

U.T. SYSTEM: REPORT OF CONTINUANCE OF SYSTEM-WIDE COMPREHENSIVE DISAPPEARANCE, -DISHONESTY, AND DESTRUCTION INSURANCE POLICY. -- In accordance with Article 6003b, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes and the Board of Regents' authorization of May, 1967, The University of Texas System-wide Comprehensive Disappearance, Dishonesty, and Destruction Insurance Policy has been continued in effect. As of June 1, 1976, the policy with Hartford Insurance Company has been renewed and is continuous until canceled. Premiums have been prorated among the various component institutions of The University of Texas System.

U.T. SYSTEM: REPORT OF RENEWAL OF SYSTEM-WIDE INSURANCE COVERAGE FOR OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES ARISING FROM THE USE AND OPERATION OF UNIVERSITY OWNED MOTOR VEHICLES. -- In accordance with Article 6252-19a, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, a system-wide Motor Vehicle Liability Insurance Policy for officers and employces of The U.T. System, arising from the use and operation of University owned motor vehicles, has been in effect since July 1, 1970. The policy each year has been renewed with the Royal Globe Insurance Company or one of its affiliate companies as approved by the State Board of Insurance and Attorney General. The policy has been renewed effective September 1, 1976, subject to the approval of the State Board of Insurance and Attorney General. Premiums for this policy will be prorated among the various component institutions of The University of Texas System.

U.T. SYSTEM: REPORT OF AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS LIABILITY POLICY TO THE CONTINENTAL CASUALTY COMPANY. -- Upon recommendation of System Administration, the Board authorized the award of a contract to Continental Casualty Company for a system-wide Directors and Officers Liability Insurance Policy. This policy includes coverage for members of the Board of Regents and all U.T. employees. The award was made on the basis of the proposal submitted through ANCO/The Anderson Company of Houston for the period April 1, 1976 to April 1, 1979. Maximum coverage is \$10,000,000 with a \$5,000 deductible on each claim and a three year premium of \$78,019.88. The premium has been prorated among all U.T. System institutions.

APPROVAL OF INSTRUCTOR OF CREDITED COURSE OFFERED BY THE ASSOCIATION OF RELIGIOUS TEACHERS: In accord with our currently established procedures, the Biblical Studies Committee chaired by Professor Marcia Herndon has recommended that Mr. Richard A. Spencer be approved to teach for the Church of Christ Bible Chair effective September, 1976. I recommend approval.

SPECIAL PARACRAPHS:

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS MODIFICATION: In its recommendation for the Parking and Traffic Regulations in 1976-77, the Parking and Traffic Committee recommended a revision of the regulations which eliminated the option of requesting an alternate parking permit. Those regulations were approved in the Regents' docket of May 14, 1976, pages A-16 through A-28. Since the announcement of that decision, the committee has received numerous complaints about hardships that would result from restricting each permit holder to a set of permits for only one vehicle. When an alternate car was brought to campus, the permit holder would be required to stop at the gate for a temporary permit. The committee has recommended a modification in the policies as set forth in the docket of May 14, 1976. Based upon the use of a small portable ID card, this system will enable each permit holder to gain access to campus by more than one vehicle and at the same time assure that only one vehicle by the same permit holder is parked on campus at any given time. The committee for 1976-77 will be asked to review this system and comment upon its effectiveness before recommending the policy for 1977-78. I recommend approval of this new alternate permit system as a part of the 1976-77 Parking and Traffic Regulations.

PLEDGE TO ENDOW THE WALTER PRESCOTT WEBB PROFESSORSHIP: Following is an Agreement by and between C. B. Smith, Sr., and the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System by which Mr. Smith transfers and assigns all right, title and interest he has in a \$100,000 Certificate of Deposit at the American National Bank to endow the Walter Prescott Webb Scholarship. The document has been executed by Deputy Chancellor E. D. Walker.

WHEREAS, Donor, by letter dated December 18, 1975, addressed to Chancellor Charles LeMaistre, pledged the sum of not less than One Hundred Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$100,000.00) to endow the Walter Prescott Webb Professorship;

WHEREAS, Donor has purchased a Certificate of Deposit at the American National Bank, of Austin, Texas, (hereinafter called American Bank) which he proposes to use to fulfill such pledge in the event the proposed professorship is not funded on or before December 6, 1976; and

WHEREAS, the parties desire to reduce to writing an agreement relating to the funding of the Walter Prescott Webb Professorship:

NOW, THEREFORE, Know All Men By These Presents, that in consideration of the mutual benefits, and other good and valuable consideration, the parties agree as follows:

1. Donor agrees to fund and Board agrees to establish and maintain the Walter Prescott Webb Professorship at The University of Texas at Austin.

In the event of the death of the Donor or if the Donor by a transfer of his interest in the real estate contained in the offer accepted by the Board of Regents at its meeting on February 13, 1976, has not offered to fund the professorship, or if the professorship has not been funded, on or before December 6, 1976, Donor hereby authorizes the use of the above described Certificate of Deposit held for him at the American Bank for the purpose of funding the Walter Prescott Webb Professorship. Upon the failure to fund prior to this date, Donor hereby GIVES, TRANSFERS and ASSIGNS all of his right, title and interest in and to that certain Certificate of Deposit at the American Bank held for him, same being Numbered 106893, to the 189

Students majoring in Archaeological Studies must take a minimum of thirty hours in courses approved for the major by the Archaeological Studies Committee, to include the following:

1. Archaeology 301 and 302, or the equivalent crosslisted titles, Anthropology 304 and Classical Civilization 302K.

2. Two courses approved as Archaeological Techniques courses.

3. At least twelve hours (in addition to the previous requirements) in a sub-field of archaeology, as prescribed by the Archaeological Studies Committee. (Examples of the sub-fields are Classical Archaeology, Anthropological Archaeology, Pre-Columbian Archaeology, and Middle Eastern Archaeology.)

4. (This requirement may be fulfilled in whole or in part by courses taken to meet Requirement No.3.) At least one upper-division course in Anthropological Archaeology and one upper-division archaeological course in Classics or Art History.

FACULTY LEGISLATION:

Special Requirements for sub-fields in Archaeological Studies:

Anthropological Archaeology. A minimum of fifteen hours, (a) to include three hours of geology or geography, and three hours of biological science. One upper-division course in cultural anthropology may be substituted for a course in anthropological archaeology. (b) Classical Archaeology. A minimum of fifteen hours, to include six hours of Ancient History. The student, especially one who is contemplating graduate study, is strongly urged (but not required) to use Greek or Latin to fulfill the foreign language requirement for the Bachelor's degree. (c) Middle Eastern Archaeology. Three hours in Middle East-ern geography is required. Hebrew, Arabic, or Parsi are recommended (but not required) for fulfilling the foreign language requirement for the Bachelor's degree. (d) Pre-Columbian Archaeology. Courses must be taken in at least two of the following three geographical areas: the Andes, Meso-America, Anglo-America. The Student must use Spanish to fulfill the foreign language requirement for the Bachelor's degree. (e) Other. Special programs in other sub-fields may be designed where appropriate and where offerings are available, with the approval of the Archaeological Studies Committee.

Mr. Paul <u>Olum</u>, Dean of the College of Natural Sciences, has filed with the Secretary of the University Council, the Proposals to Amend the 1975-1977 Catalogue of the College of Natural Sciences of the Bachelor of Science in Chemistry degree and the Bachelor of Arts, Plan I, Computer Sciences degree. These proposed changes were approved by the faculty of the College of Natural Sciences on May 3, 1976 and should appear in the 1977-79 Catalogue of the College of Natural Sciences.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF CHEMISTRY

On page 25 of the 1975-1977 Catalogue under "Bachelor of Sciences in Chemistry, A. Prescribed Work," amend the requirements as follows:


8. A minimum of forty-one forty-two semester hours of chemistry, including: (a) General chemistry -- Chemistry 302 and 204 317; (b) organic chemistry -- Chemistry 618, 118K, and 118L (or 610, 110K, and 110L); (c) physical chemistry -- Chemistry 353, 153K, 354, or 354h; and 154K; (d) inorganic chemistry -- Chemistry 431 331 and 131K; (e) analytical chemistry -- Chemistry 435 and 376K; and (f) nine semester hours of upper-division chemistry from an approved list available from the department. At least three of these nine upper-division hours must be in a laboratory course. Students are also encouraged to satisfy their elective hours in additional chemistry courses. Each course in chemistry taken at The University of Texas at Austin and counted as satisfying the major requirement must be passed with a grade of at least C.

Reason: These changes in the requirements give a new total in the number of hours necessary for a Bachelor of Science in Chemistry degree. Changes in requirements 8(a) provide a more adequate treatment of the descriptive and synthetic inorganic chemistry in the curriculum; 8(c) require the background in quantum mechanics necessary for the theoretical and conceptual portions of CH 331; and 8(d) provide a more comprehensive inorganic curriculum.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF COMPUTER SCIENCES

On page 22 of the 1975-1977 Catalogue under "Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I," under "D. Majors," amend the requirements for the major in Computer Sciences as follows:

Major: Mathematics 808 and 311, and eighteen twenty-four semester hours of upper-division computer sciences courses, including Computer Sciences 327 and three semester hours of numerical mathematics (normally Computer Sciences 348, but the more advanced 368K or 368L are also accept-

able). A grade of C or better is required in each upper-division course offered for the major requirement. Only one Computer Sciences 370 course may be counted toward the major requirement.

Reason: This change in degree requirements increases the total number of semester hours of upper-division courses and insures greater depth in the field.

HISTORY

The University of Texas School of Nursing, established in 1890 as the John Sealy Hospitul Training School of Nurses, is one of the oldest schools of nursing in the Southwest. It was originally organized as an independent school under a Board of Lady Managers. In 1896 it was transferred to The University of Texas and became the School of Nursing, one of the divisions of the Medical Branch with the diploma granted by the University. In 1932 the name of the school was changed to the John Sealy College of Nursing. A curriculum leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Nursing was established in 1923 in co-operation with the College of Arts and Sciences of The University of Texas at Austin. This was in addition to the diploma course. In 1943 this program was transferred to the John Sealy College of Nursing.

Through the financial assistance of the Texas Graduate Nurses Association, courses for graduate nurses were first offered in 1930 in the Department of Physical and Health Education of the School of Education at The University of Texas at Austin. In 1940 a complete curriculum was established leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Nursing Education. Funds for the support of this program were given to the University by the Texas Graduate Nurses Association in the form of a scholarship fund to be used for Texas nurses. In 1945 this curriculum was transferred to the Medical Branch administration, bringing both the John Sealy College of Nursing and the newly-created Department of Nursing Education together to form the School of Nursing with its own Deau. In September, 1949, a curriculum leading to the degree of Bachetor of Science in Nursing for graduates of diploma programs was established.

Through the generosity of the W. K. Kellogg Foundation a program leading to the Master of Science in Nursing with a major in nursing service administration was offered in 1952. Participating in the program of the Southern Regional Education Board for graduate education in nursing, the School of Nursing first offered additional specialization in 1955.

In 1957 the School of Nursing admitted the last class to the diploma program. Since that time it has offered one basic program leading to a Bachelor of Science in Nursing.

In the fall of 1960, Austin became an extension compus of the School of Nursing which was still headquartered in Calveston, and nursing courses were offered on the Austin campus for the first time.

The School of Nursing was reorganized in 1967 as The University of Texas Nursing School (System-wide) and administrative offices were moved to Austin. The School was renamed The University of Texas System School of Nursing in 1972. Junior and senior level nursing courses are now offered in six locations: Austin, El Paso, Fort Worth, Galveston, Houston, and San Antonio. In Austin, El Paso, and Fort Worth, a student may enroll for four years with liberal arts courses being taken at The University of Texas at Austin, El Paso, and Arlington respec-

tively. Courses may also be transferred from any approved junior or senior college or university as in Galveston, Honston, and San Antonio. A program leading to the Doctor of Philosophy degree in nursing was initiated in 1974.

On March 26, 1976, The Board of Regents of The University of Texas System voted to reorganize the Schools of Nursing in the System and to place each school under the administration of the president of the health science center or academic institution nearest its location. On September 1, 1976, the School of Nursing at Austin becomes a school of The University of Texas at Austin.

PROGRAMS IN THE SCHOOL OF NURSING

The School of Nursing offers an undergraduate program leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Nursing and graduate programs leading to the Master of Science in Nursing degree and the Doctor of Philosophy degree. The undergraduate program is designed for students who wish to enter the profession of nursing and for students who have earned a diploma in nursing and desire to obtain the baccalaureate degree. The master's and doctoral programs are designed for nurses who hold the baccalaureate degree and wish to obtain advanced training which will prepare them as clinical specialists, teachers, administrators, and researchers.

The baccalaureate and master's programs are accredited by the National League for Nursing. The baccalaureate program is also accredited by the Board of Nurse Examiners for the State of Texas.

FACILITIES

The School of Nursing is located on the campus of The University of Texas at Austin. Learning experiences in the health field are numerous for students assigned to four general hospitals, including Holy Cross, Seton, St. David's, and Brackenridge, the city-county hospital. Bergstrom Air Force Base Hospital, the Austin State Hospital, and Shoal Creek Hospital, as well as numerous nursing homes, neighborhood health clinics, day care centers, state and local health departments, physicians' offices, and clinics are also utilized for student experience.

Housing

There are no special living arrangements for undergraduate or graduate students. Students may choose from a variety of University-owned living accommodations. For further information and an application blank, write to

STUDENT FINANCIAL AID

STUDENT FINANCIAL AID

Financial assistance may be given in the form of low interest loans, grants, scholarships, work-study, or a combination of these. Financial aid is awarded to students on the basis of need. In order to determine need in a consistent way for all aid candidates, this institution requires all parents of dependent students to submit a Family Financial Statement to the American College Testing Program (ACT). A self-supporting student is also required to submit his or her financial statement to ACT, answering only those questions pertaining to his or her and spouse's income and assets. An ACT packet may be obtained from the high school guidance counselor, the School of Nursing Offices, 1700 Red River, Austin, Texas 78701. or the Office of Student Financial Aid, P.O. Box 7958, University Station, Austin, Texas 78712. The ACT code number for The University of Texas at Austin is 4240.

The dates when applications for student financial assistance are due are as follows:

Term

Nine-month academic year—March 1 Fall semester only March 1 Spring semester only—October 1 Summer only -February 1

Students who have been awarded financial assistance will receive their money soon after the beginning of each semester. The student should make certain, however, that he has sufficient funds for initial expenses in the event there should be some delay in the disbursement of checks.

Some of the sources of financial assistance for students are as follows:

Nurse Training Act

> The Nursing Student Loan Program

> > College Work-Study Program

Hinson-Hazelwood College Student Loan Program This act authorizes funds of various types for assistance to nursing students. While some funds may be available for scholarships and trainceships, most of the assistance will be in the form of loans.

Funds are provided for low-cost loans to nursing students. The maximum total for one student for any one academic year is \$2,500 and a total of \$10,000 is the maximum amount which may be awarded to any one student for all the years in school. Loan provisions include cancellation of all or part of the loans for service in nursing under specified circumstances following graduation.

Under this program, students enrolled at least half-time meeting certain financial need criteria may be employed in campus jobs parttime while classes are in session.

Only legal residents of Texas qualify for this loan. The program requires that an applicant be enrolled or accepted for at least one-half the normal course load.

Students may borrow up to \$1,500 per academic year provided the total amount does not exceed \$7,500 at any time. Summer loans not to

exceed \$500 may be made in addition to loans made for the nine-month academic year.

Funds will be available approximately eight weeks after an application has been approved.

The Guaranteed Insured Student Loan Program

Federal Educational Opportunity Grant Program

> State Nursing Stipends

Army and Navy Nurse Corps Student Programs

> Allstate Foundation Scholarships Vocational Rehabilitation

Under this program a student may borrow as much as \$2,800 a year, not to exceed \$10,000 for all years of school, from a bank or other financial institution, although his application must first be certified by the educational institution.

This program was authorized by Title I of the Education Amendments of 1972 and provides for grants of \$1.400, less the expected family contribution, for all eligible students to assist them in meeting educational costs. To be eligible a student must be enrolled at least halftime and must be an undergraduate student. Information and an Application for Determination of Family Contribution may be obtained from the Office of Student Financial Aid, or any high school.

Enacted by the 62nd Legislature, this program provides for scholarships covering all or any part of tuition costs for students in financial need enrolled in State supported bacealaureate nursing programs.

Students in the basic nursing program may apply for appointments in the Army Student Nurse Program or the Navy Nurse Corps Candidate Program at the beginning of their junior year. The appointments carry generous financial allowance.

A student who participates twelve months or less serves on active duty in the respective service for twenty-four months. If two year's support has been given, he serves thirty-six months.

Through the generosity of the Allstate Foundation a limited number of scholarships are available for students in the basic baccalaurcate program.

The Texas Rehabilitation Commission offers assistance for tuition and nonrefundable fees to students who have certain disabling conditions provided their vocational objectives have been approved by a **TRC** counselor. Examples of such conditions are orthopedic deformities, emotional disorders, diabetes, epilepsy, heart conditions, etc. Other services are also available to assist the handicapped student to become employable. STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS

Nursing Student Organization All students enrolled in the School of Nursing at The University of Texas at Austin are eligible for membership in the Nursing Student Organization. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR STUDENTS

Alumni Association

Sigma Theta Tau

The Alumni Association of the School of Nursing was organized in 1919. The primary purpose of the organization is to further the interests of the School. Through its efforts, loan funds have been established and students have been encouraged to enter the programs of the School. The membership of approximately 3,600 ex-students is governed by an Advisory Board with nine elected representatives.

The Alpha Delta Chapter of Sigma Theta Tau, the only national honor society of nursing, was chartered at The University of Texas on May 25, 1963. There are over seventy five constituent chapters in collegiate schools of nursing accredited by the National I eague for Nursing across the nation. The purposes of Sigma Theta Tau are to recognize the achievement of superior scholarship and the development of leadership qualities, foster high professional standards, encourage creative work, and strengthen commitment on the part of individuals to the ideals and purposes of the profession of nursing.

Each year invitations to membership are extended to selected students in either the undergraduate or graduate program who range within the the upper one-third of their graduating class. From time to time faculty members and community nursing leaders may be invited to membership. Program meetings of an educational or scientific nature are held each semester.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR STUDENTS

Student Affairs 1. Insofar as possible, the conduct and regulation of student affairs, other than those relating to academic matters, shall be effected by the students acting through their own organizations and rules.

It is the responsibility of the Dean of the School of Nursing, or her delegated agent or agents, to enforce all rules governing student affairs. 2. It should be clearly understood by all students that the President

of The University of Texas at Austin and the faculty of the School of Nursing have the authority to request the withdrawal from school, to drop from the rolls, and to refuse readmission of any student at any time if circumstances of a legal, moral, health, social, or academic nature are considered to justify such action.

It is the responsibility of the student to become familiar with the various regulations of the School of Nursing and to comply with them.

At the time of registration and throughout a student's enrollment in the School, it shall be his responsibility to keep the dean's office as well as the Registrar informed of his current (1) local address, (2) telephone number or where he may be reached, and (3) permanent address and phone number. This is absolutely necessary in order that schedules, official correspondence, and emergency messages will not be delayed or lost. It is the student's responsibility to be informed of general and special notices including examination schedules on the bulletin board in the School of Nursing and to make arrangements for the completion of all work including make-up examinations and requirements for removal of conditional and incomplete grades.

Other Institutions

Admission to the School of Nursing, as to all other colleges and schools of The University of Texas at Austin, is under the control of the Director of Admissions and Records. All correspondence prior to official acceptance to The University of Texas at Austin should be sent to that office. For general admission requirements, consult the General Information bulletin.

Students who have begun their work at other colleges or universities will be accepted at The University of Texas at Austin School of Nucsing if their performance at the other school meets the School's standards for admission.

A student seeking admission from another college or university must present (1) an application for admission to upper-division nursing courses; (2) two official copies of transcripts from each institution attended, at least one of which must include high school units and a report of scores on the admissions test. All credentials should be sent directly to the Office of Admissions of The University of Texas at Austin. Prospective students must adhere to the deadline dates on the application form.

Regulations

1. Transferred grades are filed as submitted.

2. An applicant, whether a new student or a former student of the School of Nursing who has attended another collegiate institution, will submit all his previous collegiate records when applying for admission to the School of Nursing and is subject to its regulations.

3. Any former student who attends another institution is responsible for getting a transcript of his record to the Director of Admissions before he re-enters.

As part of the ongoing evaluation of the School of Nursing curriculum, students are required to participate in a testing program upon admission to the School and on completion of each of the major courses within the curriculum.

Requirements for Enrollment in Upper-Division Courses²

Completion of the sixty hours of prerequisite courses with an overall grade point average of 2.0 and, in addition, a grade-point average of 2.0 on all required lower-division courses, excluding electives, is the minimum required for admission to upper-division courses. Applicants whose grade-point average exceeds the minimum required will gain more favorable consideration.

Final selection of the applicants will be made by an Admissions Committee from the School of Nursing. In general, the applicant will be evaluated on the basis of the quality of his overall academic performance as well as performance in required courses. Work done at The University of Texas at Austin and work done elsewhere will be evaluated separately.

Applications will not be reviewed until after the above deadline dates. Applications received after the deadline dates will be considered only if the class is not already filled.

Professional Liability Insurance

RESERVATION OF WORK BY UNDERGRADUATES FOR GRADUATE CREDIT prior to the first day of class, to show evidence of professional liability insurance coverage paid for a two-year period. The effective dute of the policy must be the first day of classes of the first semisster of enrollment in sursing courses.

All nursing students enrolling in nursing courses will be required.

For information regarding registration, preregistration, late registration, penalty for late registration, students becoming responsible to deans, transfer from one branch to another, registration for courses, and permission to visit a course, consult the General Information bulletin.

Undergraduates are barred from graduate courses except that it is possible for undergraduate students to reserve courses for graduate credit in their last semester under the following conditions:

I. The undergraduate in his final semester must lack not more than twelve semester hours (or six semester hours in a summer session) of work to complete all requirements for his (first) bachelor's degree.

2. These twelve hours (or less) must all be completed in the same semester or summer session in which he is taking the graduate courses. 3. The total registration for all work must not exceed fifteen semes-

ter hours in a semester (or twelve semester hours in a summer session).

4. All courses reserved for graduate credit must be approved before the end of the first two weeks of the semester (or the first week in the summer session) by the graduate adviser, the Graduate Dean, and the dean of the college in which the student is enrolled.

5. The undergraduate who reserves courses must graduate at the end of that semisster in order to receive graduate credit for yourses reserved.

The undergraduate may not count his work in graduate courses toward his bachelor's degree. These courses will be reserved for credit toward a graduate degree. A form for reserving courses, which needs the signatures of the dean of the undergraduate college and the official graduate adviser in the student's major area, must be secured from the Graduate School Student Office.

For information concerning the quantity of work rule, correspondence work by resident students, adding and dropping courses, section changes, withdrawal, class attendance and absences, examinations, grades of scholarship, reports, classification of students, see the General Information bulletin.

Credit by Examination In keeping with the School's stated philosophy of learning, the faculty recognizes the many potential avenues for acquisition of the knowledge, attitudes, and skills which are dremed appropriate for a baccalaureate nursing practitioner. Furthermore, the faculty believes that student experiences in formal educational endeavors should build on the student's present level of achievement in an effort to maximize enhancement of the "actualization of individual potential." Therefore, the faculty subscribes to the principle of validation of the candidate's competencies and the awarding of credit based upon satisfactory achievement on examinations. The candidate is thus allowed to matriculate into the curricular pattern at a level appropriate for his/her demonstrated level of achievement.

- 1. To petition for such an examination, an individual must have met all requirements for admission to upper-division courses in the School of Nursing.
- 2. The candidate should consult the Dean regarding applications, policies, and scheduling of the examination.
- 3. A student may not take an examination for credit in a course which he has completed with either a passing or failing grade.
- 4. A student who is enrolled in the course must be in good standing in the course in order to take the examination.
- 5. A candidate for "credit by examination" may obtain the course material which would be given to a student enrolling in the course.
- 6. A candidate for "credit by examination" will have access to any and all materials in compus learning centers, but will not receive tutoring by the School of Nursing faculty in preparation for the examination.
- 7. A candidate for "credit by examination" may audit any or all of the lecture portion of any course in The University of Texas at Austin School of Nursing (subject to University visitor's fee, if he is not currently registered).

- 8. A candidate for examination will be assigned a faculty adviser, teaching in the course to be challenged, whose function will be to clarify the intent of the examination and to provide feedback on the results.
- 9. A fee will be assessed each candidate writing the examination by the Measurement and Evaluation Center.
- 10. Credit for fifty-one semester hours can be awarded to students in the School of Norsing by "credit by examination," except that twenty four of the last thirty semester hours presented for the degree must be in residence (i.e., not credit by examination).
- 11. Only after the student is registered in the degree program will credit be granted for a grade of C or higher on the examination.
- 12. The student may elect to have the credit recorded as the credit symbol CR or as the actual letter grade achieved. In the latter event, the grade is included in computing the cumulative gradepoint average. No notation appears on the permanent record when the examination is failed.
- 13. Credit carned by examination shall not reduce by a corresponding amount courses which may be taken on a Pass-Fail basis.
- 14. A candidate may not retake any examination on any level.

For information concerning semester examinations, how to postpone an examination, incomplete class or laboratory work, etc., consult the General Information bulletin.

For information concerning scholastic probation, the regulations govcrining return after failure in scholastic work, etc., consult the General Information bulletin.

If a student repeats a course which he has failed in the School of Nursing, his official grade is the last one made. That official grade will therefore be used in computing his grade-point average for his degree, and the failing grade will not be included. However, if a student repeats a course and has two or more grades, all grades and all semester hours count on his University grade-point average and in determining bis scholastic eligibility for remaining in the University. A student may not repeat a course for credit in which he has made a grade of C or better.

A student must earn a minimum grade of C in each clinical nursing course. If he earns less than a C in a clinical nursing course and is in good standing in the School of Nursing, he must repeat the course with at least a grade of C. The time at which he repeats the course, if the course is not prerequisite to the next clinical nursing course, will be at the discretion of the Dean. If the course is prerequisite to the next clinical course, he must repeat the course before proceeding to the next course.

A failed clinical nursing course may be repeated only once and must be repeated in The University of Texas at Austin School of Nursing.

A grade of F in either laboratory or theory in a clinical nursing course results in a grade of F in that course.

Hours of Work of Employed Students While Enrolled in Upper-Division Nursing Courses A student's combined employment and semester-hour load (including clinical laboratory hours) should not exceed forty hours a week in either long-session semesters or summer terms.

Students may be employed as nursing aids, performing functions for which they have been trained by the institution and for which the institution has a clearly discernible policy either in writing or by precedent, defining the scope of these functions. Any individual not licensed in the State of Texas to practice professional nursing, and who engages in such practice, is doing so illegally and may be prosecuted accordingly. Supervision by a professional licensed nurse does not provide protection to the student or make the student's actions legal.

