there was no principal in default. These items involved interest on \$15,000 of bonds, and the delinquencies on both have since been removed through the consummation of refunding plans.

On motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild, the Board voted to accept and file this report, with an expression to the Finance Committee and to Mr. Simmons and Mr. Calhoun of their appreciation for the very satisfactory manner in which the investments for the University Permanent Fund have been handled.

Trust and Special Fund Investments.—Mr. Waggener presented for the Finance Committee the report on Trust and Special Fund investments for the fiscal year 1936-37. The report showed a total in Trust Fund investments at August 31, 1937, excluding cash and notes for loans to students, of \$1,171,116.20. United States and Texas municipal bonds comprised 55.3% of the total, real estate mortgage bonds and notes, 25.3%, corporate bonds, 10.2%, property, 8.2%, and miscellaneous promissory notes, 1%.

The report for the year ending August 31, 1936 had estimated that the ultimate recovery of the aggregate holdings of real estate mortgage bonds would be at least 53% of the original face value of these bonds. The report for the year ending August 31, 1937 indicated a recovery of 63%. The report carried the following statement of general policy as to purchases:

"There has been no change during the year of the general policy as to purchases for trust and special funds. This general policy is as follows: Temporary investments of Current Funds Educational, and temporary investments of other trust end special funds where the nature of the fund is such that it will likely require early liquidation, are being restricted to United States Treasury Notes. Purchases for endowment or quasiendowment funds are made either of United States bonds or Texas City and County bonds approved by the Board of Regents for the University Permanent Fund, or of other special districts approved by the Board of Regents for trust and special requirements."

On motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild, the Board voted to accept and file this report and to express to the Finance Committee, Mr. Simmons, and Mr. Calhoun their appreciation for the satisfactory manner in which the investments of Trust and Special Funds have been

PROPOSED UNIVERSAL FEE FOR TEXAS UNION .-- Mr. Charles N. Zivley, Director of the Texas Union, came before the Board by invitation and discussed a letter which had been addressed to the Board under date of June 30, 1937, containing the following statement: "The Board of Directors of the Texas Union feels that the time approaches when it will be necessary and desirable for the Auditor of The University of Texas to collect for the Union from each student upon registering in The University of Texas one dollar per semester and an equivalent and proportionate amount from each student registering in Summer School, or to obtain funds comparable in amount from some other source." Mr. Zivley said that the Board of Directors of the Texas Union would like to have the reaction of the Board of Regents to the proposal that the Legislature be requested to grant permission to charge a compulsory fee of one dollar per semester to all students, the money thus collected to be used in expanding the program of the Texas Union. The Board of Directors proposed to secure an expression of opinion from the student body if the Board of Regents approved such a proposal. Mr. Zivley discussed some of the plans which the Union would like to carry out and services which it would like to be enabled to render to the student body. Mr. Zivley withdrew, and the Board agreed to consider the matter further at a later meeting.

The Board of Regents adjourned at 6:50 p.m., to meet next at the call of the Chairman.

The Board of Regents of The University of Texas met in regular session in the office of the President at 9:15 Saturday morning, January 8, 1938, with the following present: Regents Randall (Chairman), Aynesworth, Blackert, Fairchild, Morgan, Parten, and Waggener; Fresident Calhoun, Comptroller Simmons, and Secretary Haynes. Absent: Regents Stark and Weinert, both out of the state.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES .-- On motion of Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by Senator Blackert, the minutes for the meetings of the Eoard of Regents held on November 13, 1937 and November 22, 1937 were approved by the Eoard in the form in which they had been mimeographed and distributed by the Secretary.

ROUTINE ITEMS APPROVED. -- Mr. Calhoun presented his docket of January 8, which had not been mailed to the members of the Board because of the lack of time after the meeting had been called. He explained certain items and answered several questions with respect to his recommendations. On motion of Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by Major Parten, the pard voted to approve the recommendations of Mr. Calhoun, pages 1-4, inclusive. A copy of the docket follows:

APPOINTMENTS, RESIGNATION AND CHANGE OF STATUS. -- I recommend that the following appointments and change of status be made and the following resignation be accepted, for 1937-38:

4. Change the status of Professor A. P. Winston, Professor of International Trade, from full-time to two-thirds' time for the Second Semester of the current Long Session, his salary to be reduced proportionately--i.e., his second semester salary will be \$1,366.67 instead of \$2,050.

5. Appoint Mr. William Andrew Ross as Assistant Professor of Business Administration for the Second Semester of the current Long Session only at a salary of \$1,200 for the Semester. Mr. Ross' salary is to be paid from the following accounts: \$683.33 from the unused portion of the sum originally budgeted as the full-time Long Session salary of Professor Winston and \$516.67 from the sum originally budgeted as the 1937-38 salary of Professor W. L. White, resigned.

Physical Plant

6. Change the date at which Mr. Helmuth W. Zuch's appointment as Distribution Engineer, in the Physical Flant is to become effective from December 1, 1937 to January 1, 1938.

7. Appoint Mr. L. W. Nicholson as Electrician in the Electrical Division of the Physical Plant at a salary rate of \$1,800 for twelve months, effective December 13, 1937.

Lease No. 447; O. B. Trap Company. -- This lease is to provide an annual rental of 35¢ per acre, with no limit on sheep. The actual acreage is being determined by the surveyors and will be reported to the Board later.

Lease No. 448; A. C. Hoover.--This lease is to provide an annual rental of 26¢ per acre and is to take the place of Lease No. 319. The actual acreage is being determined by the surveyors and will be reported to the Board Later.

Lease No. 449; E. H. and C. Linthicum.--This lease is to provide an annual rental of 26¢ per acre and takes the place of that part of Lease No. 322 held by Messrs. Linthicum. The actual acreage is being determined by the surveyors and will be reported to the Board later.

These leases were approved by the Board of Regents on the recommendation of the Land Committee and on motion of Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild.

Cancellation of Lease No. 339. -- On the recommendation of Mr. Compton and the Land Committee and on motion of Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild, the Board voted to cancel Lease No. 339, held by Messrs. D. F. and Charles E. Coates, as of December 31, 1937, since the acreage of this lease is included in the new Lease, No. 440, to Mr. D. Fleet Coates.

Cancellation of Portion of Lease No. 338. -- On the recommendation of Mr. Compton and the Land Committee and on motion of Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild, the Board voted to cancel eight sections (5,120 acres) out of Lease No. 338, held by Mr. Alexander Mitchell, in order that these eight sections might be included in Lease No. 446 issued to Mr. N. D. Blackstone. This cancellation is effective December 31, 1937.

Notes for Grazing Lease Rentals. -- The Land Committee recommended that Mr. Compton be authorized to accept six-months' notes at six percent interest in a total amount not to exceed \$5,000 for grazing lease rentals due January 1, 1938 on the condition that the lessee offering a note has paid all of his rentals to December 31, 1937. This recommendation was approved by the Board on motion of Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild.

Easement No. 96; Shell Pipe Line Corporation. -- Dr. Morgan presented an easement requested by the Shell Pipe Line Corporation for a four-inch pipe line across Section 32, Block B-16, Pecos County, a total length of eighty-eight rods. The easement was for a period of ten years beginning November 1, 1937, was drawn on the University's printed form, and provided the usual consideration of 25¢ per rod, or a total consideration of \$22. Mr. Compton and the Land Committee recommended that this easement be approved. It was approved by the Board on motion of Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild.

Assignment of Easements 41, 42, 43, and 44 to Lone Star Gas
Company.-Dr. Morgan presented the recommendation of Mr. Compton and the
Land Committee that Easements 41, 42, 43, and 44, executed by the Board
of Regents on February 28, 1931 to the Texas Public Service Company and
assigned on March 21, 1931 to the West Coast Power Company, be now assigned to the Lone Star Gas Company. This recommendation was approved by the
Board on motion of Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild.

Restriction as to Farming. -- Dr. Morgan called attention to the fact that the printed form of University grazing lease provides that the lease may be used for "farming and grazing purposes." He said that normally the amount of these lands which is placed in cultivation is negligible but that one or two requests had been made for permission to farm cotton on a part of the leases. He said that the objection to having the leases placed in cultivation is that it takes a good many years to get leases placed in cultivation is that it takes a good many years to get the land sodded and ready for grazing again after it is taken out of cultivation. On the recommendation of the Land Committee and on motion of tivation. On the recommendation of the Land Committee and on the Land Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild, the Board authorized the Land Committee to request the Attorney General to draw up a clause to be in-

serted in future grazing leases, which would provide that land included in a lease may not be farmed without the written consent of the lessor. Mr. Compton is then to have this clause inserted in all future grazing leases.

Cancellation of Portion of Lease No. 410.—Dr. Morgan reported that Mr. Gompton and the Land Committee recommended that the Board cancel the lease on Sections 1-6, inclusive, Block 16, Ward County, included in Lease No. 410 to Thornton and Ingham and that the Attorney General be requested to sue for possession of these sections. He explained that oil and gas are being produced on this land and that there are conflicts between the grazing lessees and the oil producer. On motion of Mr. Waggener, seconded by Dr. Aynesworth, the Board voted to approve the recommendation to cancel Sections 1-6, Block 16, out of Lease 410 and to authorize the Land Committee to request the Attorney General to sue for possession of this tract.

Bitterweed Investigation. --Mr. Calhoun reported that the proposed cooperative agreement between The University of Texas and the Agricultural Experiment Station for investigations of the control of bitterweed had been completed and that he had a letter from the Acting Secretary of the Board of Directors of A. & M. College quoting the following excerpt from the minutes of the Board of Directors of the College held on January 6: "On motion of Mr. Kiest, seconded by Mr. Schuhmacher, the cooperative agreement between The University of Texas and the Agricultural Experiment Station on bitterweed investigations was approved." Mr. Calhoun had been informed that copies of the agreement were being prepared for the signatures of the Board of Directors and the Board of Regents. Regents approve the agreement. On motion of Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by to authorize its Chairman to execute the agreement in the name of the

Geophysical Exploration. -- Dr. Morgan called attention to the fact that at the October 23 meeting the Board had approved the extension of geophysical exploration privileges on several sections of West Texas land until February 15, 1938. He stated that various oil companies desired to make their budgets for such activities for an entire year and that it was desirable, therefore, for them to know what exploration privileges would be permitted during the calendar year. Under date of December 23 he had written a letter to each member of the Board, requesting authority for ing and explained briefly the facts in the case. Dr. Morgan reported that the hearing was held on December 29, that Dr. Bybee and Mr. Haigh changed the University in the hearing, and that the Commission had sity.

Investigation of Oil Production.—Dr. Morgan reported that Mr. Compton suspects that more oil is being produced from the wells on a certain lease on University lands than is being reported for royalty the lease is the chief basis for this suspicion. On the recommendation of the Land Committee and on motion of Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by pend such a sum of money as they may deem proper, not to exceed \$1,000, in investigating this matter.

OUT-OF-STATE TRIP.--Mr. Calhoun recommended approval of the request of Dr. Bybee that Dr. Bybee and Mr. Haigh be given permission to attend the meeting of the American Association of Petroleum Geologists in New Orleans, March 16-18, with the understanding that the expenses for the two would not exceed \$50. This request had been approved by Mr. Simmons. The Board approved the recommendation of Mr. Calhoun on motion of Mr. Waggener.

GOVERNMENT REQUIREMENT FOR DEGREES. -- Mr. Calhoun presented a letter from President T. O. Walton, of A. & M. College, concerning the requirement made by the last Regular Session of the Legislature that candidates for degrees present six semester hours' credit in American Government. After a brief discussion, the President was requested to study the matter further and present a recommendation on it to the Board at a later meeting.

LAVERNE NOYES ESTATE. --Mr. Calhoun reported that the agreement between the governing boards of the various educational institutions and the Trustees of the LaVerne Noyes Estate had been completed and that under date of December 30 the Trustees had mailed to the University an executed copy of the agreement, together with their check in the amount of \$1,830 and a receipt for thirty shares of the common capital stock of the Aermotor Company. The cash represented the proportional share of The University of Texas in the amount of cash now payable under the terms of the agreement.

Mr. Calhoun reported the receipt also of a letter dated December 31 from Mr. H. L. Wells, Business Manager of Northwestern University, who had been designated to act as the agent of the various educational institutions which were parties to the agreement. The letter from Mr. Wells stated: "There seems to be sufficient evidence to establish a price of \$1,100 per share on the stock of the Aermotor Company, and, unofficially, the Trustees of this estate say that such a price is warranted. I thought perhaps you would like to know the attitude of the Trustees and myself in this matter and would wish to use the same figure which we have established on the books of Northwestern University." Mr. Calhoun stated that the cash and the receipt for the stock had been turned over to the Auditor to constitute the LaVerne Noyes Foundation Endowment Fund, the income from which is to be expended for scholarships on the terms and conditions set forth in the will of Mr. Noyes.

DISTINGUISHED PROFESSORSHIPS. -- Mr. Calhoun recalled that at the meeting of the Board held on November 22 Dr. Rendall and Mr. Weinert were not present when the vote was taken on the three Distinguished Professorships at the Main University. In accordance with the authorization of the Board, he had written to Dr. Handell and Mr. Weinert, asking for their approval or disapproval of the appointments. He had received a letter from Dr. Randell giving his approval of the action and had received Mr. Weinert's approval in a telephone conversation. Mr. Calhoun stated, therefore, that this made the action on the appointments unanimous by the entire membership of the Board.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT. --Mr. Waggener presented the following report of the Finance Committee covering bonds purchased for the University Permanent Fund since the report made on November 22, 1937. On motion of Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by Major Parten, the Board voted to approve the actions of its Finance Committee.

DEVELOPMENT BOARD. -- Dr. Randall reported that in accordance with the action of the Board at its meeting held on October 23, 1937 (Minutes, page 208), he had appointed Mr. W. E. Wrather, of Dallas, and Mr. George A. Hill, Jr., of Houston, as the two distinguished Texans outside the membership of the Board of Regents to be members of the Development Board. Dr. Randall stated that each of these gentlemen had accepted the appointment. At the request of Senator Blackert, Mr. Calhoun stated that he would request the General Faculty to appoint its two members in accordance with the resolution creating the Board (Minutes of May 31, 1937, page 208)

PLANTING PLANS, LIBRARY-MAIN BUILDING. -- Mrs. Fairchild reported that Messrs. Here and Hare had completed plans and specifications for the planting around the Library-Main Building. On the recommendation of the Building Committee and on motion of Mr. Waggener, seconded by Dr. Aynesworth, the Board voted to approve the plans and to authorize the Comptroller to advertise for bids on the planting.

COMMITTEE ON SELECTION OF PRESIDENT. -- Dr. Randall reported that the committee of the Board on the selection of a permanent President to succeed Dr. Benedict had spent considerable time studying the various prospects and that they believed they should be authorized now to make such trips as they deem advisable to investigate certain of the prospects further. On motion of Dr. Morgan, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild, the Board opinion of the committee to make such trips and investigations as in the the committee are necessary and desirable. The expenses of

Extension of Time, Furniture and Equipment Contract

WHEREAS, On August 1, 1937, the Bickley School and Church Furniture Company entered into a certain contract with The University of Texas for the furnishing and delivery of completed within sixty calendar days and, failing to be in the sixty calendar days, would be liable for the payment of required; and

WHEREAS, The Bickley School and Church Furniture Company has been unable to complete their contract with the Owner due to circumstances beyond their control, such contract, and the Owner has not in any instance suffered loss

due to the failure of the Contractor to complete the contract within the scheduled time;

Extension of Time, Project as a Whole

At one o'clock the Board recessed for lunch and were guests at the Women's Dormitory, Unit II. The session was resumed at 2:30 with Regents Aynesworth, Blackert, Fairchild, Morgan, and Parten, President Calhoun, and Secretary Haynes present. Major Parten, Vice-Chairman of the Board, presided.

ROUTINE ITEMS APPROVED, COLLEGE OF MINES AND METALLURGY. -Dr. Morgan presented President D. M. Wiggins' docket for the College of
Mines and Metallurgy. The College of Mines Committee recommended approval
of the items. This recommendation was approved by the Board on motion
of Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild. A copy of the docket

OUT-OF-STATE TRIPS. -- I recommend that the following out-of-state trips be approved:

Austin, Texas, March 5, 1938 Meeting No. 388

The Board of Regents of The University of Texas met in regular session in the office of the President at 9:45 Saturday morning, March 5, 1936, with the following present: Regents Rendell (Chairman), Aynesworth, Fairchild, Morgan, Parten, and Waggener; President Calhoun and Secretary Haynes. Absent: Regents Blackert, Stark, and Weinert, all out of the state.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES. -- On motion of Dr. Morgen, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild, the Board approved the minutes of the meeting of January 8, 1938, in the form in which they had been mimeographed and distributed to the members of the Foard.

ROUTINE ITEMS APPROVED. --Mr. Calhoun presented his docket of February 26 and his supplementary docket of March 5. He discussed several of his recommendations and answered various questions. Concerning the recommendations for the Dean of the College of Fine Arts, Mr. Calhour recommended that for the present year the salary be paid for the period from April 1, 1938, or as soon thereafter as Mr. Doty can begin his service here, until August 31. Mr. Doty's salary is to be at the rate of \$5,000 for nine months. On motion of Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by Major Parten, the Board voted to approve the recommendations of Mr. Calhoun concerning the appointment of Mr. Doty. (Docket, page 6.) (See page 278.)

On motion of Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by Dr. Morgan, the Board voted to approve the recommendation of Mr. Calhoun concerning the appointment of Dr. D. B. Klein to membership in the Graduate Faculty (docket, page 5). (See page 277.)

Dr. Aynesworth called attention to the gift from the Carnegie Institution of Washington of the original Bandelier transcripts from which Professor C. W. Hackett prepared his three-wolume edition of Historical Documents Relating to New Mexico. Dr. Aynesworth commented upon the services of Professor Hackett in connection with this translation, and the Chairman requested Dr. Aynesworth to prepare and submit to the Board at a subsequent meeting a resolution expressing the appreciation of the Board for the untiring and most efficient services of Professor Hackett in this work. (See page 277.)

The gifts listed by Mr. Calhoun on page 6 of his docket as having been presented to the University were accepted by the Board by unanimous action, and the Secretary was asked to express the thanks of the Board to the various donors. (Pages 277 and 278)

On motion of Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by Mr. Waggener, the Board approved the recommendation of Mr. Calhoun concerning Professors Hornberger and Willard in the Department of English (docket, page 7). (Page 294)

There was some discussion of the recommendation for distinguished professorships at the Medical Branch (docket, page 8), but, due to the absence of three members of the Board, action on the recommendation was postponed until a later meeting. Likewise, action on the recommendation for an increase in the salary of Dr. W. T. Dawson, Professor of Pharmacology, was postponed until a later meeting. (Page 295)

On the recommendation of Mr. Calhoum, the item "Intercollegiate Athletics Committee and Council" (docket, page 9) was postponed in order that the Athletic Committee of the Board might present its recommendation to the Board on that subject. (Page 295)

On motion of Major Parten, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild, the Board then voted to approve the recommendations of Mr. Calhoun contained in his docket of February 26, pages 1 through 8, inclusive, and to the heading "Other Matters to Come Before the Board" on page 9, with the exception that the items headed "Distinguished Professorships in the Medical School" and "Increase in Salary of Professor W. T. Dawson," on page 8, and the item headed "Intercollegiste Athletics Committee and Council, on page 9, were postponed for action at a later meeting.

Stocking, Professor of Economics, be allowed to accept appointment by the National Mediation Board as a public representative of an arbitration board to make an award in connection with the dispute between the Sacremento Northern Reilway and its employees and that he be granted permission to be absent from the campus without salary for such period as it will be necessary for him to serve in this capacity.

CIFTS .-- I recommend that the thanks of the Board be expressed to the Andrew Carruthers Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution for their initial gift of one hundred dollars (2100.00) to the University for the purpose of establishing an emergency loan fund for University women under the following conditions:

- 1. The fund is to be designated Andrew Carruthers Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution Loan Fund.
- 2. It is to be used only to assist worthy women students of The University of Texas.

 3. The fund is to be handled by the University Auditor.
- 4. Applications for loans are to be made to the Dean of
- 5. A rate of 5 per cent interest is to be charged on all

According to the letter of gift, it is the purpose of the Chapter to add to this loan fund from time to time.

I also recommend that the thanks of the Board be expressed to the Carnegie Institution of Washington, through Mr. France Scholes and Mrs. William Henry Harrison, of the Division of Historical Research of the Institution, for its action in depositing in the Library of The University of Texas the original Bandelier transcripts from which Professor C. W. Hackett, at the request of the Carnegie Institution, prepared his three volume edition of <u>Historical Documents Relating to New Mexico</u>. In turning over these transcripts to the University, Professor Hackett makes the following comments:

"these transcripts were made by the late Dr. Adolph Bandelier and his wife, Mrs. Fennie Bandelier, under a grant from Carnegie Institution of Washington, in the Archives of Mexico and Spain between the years 1912 and 1915. While engaged in this work Dr. Eandelier died in Spain, and two years later the transcripts were turned over to me by Carnegie Institution to Organize, translate, and edit as I saw fit. The great majority of the documents has been published in three volumes by Carnegie Institution of Washington ... I consider this a very remarkable gift from the Carnegie Institution of Washington. Dr. Pandelier was a pioneer in the field of Southwestern history and archaeology, and his works will ever be listed in the historiography of this area."

I recommend further that the thanks of the Board be expressed to the children of Mrs. R. L. Batts for their action in turning over to the President of the University; and his successors, as Trustee, the sum of \$500 for the foundation of a loan fund or a scholarship fund in Art, preferably sculpture, leaving it to the Trustee to decide whether it will be a loan or scholarship fund and specifying that only the income is expendable. I have received from the children of Mrs. Batts a note for 2500, which is a first mortgage on a piece of property in Austin, and 40 in cash representing a year's interest on the note.

1938-39 FELLOWSHIP AND SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS. -- I recommend that the Poard make available for award the \$5,000 appropriated by the Legislature for University Fellowships and Scholarships (3,000) and University Greduate Fellowships (\$5,000) for 1938-39, in order that the University may follow the recommendations of the Association of American Universities that fellowship and scholarship awards for 1938-39 be an-

DEAN OF THE SCILEGE OF FINE ARTS. -- I recommend the appointment of Mr. 3. William Doty, Professor of Music at the University of Michigan, as Dean of the College of Fine Arts and Professor of Music at a salary of 25,000 per Long Session, effective April 1, 1938 or as soon thereafter as Er. Doty can begin his service here.

INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS COMMITTEE AND COUNCIL. -- I recommend that the Board accept the resignation of Mr. A. E. Cooper as a Faculty member on the Intercollegiate Athletics Committee and Council, effective as of this date.

I also recommend that the Board appoint Mr. M. Y. Colby as a Faculty member on the Intercollegiate Athletics Committee and Council, vice Mr. Cooper.

PERMISSION TO REPORT LATE FOR TEACHING DUTIES IN 1938 SUMMER SESSION.--I recommend that Professor R. A. Law, Professor of English, be granted permission to report for his teaching duties in the Second Term of the 1938 Summer Session as late as July 26, 1938 without loss of pay after July 18.

OUTSIDE ACTIVITY OF DIRECTOR A. B. COX. -- I recommend that Professor A. B. Cox, Director of the Bureau of Business Research, be granted permission to accept an invitation from the Division of Program Planning of the United States Department of Agriculture to give some lectures at the Federal training school for extension workers to be held at Las Cruces, New Mexico, April 11-14, 1938, for which the Federal Covernment proposes to pay his expenses and in addition to give him an honorarium of \$15 a day while he is absent from the University.

