RECOMMENDED AMENDMENTS TO THE 1964-65 CENTRAL ADMINISTRATION BUDGET

Institutional Studies Office

Transfer \$1,000 from Consultants and Research Associates to the Clerical Assistants account in the Institutional Studies Office to provide for the payment of part-time personnel engaged in a space survey of the Main Campus in cooperation with the Texas Commission on Higher Education. (RBC 84)

University News and Information Service

2. Transfer \$1,500 from the Central Administration Unallocated Account to the University News and Information Service - Maintenance, Operation, and Equipment. Increased volume of production in this office has resulted in increased operational costs. (RBC 90)

OTHER FISCAL ITEMS

1. CONTRACT FOR INSURANCE CONSULTING SERVICES FOR THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS SYSTEM

Comptroller Sparenberg recommends via Vice-Chancellor Dolley that the University's contract with A. R. Massey and Associates, Inc., Dallas, Texas, Insurance Consultants, be extended for another twelve-month period, heginning December 10, 1964, at a fee of \$800 for this period. Source of Funds - Central Administration Unallocated Account.

Mr. A. R. Massey has been the University's insurance consultant since November 18, 1954, and has rendered very satisfactory service. The previous fees charged are as follows: first year - \$3,500; second year - \$1,500; third year - \$1,000; and fourth to tenth years, inclusive - \$800 each. He assisted us in converting fire and extended coverage policies, boiler and machinery policies, and money and securities policies to a blanket system-wide basis.

Mr. Massey's services include, in addition to consultation on miscellaneous insurance matters, (1) an up-to-date list of "replacement new" valuations for fire and extended coverage insurance, (2) furnishing information on policies, rates, and adjustments in the rates, and (3) preparing a complete audit of all insurance policies including furnishing recommendations concerning changes in coverage 1f needed.

It is recommended that the assignment of the lease be approved and that the Chairman of the Board be authorized to execute the consent for assignment after approval by the University Attorney as to form and the Endowment Officer as to content. The assignment fee of \$25 has been received.

SURFACE LEASE NO. 965 - U. S. GOVERNMENT - CIVIL AERONAUTICS AD-MINISTRATION, HUDSPETH COUNTY - REQUEST FOR OPTION FOR RENEWAL. -- This lease is for a VHF Radio Range Station Site covering a parcel of land in the E/2 of Section 72, Block M, Hudspeth County at annual rental of \$25, and extending through June 30, 1967, by payment of annual rental in advance.

The Federal Aviation Agency (successor to CAA) has, in the interest of long range planning, asked for an option on a 20-year lease, from July 1, 1967, and to enlarge the area to a plot 200 feet x 200 feet to allow for expansion of the transmitter building and installation of additional facilities to provide for better air navigation in that area. The rental will remain the same. The University will be advised of the intent of the Government to exercise the option within 90 days after the expiration date of the existing lease.

The granting of the option as outlined above is recommended, with the Chairman authorized to sign the option agreement when approved as to form by the University Attorney and as to content by the Endowment Officer.

PROPOSAL FROM TEXAS HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT FOR 24.38 ACRES OF UNIVER-SITY FAND IN WARD COUNTY. -- As right-of-way for the construction of Interstate Highway No. 20 from the Reeves County Line to 0.5 miles west of Pyote, the Texas Highway Department has requested conveyance of determinable fee in a parcel of land containing 24.38 acres in Section 40, Block 16, University Lands, Ward County. The Department proposes to pay the University the sum of \$317 for the land and \$110 for the existing fence. Arrangements for construction of fence on the new right-of-way line have been made with the University's tenants, Avary and Allgood, the cost to be borne by the Highway Department.

The University Land Agent has met with the Right-of-Way Agent of the Highway Department and the independent appraiser employed by the Highway Department. It is felt that the price of \$13 per acre for the land and \$110 for the fence is fair to the University. It is, therefore, recommended that the Texas Highway Department be sold the 24.38 acres on a determinable fee basis with all minerals reserved, for \$427, including the existing fence.

It is further recommended that the Chairman of the Board be authorized to execute the appropriate deed when approved as to form by the University Attorney and as to content by the Endowment Officer.

GRAZING LEASES NOS. 869 AND 890.--APPROVAL OF COMBINATION OF FARM-ING LEASES COVERING PORTIONS OF THE SUBJECT GRAZING LEASES WITH FEE LAND OWNED BY DARRELL S. WARREN, AND CHANGE OF NAME OF LESSEE OF GRAZING LEASE NO. 890 FROM TOM L. WARREN TO DARRELL S. WARREN.--At the September, 1964 meeting of the Board of Regents, approval was given, as required by Government regulations, for the combination of portions of the subject leases which were being farmed.

Since that action, Tom L. Warren, to whom Lease No. 890 was issued, has died and his son, Darrell S. Warren, holder of Lease No. 869, has been named heir to his estate, which includes Lease No. 890 as well as a farm cwned by Tom L. Warren some 5 miles from University Lands.

Darrell S. Warren has requested, through the Pecos County Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service, that the farm lands covered by leases Nos. 869 and 890, as well as the fee land referred to above, be combined, which request has been approved by ASCS Pecos County Committee. The combination will set up good farming practices and also simplify the ASCS book-keeping and is expected to result in a permanent cotton acreage allotment for the University acreage.