Students should be aware that 1) the School of Nursing assumes no responsibility for their activities as an employee of an agency; 2) they are personally responsible and liable for any activity they participate in while employed; 3) professional liability insurance purchased by students through the School of Nursing is only valid in their student role, not their employment role; 4) individuals who practice illegally may jeopardize their future since persons who are convicted of violation of the Nurse Practice Act may not be eligible to write State Board examinations and subsequently receive licensure.

Students employed in an agency have responsibility, personally and professionally, to engage in only those activities which fall within their job description as nonprofessional workers (i.e., aides). They have a responsibility to refuse to participate in activities which they have not been legally licensed to perform (i.e., giving medications, assuming total responsibility for a division, etc.).

DECREE PROGRAM FOR THE BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN NURSING

Philosophy

The faculty members of The University of Texas at Austia School of Nursing believe in the promotion and support of excellence in professional nursing through teaching, research, and public service.

Individuals are unique and complex beings with biological, psychological and sociological needs and methods of communication. Their development is determined by the interaction of genetic and cultural background and their total environment. People have inherent dignity and worth and the right and responsibility to participate actively, as they are able, in making decisions which affect their state of health.

Optimum health care is the right of every individual and is provided through the co-operative efforts of a wide range of professions and disciplines. Nursing, which evolves its practice in response to societal needs, is one of the interdependent helping professions committed to the prevention of illness and promotion of health.

Professional nursing practice involves assessing health needs, and planning, providing, directing, and evaluating nursing care for individuals and groups in a variety of settings. It is a scientifically-based process devoted to helping individuals, families, and groups make maximum use of their resources in meeting their respective health needs. It

further incorporates the individualities of nurse and patient/elient and is most effective when the thoughts, feelings and values of both are recognized; therefore, a high degree of communication skill and sensitivity in interpersonal situations is required. The obligation to improve nursing practice encompasses the use of knowledge and skills as well as the systematic study of the effects of this practice on human health.

Undergraduate education in nursing, which provides a foundation for continuing personal, professional, and educational development includes study of the arts, sciences, and humanities. The baccalauteate program is designed to produce a competent, self-directed, general nurse practitioner, who, in a variety of settings can assume leadership in planning, providing, and evaluating nursing care of individuals and groups; who participates in the determination of the goals of the nursing profession: and who actively searches for knowledge in nursing and related fields essential to the development and application of nursing science.

The faculty believes that learning is a lifelong process which is independent and self-initiated and results in a change or reorganization of behavior. The teaching-learning process includes teacher-student interaction in setting goals, selecting and evaluating learning experiences, and in appraising instructional methods and student progress. Learning experiences are planned to achieve application, sequence, and continuity of the knowledges, skills, and attitudes defined by the educational objective.

The School is dedicated to the proposition of equal educational opportunity for all. The faculty believes that each student has dignity and worth and a background and experiences which are unique. The student shares in the responsibility for creating an educational climate which reflects democratic values, fosters intellectual inquiry and creativity, and encourages the development of each individual's potential.

This program consists of two academic years or four semesters of

lower-division courses taken in an approved college or university followed by two academic years or four semesters of upper-division nursing courses which are taken at The University of Texas at Austin School of Nursing, Upon completion of the program, students are awarded the Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree and are eligible to take the State Board Test Pool Examination for licensure as registered nurses.

Students may complete the sixty hours of general course work listed below at any accredited junior or senior college or university. Completion usually requires two academic years. All courses must be completed before enrollment for apper-division courses in nursing.

Graduation under a Particular Catalogue

> General Requirements

A student may obtain a degree from the School of Nursing according to the requirements in the catalogue under which he enters the School or the catalogue governing any subsequent year in which he is registered in the School, provided that he completes the work for the degree within six years of the date of the catalogue he has chosen. In the case of courses which are no longer offered, the faculty will prescribe substitutions.

1. No degree will be conferred except on dates publicly announced. 2. It is expected that all candidates will attend the Commencement at which their degrees are to be conferred.

3. To be eligible for graduation a student must have a 2.0 grade-point average on the sixty semester hours of upper-division course work fulfilling the upper-division requirement.

4. A candidate must successfully complete the prescribed curriculum for which he is registered and must meet all other requirements of the School of Nursing.

5. No degree will be conferred without a residence at The University of Texas at Austin of at least two long-session semesters, or an equivalent period of residence, and the completion in residence of at least thirty semester hours of work counting toward the degree.

6. Twenty-four of the last thirty semester hours must be completed in residence,* with the exception that among The University of Texas System components, a student may with the approval of the appropriate dean transfer additional course work to his program at the degreegranting institution. A student seeking an exception to this regulation must file at the degree-granting institution a written petition with his academic dean, who may approve the transfer of additional credit.

7. No credit earned by correspondence instruction from The University of Texas at Austin or elsewhere and no credit earned by enrollment at another college or university of in Evening Classes in the Division of Extension while the student is currently enrolled for residence work at The University of Texas at Austin will be counted toward a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree unless specifically approved in advance by the Deam of the School of Nursing or his representative. Not more than thirty per cent of the semester hours required for any degree may be done by correspondence, but not more than nine hours required for the Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree may be taken by correspondence.

8. A student must supply the School of Nursing with transcripts of courses taken outside the school as the courses are completed.

9. No second bachelor's degree will be conferred until the candidate

has completed at least twenty-four semester hours in addition to those counted toward his first bachelor's degree.

10. A candidate for a degree must register at The University of Texas at Austin in the term or somester at the close of which he expects to take his degree and must apply to his dean for the degree not later than the date specified in the official calendar.

To be graduated with bonors a student must have the following grade-

House Bill 935, passed by the Sixtieth Legislature, provides that no person may receive an undergraduate degree unless he has taken and passed six semester hours in American government and six semester hours in American history. No more than three semester hours of credit by examination in government and three in history may be used to satisfy this requirement.

Each student who expects to receive a degree from the School of

Nursing must file a Degree Card before registering for upper-division courses in the major. To file a degree card, the student must first make application at the Office of the Secretary for Student Affairs in the School of Norsing and then pay the nominal fee required to cover the cost of duplicating his University of Texas at Austin record at the Registrar's Office.

A degree card is prepared in the Dean's Office, and the student is then notified of the courses he lacks and the requirements he must satisfy to receive the degree.

In advising and in registering students, the Dean and advisers try to prevent errors. Avoidance of errors is the main purpose of the degree card. But the student is expected to remember that graduation is attained according to some one catalogue, to study the requirements set forth in the catalogue, and to register in accordance therewith. It remains the responsibility of the student to fulfill all catalogue requirements.

In the long-session semester or summer session in which he is to receive the degree, the candidate must be registered in The University of Texas at Austin und must file a Diploma Name Card in the Dean's Office not later than the date specified in the current University calendar.

- B. Professional nursing is a deliberative process of interacting with individuals, groups, or families for the expressed purpose of identifying needs and then assisting the individual, families, or groups to meet these needs.
- C. Professional nurses identify normal stages of development and states of health, with variations from normal in both, as a basis for nursing intervention.
- D. Professional nurses are knowledgeable about common disease processes and disorders, special needs of individuals with these diseases and disorders, and specific nursing intervention, including skills and techniques, directed toward assisting individuals to meet these needs.
- E. Professional nursing utilizes theoretical and empirical knowledge from the physical and behavioral sciences and the humanities as a source of making decisions relative to the nursing care delivered to individuals, families, and groups.
- F. Professional nursing utilizes scientific methods of inquiry; i.e., epidemiology, nursing process, research.
- G. The health care delivery system is an integral part of the total society. Professional nursing functions within this framework, and therefore is influenced by social and scientific trends.
- II. Application of Knowledge Base to Patient/Client Care

Under supervision the new graduate is able to practice nursing in a variety of settings with individuals, families, and groups, using the following skills:

- A. Assessment
 - 1. Uses interviewing skills to obtain nursing history and to determine the needs of individuals, families, groups, and communtics.
 - 2. Uses observational skills to identify signs of wellness and illness and to determine needs for care and teaching in the areas of promotion of wellness and prevention of illness, support and treatment during wellness and/or disease and rehabilitation.
 - 3. Uses physical evaluation skills to assist in determining the state of health of the individual.
- B. Planning
 - 1. Develops nursing plan for care and teaching.
 - 2. Collaborates, co-ordinates, and consults with other health professionals.
 - 3. Sets priorities based on patient/client needs.
 - 4. Assists patients/clients and families in setting goals.
- C. Implementation
 - 1. Participates in providing care as a member of a health team. 2. Assumes responsibility for performing nursing functions.

- 3. Implements care and teaching according to previously set goals.
- 4. Performs mursing skills consistent with safe practice in gencralized settings (as opposed to specialized settings).
- 5. Manages care of groups of patients using a variety of personnel and resources.
- 6. Maintains accurate and informative records.
- **D.** Evaluation
 - Evaluates care and teaching given according to previously set goals and accepted professional standards.
 - 2. Assesses effective use of the health care delivery system,
 - 3. Continues care to assist individuals and fumilies to achieve and maintain health goals with appropriate referrals.
- III. Professional Practice
 - The new graduate is expected to:
 - A. Accept responsibility for continued personal and professional growth.
 - B. Exhibit an awareness of present and emerging roles of the professional nurse with regard to past trends, current practice, and future directions.
 - C. Demonstrate a sense of responsibility in relation to contemporary, social, and health issues.
 - D. Practice nursing within a framework of legal, ethical, and professional standards.

All students seeking registration must take and pass the State Board Test Pool Examination, administered by the Board of Nurse Examiners for the State of Texas. The Board of Nurse Examiners may refuse to admit persons to its examinations or may refuse to issue a license or certificate of registration for any of the following reasons:

(1) The violation, or attempted violation, of any of the provisions of the law regulating the practice of professional nursing.

(2) Conviction of a crime of the grade of felony, or a crime of a lesser grade which involves moral turpitude.

(3) The use of any nursing license, certificate, or diploma which has been fraudently purchased, issued, counterfeited, or materially altered.

(4) The impersonation of, or the acting as proxy for, another in any examination required by this law to obtain a license as a registered nurse.

(5) Intemperate use of alcohol or drugs which, in the opinion of the Board, endangers patients.

(6) Unprofessional or dishonorable conduct which, in the opinion of the Board, is likely to injure the public.

Application for registration by examination requires submission of a complete application and transcripts of all work completed at least one month in advance of the State Board Test Pool Examination. The following procedures will be followed by the School of Nursing and the applicant:

(1) Students will receive the application form and instructions for completion approximately one month prior to graduation.

(2) The application is to be completed, notarized, and returned to The University of Texas at Austin School of Nursing offices as soon as possible with the registration focs.

(3) The second set of transcripts submitted at the time of admission to upper-division nursing courses will be submitted with the application and fees. If the student has failed to file the second set of transcripts on admission, he will be asked to furnish them and his application may be delayed.

(4) All 120 hours for the degree must be completed before the student is eligible to take the State Board Test Pool Examination and obtain a temporary permit.

(5) Students planning to take the State Board Test Pool Examination in another state must obtain information regarding procedure from the agency responsible for professional nurse registration in that state.

No separate program is offered at the present time for nurses who are already licensed. Registered nurses who have college credit for required courses may transfer credit under policies of the School of Nursing. Credit by examination may be obtained for preparation in nursing (hospital and junior college program and work experience).

Continuing education in nursing consists of systematic learning experiences which enhance the knowledge and skills of nurses. As distinguished from formal education directed toward an academic degree, continuing education generally is more specific in nature and consists of independent self-study and short-term courses or programs offered by universities, colleges, employing agencies, and professional organizations.

Maintaining professional competency in nursing is primarily the responsibility of each individual practitioner who can best establish his/ her own personal and professional goals and pursue the appropriate learning experiences.

The University of Texas at Austin School of Nursing faculty acknowledges its responsibility to provide such learning experiences for nurse practitioners throughout the state. This will be done by promoting all kinds of continuing education self study and short-term courses or programs—for as many practitioners as possible. The faculty fitnally believes that these programs, in the form of workshops, conferences, seminars, and short courses offered by the School's Continuing Education Program, are not substitutes for further formal education but should be an adjunct to independent and formal study.

Requests for programs may be directed to the Director of Continuing Education.

DESCRIPTION OF COURSES

The following section includes the courses given in 1974–1975 and 1975–1976 and, as far as may be foreseen, those that will be given in 1976–1977 and 1977–1978. Courses enclosed in brackets will not be given in 1976–1977 or 1977–1978.

The Course Schedule is issued before the opening of each semester and contains any changes that may be necessary in the present statement of courses. In registering, the Course Schedule should always be used.

For explanation of course numbers and letters see the index of the General Information bulletin. In brief, the first digit of a course number indicates the value of the course in semester hours. The next two digits indicate the roak of the course: If 01 through 19, the course is of lower-division rank; if 20 through 79, of paper-division rank; if 80 through 99, of graduate rank: The letter A following a course number means the first half of the course; the letter B, the second half.

Unless otherwise stated in the description of the course, classes meet three locture hours a week for one semester.

UPPER-DIVISION COURSES

730, 831 NURSING PROCESS: CARE OF WELL INDIVIDUALS (Minor

threat, minor disequilibrium to dynamic equilibrium). These two numbers reflect one course. The focus is on the biological, psychological, social and linguistic components of the behavior of individuals as indicators of their level of wellness. The clients/patients with whom the student deals are individuals seeking or requiring minimal assistance in seeking health care resources; are self-sufficient or require minimal assistance in providing for their physical and emotional health; have insight into health care problems and request assistance of health care professionals. The individuals and their family/significant others have the ability to adapt, enjoy the present, and plan for the future. Individuals can use previous modes of health care problem-solving to maintain and promote health.

Student learning experiences include assessing und caring for the client/patient through a deliberative interactive proccss and assisting the individual and his family in health care decision-making with the resources available.

Students, with faculty assistance, begin examining the conrept of wellness, the characteristics of healthy patterns of living along the age continuum using nursing process, communication skills and physical assessment skills acquired during the course: and application of same in the client/patient situation. Also beginning concepts of professionalism in nursing are introduced. Prerequisite: Sixty hours of required lower-

635, 636 NURSING OF INDIVIDUALS AND FAMILIES WITH MINUR INALTH PROBLEMS (Minor threat, minor disequilibrium). These two numbers reflect one course. The focus is on the nursing process as utilized in the care of selected individuals and families experiencing minor disruptions in their health stains. The individuals and families with whom the student deals require assistance in socking health care, and require deliberative nursing intervention in regaining physically and emotionally healthy living patterns. Disruption to normal individual and family-significant others due to impairment of health is temporary and self-limiting; some adjustments to usual patterns of living and life style and life space are required by those with whom the student works.

Student learning experiences include: Examining the ill individual in light of his relationships with family and other groups and deviations from healthy living patterns along the age continuum; recognizing and demonstrating needs for health teaching of the individual and family to regain some, if not all, healthy patterns of living: and applying some in patient care settings. Also the student identifies pertinent research studies and, with assistance, applies findings to patient care situations. Prerequisite: Nursing 730 and 831. An average of six lectures and eighteen laboratory hours a week for one semester.⁶ Laboratory fee, \$8.

Sindy in a specific topic area. Topic and mode of study are agreed upon by student(s) and instructor. Registration may be repeated with varied topics. Prerequisite: Third-year standing and Nursing 730 and 831.

640, 647 NURSING INTERVENTION IN MAJOR HEALTH PROBLEMS (Major threat, major disequilibrium). These two numbers reflect one course. The focus is on the nursing process as utilized in the care of selected individuals, families, and groups, experiencing health alterations resulting in major problems for that individual, family, or group. The clients/patients with whom the student deals are individuals.

families, or groups having limited ability or total dependence in decision-making regarding seeking health care; require intervention and observation by another to sustain life or promote a constortable death. The individual, family, or group is unable to cope with additional stresses imposed at a given point in time and/or resources available to the individual, family, or group are inadequate to meet the needs of the individual, family, or group. Distortion and confusion of individual. family, or group roles and relationships occurs.

Student learning experiences include: Recognizing and acting upon acquired knowledge in pathology; utilizing the communication skills necessary in potential and real lifethreatening situations with individuals, families, and groups; examining the influences of major health problems on roles and relationships within the family; and applying nursing skills in a crisis-producing situation in the patient care setting. Also the student reviews research studies in nursing in terms of their relevance to improvement of health care of individuals and groups. Various types of health care settings are studied in terms of their effect on nursing's contribution to health care. Prerequisite: Nursing 635 and 636. An average of six lectures and eighteen laboratory hours a week for one semester.^a Laboratory fee, \$8.

645. 646 NURSING IN HEALTH CARE SYSTEMS (Minor threat, dynamic equilibrium to major threat, major disequilibrium). These two numbers reflect one course. The focus is on the nursing process involving interdisciplinary approaches to care and on leadership and innovative functions of the nurse. The student deals with individuals, families, and groups located within the health care system who are dependent upon interaction of health professionals to promote or regain their former healthy status of living and interaction.

Student learning experiences include: Applying concepts of wellness and illness in a variety of health care systems; utilizing relationships among health professionals in order to restore more healthy patterns of living to individuals and families; analyzing existing health care systems and patterns of health delivery in terms of the changing needs of society; examining the health care issues with which professional nurses must become involved. Prerequisite: Nursing 640 and 641. An average of six lectures and eighteen laboratory hours a week for one semester.⁹ Laboratory fee, \$8.

347K THERAPEUTIC STRATEGIES FOR MENTAL HEALTH. This course focuses on mental health concepts as applied to therapeutic strategies in one-to-one counseling. The specific strategies to be considered are: Client-centered Therapy, Reality Therapy, Gestalt Therapy, Transactional Analysis, and Peplan's Basic Principles of Patient Counseling. Prerequisite: Nursing 635 and 636 and consent of instructor. An average of two lectures and three laboratory hours a week for one semester.

347L OPERATING ROOM—CONTINUOUS CARE EXPERIENCE. This course is designed to provide clinical experience with patients who require surgical intervention. Focus is placed on the complete cycle of care: Preoperative teaching, intraoperative segment, and postoperative care. Prerequisite: Nursing 635 and 636 and consent of instructor. An average of one lecture hour and six laboratory hours a werk for one semester.

347M EMERCENCY NURSING.

In this course, the focus is on the application of the nursing process to the care of patients experiencing medical or surgical emergencies, or traumatic injuries. Nursing problems related to selected emergency situations are studied in depth. Students assume responsibility for care of selected patients, and have the opportunity to utilize a variety of nursing skills. Prerequisite: Nursing 640 and 641 and consent of instructor. An average of one fecture hour and six laboratory hours a work for one semester.

347N RURAL HEALTH NUBSING. The major emphasis for this course is health maintenance in the rural area. Through assessing health needs, possible solutions for tural health care are explored. A preceptor is required for the clinical portion, and the course is designed to meet individual students noods. Prerequisite: Nursing 730 and 831. An average of nine laboratory hours a week for one semester,

The grant is effective for the period June 1, 1976 through June 30, 1977, and the research will be under the direction of Dr. Addison E. Lee, Professor of Curriculum and Instruction, and Director, Science Education Center.

202. Grant SER 76-18243, by which National Science Foundation, Washington, D.C., provides \$242,200 (Travis County) for support of a project entitled, "Research Initiation and Support-Integrated Laboratory and Course Development for Computer Application in Science." The grant is effective for the period June 23, 1976 through November 30, 1979, and the project will be under the direction of Dr. Raymond T. Yeh, Professor of Computer Sciences.

203. Grant SMI76-20420, by which National Science Foundation, Washington, D.C., provides \$103, 581 (Travis County) for support of a project entitled, "Women in Science - Science Career Facilitation Project." The grant is effective for the period June 29, 1976 through July 31, 1978, and the project will be under the direction of Dr. Nell B. Dale, Instructor of Computer Sciences, and Alfred G. Dale, Associate Professor of Computer Sciences.

204. Grant SMI76-22894, (Graduate Fellowship Support), by which National Science Foundation, Washington, D. C., provides \$88,300 (Travis County) for support of certain listed Fellows affiliated with The University of Texas at Austin during the 1976-77 Fellowship year. The grant is effective for the period June 1, 1976 through September 30, 1981, or such earlier date as the funds are expended. The program will be administered under the NSF-UT/Austin Fellowship Support Agreement (dated 29 May 1974) and will be coordinated in the Office of the Vice-President and Dean of Graduate Studies.

205. Grant SOC 76-24364, by which National Science Foundation, Washington, D. C., provides \$49,600 (Travis County) for support of research entitled, "Cost Effectiveness of Merger Regulations." The grant is effective for the period July 1, 1976 through February 28, 1979, and the research will be under the direction of Professor Richard S. Markovits, School of Law.

206. Agreement between The University of Texas at Austin and the United States Department of the Navy, signed by Vice President James H. Colvin, whereby the University agrees to maintain a Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps Unit as presently established at The University of Texas at Austin. The agreement became effective May 14, 1976 and may be terminated or modified upon providing one academic year's notice of such intent by either party. The Secretary of the Navy agrees to pay to the University authorized expenses required of all students who are selected for the Scholarship Program. Such payments are to include tuition, fees, books, laboratory expenses and subsistence allowance. Also, the University may charge the Secretary of the Navy tuition fees for NROTC courses provided that tuition fees are not greater than those charged for other courses.



Through programs of a multidisciplinary character, UT San Antonio strives to eliminate the isolation of disciplines and to reflect the integrated nature of societal issues and problems. <u>The University is committed to cooperation with all institu-</u> tions of higher education in San Antonio and the surrounding region and is a member of the Higher Education Council of San Antonio. UT San Antonio also cooperates with the San Antonio community to improve accessibility to library resources; to provide internships with local professions and businesses; to offer continuing education institutes, seminars, and special activities; and to utilize local, non-university personnel with special talents and abilities to enrich classroom instruction. <u>To</u> <u>serve the metropolitan area of Bexar County</u>, The University offers courses and programs on off-campus locations in the urban area where a need is demonstrated, provided their academic guality can be maintained in the off-campus location. 6. Organization changed as presented here in congressional style:

The President at UT San Antonio is assisted by a staff including [an-Executive Vice-President] a Vice President for Academic Affairs, a Vice President for Administration, and a Vice President for Business Affairs. [The-Executive-Vice President-provides-the-President-with-advice-and-counsel-on-all-phases-of-University-operations---He-represents-and-acts-for-the-President-when-the-latter-isunable-to-be-present-] The Vice President for Academic Affairs provides the President with advice and counsel on academic matters and acts as liaison between the President's Office and the several Deans as well as with faculty committees concerned with academic affairs. With approval of the Board of Regents of a nontraditional administrative structure for graduate education at UT San Antonio, the administrative functions that ordinarily are the responsibility of a Graduate Dean are carried out by the Vice President for Academic Affairs. As the administrative officer responsible for graduate education, this officer chairs the Council on Graduate Education. The Vice President for Administration is responsible for assisting the President in handling internal and external administrative matters and in discharging special assignments as requested by the President. The Vice President for Business Affairs provides the President with advice and Counsel on fiscal affairs and has direct responsibility for the business operation of The University including operation of the physical plant. This officer is responsible for budget preparation and analysis.

2. Advisement

Advisement for undeclared majors is a function of the Office of the Dean of Students. This program is designed to provide basic information to students who are undecided about their educational goals. Academic advising for declared majors is carried on in the several Colleges, and information should be sought in the academic Deans' offices.

Advisement for all freshmen enrolled in the Provisional Admission Program is coordinated by the Office of the Dean of Students. A student who is admitted under the Provisional Admission Program and who declares an intention of majoring in a given area is advised by an academic advisor in the student's projected major area. If the student has no projected major, he/she is advised through the Dean of Students' Office by a faculty member designated to advise provisional admission students with undeclared majors.

3. Financial Aid amended as presented here in Congressional Style:

V. ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

 Provisional Admission Program for Freshmen amended as presented here in Congressional Style:

Any Texas resident applying as a freshman who has not attended a college or university and who is a graduate of an accredited high school but who does not qualify for admission due to an inadequate SAT or ACT score or deficiencies in high school preparation may be admitted on a provisional basis in the spring semester or in the first summer term (for both summer sessions). [$_{5}$] During <u>this</u> [whieh] time the student is given an opportunity to demonstrate that he or she can perform college-level work and that he or she can reasonably be expected to make progress toward a degree. [Sueh] A student <u>admitted to the Provisional Admission Program</u> is required to take courses selected from English, mathematics, natural science, and language and may not take courses in other disciplines until the provisional status is removed. The student must demonstrate ability to perform college work by obtaining an overall "C" average (2.0 on a 4.0 scale) in 12 hours of work from these fields. Normally a student is expected to complete these 12 hours of work in the summer sessions or during the spring semester. Upon completion of 12 hours of work from these fields a student is admitted as a regular university student in subsequent semesters. If a student enrolls for fewer than 12 hours and does not earn a 2.0 grade-point average, but earns at least a 1.5 grade-point average, the student may enroll for the next term. After 12 hours have been completed, the required cumulative grade-point average of 2.0 must have been reached, or the student is not allowed to continue at <u>UT San Antonio</u> [in-the following-semester-or-summer-term.]

2. Transient Students amended as presented here in Congressional Style:

Admission as Transient Students

An applicant who wishes to enroll, normally for one session only, in courses at the undergraduate level without pursuing a degree at The University of Texas at San Antonio should apply for admission as a transient student. In order to qualify as a transient student at the undergraduate level, the applicant must provide a statement of good standing from the college or university last attended, as well as an application for admission.