I further recommend that Director Cox be given permission to turn over the \$15 a day honorarium to the Bureau of Business Research to be used in compiling certain data that he is working with at the present time.

FACULTY LEGISLATION. -- I recommend approval of the following action of the General Faculty taken at its meeting of March 8, 1988, and by the circularization-no-protest procedure:

1. Freshman Requirements. Add the following paragraph at the end of the section "College of Engineering," page 14, Part V: General Information, Main University, of the current University Catalogue:

Freshmen in the College of Engineering who are regular students must take at least twelve semester hours of the courses prescribed for an engineering degree, and solid geometry if they do not present entrance credit in that subject.

2. Program of Work. Add the following paragraph to "Classwork and Routine," bottom of page 9, Part IV: College of Engineering, of the current Catalogue:

Program of Work. 2-Before the end of the first week of the second semester students of the College of Engineering shall inform themselves of the subjects for which they are registered for the second semester, and, with the consent of the Dean, add any necessary courses that have been omitted.

5. Hours of Work of Employed Students. Add the following paragraph to "Classwork and Routine," top of page 10, Part IV: College of Engineering, of the current Catalogue:

A student who has employment in addition to his scholastic work must register in the Dean's office during the first four weeks of the semester, or immediately after obtaining employment if the employment is obtained later in the semester, the number of hours of work per week required by his employment; and without unnecessary delay inform the Dean of subsequent chances in the number of hours demanded by his employment. Any failure of the student to observe the above requirement will deprive the Dean of his discretionary powers to adjust to the 'Standard of Work Required' regulations.

4. Convocations. Add the following paragraph after paragraph two of Article III on page 14 of Part IV: College of Engineering, of the current Catalogue:

- 3. All Freshmen Engineers are required to register for and attend regularly General Engineering Ol, a series of not more than eight convocations held at times and places as announced by the Chairman of the Engineering Committee on Advisers.
- 5. Standard of Work for Freshmen and Sophomores. Add the following paragraph to the subsection "Standard of Work for Freshmen and Sophomores of section "Standard of Work Required, "" page 10, Part ZV: College of Enginsering, of the current latelogue:
 - I a stadent transferring to the University of Texas is given credit for at least 54 semester hours by the Registrar of the University of Texas he may take the particular junior engineering course or courses for which he has the required prerequisites provided he has a C average on the 54 semester hours. This is not to conflict in any way with the University's maximum work allowable rule.

APPOINTMENTS, 1938-39. -- I recumend that the following appoint ments for 1938-39 be made:

REPORT OF PRESIDENTIAL COMMITTEE. -- Dr. Randell reported in some detail on a trip made recently by the Presidential Committee of the Board and told of various interviews and conferences which they had. He said that conferences had been held with the advisory committees from the Faculty and from the Ex-Students' Association both before and subsequent to the trip made by the Committee of the Board. VACANCY IN WARD COUNTY. --Dr. Morgan reported that during Mr. J. H. Walker's term as Land Commissioner a request had been made to him for a mineral lease on what was declared to be a vacancy between Blocks 15 and 16, Ward County. This so-called vacancy did not conflict at that time with the University's markers, and Mr. Walker approved the lease. Since he has given further study to the matter, Mr. Walker is convinced that the strip in question is not a vacancy but that it properly belongs to the University, since the field notes for the University tract call for this tract to join Block 15. The Land Committee and Mr. Walker believe that the University should try to cancel the lease on this tract and should lend aid and assistance to The Texas Company in its suit to disprove a vacancy. The Board indicated its approval of such a course of action on motion of Mr. Waggener, seconded by Mr. Stark.

ASENATH CAROTHERS DORATTORY. -- On motion of Mrs. Fairchild, seconded by Major Parten, the Board voted to name the newest of the dormitories for women (which has been called Women's Dormitory, Unit 2) in honor of Mrs. Neil Carothers, who was Director of the Woman's Building from 1903 to 1938. The official name of the dormitory is to be Asenath Carothers Dormitory. Mr. Stark asked to be recorded as votin "No" on this motion, because he still wanted to name a dormitory for Mrs. Helen Marr Kirby.

GIFT OF BUST OF LA SALLE AND REPLICA OF SHIP. -- Lr. Salhoun reported the receipt of a letter dated March 3 from Mr. A. Garland Adair in which Mr. Adair stated that the bust of La Salle which was given by France to the State of Texas at the time of the visit of the French Mission to the State last year is in the office of the Governor, who accepted it for the State. Mr. Adair stated that the Governor is anxious to present it to the University.

Mr. Adair reported that there is also in the Governor's office a replica of the first freight and passenger ship employed in the service between Hamburg, Germany, and New York, a gift from the State of Hamburg and the Hamburg-American Line presented in June, 1937 by the German Consul General, Dr. Ernst Wendler. He stated that Governor Allred desires to present this replica also to the University. On the recommendation of Mr. Calhoum and on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Dr. Margar, the Board of Regents voted to accept these two gifts for The University of Texas and to request Mr. Calhoun to express the thanks and appreciation of the Board for them.

ASHBEL SMITH FORTMAIT AND SWORD.—Mr. Calhoun reported that Mrs. Henry P. Jones, of Bennington, Vermont, a grand-niece of Dr. Ashbel Smith, has tendered to the University a life-size bust portrait in oils of Dr. Ashbel Smith, together with his sword and scabbard. On the recommendation of Mr. Calhoun and on motion of Dr. Morgan, seconded by Mrs. mendation of Mr. Calhoun and on motion of Dr. Morgan, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild, the Board voted unanimously to accept these gifts from Mrs. Fairchild, the Board voted unanimously to accept these gifts from Mrs. Jones and requested Mrs. Calhoun to express to Mrs. Jones the thanks of Jones and requested Mrs. Calhoun to express to Mrs. Jones the University. RESTORATION OF PAINTINGS. -- Mr. Stark called the attention of the Board to the fact that a number of paintings of people connected with the early history of the University have been hung in the corridor outside the Academic Room and stated that many of these have been painted side the Academic Room and stated that many of these have been painted for a long time and may not have had the best of care. He suggested that the Board request Dr. Battle to inspect the paintings and then to report to the Board whether in his opinion they should be restored. FEDERAL TAX ON ATHLETIC GATE RECEIPTS. --Mr. C. D. Simmons, Acting Comptroller, was invited before the Board to present a report on the matter of the federal tax on athletic sate receipts. Mr. Simmons reportmetter of the federal tax on athletic sate receipts for an opinion on some ed that he had written the Attorney General asking for an opinion on some

questions in connection with this matter and that he had received an opinion dated March 25 and signed by Mr. Henry S. Moore, Assistant Attorney General, in which Mr. Moore advised as follows:

"The last expression of the courts is that this tax is not collectible from State institutions. However, this case (the Georgia case) is now before the Surreme Court of the United States and the decision of the lower courts may be reversed. As to the reversal of this case, it is the writer's opinion, that the Supreme Court will hold that this tax is collectible. I case this on the recent rulings of the Supreme Court and their present tendency as reflected by their recent decisions to overthe lower court holding that the tax is not collectible, it would appear that the money already collected should not be provisions that should be considered...."

In enswer to a second question from Mr. Simmons, Mr. Moore had salvised that the University file a claim with the Internal Revenue Department for a refund of all amounts already paid in connection with this tax. This, he said, will stop limitation, and, although he expected that the date of refusal in which to file suit for the recovery of the texes paid.

In enswer to a third question, as to whether the University should continue to collect the tax and if the tax is collected whether the University should pay the amount over to the Internal Revenue Depart lagelity of the tax, Mr. Moore advised that the University should consider or paid over to the Federal authorities should be held in the same light as those monies collected in the past." Mr. Moore advised first that the tickets should be printed in such a manner as to inet, and the total, as required by the Federal statutes.

Mr. Simmons recommended (1) that the taxes collected by the College of Mines but not yet remitted to the Internal Revenue Department be remitted to that Department, and (2) that a claim for a refund be filed for all taxes that have been paid both at the College of Mines and at the Main University. On motion of Major Perten, seconded by Dr. Morprovision that as a matter of policy the Athletic Departments at both the Main University and the College of Mines take care in the next issuance of tickets to protect themselves regarding this tax.

BIENNIUM APPROPRIATION REQUESTS. --Mr. Calhoun discussed again with the Board the matter of the basis for appropriation requests to be made of the next Legislature for the support and operation of the Uni-Board that the appropriation requests for the 1939-1941 Biennium should be made on the same basis as the appropriations were made for the 1937-the lower division, or freshman and sophomore years, and \$225 for graduate years, plus an allowance of \$25 per full-time student in the nicel courses. Technical courses are to be defined as in the appropriancessary for the University to obtain additional funds in order to carservice and expansion.

DEAN FOR MEDICAL SCHOOL. -- Dr. Randall called attention to the fact that the appointment of Dr. W. S. Carter as Dean of the Medical School expires on August 31, 1938 and proposed that the Medical School toward the appointment of a successor to begin investigations looking cussion the Board voted, on motion of Mr. Carter. After some disblackert, to authorize the Medical School Committee of the Board to take steps toward the nomination to the Board of a person to serve as Deen of

the Medical School, the appointment to become effective September 1, 1938. The Committee is to have the privilege of asking assistance from the Executive Committee of the Faculty of the Medical School, and if they desire, from a committee of medical alumni.

SALARY INCREASES, MEDICAL SCHOOL. -- President Calhour read from a letter from Dean W. S. Carter recommending a five hundred dollar increase in the salaries of each of the following faculty members: Dr. H. O. Knight, Professor of Anatomy, Dr. B. M. Hendrix, Professor of Biological Chemistry, Dr. Paul Brindley, Professor of Pathology, and Dr. W. T. Dawson, Professor of Pharmacology. Dr. Carter recommended these increases because of long and efficient service to the Medical School on the part of each of these professors. These salary increases are to be effective as of September 1, 1937. The Board approved these increases in salary on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild.

DR. GEORGE DECHERD FOR MEDICAL SCHOOL FACULTY.--Dr. Randell reported that the Medical School is exceedingly enxious to bring Dr. George Decherd back to the staff. Dr. Decherd resigned as Instructor in Practice of Medicine on August 1, 1936, to join the staff of the Medical School of Louisiana State University at a salary almost twice that paid him by The University of Texas. Mr. Calhoun called attention to the fact that to bring Dr. Decherd back to the staff at the salary and rank which it would be necessary to pay him to induce him to return would result in a conflict with the University's nepotism rules. After a brief discussion, the Board voted, on motion of Mr. Stark seconded by Mrs. Fairchild, to refer this matter to its Medical School Committee with power to act.

APPROVAL OF PH.D. DEGREE LEGISLATION.--Mr. Calhoun presented certain legislation passed by the School of Business Administration and approved by the Administrative Council, acting as the Executive Committee of the General Faculty, on June 6, 1937, which had as its purpose the coordination of the catalogue requirements for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy with the major in Business Administration and with the general University requirements for the Doctor of Philosophy degree. The legislation had also been approved by the Graduate Faculty. On the recommendation of Mr. Calhoun, and on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Major Parten, the Board voted to approve this legislation, which follows:

Amend the section on Degree Requirements, pages 120 and 121 of the Graduate School Bulletin for 1934-35 as fol-

Omit comma after parenthesis in line 1, page 121.

Change section (2) to read:

"The candidate must elect a minor, no second minor being permitted. This minor must represent a related field outside the School of Business Administration, and should ordinarily be selected from the following: economics, government, history, mathematics, psychology."

Substitute the following for (4), (5), and (6):

(4) "The student is to be formally admitted to candidacy for the Ph.D. degree immediately after being certified as having passed the qualifying examinations which examinations are intended to demonstrate his familiarity with business and economic conditions, his knowledge of the principles and tools of business administration, and his power to attack business problems. These examinations must be taken not later than the first month of the fourth semester of graduate study. They shall cover the fields of accounting, statistics, and at least two other divisions of business administration. They shall be administered by a special committee consisting of five associate or full professors of the staff appointed by the Dean of the School of Business Administration, with the understanding that any other associate or full professor of the staff is privileged to participate in the examining. The examination may be oral or written or partly oral and partly written, at the option of the committee. The committee shall certify promptly the results of the examinations to the Dean of the School of Business Administration for transmission to the Dean of the Graduate School. Should a student fail to pass the qualifying examinations, he shall not be eligible for re-examination for at least one year."

- (5) "Prior to the selection of a professor to supervise the student's dissertation, the preliminary planning of the student's program shall be in the hands of the Dean of the School of Business Administration and of the Dean of the Graduate School. The program thus planned shall be recorded in writing for subsequent transmission to the supervisory committee of the candidate. Ordinarily the supervising professor should be appointed before the beginning of the fourth semester of graduate work."
- (6) "At least eight months before the degree is conferred, the candidate must pass satisfactorily comprehensive general examinations (termed major and minor examinations on page 22 of the Bulletin of the Craduate School) covering his major and minor fields and including accounting, statistics, economic history, economic terms, and at least two other divisions of business administration. The general examinations are to be administered by the supervisory committee of the candidate, and, oral and partly written. The results of the general examinations shall be certified promptly to the Dean of the Graduate School. A candidate failing to pass the general examinations will not be eligible for reexamination until specific permission has been granted by his supervisory committee."

APPOINTMENT OF JAMES G. UMSTATTD AS PROFESSOR OF SECONDARY ED-UCATION.--Mr. Calhoun presented again at this time his recommendation that Mr. James G. Umstattd be appointed as Professor of Secondary Education in the Department of the Art of Teaching, of the School of Education, and a Member of the Graduate Faculty, at a salary of \$5,000 for the Long Session, effective September 15, 1938. On motion of Major Parten, seconded by Mr. Stark, this recommendation was approved.

INTERCOLLEGIATE ATPLETICS PLANT IMPROVEMENTS. -- Major Parten reported that the Athletic Committee of the Board had approved the recommendations submitted by the Athletic Council in their letter of March 4 meeting of the Board held on March 5, 1938. The Secretary was instructed to Athletic Council of this approval. The recommendations of low:

l. That a sum up to \$4,500 be appropriated from Athletic Department funds to provide for the conversion of the now vacant building adjacent to the Oak Grove Dormitory into a dormitory to house twenty-

Of this sum, it is estimated that up to \$3,000 will be required al will be required to provide furnishings.

We understand that the building in question has been unused since the University acquired the property several years ago. We believe that the structure can be utilized to excellent advantage as a dormitory to be administered and operated along the same general lines as the Oak

Should the project be approved, it is proposed to provide housing in the building for twenty-two freshman athletes and one assistant served in this building but in the adjacent Oak Grove Dormitory, which is already equipped for this purpose. The Director of Athletics reports his program for the next school year. Not only would it provide comfortable and inexpensive living quarters, but it would render possible its of this group of freshman boys.

2. That a sum up to \$4,500 be appropriated from Athletic De-

partment funds to provide for the construction of a dressing room for visiting athletic teams. It is proposed that such a room equipped with proper toilet and shower facilities be constructed under the South end of the East Stadium stands. The room would, of course, be available for visiting teams in all sports. This improvement has been particularly needed for some time. At present no adequate dressing room facilities are available for visiting teams, it being necessary for them to store their belongings and to dress at various places on the campus and at local hotels.

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3. That a sum up to \$4,400 be appropriated from Athletic Department funds to provide for the construction of a lecture and moving picture room. It is proposed that this room be constructed at the south end of the present locker room, located under the west stands of the Stadium. A room of some sort to be used for this purpose is essential. During the past year, a portion of the present locker room space was cleared and thus utilized. The arrangement, however, was definitely not satisfactory as it involves entirely too much crowding, as well as storage difficulties, in already restricted space.

The Board of Regents adjourned at 5:45 p.m., to meet next at the call of the Chairman.

Mineral Lease Sale. -- Dr. Morgan presented the recommendation of the Land Committee that the Board of Regents, in turn, recommend to the Board for Lease of University Lands that certain tracts in northerm Crockett County be offered for sale of mineral leases at the next auction sale of the Board for Lease of University Lands. Dr. Morgan stated that a prospective bidder on these tracts has offered to bid a minimum of five dollars per acre on a four-section tract and will bid on additional nearby tracts. The minimum bid will include also an obligation other fifteen for sale. The minimum bid will include also an obligation to start a well within two years, the well to be drilled to a depth of to start a well within two years, the well to be drilled to a depth of 8,500 feet unless oil or gas in paying quantities is found at a lesser depth. Upon motion of Mr. Stark, the Board of Regents voted to approve this recommendation to the Board for Lease of University Lands.

CHANGE IN THE REQUIRED MINC: SUBJECTS OF MAJORS IN ENGLISH FOR THE BACHELOR OF ARTS DEGREE. Change the Catalogue of the College of Arts and Sciences for 1935-36 and 1922-37 With Are recements for 1937-38 and 1938-39 (Bulletin No. 3717) on page 32 under "2. English Group" to read as follows:

MAJOR SUBJECT: Eighteen semester hours of advanced courses in English, six semester yours of which must be in senior work.

MINOR SUBJECT: (a) Six semester hours in history; and (b) six semester hours of advanced courses in foreign language (either

ancient or modern), or six semester hours of advanced courses in any social science (anthropology, economics, government, history, philosophy, psychology, or sociology).

CIFT TO THE UNIVERSITY. -- Through the courtesy of Mr. Jay Walker, Vice-President of the National Tank Company, Tulsa, Oklahoma, the University has recently received the following equipment: two5x8 Ft. Pressure Tanks; one Oil and Gas Separator; one Lox Fittings; one 8 Ft. Stairs (150 Lys.); one 12 Ft. Section Walk for Tanks; and three Bundles Angle Irons. The tanks were made up especially for our purposes. They are of miniature size and completely equipped with necessary stairs, walk, valves, etc. The equipment will be erected on our "petroleum" lot east of the Engineering Building and will provide a very valuable addition to our instructional facilities, by teaching the students some of the principles of oil and gas separation, sacring of oil and the strapping of tanks. I recommend the this gift be accepted and that the thanks of the Board be expressed to the donor.

MEMOFIAL MUSEUM-W.P.A. PROJECT. -- On March 5 approval was given to a project for collecting vertebrate fossils in Dickens County. This project is now under way and is progressing satsifactorily. I hereby recommend a second project of this kind for Henderson County, as follows:

INSURANCE ON RARE BOOK COLLECTIONS. -- Mr. Calhoun reported that in previous years fire insurance has been carried on the rare book collections of the Library. He stated that now that the collections are housed in the new building, which is almost completely fire proof, and replaced in case of loss by fire even if insurance were carried, he recommended that this insurance not be renewed at the expiration of the Board on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Dr. Aynesworth.

PAYMENT TO SEALY AND SMITH FOUNDATION.—Mr. Calhoun reminded the Board that at the meeting held on June 6, 1936 (Minutes, page 230) tion with respect to furnishing additional funds for the completion of the Negro Hospital. This agreement provided that within two years the University would "provide a sum of \$20,000 for the purpose of paying for Medical Department of The University of Texas, at Calveston, as may be that the University Comptroller be authorized to pay this \$20,000 to the mendation was approved by the Board on motion of Major Parten, seconded by Mr. Waggener.

RENEWAL OF JOHN SEALY HOSPITAL LEASE TO CITY OF GALVESTON. -to the City of Galveston on October 7, 1889. He stated that this lease
was renewed on May 9, 1913 for a period of twenty-five years and that the

second lease is therefore nearing its expiration. He presented a form of lease to be entered into between the City of Galveston and the Board of Regents of the University, renewing the lease for a period of twenty-five years beginning May 1, 1938. Dr. Randall stated that the lease is in the same form as that which is expiring except that the new lease provides for a payment by the City of Galveston of \$1,500 per year for insurance premiums on the property instead of the \$1,300 per year provided by the present lease. The lease had already been executed by the City of Galveston, and there was attached a copy of an ordinance authorizing the execution of the lease. On the recommendation of the Medical Branch Committee of the Board and on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Major Parten, the Board of Regents voted to approve the new lease and to authorize the Chairman to execute it in the name of the Board.

DEED TO SEALY AND SMITH HOSPITAL PROPERTIES. -- Dr. Randall presented a deed executed by the Sealy and Smith Foundation for the John Sealy Hospital to the State of Texas for the use and benefit of The University of Texas to Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, and 14, in Elock 608 and Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7, in Block 548, together with the improvements thereon. This includes the Out-Patient Clinic, the new Children's Hospital, and the new Nurses' Home. Dr. Randall stated that the property transferred by the deed represented an investment of approximately \$1,250,000. At the suggestion of Mr. Stark, acceptance of the gift was postponed until the matter could be discussed and fully understood.

PROPOSED CONTRACT BETWEEN THE DIVISION OF EXTENSION AND MR. C. P. BREWER.—On the recommendation of Mr. Calhoun and on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Dr. Morgan, the Board voted to refer to the President and the Executive Committee of the Board for action a proposed contract between the Division of Extension of the University and Mr. C. P. Brewer.

VISITING COLMITTEE, McDONALD OBSERVATORY.--Dr. Randall recommended that Mr. Stark be added to the membership of the Visiting Committee for the McDonald Observatory appointed by the Board on January 8, 1938. On motion of Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild, the Board voted to appoint Mr. Stark as a member of the committee.

LEGISLATIVE REQUIRE ENT FOR THE TEACHING OF GOVERNMENT. -- Cn the recommendation of the President and on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Dr. Aynesworth, the Board voted to refer the matter of the Legislative requirement for the teaching of Government to its Legislative Committee for study and recommendation.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT. -- Mr. Waggener presented the following report for the Finance Committee covering bonds purchased for the University Permanen+ Fund since the report made on March 26. On motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Major Parten, the Board voted to ratify the actions of its Finance Committee.

BIENNIAL APPROPRIATION REQUESTS. -- Mr. Calhoun reported that his recommendations to the Board for requests of Legislative appropriations for the University for the Biennium of 1939-1941 had been completed. He reminded the Board of its action on March 26 (Minutes, page 312) concerning the basis of the appropriation requests. At that meeting the Foard had indicated its desire to join the other State Educational Institutions in Texas in a request for Legislative appropriations for the 1939-1941 Biennium based on allowances of \$175 per full-time, lower-level student, \$225 for upper-level students, and \$25 additional for technical students. This is the same basis which was used for the computation of the 1937-1939 appropriations. Mr. Calhoun reported that at a meeting held in Dallas on April 1 the Council of Presidents of the State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education in Texas had joined in recommending this basis for the requests for Legislative appropriations to be made for the 1939-1941 Biennium. In computing the number of full-time students, the Council of Presidents recommended that the average active semester hours registered for the fall semester of the 1937-38 Long Session be multiplied by two as a basis for determining the registrations for the 1957-36 Long Session. To this amount the Council recommended adding the average active semester hours registered during the Summer Session of 1937 and then dividing the total by thirty to reduce to full-time students.

Mr. Calhoun reported that this basis would permit the University to request \$2,005,295 for the Main University for each year of the 1939-1941 Biennium. He stated that the total requests for the Main University as approved by the Deans and other administrative officers and the President amounted to slightly over \$2,700,000. He recommended that the Board request \$2,005,295 of this amount from Legislative appropriations and stated that the emount of fees and other local incomes available would approximately take care of the remainder of the approved de-

Mr. Celhoun reported that in preparing the requests to be submitted to the State Board of Control a fair number of new positions needed in the various departments had been included but that the amount included in the requests for tutors and assistants was the same as that appropriated for the present Biennium and that the amounts for maintenance and equipment, physical plant operation, and Summer Session were materially below the amounts expended for these purposes during 1936-37 and budgeted for 1957-38. He said that the remainder of the required amounts for these items would have to be met from fees and other local

Mr. Calhoun called attention to the considerable increase in the request for the Conservation Division and for the Division of Research. The chief item of increase in the Division of Research was for the University Research Foundation, for which he recommended the Board request appropriations of \$380,000 to cover the following items:

Mr. Calhoun called attention to the fact that his recommendations included changing the Deans of the various Colleges and Schools from nine months service and salary as at present to eleven months.