It is, therefore, recommended that the combination of the farms on the University's two leases with Mr. Warren's fee land be approved, and that Grazing Lease No. 890, currently in the name of Tom S. Warren, be changed to Darrell S. Warren.

PROPOSED PROCEDURE FOR ARRANGEMENT WITH TEXAS HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT FOR ROAD BUILDING MATERIAL FROM UNIVERSITY LANDS. -- For many years, there has been in practically every docket of the Land and Investment Committee one or more material source permits for road building material from University Lands for the Highway Department. This material was furnished to the Highway Department, without charge, until rather recently, but payment is now being received. It is still furnished, without charge, to Counties for road building. The paper work and time for processing for each job, as well as delays in construction projects, have been time consuming, and it is therefore recommended that an arrangement be made with the Highway Department whereby material from University Lands can be sold at the going rate paid by the Highway Department in the particular area. This arrangement will in no way affect the standard price of the University to others of \$.25 per cubic yard.

Under the proposed arrangement, the District Highway Engineer will communicate with the University Land Agent and make appropriate arrangements for the material source, the rate to be paid, and the approximate amount of material to be used. The Land Agent will be authorized to allow the material to be taken upon assurance from the District Engineer that it will be paid for, upon completion of removing the material, at the established rate. When the project is completed, the University's standard material source permit form will be completed by the Highway Department and submitted to the University, preferably with check for the amount due, or with the check to be forwarded soon thereafter. This will be reported in the next succeeding docket. The Highway Districts involved in such a plan will be Nos. 5, 6, 7 and 24. Current prices being paid for base material and borrow material by the Highway Department in the various areas are as follows:

The Highway Department advises that there is occasionally some fluctuation in the price paid for material in an area due to quality, availability, etc., but they believe the prices listed above will be valid for some time. They will periodically review the schedule and advise the University of any change, and the University Land Agent will of course get the best price he can when approving removal of the material.

It is recommended that the procedures outlined above be approved.

It is further recommended that the University Land Agent be authorized to negotiate along the same lines with contractors of the Highway Department when they need additional yardage above that approved for the Highway Department out of the same pit to complete a State Highway project.

WATER LEASE NO. 29, GULF OIL CORPORATION, CRANE COUNTY - CONSENT TO ASSIGNMENT OF PORTION OF LANDS COVERED BY LEASE TO B. H. MANSELL.--Brine Lease No. 2 to B. H. Mansell covers a portion of the NE/4 of Section 4, Block 31, Crane County, already covered by Water Lease No. 29 to Gulf Oil Corporation. When the lease was made, Gulf assigned that portion of land for a three-year period from June 9, 1960. Brine is still being produced under Mineral Lease No. 2 and Gulf has again assigned that portion of the land for the production of brine as well as for 1,000 barrels of fresh water per month to be produced and sold by Mr. Mansell. The new assignment is for a three-year period from June 9, 1964. It is recommended that, in compliance with Section 14 of Water Lease No. 29, the Board of Regents consent to the assignment with the Chairman of the Board authorized to execute the instrument when approved as to form by the University Attorney and as to content by the Endowment Officer.

PIPE LINE EASEMENT NO. 1974, EL PASO NATURAL CAS COMPANY, WARD AND WINKIER COUNTIES - AMENDMENT TO DESCRIPTION OF LOCATION OF EASEMENT.—Pipe Line Easement No. 1974, covering 4,038.15 rods of 20-inch line in Blocks 16, 17, and 21, Ward and Winkler Counties was approved by the Board of Regents at its meeting of January 30, 1965. In course of construction of a portion of the pipe line, it was necessary to deviate from the description previously furnished. It is therefore recommended that the description be amended and that the Chairman of the Board be authorized to execute the instrument when approved as to form by the University Attorney and as to content by the Endowment Officer. The \$25 fee to the University for such amendment has been received.

PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND - BOND MATTERS .--

AUTHORIZATION TO REQUEST BIDS FOR \$(Amount to be supplied at meeting) BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND BONDS, SERIES 1965, AND RELATED MATTERS.—From a study of anticipated needs and bond proceeds still unexpended, it has been determined by the Vice Chancellor for Fiscal Affairs, and approved by the Chancellor, that the amount of the issue of Permanent University Fund Bonds, Series 1965, should be \$(Amount to be supplied at meeting). It is, therefore, recommended that the Endowment Officer be authorized to advertise for bids for sale of the bonds, printing of the bonds, and paying agency fees, as well as to take other necessary steps for the issuance of the bonds. The date on which bids will be taken and the sale of the bonds will be scheduled to fit into the date set for the July, 1965 meeting of the Board of Regents.

It is also recommended that the firm of McCall, Parkhurst & Horton of Dallas be employed as bond counsel for the 1965 Series and that the Chairman of the Board of Regents be authorized to execute an agreement as to their fee, upon approval of the Endowment Officer and the Vice Chancellor for Fiscal Affairs.