3. Temporary Admission amended as presented here in Congressional Style: Last sentence: Only in unusual circumstances is temporary admission granted for a first or second term. If granted for a second term, it requires approval of the

VI GENERAL ACADEMIC REGULATIONS

1. Dropping Courses amended as shown here in Congressional Style:

<u>Courses officially dropped during the add/drop period do not appear on the</u> <u>student's record.</u> <u>After the add/drop period and</u> during the first <u>six</u> [four] weeks of classes in a [regular] semester or during the first <u>ten class</u> [eight-ealendar] days in a summer session, a student may drop courses without a grade penalty <u>and receive a grade of "W."</u> The student is responsible for [obtaining-the-instructor's-approval-and] filing the change with the Registrar's Office so that the action becomes official. If a student finds it necessary to drop a course after the first six [four] weeks of classes in a [regular] semester or after the tenth class [eighth-ealendar] day in a summer session, it is his/her responsibility to initiate and complete procedures for obtaining an approved withdrawal from the course. The forms for this purpose are available in the Registrar's Office [and-require-the-approval-of-the instructor.] A student who officially drops a course after the first six [four] weeks of classes in a regular semester or after the tenth class [eighth-ealendar] day in a summer session must take the form to his/her instructor who will enter it [is-assigned] a grade of "W" if the student [he/she] is passing the course at the time of withdrawal or a grade of "F" if he/she is failing the course at the time of withdrawal. In order for the action to be official, the student must file the approved form with the Registrar's Office. [A-student-who-drops-a-course-without filing-the-required-form-with-the-Registraris-Office-is-assigned-a-grade-of-"F"-in the-eeursers] Students may not drop courses later than the first day of the final week of classes for a semester or summer term. 2. Withdrawal Procedures amended as presented here in Congressional Style: A student who finds it necessary to withdraw from The University (i.e., drop all courses for which he/she is enrolled) may obtain the form for this purpose from the Registrar's Office. After completing the required form, the student must file it with the Registrar's Office in order to withdraw officially. Students who officially [may-met] withdraw from The University during the first six weeks of a semester or during the first 10 days of a summer term, will receive a grade of "W." [later-than-four-weeks-prior-to-the-beginning-of-final-examinations-for-the semester-and-not-later-than-eight-days-prior-to-the-beginning-of-final-examinations for-a-summer-term-] Students who officially withdraw after the first six [four] weeks of classes in a regular semester or after the <u>tenth class</u> [eighth-ealendar] day of a summer session will receive a grade of "W" for each class they are passing at the time of withdrawal and a grade of "F" for each class in which they are not passing at the time of withdrawal. Students who withdraw from all classes are subject at the close of the term to academic probation and dismissal regulations. Students withdrawing should refer to the regulations on refunds of tuition and fees.

3. Reporting of Grades amended as presented here in Congressional Style: Last sentence: [Additional-work-performed-by-a-student-may-not-be-used-to-raise a-grade-that-has-been-reported-to-the-Registrar1s-Office.]

4. Petition for Reinstatement

<u>A student who has been dismissed academically may petition for reinstatement.</u> <u>Information and petition forms are available in the Registrar's Office.</u>

VII. BACHELOR'S DEGREE REGULATIONS

 General Education Requirements amended as presented here in Congressional Style:

2. C. Students majoring in the <u>applied</u> sciences; <u>biology</u>; chemistry; mathematics, <u>computer science</u>, and <u>systems design</u>; or allied health professions must select at least six hours from Group A (Three of which should be in the fine arts), six from Group C, and three additional hours from Group A or C below.

3. Transfer of Credit amended as presented here in Congressional Style:

8. New paragraph added: <u>If the equivalent of a required upper-division UT San</u> <u>Antonio course is completed at an accredited institution as a lower-division course,</u> <u>the course need not be repeated, but another upper-division course, as approved</u> by <u>the student's Advisor, must be completed at UT San Antonio in substitution.</u>

4. Additional Baccalaureate degrees amended as presented here in Congressional Style:

3. Complete all requirements for the additional degree(s), including <u>grade-point</u> <u>average requirements</u>, support courses, elective courses, and upper-division courses, as set forth in this catalog.

5. Enrollment in Graduate Courses for Undergraduate Credit [Earning-Graduate-Gredit-While-an-Undergraduate]

With approval of the <u>student's advisor</u> [eeurse-instructor], the Dean of the College in which the course is offered, and the Vice President for Academic Affairs, an exceptional undergraduate student may enroll in a graduate course and apply the credit earned to his/her undergraduate degree. An approval form is available at the Registrar's Office.

Enrollment in Graduate Courses for Graduate Credit

An undergraduate student lacking no more than 12 semester hours for graduation may <u>enroll in a graduate course and</u> earn graduate credit under the following conditions:

2. Permission, on an approved form available at the Registrar's Office, must be obtained from the student's Advisor and Dean of the College in which the courses to be awarded graduate credit are offered <u>and the Vice</u> <u>President for Academic Affairs.</u>

3. In order to earn graduate credit, the student must graduate at the end of that term; otherwise, the courses are regarded as undergraduate credit. If graduate credit is earned, the <u>semester hours</u> [units] are not considered part of the baccalaureate degree program.

6. Catalog of Graduation amended as presented here in Congressional Style: Candidates for a baccalaureate degree may graduate upon the completion of the requirements as stated in the catalog in effect at the time of initial registration at UT San Antonio provided they register for at least one term every twelve months or in any subsequent catalog <u>under which they have enrolled</u> except that no degree is granted on the basis of the requirements listed in a catalog issued more than seven years prior to the date of graduation.

IX, UNDERGRADUATE DEGREE PROGRAMS AND COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

All degree programs in this section were conformed to a common format to show the number of hours required for the degree, number of hours in the major, number of hours in support work and number of hours of free electives. An example of the format used to regularize the degree programs follows:

BACHELOR OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION DEGREE IN ACCOUNTING WITH A CONCENTRATION IN ACCOUNTING

The minimum number of semester hours required for this degree, including the 50 hours of General Education Requirements, is 128.¹

All candidates for the degree must complete:

- A. 24 semester hours in the *major*, 18 of which must be at the upperdivision level.

Division of Foreign Languages

The Division of Foreign Languages also offers support courses in Linguistics and Russian.²⁰ <u>Elective courses in Linguistics are offered to give students</u> <u>structural and historical perspective about the specific language(s) studied</u>, as well as about language in general.

Courses which are comparative and multidisciplinary in nature are also provided by the Division under the general designation of <u>Comparative Studies in the</u> <u>Humanities (CHS).</u>[Foreign-Languages- $\{F \models S\}_{\tau}$]

To enable the student to develop skills in a foreign language at least at an intermediate level of proficiency and to introduce the student to the concepts related to the study of language and its structure, the Division of Foreign Languages offers the first semesters of course work in foreign language in multiple track sequences. Completion of the first three courses, or their equivalent, in each track satisfies The University's foreign language requirement for all bachelor's degrees.

Prior to enrolling in a foreign language in which the student has prior knowledge, he or she is encouraged to take one of the examinations in that language available to him through the Testing Center. All or part of the foreign language requirement may be completed and credit earned by examination.²¹

1. Appendix B <u>Preprofessional Courses of Study in Law and the Health Fields</u> [Rules-and-Regulations-for-Determining-Residence-Status]

The University of Texas at San Antonio does not offer specific <u>prelaw</u>, premedical, predental, or prenursing programs; rather students select courses of study in preparation for admission to <u>law</u>, medical, dental, and nursing schools in terms of individual preferences and in terms of specific program requirements of individual professional schools.

The semester hour and grade requirements set forth below [for-medicine,-denistry, and-nursing] are minimum requirements, and satisfaction of these requirements

does not assure admission to any such professional schools, since applications for admission far exceed spaces available.

Preparation for law school. Most law schools do not recommend or encourage students to concentrate in a particular area or discipline, although they do recommend that students acquire certain skills during their undergraduate career. Since these vary from school to school, students should be familiar with the requirements and preferences of the particular school or schools to which they intend to apply. That information can be obtained from the collection of current catalogs and directories for law schools in Texas and throughout the United States on the procedures for admission to law schools and the Law School Admissions Test (LSAT) is also available from the committee. Appointments to consult with members of the committee may be made through the Office of the Division of Social Sciences.

Preparation for nursing school. Amendment to last sentence: For admission to the UT School of Nursing at San Antonio, students should contact the <u>Admission</u> [Student-Personnel] Office of the <u>UT Health Science Center</u> [System School-of-Nursing] at San Antonio.



FIFTH PATHWAY - REQUIREMENTS FOR TEXAS RESIDENTS ATTENDING FORFIGN MEDICAL SCHOOLS

To be considered for admission to a Fifth Pathway Program, an applicant must:

- 1. <u>Have completed</u>, in a <u>United States college or university</u>, <u>undergrad-uate premedical work of the quality acceptable for matriculation in an accredited United States medical school;</u>
- Have completed satisfactorily all didactic work required for graduation by a foreign medical school recognized by the World Health Organization;
- 3. <u>Have passed Part I of the National Roard Examination and each of the</u> component subjects in the examination; and
- 4. <u>ie a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, as defined in the</u> <u>(oordinating Board, Texas College and University System's Pules and</u> <u>regulations for Determining Residence Status.</u>

Upon satisfactory completion of the special supervised academic year of clinical training and after passing the required examination or examinations, the Fifth Pathway trainee shall be awarded a statement by the appropriate Texas medical school certifying satisfactory completion of the prescribed training. However, a Doctor of Medicine degree will not be granted to the Fifth Pathway student. A document shall be signed by the applicant prior to entry into the Fifth Pathway Program, indicating the student's understanding of the stipulation.

The Office of Admissions will furnish more detailed information on this program on request.

PROGRAM IN INFECTIOUS DISEASES AND CLINICAL MICROBIOLOGY

The Program assumes the functions of the traditional department of microbiology and clinical divisions of adult and pediatric infectious diseases. Instructional and practical training are given students in areas of microbiology and clinical infectious diseases. A first year course in microbiology is designed to furnish the student with a working knowledge of the taxonomy, nathophysiology and growth characteristics of important bacteria, fungi, parasites and viruses important to diseases of man. A more comprehensive clinical infectious disease course is presented to the students during the sixth quarter where students are taught basic concepts of microbial-host interactions. They are also given the microblology, pathophysiology and clinical features of various infections so that they are able to prepare a differential diagnosis, develop a diagnostic approach and know the appropriate therapy for patients with: meningitis, pulmonary infiltrate, "sepsis", anaerobic infections, urinary tract infection, pelvic infection, collulitis, fever of unknown origin, gonorrhea, syphilis and infection and control procedures in prevention of nosocomial infections.

<u>During clinical rotations, medical students are exposed to a wide variety of pediatric and adult infectious diseases and a portion of time is spent in the Hermann Hospital Diagnostic Microbiology Laboratory and with the Infection</u> Control Department learning the principles of diagnostic microbiology and hospital epidemiology.

The teaching program in Pediatrics emphasizes the maintenance of good health with optimal growth and development. It is, however, anticipated that all students will gain an approach to the care of a very sick child and learn how to work with his family. The enormous increase in life expectancy that has occurred during the twentieth century has been largely due to marked improvement in infant mortality and to the control of infectious diseases during childhood. These unique aspects about Pediatrics are underscored with particular emphasis in the extraordinarily important newborn period when there is adaptation to the extrauterine environment and to the mental, physical, as well as biochemical aspects of growth and development.

The department is also responsible for the teaching of human genetics. There are faculty with subspecialty training in genetics, metabolism, endocrinology, infectious diseases, hematology-oncology problems. A new teaching program in the ethical and humanistic aspects of medicine in underway. The importance of primary care is emphasized in the general Pediatrics clinics and specialty clinics.

In addition to the general Pediatric program, elective opportunities are available in four-week units in the various clinical and laboratory aspects of Pediatrics and Genetics.

The residency program, which is an integrated program involving the Hermann Hospital and the M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute, is designed to produce generalists in Pediatrics. Post-residency subspecialty training programs are available in endocrinology, genetics, infectious diseases, neonatology, metabolism, ambulatory pediatrics, and hematology-oncology.

Excellence in patient care, clinical training, and basic and applied research is the objective of the Department of Surgery. An intensive five and one-half week course of lectures, seminars, conferences, rounds, operating room experiences and clinical responsibilities is required for all students. This Core Course includes General Surgery, Cardio-Thoracic Surgery, Pediatric Surgery, Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery and Vascular Surgery. In addition, a four-week Surgical Specialty Course introduces the student to Urology, Orthopedics, Neurosurgery and the Head and Neck Specialties, including Ophthalmology, Oral-Maxillofacial Surgery and Otolaryngology. Those who elect a surgical tract are offered a wide variety of electives in clinical and laboratory surgery and the surgical specialties. Emphasis is placed upon providing the student a broad experience in the principles and practice of elective clinical surgery, surgical nutrition and metabolism, intensive care of surgical patients, management of trauma and performance of surgically-oriented basic research. Most of the surgical electives can be tailored to the needs and special interests of individual students. Clinical and laboratory facilities of the Medical School and of the M. D. Anderson, Hermann and St. Joseph's Hospitals are used for teaching and carrying out basic research. Postgraduate training in the Department of Surgery includes availability of a Categorical Surgical Internship and Residencies in teneral Surgery and the Surgical Specialities.

DIVISION OF NEUROSURGERY

The Neurosurgical Program concerns not only the diagnosis and treatment of conditions usually treated by surgery of the brain, spinal cord and peripheral nerves, but also topics of concern to the general list, such as management of pain and head trauma. The rotation through neurosurgery as a surgical subspecialty allows the student an opportunity to participate with the Neurosurgeons in the Out-Patient Department, at the bedside and in the Operating Room. Emphasis is on information of interest to the generalist, such as the neurological examination, acute management of head injury in the Emergency Room, care of patients with intractable pain of various system and evaluation and management of patients with intractable pain of various etiologies. Students are given an opportunity to become familiar with neurosurgical problems so that they might recognize when such problems exist and when it would be appropriate to seek assistance from a neurosurgeon.

An elective can be arranged for promising students with adequate background to <u>pursue more specific areas within the field of Neurosurgery</u>. In addition to working closely with the Departments of Surgery and Neurology, clinical and basic research and development programs exist within the Division of Neurosurgery concerning head trauma, patient monitoring, treatment of pain, narcotic addiction, stereotactic surgery, motor control, cerebrovascular disease, and neural control of respiration. 



Clinic Practice

The employment of all technical skills and knowledge of principles concerned with the total management of the patient's oral health as well as an appreciation of the dental profession's role in maintaining the public's health.

Electives

A complemental program which allows the individual student to develop his knowledge and skills according to his interest and attributes. This insures that the individual student has a more active role in shaping his academic experience. Electives cover the areas of dental research, academic dentistry, and dental specialties.

Each of the topics listed above has a Teaching Topic Committee made up of faculty from all appropriate departments. This committee is responsible for preparing the teaching material for that topic, for the evaluation and for student counselling. The departments that supply the faculty are as follows:

Dental Anatomy

General Practice

Gross Anatomy, Including Neuro-anatomy Histology, General and Oral Medicine, including Diagnosis, Endodontics, Internal Medicine, Periodontics and Roentgenology

Pathology, including Dental Pathology, General Pathology and Microbiology Physics, including Dental Materials Physiology, including Biological Chemistry, Nutrition, Pharmacology and

Physiology

Practice Relations and Management

Preventive Dentistry, including Community Dentistry, Orthodontics and Pedodontics

Restorative Dentistry, including Complete Restorations, Fixed Multiple Restorations, Maxillofacial Prosthesis, Removable Multiple Restorations and Unit Restorations

Surgery

The modules of didactic and laboratory material are arranged sequentially in phases so that the material studied can be applied in the clinical training at the level of the student's achievement. A prescribed curriculum sequence is followed, and the student may not proceed until he has successfully completed all antecedent work.

All of this is presented in a student-centered learning environment which allows the student to progress at his own rate and ability using the resources presented to him. The resources may be printed, videotapes, slides or other visual aids along with availability of laboratory procedures. It is not a scheduled program, although there are time commitments which the student is expected to keep. This program commits the student to be responsible for his learning.

There are few formally scheduled periods other than clinic periods. However, attendance in school during all regular hours is required, and absences must have adequate justification and be only for adequate cause.

The instructional program in the School of Dentistry continues throughout the calendar year with four weeks off in the summer, one week at the end of the summer quarter, two weeks at the end of the fall quarter and one week at the end of the spring quarter. Each quarter consists of eleven weeks. The only quarter which a student may elect not to attend is the summer guarter and then only for adequate reason.

The length of the program is flexible; however, it is not expected that a student can complete the program in less than twelve quarters, and failure to complete the program in sixteen quarters may be cause for dismissal.

Pathology:

HD138d Pathology (Biology of Connective Tissue, Bones and Joints of the Head and Neck)--This course consists of lectures on the biology, ultrastructure, and biochemistry of connective tissues, bones and joints. The main emphasis is on the formation and metabolism of collagen and elastin, on the mineral phase of bone and on the biochemistry of ground substance. Clinical findings, diagnostic methods, and the natural biological history of connective tissue diseases are emphasized. One guarter hour; I lecture per week.

HD2[4]34a [,b] or c [,d] Histopathology <u>Two</u> [Feur] quarter hours; 1 <u>lecture</u> [semimar], 1 lab per week.

HD 235b or d Histopathology-This is an advanced course of study of histopathology. Course 234 a or c is a prerequisite. In this course, students study unknown lesions with emphasis on written descriptions of the process and differential diagnosis. The lesions are then projected and discussed along with individual critiques of the students' written descriptions. Morphologic observation and skill at accurate description are stressed rather than memorization of slides. This course should be helpful to anyone who contemplates research involving histopathology by being better prepared to evaluate histopathologic material. Two quarter hours; 1 lecture, 1 lab per week.

Biochemistry:

HD251a Biochemistry (Prevention; Statistics)--This course deals with the biochemical aspects of human dental disease and biochemical approaches to preventive dentistry. Introductory lectures deal with the design of experiments for thesis-related research and the statistical approach to data resulting from such research. A book entitled "Fundamentals of Statistics for Graduate Students" is furnished. A program of chemical preventive dentistry particularly adapted to patients at advanced risk, and involving primarily home-care treatments with various flourides will be presented. Each student will process extracted human teeth through different flouride solutions to develop an understanding of how flourides protect teeth and differences in performance of different flourides, different concentrations, and different sequential treatment combinations. The final phase of the course deals with salivary gland physiology with emphasis on mechanisms of control of blochemical constituents of saliva and specifically with the flouride in saliva may become directly protective to the tooth surfaces. Two guarter hours; I lecture, I seminar per week.

HD 252b Biochemistry (Tooth Components) -- A study of the recent dental literature in topics covering the theories of acid production, pH and Stephan's curve; the roles of proteins, lipids and carbohydrates in the oral components; a thorough review of the biochemistry of plaque and calculus formation; the mechanism of the calcification phenomenon and the ultrastructure of mineralized tissue will be made. Two quarter hours; I lecture, I seminar per week.

HD253c Biochemistry (Nutrition)--The nutritional basis of oral health is presented. Foods and nutrients and their proper use for achieving ideal nutritional status are discussed in both qualitative and quantitative terms. Mainutrition problems and solutions are studied. The role of diet, dietary supplements and food habits in the prevention of dental disease and in the treatment of dental patients is described. Procedures and programs for assessing and improving nutrition are presented and used. Two quarter hours; I lecture, I seminar per week. HD254d Biochemistry (Pulp; Periodontium)--The course includes consideration of the biochemistry of the soft tissues of the oral cavity as it contributes to an understanding of their normal function and their changes in dental disease. Also included are discussions of the inflammatory process, the periodontium, the pulp and the temporomandibular joint. Two quarter hours; 2 lectures per week.

The student will select recent journal articles dealing with the following: dental plaque formation, theories of dental caries, control measures (oral hygiene, diet, value and validity of caries control tests) and contribution of laboratory animals in studying dental caries. Conditions of special interest are emphasized such as: the pathology of dental carles; dental and oral abnormalities; and bacterial, viral and mycotic diseases of special oral interest. Premalignant lesions and their difference from common benign conditions are emphasized. Winter and Spring quarters. Two credit hours.

D.II. 216 FOUR-HANDED DENTAL ASSISTING--A practical clinical course in the principles of Four-Handed Dentistry. There will be a one-to-one working relationship between the student and a Certified Dental Assistant. Four-Handed Instrument transfer procedures will be performed with the Dental Hygiene student working as the chairside dental assistant. Fall quarter. One credit hour.

D.H. 224 SPECIALTIES OF DENTISTRY Winter and spring quarters. <u>Two</u> [One] credit hours.

D.H. 231 PUBLIC HEALTH Winter [Fall] quarter. Two credit hours.

D.K. 281 HISTOLOGY, EMBRYOLOGY AND HUMAN PHYSIOLOGY**--Introduction to stages of human growth and development with emphasis on face, palate, tongue and salivary glands. Cranial bones and facial musculature. Histogenesis of the tooth (enamel, dentin, cementum and pulp); development of its supporting structures (periodontium and alveolar bone). Eruption and exfoliation processes. Characteristics and components of oral mucosa; histological review of the temporomandibular joint. Comprehensive study of the integrative functions of all body systems. Winter quarter 1976-77. Two credit hours.

D.H. 282 ORAL PATHOLOGY--This is an extension of Oral Pathology 181 covered in more depth with special emphasis on oral cancer and the use of cytologic screening methods, tumors and cysts peculiar to the oral cavity, and lesions of the salivary glands. Also covered are the oral manifestations of general metabolic diseases with emphasis on the syndromes having specific oral findings. Fall quarter. One credit hour.

For any decision that adversely affects a student's standing in any program, the student has the right to appeal the decision to the Dean, School of Allied Health Sciences. In such an event, the Dean will appoint an impartial Ad hoc Review Committee, including student representation, appropriate to the decision required.

The Ad hoc Review Committee will conduct a hearing, where both sides of the controversy will be heard. The student may be represented by Counsel, if be/she so desires, and may present any information or documentation that supports his/her appeal. He/She may also have individuals to testify in his/her behalf.

The varying requirements of the programs of the School result in different completion times. For the present, the School plans only one annual Commencement. This will normally be held in June. All eligible students are expected to present themselves for degree or certificate at that time. In the event that attendance is not possible, a petition for the award en absentia should be made to the Office of the Dean at least three weeks prior to the scheduled event. If required for employment or credentialing, a letter certifying completion of educational requirements may be obtained from the Office of the Dean prior to Commencement.

Add: <u>Student Affairs</u>

Each student by registering, enters the School of Allied Health Sciences and is therefore under the jurisdiction of the Dean of the School. This involves jurisdiction over the student's program of study, degree requirements and conduct. Students taking courses in the school are subject to the regulations of the School.

Any student enrolled may apply for student membership in the association representing the discipline. The purposes of these organizations are to promote interest in the profession with specific aims toward service and fellowship for the social, intellectual and professional benefit of each member. Membership generally entitles the student to the journal of the profession and the right to attend its meetings. Student memberships are available for the American Society for Radiologic Technology, American Society for Medical Technology, American Association for Respiratory Therapy, American Association of Nurse Anesthetists, Association for Educational Communications and Technology, the Speech Communications Association, and the Biological Photographers Association.

Students are encouraged to join the profession's local, state and regional groups as well. Further information can be obtained from the department faculty and journals.

In addition, the American Society of Allied Health Professions, a new group representing all the allied health team, is a highly desirable organization for all students. The office of the Dean can provide information about this organization.

PROGRAM IN MEDICAL TECHNOLOGY EDUCATION

The Profession

Medical Technology is the application of the techniques and knowledge of the biological and chemical sciences to the examination and analysis of body fluids and blood cells. Medical technologists are skilled laboratory workers who perform these analyses which aid physicians in the diagnosis and treatment of patients. This includes clinical chemistry, urinalysis, hematology (study of blood and blood cells), microbiology (isolation and identification of bacteria, viruses, and parasites), clinical immunology (antibody and antigen reactions related to disease), immunohematology (drawing, testing and processing of blood for transfusion.)

The medical technologist works in hospitals, medical schools, research laboratories, independent clinical laboratories, pharmaceutical companies and companies which manufacture laboratory reagents, instruments and supplies, public health agencies, and educational institutions. The medical technologist's responsibility, although varied, requires an understanding of the theory and scientific principles of human biology, chemistry, and analytical instrumentation, and familiarity with educational and managerial aspects associated with medical technology. Equally as important is the ability to perform a wide variety of laboratory procedures.

The Program in Medical Technology Education

The Hermann Hospital School of Medical Technology was formally approved by the Council on Medical Education of the American Medical Association on June 20, 1949. The school had graduated 254 medical technologists from its Inception until the academic year of 1975-76, when it became the Program in Medical Technology Education of The University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston, School of Allied Health Sciences. The faculty of the Department of Pathology of The University of Texas Medical School and the medical technologists in the clinical laboratories of the Hermann Hospital formed the faculty at the creation of this program.

This program offers a 12 month (4 quarters) course conforming to the Essentials published and monitored by the National Agency for Accreditation of Clinical Laboratory Sciences in order to qualify the student for the examination and certification by the Registry of Medical Technologists of the American Society of Clinical Pathologists. This program is also approved by the Veteran's Administration and the U.S. Office of Education.

The year of study consists of 4 months (approximately 640 clock hours) of lectures and coordinated student laboratories designed for the presentation of the theory of the analytical procedures performed in the clinical laboratories and the relationship between the results obtained and disease states. Rotation of 8 months through the Rematology, Clinical Immunology, Clinical Microscopy, Parasitology, Microbiology, Immunohematology, and Clinical Chemistry laboratories allows for structured practical experience in a working hospital laboratory. Successful completion of this course of study requires that 4 consecutive quarters of enrollment, with satisfactory academic and professional achievement, be accomplished.

Program Objectives

The Program in Medical Technology Education will provide the public and the medical community with intellectually qualified and technically capable medical technologists.

It will offer the student an academic program of optimally proportioned didactic instruction, student laboratories, and clinical practicum containing instruction of the fundamentals of clinical laboratory methodologies, instrumentation and clinical sciences in addition to supervised, structured experience in a working laboratory. It will provide a broad base of knowledge and skills in a climate of stimulus for continuing education upon which graduates of this program can build flexible and satisfying careers.

The program will provide a base for continued search for more efficient methods for medical technology education.

The environment and instruction in this program will foster the understanding of and appreciation of the roles of other health professionals.

By frequent evaluation it will maintain objectives and curriculum which will be consonant with the present and future needs of the citizens and medical community of this state and nation.

The Curriculum

The curriculum is organized so that it is equivalent to the fourth (senior) year of college. Students entering the program with a minimum of 90 semester hours or 135 quarter hours will work toward a baccalaureate degree which will be awarded by their base university. Students who enter with a baccalaureate degree will obtain the educational requirements for examination and certification as Medical Technologists (ASCP).

Beginning with the class, 1976-77, it is planned that the degree of Bachelor of Science in Medical Technology will be granted by The University of Texas School of Allied Health Sciences.

Upon completion of the program all students are eligible to take the certifying examination of the Registry of Medical Technologists of the American Society of Clinical Pathologists.

The curriculum is approved by the U.S. Office of Education, the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences and the Council on Medical Education for the American Medical Association.

The first four months of study are in lecture-discussion periods and coordinated structured laboratories. The last eight months are spent in rotation in the laboratories of affiliated hospitals. General Information

Requirements for Admission:

A minimum of 90 semester hours or 135 quarter credits in an accredited college or university is required. These hours must include the following courses in addition to basic baccalaureate degree requirements of the School.

1. Biological Sciences:

16 semester hours (24 quarter hours) including laboratory Microbiology must be included. Immunology and genetics are strongly recommended and students who have at least one of these will have an advantage in the admission process. Genetics will be required for students enrolling after January 1. 1978.

2. Chemistry:

16 semester hours (24 quarter hours) including laboratory Organic or biochemistry and quantitative analysis or a course in analytical chemistry are required. Physical chemistry is recommended.

3. Physics:

A course in physics is recommended and will be required for students enrolling after January 1, 1978.