After study and discussion of the recommendations, the Eoard approved the recommendations of Mr. Calhoun on motion of Major Parten, seconded by Mr. Stark, and authorized their submission to the State Board of Control.

On motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Dr. Morgan, the Legislative Committee of the Board and the President were authorized to request, at the proper time, salaries of 7,500 for the Distinguished Professorships instead of \$6,500 as provided for this Biennium.

PAYMENTS ON OPERATING EXPENSES OF MCDONALD OBSERVATORY. -- Mr. Calhoun reminded the Board that the agreement between The University of Texas and The University of Chicago for the operation of the McDonald Ob-

servatory provides for the payment of \$10,000 per year by The University of Texas toward the operating expenses of the Observatory. He recalled that the Board had authorized these payments for the calendar year 1937, the payments to be made \$2,500 per quarter at the end of each quarter. He recommended that the Board authorize future payments of \$2,500 per quarter payable at the end of each quarter, this authorization to include a payment for the quarter ended March 31, 1938, and to continue until further notice. The Board approved this recommendation on motion of Mr. Stark.

PROGRESS OF McDONALD GESERVATORY TELESCOPE. -- Mr. Calhoun read a letter which he had just received from Dr. Ctto Struve, Director of the McDonald Observatory, and a copy of a letter which Dr. Struve had written to Mr. Stilwell, President of the Warner and Swasey Company. Dr. pletion of the lens for the telescope. He made several proposals to Mr. Stilwell, one of which was as follows:

"Continuation of the work, with the help of your three optical assistants and under the close scrutiny of Dr. Plaskett and of our group of astronomers. This plan appeals to me more than the others, because we know better than any outsider what shape of mirror we require for the completed will guarantee the maximum of efficiency. If you should wish to hire a competent optician without taking on outsiders, I should be shilly as an optical expert I have full confidence. In addition I members of our staff."

After some discussion, the Board voted, on motion of Mr. Stark seconded by Senator Blackert, to authorize the President to write a letter to the Warner and Swasey Company, stating that the Board of Regents joined Dr. Struve in the recommendation quoted just above.

UNIVERSITY DEVELOPMENT BOARD. -- Lr. Calhoun reported that all of the members of the University Development Board have been appointed and have accepted their appointments with the exception of one of the Ex-Student members. He discussed the need and desirability for an early the Board expressed its opinion that a meeting of the Development Board should be held as soon as possible.

MEDICAL BRANCH DEAN. -- On the recommendation of Dr. Aynesworth and on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Major Parten, the Board authorized its Medical Branch Committee or such members of the committee as necessary and desirable, in an effort to find a person to become Dean of the Medical Branch of the University, effective next September 1.

TEXAS INDUSTRIAL AND COMMERCIAL RESEARCH COUNCIL. -- Mr. Calhoun presented a proposal from the Bureau of Business Research, the Bureau of Economic Geology, the Bureau of Engineering Research, and the Bureau of Industrial Chemistry that an association to be known as the Texas Industrial and Commercial Research Council of The University of Texas be pose of the Council would be to serve as a clearing house between the State-wide nature. On the recommendation of Mr. Calhoun and on motion creation of such a Council.

On motion of Mr. Waggener, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild, the Committee to counsel with the Texas Industrial and Research Council and Stark, and Parten.

On motion of Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by Mr. Waggener, the Board authorized the President and the Special Research Council Committee this program.

COTTON LABORATORY .-- Mr. Celhoun reported that the United States

Government is proposing to establish four research laboratories in the South for the study of additional uses to be made of cotton. He stated that it is essential that the laboratories be located where they will be convenient to good departments of organic chemistry and that the University, therefore, is a logical location for one of them. On motion of Major Parten, seconded by Dr. Morgan, the President was authorized to take such steps as he may deem desirable to secure one of the laboratories for the University. This authorization included approval of a trip to be made by Mr. Calhoun to Washington, D.C., or by a representative to be sent by him, if such a trip appears desirable.

LETTER TO EX-STUDENTS. --Mr. Calhoun reported that in accordance with a proposal which he had made to the members of the Board in a letter some time ago he had prepared a letter to be sent to the Ex-Students of the University, setting forth some of the plans and needs of the University. On motion of Dr. Morgan, seconded by Major Parten, the Board authorized Mr. Calhoun tp send this letter.

BROWN SCHOLARSHIP FUND. --Mr. Calhoun reported for the information of the Board that one of the bequests in the will of the Kary E. Brown (Mrs. R. L. Brown), of Austin, who died some years ago, was for \$10,000 to establish the "Brown Scholarship Fund" at the University, to be used "for the purpose of establishing scholarships for deserving and impecunious students." Mr. Calhoun said that the estate is now in process of liquidation and reported the receipt of a first payment of \$1,500 toward the bequest. The following is a quotation from the will concerning this scholarship fund:

"I direct that this money shall be paid over to the Board of Regents of the University of Texas, or such other agency as the State of Texas may establish for the purpose of handling funds of this character, with the request and direction that the principal be kept intact, and that the interest only shall be used in maintaining the scholarships in question. I will and direct that the President of the University of Texas shall control the selection of the beneficiaries of this provision of my will and that the manner of their selection be left entirely to him. I further will and direct that each beneficiary shall execute his or her note for amounts received under this section of my will, bearing five per cent per annum interest, and that such of these obligations as are paid by said beneficiaries shall not become a part of the principal fund, but shall be again used as before in assisting deserving and impecunious students of said University."

ROUTINE ITEMS, COLLEGE OF MINES AND METALLURGY. -- Dr. Morgan pre sented President Wiggin's docket, dated April 27, for the College of Mines Committee re-Mines and Metallurgy and reported that the College of Mines Committee recommended the approval of these items. The Board approved this recommendation on motion of Major Parten, seconded by Mr. Stark. The docket follows:

OUT-OF-STATE TRIP. -- I recommend that the following out-of-state trip be approved:

Dr. L. A. Welson, Associate Professor of Geology, to leave the state May 10 to 15 to accompany students on a geology field trip to the nearby mining districts of New Mexico, his traveling expenses to be paid by the Department of Geology.

ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATIONS. -- I recommend that the following additional appropriations for 1937-38 be made:

- 1. Appropriate \$30 from the Unappropriated Balance to the Departme of Biological Sciences.
- 2. Appropriate \$98.40 from the Unappropriated Balance to Official Publications.
- 3. Appropriate \$200 from the Unappropriated Balance to the Department of Publicity.

LIBRARY BUILDING -- CHANGE ORDERS .-- I recommend approval of the

following change orders in connection with the construction of the Library and Administration Building of the College of Mines.

- 1. Ceiling fans were omitted in the original specifications.
- 2. The style and type of hardware which was deemed suitable for the building could not be purchased for the amount set aside in the
- 3. The design for electrical fixtures was changed considerably at an additional cost of \$128.94.

The additional cost for these three changes amounts to \$379.03. This amount is to be used from an amount of \$4,259.38, which remains in the Library Building and Construction Fund.

FEES FOR APPLIED MUSIC. -- Dean E. W. Doty, of the College of Fine Arts, was invited before the Board to discuss the question of fees for Applied Music. He pointed out that if the fees for students in Applied Music were limited to the amounts now paid by students in other Colleges and Schools of the University, individual instruction in Applied Eusic would be practically impossible. In enswer to questions from members of the Board, Dean Doty stated that his recommendation would be, if it is legal to charge such fees, that the fees for Applied Music vary, according to the experience and standing of the teacher, from \$20 or \$25 to about 375 per semester. After some discussion, the President was instructed to investigate, the question further and especially to see whether special fees could be charged under the present statutes. (See correction,

Dean Doty then withdrew.

NAME OF LIBRARY COLLECTIONS AND OF NEW BUILDING .-- Dr. Aynesworth proposed that the various library collections of the University, including the main library and the departmental and special libraries, be named The Mirabeau E. Lamar Library of The University of Texas. There was some discussion of this and of a name for the new building, which has been called Library-Main Building and various other names. On motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Major Parten, the Board voted to name the library collections of the University The Mirabeau B. Lamar Library of The University Of Texas and to name the building The Main Building. The Main Building will include the original unit built in 1932 as well as the tower and the front unit of the building.

ADDITIONAL FUBLIC WORKS ADMINISTRATION FUNDS. -- Mr. Calhoun reported that there appeared to be some possibility that additional Public Works Administration funds may be made available in the near future and proposed that if additional funds are made svailable the University push its applications for an additional dormitory and for additional Museum funds. On motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild, the Board authorized Mr. Calhoun to call on the various Federal agencies to see if he can discover definitely whether additional funds will be available and on what terms they will be available and then to report these findings to the Board. The motion included authorization also for such members of the Medical Branch Committee as may be in or near Washington to investi-

ELIGIBILITY FOR EXTRA-CURRICULAR HONORS AND ACTIVITIES. -- Mr. Stark proposed that the Foard take action setting forth and standardizing the eligibility requirements for all participants in all extra-curricular honors and activities at the Main University. On motion of Major Parten, seconded by Mr. Stark, the Board referred this proposal to Mr. Calhoun for study and a report at the Galveston meeting.

LAND COMMITTEE MATTERS .-- On motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Major Parten, the Board gave its unanimous consent for the consideration of the following Land Committee matters.

Boundary Controversy .-- Dr. Morgan reported for the Land Committee that a question has erisen with representatives of the McKenzie Estate concerning the south boundary line of University Blocks 17 and 18 in Pecos County. A total of approximately 3,600 acres is involved, and Mr. J. H. Walker, University Land Officer, is afraid the University will lose the entire amount if the matter is taken into court. Dr. Morgan believed the matter could be negotieted with less loss to the University than this. On the recommendation of the Land Committee and on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Dr. Aynesworth, the Board voted to authorize Mr. Walker and Mr. Scott Gaines, Attorney for University Lands, to negotiate for a settlement of this matter and then report to the Board.

Easement No. 98, Shell Pipe Line Corporation. -- Dr. Morgen presented a request from the Shell Pipe Line Corporation for a pipe-line easement across portions of Sections 31 and 32, Block 16, Pecos County, Texas. The easement provided for a right-of-way 360 rods in length at the usual consideration of 25¢ a, rod, or a total consideration of \$90, and was prepared on the University's printed forms. The easement was for a period of ten years beginning May 1, 1938. Mr. E. J. Compton, University Land Agent, had examined the easement form and recommended it to the Board for approval. On the recommendation of the Land Committee and on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Mr. Waggener, the Board voted to approve the easement.

ROUTINE ITEMS, COLLEGE OF MINES AND RETALLURGY .-- On motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Major Parten, the Board gave its unenimous consent to the consideration of certain routine items for the College of Mines and Metallurgy.

Dr. Morgan presented the following recommendations from President Wiggins with the recommendation of the College of Mines Committee that these items be approved. The Board voted, on motion of Mr. Stark seconded by Major Parten, to approve the recommendations of President Wiggins.

Additional Appropriation .-- I recommend that \$4,000 be appropriated from the Unappropriated Balance to the Library and Administration Building account, this amount to be used in connection with dismentling, transferring, and erecting stacks secured from The University of Texas; materials for steam line from the Power House to the Library Building; and other miscellaneous items in connection with the completion of, and moving into, the building.

Library Building -- Change Order .- I recommend the approval of a change order in connection with the construction of the Library and Administration Building of the College of Mines to provide additional, acoustical plaster on the south and east walls of the band room. Mrs. Fairchild and Centlemen:

In meeting on May 12 last year this committee was constituted to secure information and recommendations concerning the selection of a permanent President for the University.

On May 31 following, the Board took action to create two advisory committees to assist this committee-one from the Ex-Students and distinguished citizens and the other from the Faculty. Pursuant to this action Mr. Hulon Black, Governor Dan Moody, General Robert Lee Bobbitt, one committee. Eleven faculty members were elected by the General Faculty of the University, under the chairmanship of Dean H. T. Parlin, to fessors F. C. Ayer, E. C. Barker, A. P. Brosan, J. A. Burdine, W. S. Cartryant Smith, and W. R. Woolrich.

The members of these advisory committees were named shortly after their authorization, and since that time several meetings of each of the advisory committees have been had with the committee of the Board. These committees have rendered your committee much service. They have extremely helpful in the volume of work that has been done.

Of course your committee has availed itself of the wise counsel of President Calhoun. In fact, constant touch has been maintained with him in this work, and grateful acknowledgment is here made for his helpful suggestions, heartening encouragement, and splendid cooperation.

Of course many recommendations and suggestions have come to your committee, most of which have been in writing. Your committee for given even weight so far as considerations and suggestions should mendations and suggestions received by the committee have been carefully studied and discussed.

in necessary determination of a conception of a long-range program for

the University, so vital and necessary before the choice of an executive leader. Deficiencies of our University have likewise been discussed and sought out as a requisite to the determination of the qualifications of the executive leader sought. These studies were necessarily preliminary to determination of some of the qualifications of the man for whom we were looking. After much time was devoted to these subjects, it was felt that differentiation between the powers and qualities of the men were capable of being made.

The first seven months of your committee's studies were devoted largely to the study of correspondence. A total of about 120 men have been recommended from one source or another for consideration. Some of these recommendations were purely voluntary; others were the result of solicitations addressed by the chairman to prominent university president and deens and educational foundation executives. From these sources have come several hundred letters, some containing recommendations, some containing merely advice and suggestions. Responses to inquiries have been very heartening, as all have shown a great desire to be helpful to The University of Texas. Many responses have been very complimentary in their nature, emphasizing the great importance of the selection under consideration and forecasting a future of substantial expectancy for the great educational leader among universities in the Southwest.

After many months of correspondence, study, and consultation, which amounted to almost weekly meetings of your committee, it was decided to ask the Eoard for its permission to travel. This travel was for a three-fold purpose: first, to study other first-rate institutions for comparison with our own; second, to sek the advice of prominent educators and wise counselors on our problem; and, third, to interview some of the more prominent-looking prospects in the opinion of the three committees from the general list of about 120 names.

Pursuant to Board authority, last February the committee traveled through the Southeast, the East, and the Middle West, visiting several institutions of prominence and educational foundations, where about forty-five distinguished people were met and consulted with on our problem. On this trip people were talked to with no suggestion of an invitation. All alike were approached from the standpoint of gaining suggestion. FUND UNDER JOINT CONTROL OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVER-SITY OF TEXAS AND THE SEALY AND SMITH FOUNDATION FOR THE JOHN SEALY HOS-PITAL. -- I recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

THEREAS among the securities held for the \$700,000.00 Fund under the joint control of the Sealy and Smith Foundation for the John Seely Hospital and the Board of Regents of The University of Texes, there are held certificates of the Guaranty Building and Loan Company of Galveston, Texas, of the par value of \$5,000.00, and

WHEREAS under a plan of reorganization approved by the shareholders of the company and by the Department of Eanking of the State of Texas, a new company to be called the Guaranty Federal Savings and Loan Association has been formed to take over 60% of the assets of the company against which insured shares are to be issued, the remaining 40% of the assets to be held for liquidation by the existing company, and

Whereas this refunding plan has been approved by approximately 97% of the shareholders of the existing company, and

WHEREAS the Sealy and Smith Foundation for the John Sealy Mospital is agreeable to the plan of reorganization and has recommended that) the certificates held in the seid joint fund be exchanged as Provided in said plan,

NOW, THEREFORE PE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas that it hereby concurs in the recommendation that the seid \$5,000.00 par value certificates of the Cuaranty Building and Loan Company of Galveston, Texas, be exchanged under the terms set out in the refunding plan applicable thereto, and it hereby authorizes the Sealy and Smith Foundation for the John Sealy Hospital to take the steps necessary in making said

HULES AND REGULATIONS FOR UNIVERSITY DORMITORIES. -- I recommend that the language under the heading "Long Session Deposits" in the handbook on <u>Information and Regulations-University Dormitories for Men, and for Women as adopted by the Regents on May 31, 1937 be changed to the</u>

LONG SESSION

The Long Session consists of two semesters. The first semester begins September ___ and ends January __. The second semester begins February __ and ends June __.

A deposit of ten dollars (\$10.00) is required to reserve a room for the Long Session. This is held to guarantee that the student will occupy the room for the Long Session and to cover possible damage and breakage charges. Provided notice of intention to move is given in writing on or before January 20, students will be permitted to move with a forfeit of the \$10.00 deposit plus charges assessed for breakage at the end of the first semester. Moving at other times is subject to the penalties designated in the Handbook for the Guidance of Students.

The right to occupy a room in a University dormitory is not transferable, so that it is not possible for any student to hold a room for another, or for a resident to provide a substitute to fill for her (him) an unexpired term. If the name of an occupent does not appear on the room record in the social director's (resident director of men's dormitories) office, no

This deposit is refunded if notice of cancellation or with-

drawal from the waiting list is received on or before September 1. It is also refunded less damage and breakage charges if the student is officially requested to withdraw from the University or when the student leaves the dormitory at the close of the Long Session. Persons leaving or placing their names on the waiting list of a University domnitory after September 1 forfeit their deposit if a room is offered and not accepted after this date. Damage to buildings or furniture will be charged against this deposit as long as it, is sufficient and available, deducted from funds already paid, or charged directly to the student as in the case of burns caused by smoking, which charges are not taken from the deposit, but collected from the student as soon as the damage is estimated. If deposits become reduced 50% or more because of charges made for damage, this deposit must be built up to 10.00 upon request.

Failure to reply to a room assignment within 15 days will be interpreted as a cancellation and the room deposit will automatically be returned. An incoming student reserving a room in a University dormitory for the second semester forfeits her (his) deposit if she (he) withdraws after January 25. Residents living in University dormitories during any Long Session may have the opportunity of selecting their rooms for the next Long Session ahead of other applicants by making application on or before April 1 on forms provided, and for the ensuing summer term if they make application on or before Earch 10.

ELICIBILITY FOR EXTRA-CURRICULAR HONORS and ACTIVITIES. -- I recommend that the following be adopted and added to Section A, Part III, Student Life, of Part V: General Information of the University Catalogue

SPECIAL HONORARY AND REPRESENTATIVE POSITIONS. In order to insure proper representation of the student body of The University of Texas, it is required that all holders of honorary or representative positions in which they have been placed by official appointment or election shall qualify under the rules for "official extra-curricular activities" (General Information Bulletin). Such positions as Sweetheart of Texas, Relay Queen, and official representatives sent to extremural conventions of student government, etc., are included under this regulation.

BUDGET FOR 1938-39. -- In connection with the consideration of the University budget for 1938-39, Mr. Calhoun requested that the Board permit a committee representing the Y.M.C.A. and the Y.W.C.A. to appear before them. On motion of Major Parten, seconded by Mr. Stark, the Board voted to hear this committee. Dean T. H. Shelby, Miss Selma Streit, and Mir. Harris Brush then appeared before the Board, and Dean Shelby spoke for the committee. He told briefly of the activities of the Y.M.C.A. and the Y.W.C.A. in connection with student employment, informal personnel service, freshman orientation, and religion and higher education. The committee requested that, because of the services which these groups render, the Board continue to give assistance to them in the amount of \$1,600 to the Y.M.C.A. and \$800 to the Y.W.C.A. After a brief discussion, the committee withdrew. Mr. Stark moved that whatever amount is allowed in the University budget for assistance to the Y.M.C.A. and the Y.W.C.A., an equal amount be provided for the Catholic students and an equal amount for the Jewish students in the University. No action was taken on the motion or on the committee's request at this time.

Mr. Calhoun then presented his recommendations for the budget for 1938-39, which had been mailed to the Eoard about a week before. He explained that the recommendations were not materially different from the 1937-38 budget, since the income available for the two years of the 1937-1939 Biennium had been estimated last summer and approximately one half of the total allotted to each of the two years. He stated that his recommendations did not carry additional salary promotions for the staff over those provided in the 1937-38 budget with the exception of a few instances in the low-salaried bracket.

Mr. Calhoun asked permission to include among his recommendations for the Department of Music in the College of Fine Arts (page 36) the appointment of Mr. Chase Beromeo es Professor of Voice at a salary of \$4,000 for nine months.

Semuel Williston be appointed as Professor of Law for the Second Semester of the Long Session of 1938-39 and stated that this appointment is for 1938-39 only.

At the request of Doctors Aynesworth and Randall and on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Dr. Morgan, the Board voted to postpone for later consideration the President's recommendations for the University Health Service budget (page 10). The motion referred these recommendations to the Medical Committee of the Board for further study and recommendations to the Board.

On motion of Dr. Aymesworth, seconded by Mr. Stark, the Board voted to make the salary of Professor J. E. Pearce, in the Department of Anthropology, \$4,500 for nine months in lieu of the \$4,100 recommended by Mr. Calhoun.

Mr. Stark called attention to the recommendations for the Student Employment Eureau on page 11 and stated that additional assistance would be required for the work of this Bureau. On motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Dr. Morgan, the Board voted to appropriate an additional Employment Eureau for the Maintenance and Equipment account of the Student penses of Mr. Nowotny in the supervision of student employment and to appropriate the sum of \$500 to an account for Clerical Assistants in that Eureau. Senator Blackert asked to be recorded as voting "No" on

With the changes set forth just above and with the omission of the University Health Service budget, the Board then voted, on motion of Major Parten seconded by Mr. Stark, to approve the budget for the Main University and the Extremural Divisions for 1958-39 as recommended by Mr. Calhoun (pages 1-54, inclusive).

The Board recessed at one o'clock and were guests for lunch at the John Sealy Hospital. The session was resumed at 2:20 with the same attendance as at the morning session.

CHANGE IN RULES AND REGULATIONS. -- Dr. Aynesworth celled attention to the provision in the Regents Rules and Regulations concerning the appointment of relatives and referred specifically to Paragraph c, of Section 2, Chapter I, Page 15, reading as follows:

"c. At the Main University or at the Medical Branch, no person any relative of whom occupies a position of the rank of Instructor or higher (full- or part-time), shall be initially appointed even temporarily to the position of Instructor or higher, or to any position if the relationship is within the first degree of affinity or the second degree of consanguinity; Medical Branch, the same rule shall apply reading Assistant Professor for the rank of the staff member."

After some discussion, the Board voted, on motion of Dr. Aynesworth seconded by Mr. Stark, to change the last clause to read as follows. (The changed portion of the rule is underscored.)

"...if one position be at the Main University and the other at the Medical Branch, the rule shall apply only to those cases where the relationship is within the first degree of either affinity

EUDGET FOR 1938-39 (Continued). -- The Board took up for consideration the recommendations of the President for the 1938-39 budget Rules and Regulations concerning appointment of relatives, Mr. Calhoun of Practice of Ledicine at a salary of \$4,000 for twelve months. He pre-College of Nursing.

1. Delete the name of Miss Pauline Wylie as Instructor in

Nursing. Miss Wylie has presented her resignation, effective August 31, 1938.

- 2. Appoint Miss Selma Moody as Instructor in Nursing and Second Assistant to the Director of the College of Nursing at a salary of 51.500 for twelve months.
- 3. Appoint Miss Leola Horton as Instructor in Nursing for the month of September, 1938, at a salary rate of \$1,350 for twelve months.
- 4. Appoint Miss Lillie Walther as Instructor in Nursing for the period October 1, 1938-August 31, 1939 at a salary rate of \$1,350 for twelve months. Miss Walther cannot report until October 1, and Miss Horton is to fill the place for the month of September.

