RESEARCH AND OTHER ACADEMIC CONTRACTS: The following contracts, grants, and amendments have been signed by the appropriate official upon recommendation of the respective technical directors, fiscal officers, and the Executive Director of the Office of Sponsored Projects.

Expenditures from these contracts and grants will be made in accordance with regular University operating procedures and contractual limitations. Personnel appointments and changes will be in accordance with University salary rates and approvals. Travel and purchasing conform to established procedures.

I recommend your approval and ratification of signatures.



#### CONTRACTS and GRANTS (Federal):

- 1. Modification AFOSR-67-0778A to Grant AF-AFOSR-778-67, by which the Department of the Air Force, Air Force Office of Scientific Research, Arlington, Virginia, transfers title to two Arc Lamp Housing Units to the University. The research was conducted in the Department of Chemistry under the direction of Dr. Albert W. Noyes, Jr., Ashbel Smith Professor of Chemistry.
- 2. Modification AFOSR-67-1234D to Grant AF-AFOSR-1234-67, by which the Department of the Air Force, Air Force Office of Scientific Research, Arlington, Virginia, changes the research title to read: "Aeroelastic Stability and Forced Response of Thin Shell Structures." The research is under the direction of Dr. Ronald O. Stearman, Associate Professor of Aerospace Engineering and Engineering Mechanics.
- 3. Modification AFOSR-67-1257B to Grant AF-AFOSR-1257-67, by which the Department of the Air Force, Air Force Office of Scientific Research, Arlington, Virginia, changes the title of the research to read: "Calculations of Dynamical Properties of Solids in Support of Future Aerospace Materials Requirements." The research continues under the direction of Dr. Frederik W. DeWette, Professor of Physics.
- 4. Modification AFOSR-68-1507B to Grant AFOSR-68-1507, by which the Department of the Air Force, Air Force Office of Scientific Research, Arlington, Virginia, changes the research title to read: "Theoretical Solid State Physics Supporting Future Aerospace Materials and Devices." The research continues under the direction of Dr. Leonard Kleinman, Professor of Physics.

- 5. Modification AFOSR-69-1792A to Grant AFOSR-69-1792, by which the Department of the Air Force, Air Force Office of Scientific Research, Arlington, Virginia, adds \$400,000 to the grant funds and extends the period of the grant through March 31, 1971. The research entitled "Basic Research in Electronics (JSEP)" continues under the direction of Dr. C. L. Coates, Professor of Electrical Engineering and of Computer Sciences.
- 6. Modification P003, Supplemental Agreement to Contract F33615-68-C-1306, by which the Department of the Air Force, Aeronautical Systems Division, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio, currently funds \$100,000 of the \$132,837 added to the total estimated cost under the contract, bringing the total funding to \$474,139 and the estimated cost to \$506,976. The contract period is extended through January 14, 1971, and the research continues in Applied Research Laboratories under the direction of Dr. Chester M. McKinney, Jr., Director.
- 7. Modification P00005, Change Order to Contract F41609-68-C-0020, by which the Department of the Air Force, Aerospace Medical Division, Brooks Air Force Base, Texas, transfers title to certain property from the Government to the University. The research in models of respiratory control of heart rate was under the direction of Dr. Baxter F. Womack, Associate Professor of Electrical Engineering.
- 8. Modification P00003 to Contract F41609-69-C-0006, by which the Department of the Air Force, Aerospace Medical Division, Brooks Air Force Base, Texas, increases contract funds by \$3,150 and extends the period of the contract through April 15, 1970. The project continues under the direction of Dr. Ashley Welch, Associate Professor of Electrical Engineering.
- 9. Contract DACW-73-70-C-0034, by which the Department of the Army, Office of the Chief of Engineers, Washington, D. C., provides \$10,000 for support of research entitled "Limit Design Aspects of Column and Frame Behavior." The contract is effective for the period February 13, 1970 through January 31, 1971, and the research will be under the direction of Phil M. Ferguson, Dean T. U. Taylor Professor of Civil Engineering.
- 10. Modification P002 to Contract DADA17-69-C-9073, by which the Department of the Army, U.S. Army Medical Research and Development Command, Washington, D. C., increases the contract by \$9,000 and extends the period of the contract through January 31, 1971. The \$9,000 provided at this time is for the period through June 30, 1970. The research entitled "Process of Modeling of Biological Waste Treatment," continues under the direction of Dr. David M. Himmelblau, Professor of Chemical Engineering, and Dr. Earnest M. Gloyna, Professor of Civil Engineering.
- 11. Modification P002 to Contract DADA17-69-C-9067, by which the Department of the Army, U.S. Army Medical Research and Development Command, Washington, D. C., increases the contract funds by \$51,634 and extends the period of the contract through December 31, 1970. The research entitled "New Antimalarials Based on Inhibitors of Oxidative Matabolism of Plasmodia" continues under the direction of Dr. Karl Folkers, Professor of Pharmaceutical Chemistry.
- 12. Contract DAAG17-70-C-0127 by which the Department of the Army, U.S. Army Natick Laboratories, Natick, Massachusetts, provides \$57,873 for support of research entitled "The Effect of Impulsive Loadings on Airdrop Structures." The contract is effective for the period March 31, 1970, through June 30, 1972. Of the amount awarded, \$28,936.50 is funded for the period ending March 31, 1971. The research is under the direction of Dr.E.A. Ripperger, Professor of Aerospace Engineering and Engineering Mechanics.