4. Mathematics:

<u>3 semester hours (4 quarter hours).</u> Courses which are required for physics will satisfy minimum requirements. A course in statistics is strongly recommended.

5. <u>Electives:</u> <u>Courses in business and/or management. education. electronics and computer</u> <u>sciences are recommended.</u>

Authorization for the School of Allied Health Sciences to grant a baccalaureate degree is now being acted upon: until such authorization is received. the program in medical technology must also have a letter from the preparatory university or college stating that applicants have completed all requirements for a baccalaureate degree except for the successful completion of the clinical study provided in this program and that this program will be accepted as completing the degree requirements of that university OR applicants must have a baccalaureate degree prior to entrance in this program OR the applicant's university must have an affiliation agreement on file with the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences and this program must have a letter from the registrar as indicated with the application forms.

The Admission Process:

- 1. Application forms may be obtained from: Program in Medical Technology The University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston 2nd Floor - Hermann Hospital P.O. Box 20036 Houston, Texas 77025 (713) 797-4108
- 2. All application forms including references and transcripts are due by February 15 for the class beginning in July and by August 15 for the class beginning in January.
- 3. If an application is complete and acceptable, prospective students will be asked to come for an interview and to see the facilities of the program. The minimum qualifications are: a. A grade point average of no less than 2.5 on a 4.0 scale b. 80% of grades in science and math must be C or better c. Satisfactory references, medical, physical and dental reports.
- 4. The interviewers will report on the interview.
- 5. The Medical Director and the Program Director will rank the applicants in order of preference.
- 6. Applicants will receive a letter, if accepted, offering a place in the class.
- 7. If the position in the class is accepted, immediate reply is required (within ten days) including payment of a \$40.00 matriculation fee which is applicable to the tuition and student health service fee at the time of registration.

<u>ilours:</u>

Student hours during the year vary with the particular part of the curriculum. This allows the student the opportunity to see the organization of laboratory work at the beginning of the major work shift.

The curriculum during the first sixteen weeks is typically from 8:30 a.m. until 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, and every other Saturday morning from 8:15 until 11:15. Every other Wednesday afternoon is free.

During the remainder of the year the hours depend upon the rotation schedule and are usually 8:00 a.m. until 4:30 p.m., or 7 a.m. until 3:30 p.m. It must be emphasized here that the program is oriented for the student to achieve a level of knowledge and competence and therefore the times listed here are what the average student or slightly above average student may find suitable and are not considered to be definite. The student may be scheduled to attend instruction at 6:00 a.m. in the blood collecting area.

Foreign Students:

Due to limited enrollment and the large number of applicants, only those students who have received their prerequisite college credits from an institution in the United States are eligible for admission.

Student Representative:

A student representative is to be selected by the class after the first month of class. This representative will represent the students at the Education Committee meetings.

Uniforms:

The student is required to provide uniforms. The length and selection of white uniforms should be done with professional discretion. Male students are to wear shirts (sport or dress) slacks and white laboratory coats. Pantsuits are allowed. (If street clothes are worn (not whites) white laboratory coats must be worn.

Books:

Each student is expected to purchase Todd-Sanford Clinical Diagnosis By Laboratory Methods, 15th edition, edited by Davidsohn and Henry, W. B. Saunders Company, Philadelphia, 1974 edition or later.

Books and audiovisual instructional units are available in the library of the Department of Pathology and in the clinical laboratory for student use.

Financial Aid:

In addition to the resources described in the general financial aid section of this catalog, student jobs in the clinical laboratory at Hermann Hospital are available to students in a limited number. The work hours assigned are for early mornings, evening, and weekends for a total of about 12 hours each week. These jobs afford the students a regular monthly income. However, any student may apply for hourly work in the laboratory areas in which he has completed his study.

Evaluation of Students:

Students will be evaluated frequently on their ability to retain facts, to solve problems based on facts presented, and to achieve specified behavioral objectives. The evaluation includes the ability to learn, initiative, persistence, industriousness, priorities, resourcefulness, judgment, knowledge, attempts to improve, quality of work, interest in work, ability to relate to others, verbal communication, and organization of work.

Students who are unable to achieve a satisfactory level of performance in a reasonable length of time or whose conduct compromises the standards of professionalism, will be subject to dismissal. PROGRAM IN MEDICAL TECHNOLOGY EDUCATION

Special Topics

Principles of operation, maintenance, and use of laboratory instruments including pH meters, balances, microscopes, centrifuges, diluters, spectrophotometers, and other manually operated instruments. Also included are automated analyzers or counters in the chemistry, hematology, and other Taboratories.

Clinical Immunology

MT 4120A Clinical Immunology (Lecture/Discussion) 1 Quarter Hour Credit. Structure and characteristics of antibodies and antigens, host defense mechanisms, antigen-antibody reactions, complement, histocompatibility antigens, hypersensitivity, autoimmunity, allergic reactions.

- MT 4120B Clinical Immunology Laboratory I (Laboratory/Discussion/Demonstration) 1 Quarter Hour Credit. Structured laboratory in techniques and methods for the detection of antigens and antibodies.
- MT 4220C Clinical Immunology Laboratory II (Practicum) 2 Quarter Hours Credit. Hospital laboratory experience in techniques and methods of antigenantibody reactions used in the clinical laboratory and the relationship to disease states.

Hematology

- MT 4240A Hematology (Lecture/Discussion) 2 Quarter Hours Credit. Human hematopoesis and its relationship to human disease (anemias, myeloproliferative disorders) and other body organ functions. Morphological and biochemical characteristics of cells normally found in the peripheral blood and bone marrow and those cells of significant diagnostic importance are included. Blood coagulation.
- MT 4140B Hematology Laboratory I (Laboratory/Demonstration/Discussion) 1 Quarter Hour Credit. Methods of preparation of specimens, identification and enumeration both microscopically and electronically of erythrocytes, leukocytes, thrombocytes; calculation of cellular parameters; hemostasis and other properties of blood.
- <u>MT 4740C Hematology Laboratory II (Practicum) 7 Quarter Hours Credit. Structured</u> experiences in a hospital hematology laboratory for the implementation of the knowledge and techniques gained from MT courses 4240A and 4140B).

Clinical Chemistry

- <u>MT 4310A Clinical Chemistry (Lecture/Discussion) 3 Quarter Hours Credit. Principles of analytical methods, both manual and automated, currently used in clinical laboratories. The relationship between the disease state and the clinical chemical variation from normal is included.</u>
- MT 4210B Clinical Chemistry Laboratory I (Laboratory/Demonstration/Discussion) 2 Quarter Hours Credit. Performance of selected clinical chemical methods which serve to demonstrate the principles of the analytical methods currently used in clinical laboratories.
- MT 4910C Clinical Chemistry Laboratory II (Practicum) 9 Quarter Hours Credit. Rotation in a hospital clinical chemistry laboratory including practice of the material learned in MT 4310A and MT 4210B. Organization of work, operation and maintenance of instruments, and control systems are included.

Clinical Microbiology

- MT 4260A Clinical licrobiology (Lecture/Discussion) 2 Quarter Hours Credit. Characteristics of clinically important bacteria, viruses, fungi and rickettsia including role in human diseases, mode of transmission, therapy and identification of the microorganisms.
- MT 4260B Clinical Microbiology Laboratory I (Laboratory/Demonstration/Discussion) 2 Quarter Hours Credit. Methods of isolation and identification of bacteria, rickettsia, fungi and mycoplasma from clinical specimens; including handling and plating of specimens; selection of media; incubation requirements; biochemical tests, and the recording and interpretation of results.

MT 4760C Clinical Microbiology Laboratory II (Practicum) 7 Quarter Hours Credit. Experience during rotation in a clinical microbiology laboratory including practice of material presented in MT 4260A and MT 4260B. Organization of work and quality control systems are included.

Quality Control

MT 4103 Quality Control (Lecture/Discussion) 1 Quarter Hour Credit. Concepts of Quality assurance in the clinical laboratory, Tabelling, specimen identification, statistical methods of establishing normal values, record keeping, instrument records and maintenance.

Seminar

<u>MT 4100A Seminar (Lecture/Discussion) I Quarter Hour Credit. Topics of current interest in medical technology are selected by the student for presentation.</u>

Clinical Microscopy

- MT 4.530A Clinical Microscopy (Lecture/Discussion) 0.5 Quarter Hour Credit. The structure and function of the kidney and the chemical, physical and cellular composition of the urine in health and disease. The chemical, physical, and cellular characteristics of cerebrospinal fluid, synovial fluid, semen, gastric, feces, amniocentesis, and other body fluids are included.
- MT 4.5308 Clinical Microscopy Laboratory I (Laboratory/Demonstration/Discussion) D.5 Quarter Hour Credit. Structured laboratory experience in the chemical physical, microscopic examination of urine, and other body fluids.

PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

The Post-Baccalaureate Certificate Program in Biomedical Communications, a new program in the School of Allied Health Sciences, enrolled its first students in the Winter Quarter of 1976. It is oriented toward the development of a multi-skilled manager in the field of biomedical communications, rather than a technician in any specific area. The program is designed to acquaint the student with:

- the applications of instructional technology and information management to (1)the blomedical field;
- the processes and organization of a health science center; the channels of communication utilized in biomedical operations. $\binom{2}{3}$

Most prospective students have backgrounds in <u>related fields</u>, often <u>in health</u> sciences, communication or education. The career opportunities in biomedical communications are many and varied. Representative employment sources include:

- federal agencies, e.g., National Library of Medicine, National Medical Audio-Visual Center, Veteran's Administration; departments of biomedical communications or central learning resources in (1)
- (2) 85 medical schools, 22 dental schools, numerous nursing and veterinary schools;
- (3) county and state medical societies, especially where physician recertification is part of state law;
- colleges and universities with allied health components. (4)

Flexibility and innovation are key words in the operation of this instructional program, which is based largely on the following assumptions:

- each student and each instructor has a unique set of interests, capabil-(1)ities and preferences;
- (2)optimal learning takes place when the student initiates it, when he/she
- has a sense of personal involvement;
- Tearning can be measured in a variety of ways and is facilitated by evalu-(3) ation and feedback;

(4) individuals learn better when they are expected to succeed.

It follows that student programs are highly individualized.

Extensive pretesting on entrance does much to determine individual strengths and weaknesses and aids also in the formulation of course content. Some students are found eligible to bypass portions of the curriculum or even to participate in the teaching of those subjects in which they are especially competent. There are many opportunities for independent study and self-instruction.

The program aims to cultivate resourcefulness and versatility and a systematic approach to problem-solving in all its students. Biomedical Communications graduates should be prepared to function as administrators, planners, consultants in a broad range of communication-related contexts, in media production and health sciences. They should be aware of the Specialized references, media resources, computerized information and expert personnel available to them when they confront actual situations in biomedical communications which require specific knowledge. They should be capable of evaluating their own operations and those of others. They emerge from the program as generalists, prepared for a variety of employment possibilities.

Curriculum

The Program in Biomedical Communications is organized into four major curriculum components: (1) Communications; (2) Instructional Technology; (3) Health Sciences; (4) Special Topics.

Communications--

The Communications component of the curriculum provides an introduction to communication theory, its definitions, models and applications. Students learn to develop and use communication strategies to solve problems in interpersonal and group communications. The theory and practice of effective communication in complex organizations is presented as it applies to improving communications in health care systems.

Instructional Technology--

This component includes a systematic introduction to the characteristics and uses of various media in the instructional process. This is followed by a "hands on" media sequence designed to provide basic competencies in graphics, photography, film, television, computers and audio. An advanced practicum sequence provides the student with the opportunity to work as an instructional developer in various sites of the medical and health science centers.

Health Sciences--

The Health Sciences portion of the program surveys basic health science, clinical and experimental operations, health care delivery systems and health center organization. Students are expected to acquire some fluency in the biomedical idiom and to become acquainted with curriculum and instruction practices in the various teaching-learning environments of the medical and health science centers.

Special Topics--

The Special Topics courses are designed to supplement and enrich the other offerings of the program. Such diverse areas as futurology and biomedical forecasting, computer applications in health services and methods in research design are incorporated. Any topic in which students or faculty show sufficient interest may be included in this component of the program. Practical experience is emphasized throughout the program. As part of their course work, students may be called upon to conduct interviews, teach seminars and develop miniature instructional units. Whenever possible, they engage in production activities which illustrate the applications of a particular medium to biomedical operations. Opportunities are provided for students to collaborate with instructional development teams, to work with clients on their instructional or communication problems and to develop solutions for them.

Students have at their disposal the vast resources of the Texas Medical Center, with opportunities to observe classes, clinical and experimental procedures, etc., both for content and for the opportunity to compare them to the theoretical models which they are studying. They are afforded a chance to identify the political, social and institutional forces which shape such operations. The curriculum components are unified as students engage in projects in biomedical writing, film production, computer programming, etc.

Admissions Requirements

Applicants are expected to possess a baccalaureate degree from an accredited institution. In certain instances, equivalent work experience may be considered an acceptable substitute.

The applicant is responsible for providing to the above address the following:

- a completed application form; official transcripts of all colleges attended (sent directly to our (2) office);
- three letters of reference;
- a resume of his/her own choosing which includes a description of (4) relevent work experience, academic preparation, honors, future goals and
- objectives; any project, paper, report, photo essay, audio, video, film, or other presentation that provides information as to capabilities and performance, (5) presented in the course of an interview.

Applications are reviewed by the Admissions Committee of the Program in Biomedical Communications and, where applicable, by other professionals in cooperating Institutions involved with the program. Applications may be submitted at any time. The limitations placed on our enrollment by the availability of facilities and instructors for individualized instruction make the flow of admissions somewhat unpredictable at this time.

Advisory Committees

Each student has an advisory committee with three permanent members: a faculty advisor, a resource person, and the coordinator of the Biomedical Communications program. Faculty advisors help students plan their programs and complete them. Resource persons help them to obtain the skills, materials and resources they need. As a whole, the group provides regular feedback and suggestions. Should a student find the course activities unsuitable to his/her needs and interests, the committee can propose alternative activities by which to accomplish similar objectives.

<u>Supplemental instructors and resource persons temporarily join the committee</u> from time to time to assist the student through the specific portions of the curriculum which they teach. They come and go as he/she enters new areas and requires their particular types of expertise. These floating members guarant These floating members guarantee that the advisory committee always has a component which is directly involved with the student's program.

While the committees are always available for guidance, students are expected to set their own goals and priorities. They should have some conception of the educational activities in which they want to participate, the projects they wish to undertake, the persons they would like to have serve on their committees. Students are largely responsible for shaping their own programs. They should be able to evaluate their progress and to set their own pace. They are encouraged to get involved in instruction in those areas in which they are already knowledgeable.

GRADING AND EVALUATION

Grades are reported quarterly on a pass-fail basis and supplemented by competency evaluations. Evaluations are performed by the student, by the advisor, and by faculty and resource persons who have worked with the student. As provided by law, all students have full access to their files. They are free to read any material placed in their records; forms are provided for them to make written replies to any evaluations with which they disagree.

THESIS COMPLETION

Completion of the program requires the submission of a thesis; this need not take the traditional form of a written document. With the approval of the advisory committee, the student may devise and execute some other package, project or production to fulfill this requirement.

The thesis should be submitted in final draft form no later than three weeks before the last day of instruction of the quarter in which the student expects to graduate. At that time, the Registrar needs to be informed of the intention to graduate and of the form in which the student wishes his/her name to appear on the certificate.

FEES

COMMUNICATIONS

C 6400 Introduction to Communication Theory and Practice (4 gtr credits)

> Students are introduced to communication theory through a consideration of its forms, definitions and models. The focus of the seminar is on a basic understanding of human communication in a variety of settings. Communication variables, such as sources, messages, channels and receivers are explored through a variety of exercises.

C 6470 Organizational Communications (4 qtr credits)

Utilizing the communication theory and practices of the introductory seminar (C 6400), students will consider the particular communication problems inherent in complex organizations. Characteristic patterns found in structural settings (upward, downward, bilateral, unilateral, chain, branching) will be explored. The specific health-science related organizations will be analyzed to see what techniques could be applied to improve communication within and among them.

C 6450 Interpersonal and Group Communications

(4 gtr credits)

This seminar begins with an in-depth development of interpersonal skills and ends with the application of these skills to the facilitation of group problem solving. Students participate in activities designed to improve their ability to communicate more effectively in both verbal and non-verbal modes and to listen and respond on a one-to-one basis. Techniques of communication which aid group problem solving and related group work are also examined.

<u>C 9400 Communications Seminar (4 qtr credits)</u>

This is an elective seminar in communications which provides students with an opportunity to develop specialized communication skills for their particular needs and interests. The exact content and procedures for the seminar will be determined by the makeup of the class. Skill development in any communication medium is considered appropriate.

INSTRUCTIONAL TECHNOLOGY

IT 5400 Introduction to Educational Media (4 gtr credits)

A systematic introduction to the characteristics and uses of various media in the instructional process. Guidelines for the utilization of media, in different instructional environments and for different instructional strategies, are considered.

IT 5120 Media Production Sequence (Practicum) (4 credits per quarter)

A three-quarter sequence. A "hands on" approach (taught by experts in each field) aids students in understanding the fundamentals of graphics, photography, audio, film, television and computers. Instruction takes place in the various health care facilities where the practitioners are employed.

IT 5470 Planning and Design of Instructional Programs (4 gtr credits)

This course is designed to provide students with a theoretical framework from which they can approach instructional development and to Introduce them to the instructional development process. Students will complete projects under the direction of instructional developers.

IT 9400 Advanced Seminar in Instructional Development (4_qtr credits)

An elective course in the instructional development approach to solving educational problems in a variety of health-related areas. This course allows the student to select an area in instructional development in which he/she would like to gain advanced competencies. It also provides insights into change agentry and curriculum innovation.

HEALTH SCIENCES

HS 8400 Health Science Institutions and Their Organization (4 qtr credits)

An introduction to the theories and principles of health care organizations. This includes curriculum and instructional practices, goals and objectives, organizational structure, management techniques, and program responsibilities. The course provides basic information which will prepare students for their classroom visitations in Basic (HS 8450) and Clinical (HS 8470) Health Science. HS 8450 Basic Health Science Terminology and Organization (4 gtr credits)

This course is presently being conducted through programmed self-instruction. Students are expected to complete a basic programmed text in terminology before they begin visiting classes in the Health Science Center. Other individualized activities, such as viewing video and slide tape programs are conducted in conjunction with the students' visitations.

<u>IIS 8470 Clinical Science Organization and Practice (4 qtr credits)</u>

This course is also conducted through self-instruction and includes visits to selected clinic sites in the Health Science Center and the Texas Medical Center. Students observe, record and make presentations regarding the content and the process of the teaching-learning environments to selected faculty who are prepared to criticize students' work and synthesize their experience.

HS 9400 Advanced Seminar in Health Science (4 qtr credits)

Students who wish to be employed as instructional developers in specialized medical facilities may elect this course in order to better prepare themselves to communicate with and function effectively for the highly skilled specialist. Independent learning experiences in the preparation of instructional materials and the operation of specialized media are provided at specified sites in the Houston health science/medical care complex.

* * * * *

- BMC 7500 Special Topics in Biomedical Communications (3 qtr credits) Topics vary according to requests of faculty and students. May be repeated for credit.
- BMC 8500 Independent Study in Biomedical Communications (1-4 gtr_credits)

An opportunity for students to explore areas of special interest or to accomplish certain instructional objectives in their educational programs. The student works under the direction of his/her faculty advisor and in cooperation with faculty members whose expertise lies in the area he/she undertakes to study. Guidelines for submitting a proposal for independent study are available from the office of the Coordinator.

BMC 9500 Thests

(6-12 qtr credits)

In completion of the thesis requirement, the student has a choice of formats (See section entitled "Thesis Completion" for details). Credit awarded varies according to the decision of the individual's advisory committee. The format and content of the thesis project may dictate the selection of additional specially qualified faculty members to serve upon the advisory committee as thesis advisors.

The Profession

Nurse anesthetists, trained in the use of special equipment, administer anesthesia to surgical and obstetrical patients as well as providing indispensable support in the care and resuscitation of the critically ill. Although nurse anesthetists have unusual responsibilities for the safety of the patient, the rewards and challenges are great for those dedicated people who enter this field.

A growing demand for anesthesia services so essential to surgery and other types of care has created a wealth of job opportunities for qualified nurse anesthetists in hospitals and public health services across the country.

The Program in Nurse Anesthesia Education

The Nurse Anesthesia Education Program, a recent addition to the School of Allied lealth Sciences, is a twenty-four month course of study leading to a Certificate in Nurse Anesthesia. Graduation from the program provides eligibility to write the qualifying examination for certification in this clinical specialty administered by the American Association of Nurse Anesthetists' Council on Certification. This program is conducted in collaboration with the Department of Anesthesiology, The University of Texas Medical School at Houston, Hermann Hospital, The Univer-sity of Texas System Cancer Center M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute and other affiliated hospitals.

Program Objectives

The curriculum of the program is designed to achieve the following major objectives:

- Prepare professionally competent, concerned nurse anesthetists capable 1. oŦ:
 - Administering physiologically sound anesthetics within the confines a. of the operative, diagnostic, and therapeutic situation and the pathological condition of the patient.

- Recognizing signs and symptoms and synthesizing knowledge of Ь. behavioral and physiological sciences in making nursing and medically delegated judgments and in defining and implementing anesthetic and nursing care plans for meeting patient needs.
- Functioning as a resource person in the area of acute care, in-cluding respiratory care, cardiopulmonary resuscitation, fluid therapy, and sophisticated patient monitoring. in-Ċ.
- Assisting others to learn in selected health areas related to area d. of expertise.
- Evaluating current research for possible incorporation into e. practice.
- Prepare professionally committed nurse anesthetists capable of: 2.
 - Demonstrating responsibility of one's own actions and motivation for continuing personal and professional growth. °a.
 - Monitoring trends in society and health care for implications to b, the nurse anesthesia profession and practice.

Admissions Requirements

Students are admitted once yearly, with classes beginning in the fall quarter of each academic year. All applications should be submitted prior to April 15. Interview of eligible applicants will be conducted during the months of April and May. Selection of students must await notification of the awarding of preaccreditation status for the Nurse Anesthesia Educational Program by the American Association of Nurse Anesthetists' Council on Accreditation. Once pre-accreditation status has been achieved, selections will be made expeditiously and each applicant will be notified of the Selection Committee's decision.

- Current license to practice professional nursing. (Must have Texas license or be eligible for Texas license.) 1.
- 2. Graduation from an NLN accredited School of Nursing. (Nurses with BSN or other appropriate baccalaureate degree will be given preference.)
- GPA 2.75 or better, or graduation in upper 1/3 of class. з.
- Nursing Experience: minimum of one year, preferably in an intensive 4. care setting (ICU, CCU, ER, UR, etc.

(If within the individual state, it is illegal to photocopy nursing license, submit other evidence of nursing license.)
- 2. Interview:

After the above are received, a personal interview with each eligible applicant for the program will be conducted by the program director or other designated faculty member(s).

- 3. Selection Process:
 - a. Selections are made on a best qualified basis by an appropriate faculty committee after review of all applications. Motivation, intellectual ability and achievement, nursing experience and personal attributes are all considered in the evaluation process.
 - b. While the preference may be given to Texas residents, selections are made without regard to age, race, creed, sex or national origin.
 - c. Successful applicants will be notified by mail of their selection. Unsuccessful applicants will also be notified providing reasons for non-selection and recommendations for improving their opportunities for selection if they choose to reapply.
- 4. Student Admission Physical Examination:

A physical examination, including audiogram, will be performed on all successful applicants at a time mutually agreed upon. Any past or present major or chronic health problems deemed to be incapacitating by the medical staff for students within this program will be cause for revocation of admission. In such an event, the matriculation fee will be returned.

General Information

Books: Each student will be required to purchase specified textbooks costing approximately \$150.00. These will include an advanced physiology text, an advanced pharmacology text, a Fundamentals of Anesthesia text and a Pediatric Anesthesia text. Reading lists and references will be used extensively in teaching.

Financial Assistance: In addition to the sources of aid listed in the general information section of this catalog, the American Association of Nurse Anesthetists has limited funds for student loans. Student Employment: Students will not be allowed to work outside of their school committment. Student Time Committment:

Total time committment within the program shall not exceed 60-66 hours weekly, Including class, clinical practicum, and class and clinical preparation committments. Class preparation time is allotted on the basis of two hours study per one hour of didactic class, although some students may have to study more. The first six months of the program will be predominantly class and some laboratory experiences; the latter portion of the program will be predominately clinical in nature. Clinical correlation conferences will be conducted throughout the clinical program.

Students will be assigned in the clinical area for selected shifts and call experience. The call experiences may include 16-hour or 24-hour call.

<u>Students will be evaluated by multiple faculty utilizing a variety of methods.</u> <u>including academic testing, written and oral, and clinical observation utilizing</u> <u>clinical evaluation tools and anecdotal and critical incident notes.</u> <u>Comprehensive</u> <u>examinations covering the curriculum covered to date will be given at the 12th</u> <u>month interval and within the last month before graduation.</u>

Sustained Exposure to Anesthetic Environments and Personal Health:

There have been studies done in the past several years in which sustained exposure to an anesthetic environment has been associated with an increase in abortions. birth defects and certain type malignancies among female and male personnel. While no cause and effect relationship has been shown, careful consideration of these findings should be given in choosing anesthesia as a specialty and accepting the risks that may be involved. Most hospitals have or will have in the near future anesthetic gas exhaust systems for minimizing the risk to O.R. personnel encountered from this potential hazard. Responsibility for these risks rests with the individual who chooses to work within this environment rather than with institutions.

Uniforms and Equipment:

<u>Students will be required to purchase three white coats, conductive O, R. shoes,</u> and an ear mold for precardial monitoring upon enrollment into the program. <u>Approximate cost of these items will by \$80.00.</u> Purchase of white coats and ear mold should await advisement from the Program Director.

Formal evaluation and counseling sessions with students will be conducted quarterly, or more frequently if indicated. <u>Students must maintain expected progression throughout the program, attaining and maintaining a 2.0 grade point average for both didactic and clinical work.</u>

Course Outline

The curriculum of this program is built on a professional nursing base. It provides for the attainment of clinical competence in Nurse Anesthesia practice while building on a theoretical base which includes the basic sciences as well as medical and nursing sciences. It also provides an orientation to the functional roles of a professional practitioner. It is designed to comply with the requirements for accreditation as defined by the American Association of Nurse Anesthetists' Council on Accreditation, providing graduates of the program with those qualifications necessary to write the qualifying examination for certification in this clinical specialty.