It is further recommended that the sum of \$7,500 be appropriated from the Available Fund to an account in the Endowment Office entitled "Permanent University Fund Bonds, Series 1965 - Miscellaneous Costs." This appropriation will be used to pay for printing, advertising, bond counsel, postage and similar expenses.

We have learned that the Administration of Texas A & M University does not expect to Issue Permanent University Fund Bonds in 1965.

TRUST AND SPECIAL FUNDS - REAL ESTATE MATTERS ---

SOUTHWESTERN MEDICAL SCHOOL - DANCIGER RESEARCH LABORATORIES - SALE OF WEINBERGER PROPERTY IN DALLAS. -- On June 30, 1962, the Board of Regents accepted gift of approximately 1.2 acres on Central Expressway in Dallas from the Pauline and Adolph Weinberger Fund of the Dallas Community Chest Trust Fund with the proceeds to be applied in due course on the construction of two additional floors, to be known as the Weinberger Research Laboratories, on the Danciger Research Building at Southwestern Medical School. In making this gift, Mr. Weinberger gave a letter agreeing to buy the property from the Board of Regents for \$50,000 at the end of 5 years if it had not been sold by that time for at least that amount. An independent appraisal obtained at the time of the gift gave a market value of \$45,000.

At its July, 1963 meeting, the Board of Regents authorized negotiations for sale of the property and listings with Dallas realtors to be selected by Dean Gill, with approval of Central Administration, any sale proposal to be submitted to the Board of Regents for action.

The construction of Danciger Research Building, including the Weinberger Research Laboratories, is well along, and the proceeds from the Weinberger gift are needed.

Dean Gill listed this property on a non-exclusive basis with two of the leading Dallas realtors in the summer of 1963, but no proposals for purchase in the range of \$50,000 were received until April, 1965, when a proposal with earnest money came from Emsco Enterprises through Mildred Hall, Realtor, at gross price of \$52,272 cash, the seller to receive \$50,000 net. Emsco Enterprises appeared most anxious to have action on this proposal before the May meeting of the Board of Regents, and the staff, through channels, submitted their proposal to the Executive Committee of the Board of Regents, which approved acceptance and execution by the Chairman of the Board of a contract of sale with Emsco Enterprises.

Mr. Weinberger has now notified Dean Gill that he would like to buy the property for \$50,000. The staff is notifying Emsco that their proposal must await action by the Board of Regents at the May meeting. This matter is submitted by the staff for appropriate recommendation by the Land and Investment Committee and action by the Board of Regents.

M. D. ANDERSON HOSPITAL AND TUMOR INSTITUTE - DELINQUENT RENTAL ON PROPERTY AT CAPITOL AND LABRANCH, HOUSTON - CLYDE PAUL LEASE. -- Among the properties of the Rosalie B. Hite Estate, the income from which was designated for use by M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute, was property at Capitol and LaBranch in Houston. The property was sold to Young Women's Christian Association of Houston in December, 1962.

This lot was too small for anything like a profitable parking lot without use by the lessee of adjoining property and had been under various leases to Mr. Clyde Paul since June 1, 1946. Due to poor health and financial reverses, Mr. Paul became delinquent on his rental of \$150 per month and owed the University \$900 when the property was sold. He agreed to pay this out at \$50 per month but made only one payment. The Taub family, with whom the University staff was in touch off and on prior to sale of our property, owned the adjoining property leased to Mr. Paul. At the time of the sale, Mr. Paul owed the Taubs around \$7,000. It is understood that this has been reduced to judgment but with little hope of collecting any of it. The University staff has made personal calls on Mr. Paul and has written him many times. It now seems definite that nothing can be collected and it is recommended that the Board of Regents authorize dropping the matter without filing suit.

TRUST AND SPECIAL FUNDS - REAL ESTATE MATTERS .-- Continued

TEXAS WESTERN COLLEGE - FRANK B. COTTON TRUST - EXTENSION OF LEASE TO SOUTHWEST WHEEL AND MANUFACTURING COMPANY.--The five-year lease to Southwest Wheel, Inc., now Southwest Wheel and Manufacturing Company, of a 1.5-acre tract of the Frank B. Cotton Trust on which is situated a sheet iron building and related improvements, expired February 28, 1965. Rental is \$500.00 per month. Due to the uncertainty created by the Chamizal Project, Dr. Ray has recommended that the lease be extended only for one year under the present terms. It is recommended that such extension through February 28, 1966, be approved with the Chairman of the Board authorized to execute the instrument when approved as to form by the University Attorney and as to content by the Endowment Officer.

TRUST AND SPECIAL FUNDS - GIFT, BEQUEST AND ESTATE MATTERS .--

RECOMMENDATION FOR ACCEPTANCE OF GIFT FROM DR. AND MRS. WM. E. DUNN WITH INCOME RESERVED. -- Dr. and Mrs. Wm. E. Dunn of Dallas propose to give to the Board of Regents good common stocks worth approximately \$25,000, with full powers of sale, reinvestment, commingling and the like, reserving income to themselves and their children for a period of 20 years, at which time the fund will vest in the Board of Regents without restriction as to use. Dr. Dunn is 77 years of age, a 1909 graduate of the University, and a member of the faculty of the University's History Department from 1913 to 1919.