- 13. Modification P004, Supplemental Agreement to Basic Contract N00014-67-A-0126, by which the Department of the Navy, Office of Naval Research, Washington, D.C., makes certain revisions and alterations in the General Provisions without any substantive changes in existing rights and obligations under the contract.
- 14. Modification AD, Supplemental Agreement to Contract N00014-67-A-0126-0001, by which the Department of the Navy, Office of Naval Research, Washington, D. C., increases the total estimated cost of the contract by \$30,000 to a new total of \$150,436 and extends the period of the contract through January 14, 1971. The research on human reactions to psychological stress continues under the direction of Dr. Robert L. Helmreich, Associate Professor of Psychology.
- 15. Modification AE, Supplemental Agreement to Contract N00014-67-A-0126-0001, by which the Department of the Navy, Office of Naval Research, Washington, D. C., increases the total estimated cost of the contract by \$50,000 to a new total of \$200,436. The research on human reactions to psychological stress continues under the direction of Dr. Robert L. Helmreich, Associate Professor of Psychology.
- Contract N00014-67-A-0126-0012, by which the Department of the Navy, Office of Naval Research, Washington, D. C., provides
   \$85,438 for support of research entitled "Measuring X-Ray Production in Fission Processes." The grant is effective for the period April 1, 1970, through March 31, 1971, and the research will be under the direction of Dr. C. Fred Moore, Associate Professor of Physics, and Dr. Patrick Richard, Assistant Professor of Physics.
- 17. Contract N00014-67-A-0126-0013, by which the Department of the Navy, Office of Naval Research, Washington, D. C., provides \$15,000 for support of research entitled "Applications of Orbital Mechanics to Problems of Satellite Motion." The contract is effective February 1, 1970 through October 31, 1970, and the research will be under the direction of Dr. Byron D. Tapley, Professor of Aerospace Engineering and Engineering Mechanics, and Dr. G. E. O. Giacaglia, Visiting Professor of Aerospace Engineering and Engineering Mechanics.
- 18. Modification P009, Supplemental Agreement to Contract N00024-68-C-1339, by which the Department of the Navy, Naval Ship Systems Command, Washington, D. C., provides \$20,000 additional funds and increases the total estimated cost under the contract to a new total of \$1,190,500. The research continues in Applied Research Laboratories under the direction of Dr. Chester M. McKinney, Jr., Director.
- 19. Modification P005, Supplemental Agreement to Contract N00024-69-C-1159, by which the Department of the Navy, Naval Ship Systems Command, Washington, D. C., makes certain changes in the Specifications and General Provisions, adds \$50,000 additional funds, increasing the total estimated cost of the contract to \$400,000, and extends the period of the contract through September 30, 1970. Research continues in Applied Research Laboratories under the direction of Dr. Chester M. McKinney, Jr., Director.
- 20. Modification P001 to Contract N00024-69-C-1283, by which the Department of the Navy, Naval Ship Systems Command, Washington, D.C., corrects an administrative error and incorporates the Data Distribution List inadvertently omitted upon issuance of the contract. The research continues in Applied Research Laboratories under the direction of Dr. Chester M. McKinney, Jr., Director.
- 21. Modification P002, Supplemental Agreement to Contract N00140-69-C-00278, by which the Department of the Navy, Naval Regional Procurement Office, Brooklyn, New York, extends the period of the contract through April 16, 1970, without additional funds. Research continues in Applied Research Laboratories under the direction of Dr. Chester M. Mc Kinney, Jr., Director.