The design is a modified two-phase (Theoretical-Clinical) approach which is aimed at providing a theoretical base on which to build professional and clinical competence. It allows for the reinforcement of theoretical learning through clinical teaching and clinical correlative conferences. This approach is used believing that:

- <u>Theoretical knowledge and understanding is prerequisite to the acquisition</u> of clinical competence.
- <u>Clinical skills are more readily acquired when there is an understanding of</u> the anatomical, physiological and physical principles underlying them.
- 3. <u>Clinical teaching is facilitated by the student's understanding of the</u> <u>scientific, philosophical and professional basis for practice</u>.
- 4. That safe attitudes of practice can best be promoted when the curriculum design supports the philosophy of practice, i.e., that knowledge and adequate information are prerequisite to the assumption of professional responsibility for clinical performance.
- 5. The ability to utilized and retain theoretical knowledge and understanding is best facilitated through reinforcement from a variety of directions or approaches and that such reinforcement is facilitated through this approach to teaching.

The Profession

<u>Respiratory Therapy (inhalation therapy) is an allied health specialty which is concerned with the treatment of patients with deficiencies and abnormalities associated with the process of breathing.</u>

The respiratory therapist uses therapeutic and diagnostic aids related to breathing. He/she must be knowledgeable and proficient in cardiopulmonary resuscitation, positive pressure ventilation, and chest physiotherapy. His responsibilities include aiding in the treatment of heart and lung ailments such as cardiac failure, asthma, pulmonary edema, emphysema, stroke, drowning, hemorrhage, and shock. He often performs under the stress of emergency situations.

ADMINISTRATIVE SCIENCES

There is no degree program offered at the present time. At the doctoral level, however, a student whose background is in administration, political science, or sociology and who can qualify for admission into the Ph.D. program in Rehavioral Sciences, may pursue a degree program with major emphasis in the administrative sciences. The primary purpose of the teaching program in administrative sciences is to provide basic, mid-level, and advanced courses in administration and planning that will help to satisfy the educational needs and requirements of students in the problem-oriented modules.

BEHAVIORAL SCIENCES

The sciences of human behavior are an especially critical component in the teaching and research programs of a school of public health because the major public health problems -- such as population growth, degradation of the environment, deviant behavior militating against mental and social well-being, and the organization and delivery of health services -- can be accurately described as having both their origin and solution in human behavior.

The Faculty in Behavioral Sciences does not feel, however, that basic master's degree programs in the various behavioral science disciplines are appropriate In the setting of a school of public health. It is, however, clear that a Ph.D. in Community Health Sciences with a field concentration in a social or behavioral science is both appropriate and desirable in such a setting. The distinguishing feature of such a program (and its justification) is that the program of study, the qualifying examination and the thesis research would all focus on some social or behavioral aspect of a community health problem.

Thus, depending upon the current availability of faculty resources, well-qualified students can complete a doctoral program at the School with a field concentration in areas such as economics, political science, sociology, anthropology, psychology, or any combination of these. Furthermore, these behavioral science fields of concentration are also available as related minor fields for doctoral students with other areas of concentration.

Prereguisites

1. Masters degree in one of the behavioral or social science disciplines or its equivalent or demonstrated competency by examination in a social or behavioral science.

Degree Requirements

Completion of an approved program of study, satisfactory performance on a qualifying examination in a Behavioral Science and presentation of a dissertation focusing on behavioral aspects of community health.

BIOMETRY

Biometry refers to the development of statistical models for the quantitative analysis of biological systems. Within the academic program of the School of Public Health, biometry refers to the development and application of mathematical and statistical representations appropriate to the analysis of biological, demographic, social and other forms of organization which bear on the problems of human health and disease. This definition encompasses the areas of biostatistics, biomathematics, demography, and operations research. The faculty in biometry offers a curriculum leading to the M.S. and Ph.D. degrees in Community Health Science with emphasis in biometry.

Master of Science Program

The M.S. degree program is ordinarily a two-year full-time program. Graduates are trained in research design, basic statistical theory, data analysis, computer applications, and statistical consultation. Graduates also acquire a depth of knowledge in at least one minor area. The minor area is selected from the discipline and module descriptions given elsewhere in the catalog. Graduates of the program are prepared to enter intermediate statistical posts in governmental or private health agencies, or in univeristy-based health research programs.

Entrance Reguirements

Students entering the M.S. program hold an undergraduate degree in the mathematical, physical, biological, or social sciences. Mathematical courses at least through calculus are required for entrance. Advanced mathematical training and knowledge of computer programming is highly desirable. The student must also meet the general admission requirements of the institution.

Course of Study

On admission a biometry faculty advisory committee is appointed for each student. This committee will assist the student in selection of a course of study, advise the student on related academic matters and periodically evaluate the student's progress.

It is expected that at least one-half of all courses elected for the M.S. degree be in the major concentration. Of these courses, the following are required: PH 225-227 Intermediate Biometric Methods and PH 251-253 Statistical Theory of Biometry. These requirements may be waived by examination.

Formal instruction occurs in the Fall, Winter, and Spring quarters. Summer quarters ordinarily are used to provide the student with directed research experience, field experience with a health agency, or additional intensive coursework by attendance at the national cooperative summer program of statistics applied to the health sciences. Funding for specialized summer programs is arranged on an individual basis and at no additional expense to the student. Summer programs may require brief periods of time off-campus.

The M.S. program requires the completion and defense of a written project which demonstrates the student has acquired a comprehensive knowledge on the application of biometry to a problem of human health or disease. The student's M.S. advisory committee also serves as thesis guidance committee.

Doctor of Philosophy Program

The Ph.D. program is ordinarily a three year full-time program beyond the M.S. degree. Graduates are expected to be independent investigators in the development and application of biometric analysis to problems of human health and disease. Graduates are prepared to assume senior statistical posts in governmental or private health research agencies or follow careers in teaching and research at the university level.

Entrance Reguirements

Students entering the Ph.D. program are expected to hold a Master of Science degree in biometry or its equivalent. Students with a graduate degree in either the biomedical, physical, or social sciences and with advanced mathematical training are eligible for admission. In cases of exceptional academic achievement, students without an advanced degree but with the requisite mathematical training may be admitted to the Ph.D. program. The student must also meet the general admission requirements of the institution.

Course of Study

Students who do not hold an M.S. degree in biometry or its equivalent are expected to fulfill the course reuginements in biometry for the M.S. degree or demonstrate competence in these areas by examination. The student will ordinarily complete the course sequences in multivariate analysis, stochastic processes, and linear models. The student will also elect additional work in operations research, demography or experimental design. Two minor fields are required. Minor areas are selected from discipline and module descriptions given elsewhere in the catalog.

At the end of the second year of doctoral study, the student must satisfactorily complete a written comprehensive examination in biometry and two minor fields. Upon completion of the qualifying examination requirement, a doctoral guidance committee is appointed and the student will work with this committee to prepare a research plan which demonstrates the student's capacity to conceive and conduct independent research in biometry. The research plan will culminate in the completion and presentation in written form of an original research project that makes a substantial contribution to knowledge in biometry.

Members of the biometry faculty include Thomas Downs, Arthur Littell, Ronald Forthofer, Ralph Frankowski, Jay Glasser, Robert Hardy, Morton Hawkins, Bartholomew Hsi, Asha Kapadia, Gary Cutter, Eun Sul Lee, and Clayton Eifler. Other faculty affiliated with the biometry discipline by virtue of joint teaching or research programs include Benjamin Bradshaw, Paul Callen, Ranajit Chakraborty, Carl Hacker, and William Schull.

ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCES

The Environmental Sciences Discipline is a composite of faculty specialists in the several biological, chemical, physical, engineering and other sciences underlying the analysis and management of the human environment. It develops basic survey courses in environmental health and specialized courses necessary to students, emphasizing particular categorical tracks such as water quality and its management, the air resource, food quality control and sanitation, radiological health, occupational hygiene, waste management, environmental physiology and veterinary public health. Student curricula sponsored by the discipline lead to the M.S. and Ph.D. degrees. Additionally, some student programs preparing for management and administration of environmental health activities may more appropriately terminate in the M.P.H. or Dr.P.H. degrees. EPIDEMIOLOGY

The field of epidemiology is the basic science of preventive medicine and public health, being concerned with the determinants and distribution of diseases in the population. Epidemiologic methods are currently being applied to a wide variety of health problems related to infectious and non-infectious diseases, organization and delivery of health services, and environmental and occupational health hazards. The faculty in epidemiology offers a curriculum leading to the M.S. and Ph.D. degrees.

Master of Science Degree

The M.S. degree program in epidemiology will prepare graduates for intermediate positions in government or private health agencies, or research projects with an epidemiologic mission.

Admission Requirements

Candidates for this degree should hold a baccalaureate or professional degree in the biomedical, physical, or social sciences or several years of practical experience in epidemiologic related work. The student must meet the general admission requirements of the institution.

Course of Study

Each student will have an advisory committee to assist in selection of courses, evaluation of academic progress and review of a master's thesis focusing on an epidemiologic problem.

Students will complete the PH 311, 312, 313 course sequence and elect special topics in epidemiology (PH 398, PH 399) to obtain a broad understanding of epidemiologic issues and research problems related to infectious and non-infectious diseases. Basic to the understanding of human diseases is the study of genetics, pathology, physiology and microbiology. Students whose background is deficient may study these subjects through a series of electives. Candidates must also demonstrate an understanding of biometry prior to completion of their M.S. degree.

In addition to coursework, successful completion of the M.S. degree depends upon preparation of a master's thesis which usually involves research relating to an epidemiologic problem. Students may formulate their own research problem or assist the faculty with development of an existent research project. Doctor of Philosophy Degree

The Ph.D. degree is offered to those students whose career interests are in teaching or research. Graduates are expected to be independent researchers capable of formulating and developing research concerned with epidemiologic problems.

Admission Requirements

<u>Candidates for the Ph.B. degree should hold at least an M.P.H., M.S. or</u> equivalent professional degree in the biomedical, physical or social sciences, and must meet the general admissions requirements of the institution.

Course of Study

Those seeking a Ph.D. degree should anticipate a three year program of study.

lipon admission to the degree program, the student will form an advisory committee whose purpose will be to oversee the academic program, evaluate the student's progress and administer a qualifying examination. This examination is given when the student has completed the basic coursework and feels ready to begin work on the doctoral thesis.

The student must complete the PH 311, 312, 313 course sequence and electives as determined by consultation with the advisory committee, and demonstrate understanding of disease related subjects such as genetics, pathology, physiology and microbiology, and biometry.

Students are required to elect 4 courses in each of two designated minor fields, selected from the disciplines or modules. A member of each minor discipline or module will usually be a member of the advisory committee.

Upon satisfactory completion of the qualifying examination, a thesis review committee will be formed to replace the advisory committee. The thesis committee will review the student's doctoral dissertation which will be a research study which constitutes a substantial contribution to the field of epidemiology.

Ph.D. students are expected to assist with the epidemiology teaching program.

The epidemiology faculty is currently engaged in a wide variety of research activities including epidemiologic aspects of infectious disease, cardiovascular disease, cancer, environmental and occupational health hazards, delivery and organization of health services and family planning. The faculty encourages and desires students to participate in these research activities which may serve as the basis of the student's master or doctoral thesis.

Faculty affiliated with the Epidemiology Discipline are Patricia Buffler, Bobbe Christensen, Vincent Guinee, Alfonso Holguin, Lewis Roht, Beatrice Selwyn, and Reuel Stallones.

HUMAN ECOLOGY

Human Ecology focuses on the study of the effects of man on his environment and those of the environment on man. The faculty seeks to prepare students to understand these man-environment interactions, to measure their effects on health, and to develop intervention strategies aimed at ameliorating the consequences for human health. To these ends the faculty offers a curriculum leading to the Ph.D. in Community Health Sciences. The student is expected to complete a three-part self-paced program in approximately four quarters, a course in biometry equivalent to PH 225, 226, and 227, and three quarters of independent study learning skills from three different members of the faculty. Opportunity is available for taking electives of particular interest to the student. Each quarter the student is expected to participate in a non-credit discipline seminar on current topics in human ecology.

To advance from part to part in the self-paced program, the student must successfully pass a written examination. The final examination will serve as the qualifying examination.

Upon qualifying for the doctoral program the student will prepare and defend a doctoral dissertation in order to complete requirements for the Ph.D.

For admission as a doctoral candidate in the Human Ecology Discipline, the student must fulfill the general admission requirements of the school, hold to the M.S. degree, and identify an advisor. Prior educational experience in the biological and physical sciences and mathematics is strongly recommended.

The faculty also provides opportunities for students with the B.S. degree to earn the M.S. degree in Community Health Sciences with an emphasis on human ecology. In this case the curriculum is designed to prepare the student to enter the doctoral program.

The Master of Public Health (M.P.H.) degree is the basic professional degree in the field. It is required for many supervisory and managerial positions in public health and is recommended for many others.

Each student will be affiliated with one of the teaching-research modules units and will ordinarily do most of his work with that module unit. An M.P.H. may be completed in nine months, however, the majority of students take one year or longer to complete all degree requirements.

Revision to DOCTOR OF PUBLIC HEALTH section, pp. 21-22.

(20)Add REDUIRED REVIEW paragraph after THESIS COMMITTEE paragraph.

REQUIRED REVIEW

Any student who has been admitted to candidacy for a doctoral degree is expected to complete the degree within three years from the date of admission to candidacy; otherwise, his doctoral thesis committee will review his case at the end of the three-year period and annually thereafter, and will consider such recommendations as (1) the meeting of any new requirements which may have been adopted in the interim, (2) additional course work, or (3) termination of the candidacy. Recommendations of the doctoral thesis committee are forwarded to the Dean.

(21)Revise MASTER OF SCIENCE section, p. 23, as follows:

The Master of Science (M.S.) degree in Community Health Sciences is offered with the following fields of concentration:

Biometry Environmental <u>Sciences</u> Health Epidemiology Human Ecology

These are research fields, each with a theory, a body of knowledge, and a set of methods that define it uniquely. However, they interrelate substantially and constitute much of the broad field of human ecology. Since preparation in depth in such a multiplicity of fields is manifestly impossible, we expect the student to concentrate in one or a few areas and gain some understanding of the interrelations within the array. Where the requisite skills are not included in our own faculty, students will be encouraged to draw upon the resources of other institutions of higher learning in Houston and <u>elsewhere</u> elswhere. To a large extent the program will be arranged by each student for himself in consultation with his faculty advisor and cannot be defined as a list of courses. The majority of M.S. students take at least two years to complete all degree requirements.

(22)Revise the DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY section, pp. 24-25.

The Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) degree in Community Health Sciences represents outstanding scholarly attainment, signifies a capacity for independent study, and is primarily a research and teaching degree. Curricular leading to this degree are offered in the following fields of concentration:

Any student who has been admitted to candidacy for a doctoral degree is expected to complete the degree within three years from the date of admission to candidacy: otherwise, his doctoral thesis committee will review his case at the end of the three-year period and annually thereafter, and will consider such recommendations as (1) the meeting of any new requirements which may have been adopted in the interim, (2) additional course work, or (3) termination of the candidacy. Recommendations of the doctoral thesis committee are forwarded to the Dean.

(25)Add the PLACEMENT ACTIVITIES section, as follows:

The UTSPH Career Information Advisory is a resource center to assist degree candidates and alumni in identifying potential areas of employment and in acquiring the employment-search skills necessary for attaining satisfactory careers in public health.

The CIA publishes a Newsletter approximately monthly, in which position vacancies received by the School are briefly described, along with commentary on public health employment trends. The primary purpose of the Newsletter is to acquaint students with job requirements and salary ranges in the public health employment milleu. In keeping with the general philosophy of the School as a resource center, the CIA collects directories of public health agencies, names and addresses of community health facilities and other information to aid in identifying potential places of employment. There is no charge for the services of the CIA.

In addition, career counseling is available to provide realistic information about post-graduation employment opportunities, salary ranges, position titles and related matters. Guest speakers are invited to provide descriptions of current opportunities for public health graduates. Students may request special presentations related to careers-manpower-employment. Assistance in constructing resumes is also offered. A summary of the DTSPH Alumni is presented during orientation week to provide information on the employment experiences of DTSPH graduates.

(28)Revise the THESIS OR PROJECT COMPLETION section, p. 27, paragraph 3, as follows:

Students intending to graduate in June should inform the Office of Student Records by <u>March 18 May-19</u> about the form in which they wish their names to appear on their diplomas. Students planning to graduate at other dates should inform the Office of Student Records about the preparation of their diplomas at the time their theses or project reports are filed.

(29)Revise the LIBRARY FACILITIES section, p. 28, paragraph 1, as follows:

The University of Texas School of Public Health Library maintains a current collection of materials relevant to public health. The collection is composed of over 16,000 11,999 bound volumes (books/journals) and an estimated 5,000 2,999 pamphlets. Additional materials are obtained in various media, such as conferences on audio-cassettes and the U.S. census on microfiche.

(30)Revise the ADMISSIONS PROCEDURES section, pp. 28-29, paragraph 4, as follows:

<u>Satisfactory scores</u> Secres obtained on the aptitude test of the Graduate Record Examination. This test is given six times a year at The University of Texas at Austin and some 500 other centers around the country. The course utilizes a teaching reference community in which particular problems illustrative of community health practice are set and solved. It includes the fundamentals of community health, public policy and planning, evaluation, and financing, epidemiology, biostatistics, computer sciences, public administrative, managerial skills and public health law. It is the equivalent of three courses. Fall Quarter

PH 171 Community Health Practice II The Faculty in Community Health Practice A continuation of PH 170, focusing on the application of more advanced specialized health professional skills and knowledge in both simulated and actual community situations. It is the equivalent of two courses. Winter Quarter

PH 172 Community Health Practice III The Faculty in Community Health Practice

A continuation of PH 171. It is the equivalent of two courses. Spring Quarter

<u>PH 173 Case Studies in Community Health Practice</u> The Faculty in Community Health Practice

A case method approach to community health practice. Cases are used to involve the student in real life situations as a means of developing insights into current issues in community health programs and the knowledge and skills necessary to deal with these issues. Spring Quarter

PH 174 Policies and Practices of Local Health Departments The Faculty in Community Health Practice

The course will provide insight into policies and practices of present day local health departments in dealing with community health problems. Among the participating faculty are Directors of Departments of Public Health in the area who will draw freely on their current activities for course material. The historical and conceptual basis for the role, objectives, and programs of health departments will be reviewed. Operational strategies and issues relating to organization and administration, program development and implementation, community relationships and intergovernmental functions will be presented and discussed. Spring Quarter

PH 178 Special Topics in Community Health Practice The Faculty in Community Health Practice

Topics vary from quarter to quarter. May be repeated for credit. All quarters

PH 179 Individual Study in Community Health Practice The Faculty in Community Health Practice

A plan of study designed and developed by the student and supervised by a member of the community health practice faculty. May be repeated for credit. All guarters

PH 182 Contemporary Intervention and Innovation Strategies in the U.S. Health Service Sector The Faculty in Health Services Organization

This course will include a description and critical evaluation of major public and private attempts to change the organization, delivery, and financing of health services in the U.S. Contemporary issues discussed with reference to the attempts to affect changes in specific aspects of the health care system, and the rationale for such change. Spring Quarter Prereguisites: PH 180 and PH 181 or consent of instructor

PH 183 Topics in Dental Public Health Plummer

This course consists of lectures and discussions of issues relating to the delivery of community-oriented dental health services. Specific reference will be made to the following topic areas: epidemiology of dental disease, dental manpower, dental health survey design, governmental programs related to dentistry, preventive dentistry and problems associated with the delivery of dental services to handicapped persons. Spring Quarter

PH 422 Control of Health Hazards in Foods Lewis

An evaluation of the microbiological and chemical hazards associated with foods, including discussion of the administrative systems and technical procedures that contribute to protection of the consumers' health. Fall Quarter

Principles and applications of treatment processes currently used to provide potable municipal and rurAl water supplies are studied. THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS SCHOOL OF NURSING

The University of Texas School of Nursing, established in 1890 as the John Sealy Hospital Training School of Nurses, is one of the oldest schools of nursing in the Southwest. It was originally organized as an independent school under a Board of Lady Managers. In 1896, it was transferred to The University of Texas and became the School of Nursing, one of the divisions of the Medical Branch with the diploma granted by The University. In 1932 the name of the school was changed to the John Sealy College of Nursing. A curriculum leading to the Bachelor of Science in Nursing was established in 1923 in cooperation with the College of Arts and Sciences of The University of Texas at Austin. This was in addition to the diploma course. In 1943 this program was transferred to the John Sealy College of Nursing.

<u>Through the financial assistance of the Texas Graduate Nurses Association, courses for graduate nurses were first offered in 1930 in the Department of Physical and Health Education of the School of Education at The University of Texas at Austin. In 1940 a complete curriculum was established Teading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Nursing Education. Funds for the support of this program were given to The University by the Texas Graduate Nurses Association in the form of a scholarship fund to be used for Texas nurses. In 1945 this curriculum was transferred to the Medical Branch administration, bringing both the John Sealy College of Nursing and the newly created Department of Nursing Education together to form the School of Nursing with its own Dean. In September, 1949, a curriculum leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science of diploma programs was established.</u>

Through the generosity of the W. K. Kellogg Foundation a program leading to the Master of Science in Nursing with a major in nursing service administration was offered in 1952. Participating in the program of the Southern Regional Education Board for graduate education in nursing, the School of Nursing first offered additional specialization in 1955. In 1957 the School of Nursing admitted the last class to the diploma program. Since that time it has offered one basic program leading to a Bachelor of Science in Nursing.

In the fall of 1960, Austin became an extension campus of the School of Nursing which was still headquartered in Galveston, and nursing courses were offered on the Austin campus for the first time.

The School of Nursing was reorganized in 1967 as The University of Texas Nursing School (System-wide) and the administrative offices were moved to Austin, The School was renamed The University of Texas System School of Nursing in 1972. Junior and senior level nursing courses were offered in six locations: Austin, El Paso. Fort Worth, Galveston, Houston and San Antonio. In Austin, El Paso and Fort Worth a student could enroll for four years with liberal arts courses being taken at The University of Texas at Austin, El Paso and Arlington respectively, Also, courses could be transferred from any approved Junior college or university.

The School of Nursing at Houston started a master's program January 1976. On March 26, 1976. The Board of Regents of The University of Texas System voted to reorganize the Schools of Nursing in the System and to place each school under the administration of the president of the health science center or academic institution nearest its location. On September 1, 1976, the School of Nursing at Houston became The University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston School of Nursing.

(6) Addition of the section PROGRAMS IN THE SCHOOL OF NURSING as follows:

The School of Nursing offers an undergraduate program leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Nursing and a graduate program leading to the degree of Master of Science in Nursing. The undergraduate program is designed for students who wish to enter the profession of nursing and for students who have earned a diploma in nursing and desire to obtain the baccalaureate degree. The master's program is designed for nurses who hold the baccalaureate degree and wish to obtain advanced preparation which will prepare them as clinical specialists, teachers, administrators and researchers.

The baccalaureate and master's program are accredited by the National League for Nursing. The baccalaureate program is also accredited by the Board of Nurse Examiners for the State of Texas.

(7) Addition of <u>CLINICAL FACILITIES</u> section as follows:

The School of Nursing is located in the Texas Medical Center where students have a variety of educational opportunities. Clinical learning experiences are available within UT components in the Medical Center, such as Hermann Hospital and The University of Texas System Cancer Center.

<u>The Memorial Hospital System, St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital, Texas Children's Hospital, Texas Heart Institute, Texas Institute for Rehabilitation and Research and Texas Research Institute of Mental Sciences are also utilized by the School of Nursing.</u>

In addition to these extensive hospital resources, students have experience in neighborhood health centers, nursing homes, day care centers, city and county health departments, mental health retardation facilities, and physicians' offices and clinics.

(8) Addition of STUDENT FINANCIAL AID section as follows:

Financial assistance may be given in the form of low interest loans, grants, scholarships, work-study, or a combination of these. Financial aid is awarded to students on the basis of need. In order to determine need in a consistent way for all aid candidates, this institution requires all parents of dependent students to submit a Family Financial Statement to the American College Testing Program (ACT). A self-supporting student is also required to submit his or her financial statement to ACT, answering only those questions pertaining to his or her and spouse's income and assets.

<u>Inquiries and applications for financial assistance should be directed to The</u> <u>University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston School of Nursing</u>.

The dates when applications for student financial assistance are due are as follows:

Term:

<u>Nine month academic year -- May 1</u> Fall semester only -- May I Spring semester only -- October 1 Summer only -- March 1

<u>Students who have been awarded financial assistance will receive their award after the beginning of each semester. The student should have sufficient funds for initial expenses in the event there is delay in the disbursement of checks.</u>

Some of the sources of financial assistance for students are as follows:

The Nursing Student Loan Program

Funds are provided for low-cost loans to nursing students. The maximum total for one student for any one academic year is \$2,500 and a total of \$10,000 is the maximum amount which may be awarded to any one student for all the years in school. Loan provisions include cancellation of all or part of the loans for service in nursing under specified circumstances following graduation.

College Work-Study Program

<u>Students enrolled at least half-time meeting certain financial need criteria</u> <u>may be employed in campus jobs part-time while classes are in session</u>.

Hinson-Hazelwood College Student Loan Program

Only legal residents of Texas qualify for this loan. The program requires that an applicant be enrolled or accepted for at least one-half the normal course load.

Students may borrow up to \$1,500 per academic year provided the total amount does not exceed \$7,500 at any time. Summer loans not to exceed \$500 may be made in addition to loans made for the nine-month academic year.

Funds will be available approximately eight weeks after an application has been approved.

Federally Insured Loan Program

A student may borrow as much as \$2,500 per year, not to exceed \$10,000, for all years of school, from a bank or other financial institution, although his application must first be certified by the educational institution.

Basic Educational Opportunity Grant Program

This was authorized by Title I of the Education Amendments of 1972. It provides for grants of \$1,400, less the expected family contribution, for all eligible students to assist them in meeting educational costs. To be eligible a student must be enrolled at least half-time and must have started his postsecondary education after April 1, 1973. Information and an Application for Determination of Family Contribution may be obtained from the Financial Aid Office.

State Tuition Scholarships Program

This Program enacted by the 62nd Legislature provides for scholarships covering all or any part of tuition costs for students in financial need enrolled in State-supported baccalaureate nursing programs.

Allstate Foundation Scholarships

A limited number of scholarships are available for students in the basic baccalaureate program. Vocational Rehabilitation

The Texas Rehabilitation Commission offers assistance for tuition and nonrefundable fees to students who have certain disabling conditions provided their vocational objectives have been approved by a TRC counselor. Examples of such conditions are orthopedic deformities, emotional disorders, diabetes, epilepsy, heart conditions, etc. Other services are also available to assist the handicapped student to become employable. Application for such service should be made at:

(9) Addition of <u>FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT OF 1974</u> section as follows:

The provisions of the "Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974" require that all students be notified of the rights accorded them by that Act. In compliance with that requirement, a copy of the Act is available in the Dean's Office. Also available is a statement setting forth the type of records maintained by the institution, the name and locations of the person responsible for maintaining them, and the procedures established for access to and reviewing and expunging those records.