The terms of the gift are in line with the policy adopted by the Board of Regents in July, 1960, covering gifts to the University with income reserved, and it is recommended that the Board of Regents accept this gift and authorize its Chairman to execute the Trust Agreement when approved as to form by the University Attorney and as to content by the Endowment Officer.

M. D. ANDERSON HOSPITAL AND TUMOR INSTITUTE - REPORT AND RECOM-MENDATION FOR ACCEPTANCE OF BEQUEST UNDER THE WILL OF WM. G. C. MACDONALD.--Mr. Wm. G. C. MacDonald of Brady died in April, 1963, leaving a Will now probated in McCulloch County providing in Article II as follows:

- A. All property, real, personal or mixed, wherever situated and however acquired, which I may own or in which I may have any interest at my death, I give, devise, bequeath and appoint to the Board of Regents of the University of Texas, State of Texas, as Trustee, and my said executor, hereinafter named, is directed to pay and deliver all of such property to the said Board of Regents of the University of Texas, State of Texas, as Trustee, but such gift, devise, bequest and appointment to said Board of Regents of the University of Texas is in trust and said Board of Regents as Trustee is hereby directed and instructed to use and spend any and all of such funds and property only for the purpose of cancer research at the University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital located in the County of Harris, State of Texas.
- B. Should the Board of Regents of the University of Texas, as Trustee, fail, refuse or be unable to take hereunder for the purpose outlined in the immediately preceding paragraph "A" of this Article II, such gift shall in no event lapse, but my executor, hereinafter named, is hereby instructed, authorized, empowered and directed to pay and deliver all of such property to any charitable institution or institutions of my executor's choosing, organized and doing business in the State of Texas and engaged primarily in medical research, and, in such event, I hereby give, devise, bequeath and appoint all of such property to any such charitable institution or institutions designated and named in writing by my said executor, hereinafter named.

A contest of the Will was filed by relatives, which contest has now been concluded by final judgment upholding the Will. The Commercial National Bank of Brady is Independent Executor. The Estate, consisting of two pieces of real estate, bonds, and cash, has a gross value of \$40,000 to \$50,000, and the Independent Executor is proceeding with Administration. It is recommended that the Board of Regents accept this bequest.

ESTATE OF MRS. FLORIDA P. SUMERWELL, DECEASED - REPORT AND RECOM-MENDATION FOR ACCEPTANCE OF BEQUEST. -- The Independent Executor of the Estate of Mrs. Florida P. Sumerwell of East Orange, New Jersey, has advised the University of a bequest under her Will, Paragraph THIRD C (b), which reads as follows:

(b) I give and bequeath to the University of Texas the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars for such purposes as the then governing body of the University may deem desirable.

Check in the amount of \$1,000.00 has been received.

Mrs. Sumerwell (Daisy Philips) of Austin was a student in the University from 1885 to 1887 in the "Academic Department."

It is recommended that the bequest be accepted.

TRUST AND SPECIAL FUNDS - BOND MATTERS .--

ARLINGTON STATE COLLEGE - PLANS FOR ISSUANCE OF \$325,000 BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS - ARLINGTON STATE COLLEGE STEAM PLANT REVENUE BONDS - SERIES 1965.--Recommendations are being submitted through the Buildings and Grounds Committee regarding award of contract for heating and air conditioning plant expansion at Arlington State College, these plans having progressed to the point of receiving bids before the College was transferred to The University of Texas System. It is necessary to have this plant expansion completed by the beginning of the Fall Semester in order to use certain new buildings at the College.

After thorough study of the matter, the staff recommends that the Board of Regents authorize plans for the issuance of \$325,000 Board of Regents of The University of Texas - Arlington State College Steam Plant Revenue Bonds - Series 1965, to finance this plant expansion and the employment of the firm of McCall, Parkhurst & Horton as bond counsel. The firm has already worked on the plans for issuance of revenue bonds for this purpose. It is understood that these bonds will be issued under Article 2654c-1, generally known as the Skiles Act, which authorizes the Board of Regents and other governing boards to deduct \$5.00 per semester, from tuition fees, for the construction and equipment of buildings and power plants, as well as other purposes and to pledge such fees or any portion thereof for the retirement of bonds for such construction. There have already been preliminary negotiations by the A & M System with a Texas bank for the purchase of revenue bonds for this plant expansion, and it is recommended that the University staff be authorized to pursue these negotiations and recommend to the Board of Regents at its next meeting the adoption of the appropriate bond resolution and the award of the bonds on negotiated sale if an effective interest rate satisfactory to the Board of Regents can be obtained. The staff believes that sale of this amount and type of bonds by newotiation will be an advantage over advertising for bids.

Due to the fact that payments on the heating and air conditioning plant expansion contract would be due prior to the time when revenue bonds can be delivered, the staff recommends that all amounts necessary to meet such contract payments be advanced from Main University Housing and Food Service Reserve, Account No. 28-8328-F, and be reimbursed to that account from proceeds of sale of the bonds.

