum, from the first building funds available after the library has been removed to the new quarters, it being understood that the Faculty Building Committee and the Regents Building Committee shall have the advice and approval of Mrs. Stark as to the drawing of the plans for the remodeling work. (See further, action taken later in the day.)

At 12 M. the Board recessed for lunch, until 2 P.M. When the Board reconvened, there were present the same persons as in the morning and the following: Mr. H. A. Wroe, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the American National Bank; Mr. R. J. Whitfield, of the Federal Commerce Trust Company of Saint Louis; Mr. Dennison, of the Illinois Merchants Trust Company of Chicago; and Honorable Dan Mody, Attorney General of Texas.

DISCUSSION CONCERNING POSSIBILITY OF A LOAN FOR THE BUILDING PROGRAM. FMr. Whitfield outlined to the Board the terms under which his house would undertake to clear away the legal difficulties in the way, after the successful termination of which it would agree to float a loan

to finance the building program of the University. After Mr. Whitfield had replied to questions relative to various pahses of the plan, Mr. Wroe, Mr. Whitfield, and Mr. Dennison withdrew from the meeting. Various phases of the situation were then discussed by the Board and in particular were the legal questions discussed with the Attorney General.

At 3:30 P.M. Regent Royston arrived and joined in the delibera tions. (At this point the discussion was suspended. See action taken later in the day.)

MIRIAM LUTCHER STARK MUSEUM. At this time, Atty Ley General Dan Loody being present, the Board took up the question of the greangement whereby the Board could place into needed buildings the \$150,000 offered by Mrs. Stark and bind themselves to expend a like sum in the remodeling of the present library building to receive the art collection, out of the first funds available for buildings after the library has been removed to new quarters. Attorney General Moody approved of the plan in principle, stated that he thought such an agreement smald be arranged, and offered to cooperate in the drawing up of a proper Citract.

With this assurance, Mr. Stark amounced that the gift be considered finally made under the terms stated earlier in these minutes. Upon motion of Mr. Neathery seconded by Mr. Storey, the Board voted (Mr. Neathery presiding) to accept with gratitude this magnificent gift, to name the Museum the Miriam Lutcher Stark Museum, and to request President Splawn to draft suitable resolutions expressing to Mrs. Stark the appreciation of the Regents of the University.

"At 4:15 P.M. the Board recessed to attend the laying of the cornerstone of Garrison Hall, reconvening at 5:15 P.M., with Attorney General Moody again present to advise in legal matters.

DISCUSSION OF POSSIBILITY OF LOAN FOR BUILDING PROGRAM. After further discussion of the right of the Regents to pledge the income from the permanent fund to secure a loan for the purpose of erecting permanent buildings, the Board voted, upon motion of Mr. Storey, to authorize the appointment of a committee of the Board to undertake the negotiation of a loan of funds for the erection of permanent buildings and that the committee be authorized to employ counsel, if necessary, to work with the Attorney General for the purpose of having validated an issue of bonds to secure such loan, the committee to have all legal questions of the loan settled before offering the bonds for sale to the

With the consent of the Board, the Chairman appointed the following members of the committee authorized: Neathery (Chairman), Royston, and Storey.

The Board recessed at 6 F.M. for dinner, reassembling at 7: P.M. with five Regents, President Splawn, and the Secretary present. Mr. Neathery presided in the absence of Mr. Stark.

OUT-OF-STATE TRAVEL. Upon motion of Judge Royston, the Board approved the following out-of-state trips:

- 1. Dr. W. J. Battle to Charleston, S. C., to attend a meeting of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the meeting being December 1-4.
- 2. Registrar E. J. Mathews to a ttend the same meeting at Charleston, S. C.
- 3. Miss Laura Murray, Chief of the Bureau of Industrial Teacher Training, to New Orleans, November 2-7, to attend the meeting of the State Supervisors and Teacher Trainers in Industrial Education.

PRESIDENT SPLAWN TO NEW YORK. Upon motion of Mr. Storey, the Fresident was authorized to make a trip East in search of instructors, his itinerary to include meetings of various associations to be held in New York during the Christmas holidays in attendance upon which suitable candidates might be found.

SUMMER SCHOOL. Upon motion of Mr. Storey seconded by Mr. Howard, the Board voted to approve the following budget for the Sum-

DR. CAMPBELL'S SUMMER WORK. Upon motion of Judge Royston, the Board voted to authorize the President, in conference with the Dean concerned, to arrange for Dr. Campbell to teach in the Summer Session as a part of his nine months contract and take a term's vacation in the Long Session instead of taking the vacation in the Summer.

DEAN OF STUDENTS IN SUPER SCHOOL. Upon motion of Mr. Storey, the Board voted to employ the Dean of Students for the Summer Session at a salary of \$1,000 for the two terms, he to teach one class each

FACULTY BUILDING COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS. Upon motion of Mr. Storey, the following recommendations of the Faculty Building Committee were approved:

1. The Heating Plant be located between Clark Field and Duval Street next to Twenty-fourth Street;

2. That the floor plans presented by the architects for the Chemistry Building be approved, subject to such minor changes as may later be suggested by the committee.

3. That the general design for the north elevation of the Chemistry Building presented by the architects be approved, subject to such changes as may be suggested by the committee in story and window heights, in spacing windows, and in other matters of detail.

4. That the general design submitted by the architects for the south elevation of the Chemistry Building, involving a gable treatment for the central pavilion, be approved, subject to a better working out of the gable and to changes in story and window heights, and matters of detail as on the north elevation.

5. That the new Library be located between the Main Building and Twenty-first Street, the exact location to be settled later.