(10) Addition of ORGANIZATIONS section as follows:

Nursing Student Organizations

<u>All students enrolled in the School of Nursing are eligible for membership</u> in the Nursing Student Organizations. Through the Student Association Organizations, nursing students are represented on campus committees and in campus activities involving students. Membership is available with the Texas Nursing Student's Association and the National Student Nurse Association.

Alumni_Association

The Alumni Association of the School of Nursing was organized in 1919. The primary purpose of the organization is to further the interests of the School. Through its efforts, loan funds have been established and students have been encouraged to enter the programs of the School. The membership of approximately 3,600 ex-students is governed by an Advisory Board with elected representatives. The campus elects its officers and designates activities.

<u>Sigma Theta Tau</u>

The Alpha Delta Chapter of Sigma Theta Tau, the only national honor society of nursing, was chartered at The University of Texas on May 25, 1963. There are over fifty constituent chapters in collegiate schools of nursing accredited by the National League for Nursing across the nation. The purposes of Sigma Theta Tau are to recognize the development of leadership qualities, foster high professional standards, encourage creative work and strengthen commitment on the part of individuals to the ideals and purposes of the profession of nursing.

Each year invitations to membership are extended to selected students in the undergraduate and/or graduate program who range within the upper one-third of their graduating class. Faculty members and community nursing leaders may be invited to membership.

Each year. Alpha Delta Chapter recognizes those individuals who have been selected for membership. Program meetings of an educational or scientific nature are held during each semester.

(11) Addition of <u>GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR STUDENTS</u> section as follows:

Student Affairs

<u>1. Insofar as possible, the conduct and regulation of student affairs, other</u> than those relating to academic matters, shall be effected by the students acting through their own organizations and rules.

<u>The-faculty-of-the-School-of-Nursing-has-the-opportunity-and-authority-to</u> <u>establish-and-maintain-standards-of-ethical;-moral;-and-personal-conduct-for</u> <u>students-in-the-School:--The-Student-Organization-serves-in-an-advisory-role</u>.

It is the responsibility of the Dean of the School of Nursing to enforce all rules governing student affiars.

2. It should be clearly understood by all students that the Dean and Faculty of the School have the authority to request the withdrawal from school, to drop from the rolls and refuse readmission of any student at any time if circumstances of a legal, moral, health, social or academic nature are considered to justify such action.

It is the responsibility of the student to become familiar with the various regulations of the School of Nursing and to comply with them.

At the time of registration and throughout a student's enrollment in the School, it shall be his responsibility to keep the Dean's Office Informed of his current (1) local address, (2) telephone number or where he may be reached, and (3) home address and phone number. This is absolutely necessary in order that schedules, official correspondence and emergency messages will not be delayed or lost. It is the student's responsibility to be informed of general and special notices including examination schedules on the bulletin board in the School of Nursing, and to make arrangements for the completion of all work including make-up examinations and requirements for removal of conditional and incomplete grades.

Tuition and Fees

<u>Tuition charges, as indicated below, are the same for both residents and nonresidents of Texas. Tuition and fees are subject to change at any time by Tegislative or Regental action.</u>

Late Registration Fee

A late registration fee of \$5.00 will be charged for the first day of late registration and an additional \$2.50 per day thereafter with the maximum amount being \$15.00 for any one semester. This fee may be waived only in extenuating circumstances by the Dean or the Dean's delegate. The late registration fee is not refundable.

Fee for Credit by Examination

A fee of \$25.00 per examination will be required of students who seek credit by examination. Procedures are set forth in the Credit by Examination section.

Graduation Fee

<u>All degree candidates are required to pay a \$25.00 graduation fee at the beginning of a semester in which they anticipate receipt of the degree</u>.

Other Expenses

Uniforms, caps, shoes, name pin and identification insignia are all purchased prior to the first nursing course at an approximate cost of \$100.00.

Fees for Auditing Nursing Courses

Students enrolled in nursing courses may audit additional nursing courses at a cost of \$5.00 for each additional course.

Students not enrolled in nursing courses may audit nursing courses at a cost of \$25.00 for each course.

Refund of Tuition and Fees

A refund of the tuition and laboratory fees is made only to students officially withdrawing from the school. If withdrawal is official and falls within the following time limit, a student will receive a percentage refund of tuition as follows:

In no case shall the total refund exceed 70% of the tuition. In the case of fees other than tuition and laboratory fee. refunds will be determined on an individual basis. in accordance with the time schedule outlined above. Additional information is available in the "Withdrawal" section.

Student Health Services

All students enrolled in nursing courses are to have annual physical examinations, routing laboratory studies, immunizations as indicated and periodic chest roentgenray examinations. All fees for such services are paid by the student on an individual basis. Students are cared for by the Student Health Service (SHS) of The University of Texas Health Science Center. SHS provides ambulatory health care for the enrolled student. Spouse and children may be covered for an additional fee.

An acceptable health insurance policy is required since students are responsible for all hospitalization expenses. A group health insurance plan offered through The University of Texas Health Science Center may be purchased at registration.

(12) Addition of <u>ADMISSION</u> section as follows:

<u>Students entering a college or university as freshmen or sophomores should</u> <u>check admission requirements of the institution they plan to attend, for</u> <u>lower division requirements</u>.

A student seeking admission must present (1) an application for admission to upper-division nursing courses, and (2) two official copies of transcripts from each institution attended, at least one of which must include high school units and a report of scores on the admissions test.

Regulations

1. Transferred grades are filed as submitted.

- 2. An applicant, whether a new student or a former student of the School of Nursing who has attended another collegiate institution, will submit all his previous collegiate records when applying for admission to the School of Nursing and is subject to its regulations.
- 3. Any former student who attends another institution is responsible for getting a transcript of his record to the School of Nursing before he reenters.

<u>Requirements for Enrollment in Upper-Division Courses</u>

<u>Completion of the 60 hours of prerequisite courses with an overall gradepoint average of 2.0 and, in addition, a grade-point average of 2.0 on all required lower-division courses, excluding electives, is required for admission to upper-division nursing courses.</u>

<u>Applicants whose grade-point average exceeds the minimum required will gain</u> <u>more favorable consideration</u>.

Selection of the applicants will be made by an Admissions Committee of the School of Nursing. In general, the applicant will be evaluated on the basis of the quality of his overall academic performance as well as performance in required courses.

The deadlines for submission of applications are as follows:

These policies are subject to change and such changes will be incorporated in subsequent catalogues. Applications will not be reviewed until after the above deadline dates. Applications received after the deadline dates will be considered only if the class is not already filled. In addition, a health history and physical examination, completed within the three months prior to enrollment, is required for all students applying for admission to upper-division courses.

Professional Lightity Insurance

All nursing students enrolling in nursing courses will be required at official registration to show evidence of professional liability insurance coverage in at least a minimum amount of \$5,000 limit each claim and \$15,000 limit aggregate.

(13) Addition of <u>CLASSWORK AND ROUTINE</u> section as follows:

Explanation of the Course Numbers

The Semester Hour -- Instruction is given in courses and the unit of measure for credit purposes is the semester hour. One semester hour of credit is given for three hours of laboratory experience.

<u>Course Numbers -- Courses are designated by numbers, or by numbers with a capital letter affixed, which indicate both rank and credit value in semester hours, and by lower case letters which indicate the part of the course re-ferred to or the semester or term in which it is given.</u>

<u>Course numbers 201 through 299 indicate a value of two semester hours: 301</u> <u>through 399, a value of three semester hours, etc. The two digits on the</u> <u>right indicate the rank of the course: if 01 through 19, the course is of</u> <u>lower-division rank: if 20 through 79, of upper-division rank: if 80 through</u> <u>99, of graduate rank. A zero as the first digit of a course number indicates</u> <u>that the course is noncredit</u>.

Classification of Students

Level

Students are classified as freshmen, sophomores, juniors and seniors. Until he/she has credit for thirty semester hours in addition to the full admission requirements, a student is a freshman; then, until he/she has credit for sixty semester hours, a sophomore; then, until he/she has credit for ninety semester hours, a junior; then, a senior until graduation. Freshmen and sophomores are referred to as lower-division students; juniors and seniors are designated as upper-division students.

Full-time and Part-time

<u>A full-time undergraduate student is one who is registered for 12 or more</u> <u>semester hours during a regular semester.</u> A full-time graduate student is one who is registered for 9 or more semester hours during a regular semester. <u>Full-time enrollment for both undergraduate and graduate students is six or</u> <u>more semester hours in one session or nine hours in two sessions of one</u> <u>summer. A part-time student is one who is registered for fewer hours than</u> the stated requirement for full-time status.

Adding and Dropping Courses

Adding or dropping courses must be attended to in person.

Adding Courses

After registration, during the first four class days of any semester or the first two class days of any summer session, a student may add a course only with the approval of his/her advisor and the Dean.

Dropping Courses

Dropping refers to the procedure by which a student removes himself from one or more of the courses in which he/she is enrolled, while continuing in the remainder of his/her courses.

A student may drop a course under the following provisions:

1. A student may, with the approval of his advisor, the Dean and the course coordinator, drop a course at any time during the first four weeks of class work of any semester or during the first two weeks of class work of any summer session, without having a grade recorded in the course. The symbol Q will be recorded to indicate a drop without penalty.

2. With the approval of his/her advisor, Dean and instructor, a student may drop a course at any time before the last day of classes in any semester or before final examination time in any summer session. If he/she has a C average at the time of the drop, the symbol Q is then recorded to indicate a drop without prejudice or penalty.

With the approval of his/her instructor and the graduate advisor, a graduate student may drop a course at any time and the instructor will determine whether a grade of F or a symbol of Q should be recorded.

3. After the first four weeks of class work of any semester, or after the first two weeks of any summer session, the Dean may permit a student to discontinue attending a class in which the student is not making a grade of at least C and shall advise the instructor that a grade of F should be reported at the end of the semester. A graduate student may drop a course at any time before the beginning of final examinations, subject to the approval of the instructor and the graduate advisor, with a grade of F or Q determined by the instructor.

To drop a course without permission means to sever one's connection with the School of Nursing.

On the recommendation of the instructor concerned, a student may be required to drop a course at any time, with the approval of the Dean, because of neglect or for lack of preparation.

<u>Class Attendance</u>

The instructor shall inform his/her students of any special attendance reguirements.

Standard of Work Required for Continuance in the University

Grade Scores

Although a grade of D gives credit in a nonclinical nursing course, a minimum semester hour grade average of C is necessary for progress toward a degree. In computing this average the following scores are used: A, 4 points per semester hour; B, 3 points; C, 2 points; D, 1 point; and F, 0 points. The grade symbols P (postponed examinations), R (re-examination permitted), X (incom-PLete), and CR (Pass-Fail) score, 0 points.

Conferences

The Dean is prepared to confer with all students who are doing unsatisfactory work, particularly at the intrasemester dates and at the end of the semester, in order to advise with the student for his/her improvement and to offer him/ her opportunity for renewed effort with such assistance instructors may be able to furnish.

<u>Warning</u>

Each student is responsible for knowing whether he is eligible to continue in the School of Nursing. An ineligible student who nevertheless registers in the School shall be dropped, and the student shall not receive special consideration in his plea of lack of knowledge of his/her scholastic status.

Scholastic Probation

1. Scholastic probation -- If at the end of any long session semester or summer session, a student's grade-point average for the total number of hours undertaken in the School of Nursing fails below 2.0, he will be placed on scholastic probation. The student shall be notified that he is on scholastic probation.

2. Admission on scholastic probation -- In exceptional cases a student may be admitted to The University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston School of Nursing on scholastic probation on recommendation of the Dean.

3. Removal from scholastic probation -- A student who is on scholastic probation will be removed from such probation at the conclusion of either semester in the long session or at the end of a summer session when he has achieved an overall 2.0 average.

4. Quantity of work while on scholastic probation -- A student on scholastic probation will not be permitted to take less than twelve semester hours in a long session semester or six semester hours in a summer session except in unusual and extenuating circumstances and with the written approval of and under conditions prescribed by the Dean.

5. Effect of grades in courses repeated -- In counting grade points for any one semester, a student who has a grade of at least C in a course completed prior to that semester may not again present grade points for this course to meet minimum quality requirements for continuance in the School of Nursing without special written permission of the Dean.

6. Attendance at another institution while on scholastic probation -- A student who leaves the School of Nursing on probation will be readmitted to the School on scholastic probation, even if he/she has attended another institution between his leaving and his re-entering the School of Nursing.

Petitions and Official Communications

To avoid confusion and to secure proper record, it is required that petitions of students be put in writing. For those petitions for which special forms are required, they may be obtained at the Office of the Dean either in person or by mail. If there is such haste that the proper form cannot be obtained, a letter by United States mail will often serve.

To prevent misunderstanding it is necessary that official communications be in writing. A student should insist that a recommendation about himself from one member of the faculty to another be written.

Change of Address

If a student, after registration, changes his home address, he is expected to notify the School of Nursing in writing at once. He will be held responsible for a communication from the School offices sent to him at the address last given and may not claim indulgence on the plea of having moved his lodgings and therefore of not having received the communication.

<u>Withdrawal</u>

Withdrawal refers to the procedure by which a student removes himself from all courses in which he is enrolled. A student wishing to withdraw from the School of Nursing for the remainder of a particular session should apply to the Dean for permission. The Dean's permit to withdraw will be sent to the Accounting Office, where an order will be given for the return of such fees as are returnable by the rules. No fees will be repaid to anyone other than the payor, except on his/her written order.

If an undergraduate student withdraws from The University of Texas School of Nursing, with proper permission, after the first four weeks of a regular semester or the first two weeks of a summer session, the symbol W will be recorded for courses in which he is passing and the symbol F in those which he is failing. If he withdraws from a clinical course while failing he may reenroll for the course only once.

<u>Transcripts</u>

A student presently enrolled in the School of Nursing or one who has completed the undergraduate or graduate program may secure an official transcript of his record at a cost of one dollar. The term transcript is understood to refer to the recorded results of the student's work in the classroom. This statement will contain all the important facts pertaining to the student's admission, academic level, and scholarship. No partial or incomplete classroom record (for example, with failure omitted) will be given.

Residence Requirement

To receive the Bachelor of Science Degree in Nursing, a student must complete in residence the last 36 hours of the nursing major at the upper division level in The University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston, School of Nursing.

<u>Correspondence</u>

Students wishing to enroll for correspondence courses and/or courses in another institution while enrolled in the School of Nursing must obtain permission from the Dean in order for such courses to be accepted for credit by the School of Nursing. Students must be in good scholastic standing and must have demonstrated their ability to carry the increased course load in order to receive such permission.

Not more than 9 hours required for the degree may be taken by correspondence.

Reservation of Work by Undergraduates for Graduate Credit

Undergraduate students in the School of Nursing may be admitted to graduate courses in nursing only in the last semester of the senior year and hours taken may not be counted toward the undergraduate degree in nursing.

<u>Courses taken by undergraduate students which are to be reserved for graduate</u> credit may be applied toward the graduate degree only after the student has been admitted to and is enrolled in the graduate program.

Credit by Examination

In keeping with the School's stated philosophy of learning, the faculty recognizes the many potential avenues for acquisition of the knowledge, attitudes and skills which are deemed appropriate for a baccalaureate nursing practitioner. Furthermore, the faculty believes that student experiences in formal educational endeavors should build on the student's present level of achievement in an effort to maximize enhancement of the "actualization of individual potential". Therefore, the faculty subscribes to the principle of validation of the candidate's competencies and the awarding of credit based upon satisfactory achievement on examinations. The challenge examinations for Levels I. II, III and IV will be open to registered nurse students. All other applicants may be given special permission to take the examination following a faculty review and with concurrence of the Dean. The candidate is thus allowed to matriculate into the curricular pattern at a level appropriate for his/her demonstrated level of achievement.

1. To petition for such an examination, an individual must have met all reguirements for admission to upper division courses in the School of Nursing.

2. The candidate should consult the Office of the Dean regarding applications, policies and scheduling.

3. A student may not take an examination for credit in a course which he has completed with either a passing or failing grade.

4. A student who is enrolled in the course must be in good standing in the course in order to take the examination.

5. A candidate for "credit by examination" may obtain the course material which would be given to a student enrolling in the course.

6. A candidate for "credit by examination" will have access to any and all materials in learning resources center but will not receive tutoring by The University of Texas School of Nursing faculty in preparation for the examination.

7. A candidate for "credit by examination" may audit any or all of the lecture portion of any course in The University of Texas School of Nursing (Sub-Ject to university audit fees).

8. A candidate for examination will be assigned a faculty adviser, teaching in the course to be challenged, whose function will be to clarify the intent of the examination and to provide feedback on the results.

9. A fee of \$25.00 will be assessed each candidate writing the examination.

10. Fifty-one semester credit hours can be awarded by "credit by examination".

11. Only after the student is registered in the degree program will credit be granted for a grade of C or higher on the examination.

12. The student may elect to have the credit recorded as a "pass" or as the actual grade received. In the latter event, the grade is included in computing the cumulative grade-point average. No notation appears on the permanent record when the examination is failed. 13. Credit earned by examination shall not reduce by a corresponding amount courses which may be taken on a pass-fail basis.

14. A candidate may not retake any examination on any level.

(14) Addition of EXAMINATIONS section as follows:

All written work handed in by students is considered to be their own product, prepared without unauthorized assistance. Students are invited to cooperate with their instructors in maintaining the integrity of examinations and are strongly urged to inform them, without specifying the offenders, if cheating occurs in their classes.

Semester Examinations

Wishing to encourage the student to secure a general view of the whole subject and readiness in the use of it, the faculty has ruled that exemptions from examinations may not be given. In a course extending over more than one semester, when the subject is continuous, the second semester examination may include the work of the preceding semester.

<u>In all examinations, account is taken of the student's use of English and of</u> the form of the paper in general, the grade being lowered because of deficiencies in these regards as well as in the subject matter proper.

Absence from Examinations

A student absent from a semester examination without the Dean's permission is graded F and required to repeat the semester's work if he desires credit for it. Absence from a postponed examination or a re-examination, after a permit has been granted, will have the same effect as failure unless the student presents to the Dean within a week after the date set for the examination a satisfactory excuse for his absence.

How to Postpone an Examination

A student who is compelled to be absent from a semester examination because of 111ness or other imperative reason should, either in person or through a friend, petition the Dean for permission to postpone the examination. This request, approved by the instructor, should be made to the Dean as soon as the student knows he will be compelled to be absent, and, in any event, within ten days after the scheduled examination period. The procedure is as follows:

1. If the postponement is because of illness the student should secure a physician's written statement concerning the illness. If the postponement is for other reasons, the student should have adequate verification of facts.

2. The student should present a postponed examination petition to the office of the Dean.

3. He should then request his instructor's approval of the petition.

4. If the instructor approves the postponed examination, the student should return the petition to the Dean's office, requesting approval of the petition.

5. If the approvals are granted, the student should arrange with his/her instructor to take the postponed examination at a time to be scheduled by the instructor. The examination should be given as soon as possible (and preferably with another section of the same course during the same examination period), but not later than thirty days after the original examination period.

6. If, because of unusual circumstances, the petition to postpone the examination is submitted later than the previously stated time, or if, for good reason, the student cannot take the examination within the thirty-day period, the examination may be scheduled with a subsequent class in the same course or at any time convenient to the instructor, except in no case will it be given later than the end of the semester following the one for which the postponed examination was approved.

An instructor should record the symbol P for a student who has been permitted to postpone an examination. If the postponed examination is not taken before the end of the next long session, the grade in the course will be changed to an F.

Incomplete Class or Laboratory Work

A student who is compelled to delay beyond the end of the semester the completion of the classwork of the semester due to sickness or other imperative cause may defer it under the provisions listed under "Symbol X".

Re-Examinations: Symbol R

If a student has failed to pass the final examination in a course for undergraduate credit, the instructor may report the symbol R and give him a second examination. If a re-examination is approved, the student should arrange with his instructor to take the re-examination at a time to be scheduled by the instructor. The re-examination will be given as soon as possible and not later than thirty days after the original examination period, except that with the permission of the instructor it may be given with the examination of a subsequent section in the same course. In any event, the examination must be given before the end of the semester following the one in which the course was taken. The approval of the re-examination is subject to the following provisions:

1. The symbol R may be recorded only in courses for undergraduate credit and only if the student has at least a C average on all work other than the final examination. Re-examinations are not permitted on courses for graduate credit.

2. The minimum passing grade for re-examination shall be C.

3. If the student passes the re-examination, the grade received shall be substituted for the original final examination grade in determining the final course grade.

4. If the student does not make a grade of at least C on the re-examination, the final course grade shall be reported as F and the course must be repeated if credit for the work is desired.

5. If the re-examination is not taken within the specified time limit, the symbol R shall be changed to a grade of F on the official records.

6. Subject to the preceding provisions, the symbol R shall be used entirely at the discretion of the instructor.

7. Whenever the symbol R is recorded, the instructor shall indicate the student's classwork average on the grade sheet in the column headed "Remarks".

(15) Addition of GRADES OF SCHOLARSHIP section as follows:

<u>Grades</u>

The standing of a student in his work is expressed by grades made up from the class work and from examinations. There are five grades: A (Excellent), B (above average), C (average), D (pass), and F (failure). No grade below C is acceptable in a clinical nursing course. Students may also register in certain courses on a pass-fail basis, in which case the grade is recorded as either pass or fail and no letter grade is assigned. After being reported to the Registrar, a grade may not be changed unless an error has been made by the instructor. Grades are given by semester; however, in a course extending through two semesters, no credit is given until both semesters of the course have been completed.

Members of staff are not authorized, without the Dean's approval, to withhold a final grade or to defer reporting a final grade due at the end of a semester. In case a grade is withheld without the Dean's approval for any reason other than absence from a final examination, which is governed by a separate regulation, such grade may not later be added to the official records without the written approval of the Dean.

Courses Taken on a Pass-Fail Basis

<u>Six hours of free electives at the lower-division level may be taken on a pass-fail basis. Nine hours of electives at the upper-division level may be taken on a pass-fail basis.</u>

Symbols

Under certain circumstances, instructors may use symbols in reporting a student's standing in his semester work. The symbol P is reported for a student who has been permitted to postpone an examination; the symbol R, for a student who has been permitted a re-examination; the symbol X, for a student who, under specific circumstances, has incomplete class or laboratory work (see below); and the symbol CR, for a student who, under specific circumstances on a pass-fail basis.

Symbol X: Incomplete Class or Laboratory Work

Subject to the provisions listed below, a student who has been unable to complete all of the class or laboratory assignments in a semester or term of a course may have the symbol X reported.

1. The symbol X shall not be assigned unless the student has a passing average on those portions of classwork, laboratory work, etc., completed.

2. The symbol X may be recorded only if the student has taken and passed the final examination, provided a final examination is required, or if the Dean has granted an official postponement of the final examination.

3. The incomplete work must be a portion of the classwork, laboratory work, or assignment other than the final examination, since the postponement of a final examination is governed by a separate regulation.

4. The deferring of the work must be with the approval and sanction of the instructor.

5. The use of the symbol X subject to the preceding shall be entirely at the discretion of the instructor.

6. Incomplete work must be made up within four months after the symbol X is recorded, provided the student does not wish to progress immediately to the next course.

7. If a student wishes to enroll in the next required course, under special circumstances the removal of an incomplete in the prerequisite to the succeeding nursing course may be delayed up to the 12th class day of the following semester providing that this action has been recommended by the faculty in the prerequisite course and approved by the faculty of the succeeding course. The conditions of this action will be given in writing to the student, as recommended by the faculty giving the grade of X.

8. Unless a grade has been reported in the meantime by the instructor or unless the work is made up within the time limit indicated, the symbol X shall be changed to a grade of F and the course must be repeated if credit for the work is desired.

9. Policies for incompletes for graduate students differ from those for undergraduates in that there is not a designated period of time within which a grade of incomplete must be removed from the record.

Higher Work After Failure

If a student makes an F in a course he may not take the next higher course until the course is taken again and passed.

Repetition of a Course

If a student repeats a course which he had failed in the School of Nursing, his official grade is the last one made. That official grade will therefore be used in computing his grade-point average and the failing grade will not be included. A student may not repeat a course for credit in which he has made a grade of C or better.

<u>Clinical Nursing Courses</u>

A student must earn a minimum grade of C in each clinical course. If he earns less than a C in a clinical nursing course and is in good standing in the School of Nursing, he must repeat the course with at least a grade of C. The time at which he repeats the course, if the course is not prerequisite to the next clinical course, must be before proceeding to the next course.

<u>A failed clinical nursing course may be repeated only once and must be re-</u> peated in The University of Texas School of Nursing.

<u>A grade of F in either laboratory or theory in a clinical nursing course re-</u> sults in a grade of F in that course.

(16) Addition to <u>REPORTS</u> section as follows:

Semester Reports -- Grade reports are sent to all students at the end of each semester.

Intrasemester Report from the Dean -- About the middle of each semester, the faculty reports to the Dean all students doing work below the grade of C, and the Dean in turn forwards such reports to the students.

(17) Addition to STUDENT EMPLOYMENT section as follows:

A student's combined employment and semester-hour load including clinical laboratory hours should not exceed 40 hours per week in either long-session semesters or summer terms.

Students may be employed as nursing aides, performing functions for which they have been trained by the institution and for which the institution has a clearly discernable policy either in writing or by precedent, defining the scope of these functions. Any individual not licensed in the State of Texas to practice professional nursing, and who engages in such practice, is doing so illegally and may be prosecuted accordingly. Supervision by a professional. licensed nurse does not provide protection to the student or make the student's actions legal.

Students should be aware that (1) the School of Nursing assumes no responsibility for their activities as an employee of an agency: (2) they are personally responsible and liable for any activity they participate in while employed: (3) professional liability insurance purchased by students through the School of Nursing is only valid in their student role, not their employment role: (4) individuals who practice illegally may jeopardize their future since gensons who are convicted of violation of the Nurse Practice Act may not be eligible to write State Board examinations and subsequently receive licensure.

Students employed in an agency have responsibility, personally and professionally, to engage in only those activities which fall within their job description as nonprofessional workers (i.e., aides). They have a responsibility to refuse to participate in activities which they have not been legally licensed to perform (i.e., giving medications, assuming total responsibility for a division, etc.).

(18) Addition of <u>GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS</u> section as follows:

<u>1. To be eligible for graduation a student must have a 2.0 grade-point average</u> on the sixty semester hours of upper-division course work fulfilling the upper-division requirements.

2. A candidate must successfully complete the prescribed curriculum for which he is registered and must meet all other requirements of the School of Nursing.

3. To receive the Bachelor of Science in Nursing, a student must complete in residence a minimum of 24 of the last 30 semester hours of the nursing major at the upper-division level in The University of Texas School of Nursing.

4. A student must supply the School of Nursing with transcripts of courses taken outside the School, as the courses are completed.