RESEARCH CONTRACTS: The following contracts, grants, and amendments have been negotiated by the Office of Government Sponsored Research and have been signed by the Vice-Chancellor for Academic Affairs upon the recommendation of the appropriate technical director and fiscal officers, and the Director of the Office of Government Sponsored Research. I recommend your approval and ratification of signatures:

These additional funds are to be used for the procurement of a replacement tube for the 4 Mev-type KN Van de Grasf accelerator. The research in nuclear physics continues under the direction of Dr. B.B. Kinsey, Professor of Physics.

Contract AT-(40-1)-3326, by which the United States Atomic Energy Commission, Oak Ridge , Tennessee, provides \$10,000.00 for support of research entitled "Initiation of Bubbles in Supersaturated Solutions by Ionizing Radiation." The contract is effective for the period February 1, 1965 through January 31, 1966, and the research will be performed under the direction of Dr. David M. Himmelblau, Associate Professor of Chemical Engineering.

Contract AT-(40-1)-3341, by which the United States Atomic Energy Commission, Oak Ridge, Tennessee, provided \$8,250.00 for support of a project entitled "Research Participation for College Teachers." The contract is effective for the period January 1, 1965 through December 31, 1965, and the project will be under the direction of Dr. R.N. Little, Professor of Physics.

Amendment No. 2 to Contract CGS-1198, by which the Department of Commerce, Coast and Geodetic Survey, Washington, D.C., adds the sum of \$70,000.00 to the contract funds and extends the period of the contract through November 11, 1965. The contract is effective for the period January 15, 1965 through June 30, 1966, and the Institute will be under the direction of Dr. Royal B. Embree, Jr., Professor of Educational Psychology.

Contract OE-5-12-046, by which the United States Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Office of Education, provides \$16,095.00 for support of a short term Counseling and Guidance Training Institute during the summer of 1965. The contract is effective for the period January 15, 1965 through September 30, 1965, and the Institute will be directed by Dr. Earl A. Koile, Professor of Educational Psychology.

Grant GMllll-03, by which the United States Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Public Health Service, provides \$53,898.00 for support of research entitled "Biochemical Systematic Studies in the Genus Baptisia." Supplemental Agreement No. 2 to Contract FH 43-64-557, by which the United States Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Public Health Service, changes certain language in Supplemental Agreement No. 1 to "a new provisional overhead rate has been negotiated beginning with the effective date of the basic contract" from "a new provisional overhead rate has been negotiated beginning with the effective date of this agreement." The research on the effects of plastic devices on biological products continues under the direction of Dr. John Autian, Associate Professor of Pharmacy.

The grant is effective for the period April 15, 1965 to April 14, 1966, and the center will be under the direction of Dr. Charles C. Cleland, Associate Professor of Educational Psychology.
- 52. Amendment No. 1 to Grant VRA 305-T-55 by which the United States Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Vocational Rehabilitation Administration, Washington, D.C., makes a prior years' adjustment of \$1,577.84 in the grant funds. The teaching grant and traineeships in mental retardation continue under the direction of Miss Anne Wilkens, Professor and Acting Director, Graduate School of Social Work.
- 53. Amendment No. 1 to Grant No. VRA 446-T-65, by which the United States Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Vocational Rehabilitation Administration, Washington, D.C., authorizes the rebudgeting of some of the funds as requested by Dr. Kopra. The teaching grant and traineeships in the field of speech pathology and audiology continue under the direction of Dr. Lepnart L. Kopra, Professor of Speech.
- 54. Amendment No. 2 to Grant VRA 406-T-65 by which the United States Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Vocational Rehabilitation Administration, Washington, D.C., makes a prior years' adjustment of \$3,357.05 in the grant funds. The teaching grant and traineeships in the field of speech pathology and audiology continue under the direction of Dr. Lennart L. Kopra, Professor of Speech.
- 55. Amendment No. 1 to Contract VRA 65-13, by which the United States Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Office of Vocational Rehabilitation, Vashington, D.C., transfers funds in the amount of \$100.00 from the traineeship category to the instructional administrative costs category. The short term training institute for volunteer coordinators in state operated psychiatric facilities in Texas, Arkansas, Louisians, Oklahoma, and New Mexico continues under the direction of Dr. Robert L. Sutherland, Professor of Sociology.
- 56. Training Grant No. 65-33, by which the United States Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Welfare Administration, Children's Bureau, Washington, D.C., provides \$48,289.00 for support of a teaching grant and traineeships in the field of child welfare. The grant is effective for the period July 1, 1965 through June 30, 1966, and the program will be directed by Miss Anne Wilkens, Professor and Acting Director, Graduate School of Social Work.
- 57. Grant CB-3280, by which the National Science Foundation, Washington, D.C., provides \$35,000.00 for support of research entitled "Avian Behavior, Ecology, and Evolution." The grant is effective for the period February 1, 1965 through January 31, 1967, and the research will be performed under the direction of Dr. Robert K. Selander, Associate Professor of Zoology.
- 58. Grant GE-7557, by which the National Science Foundation, Washington, D.C., provides \$8,770.00 for support of a project entitled "Research Participation for College Teachers." The grant is effective for the period December 1, 1964 through October 31, 1965, and the project will be under the direction of Dr. R.N. Little, Professor of Physics.