With Major Parten presiding, the Eoard voted, on motion of Dr. Randell seconded by Mr. Stark, to withdraw the appointment of Dr. Charles H. Taft, Jr. as Associate Professor of Pharmacology at a salary of \$3,000 for twelve months. Dr. Randell stated that a recommendation concerning this appointment would be presented to the Board later.

With the changes above set forth, the Board voted, on motion of Dr. Aynesworth seconded by Mr. Waggener, to approve the recommendations of the President for the 1938-39 budget for the Medical Branch of the University (pages 55-64, inclusive). (See pages 376-383.)

On motion of Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by Senator Elackert, the Foard voted to authorize its Medical Branch Committee to make recommendations to the Board for the position of Dean of the Medical Branch or for the position of Dean of the Medical Branch and Professor of Preventive Medicine.

On motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild, the Board approved the recommendations of Mr. Calhoun for the University Available Fund budget for 1938-39 (pages 65-68, inclusive). (See pages 383-386.)

Mr. Calhoun called attention to his recommendations for intercollegiate Athletics (page 70) and stated that the recommendations for Coaches Cherry and Gilstrap provided for full-time services from September 1 to May 31 and one-fourth-time services during the three summer months. Their salaries for the one-fourth-time services are to be at the months. Their salaries for the one-fourth-time services are to be at the rate of \$100 a month. Mr. Calhoun stated that this provision is in accordance with the recommendations of the Intercollegiate Athletic Council. On the recommendation of the Athletic Committee of the Poard and on motion of Dr. Morgan, seconded by Mr. Waggener, the Board voted to approve this basis for Coaches Cherry and Gilstrap. On motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Dr. Morgan, the Board then voted to approve the restark, seconded by Dr. Morgan, the Board then voted to approve the recommendations of Mr. Calhoun for the Auxiliary Enterprises and Activities commendations of Mr. Calhoun for the Auxiliary Enterprises and Activities of the University for 1938-39 (pages 69-84, inclusive).

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PROPOSAL FOR TRAINING OF SOCIAL WORKERS.--Dr. Randall reported that he had had a conference with Mr. Claude Teer, Chairman of the State Eoard of Control, in which Mr. Teer requested that the University attempt to provide training for social workers to fill this type of position in the State of Texas. LEAVE OF ABSENCE, 1937-38.--Dr. Randall reported that Miss Dorothy J. Miss MacLeod's regular value approved by Miss Dore Mathis, Director of the John Sealy College of Nursiteff are paid on a twelve-months' basis but their services are largely out loss of pay. PROWN SCHOLARSHIP FUND. --Mr. Waggener presented the following report for the Finance Committee concerning the Brown Scholarship Fund. on motion of Dr. Morgan, seconded by Mr. Stark.

Your Finance Committee has had under consideration a proposal made by the executors of the estate of the late Mrs. R. L. Brown of Austin, Texas, to turn over to The University of Texas certain mortgage note belonging to the estate to apply on the unpaid balance due The University arship Fund" and also a proposal for the creation of the "Brown Scholto this fund. The bequest of Mrs. Brown to The University of Texas for the establishment of this scholarship fund was one of a large number of bequests contained in her will. The will specified that the bequests cequest to the University was next to the last in this list.

Recently payments in cash have been received emounting to 53,600.00. Er. R. L. Slaughter and Er. G. F. Zimmermann, who conduct a business as partners under the firm name of Brown Brothers, are the executors under the will. Brown Brothers now propose to turn over to the University four mortgage notes amounting to 54,950.00 from the assets of notes beer 6% interest and will be unconditionally guaranteed as to payment of both principal and interest by the firm of Brown Brothers, who University for the benefit of the scholarship fund. The makers of the notes and the amounts are as follows:

Attached hereto is a tabulation showing a more complete description of the loans and an appraisal of the collateral by Mr. R. L. Slaughter. Mr. that the guarantee of the firm of Brown Brothers will add materially to offer is to expedite payment of the bequests to the University to the end donor and also to enable the executors to begin payments to certain reformance.

In addition to turning over the notes referred to above in part payment of the legacy, Brown Brothers have offered to sell to the Regents as investments for that portion of the fund which has been paid and will be paid in cash, mortgage loans on Austin homes to net the University 5%, such loans being endorsed "without recourse" by Brown Brothers but subject to approval of the University as to security. In view of the present difficulty of securing attractive returns on municipal bonds, the Committee

is of the opinion that investment of this particular fund in mortgage loans would be desirable. Furthermore, such investments made through the firm of Brown Brothers would be in accord with a provision in Mrs. Brown will reading as follows:

"My business affairs have always been handled in a very satisfectory and able manner by said firm of Brown Brothers, and I recommend that all my legatees carefully consider investment of such funds as they receive by virtue of this will through the agency of said firm."

After considering the matter fully, your Committee wishes to submit the following recommendations:

- 1. That the Regents approve the acceptance of the four 65 mort gage notes totaling 34,950.00 as described, and bearing the unconditional guarantee of the firm of Brown Brothers, this firm to retain 1% for servicing the loans.
- 2. That the Regents approve the policy of investing the cash belonging to the Brown Scholarship Fund in mortgages offered by the firm of Brown Brothers to net the University 5%, such notes to be secured by Austin homes and to be approved by the University Investment Officer as to security.

EIDS ON INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS PLANT IMPROVEMENTS. -- Ar. Simmons reported that in accordance with the action of the Board on March 26, bids had been called on certain improvements to be made by the Intercollegiate Athletic Council. The bids are to be received on June 6 and will cover the Freshmen Football Dormitory, a new Locker Room on the east side of the Stadium, for visitors, and an addition to the present Locker Room on the west side of the Stadium. On the recommendation of Locker Room on the west side of the Board and on motion of Major Parten, sether Building Committee of the Board and on motion of Major Parten, seconded by Dr. Morgan, the Board authorized Mr. Simmons, as Acting Comptroller, to open the bids on June 6 and to award the contracts after receiving the recommendations of the Intercollegiate Athletic Council.

EASEMENT NO. 99, PHILLIPS PETROLEM COLPANY.--Dr. Morgan presented a request from Mr. E. J. Compton for approval of a pipe-line right-of-way to the Phillips Petroleum Company across Sections 1, 2, 3, 5, 10, and 11, Block 35, Crane and Ector Counties, and Sections 5, 3, 17, 20, and 11, Block 35, Crane and Ector County. The easement was to be 21, 28, 33, 40, and 45, Block 30, Crane County. This tender had been in accordance with the Board's action on March 5, 1938 (Minutes, page 300). MEMORIAL TABLET TO DR. J. A. UDDEN. -- Lr. Calhoun reported that a group of Swedish friends of the late Dr. J. A. Udden, formerly Director of the Bureau of Economic Geology, had expressed a desire to present to

the University a memorial tablet commemorating the services of Dr. Udden and that they would like to know whether the University would be willing to accept such a tablet. On motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Dr. Morgan the Board voted unanimously to ask Mr. Calhoun to advise these friends that the pard would accept such a tablet with sincere thanks and appreciation.

COTTON RESEARCH FOUNDATION FELLOWSHIP .-- Mr. Calhoun reported that the Mellon Institute of Industrial Research has proposed to make a grant of \$1,500 to the University, with the understanding that the University will match this amount, for the purpose of investigating some phases of industrial utilization of cotton, particularly cotton linters or off grades of lint. Under the terms of the grant, the 31,500 made available by the Mellon Institute and \$700 made available by the University would be used to provide a stipend of \$2,200 for twelve months for a post-graduate research fellowship. An additional sum of \$500 would be made available by the University for the purchase of supplies and equipment. The University would supply space for two research workers and the usual laboratory facilities and utilities, in the Chemistry Building, which would amount to a contribution of at least \$500. In addition, the University would assign an Assistant in Chemistry, a candidate for the master's degree, to this project sometime subsequent to September 15, 1938. This assistant would utilize the fellowship as a basis for his

Mr. Calhoun presented the following specific recommendations concerning the grant:

- 1. Appropriete \$700 to be added to the Mellon Institute grant of \$1,500, to provide a stipend of \$2,200 for twelve months for a postgraduate research fellowship.
- 2. Award to Mr. Eruce B. Allen, who is expected to receive the degree of Doctor of Philosophy from The University of Texas in June, 1938, the Cotton Research Foundation Fellowship at a stipend of \$2,200 for twelve months beginning July 15, 1938.
- 3. Appropriate \$300 to an account to be called "Cotton Research Meintenance and Equipment" in the Department of Chemistry budget
- 4. Authorize the Department of Chemistry to furnish space for two research workers and to furnish the usual laboratory facilities and

On motion of Major Parten, seconded by Mr. Stark, the Board voted to approve these recommendations of Mr. Calhoun.

VANGUARD THEATRE PROJECT .-- Lir. Calhoun presented a recommendation from Mr. James H. Parke, concurred in by Dean E. W. Doty, that the University request assistance from the Carnegie Foundation in subsidizing the Vanguard Theatre Group, who propose to have headquarters at The University of Texas under the auspices of our Department of Drama and to present a group of plays in Austin and over the State of Texas from September 1, 1938 to June 1, 1939. Mr. Parke reported that the Whitney Foundation had agreed to help subsidize the group. The finances as well as the policies of the group would be administered by the Department of Drama of the University. The Vanguard Theatre is a group of men and women trained in the theatre at the Yale University Department of Drema. On motion of Major Parten, seconded by Mr. Stark, the Board instructed Mr. Calhoun to look further into this proposal and if it appears to be a desirable project to take such steps as may be necessary in order to secure a foundation grant for the project.

GRADUATE WORK FOR NEGROES .-- Mr. Calhoun reported that a committee called on him a few days ago and requested the assistance of the University in securing a Legislative appropriation to care for graduate work for Texas negroes. The committee proposed that an appropriation of \$30,000 be requested for each year of the 1939-1941 Biennium, the amount to be included in the Educational Appropriation Bill and administered through the Graduate School of The University of Texas in reimbursing qualified negro graduate students for the excess in cost to them to attend graduate schools outside the State of Texas over what it would cost

them to attend a graudate school in the State of Texas. The committee asked Mr. Calhoun further if the University would sponsor a request for such an appropriation from the Legislature. There was some discussion of these proposals, but no action was taken on them at this time.

RATIFICATION OF CONTRACT WITH MR. C. P. EREWER. -- Mr. Calhoun reported that, in accordance with the action of the Board on April 30, the Executive Committee and the President had approved a contract between the Division of Extension and Mr. C. P. Brewer, engaging Mr. Brewer to conduct classes in Business Psychology and Salesmanship or Salesmanship and Personal Development. The contract covered a period from September 1, 1938 to approximately June 1, 1939 and provided that the University should receive ten per cent of the gross fees, after refunds to students with the remainder of such fees to take care of expenses and to compensate Mr. Brewer.

At 7:30 p.m. the Board adjourned, to meet next at the cell of the Chairman.

- 3. The departmental appropriations for Tutors and Assistants and for Maintenance and Equipment are contingent upon the student enrollment Not more than sixty per cent of these two items may be expended or committed before Cctober=1. Instructions concerning the remainder will be issued by that time or soon after.
- 4. All appropriations for books are included in the Library budget. Allocations to the departments for 1938-39 will be made by the Librarian on the basis of the departmental recommendations for 1938-59.
- 5. The term of appointment of members of the staff, unless otherwise specified, is subject to the provisions of Chapter I, Section 3, of the Regents Rules and Regulations for the Government of The University of Texas as adopted March 14, 1936. Austin, Texas, June 25, 1938 Meeting No. 373

The Board of Regents of The University of Texas met in regular session in the office of the President at 10% 30 a.m., Saturday, June 25, 1938, with the following present: Regents Randall (Chairman), Blackert, Fairchild, Morgan, Parten, and Waggener; President Calhoun, Comptroller Simmons, and Secretary Haynes. Absent: Regents Aynesworth, Stark, and Weinert.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES .-- On motion of Dr. Morgan, seconded by Major Parten, the Board voted to approve the minutes for the meetings of May 14, 1938 and May 30, 1938, in the form in which they had been mimeographed and distributed to the members of the Board.

CORRECTION OF MINUTES OF APRIL 30, 1938 .-- The Secretary referred to the minutes of April 30, 1938, page 6, "Fees for Applied Music," and requested permission to change the clause in the fifth line reading, "individual instruction in Applied Music would be practically impossible, to read, "it would be impossible to offer a sufficient quantity of Applied Music instruction to meet the demand." This correction was approved by the Board without objection. (See page 330.)

GIFT FROM COTTON ESTATE .-- President D. M. Wiggins, of the College of Mines and Metallurgy, and Mr. Will H. Burges, of El Paso, appeared before the Board, and President Wiggins reminded the Board that at the meeting held of September 25 he had presented a letter from Mr. Welter B. Grant, Trustee under the will of Mr. Frank B. Cotton, proposing a gift to the College of Mines and Metallurgy. President Wiggins recalled also that at that time considerable taxes were in arrears on the property and reported that since then the various bodies concerned had remitted all outstanding taxes against the property. He said that, in accordance with the action of the Board, Mr. Burges had examined the proposed gift, the deeds to the property, and other legal matters.

Mr. Burges then presented the following resolution, together with the five deeds referred to in the resolution. After Mr. Burges had read the resolution, the Board voted unanimously, on the recommendation of its College of Mines Committee and on motion of Major Parten, seconded by Senator Blackert, to accept the offer tendered by Mr. Grent, to adopt the resolution presented by Mr. Burges, and to express the sincere thanks of the Board to Mr. Grant for this gift.

WHEREAS, at this meeting of the said Board of Regents of The University of Texas there are tendered to the said Board of Regents four deeds, all from WALTER B. GRANT, as sole surviving Executor and Trustee under the Will and the Estate of FRANK E. COTTON, Deceased, all dated December 20, 1937, one of such deeds conveying certain specific properties in El Paso County, Texas, not including any lands in Block 4, Mills Map Addition to the City of El Paso; the second of such deeds similarly conveying specific properties in Hudspeth County, Texas; the third of such deeds similarly conveying specific properties in Culberson County, Texas; and the fourth being a general conveyance of all properties owned by the Estate, including eny real estate owned by said Cotton Estate or Walter B. Grant, as surviving Executor and Trustee thereof, in any of such three Counties, excepting from such general deed, however, any lands in Block 4, Mills Map Addition to the City of El Paso, El Paso County, Texas; and all of said four deeds being executed pursuant to Senate Bill #8 of the Second Called Session of the Forty-fifth Legislature of Texas, and copies of each of said four deeds being attached to this Resolution and made pert hereof for all purposes; and,

WHEREAS, the said Board of Regents finds that the taxes upon the real estate conveyed by each of said four deeds have not been paid for a period of three years prior to this date,

and that no part of such taxes has been paid during such period upon any portion of such land; FURTHER, the said lands are assessed for taxation for more than three times the amount of taxes due thereon; FURTHER, by the terms of such deeds the said lends and the proceeds thereof are applied exclusively to the use of the College of Mines and Metallurgy, as provided in said deeds, as a State owned and operated institution of higher education; FURTHER, the Commissioners Court of El Paso County, the Commissioners Court of Culberson County and the Commissioners Court of Hudspeth County, as to the lands in each of such Counties, respectively, have certified to this Board of Regents its approval of such acceptance as to the lands in each such County, respectively, and each of such Commissioners Courts has certified as to the lends in such County, respectively, that the advantages to the people from accepting the donation exceed the benefit that would be derived from the sale of said lands in such Counties, respectively, at tax sale, or under decree of court; and FURTHER, the City Council of El Paso, Texas, as to the lands situated in El Paso County, Texas, and within the limits of such City, having certified to this Board of Regents its approval of such acceptance as to such lands within such City, and having further certified that the advantages to the people from accepting the donation of the said lends within such City exceed the benefit that would be derived from the sale of said lands at tax sale, or under decree of court; and it appearing to the Board of Regents of The University of Texas that by accepting the lands described in said four deeds, as conveyed thereby, and for the purposes and on the terms and conditions set forth in such conveyances, that the charitable trust set forth in Paragraph 16 of the Will of Frank B. Cotton, Deceased, referred to in such deeds, will be carried into effect, and that the acceptance of such donation is for the best interest of The University of Texas and of the said College of Mines and

WHEREAS, the said Board of Regents finds that the condition of such land described in and donated by said deeds, the term of the donations set forth in each of said four deeds, and all other matters relating to such proposed donation, as set forth in such deeds, are such as are provided for in said Act of the Legislature, and such as this Poard of Regents are authorized to accept under such Act;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the said Board of Regents hereby accepts the said four deeds and the said lands therein described, and the donation thereby effected, for the use and benefit of the said College of Mines and Metallurgy, to be used exclusively for said College of Mines and Metallurgy, as resignated by the Grantor in such deeds, and in trust for the purposes set forth in the Will of Frank B. Cotton, deceased, and in such deeds, and to be sold at such time and under such conditions and for such amounts as in the judgment of this Board are gy. While held by this Board the lands conveyed by such deeds may be leased or rented, as to this Board seems best.

And at such meeting there is also tendered to said Board of Regents a fifth deed, also from the said WALTER B. GRANT, as such Executor and Trustee, of the same date as the foregoing deeds, and conveying the Easterly 60 feet of Lot 24, in Block 4, Paso County, Texas, such deed having the effect of donating said college of Mines and Metallurgy, in accordance with Article 2595 copy of said fifth deed being likewise hereto attached and made

And it appearing to this Board that such last mentioned deed and the donetion effected thereby should also be accepted;

THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that said fifth deed

and the donation effected thereby, be, and is hereby, accepted in accordance with Article 2595 of the Revised Statutes of the State of Texas, for 1925.

FURTHER, each and all of said five deeds and the donation effected thereby are furthermore accepted by virtue of any other and further authority than that recited, by which the said Board of Regents may legally accept same.

FURTHER, the Secretary of this Board is hereby directed to attach to each of the said five original deeds so tendered at this time a copy of this Resolution, certified by him to be true and correct, and the Secretary is further directed to endorse upon the original of each of such deeds a memorandum, signed by him, to the effect that it is one of the said five original deeds tendered at this meeting.

On motion of Major Parten, seconded by Dr. Morgan, the Board voted to express its appreciation to Mr. Burges and President Wiggins for their services in connection with this gift.



BY-LAWS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS DEVELOPMENT BOARD

ARTICLE I.

Name and Purpose

Section 1. The name of the Board shall be the University of

Texas Development Board.

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Sec. 2. In a rdance with resolutions adopted by the Board of Regents of the University of Texas and the Ex-Students' Association of the University of Texas, reating this Board, the purpose for which it is created and organized is, subject to control by the Foard of Regents, to develop and carry forward a program for the development of the University through gifts and endowments.

# ARTICLE II.

# Membership and Term of Office

Section 1. The Board shall be composed of nine voting members, three appointed by the Board of Regents of the University of Texas four appointed by the Executive Council of the Ex-Students' Association of the University of Texas, and two members of the Faculty of the University appointed by the General Faculty of the University by secret ballot, and the President of the University of Texas as an ex-officio non-voting member.

Sec. 2. Vacancies shall be filled by the body appointing the person whose place is vacant.

Sec. 3. The terms of office of the members of the Board shall be determined and established by the body appointing them as provided in Section 1 of this Article II.

### ARTICLE III.

## Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Board shall be a chairman, a vice-chairman, an executive secretary, and a secretary-treasurer.

Sec. 2. Each officer of the Board except the executive secretary shall be a member of the Board.

Sec. 3. Each officer of the Board shall be elected by a majority of the voting members of the Board and shall hold office for one year, or until his successor shall have been chosen. No officer except the executive secretary and the secretary-treasurer shall serve more than three consecutive terms.

Sec. 4. Officers shall be elected annually at the regular

Sec. 5. The chairman shall preside at all meetings of the Board. He shall be responsible for the general direction of the affairs of the Board and shall be the official representative of the Board. In the absence or disability of the chairman, the vice-chairman shall preside and serve in his place and stead.

Sec. 6. The executive secretary shall be the full-time administrative officer of the Board. He shall be responsible to the Board for the conduct of the headquarters office and shall perform all by the Board.

Sec. 7. The secretary-treasurer shall keep the minutes of the meetings of the Board and shall have charge of all operating funds of the Board under the direction of the Board. Unless otherwise protary on the Board's accounts. He shall see to it that systematic and that an annual financial report, and such other reports as are required by it, are made to the Board.

### ARTICLE IV.

### Meetings

Section 1. The Board shall hold two regular meetings each year, one in May and the other in October; the May meeting shall be considered the annual meeting.

Sec. 2. Special meetings of the Board shell be held as determined by the Board itself or upon call of the chairmen or upon request in writing signed by at least three members which may include the President of the University.

Sec. 3. The exact date and place of holding meetings shall be as fixed by the Board, or in the cell issued for the meeting.

### ARTICLE V.

### Quorum

Section 1. Five voting members shall constitute a quorum at any meeting.

### ARTICLE VI

### Committee

Section 1. There shall be an executive committee composed of the officers of the Board, and such other standing and special committees appointed by the chairman as may be determined upon by the Board.

### ARTICLE VII.

### Amendments

Section 1. These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting or at any called meeting in the notice for which the members are advised of the contemplated consideration of the amendment, by vote of a majority of the voting members of the Board.

UNIVERSITY HALL RULES AND REGULATIONS. -- I recommend ratification and approval of the Revised Rules and Regulations for University Hall at Galveston attached hereto as Exhibit I. These rules have the approval of Dean Carter and the Comptroller andhave been in effect for some time. Following is a copy of the rules and regulations:

> UNIVERSITY HALL Medical Branch, University of Texas Galveston, Texas

## Management

A Director, appointed by the Board of Regents, is in charge of the Wall. She is responsible for the food service, housekeeping, yard, and all

There is a House Organization composed of the women medical students registered in the Medical Branch and residing in the dormitory. The House Organization elects a House Chairman to serve for two consecutive years. She receives her room rent free, but pays board.

The House Chairman shall be elected at the first meeting in May. A nominating committee for chairman shall be appointed one week prior to this first meeting in May, to consist of one representative from each class. The chairman shall be elected on vote of majority and takes office

Every medical student living in the University Hall shall have a vote in house meeting unless such student is living in the hall as transient.

Transients must abide by House Rules and Regulations and do not partici-

The regulations pertaining to student life and behavior of the residents, as well as the enforcement of the same, are in the hands of the House Organization. Regulations adopted by the House Organization are to be turned over to the Director for her recommendations and then passed on by her through the proper channels to the Board of Regents for final approval. The House Organization is responsible to the Director for the enforcement of all rules; and inability to manage such affairs is to be reported by the Director and House Chairman, or by the Director alone as the case may be, to the proper Medical School authorities.

# Duties of Chairman:

She shall be responsible to the House for:

- 1. Administration of University Hall under plans as outlined.
- 2. Appointment of Committees.
- 3. Calling house meetings. There must be a meeting the first week in October and the first week in May: Other meetings may be called at the discretion of the House Chairman or on request of any member of the house or Director

Room Rent, Board, and Guests.

All rates are set by the Board of Regents.

- 1. There shall be two rates, one of which applies to transients and to students registered in the Medical Branch who do not participate in organization, and the second to women registered in the Medical Branch who constitute the house organization.
- 2. The rate for students \$40.00 a month (\$12.00 room and \$28.00 board) is fixed for the eight school months and includes room and three meals daily.
- 3. Any student rooming in the University Hall, but not taking all meals in the hall shall be considered a transient and pay transient rates unless she receives board as part compensation for labor. The same shall apply to students taking all or part of their meals in the hall, but not rooming in the hall.
- 4. Refunds for students shell be made for board during the Christmes holiday as given in the catalogue of the Medical Department; also for board in case a student is away for a period of seven consecutive days or more. No other refunds shall be made.
- 5. The rates for transients shall be either monthly or daily as

Room: \$15.00 monthly for single room.