5. Before registering for upper-division courses in the major, a student must apply for a degree. A degree card application should be obtained from the Dean's Office. completed by the student and returned to the Dean's Office. The student is then notified of the courses he lacks and the requirements he must satisfy to receive the degree. In advising and registering students, the Dean and advisors try to prevent errors. Avoidance of errors is the main purpose of the degree card. But the student is expected to remember that graduation is attained according to any one catalogue, to study the requirements set forth in the catalogue, and to register in accordance therewith. It remains the responsibility of the student to fulfill all catalogue requirements. 6. A candidate for a degree must (1) register in the semester in which he is to receive the degree and (2) apply for a degree by filing a "Diploma Name Card" with the Dean, preferably at registration, in the term in which the degree is to be granted.

7. No degree will be conferred except on official dates publicly announced.

Testing Program for Curriculum Evaluation

As part of the ongoing evaluation of the School of Nursing curriculum, students are required to participate in a testing program upon admission to the School and on completion of each of the major courses within the curriculum.

Graduation with Honors

To be graduated with honors a student must have the following grade-point average on upper-division hours in nursing taken in the School of Nursing:

Graduation Under Particular Catalogue¹

A student may obtain a degree from the School of Nursing according to the requirements in the catalogue under which he enters the School, or the catalogue governing any subsequent year in which he is registered in the School, provided that he completes the work for the degree within six years of the date of the catalogue he has chosen. In the case of courses which are no longer offered, the faculty will prescribe substitutions.

Registration as a Professional Nurse

<u>All students seeking registration must take and pass the State Board Test</u> <u>Pool Examination, administered by the Board of Nurse Examiners for the State</u> of Texas. The Board of Nurse Examiners may refuse to admit persons to its examinations or may refuse to issue a license or certificate of registration for any of the following reasons:

(1) the violation or attempted violation of any of the provisions of the law regulating the practice of professional nursing;

(2) conviction of a crime of the grade of felony, or a crime of a lesser" grade which involves moral terpitude;

(3) the use of any nursing license, certificate or diploma which has been fraudulently purchased, issued, counterfeited, or materially altered;

(4) the impersonation of, or the acting as proxy for, another in any examination required by this law to obtain a license as a registered nurse;

(5) intemperate use of alcohol or drugs which, in the opinion of the Board, endangers patients;

(6) unprofessional or dishonorable conduct which, in the opinion of the Board, 13 likely to injure the public.

¹This policy does not pertain to rules or policies regarding class work and routine.

(1) Students will receive the application form and instructions for completion approximately one month prior to graduation.

(2) The application is to be completed, notarized and returned to the Dean's Office with the registration fees within one week of graduation.

(3) The second set of transcripts submitted at the time of admission to upper-division nursing courses will be submitted with the application and fees. If the student has failed to file the second set of transcripts on admission, he will be asked to furnish them and his application may be delayed.

(4) All 120 hours for the degree must be completed before the student is eligible to take the State Board Test Pool Examination and obtain a temporary permit.

(5) Students planning to take the State Board Test Pool Examination in another state must obtain information regarding procedure from the agency responsible for professional nurse registration in that state.

(19) Addition of <u>UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAM</u> section is as follows:

Bachelor of Science Degree

Philosophy

The University of Texas School of Nursing believes in the promotion and support of excellence in professional nursing through teaching, research and public service.

individuals are unique and complex beings with biological, psychological and sociological needs and methods of communications. Their development is determined by the interaction of genetic and cultural background and their total environment. People have inherent dignity and worth and the right and responsibility to actively participate, as they are able, in making decisions which affect their state of health.

Optimum health care is the right of every individual and is provided through the cooperative efforts of a wide range of professions and disciplines. Nursing, which evolves its practice in response to societal needs, is one of the interdependent helping professions committed to the prevention of illness and promotion of health.

Professional nursing practice involves assessing health needs and planning, providing, directing and evaluating nursing care for individuals and groups in a variety of settings. It is a scientifically-based process devoted to helping individuals, families and groups make maximum use of their resources in meeting their respective health needs. It further incorporates the individualities of nurse and patient/client and is most effective when the thoughts, feelings and values of both are recognized; therefore, a high degree of communication skill and sensitivity in interpersonal situations is required. The obligation to improve nursing practice encompasses the use of knowledge and skills as well as the systematic study of the effects of this practice on human health. Undergraduate education in nursing, which provides a foundation for continuing personal, professional and educational development includes study of the arts, sciences and humanities. The baccalaureate program is designed to produce a competent, self-directed general nurse practitioner who, in a variety of settings, can assume leadership in planning, providing and evaluating nursing care of individuals and groups; who participates in the determination of the goals of the nursing profession; and who actively searches for knowledge in nursing and related fields essential to the development and application of nursing science.

The faculty believes that learning is a lifelong process which is independent and self-initiated and results in a change or reorganization of behavior. The teaching-learning process includes teacher-student interaction in setting goals, selecting and evaluating learning experiences, and in appraising instructional methods and student progress. Learning experiences are planned to achieve integration, sequence and continuity of the knowledges, skills and attitudes defined by the educational objective.

The School is dedicated to the proposition of equal educational opportunity for all. The faculty believes that each student has dignity and worth and a background and experiences which are unique. The student shares in the responsibility for creating an educational climate which reflects democratic values, fosters inquiry and creativity, and encourages the development of each individual's potential.

The Baccalaureate Graduate

The educational program prepares a graduate with the following characteristics:

I. Bellefs and Knowledge

A. People are biological psychological and sociological beings unique in nature who through their behaviors are constantly adapting to their internal and external environment.

B. Professional nursing is a deliberate process of interacting with individuals. groups or families for the expressed purpose of identifying needs and then assisting the individual. families or groups to meet these needs.

C. Professional nurses identify normal stages of development and states of health, with variations from normal in both, as a basis for nursing intervention.

D. Professional nurses are knowledgeable about common disease processes and disorders, special needs of individuals with these diseases and disorders. and specific nursing intervention, including skills and techniques, directed toward assisting individuals to meet these needs.

E. Professional nursing utilizes theoretical and empirical knowledge from the physical and behavioral sciences and the humanities as a source of making decisions relative to the nursing care delivered to individuals, families and groups.

F. Professional nursing utilizes scientific methods of inquiry, i.e., epidemiology, nursing process, research.

6. The health care delivery system is an integral part of the total society. Professional nursing functions within this framework and therefore is influenced by social and scientific trends. II. Application of Knowledge Rase to Patient/Client Care

Under supervision the new graduate is able to practice nursing in a variety of settings with individuals, families and groups using the following skills:

A. Assessment

1. Uses interviewing skills to obtain nursing history and to determine the needs of individuals, families, groups and communities.

2. Uses observational skills to identify signs of wellness and illness and to determine needs for care and teaching in the areas of promotion of wellness and prevention of illness, support and treatment during wellness and/or disease and rehabilitation.

<u>3. Uses physical evaluation skills to assist in determining the state</u> of health of the individual.

<u>B. Planning</u>

1. Develops nursing plan for care and teaching.

2. Collaborates. coordinates and consults with other health professionals.

3. Sets priorities based on patient-client needs.

4. Assists patients, clients and families in setting goals.

C. Implementation

1. Participates in providing care as a member of a health team.

2. Assumes responsibility for performing nursing functions.

3. Implements care and teaching according to previously set goals.

4. Performs nursing skills consistent with safe practice in generalized settings (as opposed to specialized settings).

5. Manages care of groups of patients using a variety of personnel and resources.

6. Maintains accurate and informative records.

D. Evaluation

<u>1. Evaluates care and teaching given according to previously set</u> goals and accepted professional standards.

2. Assesses effective use of the health care delivery system.

<u>3. Continues care to assist individuals and families to achieve and maintain health goals with appropriate referrals.</u>

III. Professional Practice

The new graduate is expected to:

A. Accept responsibility for continued personal and professional growth.

B. Exhibit an awareness of present and emerging roles of the professional nurse with regard to past trends, current practice and future directions.

C. Demonstrate a sense of responsibility in relation to contemporary, social and health issues.

D. Practice nursing within a framework of legal, ethical and professional standards.

Degree Requirements for the Bachelor of Science in Mursing

This program consists of two academic years or four semesters of lowerdivision courses taken in an approved college or university followed by two academic years of four semesters of upper-division nursing courses which are taken in The University of Texas School of Nursing. Upon completion of the program, students are awarded the Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree and are eligible to take the State Board Test Pool Examination for licensure as registered nurses.

Prescribed Work

Students may complete the 60 hours of general course work listed below at any accredited junior or senior college or university. Completion usually reguires two academic years. All courses must be completed before enrollment for upper-division courses in nursing.

The nursing major begins in the junior year after completion of the 60 hours of basic liberal arts courses providing a foundation for understanding the whole (bio-psycho-social-linguistic) man as he exists in different states of health and illness. The curriculum is divided into four levels, corresponding to four semesters of the junior and senior years.

³House Bill 935, passed by the Sixtieth Legislature, provides that no person may receive an undergraduate degree unless he has taken and passed six semester hours in American Government and six hours in United States History. Undergraduate Course Descriptions

370. 831. Nursing Process: Care of Well Individuals (Minor threat, minor disequilibrium to dynamic equilibrium). -- These two numbers reflect one course. The focus is on the biological, psychological, social and linguistic components of the behavior of individuals as indicators of their level of wellness. The clients/patients with whom the student deals are individuals seeking or requiring minimal assistance in seeking health care resources: are self-sufficient or require minimal assistance in providing for their physical and emotional health: have insight into health care problems and request assistance of health care professionals. The individuals and their significant others have the ability to adapt, enjoy the present and plan for the future. Individuals can use previous modes of health care problem-solving to maintain and promote health.

Student learning experiences include assessing and caring for the client/ patient through a deliberate interactive process and assisting the individual and his family in health care decision-making with the resources available.

⁴<u>A minimum of three elective hours must be in nursing.</u>

Students, with faculty assistance, begin examining: the concept of wellness, the characteristics of healthy patterns of living along the age continuum using nursing process, communication skills and physical assessment skills acquired during the course; and application of same in the client/patient situation. Also beginning concepts of professionalism in nursing are introduced. Prerequisite: 60 hours of required lower division courses. Nine lecture and eighteen laboratory hours average per week per semester.⁵ Fifteen semester hours. Laboratory fee of \$15.00.

635. 636. Nursing of Individuals and Families with Minor Health Problems (Minor threat, minor disequilibrium) -- These two numbers reflect one course. The focus is on the nursing process as utilized in the care of selected individuals and families experiencing minor disruptions in their health status. The individuals and families with whom the student deals require assistance in seeking health care and require deliberate nursing intervention in regaining physically and emotionally healthy living patterns. Disruption to normal individual and family-significant others due to impairment of health is temporary and self-limiting; some adjustments to usual patterns of living and lifestyle and life space are required by those with whom the student works.

Student learning experiences include: examining the ill individual in light of his relationships with family and other groups and deviations from healthy living patterns along the age continuum: recognizing and demonstrating needs for health teaching of the individual and family to regain some. if not all, healthy patterns of living: and applying same in patient care settings. Also the student identifies pertinent research studies and, with assistance, applies findings to patient care situations. Prerequisite: Nursing 730 and R31. Six lecture and eighteen laboratory hours average per week per semester.⁶ Twelve semester hours. Laboratory fee of \$15.00.

337. Independent Study -- Study in a specific topic area. Topic and mode of study are agreed upon by student(s) and instructor. Registration may be repeated with varied topics. Prerequisite: Junior standing and Nursing 730 and 831. Three semester hours.

640. 641. Nursing Intervention in Major Health Problems (Major threat, major disequilibrium) -- These two numbers reflect one course. The focus is on the nursing process as utilized in the care of selected individuals. families and groups experiencing health alterations resulting in major problems for that individual, family or group having limited ability or total dependence in decision-making regarding seeking health care; require intervention and observation by another to sustain life or promote a comfortable death. The individual, family or group is unable to cope with additional stresses imposed at a given point in time and/or resources available to that individual, family or group, are inadequate to meet the needs of the individual, family or group. Distortion and confusion of individual, family or group roles and relationships occur.

Student learning experiences include: recognizing and acting upon acquired knowledge in pathology; utilizing the communication skills necessary in potential and real. life-threatening situations with individuals, families and groups; examining the influences of major health problems on roles and relationships within the family; and applying nursing skills in a crisisproducing situation in the patient care setting. Also the student reviews research studies in nursing in terms of their relevance to improvement of health care of individuals and groups. Various types of health care settings are studied in terms of their effect on nursing's contribution to health care. Prerequisite: Nursing 635 and 636. Six lecture and eighteen laboratory hours average per week per semester.⁶ Twelve semester hours. Laboratory fee is \$15.00. 645, 646. Nursing in Health Care Systems (Minor threat, dynamic equilibrium to major threat, major disequilibrium) -- These two numbers reflect one course. The focus is on the nursing process involved in interdisciplinary approaches to care and on leadership and innovative functions of the nurse. The student deals with individuals, families and groups located within the health care system who are dependent upon interaction of health professionals to promote or regain their former healthy status of living and interaction.

Student learning experiences include: applying concepts of wellness and illness in a variety of health care systems: utilizing relationships among health professionals in order to restore more healthy patterns of living to individuals and families; analyzing existing health care systems and patterns of health delivery in terms of the changing needs of society examining the health care issues with which professional nurses must become involved. Prerequisite: Nursing 640 and 641. Six lecture and eighteen laboratory hours average per week per semester.^b Twelve semester hours. Laboratory fee of \$15.

147, 247, 347. Specialized Topics in Nursing -- Courses dealing with areas of special interest. Registration may be repeated with varied topics. Prerequisite: Junior standing and Nursing 730 and 831. One, two or three semester hours.

147A, 247A, 347A. These courses include those related to nursing in the broad practice of Psychiatric-Mental Health Nursing and Human Relations as applied to nursing. Courses focus on a variety of clients/patients and a variety of practice situations.

147B, 247B, 347B. These courses include those related to nursing in the broad practice area of nursing of patients requiring surgical and/or medical intervention. Courses focus on a variety of types of patients and a wide range of practice situations.

147C, 247C, 347C. This topic area includes courses related to nursing in the broad practice area of Maternal/Patient-Child Nursing.

147D, 247D, 347D. This topic includes courses related to the broad areas of functional aspects of health care delivery from either a nursing or interdisciplinary health professional perspective.

147E, 247E, 347E. This topic includes courses related to the broad areas of nursing in health promotion as differentiated from nursing in situations where there is an identified illness. The focus of these courses includes individuals and/or groups through the life cycle who are not subsumed by the maternal/parent-child focus of Topic 347.3.

⁵The nine lecture hours and eighteen laboratory hours are calculated on the hasis of fifty minute clock hours. Nine lecture hours are equivalent to seven and one-half clock hours. Eighteen laboratory hours are equivalent to fifteen clock hours.

⁶The six lecture hours and eighteen laboratory hours are calculated on the basis of fifty minute clock hours. Six lecture hours are equivalent to five clock hours. Eighteen laboratory hours are equivalent to fifteen clock hours.

Students from Other Colleges

A student planning to transfer to the School of Nursing will follow the procedures as set forth in this catalog. Such students should seek advisement on program arrangements from The University of Texas School of Nursing.

Registered Nurses

No separate program is offered for nurses who are already licensed. Registered nurses who have college credit for required courses may transfer credit under the policies of the School of Nursing. Credit by examination may be obtained for preparation in nursing (hospital and junior college programs and work experience).

(20) Addition of GRADUATE PROGRAM section as follows:

Philosophy of Graduate Education

The graduate faculty of The University of Texas School of Nursing believes that graduate programs in nursing should be based upon general undergraduate education and professional knowledge, attitudes and skills. The faculty is committed to the idea that graduate programs in nursing should be designed to provide gualified individuals with an education which will enable these persons to make significant contributions to the improvement of health care and the advancement of nursing practice. Furthermore, such education should emphasize holistic man and, thus, evolve from the concept that man is a biopsycho-social-linguistic being.

The content of graduation education for nurses should have relevance to the theory and practice of nursing, the present and future role of nursing in the health system, and the social and ethical problems related to the professional issues. Such content should prepare nurses to assume principal functional roles as educators, researchers, administrators, clinical specialists, consultants, or varied combinations of these roles. The faculty believes that the development of persons to assume such influential positions will contribute to the preparation of a group within nursing who can assess, clarify and determine the unique contribution of professional nursing to society. To this end, the faculty supports the idea that candidates for advanced degrees present research done in their chosen major area and, in addition, encourages studies at an advanced level in one or more related areas.

Objectives of the Graduate Program

Objectives of the Master of Science in Nursing Program

The intent of graduate faculty is to select candidates with potential for Teadership in the functional areas of teaching, administration or clinical specialization, and to provide them with the tools necessary for realization of this potential. The master's program is directed toward four objectives. These are that at the end of the program the student:

1. Consistently demonstrates a high level of competence in the selected areas of nursing based on understanding of man's bio-psycho-social-linguistic behavior.

2. Applies principles of teaching, administration or clinical specialization in a creative manner.

3. Consistently demonstrates a critical, logical and analytic approach to problems.

4. Accepts responsibility for personal, professional and educational development.

Admission to Graduate Program

The student seeking admission should, at his earliest opportunity, contact the graduate adviser. He should write to the Admissions Office of The University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston School of Nursing for an application form. The application must be filled out and returned with an official transcript to the Admissions Office. The applicant must also request that an official report of his Graduate Record Examination or Miller Analogies Test scores be sent to the Admissions Office.

Admission Reguirements

The requirements for admission to the graduate program:

1. A minimum of baccalaureate degree in nursing. An applicant holding a baccalaureate degree in a field other than nursing may qualify by passing the advanced standing examinations for each of the four required upper division courses in the undergraduate curriculum.

2. A basic statistics course which must be completed prior to enrolling or during the first semester of graduate study.

3. Evidence of current licensure as a registered nurse.

4. A minimum average of B for all upper-division and graduate courses undertaken.

5. A satisfactory score on the Aptitude Test of the Graduate Record Examinations or on the Miller Analogies Test. Scores more than five years old will not be accepted.

6. Satisfactory academic and professional references.

7. Approval of the applicant by the Admissions Committee.

Conditional Admission

When a student with less than minimum grade-point average or with less than satisfactory Graduate Record Examinations Aptitude Test or Miller Analogies Test score is admitted conditionally, the student will be required in the first semester of study to take at least nine semester hours of courses required for the degree and to achieve an overall average of B in all courses taken. Part-time students admitted conditionally will be considered on an individual basis. If these special conditions are not met, the student may be harred from subsequent registration in the graduate program.

Deadlines for Submission of Applications

Prospective students should file their application, along with official transcripts of all previous college or university work, at least thirty days prior to the beginning of the semester or summer session in which they plan to register. Foreign students should apply much earlier. All correspondence relating to their applications must be completed thirty days before the beginning of the semester or summer session.

Procedure After Admission

The successful applicant will be informed by mail about his admission and any conditions imposed on it. Either through personal interview or, if necessary, through correspondence with the graduate adviser, the new graduate student should acquaint himself promptly with specific School regulations and requirements. In any case, as soon as the entering student receives his registration materials in the mail, he should note the time and place indicated for his appointment with the graduate adviser and consult him then about the details of registration, course program, and other routines. The student must have his course program approved each semester by the official graduate adviser before he can register for courses. All graduate students are required, prior to official registration, to show evidence of professional liability insurance coverage as described in this catalog.

The Graduate Record Examinations Aptitude Test

The Aptitude Test of the Graduate Record Examination is designed to test preparation and aptitude for graduate study. Issued from the Educational Testing Service, Box 1502, Berkeley, California, 94701, and taken at the applicant's own expense, it is given six times a year, usually in October, December, January, February, April and July. On each of the six appointed dates it is administered at The University of Texas at Austin and at approximately 500 other designated centers in the United States and abroad. Some twenty-five other colleges and universities also administer the test, but fewer than six times annually. An informational booklet and an application blank may be obtained from the Measurement and Evaluation Center of The University of Texas at Austin. Since applications for the tests must be received in Berkeley about eighteen days before each testing date, applicants should secure the booklet and application blank at least a month in advance.

The Miller Analogies Test

The M.A.T. may be taken as an alternative to the G.R.E. if applicants prefer. The test consists of 100 items stated in the form of analogies. An information booklet which lists the available testing centers can be obtained from The Psychological Corporation. 304 East 45th Street. New York. N.Y. 01017. Many university testing centers administer the M.A.T. frequently and scores are usually reported within two weeks.

Degree Requirements for the Master of Science in Nursing

The program leading to the Master of Science in Nursing degree is offered in three regular semesters. While selected graduate courses may be offered during summer sessions, students should not anticipate completing the program in less than three regular semesters of full-time study. The curriculum is organized into five areas: (1) core courses, (2) research, (3) specialized clinical content courses, (4) functional content courses in teaching, administration or clinical specialization, and (5) electives. The student may complete a clinical and/or functional major or he may elect a general program meeting the minimum requirements for the degree.

For this degree a minimum of 36 semester hours of upper-division and graduate courses are required, including at least 18 semester hours taken in the School of Nursing, six of which may be for thesis. The maximum number of semester hours of upper-division level course work which may be included is nine. Completion of from two to three courses (8-9 semester hours) in a selected clinical area constitutes a clinical concentration, and completion of two courses (6-8 semester hours) in a functional area constitutes a functional concentration. Clinical areas offered include medical-surgical, psychiatric, and maternal/parent-child health nursing. Functional areas include teaching, ad-ministration and clinical specialization. Elective courses may be taken outside the School of Nursing.

Transfer of Credit

All academic work for a graduate degree is usually completed within The Uni-versity of Texas. However, a student may transfer from other accredited in-stitutions a maximum of six (6) semester hours of graduate credit applicable to a course of study leading toward a graduate degree. Additional general education oraduate courses may be transferred from other accredited institutions upon the approval of the Admissions Committee with the number not to exceed an additional six hours for each degree.

For the Approval of Transfer Credit:

1. The student must be enrolled in The University of Texas School of Nursing.

2. The enrolled student must submit:

a. <u>Title and number of course(s) to be considered</u>.

- b. Official catalogue containing the course title(s), number(s), and course description(s).
- с.
- Rationale for taking the course(s). d. Reason for requesting the waiver.

3. Course credits under consideration must be a part of a planned program of study approved by the Admissions Committee.

<u>All courses must have been completed no more than six years before the degree</u> <u>is awarded.</u> Courses in which a grade of C or less has been earned will not be authorized for transfer.

Courses Taken in Other U.T. Institutions

All students who have been admitted to The University of Texas School of Nurs-ing Graduate Program and plan to take courses applicable to a nursing degree in a University of Texas component other than the School of Nursing at Houston must obtain approval from the adviser prior to taking such courses and supply a transcript to the Admissions Office immediately upon the completion of the course(s).

Time Limits

The requirements for a single graduate degree must be completed within five years.

Residence

Each degree candidate must complete two semesters of full-time study, or the equivalent, in residence at The University of Texas School of Nursing. No student may receive advice and assistance from a member of the faculty in the preparation of his thesis without being registered (if necessary, for multiple semesters) for the thesis course.

In absentia registration constitutes an arrangement for the candidate who has finished the last requirements, including submission of thesis for his degree too late for the semester deadline but before the first registration day of the following semester. Such a candidate may, for a nominal fee, register in the next following semester or summer session for the sole purpose of receiving his degree in that semester or summer session.

Correspondence Courses

Courses completed by correspondence are not acceptable for graduate credit.

Graduation Under a Particular Catalogue

General and specific requirements for degrees in the School of Nursing may be altered in successive catalogues, but the student is bound only by the requirements of the catalogue in force at the time of his admission, with a six-year limit. At his discretion he may choose to fulfill the requirements of a subsequent catalogue.

When a curriculum revision occurs during the period of a student's matriculation for a degree and courses which appeared in the catalogue in force at the time of his admission to the graduate program are no longer offered, a substitute program, utilizing the offerings of the revised curriculum, will be developed for him.

Academic Requirements

Student Responsibility

The student is held responsible for knowing degree requirements and enrolling for courses that fit into his degree program. He is Tikewise held responsible for knowing the School of Nursing regulations in regard to the standard of work required for continuance in the graduate programs. Additional information should be obtained from the graduate adviser.

Grades and Grade Point Average

A maximum of six semester hours of electives applicable to each graduate degree may be taken on a credit-no credit basis and/or pass-fail basis. If the course is taken on credit-no credit basis and is passed, the symbol CR will appear on the transcript. If failed, no notation will appear on the transcript. Courses taken on a credit-no credit basis are not computed in the grade-point average. If the course is taken on a pass-fail basis, and is passed, the symbol P will appear on the transcript but is not computed in the grade-point average; if failed, the symbol F will appear on the transcript and is computed as a zero (0) in the grade-point average.

Courses in which a student receives a D or F will not be counted toward the total number of courses and/or hours required for a graduate degree from the School of Nursing. The degree candidate is required to present an overall average of B at the end of his course of study in order to graduate. Thesis course is not counted in the average.

Adding and Dropping Courses, and Withdrawal from the School of Nursing

Exact information and regulations can be obtained from the graduate advisor.

Continuation in the Graduate Programs

Registration in a graduate program beyond the first semester (or summer session) is dependent upon two main factors: (1) Satisfactory progress in absolving any admission conditions that were imposed, and (2) Maintenance of a B average for all upper-division and graduate courses taken in a given semester. Should a graduate student make less than a B average in a given semester or summer session, he will be warned that his continuance is in jeopardy. During the next semester or summer session in which he is registered for full-time study at the graduate level, he must maintain a B average, or he will be automatically dismissed at the end of it: during this period he will not be permitted to drop any courses or to withdraw.

The graduate student who has been dismissed may be readmitted for further graduate study only by permission of the Admissions Committee.

Graduate Course Descriptions

Advanced courses are considered doctoral level.

280. Core III. Professional Nursing -- Influences and Issues -- Provides a forum for exploration and evaluation of concerns germane to contemporary nursing. Prerequisite: Graduate standing required of all master's students. May be taken concurrently with Nursing 480K or Nursing 480L. Two seminar hours a week. Two semester hours.

480K. Core I. Theoretical Foundations of Nursing Process -- Relates philosophical and theoretical base to concepts and operations inherent in nursing process. Considers theories from the behavioral, natural and applied sciences with the aim of synthesis in the development and application of nursing process. Prerequisite: Graduate standing. Required of all master's students. Three class hours and three practicum hours a week. Four semester hours.

480L. Core II. Nursing Process in Clinical Situations -- Focuses on critical analysis of nursing process with selected patients. Expands and strengthens concepts and operations in the nursing process through systematic inquiry. Students choose patients for care. Content of the course arises from both theory and the nursing situation presented by the patients selected. Prerequisite: Graduate standing and Nursing 480K. Two class hours and six laboratory hours a week. Four semester hours. <u>383K.</u> Roles and Functions of the Teacher in Nursing -- Investigation of roles and functions of the teacher in contemporary nursing programs. Builds on the theory developed in the preceding courses and an investigation of the teaching-Tearning situation of a group of students in a professional, technical or vocational nursing program. Prerequisite: Nursing 480K and 483 and consent of the instructor. One class hour and six Taboratory hours a week. Three semester hours.