FINAL SETTLEMENT -- ADMINISTRATION-MUSEUM BUILDING, GALVESTON. Mr. Storey presented the report of the committee appointed to make the final settlement with the general contractors for the construction of the Administration-Museum Building, Galveston, which was approved by a motion duly adopted:

UNIVERSITY POSTOFFICE. Upon motion of Judge Royston, seconded by Mr. Storey, the Board voted to authorize President Splawn to take the necessary steps to have the University Sub-station Postoffice removed from the University campus.

REPAIRS TO NURSES! HOME: GALVESTON. The Board referred to Judge Royston as a committee of one the matter of repairs to the Nurses' Home at the John Sealy Hospital, Galveston, for settlement.

OLD FORT BLISS SITE. Upon recommendation of President Splawn the Board voted to authorize Dean Kidd, of the College of Mines and Metallurgy, to lease the old Fort Bliss Site of the School of Mines at the best figure obtainable, it appearing that the United States Government has no further need for the site.

AUDIT OF OIL ACCOUNTS. Upon motion of Mr. Storey seconded by Judge Padelford, the Auditing Committee was authorized, at their discretion, to advertise for an audit of the accounts of the oil operators on University leases.

WEAVER TO DESIGN POWER PLANT EQUIPMENT. Upon motion of Mr. Storey, the Board approved President Splann's recommendation that Professor H. C. Weaver be instructed to draw the plans and write the specifications for the equipment of the new power plant, the plans and specifications for the building to be prepared by Architect Greene.

PRESIDENT'S HOME FUEL OIL BILL. Upon motion of Judge Royston, the Board voted to authorize the Comptroller to voucher and the Auditor to pay the bills for fuel oil used in heating the President's Home.

AUDITOR'S BOND. Upon motion of Mr. Storey, the Board referred the matter of the Auditor's bond to the Regents Auditing Committee, they to determine whether it is best to have one bond for the Auditor, or one bond for the Auditor and other bonds for other employees of the Auditor's Office who handle funds. The Committee was empowered to arrange for the bonds decided upon.

A. & M. MATTER. Mr. Storey reported that the Land Committee had studied the question of A. & M. College's claim to a portion of the University's Permanent Fund. After a general discussion, it was decided that there was no formal action necessary for the Board of Regents at this time.

At 10 P.M. the Board adjourned.

The Board of Regents of the University of Texas held their regular meeting at 9:30 Wednesday morning, Jamuary 20, 1926, in the President's Office. Present were: Regents Stark (Chairman), Foster, Howard, Neathery, Padelford, Royston, Storey; President Splawn and Secretary Simmons. Absent were Regents O'Hair and Tyler.

The minutes, of the meeting of December 8 were ordered approved.

REED FELLOWSHIP. President Splewn read a letter from Mr. M. H. Reed in which he enclosed a check for \$1000 in payment of the Malcolm Hiram Reed. Jr., Fellowship for the current year and in which he expressed the hope that he would within the next year place in the hands of the Regents the sum of \$18,000 or \$20,000 as a permanent endowment fund to supply the annual stipend for the fellowship. The Board expressed further their appreciation of Mr. Reed's gift.

VOTES BY MAIL. The results of votes-by-mail were announced as follows:

Removal of University Postoffice: Six affirmative votes received for removing the University Postoffice Substation from the University Campus to some site on Guadalupe Street, across from the campus, the equipment owned by the University to be leased for a nominal sum, such as \$10 a year. (No votes received from Messrs. Neathery and Padelford and Mrs. O'Hair.)

Bids for University's Checking Account: Seven votes received for placing this account with the Security Trust Company, in accordance with the terms of their bid therefor. (No votes received from Judge Padelford and Mrs. O'Hair.)

PRESIDENT TO ATTEND BIZZELL'S INAUGURATION. Upon motion of Mr. Neathery seconded by Judge Royston, the Board authorized President Splawn to attend the inauguration of President Bizzell of the University of Oklahoma.

BEAUMONT'S PETITION RE DECISION OF THE UNIVERSITY INTERSCHOLASTIC LEAGUE. President Splawn presented a petition from the Beaumont Public School Board and Athletic Council for the right to appeal to the Board a decision of the Executive Committee of the University Interscholastic League as to the eligibility of certain football players on the Beaumont High School football team. President Splawn explained that according to the Constitution of the League one of the conditions for membership the League shall be the final authority for the decision of questions of eligibility of players. After a thorough discussion, the Board voted, upon motion of Judge Royston seconded by Mr. Neathery, that an appeal in such cases does not lie to the Board of Regents and asked President Splawn to to inform the Beaumont School authorities.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR OF INTERSCHOLASTIC LEAGUE. Upon motion of Judge Royston, the Board requested the President to investigate (1) the desirability of having an athletic director for the Interscholastic League and (2), in case it should appear desirable, whether or not the present incumbent should be retained, the report of the investigation to be made to the Board as soon as possible.

ALICE LITTLEFIELD DORMITORY FOR GIRLS. At this time the Board of Regents entered into a joint session with the trustees of the Alice Littlefield Dormitory for girls. Present were: Regents Stark (Chairman), Foster, Howard, Neathery, Padelford, Royston, Storey; Trustees (of the Alice Littlefield Dormitory for girls) H. A. Wroe and W. M. W.

Splawn; R. L. White, Superintendent of Construction, the University; G. J. Stephens, Assistant to the Comptroller, the University; H. M. Greene, University architect; Judge L. C. Sutton, Assistant Attorney General of Texas; and C. D. Simmons, Secretary of the Board of Regents.

Mr. H. W. Wros recommended that the three lowest bids be accepted provided the Board of Regents agree to bear all of the cost in excess of the sum of \$500,000, this being the maximum sum available from the estate of the late George W. Littlefield under the terms of Major Littlefield's will.