" two persons in room. \$25.00 "

" single person in double room. \$18.00 "

\$ 1.00 daily per person.

Meals: \$30.00 monthly for meals daily Daily rates: breakfast \$.35; dinner \$.50; supper, \$.40.

Monthly: Suppers only \$11.50 Breakfast * \$10.00 Dinners * \$14.50

- 6. If food or other operating expenses advance materially, it may be necessary to raise the rates for room and board. Thirty days notice of eny rate change will be given.
- 7. A charge of \$.75 per night is made to all transients and \$.50 per night to all students having a guest in their room for the night. This entitles them to a cot and clean linen, providing requests for the cot have been received before the maids go off duty. A charge of \$.25 is made to students having a guest in an occupied room when the occupant of the room is away and has given written permission for the room to be used. This covers fresh linen.
- Board and room are paid in advance to the Eusiness Officer of the Medical Branch on the 8th, 9th, and 10th of the month with time extended one day in case of an intervening Sunday or holiday. If payment of room rent and board is made after the dates specified, a fine of fifty cents (\$.50) for the first day and twenty-five cents (\$.25) for each succeeding day is added to the account.

General Information and HOUSE REGULATIONS

After all provisions have been made for rooms for medical students, the remaining rooms may be rented to transients. These transients may be faculty members, women in college positions as technicians, etc., graduate nurses, friends of patients in John Sealy Hospital on recommendation of attending physician, and others on reliable recommendations.

Meal Hours: Breakfast: 7:30 to 8:30 a.m. week days; 7-9 a.m. Sundays and holidays.

Dinner: 12:30 p.m. except Thursday when dinner is served at 6:15 p.m. to allow for guests.

Supper: 6:00 p.m. except Sunday nights when buffet supper is served in kitchen. The students shall take turns as chairman for Sunday night.

The House Chairman shall appoint one student to be in charge for each Sunday night supper. This student shall receive her instructions from the Director, open the pantry at 6:00 p.m., and serve supper as given on menu. This student is responsible for seeing that the dishes are stacked and food put away and kitchen left clean. The Sunday preceding and during exam week the Director shall be in charge of supper. After 8:30 a.m. week days and 9:00 a.m. Sundays and holidays, a student or transient may not procure food from the kitchen or ask a maid to do so. Coffee may be had if already made. Food may be prepared only in second floor kitchenette. Food may not be regularly prepared in second floor kitchenette or in rooms while dining room is open.

Meals are served only at regular hours. Students are not allowed to go into the kitchen for food without the approval of the Director. Residents wishing to purchase food for use in the kitchenette from the University Hall storeroom must make such arrangements with the Director before the kitchen is closed after the evening meal; otherwise, such purchases must be made elsewhere.

Remains of parties must be removed by students or transients having party unless it is a house affair and arrangements are made with the Director for servents.

No person shall go to meals without being fully dressed and hair arranged

Thursday night dinner is arranged at 6:15 so that students may entertain guests. The Director should be notified before 9 a.m. Thursday morning of such guests.

Suggestions as to menus may be made to the Director, but food should not be discussed at the table.

Special diets are served upon receipt of a written order from a physician connected with the Medical School. All cases of illness and accident should be reported immediately to the Director. In case of illness trays will be sent to the room. An extra charge may be made for a special diet, if it is continued over a long time and involves extra cost.

Suggestions and requests for repairs in the room, etc., shall be made in writing to the Director.

## PROPERTY:

Any person breaking, damaging, or destroying property of house shall pay

Each room is supplied with four bath towels, one face towel, one sheet and one pillow case each week and fresh counterpane each month. If these articles are lost, they are charged to the person occupying the

Table linens are changed twice weekly.

The Director is in charge of the regulating of the heat of the house. No other person is permitted to touch the register.

Heat shall be turned on at 6 a.m. if outside temperature is registered on thermometer as 65° in dry weather or 68° in wet weather.

The house is to maintained at 70° and heat turned on if temperature is

below this in the northeast room on second floor.

If a room cannot be maintained at 70° when the heater is going, an electric heater may be used; otherwise, extra charge shall be made for electric devices used in rooms.

The heat is turned off at 10:00 p.m. except during week preceding and during exams when it is turned off at 12.

Radiators should be turned off if room is too hot. Rooms should not be left with windows open and heat turned on in radiators.

If the front door is locked after ll p.m., the key may be obtained from Hospital and should be returned immediately after using. The front door bell shall not be rung after 11 p.m.

During the day the maids will answer the bell. At night those expecting calls or packages should answer the bell.

No personal articles shall be left in the halls or on hall tables. All erticles delivered or for delivery should be kept on rack in northeast corner of front hell.

The house shall be absolutely quiet after 7 p.m. every night except Saturday when it shall be quiet after 12 p.m.

There should be no music or noise downstairs before 8 a.m.

During the day there should be quiet at all times on second and third floors so that those so desiring may sleep or study.

Typewriters cannot be used upstairs after 11 p.m.

During exemination week and the week preceding the quiet hours must be maintained downstairs and upstairs and music allowed only from 1:00 to 2:00 p.m. and from 6:00 to 7:00 p.m.

Any student is permitted to use the sewing machine. Report to the Director at once if the machine is out of order.

Orders to servants may be given only by the Director. No person may request personal service from maids of the house during the hours they are employed by the house.

If away from meals or away over night, it is considered courtesy to notify the Director of intended absence.

These rooms must be left in order before leaving. Personal belongings must be removed. If two persons desire same room at same time, it shall be used by the one who has had it least during that week.

The northeast living room cannot be used for study purpose.

This room is for general use. If desired for individual use, request for reserving it shall be made in writing to Director giving hours it is to be reserved. If two persons request reservations for same time, it shall go to the one having had use of room the least time during week.

Windows should be closed before leaving room at night.

The hall may be used for social purposes as approved at house meeting.

The courtesy of the hall is extended to faculty and School of Nursing. The Director shall see that those using hall leave it in good condition and if necessary charge may be made for preparation and cleaning of room and lights used.

The house shall subscribe for the morning paper. This paper is not to he taken from first floor.

No personal articles are to be left in the bathroom. Kotex must not be put in toilets. Tubs should be cleaned before leaving. Soiled napkins must not be left in bathrooms. They must be carefully wrapped and put in waste basket.

This room must be kept in order by each person using it. All pans and dishes must be washed immediately. Dry clothes must be removed as soon

The electric iron should be detached from the wall when not in use. Charges shall be made for damage done by failure to detach iron.

No furniture shall be painted or carpentering done without approval of the Director.

No wet clothes shall be put on the furniture.

Report to the Director in writing repairs needed.

Push oins may be used for pictures, but no nails are to be driven in the

The maid is responsible for making the bed, and keeping the floor and rugs clean; but she cannot put room in order, pick up clothes, or dust furniture in rooms. Each individual is responsible for her own room.

### SELECTION OF ROOM AND FURNITURE:

At the May meeting of each year the students are to select in order of seniority rooms desired for the coming session. The house chairman in consultation with the Director shall place freshmen in the most desirable available rooms. The south rooms are to be reserved for students.

The new furniture in bedrooms shall be given to students in order of seniority. Those in the same class desiring the same room or furniture shall draw for it. The new furniture shall be kept altogether in the room as a unit. If moved to another room, the entire furnishing of the room must be moved so as to keep the new furniture and like kinds together.

Two students of the same class desiring the same room shall draw for it.

In case rooms are all taken and a new student, faculty member or person employed by the college shall desire a room, the last transient in the house renting only room without board shall be asked to leave.

Preference shall be given to those transients taking room and board and to those renting rooms for the entire year.

No telegrams can be charged to the telephone.

The person receiving the last call shall answer the phone next time.

Messages should be left in writing on door of person for whom message is

# TELEPHONE: (Continued)

There is five minute limit for calls.

Long distance calls and charge of same should be reported at once to the Director in writing.

During meal hours a waitress is to answer the telephone.

Care should be taken to replace receiver when phone is answered on another floor.

Unnecessary calling through the halls should be avoided.

The hall lights are to be turned off at 11 p.m.

Bathroom lights should be turned off when leaving bathroom.

Parlor and study room lights are to be turned out when room is not in use and turned on when room is in use at night.

Care should be taken to turn off dining room light in evening.

Each room is provided with not more than two 40 wett globes or one 75 watt globe. Globes of higher power will be removed by the Director unless extra charge is made for their use. Each room shall be provided with a study lamp.

No cats or dogs are to be kept in University Hall.

Each individual living in the house is responsible for her own conduct. If matters of indiscretion are observed, they should be reported to the House Chairman whose responsibility it is to notify the person complained of.

If any person living in the house does not abide by the house rules and regulations, or refuses to cooperate in the administration of University Hall, the House Chairman may take the matter up with the Director; and they, in turn, with the proper Medical School authorities. Any person whose conduct is questionable may be requested to leave the hall.

If any student refuses to attend house meetings and ceases to cooperate in administration, she may be considered as transient and pay transient rates if so voted by the majority of the house.

All men must leave the house by twelve o'clock midnight.

No person shall come to first floor unless fully dressed.

Kimonas shall be worn when in halls and bathrooms on second and third floors.

No liquor is to be served in the house.

Shades shall be drawn when dressing.

# SUMMER OPERATIONS

If University Hall is operated in the summer, from June 11th, to September 10th, inclusive, it shall be under the supervision of some responsible person selected by the University officials. She is responsible sible for renting the rooms, collecting the rent, directing the help employed and other business activities that may arise.

For financial reasons unless there are as many as eight students in the dormitory at the time, the Hall cannot be maintained primarily as a study Hall in the summer.

The Hell cannot be operated during the summer unless the income is sufficient to meet the expenses. The house will be conducted in an orderly fashion at all times and an effort will be made to observe quiet hours for the benefit of students wishing to study if there are less than eight students studying in the Hall during the summer.

Students...... \$12.00 per month. \$.50 per day for portion

Non-student residents.. \$15.00 per month.

Transients and guests.. \$1.00 per day.

Students wishing to occupy the rooms assigned them for the winter term prior to the opening date of school must give notice in writing to the person in charge of the hall, stating the date of their expected arrival, in which case the room will be prepared and the charge of \$.50 per day will begin whether the room is occupied or not.

(Return after Repeated Failure, Class Attendance). Amend the Catalogues

# STANDARD OF WORK REQUIRED

REPORTS. -- Reports on the scholastic stending of students are made twice a semester, on November 26 and at the end of the first semester, and on April 1 and at the end of the second semester. In this way parents are informed fairly frequently of the scholastic progress of their children. At intrasemester dates only failing grades are ordinarily reported. The semester report gives the grades made by the student in all his courses. Intrasemester reports are sent to the student and parents by the Dean; semester reports are sent to the parents by the Registrar.

REQUIRED MINIMUM. -- To avoid scholastic probation or being dropped from the rolls of the University, the student must meet the following standard of work at the end of each semester of the long session.

Students taking less than nine semester hours per week must pass in all the work taken.

Students taking as much as nine semester hours per week must (1) pass in at least nine hours per week and (2) must also make a score of 117 points if a first-year student; of 126 points if a second-year student; and of 135 points, including an average of at least C in nine hours, if a third-year student or above.

The grades are A (excellent), B (good), C (fair), D(pass), E (Failure), F (bad failure with privilege of continuing course), G (the same as F except that the student should be dropped from the course and must be dropped if the grade is a semester grade).

In scoring, grades count as follows: A, 21 points per each semester hour; B, 18 points, C, 15 points; D, 12 points; E, F, and G, O. The grade in physical training is not counted in scoring.

A first-year student is one who has resided less than two semesters (nine months) at a university or college. A second-year student is one who has resided more than two and less than four semesters at a university or college. Attendance at a Summer Session of twelve weeks counts as a semester in classifying students as a first-year, second-year, or thirdyear student.

# SCHOLASTIC PROBATION

CONFERENCES. -- The Deans of the College of Arts and Sciences, School of Education, College of Engineering, or College of Pharmacy, as the case may be are prepared to confer with all students in the College or School School, as the case may be who are doing unsatisfactory work, both at the intrasemester dates and at the end of the semester. The object of these conferences is to advise with the student for his improvement, to offer him opportunity for renewed effort with such assistance as parents and instructors may be able to furnish, and to encourage or to warn him as the case may demand.

FAILURES. -- The University has prescribed a certain minimum of work which a student must pass at the end of the semester or be dropped from the University. (See Required Minimum of Work Rule.) Before a student is dropped from the University for failure in work he is first given a warning called "scholastic probation."

SCHOLASTIC PROBATION. -- The failure of a student to pass in the required minimum of work at the end of a semester puts the student on scholastic probation for the next semester of attendance in the long session. Scholastic probation is for the period of one semester; making the required the required score at the end of that semester removes the student from

A student who withdraws from the University or postnones his final inations while on scholestic probation will be counted as having examinations while on scholastic probation will be counted as having failed to make the conserved to the counted to the conserved to the compact of the comp failed to meet the required minimum of work in the semester concerned. A failure at the end of the first semester, if the student is on

scholastic probation, drops the student automatically from the University for the remainder of the current session.

If enforced withdrawal for failure after scholastic probation occur at the end of the second semester, the student thus dropped from the rolls may register in the following Summer Session, but not in the next long session earlier than the second semester unless he passes in at least nine semester hours of work in the subsequent Summer Session with grades that satisfy the required minimum of work rule.

To be eligible to enter the following September, a student who is admitted in June by the Registrar to the College of Arts and Sciences, School of Education, College of Engineering, or College of Pharmacy, as the case may be on scholastic probation must attend the twelve weeks Summer Session and pass in at least nine semester hours of work as set forth in the required minimum of work rule.

Scholastic probation is for the period of one semester, during which the student, while still in attendence upon his classes, must show marked improvement in his studies, in default of which his connection with the University terminates with the period.

RETURN AFTER REPEATED FAILURE. -- A student who has been on scholastic probation three times within the five preceding semesters of residence (counting the Summer Session as one semester) and who fails again to pass in the required minimum of work at the end of the fifth or next succeeding semester of residence, will be dropped from the rolls of the University for two long-session semesters following the date of the last enforced withdrawal.

A student who has been forced to withdraw from the University because of failure in work twice within a period of four semesters of residence may not register again in the University after the second enforced withdrawal than a period of four semesters.

CLASS ATTENDANCE. -- The University expects, and has a right to expect, that a student on scholastic probation will attend classes with unfailing regularity, will be punctual in reports and other written work, and will make every effort to show marked improvement in his courses. A failing student unwilling to put forth every effort to keep up with his classes should be withdrawn from the University.

In case of illness or any other imperative reason for absence, a student should file a written explanation of each absence with the Dean to be entered upon his record card.

Report of the Special Committee on the Use of Automobiles by Students and Faculty. Mr Ayres, Chairman of the Special Committee on the Use of Automobiles by students and Faculty appointed at the request of the General Faculty, then presented the following report which was signed by the Chairman and the other two members of the committee, Mr. Crene and Mr. Short:

The committee has been unable to find evidence of general misuse of automobiles by students. Neither the city police nor the University administrative officers are of the opinion that an acute situation exists at present. In view of these circumstances it seems to the committee unwise at present to consider drastic change in the present arrangements.

Certain regulations, however, might have the double effect of giving the administrative officers some increase of control and also of providing the information by which later decisions may be informed. Nobody knows exactly how many students have automobiles of their own or use automobiles belonging to their families. It is highly desirable that the University should

know which of its students drive what cars. At the present time Dean Moore maintains a voluntary registration system. At the invitation of the committee he has expressed the opinion that all student cars should be registered. The committee concur in this opinion and therefore make the following recommendation:

That all students who own automobiles or have the use of automobiles be required to register the license numbers and a suitable description of such automobiles.

Such registration system would make it possible for the Dean of Student Life to obtain reports from the city police of all traffic violations involving students and to put into effect an automatic system of penalties whereby for certain offenses the student may be placed on what Dean Moore has called "automobile probation." This penalty would bar the student who incurs it from driving or maintaining a car in Austin for a specified period. The committee endorse this proposal and make the following recommendation:

That a system of penalties be worked out by the Dean of Student Life in collaboration with the Committee on Student Life for imposition on students guilty of traffic violations.

The committee have explored the parking problem in some detail with the assistance of the Comptroller who was kind enough to consult with the University architect's office on the subject. It appears that the parking problem has not been seriously considered in any long-range plan for campus development. This seems to the committee a mistake. traffic is an administrative matter and one which is already engaging the attention of administrative officers, the committee see no necessity for any faculty recommendation at this time.

Mr. Ayres said that what the committee was proposing was resolutions and not regulations, and that the regulations would have to be worked out later by administrative officers. He declared that the committee found no excessive disregard of traffic regulations by either Faculty or students; that it thought students who own or use automobiles should be required to register the license numbers and suitable descriptions; and that the attention of the Board of Regents should be called to the need of parking space, so that the Board might take the matter into consideration in the construction of the mall. The resolutions incorporating the recommendations of the committee were thereupon adopted.

CENTENNIAL COINS. -- I recommend that no more Centennial Coins be issued and that the office be closed and the business wound up by December 1, 1938. (Referred to Board of Directors of the Museum. See p.405.)

TEXAS MEMORIAL MUSEUM BUILDING. -- I recommend that the Building Committee of the Board be authorized to accept the Museum Building and make final payments thereon when it deems such action appropriate.

OFFER OF MR. GEORGE MORRISON. -- Mr. George Morrison, of Clarks-ville, Texas, desires to give to the University several town lots located in Clarksville, Texas, because of the large amount of State, County, and City taxes thereon. I recommend that the Board not accept Mr. Morrison's offer.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE GRANTED DR. SHECKLES. -- I recommend that the Board rescind its action granting a leave of absence without pay to Dr. L. W. Sheckles, Jr., Assistant Professor of Medicine, for August and September, 1938. Dr. Sheckles will be on duty during these months and this means that his salary will be \$2,400 for 1937-38 and for 1938-39.

The Shell Petroleum Corporation has agreed to purchase and handle the oil but requires the Cardinal Oil Company to set a five thousand barrel tank at the Shell pump station in order that there will be no contamination between the oil produced by the Cardinal Oil Company and that produced on University lands, in the Taylor-Link Field.

On motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Major Parten, the Board voted to approve the budget for the University Health Service for 1958-39 as recommended by Mr. Calhoun and to request the President to discuss with Dr. Gilbert the need for additional personnel for the Service during 1938-39.

ADDITIONAL COMPENSATION TO DR. S. M. Dr. Randall proposed that the Board consider the matter of compensation to Dr. Morris for these additional services. On motion of Mr. Stark, the Board referred this matter to the Medical Committee and the President for study and a recommendation. While no definite action was taken, it appeared to be the sense of the Board that Dr. Morris! salary for 1938-39 should be \$1,200 with some honorarium for extra work during the present summer.

MEDICAL SCHOOL MATTERS .-- Mr. Calhoun reported that he had a letter from Acting Dean Hendrix, of the School of Medicine, concerning certain personnel changes for the School of Medicine, a resolution from the Executive Committee of the Faculty concerning the Dean of the School, and other matters which should be given consideration within the very near future. On motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Major Parten, the Board voted to empower the President to make such appointments for the School of Medicine, excepting that of the Dean, as may be necessary before the next meeting of the Board.

It is further covenanted and agreed that the rates to be charged for the use of and services furnished by said dornitory shall be so fixed and revised from time to time that the proceeds thereof will be fully sufficient to pay the cost of the operation and maintenance of said dormitor; and to provide the amounts hereinabove required to be paid into the Bond Fund. The Board of Regents further covenants and agrees that it will at all times exert its best efforts to the prompt collection and proper application of said revenues.

Section 12. That the Board shall maintain the dormitory in good condition and operate the same in an efficient manner and at a reasonable cost. So long as any of the Bonds are outstanding, the Board agrees to maintain insurance for the holder or holders of the bonds issued on the dormitory of a kind and in an amount which usually is carried on such structures and facilities. Nothing in this agreement shall be construed as requiring the Board to expend any funds which may be derived from any source other than from the operation of the dormitory but nothing herein shall be construed as preventing the Board from

Section 13. That the Board shall keep proper books or records and accounts (separate and apart from all other records and accounts) in which complete and correct entries shall be made of all transactions relating to the dormitory. The Board shall furnish to the original purchaser, so long as such purchaser holds any of the bonds, and to any holder of any of the bonds, at the written request of such holder, not more than thirty days after the close of each six months! fiscal period, complete operating and income statements of the dormitory in reasonable detail covering such six months! period, and, not more than sixty days after the close of each fiscal year, complete financial statements of the dormitory in reasonable detail covering such fiscal year, certified by independent auditors.

Section 14. That any purchaser of twenty-five (25) per centum in aggregate principal amount of the bonds at the time then outstanding, or any holder or holders of twenty-five (25) per centum of said amount of outstanding bonds, shall have the right at all reasonable times to inspect the dormitory and all records, accounts and data of the Board relating thereto.

Section 15. That the sale of the bonds herein authorized to the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works is hereby in all things ratified and confirmed, and that such bonds shall be prepared and executed as soon as may be after the adoption of this Resolution and shall thereupon be delivered to the purchaser thereof upon payment therefor at par and accrued interest, in accordance with the terms of the sale

Section 16. That all resolutions and orders and parts thereof in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed to the extent of such conflict.

RENTAL RATE FOR NEW DORATTORY FOR NEW .-- Mr. Simmons presented the following resolution establishing a rental rate for the new dermitor for men students (FWA Docket 9107-F). Some members of the Board discussed the question of changing the plans for this dormitory in order to accomodate a larger number of students and thus to be able to reduce the rental rate. On motion of Major Parten, seconded by Mr. Stark, the Board voted to locate this dermitory somewhere in the area of Gregory Gymnasium north of Twenty-first Street. The exterior plans for the dermitory are to be worked out in harmony with the existing dermitories for boys on the Cavanaugh Tract, but the interior plans are to be changed in such a way as to accommodate as many boys as possible, thus permitting a lower rental rate. If it is possible, a dining room is to be included in this dormitory. With the preceding action in mind, the following resolution was then adopted on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Major Parten.

# RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING RENTAL RATES.

WHEREAS, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas has authorized the issuance and sale to the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works of Fifty-Seven Thousand Dollars (\$57,000.00) of dormitory revenue bonds, Series A, 1938, for the purpose of constructing a dormitory for men students (PWA Docket 9107), and has pledged the revenue to be derived from the use of said dormitory to the payment of said bonds and the interest thereon; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to fix the rates to be charged for the use of the facilities of said dormitory;



Austin, Texas, September 29, 1938 Meeting No. 375

The Board of Regents of The University of Texas met in regular session in the office of the President at 9:30 Thursday morning, September 29, 1938, with the following present: Regents Randall (Chairman), Aynesworth, Blackert, Fairchild, Morgan, Parten, Stark, and Waggener; President Calhoun, Comptroller Simmons, and Secretary Haynes. Absent: Regent Weinert. Five members of the Board constitute a quorum.

AMENDMENT AND APPROVAL OF MINUTES .-- The Secretary called attention to the fact that the minutes for the meeting of June 25, 1938 had not yet been approved. On motion of Major Parten, seconded by Dr. Morgan, the Board voted to approve the minutes for the meeting held on June 25, 1938 in the form in which they had been mimeographed and distributed to the members of the Board.