483. Curriculum and Instruction in Nursing -- Explores the nature of education and the major learning theories. Focuses on the development of curricula for a variety of programs in nursing and the design of teaching and learning strategies for their implementation. Prerequisite: Graduate standing or consent of instructor. Four class hours a week. Four semester hours.

386K. Nursing Administration -- The application of theories of administration and management related to situations in which nurses work. Consideration is given to the philosophical base on which nursing administration occurs. Includes the study of the extension of administrative principles to the broader field of health care delivery including legislative process. Assessment of management tools and methods related to materials and human resources management. Special emphasis is placed on the development of hypotheses regarding the nature of nursing administration. Prerequisite: Graduate standing and graduate course in theories of administration of personnel management. Three class hours a week. Three semester hours.

386M. Organizational Behavior -- Problem-oriented Case Study Approach to Labor-Management Concerns Which Are Applicable to Mursing Administrators. Prerequisite: Graduate standing and Nursing 386% or consent of instructor. Three class hours a week. Three semester hours.

194, 294, 394, 494. Independent Study in Nursing -- Detailed or in-depth study in a specific topic area. Topic and mode of study are agreed upon by student(s) and instructor. May be repeated for credit when topics vary. Prerequisite: Graduate standing and consent of instructor. Hours to be arranged. One, two, three or four semester hours.

396. Advanced Human Physiology -- Advanced concepts and recent research focused on the physiological system of man and the significance of alterations in their functioning. Prerequisite: Graduate standing and an introductory course in physiology. Three lecture hours a week. Three semester hours. Laboratory fee to be announced.

397. Fundamentals of Research -- Overview presenting the logic, methods and techniques of research. Students have the option of (1) critiquing nursing literature and applying the research process at the level of replicating a study, or (2) identifying and delineating a nursing problem and developing a research proposal. Prerequisite: Graduate standing. Three lecture hours a week. Three semester hours.

698. Thesis -- First registration for the thesis is for 698R. Students who require more than one semester to complete the thesis must register for 698W for any subsequent semesters. Prerequisite: Graduate standing, Nursing 397, and consent of instructor. Six semester hours. Assigned advisors.

Maintaining professional competency in nursing is primarily the responsibility of each individual practitioner who can best establish his/her own personal and professional goals and pursue the appropriate learning experiences.

The University of Texas School of Nursing faculty acknowledges its responsibility to provide such learning experiences for nurse practitioners throughout the state. This will be done by promoting all kinds of continuing education self-study and short-term courses or programs -- for as many practitioners as possible. The faculty firmly believes that the latter, in the form of workshops, conferences, seminars and short courses offered by the School's Continuing Education Program, are not substitutes for further formal education but should be an adjunct to independent and formal study.



Amend third to the last paragraph in section THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS HEALTH SCIENCE CENTER AT SAN ANTONIO History as follows:

In 1969, the Texas Legislature authorized the implementation of The University of Texas System School of Nursing at San Antonio. It began admitting students in 1970. On March 26, 1976, the Board of Regents reorganized the System School of Nursing [:--The-San-Antonio-School-of Nursing-was-placed-administratively-within-the-Health-Science-Genter;-effective-September-1;-1976:] and The University of Texas School of Nursing at San Antonio became a component of The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio on September 1, 1976.

Amend section THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS HEALTH SCIENCE CENTER AT SAN ANTONIO Accreditation as follows:

The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio has been awarded full regional accreditation through the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

The dental education program has received full accreditation by the Council on Dental Education of the American Dental Association and the Commission on Accreditation of Dental and Dental Auxiliary Education Programs.

The Nursing education program has received full accreditation by the National League for Nursing and the State Board of Nurse Examiners.

The medical education program has received full accreditation by the Liaison Committee on Medical Education of the Association of American Medical Colleges and the American Medical Association.

In December 1975, the Dental Assisting and Dental Laboratory Technology Training Programs were approved for preliminary provisional accreditation by the Commission on Accreditation of the American Dental Association; the Dental Hygiene Education Program was granted accreditation eligible status. Students enrolling in and completing these programs will be considered graduates of accredited programs.

Add new paragraph at the end of section STUDENT AND FACULTY SUPPORT ACTIVITIES The Office of Educational Resourses as follows:

The School of Nursing has a well-equipped simulated learning laboratory. This laboratory contains twenty-five carrels complete with individual television monitors and direct videotape access. The laboratory also provides a demonstration area for the practice of nursing skills, a reference area and a physical examination room.

Amend section STUDENT AND FACULTY SUPPORT ACTIVITIES The Office of Continuing Education Services as follows:

The learning process of a professional cannot end with the attainment of a professional degree, but must be extended continuously to keep abreast of new developments in special areas of interest. Such learning is difficult for the unassisted individual because of the enormous body of scientific information. It is the function of the Director of Continuing Education Services to coordinate and support programs designed by the faculty of the Health Science Center to further and facilitate post-graduate professional learning. San Antonio <u>Health</u> <u>Science</u> <u>Center</u>

The program of Continuing Medical Education includes a biweekly series of Therapeutic Seminars is presented at The Health Science Center for physicians in the locality and are set up as teleconferences to allow direct participation by physicians over a five-state area. <u>Nursing teleconferences</u> will begin in 1977 utilizing this same network.

Approximately 35 postgraduate courses are offered for physicians, psychologists, and others each year. These vary in length from one weekend to afternoon classes extending as long as 10 weeks so that the professional has opportunity for formal training commensurate with individual time available, interests, and requirements.

Preceptorships are also provided. These programs permit a physician to participate in the development and evaluation of an educational experience designed on an individual basis.

An extensive program in Continuing Dental Education has been established whereby dentists and auxiliaries may obtain firsthand knowledge relevant to upgrading health care.

Dental courses are scheduled on the basis of maximum interest and priority, and most will be open to all auxiliaries. In addition, special courses for dental auxiliary personnel such as dental assistants, hygienists and laboratory technicians will be offered.

Innovative educational activities will take the form of preceptorships, study clubs, participation studies for the doctor/patient or doctor/assistant, closed-circuit television courses, laboratory courses and seminars.

Nursing continuing education programs are offered to nurses in a wide geographical area. Approximately ten programs a month are sponsored by the School of Nursing. Over 5,000 participants attend these programs yearly.

Amend section ADMISSIONS TO DENTAL SCHOOL Minimum Requirements as follows:

Admission to The University of Texas Dental School at San Antonio requires a minimum of sixty semester hours of college work from an accredited college, including the following courses:

- English: One year of college English.
 Biology: Two years, as required for college science
- majors; one year must include formal laboratory work. (3) Physics: One year, as required for college science
- majors; including the corresponding laboratory experience.
- (4) Chemistry: One year of general chemistry and one year of organic chemistry, as required for college science majors, including the corresponding laboratory experience.

If students enter dental school without a baccalaureate degree but plan to earn one later, they must satisfy all the graduation requirements of the institution granting the degree.

Add Suggested Studies to section ADMISSIONS TO DENTAL SCHOOL as follows:

Suggested Studies

In San Antonio, conversational ability in colloquial Spanish is a distinct advantage and such a course is recommended. Studies that assist in the development of manual skills such as ceramics, sculpturing, freehand art, jewelry making, typing, and musical instruments are beneficial. Advanced literature, anthropology, political science, government, behavioral and social sciences as well as the arts broaden the student's perspective and are helpful.

Amend section ADMISSIONS TO DENTAL SCHOOL Dental Admission Test as follows:

in addition to the scholastic requirements for admission, all candidates are required to take the Dental Admission Test (DAT). It is administered at several testing centers throughout Texas by the Council on Dental Education of the American Dental Association. Candidates are advised to take the test after they have completed most or all of the required predental college work in biology and chemistry. The test is given [three] two times a year, in [the-Fall-(September-or] October[]--in danusry,] and in April. It is advisable to take the test not later than the Fall of the year preceding the anticipated enrollment year. Test results more than two years old are not acceptable. An application to take the Dental Admission Test and a brochure describing the testing program may be obtained from the Office of the Registrar of the Dental School or from the American Dental Association or from the Predental Advisor.

Applicants are strongly advised to prepare themselves for taking the DAT by reviewing General Chemistry, Organic Chemistry, and the Biological sciences. There are books available demonstrating the types of test questions used in the DAT and an applicant would be well advised to obtain a copy and review it.

Amend section ADMISSIONS TO DENTAL SCHOOL Application Procedure as follows:

The following requirements are stipulated for official consideration of an application for admission to the Dental School:

Applications will be accepted only between June 1 and October 31 of the year preceding expected matriculation. Applications must be made on the current year's official forms of The University of Texas System Medical and Dental Schools. The Application Center for The University of Texas System medical and dental schools must receive:

- (a) All Application forms completed and signed where appropriate.
- (b) Official transcripts of course work and grades directly from all post secondary academic institutions attended.
- (c) An evaluation of the applicant from the Pre-Professional Advisor or Advisory Committee.
- (d) DAT scores. When the applicants apply to take the DAT test, they must instruct the Division of Educational Measurements to send the test results to The University of Texas System, Medical and Dental Application Center.
- (e) A non-refundable filing fee [{this-fee-is-based-on-the number-of-schools-to-which-an-applicant-is-applying};] which ranges from \$12.00 for one school to \$37.00 for all medical and dental schools of the system.

Preference is given to legal residents of Texas. Applicants are considered on a competitive basis with consideration given to undergraduate grade point average, science grade point average, academic progression index, DAT scores (must have been taken within the lest three years), preprofessional evaluations, extramural activities and other non-cognitive factors. Interviews by members of the Admissions Committee are a prerequisite for admission. A psychological testing program will be instituted for applicants in 1977. Counseiling regading the Dental Program may be obtained at the request of the applicant.

Most pre-professional schools have Committees who are given the responsibility for preparing an appraisal of predental applicants and sending these evaluations to the Dental School Admissions Committee. When in doubt about seeking persons to write these letters of recommendation, consult with the Registrar of the Dental School.

Amend section REQUIREMENTS AND REGULATIONS <u>Absence</u>, <u>Withdrawal</u> and Re-Admission as follows:

Short leaves of absence may be granted in case of illness or personal emergency with the understanding that the student arranges with the faculty for making up all work which is missed. Absence for any cause shall, however, be reported to the office of the Associate Dean for [Academic] Student Affairs. Failure to do so may result in dismissal.

In addition, students who fail to register and pay tuition and fees within the specified dates will be considered to have terminated their connection with the Dental School unless permission to register and pay tuition at a later date has been expressly granted by the Registrar.

Students wishing to withdraw from the Dental School in good standing for physical or other personal reasons either during the academic year or after promotion to the next year must submit a written request to the Dean stating their reasons for withdrawal, the period of time involved, and their intentions concerning resumption of dental studies. If the Dean approves the request for withdrawal, the student may be granted permission to delay registration for one calendar year or to rementer Dental School at the beginning of the next regular session. In order to repeat the first year, a first year student who so withdraws, must apply again exactly according to the procedures described under APPLICATION PROCEDURES, , and must be accepted in competition with all other applicants page of that year. In each case the student must submit a written request for re-admission and furnish evidence satisfactory to the Dean that the physical condition or other reason necessitating withdrawal has been corrected and that the student is ready to resume dental studies. All matriculants must clearly understand that the faculty of the Dental School has the authority to dismiss any student from the School, or to refuse re-admission at any time before graduation if circumstances of a legal, moral, health, social, or academic nature justify such action.

The University of Texas Dental School does not undertake to prescribe in detail either its requirements or its prohibitions. Mutual regard and cooperation is expected between faculty and students. Faculty efforts are directed toward a standard of moral and ethical conduct expected of the professional person. To sever the student's connection with The University of Texas Dental School, it is understood that a gross violation of moral and ethical standards is not necessary.

Amend section REQUIREMENTS AND REGULATIONS Class Attendance as follows:

The instruction in all courses will begin as scheduled. No student may obtain credit for the year's work who has not completed his enrollment within one week after the last stated day for registration for each semaster unless special arrangements have been made with the Registrar.

Attendance is required at all scheduled classes, Laboratories and clinic periods. Reasons for absences due to illness, delayed registration, or approved causes shall be considered on an individual basis by the administration and the faculty. <u>All absences must be reported to the Dean's office at the time of the illness. Grading System

The following letter grades are used to report student performance:

A - Excellent B - Superior C - Acceptable D - Minimally Acceptable F - Failure 1 - Incomplete W - Withdrawal

<u>D</u> Grades

The final D grade is used only in basic science courses and is considered minimally acceptable.

Removal of F Grades

All grades of F must be remediated before a student is promoted to the next year or allowed to graduate. When a student remediates an F grade, the original F grade remains on the official transcript; however, the grade earned after examination following an appropriate remedial course is also entered on the official transcript and it only is used to compute the grade point average.

Removal of [Grades

An I grade may be given to a student who is doing satisfactory work in a course but because of circumstances beyond his/her control was not able to complete the required work. When all requirements have been satisfactorly completed, the student will receive the final grade earned in that course. A student with an I grade will not be promoted to the next academic year.

Withdrawel

Students who withdraw (with the Dean's permission) from a course any time before the final examination is administered will receive a WP or a WF grade in that course depending on the academic progress at the time of withdrawal. WP can be interpreted as passing with an A, B, C, or D grade; WF as failing.

Credit Hours

One semester hour of credit will be assigned for every 15 to 18 clock hours of lecture presentation, or 45 to 60 clock hours of laboratory or clinic work.

Grade Point Average

<u>Grade point average is computed on the basis of the number of credit hours</u> assigned to each course and grade points assigned to each letter grade:

The grade point average is the sum of the products of course credit hours and grade points divided by the total number of credit hours.

Promotion

The performance of each student is reviewed at the middle and end of each semester by a promotions committee. The committee determines, upon the basis of progress and/or final grades, whether the student is progressing satisfactorily. If progress is not satisfactory, remediation by assignment to a special program or dismissal may be recommended to the Dean.

At the end of the academic year, promotions committees will recommend: 1) advancement to the succeeding year, 2) assignment to special program, 3) academic dismissal, or 4) repetition of the year in the regular curriculum. All such recommendations will be supported by appropriate evidence which justifies the action being proposed.

A student must achieve a 2.0 grade point average and satisfactorily complete each course during that semester in order to be promoted to the succeding year.

Academic Probation

A student may be placed on academic probation at mid-semester or at the end of the semester in any academic year is he/she has:

1. A grade point average below a 2.0 for the semester

2. One or more F grades 3. Two or more D grades

In order for a student to be removed from academic probation he/she must:

1. Remediate all F grades 2. Achieve a grade point average of 2.0 for that semester

A student who is placed in an extended special program for the reasons listed above will remain on academic probation until he/she has remediated the deficiencies as determined by the Special Programs Committee.

Under no circumstances will a student be permitted to graduate with a cumulative grade point average of less than 2.0.

Depending upon the type of remediation, students in Special Programs will be required to register and pay an appropriate fee for the Summer Session.

The administration in consultation with the faculty may at times find it necessary to make exeptions in individual cases to the above policy in the best interest of the student and the school.

<u>Dismissal</u>

it is the policy of the University of Texas Dental School at San Antonio that each student must pass, at a designated level of competence, each required course in order to graduate. Any student who fails to satisfactorily complete a course in the regular curriculum, and fails again to satisfactorily complete that course after formal remediation, will be subject to dismissal.

Graduation

The degree of Doctor of Dental Surgery is awarded by the Board of Regents upon the satisfactory completion of the prescribed curriculum, recommendation of the Faculty of Dentistry to the Dean, and certification by the Dean to the President. Candidates must (1) present evidence of good moral character; (2) comply with all necessary legal and financial requirements; and (3) offer evidence of having satisfactorily fulfilled all academic requirements of the dental curriculum.

A final Senior Comprehensive Examination is given in conjunction with the State Board Examination for licensures. The evaluation of the work for the Comprehensive Examination is undertaken entirely by the faculty of the dental school and the grading and evaluation is entirely separate and independent from that of the State Board Examinations. The same format and the same patients are used however for both qualifying examinations. A satisfactory performance in this examination as determined by the dental school faculty is required in in order for a student to be given a passing grade from the Department of General Practice. Failure to pass this final Senior Comprehensive Examination will result in the student not graduating with his class. Should a failure occur, the faculty reserves the prerogative of re-examining a student either immediately following the Comprehensive or during the summer session. Additionally, depending on the performance of the student, remedial work may be required during the summer and/or additional semesters in order to finally gualify the student for the retake of the comprehensive examination and for graduation.

The Dental Curriculum normally requires four academic years comprised of two semesters each. It is structured so that Freshman and Sophomore classes begin in mid-August, and Junior and Senior classes each begin in mid-July with a summer clinic. Although most instruction is presented by departments of the Dental Sciences and Basic Sciences, there are some interdisciplinary courses which integrate subject material from two or more disciplines. Most of the required basic science courses are presented during the first two years of the program with some continuation through the last two years. Conversely, clinical experience begins minimally in the first year but increases each year until it predominates in the last two.

Each Junior and Senior student is assigned a cubicle in the clinic area which is a simulated dental office. Although the philosophy of the School is to emphasize the importance of comprehensive care, Juniors are rotated through each of the dental specialties to insure proficiency in each. During this year patients are screened and selected by the Diagnosis Department and assigned to several students -- each on a different specialty. Such a "team" approach provides maximum experience in each clinical discipline. Senior students are taught primarily by the faculty of the General Practice Department with the clinical specialty departments acting as consultants. Seniors are provided the opportunity to diagnose, plan treatment, and accomplish all the necessary clinical procedures on patients as would be done in a general practice enviroment.

A special educational program is available for students who have the ability to progress more rapidly than normal. They are expected to take advantage of selective courses available in a wide variety of topics, but no three-year program is available nor contemplated. The Dental Curriculum may also be decelerated to extend through five years for students who have difficulty with the normal program.

Periodontal pathology is thoroughly examined with study of the etiology and progression of periodotal disease, including all contributing factors. Problems are discussed by types with an exhaustive exploration of available therapeutic procedures with their indications and contra-indications. Special attention is given to diagnosis and treatment planning, relating periodontal therapy to all other disciplines of dentistry.

Preventive Dentistry First Semester - Sophomore 1.00 Credit Hours and First Semester - Sophomore, 1977 - 78

This 16 hour lecture course is presented by Faculty staff and by guest lecturers to describe how primary and secondary preventive concepts and technics can be applied to specialty and general practices. Emphasis is placed on the philosophy that even though the focus of the dental profession should be on the total prevention of onset of disease, there is also a need to identify and prevent the progress of existent pathology. Preclinical Technique 11 First Semester Sophomore 11.3 Credit Hours and First Semester Sophomore, 1977 - 78

An advanced didactic, laboratory, and clinical course presented by all clinical science departments in preparation for clinical practice. Techniques taught in this course are done under patient simulated conditions The knowledge and skills developed by the student in this course will enable the student to deliver care to patients in restoring their oral Health.

<u>Clinic</u> <u>Second Semester - Sophomore</u> <u>2.00 Credit Hours</u> Second Semester - Sophomore 1977-78

This course involves delivery of patient care in a clinical setting. The student will learn patient management in the following clinical areas: Oral Diagnosis, Treatment Planning, Operative Dentistry, Oral Surgery, Pedodontics, and Periodontics. The student will be involved in rendering fundamental treatment procedures on a rotating basis. The procedures accomplished will not affect the clinical requirements of the Junior and Senior year, but the experience will facilitate patient and record management in the ensuing clinical years.

Diagnosis and Treatment Planning Second Semester-Sophomore 1.00 Credit Hour

The student gains clinical judgement and proficiency in history taking, general patient appraisal, intra-oral examination techniques, Interpreting radiographs, and other diagnostic aids making the diagnosis, prognosis, and treatment plan. This is accomplished on each of his approximately 15 comprehensive care patients. The course would not require additional hours of work by the students; it would merely give credit for the work the students are doing at present. It would reflect favorablyof the student's transcript and would increase the ratio of clinical hours to didactic hours. At present the students are spending on the average of 8 hours to do the clinical examination, radiographs, interpretation of radiographs, fabrication of diagnostic casts, having the examination checked by the diagnosis instructor, and formulating a treatment plan as they rotate through the departments. An additional 30 minutes is spent on verification of treatment plan. This adds up to a total of 8 1/2 hours before the student is ready to begin treatment. Subtracting the 2 1/2 hours estimated for radiographs and interpretation, this leaves a total of 6 hours to diagnosis and treatment planning. Anticipating that the average Sophomore will pick up approximately 15 cases during his sophomore year this works out to a total of 90 clock hours for diagnosis and treatment planning.

Guest lecturers present some of the lectures. During the clinical phase of [T]this course continue[s]d emphasis is placed on diagnosis, treatment planning, design priciples, mouth preparation and dental laboratory coordination. The student correlates biological and mechanical information in clinical are of patients requiring removable partial dentures. The student is required to complete treatment for one partial denture patient during the junior year.

Complete Denture Prosthodontics Second Semester - Junior 1.00 Credit Hour

The student applies the principles of complete denture construction that were taught during the clinical and preclinical complete denture courses. The student is regulred to construct a minimum of two complete dentures.

Public Health

Second Semester - Junior 0.50 Credit Hours

A continuation of the first semester lecture course directed to the philosophy and use of public health planning and operation to maximize the dental health of a community, state or nation. Includes discussions on scope, needs and responsibilities of public health delivery systems, including epidemiology, manpower, financing and technics for prevention and oral health care.

Measurement and Evaluation [Biostatistics]

The study of quantitative statistical methods commonly used in the evaluation of dental research data intended to aid the student in reading the literature, designing studies, and understanding the role of scientific investigations. This is an 8 hour didactic course in which the techniques of complicated exodontia will be discussed. There will also be lectures on the management of patients with systemic problems requiring oral surgery. Drug use preoperatively and postoperatively will be reviewed. Each student will be given a week rotation at the Robert B. Green Hospital. This will be approximately 28 clock hours. This rotation provides clinical experience in performing minor oral surgery on patients who, in many instances, are in acute distress and/or have acute odontogenic infection.

Endodontics Second Semester - Junior 1.00 Credit Hour

This course is a combination of both lecture and clinical endodontics. It provides additional clinical Endodontic situations which require management in the routine practice of dentistry. A portion of the course includes a conjoint approach by the Pathology, Diagnosis and Endodontic Departments to emphasize the pulp in health and disease, diagnosis and treatment planning, and management of Endodontic problems.

Add Section on Selectives as Follows:

Selective Subjects

Each student must take a certain number of selective hours from among a list of alternatives, but no single subarea or course is specifically required. A total of 2.5 Credit Hours must be earned from selective subjects during the second semester of the senior year. This number of hours may be attained from a single subject or from a combination of as many as four subjects. The selective subjects listed below are now available; however, others are in preparation. Seniors may select additional subjects as they are developed and approved.

Effective Dental Photography

This course requires nine clock hours and includes basic photographic terms, equipment selction, lenses, film, lighting, intra-oral techniques (such as use of mirrors and retractors), extra-oral techniques, photographing small objects, making photographs of the printed page, and making title slides.

Head and Neck Anatomy

This course offered in 1976-1977 only. Conferences, dissections, and prosection demonstrations designed to correlate basic anatomy of the head and neck with clinical problems. Combined with teaching in the laboratory for the freshman or sophomore head and neck anatomy course. Available by appointment only.

Advanced Roentgenology

This is an advanced seminar and clinical course in roentgenology covering special intra-oral and extra-oral roentgenographic techniques, interpretation principles and recent advances in dental and medical roentgenology. The student will be required to prepare a method of prescribed intra-oral and extra-oral radiographs taken in the dental x-ray clinic.

<u>Periodontics</u>

<u>A seminar course in advances periodontics with emphasis on nutrition and systemic disease conducted by the Department of Periodontics Faculty and guest lecturers Donald H. Master, D.D.S., and Richard Newberry, D.D.S.</u>

Nitrous Oxide Utilization

A lecture and clinical participation course presenting the fundamentals of nitrous oxide conscious sedation presented by the Department of Oral Surgery Faculty.

Nearly ninety percent of all practicing dentist belong to their National organization, The American Dental Association (A.D.A.). Membership in this organization is coupled with membership in the State Association as well as in the local dental society. Provision has been made so that dental students may join the American Student Dental Association and receive the journal as well as being eligible for the A.D.A.'s insurance programs and for other benefits. The fee for membership is ten dollars per year and this same fee provides membership for the first year after graduation or while in postgraduate school

Add new organization as follows:

Dental Student Association - The University of Texas Dental School at San Antonio

The Dental Student Association was formed in 1976 to provide an organization by which these students might contribute to the regulation of their affairs and to provide an effective means of communication between students, faculty, and administration.

Each student enrolled in The University of Texas Dental School is automatically a member of the Association. Members of the Student Council, the governing body of the Association, are elected annually by the students.

Association members participate in the standing committees of the dental school faculty to insure student representation and viewpoints in the operation of the dental program. Additional functions of the Association include: recommendations on academic affairs, recommendations on curriculum evaluation, promotion of athletic activities amoung members, publication of an association newspaper, and production of the school's yearbook.

Amend section FINANCIAL INFORMATION Other Expenses as follows:

Students are required to enroll in the Blue Cross Hospital Services Plan designed for students at The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio or show evidence of enrollment in another hospitalization plan with [equat-or-greater-provisions] adequate coverage. From this review, a list of required equipment is developed for each year of the dental curriculum and is made available to each class at the time of registration. An approved kit is placed on reserve for each registering dental student at the Bookstore of The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio.

It is essential that prescribed new instruments be purchased so that students have equal opportunity to perform the tasks and obtain the experience expected of them. Therefore, instruments and supplies other than those on the official list or used instruments and supplies are not acceptable.

Dental Textbooks[and-the-Bookstore]

As in the case of dental instruments, every student needs specific textbooks and manuals. Also, as in the case with the dental instruments, students will want to retain these textbooks for use during their educational program and for their own professional library.

New lists of textbooks are issued each year. Textbooks may be purchased at the Health Science Center's bookstore.

Textbook lists normally list "required" textbooks and "recommended" textbooks. As the word implies, the instructors expect the students to purchase the "required textbooks". Students should consult the instructor as to the advisability of purchasing the "recommended" books. Although these are usually on reserve in the library, students may find it more convenient to have their own books if they are to be used frequently. It should be emphasized that instructors expect every student to own a copy of the textbooks which have been placed on the "required list." It is not possible for a student to depend upon checking out textbooks from the library or to borrow them from other students.

Second-hand textbooks may be used providing that each textbook is the edition specified on the list. Most students prefer to buy new copies so they can do their own underlining and note taking in the book. The bookstore does not sell used books.