- 59. Grant GS-671, by which the National Science Foundation, Washington, D.C., provides \$55,000.00 for support of research entitled "Acculturation in a Modern Complex Society." The grant is effective for the period January 1, 1965 through December 31, 1968, and the research will be performed under the direction of Dr. John B. Cornell, Associate Professor of Anthropology.
- 60. Amendment No. ? to Subcontract No. 181471, by which the Applied Physics Laboratory, Johns Hopkins University, Silver Spring, Maryland, increases the sum allotted under Task B from \$50,000.00 to \$106,688.15 and amends the work to be performed under Task B of the contract. The research continues in the Defense Research Laboratory under the direction of Dr. Chester M. McKinney.

<u>ACADEMIC CONTRACTS:</u> The following contracts have been executed at the Main University by the official indicated. I recommend approval and ratification of signatures.

- 1. Research Agreement with Continental Oil Company, signed by Vice-Chancellor Norman Hackerman, whereby the University will carry out an experimental research program in the "Field of Endeavor" under the direction of Professor F. W. Jessen of the Department of Petroleum Engineering. Continental Oil has sent a check for \$6,600, the estimated cost in the contract, but will pay extra up to a total of \$7,000 should there be additional costs.
- 2. Letter Agreement with Getty Oil Company, Wilmington, Delaware, signed by Chancellor Harry Ransom, whereby the Oil Company will send to the University from time to time students under its sponsorship, whom the University, through its International Office, will test, appraise their academic hackground, and arrange individual academic programs to be conducted either on the University campus or other campuses. Getty Oil Company will pay the University \$600 per semester per student enrolled and may also pay the sum of \$100 per semester to secure a complete coverage of health and medical expenses up to a total of \$1,000 for each illness or accident.
- 3. Amendment No. I to Interagency Contract No. 4413-984 with the Texas Highway Department, signed by Business Manager James H. Colvin, which extends the terminating date to July 1, 1965, for the Economic Base Study for the Dallas-Fort Worth Regional Transportation Study being done by the Bureau of Business Research.
- 4. Interagency Contract No. 4413-1087 with the State Department of Health, signed by Business Manager James H. Colvin, whereby the University through its Testing and Counseling Center will use the Optical Mark Scoring Reader and card punch machine for the purpose of processing data for the Texas Plan for Comprehensive Mental Health Program Planning. The contract is in force from February 15, 1965, through June 30, 1965, and the total amount to be paid to the University will not exceed \$500.
- 5. Interagency Contract No. 4413-1089 with the Parks and Wildlife Commission and Department, signed by Business Manager James H. Colvin, whereby the University through its Center for Research in Water Resources will furnish the necessary services to continue the

studies of the movement of currents, sedimentation, siltation, and their effects in Galveston and Trinity Bays, the contract to be in force from February 16, 1965, through August 31, 1965, and the total amount is estimated to be \$12,700.

- 6. Interagency Contract No. 4413-1090 with the Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University, signed by Business Manager James H. Colvin, whereby the University will make available the services of Dr. Arthur J. Rubel, Assistant Professor of Anthropology, during a training conference at San Antonio and San Angelo on Reaching Mexican-American Families with Extension Educational Programs during the approximate period of March 23 to April 1, 1965, the total amount to be paid not to exceed \$80.00.
- 7. Interagency Contract No. 4413-1092 with Texas Industrial Commission, signed by Business Manager James H. Colvin, whereby the University through its Bureau of Business Research will furnish services and materials for use in advertising and disseminating information to out-of-state prospects for industrial expansion. This renews a contract terminating as of February 1, 1965, and the expiration date is August 31, 1965. The total amount to be paid is not to exceed \$3,000.
- 8. Interagency Contract No. 4413-1095 with Texas A&M University, signed by Business Manager James H. Colvin, which covers videotaping English 103 by the University through Radio-Television, for the period Permary 18, 1965, through June 15, 1965, at a total cost not to exceed \$5,750.
- 9. Interagency Contract No. 4413-1696 with Texas Tourist Development Agency, signed by Business Manager James H. Colvin, whereby the University through Radio-Television will furnish services and materials for use in advertising and disseminating information designed to call to the attention of both Texans and non-Texans the State's scenic, historical, recreational, and other attractions. The period is March 26 August 31, 1965, and the total amount paid is not to exceed \$1,000.
- 10. Interagency Contract No. 4413-1099 with the Abilene State School, signed by Chancellor Harry Ransom, whereby the University through its Visual Instruction Bureau will furnish visual instructional films and other instructional aids for the period March 31 August 31, 1965, at a total cost not to exceed \$200.00.
- 11. Ford Foundation grant to Southern Regional Education Board in the total amount of \$115,000 to support three regional summer seminars for college faculty in world area studies, one of which will be in Latin American History and Politics at The University of Toxas, 1965. The seminar will be under the direction of Professor John P. Harrison, and the University will receive approximately one-third of the grant.
- 12. Amendment to Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation Agreement, signed by Vice-Chancellor Norman Hackerman, which adds \$185,000 to the original agreement dated January 27, 1964.
- 13. Contract No. AF 41(687)-1761 with the United States Air Force, signed by Business Manager James H. Colvin, whereby the University through its Division of Extension will enroll and provide instruction for students who are military personnel of the Air Force during the period February 1 May 26, 1965, at a total amount not to exceed \$1,407.