The Secretary presented the following amendment to be inserted in the minutes for the meeting held on August 13, 1938:

UNIVERSITY ARCHITECTS (Continued) .-- During the afternoon session Mr. Calhoun reported that in accordance with the authorization earlier in the day he had conferred with Mr. C. H. Page concerning the employment of Mr. Page as an Associate Architect for the new dormitory for men to be constructed with Public Works Administration aid (PWA Docket 9107-F). Mr. Calhoun presented a proposed form of contract providing for a fee of 3% to be paid Mr. Page as Associate Architect as a part of the general arrangement, which involves a fee of 1% to Mr. Paul P. Cret for services as Consulting Architect and for a limitation of 12% on the amount to be expended for supervision and for the services of Mr. R. L. White as Supervising Architect, making an over-all limit on the total architectural fees of 52% of the total cost of construction.

Mr. Calhoun presented the following resolution authorizing the execution of a contract with Mr. Page. On motion of Mr. Stark, the Board approved this resolution and authorized Major J. R. Parten, as Vice-Chairman of the Board, to execute the contract with Mr. Page. The approval of the contract was made subject to the approval of the Public Works Administration. The following members of the Board of Regents were present and voted for the adoption of the resolution: Regents Randall, Aynesworth, Morgan, Parten, and Stark; voting against: none.

# RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING ARCHITECT'S CONTRACT

WHEREAS, The Board of Regents of The University of Texas (hereinafter referred to as Owner) did by resolution at a regular meeting on August 13, 1938, nominate Mr. C. H. Page as Architect for design and supervision of the construction and improvements of the project for which an allocation of funds has been made by the Public Works Administration under Docket No. 9107-F: and

WHEREAS, The Regional Director of said Administration has approved said nomination; and

WHEREAS, The Owner has approved a form of Architectural Contract, has submitted said form to the said Regional Director and secured his approval thereof;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That J. R. Parten, Vice-Chairman of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas, be authorized and instructed to sign said contract with said Architect for and in the name of the said Owner, and that Leo C. Haynes, Secretary of said Board of Regents, be authorized and instructed to attest said contract under the seal of said Board and forward to said Regional Director three (3) certified copies of said contract.

On motion of Major Parten, seconded by Doctor Morgan, the Board voted to approve the minutes for the meeting held on August 13, 1938 in the form in which they had been mimeographed and distributed to the members of the Board, with the amendment presented by the Secretary.

MEETING TO BE HELD IN EL PASO .-- On motion of Senator Blackert, seconded by Major Parten, the Board voted to hold an early meeting in El Paso, the exact date of the meeting to be determined by the Chairman of the Board and the College of Mines Committee.

COTTON ESTATE PROPERTY .-- Dr. Morgan reported that he had recently made a trip to El Paso to inspect some of the property acquired by the College of Mines from the Cotton Estate. He had inspected particularly the building in the City of El Paso which is commonly known as "The Chocolate Shop." Dr. Morgan believed that the property was worth considerably more than the outstanding mortgage of \$75,000 against it.

Dr. Morgan presented an agreement prepared by Mr. W. H. Burges to be entered into between the Board of Regents and Messrs. J. F. Coles and Otis C. Coles, doing business under the name of Coles Brothers. The proposed agreement provided for the appointment of Coles Brothers as

agents for the management and sale of the properties acquired from the Cotton Estate. The consideration to Coles Brothers is to be "five per cent of all amounts for which the lands may be sold and five per cent of the rentals collected on the said property, but no charge shall be made for the collection of notes." The proposed agreement designated Dr. D. M. Wiggins, President of the College of Mines and Metallurgy, as the general agent for the Board of Regents in the management and control of the property. Dr. Morgan reported that the Land Committee recommended the approval of the proposed agreement. On motion of Mr. Stark, seconder by Mrs. Fairchild, the Board approved the recommendation of its Land Committee and authorized the Chairman to execute the agreement in the name of the Board. (For a copy of the agreement, see the Secretary's files.)

Dr. Morgan reported that Mr. George Jones and Mr. John Snyder, composing the firm of Jones and Snyder, had proposed to lease sixteen sections and two fractions of sections of the Cotton Estate land in Hudspeth County at a rental of three cents per acre per year. He stated that he believed this price to be reasonable, on the average, for the tracts involved. Jones and Snyder proposed a three-year lease. On the recommendation of the Land Committee and on motion of Mr. Stark, the Board voted to approve the proposed lease with the understanding that it is to be drawn on the usual University form.

There are three other sections of Cotton Estate land in Hudspeth County and three fractions of sections which were not included in the proposed lease to Jones and Snyder. Dr. Wiggins stated that Jones and Snyder had agreed to handle this land for the Board of Regents during a term of three years "to protect it as far as our ability will permit to see that there is no trespassing, with the understanding that we will report any trespassing to you or your agents." The proposed consideration for this service was one dollar per year. It was agreed that provision for the handling of these three sections and three fractions of sections would be included in the lease to Jones and Snyder, referred to in the preceding paragraph.

ROUTINE ITEMS, COLLEGE OF MINES AND METALLURGY .-- President Wiggins presented his docket of September 24, which had been mailed to the members of the Board. On the recommendation of the College of Mines Committee and on motion of Mr. Stark, the Board approved the recommendations of President Wiggins as contained in this docket. A copy of the docket follows:

ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATIONS .-- I recommend that the following additional appropriations be made:

Miscellaneous General Expenses

1. Appropriate \$250 from the Unappropriated Balance to the Educational Conference Fund.

2. Appropriate \$150 from the Unappropriated Balance to the Department of Chemistry, to be used as the salary of a Part-time Laboratory Assistant for the Long Session of 1938-39.

3. Appropriate \$150 from the Unappropriated Balance to the Department of Music, to be used as the salary of an Assistant Director of the Band and Glee Clubs.

Physical Plant,

4. Appropriate \$840 from the Unappropriated Balance to the Physical Plant budget to be used as the salary of G. A. Shafer as Head

Home-Making

5. Appropriate \$375 from the Unappropriated Balance to the 1938-39 budget to be used as the salary of Miss Mary Ella Pool as Instructor (one-fourth-time) in Home-Making for the Long Session of 1938-39

Physical Plant

6. Appropriate \$1,700 from the Unappropriated Balance to the Physical Plant budget, this amount being necessary to complete WPA projects not included in the original estimate.

Library and Administration Building Fund

7. Appropriate \$850 from the Unappropriated Balance to the Library and ministration Building Fund. This amount includes various miscellaneou items in connection with completing the building and moving from the library into the new building.

AMERICAN EDUCATION FORUM OF THE NATIONAL BROADCASTING COMPANY. The School of Education of the University has been invited to participate in a weekly sustaining program of the National Broadcasting Company to be known as the American Education Forum. The other Universities invited to participate in this Forum are Teachers College, Columbia University; the

Department of Education, The University of Chicago; and the School of Education, Stanford University. According to the plan, each participating institution will provide a thirty-minute program of discussion once a month on an educational theme. The purpose is to represent the attitudes and interests of the different sections of the country on educational problems of nationwide importance. The time proposed by N.B.C. is noon on Saturday, E.S.T. N.B.C. agrees to pay all transmission costs and offers at least \$100 per program toward local expenses. Further expenses, if any, would depend upon this University's interest in trying to place its contributions on a level with the best. MEDICAL SCHOOL MATTERS.--Mr. Calhoun called attention to his recommendation concerning Dr. George Herrmann (Item 79, Page 8, of the docket of September 22) and stated that Associate Professor Edward H. Schwab had requested that he also be placed on part-time services with the School of Medicine. Mr. Calhoun read a letter from Acting Dean B. M. Hendrix concerning these requests. RESOLUTION ON SERVICES OF PROFESSOR CHARLES W. HACKETT -- Dr. Aynesworth presented the following resolution of appreciation for the services of Dr. Charles W. Hackett, Professor of Latin-American History.

It seems meet and proper when a professor in the faculty of the University renders a distinguished service to scholarship or performs a meritorious contribution to learning that the Board of Regents take cognizance of such services in order to pay merited tribute and to encourage the spirit of research and scholarship in the faculty.

It is well known that all such contributions to scholar-ship are the product and labor aside from the regular and required duties appertaining to the professorial responsibilities, that such contributions reflect merit not only upon the individual professor but upon the University itself, and that the entire faculty shares in the reputation and renown resulting from any contribution to learning from any department.

From time to time, professors in the University have either written or published contributions from their departments which have been given national and even international recognition. While it is at times unwise and quite difficult to select certain professors for special commendation, it becomes the pleasant duty at this time to take official recognition of the services of a member of the Department of History.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Regents desire to commend Dr. Charles Wilson Hackett, Professor of Latin-American History, for his contributions to Latin-American history as evidenced by the attached list of the publications, translations and the editing of numerous volumes, articles, reviews and books which have been issued from his department and which are evidence of the results of his continued interest, persistent research and sound

Not only has Dr. Hackett labored as a student of history, but he has been a major influence in building a great library in his field. In view of the evidence of Dr. Hackett's achievements,

as herewith presented, the Board of Regents desire to express their heartiest commendations and a fervent wish that he may continue the distinguished career which he has so notably pursued, and also, that a copy of this resolution be presented to Dr. Hackett and a copy filed with the Board of Regents.

Easement No. 108, Southern Union Utilities Company. -- Dr. Morgan presented a recommendation from Mr. Compton and the land Committee that Easement No. 108 be granted to the Scuthern Union Utilities Company for a waterworks system on Section 20, Block 16, Ward County. The easement was on a form prepared by Mr. Scott Gaines, University Attorney, was for a period of ten years beginning October 1, 1937, and carried a consideration of \$500. On motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Dr. Aynesworth, the Board approved the recommendation of its Land Committee that this easement be granted.

Easement No. 109; Highway Right-of-Way, Andrews County.--Dr. Morgan presented the recommendation of Mr. Compton and the land Committee that a right-of-way be granted to Andrews County for an eighty-foot road across Block 9 and Block 1 in Andrews County. The easement was on the regular University printed form. The recommendation of the land Committee was conditioned upon the County's fencing the road. The Board approved this recommendation on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Dr. Aynesworth.

Forfeiture of Sale of Land, Cooke County. -- Dr. Morgan presented a recommendation prepared by Mr. J. H. Walker, University Land Officer, reading as follows:

WHEREAS, May 1, 1903, H. P. McCain purchased from the Board of Regents the following described tract of State University land situated in Cooke County, Texas:

WHEREAS, said purchaser having failed to make the annual payment of principal and interest on his obligation for the deferred payment of \$500.00 in accordance with the terms of his contract, the last payment having been made September 26, 1906, leaving unpaid the sum of \$464.66 with interest due and unpaid thereon from November 1, 1906;

THEREFORE, Be It Resolved by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas that said contract of sale be and the same is hereby cancelled and declared to be of no further force and effect and that the Commissioner of the General Land Office is authorized and requested to indorse cancellation and forfeiture on the obligation executed by said H. P. McCain and on his contract to purchase, both of which instruments are on file in the Land Office and also to make an entry of forfeiture on the account kept with said purchaser, H. P. McCain, as provided in said contract.

On the recommendation of the Land Committee and on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild, the Board approved this resolution and ordered the contract of sale cancelled and of no further force and effect.

At one o'clock the Board recessed for lunch at the University Cafeteria, and returned at two with the same attendance as at the morning session.

UNIVERSITY DEVELOPMENT BOARD. -- Major Parten called the attention of the Board to the fact that the recommendations of the University Development Board had been referred to the Executive Committee of the Board of Regents for study and recommendation. He reported that the Executive Committee recommended that the Board of Regents approve the organization for the University Development Board as set forth in the report of the Committee on Organization of the University Development Board (minutes of the Board of Regents for June 25, 1938, pages 3-5, inclusive). The recommendation of the Executive Committee included also the appropriation of \$10,500 or so much thereof as may be needed for the budget for the University Development Board for the fiscal year of 1938-39, this appropriation to be made from the Main University Unappropriated Balance. This recommendation was approved by the Board of Regents on motion of Dr. Morgan, seconded by Senator Blackert.

STEPHENS LIBRARY COLLECTION. -- At the request of Dr. Aynesworth, for the Library Committee, Dr. C. W. Hackett, Mr. Donald Coney, Mr. E. W. Winkler, and Dr. C. E. Castaneda were invited before the Board. Dr. Aynesworth and Messrs. Hackett, Coney, Winkler, and Castaneda discussed a

collection of books and manuscripts known as the Stephens Collection, which is available for purchase by the University at this time. Dr. Hackett thought that the Texas materials in the collection would be worth a minimum of \$16,000. He stated that there were some materials on California which might either be kept in the University Library or exchanged. The collection consists of some 874 items and about 21,000 pages of manuscript. After the four visitors withdrew and after some discussion of University finances and needs the Board voted, or motion of Major Parten representative of the Stephens family and to offer a maximum of \$21,000 be paid in amounts not in excess of \$3,000.0

Mr. Stark made the following statement to the Board of Regents:
"As soon as the Development Board begins to function, I will use my best efforts to get the purchase of the Stephens Collection underwritten as one of the immediate projects of this Development Board."

attention of the Board to the appropriation in the current appropriation bill of \$30,000 for the year 1938 and \$20,000 for the year 1939 for the purposes of "Transferring, preparing, arranging, cataloguing, and mainten ance of the Stark Library and Fine Arts Collection." Mr. Calhoun stated that Mr. Scott Gaines had prepared an opinion to the effect that the \$30,000 appropriated for 1938 is for the calendar year instead of the fiscal year and that it is therefore available until December 31, 1938. He said that Mr. H. Grady Chandler, First Assistant Attorney General, had ruled, however, that the appropriation is for the fiscal year and consequently that it lapsed on August \$1, 1938. At the request of the Board, Dr. Morgan and Mr. Calhoun are to look further into this matter.

At the request of some members of the Board, Mr. Stark discussed, briefly, his desires and ideas concerning the housing and displaying of the Stark Fine Arts Collection.

BOND RESOLUTION, DORMITCRY FOR MEN. -- Among other business coming before the Board was the question of the issuance of bonds for the construction of a Men's Dormitory (PWA Docket 9107-F). Mr. Simmons presented and read a resolution authorizing the issuance of bonds for this dormitory, and Doctor Morgan moved that the resolution be adopted. The motion was seconded by Major Parten. The question being upon the adoption of the resolution, the following Regents voted "Aye": Aynesworth, Fairchild, Morgan, Parten, Blackert, Stark, and Waggener. 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Section 9. Definition: In this resolution the term "project" shall mean the men's dormitory building to be constructed and equipped with the proceeds of the bond issue authorized by this resolution.

The term "system" shall be interpreted to mean and include the project, together with all improvements and extensions thereto and replacements thereof, hereafter constructed or acquired.

The expression "net revenues" as used in this resolution shall mean the gross revenues from the operation of the system, after providing sufficient thereof for the reasonable cost of maintaining, repairing, insuring and operating said system.

Section 10. Section 14. That the Board shall maintain the system in good condition and operate the same in an efficient manner and at a reasonable cost. So long as any of the Bonds are outstanding, the Board agrees to maintain insurance for the holder or holders of the bonds issued on the system of a kind and in an amount which usually is carried on such structures and facilities. Nothing in this agreement shall be construed as requiring the Board to expend any funds which may be derived from any source other than from the operation of the dormitory but nothing herein shall be construed as preventing the Board from so doing.

WHEREAS, the Board has defined as the "System" the dormitory building to be constructed and equipped with such funds together with all improvements and extensions thereto and replacements thereof, here-

TEXAS:

- 1. That this Board covenants to establish and enforce, so long as any obligations which the United States of America has offered to purchase remain outstanding and unpaid, such parietal rules and regulations as will insure maximum occupancy of the facilities and service afforded by the system;
- 2. That such rules shall be amended from time to time as the occasions arise so as to meet changing conditions, better to assure the fulfillment of this pledge;
- of the institution and other buildings used for such purposes than is required by students applying for space in said dormitories, the Administrative Officers of said University of Texas are hereby directed to give of The University of Texas not previously constructed in whole or in Government, resulting in the occupancy of all of the space afforced by part of the space available in any other dormitory or building maintained by said University.
- 4. That to the extent that any surplus space shall ever be available in said system while any of said obligations remain outstanding and unpaid, it shall then be the duty of the Administrative Officers of said University to enforce a rule requiring occupancy of said facilities by students attending said institution, with the exception in favor of the facilities constructed with the proceeds from revenue bonds heretofore purchased by the Government; to the end that maximum occupancy of said dormitory shall be maintained and this provision shall be considered as a rule for the guidance of said Administrative Officers
- 5. The Administrative Officers of the University shall notify the students of said University of these rules by suitable posting and by publication in the annual catalog.

PROVISION FOR NEGRO GRADUATE EDUCATION .-- Mr. Calhoun stated that under date of September 20 he had mailed each member of the Board a copy of a telegram received by him, dated September 24, from Dr. Thomas W. Currie and other members of the Educational Committee of the Texas Commission on Inter-Racial Cooperation. The telegram urged consideration of the provision of a scholarship fund for graduate work for Negroes by Legislative enactment. MEDICAL COMMITTEE ACTION REGARDING STATUS OF DRS. HERRMANN AND SCHWAB.--I report for confirmation the following action of the Medical Committee regarding the status of Dr. G. R. Herrmann and Dr. Edward H. Schwab as authorized by the Board at its meeting of September 29, 1938:

"At a recent meeting of the Board of Regents it was resolved that the Status of Doctor Herrmann and Doctor Schwab at the Medical School be referred to the Medical Committee of The Board of Regents with power to act. This Committee, having studied the situation, recommends that Doctor Herrmann be retained as full time Professor of Clinical Medicine with the understanding that he be available at all times for service in the hospital; that he be allowed an office in the Outdoor Clinic and the privilege of consulting practice in his office, and that he may respond when called by physicians in consultation, if and provided this consultation work does not interfere with his hospital work; that he be paid a salary of \$5,000 per year, provided that all funds collected in the laboratories, be it in clinical laboratory or electrocardiographic laboratory, be placed in the care of Doctor Wilson, Superintendent of John Sealy Hospital, and to be spent for the replacement or upkeep of these laboratories.

"The Committee recommends that Doctor Schwab be retained as Associate Professor of Practice of Medicine and that he be given an office in the Outdoor Clinic and the privilege of consulting practice in his office and the privilege of responding to calls of physicians outside of the hospital, if and provided that this work does not interfere with his work in the hospital; and that he be named health physician to examine medical students and nurses and to care for their physical infirmities. That all funds collected in the laboratories, be it clinical laboratory or electrocardiographic laboratory, be placed in the care of Doctor Wilson, Superintendent of John Sealy Hospital, and to be spent for the replacement or upkeep of these laboratories. That Doctor Schwab be paid \$1,500 per annum and no other emoluments from the Medical School or Hospital."

SFECIAL FERMISSION TO MISS FAMINIE RATCHFORD. I recommend approval of the request of Miss Famine Ratchford, Wrenn Librarian, for permission to edit for publication the letters of Thomas J. GENERAL FACULTY LEGISLATION. -- I recommend approval of the following action taken by the General Faculty at its meeting of Cetober 11, 1933 and by the circularization-no-protest procedure, as indicated:

## Circularization-no-protest Precedure

Salary for President of Students! Association. -- Add to the Laws of the Students! Association, Title 8, the following to be inserted as Article 6, present Article 6 to be made Article 7:

The President of the Students! Association shall be paid a salary of thirty dollars (\$30.00) per month during the Long Session. This salary shall be paid out of the funds allotted to Student Government.

## Meeting of October 11, 1938 (Minutes, page 1447)

Transfer from One Branch to Another.—A student in any college or school of the University who is entitled to continue in the University and who can meet the admission requirements of another college or school of the University may transfer to it, with the approval of the Registrar, carrying with him the same probationary status, if any, that he had where he was. Upon the recommendation of his dean with the approval of the Registrar, a student in the School of Law or the School of Medicine who has not passed in the required minimum of work may transfer to enother college or school on probation. No student may transfer from one college or school of the University later than the eighth day of the opening of the semester.

RESOLUTION IN RE REINVESTMENT OF SEALY AND SMITH-BOARD OF RECENTS FUNDS. -- I recommend the approval of the following Resolution:

WHEREAS, among the securities held for the \$700,000 fund under the joint control of the Sealy and Smith Foundation for the John-Sealy Hospital and the Board of Regents of The University of Texas, there are held \$5,000 par value El Paso County, Texas, 5% Road Bonds, due January 7, 1954, optional May 7, 1959, and

WHEREAS, El Paso County has given public notice of a call for redemption of said bonds on May 7, 1939, after which date no further interest will be due or payable, and

WHEREAS, the Foundation has received an offer of par and accrued interest to the date of redemption for delivery of these bonds against payment on or about November 7, 1938, and

MEPEAS, the Foundation is of the opinion that this offer should be accepted and the proceeds reinvested,

NCW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas

- (1) that it hereby approves the acceptance of the above mentioned offer, and
- (2) that it hereby approves the policy of reinvesting the proceeds of the sale of the above mentioned bonds either in bonds of the United States, bonds of the State of Texas, bonds of Texas cities and Texas counties upon the approval of the University Investment Officer as to the particular names, or in bonds of corporations domiciled within the United States and of the grade described in Moody's Manual as Asa bonds, any of said bonds when so purchased to be held and used as provided by the terms of the act under which this special fund was created.

Mr. Simmons presented the following additional items carrying the recommendation of Mr. Calhoun, which items had come to the attention of the President after the preparation of the Movember 3 Locket. WHEREAS, Heretofore, to-wit, on the 29th day of September, A.D. 1938, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas, at its regular meeting held on said date at Austin, Travis County, Texas, made and passed a resolution ordering and directing J. W. Calhoun, the President of said University, to megotiate with, and to endeavor

to purchase from, Virginia Stephens, of the City of Mexico, in the Federal District of the Republic of Mexico, and/or with and from G. A. Martins, her attorney in fact, of Austin, Travis County, Texas, that certain collection of historical material, commonly known as the W. B. Stephens Collection of Books and Manuscripts, and being more particularly described in and by that certain bill of sale of the same, dated the 1st day of October, A.D. 1938, executed and delivered by said G. A. Martins to The University of Texas, in his capacity as the attorney in fact of said Virginia Stephens, which bill of sale is hereby referred to and made a part hereof for all pertinent purposes, on the basis of Twenty-one Thousand (\$21,000.00) Dollars, payable, the sum of Four Thousand (34,000.00) Dollars, cash on delivery, and the balance evidenced by one promissory note for the sum of Seventeen Thousand (\$17,000.00) Dollars, due and payable in annual installments of Three Thousand (\$3,000.00) Dollars each; and,

WHEREAS, The said Virginia Stephens declined to sell the collection on the basis above set out but agreed to sell the same to The University of Texas for the said sum of Twenty-one Thousand (\$21,000.00) Dollars, paid and secured to be paid in accordance with the following terms, to-wit:

RESOLUTION ON DEATH OF MRS. JENNIE SEALY SMITH. -- Dr. Randall presented the following resolution on the death of Mrs. Jennie Sealy adopted by the Board on motion of Major Parten, seconded by Mrs. Fair-

WHEREAS, The general welfare of The University of Texas Regents; and

WHEREAS, During its more than a half century of progress a few outstanding citizens of Texas have given largely of their time and means in an effort to establish its growth and influence, foremost among whom have been members of the John Sealy family in

Galveston, who have been as generous as the State itself in support of our great Medical School, by building, equipping and maintaining a system of hospitals in connection therewith, which are unsurpassed in efficiency by any in our common country.

