LAPSE OF BALANCE IN ALLOTMENT ACCOUNT FOR NEW PARKING AREA AND STORM SEWER AT SOUTHWESTERN MEDICAL SCHOOL: At the Regents' meeting of June 29, 1957, an appropriation in the amount of \$70,000.00 was made from the Unappropriated Balance of General Funds of Southwestern Medical School for the construction of a new parking area and storm sewer. A contract has been let for the Parking Area, and the storm sewer has been constructed by the City of Dallas, with the University paying a portion of the expenses. There now remains a balance of \$7,536.50 in the allotment account for which there appears to be no further need. Mr. Sparenberg recommends, and I concur, that this sum be lapsed to the Unappropriated Balance - General Funds of Southwestern Medical School.