- 14. Agreement DA 41-133 ARV-5504 with the United States of America, Department of the Army, signed by Business Manager James H. Colvin, whereby the University through the Division of Extension will furnish instruction to students who are personnel of the Department of the Army during the period April 1965 to April 1966.
- 15. Agreement with the United States of America, Department of the Army, signed by Chancellor Harry Ransom, which provides for educational instruction and other required services in connection with the Army ROTC program at the University. This incorporates changes necessitated by recent legislation.
- 16. Grant Agreement No. SCC-40376 with the United States of America, Department of State, signed by Vice-Chancellor Norman Hackerman, whereby the University will assist the Department of State in carrying out a Childen Student Leader Seminar designed to acquaint approximately ten students and one faculty member from the University of Chile with developments in the field of education and to increase their understanding and appreciation of various aspects of life in the United States. The period covered is November 17, 1964, through May 31, 1965. A total of \$13,400 equivalent in Chilean escudos will be made available to the University's designated representative in Santiago, Chile, and \$11,600 will be paid to the University. The program is under the direction of Dr. Joe Neal, Director, international Office.

FACULTY LEGISLATION: The following legislation has been passed by the Faculty Council and/or General Faculty. I recommend approval.

- 1. The Faculty Council on Tebruary 20. 1965, approved by the circularization procedure the change proposed for the College of Arts and Sciences in the requirement for a major in German under the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan T (D&P 3466). The effect is to increase the major requirement to twenty-one advanced semester hours instead of eighteen and to include a course in linguistics, since it will improve the degree program by including such a course as proper preparation for the purposes served by the degree. Both those students who use the 6.A. as preparation for teaching German at secondary level and those who present it as the basis for graduate work need knowledge of the structure and content of the language. This change would bring the degree program in German closer to the level of programs at other institutions.
- 2. The Faculty Council on March 8, 1965, approved by the circularization procedure the College of Pharmacy proposal to delete Pharmacy 007-Senior Trip (D&P 3469). The faculty feels that the inspection trip for seniors should not be a mandatory graduation requirement since there are always a few students who have been excused for valid reasons. The faculty will continue to encourage strongly all graduating seniors to participate.

The Faculty Council on the same date also approved by the circularization procedure the College of Pharmacy proposal to change Section 7 under I. General Requirements, Pharmacy Catalogue, to provide that "No credit earned by correspondence instruction from The University of Texas or elsewhere and no credit earned by enrollment at another college or university while the student is currently enrolled for residence work at The University of Lexas will be counted toward a B.S. in Pharmacy degree unless specifically approved in advance by the Dean of the College of Pharmacy, or his representative." This will allow more adequate supervision of the students' total academic loads for the semester. (D&P 3470)

- 3. The Faculty Council at its meeting on March 15, 1965, approved the proposal of the College of Arts and Sciences to change the number of hours of ROTC course which may be counted toward degrees in that college (D&P 3471-74). The current catalogue permits from 6 to 24 semester hours of ROTC work to 19 pounted on degrees in various programs provided the student completes twenty-four semester hours of required military or naval science courses. This legislation would permit not more than 9 semester hours of ROTC courses to be used toward any degree in the College of Arts and Sciences and then only as free non-advanced electives and only in the case of the student who completes successfully the junior and senior years of the ROTC programs. ROTC courses cannot be substituted for any specific required course, but a student registered for ROTC will be exempted from registration for required health and physical education, and upon completing the semester with a passing grade in the ROTC course will be absolved from the required health and physical education for that semester.
- 4. The Faculty Council on April 21, 1965, approved by the circularization procedure the proposed catalogue changes in the requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Business Administration (D&P 3491-92). This changes the freshman mathematics requirements to provide adequate topical coverage of the basic mathematics required to formulate and solve quantitative models for business decisions. In advanced nowises a knowledge of these mathematical topics will be essential to the solution of problems on a digital computer. It also changes the required 27 hours of work in the sophomore year by eliminating a 3-semester-hour course in platform speaking and requiring three semester hours in Programming and Statistics, the speaking course being recommended to be taken in the freshman or sophomore year. This change in the statistics requirement is to provide students with an introduction to digital computers, elements of programming, and basic quantitative models for business decisions. The course builds on the new freshman mathematics requirements and will enable students to utilize the computer for the solution of problems in advanced courses.
- 5. The Faculty Council at its meeting on April 12, 1965, approved the recommendation of the Deans' Council concerning changes in the General Information bulletin under "Scholastic Probation and Dismissal," including approval of any editorial changes that might be required (D&P 3479-82).

This legislation concerns the use of the symbols \underline{P} (postponed examination), \underline{X} (incomplete work), and \underline{R} (re-examination) in scoring semester records of students on scholastic probation. At present if the required minimum of work of a student on scholastic probation cannot be determined because of these symbols, he is considered to have failed; the revision would eliminate \underline{P} and \underline{X} and retain only \underline{R} . The reason given by the deans is that to be eligible for a postponed examination a student must have sickness or other imperative cause and this should not work to a student's disadvantage in regard to his eligibility to re-enroll; also he should have the permissible amount of time to make up incomplete work before he is barred from enrolling.