It was in 1891 that the John Sealy Hospital was established. It formed the nucleus which gave birth to the Medical School of The University of Texas, which had its beginning in the early nineties. From that time on until death removed him, the younger John Sealy made this institution the chief coject of his affection. A short time before his untimely passing, he and his sister, Mrs. Jennie Sealy Smith, joined by her husband, Mr. R. Waverley Smith, incorporated at her suggestion the larger portion of their vast holdings under title of "The Sealy and Smith Foundation for the John Sealy Hospital." The purpose of this Foundation was to perpetuate this great system of hospitals so that its blessings to humanity might flow on from generation to generation.

The State of Texas owes a debt of gratitude, which it never can repay, to the elder John Sealy for his gift which gave rise to later benefactions by his children.

It is with profound sorrow that this Board has learned that Mrs. Jennie Sealy Smith, the last of this immediate family, passed to her reward, at New York City, on the 12th day of October. After her brother's death, which occurred several years ago, her interest in the fosterchild of the family never dimmed. Although the hospital was deeded to the State shortly after the Medical School was founded, the benefactions from this family flowed on. Buildings have continued to be erected, and deficiencies for charity treatment have been paid. By Mrs. Smith's will, the Foundation is made the residuary legatee of her estate.

Income from the Foundation has provided, and will continue to provide, other buildings and facilities as time goes on. All in all, Mrs. Smith was imbued with the same ideals as her illustrious father and brother. She represented and typified the finest characteristics of the best there is in a well-rounded life. She did not live for self but invested all she had in lifting the burdens and routing misery from the doorstep of the human race. What better use could one make of one's time and chattels than she made of hers? She was the Lady Bountiful of all charities.

Now that we shall henceforth miss "one whom we have long loved but lost awhile," let us take note of the fine things she did as she journeyed here, that others seeing her good works might choose to follow in her footsteps.

Premises considered, IT IS RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF RE-GENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS, That, in the passing of Mrs. Jennie Sealy Smith, The University of Texas, the State, and the Nation have lost one of their most valuable citizens, whose virtue and example we commend to all who would tread the higher and nobler paths of duty.

RESCLVED FURTHER, As a testimonial of our affectionate regard for her memory, that a copy of this resolution be inscribed in our minutes and that one be mailed to the known address of each of her collateral relatives.

APPOINTMENT TO JOHN SEALY HOSPITAL BOARD. -- Dr. Randall reported that the Sealy and Smith Foundation recommended the appointment of Judge Mart H. Royston, of Galveston, as a member of the John Sealy Hospital Board to succeed Mrs. Jennie Sealy Smith. Chimetton of Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by Major Parten, the Board of Regents approved this nomination of the Sealy and Smith Foundation.

BIDS ON HOME ECONOMICS INSTITUTIONAL LABORATORY.--At 10:30 Mr. R. J. Ley, Resident Engineer Inspector on the Dormitory for Men (PWA Docket 9107-F), appeared before the Board as a representative of the Public Works Administration at the opening of the bids on the Home Economics Institutional Laboratory (PWA Docket 2465-F). Others present

for the opening of the bids were: Miss Mary E. Gearing, Professor of Home Economics, Miss Rosalie Godfrey, Business Director of University Residence Halls, Mr. R. L. White, University Supervising Architect, Mr. W. W. Dornberger, Assistant Supervising Architect, Mr. George J. Stephens, Assistant to the Comptroller, the bidders, reporters, and others. The bids were opened and read by Mr. Simmons, Comptroller, and examined by Mr. Ley for compliance with Public Works Administration regulations. A tabulation of the bids follows:

In view of the fact that the amount of the base bid of the lowest bidder exceeds the amount we had budgeted for the Contract, and ly impairing the successful operation of the Laboratory (such items can be added at a later date if desired) we recommend the award of a contract to the above firm on the basis of their base proposal less Alternates, 1 to 3 inclusive.

We found the low bid regular in all respects, the prices quoted proper, and consider the firm fully qualified to handle the work under their contract. Accordingly, we recommend that the contract for of \$22,444.00 less the deduction of Alternates 1 to 3 inclusive leaving a net contract amount of \$19,953.00.

That, after the receipt and study of the various bids submitted for the erection and completion of an Institutional Laboratory for Home Economics (PNA Docket No. Tex-2465-F) and the recommendation of the Architect and the Building Committee of the Board of Regents that the contract for the work be awarded to the Rex D. Kitchens Construction Company, of Austin, Texas, on the basis of their base bid of \$22,444.00 less the acceptance of Alternate Proposals Nos. 1 to 3, inclusive, making the contract price for the work the sum of \$19,953.00.
- 2. That this award shall not be effective until the awardee shall have been notified in writing by the Secretary of the Board of Regents of such award and its approval by the Regional Director of the Public Works Administration.
- 3. Further, that upon receipt of notice that the Regional Director of the Public Works Administration has concurred in the award of this contract to the above bidder at the price stated, Dr. Edward Randall, Chairman of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas, be authorized to execute the contract with the above firm for and in the name of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas.

Mr. Simmons recommended that the contribution of the University to the Institutional Laboratory project be increased from \$11,000 to \$16,000 in order to take care of the excess of the actual cost of the project over the original estimated cost. On the recommendation of the Building Committee and on motion of Dr. Morgan seconded by Major Parten, the Board approved the following recommendation: "The sum of \$5,000 which is on hand and available for the purpose of the construction of the Home Economics Institutional Laboratory is hereby appropriated for such purpose. The Comptroller is hereby ordered to do all things necessary to transfer said sum to the construction account. The proper person is hereby authorized to execute all necessary documents to secure the approval of the changes sought."

TRANSFER AND APPROPRIATION OF FUNDS, INSTITUTIONAL LABORATORY.
--Mr. Simmons reminded the Board that at the September 29 meeting (Minutes, page 21) the Board had approved a resolution appropriating \$11,000 to the Institutional Laboratory project and specifying the funds which would lend this amount of money to the Institutional Laboratory project, the interest rate, maturities, et cetera. He presented the following resolution providing for the contribution of \$16,000 by the University, to supersede that adopted on September 29. This resolution was adopted by the Board on motion of Dr. Morgan, seconded by Major Parten.

RESOLVED, That the sum of \$16,000 to be supplied by The University of Texas as the applicant's portion of the funds to be matched by the grant of \$9,000.00 made by the United States Government through its Public Works Administration for the construction of a Home Economics Institutional Management Laboratory (PWA Docket No. Tex-2465) be provided as follows:

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- 2. Beginning with the first day of the month following the acceptance of the completed building by the University, the loan is to boar interest at the rate of three per cent (3%) per annum, payable annually on August 31.
- 3. The principal is to be payable on August 31, in amounts and years as follows, provided that additional payments on principal may be made on any interest date in multiples of
  - \$ 600.00 in 1940 to 1942, inclusive, 700.00 in 1945 to 1947, inclusive, 300.00 in 1948 to 1952, inclusive, 900.00 in 1955 to 1955, inclusive, and 1,000.00 in 1956 to 1959, inclusive.
- 4. The loan is to be secured by an exclusive first lien on and pledge of the revenues of the home Economics Tea Room, after deduction of the reasonable operation and maintenance expenses
- 5. Repayments of principal are to be credited to the funds raking the advances in the ratio of their participation in the loan, credits being rounded off to multiples of \$10,000.

HEGRO GRADUATE AND PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION .-- Major Parten reminded the Board of its action at the September 29 meeting concerning provision for Negro graduate and professional education (Minutes, pages 22 and 23). He discussed the experience of other states in handling this matter, including the State of Virginia. He said that the proposal recommended for the State of Texas is similar to the method used by Virginia. Major Parten presented the following proposed letter to be addressed by Dr. Randall, as Chairman of the Ecard of Regents, to Mr. Claude D. Teer, Chairman of the State Board of Control.

Hon. Claude D. Teer, Chairman State Board of Control Aus hin, Texas

Dear ir. Teer:

As you perhaps know, the Educational Committee for the Inter-Racial Commission of Texas has been at work on some plan to make it possible for Megro students of the State to secure graduate and professional educational training. The most feasible plan which seems to have been suggested is one which would provide a State appropriation of sufficient amount to pay the differential in cost to qualified Regro students who must go to an institution outside of the State of Texas over what it would cost those students to attend an institution in Texas.

Representatives of the Committee have discussed this proposal with the President of the University and members of the Board of Regents on several occasions, and the Board of Regents joins the Committee in the following recommendation:

"The State Board of Control is earnestly requested to include in its recommendations to the Governor and the Forty-sixth legislature for appropriations for the educational institutions of the State for the 1939-41 Biennium an item of \$50,000 per year to provide scholarship aid to qualified Megro students who are citizens of Texas for graduate and professional study in an approved college or university

On motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild, the Board agreed that its legislative Committee should be permitted to accept for the University the responsibility for the administration of this fund if the Legislature should ask the University to administer

RENEWAL OF DEPOSITORY CONTRACTS .-- Mr. Simmons recommended that the depository contracts with the four banks listed below be renewed for a period of one year beginning September 1, 1938. He presented renewal agreements to be signed by the officials of the banks concerned and the Chairman of the Board of Regents. On motion of Dr. Morgan, seconded by Mr. Stark, the Board approved these renewals and authorized the Chairman to execute the renewal agreements in the name of the Board. The renewal agreements are with the following banks:

> The Austin National Bank of Austin, with The American National Bank of Austin as Trustee

> The American National Bank of Austin, with The Austin Mational Bank of Austin as Trustee

The American National Bank of Austin, with the Dallas Mational Bank of Dallas as Trustee

Mr. Simmons reported that the depository contracts with the First National Bank of Galveston and the Hutchings-Sealy National Bank of Galveston are continuous and do not require amnual renewal.

ADDITIONAL WAGE CLASSIFICATIONS, DORMITORY FOR MEN. -- Mr. Simmons reported that it had been found necessary to provide four additional wage classifications on the Dormitory for Men (PNA Docket 9107-F) He recommended the approval of the following classifications and minimum

RENTAL RATE FOR DORMITORY FOR MEN .-- Mr. Simmons recalled that at the August 13, 1938 meeting of the Board a resolution establishing rental rates for the new Dormitory for Men (PWA Docket 9107-F) had been approved by the Board. Since the Public Works Administration had ruled, however, that items in connection with this project not included in the official call for the meeting had not been properly adopted, Mr. Simmons presented the following resolution, which was the same as that adopted by the Board at the meeting held on August 13. This resolution was adopted by the Board on motion of Major Parten, seconded by Mr. Stark, with the six members of the Board present voting for its adoption. Three members of the Board were absent from the meeting.

## RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING RENTAL RATES

WIEREAS, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas has authorized the issuance and sale to the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works of Fifty-Seven Thousand Dollars (357,000.00) of dormitory revenue bonds, Series A, 1938, for the purpose of constructing a dormitory for men students (PWA Docket 9107), and has pledged the revenue to be derived from the use of said dormitory to the payment of said bonds and the interest thereon; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to fix the rates to be charged for the use of the facilities of said dermitory;

MA, MERRICER, RE IF RECOVED by the Board of Regents of The Inivercity of Texas that a charge of One Hundred and Twonty Dollars (\$120.00) per Long Jession of nine months for room is hereby fixed for the use of said dormitory, and that the amount of said revenue over and above that necessary for the maintenance and operation of said dormitory is hereby irreveably pledged to the payment of said bonds and the interest thereon in accordance with the order passed by the Board of Regents of the University of Texas authorising the issuance of said bonds.

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TEXAS UNION DUDGET FOR 1933-39. -- Er. Stark reminded the Board that Er. Calkeun had included in his supplementary docket for the meeting held on September 29 the 1953-39 budget for the Texas Union as approved by the Board of Directors of the Union. On motion of Mr. Stark subject for the Texas Union as seconded by Dr. Aymesworth, the Board of Regents voted to approve the budget for the Texas Union as set out on page four of the President's supplementary docket for September 29. (See Vol. L, pp. 431 and 492.) (For amended budget, see page 25, this volume.)

PRITERIAL OF DEAR HILDERALD. -- Nr. Simmons reported that Mr. Salkows had received a letter dated November 5, 1938 from Dean Ira P. Mildebrand reading as follows:

"At the end of the present blennium, August 31, 1939, I will have taught law at the law School of the University of Texas for thirty-two years. During the last fifteen years of this time, have been Bean of the School of law. For several years I have been under written contract to write an exhaustive treatise on the Texas law of Frivate Corporations and Joint Stock Companies. On account of the exacting duties of my present position, I have not years. I am anxious to devote more time to research, writing, and desire to retire as Bean, August 31, 1939. I am writing you early new Bean of the law School."

Er. Calhoun had addressed a letter to each member of the Board of Regents under date of November 7 recommending that Dean Hildebrand be permitted to retire as Dean of the Dencol of law, effective August 31, ing the question of a successor for Dean Hildebrand. Major Parten premotion of Major Parten, which was adopted by the Board on motion of Major Parten, seconded by Dr. Aynesworth:

MHEREAS, Professor Ira P. Hildebrand has expressed a desire to the Board of Regents that he be permitted to retire from the position of Dean of the School of Law on August 51, 1939, and has stated as his reason that he desires to spend more time than pletion of his treatise on the Texas Law of Private Corporations;

NOV, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS, That such permission be granted and loyal and earnest services as Dean for the past fifteen years in Law Schools of the United States.

DEAN OF THE MEDICAL SCHOOL. -- Dr. Randall reported for the Medical Committee of the Board on the activities of that Committee in cal School. The Medical Committee recommended to the Board the appoint-

ment of Dr. John W. Spics, who has recently returned from Bombay, India, as Dean of the Medical School and Professor of Public Health. The Committee recommended further that Doctor Spies be given a leave of absence with pay until January 1, 1939 in order that he may visit and study other medical schools in the United States. The Committee recommended that Doctor Spies' appointment become effective Movember 1, 1938, and that, because of the international reputation and experience of Doctor Spies, and of his research, particularly on cancer, his salary be at the rate of \$10,000 for twelve months.

The Committee's recommendation included also the appointment of Dr. Tom Spies, of Cincinnati, Chio, a brother of Dr. John Spies, as Distinguished Professor of Medical Research at a salary rate of \$6,500 for twelve months, with the understanding that the appointment will become effective at such time as it is possible for Doctor Spies to report for duty. Dr. Tom Spies is an honor graduate of Harvard Medical School and is a nationally known research specialist in the field of malnutrition, with particular emphasis on pellagra.

Dr. Randall reported that Mr. Calhoun concurred in these recommendations. On motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Dr. Morgan, the Board approved these recommendations of its Medical Committee.

Dr. John Spies, who was in Austin, was then invited before the Eoord and informed of the action of the Board. Doctor Spies stated that he would accept the position tendered him and expressed his great appreciation for the appointments.

The Medical Committee recommended that Dr. B. M. Hendrix be continued as Acting Dean at his present salary (\$6,000 for twelve months) until January 1, 1939, when Dr. John Spies will take up his duties in Calveston as Dean.

HOGG ESTATE MATTERS. -- Major Parten stated that he was informed that Miss Ima Hogg and Mr. Mike Hogg would like to confer with a committee from the Board on the matter of the disposition of the remainder of the estate of Mr. Will C. Hogg. On motion of Dr. Morgan, seconded by Mr. Stark, the Board authorized and requested its Medical Committee and Mr. Waggener to confer with Miss Hogg and Mr. Hogg at an early date

LAND COMMITTEE MATTERS .--

Aerial Survey of University Lands. -- Dr. Morgan reported that some conferences had been held with Monorable R. Ewing Thomason, Representative from the Sixteenth Congressional District of Texas to the United States Congress, concerning assistance by the Federal Government through the War Department, in making an aerial, photographic survey of University lands in West Texas. With the concurrence of the Land Committee, Dr. Morgan presented the following resolution, which was adopted by the Board on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild

WHEREAS, The State of Texas has set aside and dedicated to the use and benefit of The University of Texas 2,000,000 acres of land, 1,000,000 acres of which was appropriated out of the public domain of the State and set apart for the use and benefit of the University by the State Constitution of 1876, and 1,000,000 acres of which land was set apart by an act of the Legislature of the State of Texas dated April 10, 1883, and

WHEREAS, The title and ownership of said land is in the name of the State of Texas, but said lands have been dedicated to the exclusive use and benefit of The University of Texas, a State institution of higher learning, for educational purposes, and

WHEREAS, The Board of Regents of The University of Toxas as the governing body of said institution, has been invested by law with the sole and exclusive management and control of said lands, and

WHEREAS, The Regents of The University of Texas are public officers charged with the duty of the management and control of The University of Texas and its property, and

WEREAS, The Board of Regents deems it advisable and necessary to procure and have made an aerial photographic survey of said lands, and

MIEREAS, Said 2,000,000 acres of land which has been set agart as an endowment and permanent fund for the use and benefit of The University of Texas is situated and located in the western part of the State of Texas and within the boundaries of the Eighth Corps Area of the United States Army and said lands having tremendous potential value as petroleum reservoirs and potash and other mineral producing values necessary for the National Defense, and

located within 150 miles of the international boundary line between the United States and the Republic of Mexico, making such lands by reason of such location a necessary part of any program for the National Defense and for any program promulgated by the landgration Department of the Federal Government, and

WIRMAS, Said lands are situated along regularly designated air lanes traversed by both military and commercial aircrafts, the lands in Hudspeth, Culberson, and Andrews Counties are traversed by or adjacent to the present El Paso-Ballas route of the American Airways, and the lands situated in Pecos, Terrell, and Crockett Counties will be traversed by or adjacent to a proposed El Paso-San Antonio air line making such lands advantageously situated for emergency landing fields and air ports for military as well as commercial purposes, and

WHEREAS, The present and past production of gas and oil on these lands has brought in large and substantial sums of money to The University of Texas and the producers of said minerals resulting in the collection of a large amount of income and other taxes directly and indirectly by the Federal Government, and

WEREAS, The Federal Government has done and will do a great amount of work in this territory and in connection with the University lands with reference to geodetic surveys, and

WHEREAS, It would be to the great benefit and advantage both to the State of Texas, The University of Texas, and the Federal Covernment to have made a "photographic aerial survey" of said lands and surrounding territory for the purpose of having compiled an "aerial photographic topographic map" of said lands and territory, and

WHEREAS, The Board of Regents of The University of Texas is not in a position by reason of lack of equipment, personnel, and finances to make such a survey, without the cooperation of the United States Government, and

WHERRIS, The Federal Government is equipped and able to do said work by and through the United States Army Air Corps, and

WHEREAS, Such a survey would be to the mutual advantage and benefit of both the Federal Government and The University of Texas, calling for the cooperation of the Federal Government with and the Secretary of Texas acting by and through the War Department and the Secretary of War and the Board of Regents, respectively,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That negotiations be entered into by the Board of Regents acting by and through its partment of the United States Government and the Secretary of War for the purpose of bringing about a mutual understanding, cooperamade an aerial photographic topographic survey of making or having lands situated in the Western part of the State of Texas. The with the War Department to the extent of sharing in the expense development of pictures, and any other reasonable and necessary exgraphic Division of the Air Service of the United States Army.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a certified copy of this resolution be furnished by the Secretary of this Board to the Secretary of War for his information and advice.

Lease No. 474; Group No. 1 Oil Corporation.--Dr. Morgan reported that on June 25, 1938, the Board had granted Lease No. 474 to the Group No. 1 Oil Corporation with the understanding that the lease that the lease as finally completed carries a different acreage from that reported on June 25. The let covers 3,103.6 acres in Reagan county and carries an annual rental of twenty cents per acre, payable annually in the amount of \$620.72. The lease is for a period of five years beginning July 1, 1938. The acreage included in the lease is as follows: 320.6 acres in Section 1 and 36.4 acres in Section 2, Block 8; 257.8 acres in Section 35, 652.5 acres in Section 36; 530.1 acres in Section 15, 21.1 acres in Section 21, 639.3 acres in Section 22, and 645.8 acres in Section 23, Block 9. On the recommendation of the Land Committee and on motion of Mr. Stark seconded by Mrs. Faircution by the Chairman.

Lease No. 481; T. A. Kincaid. -- Dr. Morgan presented the recommendation of Mr. Compton and the Land Committee that Lease No. 481 be granted to Mr. T. A. Kincaid on 10,121.7 acres of land in Upton County for a period of ten years beginning January 1, 1939. The lease carries an annual rental of twenty cents per acre, payable \$1,012.17 semi-annually. The lease covers the following acreage: 207.8 acres in Section 1, 645.8 acres in Section 2, 643.7 acres in Section 3, 647.8 acres in Section 4, 647.8 acres in Section 5, 298.9 acres in Section 6, 374.7 acres in Section 7, 647.8 acres in Section 8, 647.8 acres in Section 10, 647.8 acres in Section 11, 450.5 acres in Section 12, 526.2 acres in Section 13, 647.8 acres in Section 14, 647.8 acres in Section 15, 647.8 acres in Section 16, 647.8 acres in Section 17, and 645 acres in Section 18, Block 15; less 148.9 acres for highway and railway rights-of-way. This recommendation was approved by the Board on motion of Mrs. Fairchild, seconded by Mr.

On the recommendation of Mr. Compton and the Land Committee, the Board reduced the semi-annual rental due January 1, 1939, on Lease No. 481 from \$1,012.17 to \$939.75, because of an over-payment last year on Lease No. 342. This recommendation was approved by the Board on motion of Mrs. Fairchild, seconded by Mr. Stark.

Assignment of Portion of Lease No. 383.—Dr. Morgan presented the recommendation of Mr. Compton and the land Committee that 3,800 acres out of Lease No. 383 known as "The East Bob Owens Pasture" be assigned from Mr. Dolph Briscoe to Mr. E. H. Shafer. This recommendation was approved by the Board on motion of Mrs. Fairchild, seconded by Mr. Stark.

Cancellation of Assignment of Portion of Lease No. 383.—Dr. Morgan presented the recommendation of Mr. Compton and the Land Committee that the assignment of 3,800 acres out of Lease No. 383 from Mr. Dolph Briscoe to Mr. E. H. Shafer be cancelled as of January 1, 1959. The purpose of this cancellation is to permit the making of a new lease to Mr. Shafer on this acreage. The acreage assigned from Lease No. 383 was 3,800, but Mr. Friend's survey of this tract showed only 3,753.4 acres. As a result, the new lease (No. 482) is for 3,753.4 acres. On motion of Mrs. Fairchild, seconded by Mr. Stark, the Board approved the recommendation of the Committee to cancel this assignment.

Lease No. 482; E. H. Shafer.—Dr. Morgan presented the recommendation of Mr. Compton and the Land Committee that Mr. E. H. Shafer be granted Lease No. 482 on 3,753.44 acres of land in Crockett County at an annual rental of twenty-six cents per acre, payable \$487.94 semi-annually. The lease is for a period of ten years beginning January 1, 1959. The acreage included in the lease is as follows: 255.5 acres in Section 3, 478.6 acres in Section 4, 605.44 acres in Section 7, 302 acres in Section 8, 400.8 acres in Section 13, 604.6 acres in Section 14, 603.8 acres in Section 17, 455.1 acres in Section 18, 27.9 acres in Section 23, and 39.7 acres in Section 24, Block 39. This recommendation was approved by the Board on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild.

Extension of Lease No. 355; White and Baker.--Dr. Morgan presented a recommendation from Mr. Compton and the Land Committee that Lease No. 355 to Messrs. White and Baker be extended from January 1, 1938, to December 31, 1939. This extension is in consideration of improvements to the extent of \$8,000 which Mr. Baker has placed on the lease in line with an agreement made between Mr. Baker and the Land Committee of the Board in 1932. On motion of Dr. Aynesworth, seconded by Mr. Stark, the Board approved the recommendation of the Land Committee. (See correction, page 32.)