This regislation also gives approval to allowing the departments to give advanced standing examinations at their convenience instead of at officially stated times as is the present practice. The postponed examination and re-examination will continue to be given at times designated in the General Information bulletin.

APPENDAGE TO SECURITY AGREEMENT WITH DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE: An Appendage to the Security Agreement has been signed by the Chancellor and by the Department of the Navy, representing the Government, providing that the Radiobiological Laboratory and the Military Physics Research Laboratory he removed from the approved list of cleared facilities at the Main University, effective November 9, 1964. This action was necessitated because the Radiobiological Laboratory is no longer in operation and the Military Physics Research Laboratory has merged with the Defense Research Laboratory.

C., for research in connection with NSF grant, expenses for the Chicago portion to be paid from Miscellaneous Administrative Expenses, Office of the Vice-Chancellor for Academic Affairs.
- 4. Mr. Robert R. Molfenauer, Assistant Professor of Germanic Languages, March 11 13, 1965, to Bloomington, Indiana, to attend the Language Laboratory Conference and inspect language laboratory equipment and interview potential applicants for position of Assistant Laboratory Director, expenses to be paid from the Maintenance and Equipment account of the Language Laboratory.
- 5. Mr. Archie W. Straiton, Professor of Electrical Engineering, April 15, 1965, to Dallas to attend the meeting of the Gulf Universities Research Corporation, expenses to be paid from Miscellaneous Administrative Expenses, Office of the Vice-Chandellor for Academic Affairs.
- 6. Mr. William Francis Harris, Social Science Research Associate IV (Director), and Mr. Joe L. Ray, Social Science Research Associate III, both with Cotton Economic Research, April 22 to Waco, Texas, to attend an Advisory Steering Committee of Cotton Weather Project, expenses to be paid from the Maintenance and Operation account of the Cotton Research.

NEPOTISM CASE: Defense Research Laboratory wishes to employ Mr. Joseph Edgar Chance, presently Instructor in Mathematics at Howard County Junior College, effective June 7, 1965, as a Mathematician in its Military Physics Division. He has a B.A. from The University of Texas and a M.S. in Mathematics and Chemistry from Texas Technological College. His brother, Mr. Calvin Luther Chance, Jr., is presently employed in the Acoustics Division at DRL as a Research Engineer Associate II, at a salary of \$620 per month. He would have no administrative control over his brother, but since Mr. Joseph Chance would be employed at a salary in excess of \$600 per month, in accordance with Sec. 5.33 of the Regents' Rules, his appointment can be effective only with approval of the Chancellor and Board of Regents. The Chancellor has approved.

BUSINESS CONTRACT ITEMS

I recommend approval of the following contracts:

- 1. Contract with Anderson and Callery, 8635 Dyer Street, El Paso, Texas, to remove three buildings in Veterans Village, the substandard married students housing area. Invitations to bid and specifications were sent to seven prospective bidders; two bids were received with Anderson and Callery proposing to pay Texas Western College the sum of \$511.91 and the other bidder proposing to pay \$450.00. The contractor will furnish all labor and materials to do the job and will receive all materials, equipment, debris, etc. resulting from the demolition and removal.
- 2. Contract with KHEY Broadcasting, Inc., 9640 Dyer Street, E1 Paso, Texas for the exclusive local radio bradcast rights for the Texas Western College home football games played during the fall of 1965. Invitations to bid and specifications were sent to six radio stations; three bids were received with KHEY Broadcasting, Inc. submitting the high bid of \$3,250.00.

RECLASSIFICATION OF FUND

For several years now, Mr. Jack Ponder has been making small contributions to the Gordon Ponder Heart Fund, each contribution to the fund with acknowledgment to some bereaved family in most instances. Mr. Ponder has now, in consultation with the Schellenger Committee, decided that the fund, as it now exists, cannot be constructively used, and he wishes that the fund be reclassified as a loan fund for graduate students. GOVERNMENT CONTRACTS AND GRANTS

The following contracts and contract amendments have been negotiated and have been signed by me upon the recommendation of the Directors of the projects. The Business Manager checked the budget and overhead provisions of each proposal. I recommend your approval and ratification of the signatures:

- 1. Letter Contract No. 0E-5-49047 by which the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Office of Education, Washington, D. C., provides for a Reading Institute during the summer of 1965 under the direction of Dr. Marion Cline, Jr. This letter contract authorizes \$3,000.00 as an interim amount during negotiation of the total contract amount.
- 2. Modification No. 2, Contract DA-29-040-AMC-718 (Z), by which Purchasing and Contracting Division, White Sands Missile Range, New Mexico, provides for an extension of the original contract to December 31, 1965. This contract is increased from \$60,367.00 to \$102,126.00, an increase of \$41,759.00. Research will be under the direction of Dr. Lonnie D. Abernethy, Director of Schellenger Research Laboratory.
- 3. Modification No. 2, Contract DA-41-014-AIV-3749 by which Purchasing and Contracting Office, U. S. Army Air Defense Center, Fort Bliss, Texas, provides for an increase in the amount of the contract by \$52.33 because of the substitution of a new trainee for one who is withdrawing. The contract amount is increased from \$3,356.56 to \$3,408.89.

- 4.