Request of C. B. Becton for Lease. -- Dr. Morgan recalled that at the September 29 meeting a request had been presented from Mr. C. B. Becton for permission to lease directly from the Board a grazing lease (Mo. 383) which he now is subleasing from Mr. Dolph Briscoe, which lease will expire on June 30, 1940. Mr. Compton and the Land Committee recommended that Mr. Briscoe be advised that the Board does not desire to enter into an agreement on this land until about the time the present lease expires. The Committee further pointed out that this land joins to use the land at the expiration of the present lease in connection with the station. On motion of Mrs. Fairchild, seconded by Mr. Stark, the Board approved this recommendation of the Land Committee.

Extension of Lease No. 344; Sam C. Arnett.--Dr. Morgan presented the recommendation of Mr. Compton and the Land Committee that Lease No. 344 to Mr. Sam C. Arnett be extended for a period of one year Mr. Arnett desires the extension of time in order to determine more about the possibilities of oil development on the land before he takes a new ten-year lease. The Board approved this recommendation of the Land Committee on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild.

MINERAL LEASE SALES. -- Dr. Aynesworth presented for the information of the Board the following tabulation showing the bonuses received on each of the eight public auction sales of oil and gas leases on University lands.

Comptroller, was instructed to file an application with the Public
Works Administration for an additional grant allotment on the Home
Economics Institutional Laboratory (PWA Docket 2465-F), in view of

The Board of Regents of The University of Texas met in regular session in the office of the President at 9:30 Saturday morning, December 10, 1938, with the following present: Regents Randall (Chairman), Aynesworth, Blackert, Fairchild, Morgan, Parten, Stark, Waggener, and Weinert; President Calhoun, Comptroller Simmons, and Secretary Haynes.

CORRECTION AND APPROVAL OF MINUTES.—The Secretary called attention to the paragraph headed "Texas Union Budget for 1938-39" on page 9 of the mimeographed minutes for the meeting of the Board held on November 10, 1938, and requested permission to correct the last sentence by striking out the words "as set out on page four of the President's supplementary docket for September 29" and inserting in lieu thereof "for 1938-39 as recommended by the President. (A copy of the budget is attached to these minutes.)" The Secretary explained that the copy of the budget for the Texas Union which was recommended to the Board of Regents for the November 10 meeting differed slightly from that attached to the docket for the September 29 meeting and that the purpose of this correction was to have the revised form, which follows, approved.

PROPOSED NEW HOSPITAL BUNDING, MEDICAL SCHOOL. -- Doctor Rendall reported that the will of Mrs. Jennie Sealy Smith made provision
for the erection of a new hospital tilding in memory of her husband,
Mr. R. Waverley Smith. Doctor Randall States hat the Sealy and Smith
Foundation for the John Sealy Hospital to proceed at once toward the construction of this building. After a brief discussion, the
Board voted, on motion of Mr. Weinert seconded by Mr. Stark, to authwith the Sealy and Smith Foundation, the matter of the location of the
mendations at a subsequent meeting of the Board.

Doctor Randall stated that the Sealy and Smith Foundation will probably desire to use Dr. L. R. Wilson, Superintendent of the John Sealy Hospital, as Consultant on the hospital building and Mr. Robert Leon White as Architect. The Medical Committee of the Board refor the period of time necessary for the preparation of plans and

specifications and the erection of the hospital if the Sealy and Smith Foundation requests that he be granted a leave of absence for this purpose. The leave will be effective as of such date as the Sealy and Smith Foundation may need Mr. White to begin his services with them. On motion of Doctor Morgan, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild, the Board voted to authorize the President to make provision to lend Mr. White as Architect the Sealy and Smith Foundation on the request of the Foundation and to authorize the President to make suitable provision for Mr. White's classes in the Department of Architecture during such time as he may be on leave of absence from the University.

MEDICAL BULIETIN. -- Doctor Aynesworth discussed briefly the need for a medical bulletin to be published monthly by the Medical School of the University and the John Sealy Hospital. On the recommendation of the Medical Committee and on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Doctor Morgan, the Board authorized the establishment of such a bulletin with the understanding that the Medical School will share the expenses of the bulletin with the John Sealy Hospital up to a maximum contribution of \$1,000 a year.

The Board spent the remainder of the morning session considering a report of its Presidential Committee.

Doctor Randall, Doctor Aynesworth, and Mr. Weinert returned to their homes at noon. Major Parten, as Vice-Chairman of the Board, presided at the afternoon session.

ROUTINE ITEMS APPROVED. --Mr. Calhoun presented his docket of December 10, containing certain recommendations for the consideration of the Board. He recommended also that permission be granted Dr. John Spies for out-of-state travel during a period of approximately two months from November 10 in order that he may visit and study other medical schools and hospitals. Permission for this study had been included in the action of the Board on November 10 when Doctor Spies was elected Dean of the Medical School. On motion of Doctor Morgan, seconded by Mr. Stark, the Board voted to approve the recommendations of Mr. Calhoun contained in his docket of December 10, to the heading "For Information Only," on page 3, and the recommendation for out-of-state travel permission for Doctor Spies. A copy of the docket follows:

PROPOSED LOAN FROM THE COMMISSION OF THE VOLUNTEER ARMY OF THE MAR ATTH SPAIR. -- Mr. Calhoun reported that he had a visit recently from Jr. J. B. Derden, Acting Department Commander of the United Spanis War Veterons of Texas, who called attention to House Bill 780, Chapter 304, of the Forty-fourth Legislature, Regular Session (page 1052 of the Acts of the Forty-fourth/Legislature), appropriating from the General Revenue Fund of the State the sum of \$1,968.15, which had been on deposit in the State Treasury on February 7, 1914, and which had been trensferred that day to the General Revenue Fund. This amount conscituted the unclaimed portion of an appropriation of the United States Government for payment to the members of the Texas National Guard who served an the War with Spain in 1898. House Bill 363, Chapter 341, Acts of the Forty-fourth Legislature, authorized the investment of this sum "in bonds and/or securities of The University of Texas." Mr. Calhoun recommended to the Board that the University issue a note, or notes, in the amount of \$5,000 to be secured by a lion on the net operating income derived from the operation of the Home Economics Institutional Laboratory (PWA Docket, Texas, 2465-F). This note, or these notes, would be issued under the authority of Senate Bill No. 9, these notes, would be issued under the authority or senate bill no. y, Chapter 5, Acts of the Forty-third Legislature, Second Called Session, and would then be purchased with the appropriation of 24,968.15 referred to above, with the Commission of the Volunteer Army of the War with Spain adding enough to the appropriation to make it an even \$5,000. Mr. Calhoun proposed that the note or notes bear interest at the rate of three per cent. On motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild, the Board voted to approve this recommendation of Mr. Calhoun, subject to the approval of the Attorney General and the State

LAND COMMITTEE MATTERS .--

Extension of Easement No. 77; Hayden Miles. -- Doctor Morgan presented the recommendation of Mr. Compton and the Land Committee that Easement No. 77, a sand, gravel and clay permit issued to Mr. Hayden Miles, be extended for a period of twelve months beginning September 30, 1938. This recommendation was approved by the Board on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild.

Permission for Geophysical Exploration. -- Doctor Morgan presented the recommendation of Doctor Bybee and the Land Committee that the lands indicated in the following addenda be opened for geophysical and geological exploration for the respective periods indicated. This recommendation was approved by the Board on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Mr. Waggener.

### ADDENDA UNIVERSITY LANDS

Certain blocks in Andrews, Crane and Ector, Pecos, Reagan, Upton, Irion, Schleicher, Crockett, and Terrell Counties, Texas, are to be opened to geological and geophysical inspection upon the following conditions:

1. The Board of Regents of The University of Texas has authorized its Land Office at 408 Thomas Building, Midland, Texas, to grant permits for geological and geophysical inspection of the following blocks at times indicated below:

Andrews County: Blocks 1-14, inclusive. January 1 to December 31, 1939.

Crane and Ector Counties: Blocks 30, 31, and 35. January 1 to December 31, 1939.

Pecos County: Blocks 16-28, inclusive. May 1 to December 31, 1939.

Reagan, Upton, Trion, Schleicher, and Crockett Counties: Blocks 1 to 13, inclusive; 29 to 33, inclusive; and 38 to 58, inclusive. May 1 to December 31, 1939.

Terrell County: Blocks 34, 35, 36, and 37. May 1 to December 31, 1939.

- 2. Any type of geophysical dil prospecting instrument may be used upon these lands during the term of the prospecting period, but all prospecting parties shall be responsible to the surface lessees for damages done to houses, fences, live stock, tanks, other improvements or the surface of these lands.
- 3. All parties desiring to prospect with geophysical instruments on any or all of the above mentioned blocks are required to make application therefor in writing to the University Land Office, Geological Department, Midland, Texas.
- 4. Each Permittee shall be obligated to pay in advance to The University of Texas a fee of \$150.00 per crew for each 15-day period in which Permittee operates within the time limit of said Permit. The University shall employ an inspector for each crew, who shall protect the interest of all parties.
- 5. Each prospector or Permittee shall be required to finish his prospecting within the time limit above stated, and shall take an obligation to the University to file with its Land Office at Midland, Texas, within seven (7) days after the expiration date of the permit, a certified general map showing the approximate location of the shot or station points used in such survey, surface elevation of such station points or shot holes, the depths to which holes or wells are drilled upon the

station points, if drilled, signifying water sands encountered, if any, together with a statement certified by an authorized representative covering the truth and fact of such information given.

Forms of application for permits may be secured by addressing the University Land Office, P. O. Box 1663, Geological Department, Midland, Texas.

Lease No. 483; Ralph Pembrook .-- Doctor Morgan presented the recommendation of Mr. Compton and the Land Committee that a lease be granted to Mr. Ralph Pembrook on 19,515.2 acres of land in Reagar and Crockett Counties at an annual rental of twenty-six cents per acre for a period of ten years beginning January 1, 1939. This lease succeeds Loase No. 343, which will expire on December 31, 1938. The new lease provides for semi-annual payments of \$2,536.98, payable on January 1 and July 1 of each year. The acreage included in the new lease is as follows: all of Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 9, 10, and 11, 275.9 acres in Section 6, 354.8 acres in Section 12, 354.8 acres in Section 13, 354.8 acres in Section 14, 615.5 acres in Section 15, 639.4 acres in Section 16, 10.7 acres in Section 17, .7 acres in Section 18, 17.6 acres in Section 19, .2 acres in Section 20, and 3.3 acres in Section 21, Block 7; Sections 19, 20, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33 and 34, 2.7 acres in Section 16, 21.4 acres in Section 17, 43.1 acres in Section 15, 637.2 acres in Section 21, 650.1 acres in Section 22, 625.6 acres in Section 23, 639.6 acres in Section 26, and 640.9 acres in Section 35, Block 8; 45.4 acres in Section 13, 394.7 acres in Section 24, 253.3 acres in Section 25, and 90 acres in Section 36, Block 11; 21.3 acres in Section 6, 21.3 acres in Section 7, and 10.9 acres in Section 18, Block 12. The Board approved this lease on motion of Mr. Stark,

Extension of Lease No. 355; White and Baker. -- Doctor Morgan called attention to the fact that Lease No. 355 does not expire until lease approved by the Board at the November 10 meeting would be for the Stark, seconded by Mr. Waggener, the Board authorized this correction in the November 10, 1938 minutes.

Leases on Cotton Estate Lands. -- Doctor Morgan presented two tate. He presented the recommendation of the Land Committee that these leases be approved by the Board subject to their approval as to H. This lease was to and provided a consideration of \$120 per annum, payable one half on pective years.

The second lease was to Mr. Ord Gary for a period of three years, beginning January 1, 1939, and provided for a payment of \$3,000 land implied in the lease which is capable of cultivation during the years 1940 and 1941, with a minimum rental per annum of \$3,000 for not less than 150 acres. The payments were to be made one half on or before January 2 and one half on or before November 15 of the respective additional two-year period at a consideration to be agreed upon by the

parties to the lease. The lease provided that the lessor, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas, was to pay all irrigation water charges assessed against said land during the term of the lease. Doctor Morgan stated that he had been advised that in the past these charges had averaged about \$800 a year. A description of the land included in the lease follows: 21.77 acres, lying north of First Street; 24.363 acres, lying between First and Fourth Streets; 29.485 acres, lying between Fourth Street and the Franklin Canal; 1.959 acres, and 2.537 acres, out of the 3.804 acre tract at the corner of Eleventh Street and Park Street; approximately 35 acres out of the 40.849 acre tract lying between the Franklin Canal and Eleventh Street; 8.121 acres off of the Werchant-Thomas Survey, lying west and along the Southwestern Railway Spur; 3.756 acres, lying between said Spur Track and Franklin Canal, bounded on the north by Second Street and on the south by Fourth Street; all that portion of the 125.413 acre tract, Merchant-Thomas Survey, north of the Peyton Packing Company and the 6.355 acre tract owned by E. P. Waud, lying between the said El Paso and Southwestern Railway Spur and the boundary line between the United States and Mexico, except approximately ten acres in the extreme north end, shown on said

On motion of Mrs. Fairchild, seconded by Mr. Stark, the Board approved these two leases on the Cotton Estate property.

Doctor Morgan reported to the Board on negotiations with the Cameron Cattle Company concerning a proposed lease of a part of the Cotton Estate property in Hudspeth and Culberson Counties. He said he believed the entire tract could be leased to the Cameron Cattle Company at an annual rental of Text per acre. He said it might be possible to obtain a larger rental if certain portions of the land were omitted from the lease. On the recommendation of the land Committee and on motion of Mr. Waggener, seconded by Mr. Stark, the Board referred this proposed lease to President Wiggins with power to act. The lease is not to be executed for a consideration less than Text per acre per year. President Wiggins is to use his judgment as to whether to accept the lease on the entire acreage or to attempt to get a higher rental on the majority of the tract but with certain portions of it omitted from the lease.

MINERALOGIC-PALEONTOLOGIC SURVEY OF TEXAS.--Mr. Calhoun presented a letter from Professor E. H. Sellards, Director of the Bureau of Economic Geology, recommending that that Bureau be authorized to cooperate with the Works Progress Administration in a mineralogic-paleon tologic survey of Texas. The contribution to be made by the University would include: (1) working space for certain Works Progress Administration workers connected with the headquarters unit of the project, (2) supervision by members of the present University staff, and (3) salary and travel expense of the sponsors' representatives in connection with the supervision of the project. On motion of Senator Blackert, seconded by Mr. Stark, the Board authorized Mr. Calhoun to take such steps as may be needed in going forward with this project under the sponsorship of the Bureau of Economic Geology.

CHANGES IN MEN'S DORMIT'ORY PLANS .-- Mr. Simmons reminded the Board that when bids were taken for the Men's Dormitory, Unit 3 (PWA Docket Texas 9107-F) the construction contracts ran somewhat higher than had been estimated and, as a result, there was not left in the total allotment for the project a sufficient amount of money to equip the dormitory properly. He stated that Mrs. H. J. Lutcher Stark had proposed to furnish a large lobby on the first floor of the dormitory if the construction plans for the building could be changed sufficiently to provide such a room. Mrs. Stark desired to make this gift to the University in memory of her father, Dr. Homer Hill, who was for many years Physician for the various University athletic teams. Mr. Simmons reported that certain other changes in the construction plans appeared to be necessary and desirable and said that Mr. White had secured preliminary quotations from the contractors, indicating that the total cost of the changes would approximate \$3,280. Mr. Simmons suggested that the architect be authorized to prepare specifications and plans for the following changes:

- 1. Provision for a lobby on the first floor.
- 2. Provision for rooms for two coaches.
- 5. Provision for a buzzer signal system.
- 4. Necessary changes in the heating and distribution system.

On the recommendation of Messrs. Farten and Stark and on motion of Mrs. Fairchild seconded by Doctor Morgan, the Board authorized these changes in the construction plans subject to the receipt from the contractors of actual proposals which are not materially out of line with the preliminary proposals and subject to the approval of the Public Works Administration.

On motion of Mrs. Fairchild, seconded by Mr. Waggener, the Board voted to express its thanks to Mrs. Stark for her very generous offer to make this gift to the University.

COTTON BOWL ASSOCIATION. -- Mr. Stark reported that the Board had, in a vote by mail, approved the proposed organization of the Cotton Bowl Association. The proposed organization had been approved by the University Athletic Council and by the Southwest Conference last summer. On motion of Doctor Morgan, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild, the Board voted to ratify its mail vote approving the following proposed organization. Senator Blackert asked to be recorded as voting No on this motion.

## COTTON BOWL GAME

- 1. This program is to be in effect for a period of three years, from September 1, 1938 to September 1, 1941.
- 2. Control of the Cotton Bowl Association is to be placed in the hands of a Board of Directors of twenty-one men to be selected by the Conference institutions, and the President of the Conference and the President of the Business Managers' to nominate three members of the Board of Directors.)
- 3. Active directorship of the Association between sessions of the Board of Directors shall be in the hands of an Executive Committee of five men to be selected by the Board from its membership, including the President of the Conference and the President of the Association of Business Managers. (Dan Rogers is to be requested to serve as temporary Chairman.)
- 4. The Conference is to invite the Championship team of the current season to act as host team for the Cotton Bowl game. Should this team be unable to accept the invitation, the Conference will invite the runner-up team to act as host, etc.
- 5. The Executive Committee of the Association is to select the opposing team subject to the approval of the Conference host institution. The net proceeds of the Cotton Bowl game shall be split up as follows, until such time as the Association Conference host team, 33-1/3% to the selected opposing team, 25% to the Association, 8-1/3% to the Selected opposing team, 25% Bowl game be adopted as a Conference institution, any accumulated surplus at the date shall be divided: 50% to the Conference and
- 6. The Association is to assume all risks of underwriting the Cotton Bowl game as provided in the report of the

ARCHITECT FOR FINE ARTS MUSEUM. -- After a brief discussion, the Board, on motion of Senator Blackert seconded by Doctor Morgan, authorized Mr. Stark to confer with Mr. John F. Staub, of Houston, concerning his employment as Architect to design and prepare plans and specifications for museum cases and for such other services as may be necessary at this time in connection with preparation for the housing and displaying of the Stark Fine Arts Collection.

The Secretary was handed the following minutes, prepared by Mr. Leslie Waggener at the request of the Board, covering a special meeting of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas held in the Office of the President, at Austin, on December 4, 1938. Mr. Waggener advised the Secretary that these minutes had been submitted to each member of the Board of Regents except Senator Blackert, who had been out of the State for some time, and that each had expressed his approval

Dr. Edward Randall, Chairman of the Committee of four, composed of himself, Dr. K. H. Aynesworth, Messrs. J. R. Parten, and Leslie Waggener, designated by the Board of Regents to investigate and report, from time to time, its recommendations as to men thought worthy of consideration for the Presidency of The University of Texas, reported:

That, during the past twenty months, the above named committee the Board of Regents as a whole, the Faculty Advisory Committee, and the Ex-Students' Advisory Committee, had--by correspondence and personal visitation--given careful consideration to a large number of distinguished educators of all sections of the country:

That said Committee found itself in unanimous agreement in recommending to the Board of Regents that the Presidency of The University be tendered to Dr. Homer P. Rainey, at an annual salary of \$17,500, with a suitable residence provided, free of cost to him:

That the Faculty Advisory Committee, composed of the following gentlemen: Messrs. H. T. Parlin (Chairman), E. C. Barker, A. P. Brogan, J. Alton Burdine, W. A. Felsing, B. F. Pittenger, C. W. Ramsdell, Fred C. Ayer, W. R. Woolrich, J. Anderson Fitzgerald, and Bryant Smith, had filed a written report, signed by each member, stating that in its judgment Dr. Homer P. Rainey was well qualified, from every standpoint, to serve as President of The University of Texas, and that his selection by the Board of Regents would meet with its hearty approval;

That the Committee of Ex-Students, Messrs. Hulon Black, Hines H. Baker, and W. H. Richardson, designated by the Ex-Students' Association, and Governor Dan Moody and Judge R. L. Bobbitt, distinguished alumni, designated by the Board of Regents, had filed a written report, signed by each member, stating that in its judgment Dr. Homer P. Rainey was well qualified, from every standpoint, to serve as President of The University of Texas, and that his selection by the Board of Regents would meet with its hearty approval.

Lutcher Stark, the Committee Report--recommending that the Presidency of The University of Texas, on the terms set out above, be tendered to Dr. Homer P. The Board of Regents of The University of Texas met in regular session in the Office of the President at 9:45 Saturday morning, January 14, 1939, with the following present: Regents Randall (Chairman), Aynesworth, Fairchild, Morgan, Parten, Stark, Waggener, and Weinert; President Calhoun, Comptroller Simmons, and Secretary Haynes. Absent: Regent

APPROVAL OF MINUTES. The minutes of the meeting of December 10, 1938, were approved, in the form in which they had been mimeographed and distributed to the members of the Board, on motion of Mr. Stark, seconded by Major Parten.

ROUTINE ITEMS APPROVED. -- Mr. Calhoun presented his docket of January 7 and called particular attention to certain of his recommendations, including the appointment of Mr. Roger J. Williams as Professor of Chemistry at a salary of \$5,000 for nine months beginning September 15, 1939 (item 5, page 1). Mr. Calhoun said that Mr. Williams understood that this appointment was subject to the provisions of the Legislative Appropriation Bill for the Biennium beginning September 1, 1939.

Mr. Calhoun requested permission to add the following item to his recommendations:

School of Business Administration

Grant permission to Dr. J. Anderson Fitzgerald,
Dean of the School of Business Administration, to go to
California, April 14-29, 1939, to attend the meetings of
the American Association of Collegiate Schools of Business,
April 20-22, and to visit some of the Pacific Coast Institutions, his expenses to be paid from the Office and Traveling
Expenses of the Dean account in the 1938-39 budget for the
School of Business Administration.

On motion of Major Parten, seconded by Mr. Stark, the Board voted to approve Mr. Calhoun's recommendations contained in his docket of January 7 to the heading "Other Matters to Come Before the Board," on page 3, and to grant permission to Dean Fitzgerald to make the trip referred to above.

After a brief discussion, the Board voted, on motion of Doctor Morgan seconded by Mr. Stark, to request the President to insert in his docket recommendations in the future the reasons for which staff members are permitted to be absent from the campus. The docket follows:

BUDGET CHANGES. -- I recommend approval of the following changes in the budgets for 1938-39 and 1939-40, as indicated:

## Main University and Extramural Divisions

Office of the President

1. Appoint Mrs. Frances Little McMath as Secretary to the President for the period beginning January 1, 1939, and ending May 31, 1939, inclusive, at a salary rate of \$225 per month, this appointment to be regarded as an emergency appointment due to the fact that the new President-elect is supposed to take office on June 1 and the Legislature will be in session during most of the time between now and that date.

Botany and Bacteriology

2. Appoint Mr. Orville Wyss as Instructor in Botany and Bacteriology for the Second Semester of the current Long Session only, at a salary of \$1,000 for the Semester.

Chemistry and Chemical Engineering

3. Appoint Mr. Judson Swearingen as Assistant Professor of Chemical Engineering at a salary rate of \$2,400 for nine months, effective February 1, 1939.

4. Appropriate the sum of \$1,200 from the 1938-39 Main University Unappropriated Balance to the 1938-39 budget for the Department of Chemistry and Chemical Engineering to cover the appointment of Mr. Swearingen as Assistant Professor of Chemical Engineering beginning February 1, 1939.