- 22. Modification P002 to Contract N00024-70-C-1117, by which the Department of the Navy, Naval Ship Systems Command, Washington, D.C., makes certain changes within clauses under the section entitled Allowable Cost and Negotiated Overhead Rates (Post Determined). Which were inadvertently omitted from the Contract Schedule. Performance of research under the contract continues in Applied Research Laboratories under the direction of Dr. Chester M. McKinney, Jr., Director.
- 23. Modification P003, Supplemental Agreement to Contract N00024-70-C-1117, by which the Department of the Navy, Naval Ship Systems Command, Washington, D. C., adds \$81,000 to contract funds, making a total of \$341,000 of the \$350,000 total estimated cost, and makes certain changes within the provisions of the contract. Research continues in Applied Research Laboratories under the direction of Dr. Chester M. McKinney, Jr., Director.
- 24. Contract N00024-70-C-1247, by which the Department of the Navy, Naval Ship Systems Command, Washington, D. C., provides \$701,000 for support of research entitled "Computer Aided Classification." The contract is effective for the period February 15, 1970 through May 14, 1971, and the research will be performed in Applied Research Laboratories under the direction of Dr. Chester M. McKinney, Jr., Director.
- 25. Contract N00024-70-C-1253, by which the Department of the Navy, Washington, D. C., formalizes the contract awarded by letter dated March 4, 1970. This contract supersedes the letter award between the Navy and the University. It has an estimated cost of \$45,000 and is effective March 4, 1970 through March 3, 1971. The research entitled "Support of AN/SQS-47(XN-1) Riverine Sonar" is performed in Applied Research Laboratories under the direction of Dr. Chester M. McKinney, Jr., Director.
- 26. Contract N62306-70-C-0361, by which the Department of the Navy, U.S. Naval Oceanographic Office, Washington, D. C., provides \$63,000 for support of a program to develop interface specifications for the Bottom Topography Survey System (BOTOSS). The contract is effective April 6, 1970 through April 5, 1971, and the program will be performed in Applied Research Laboratories under the direction of Dr. Chester M. McKinney, Jr., Director.
- 27. Purchase Order N61756-70-M-3660, by which the Department of the Navy, Naval Air Station, Point Mugu, California, provides \$1,501 for Doppler data from beacon satellites. The purchase order covers the period May 1, 1970 through June 30, 1970, for services rendered by Applied Research Laboratories under the direction of Dr. Chester M. McKinney, Jr., Director.
- 28. Change P007 to Contract NBy-53143, by which the Department of the Navy, Naval Facilities Engineering Command, Washington, D.C., adds \$7,000 to the contract funds and extends the period of the contract through December 31, 1970. The investigation of welded tubular connections continues under the direction of Dr. A. A. Toprac, Professor of Civil Engineering.
- 29. Modification No. 1, Supplemental Agreement to Contract AT-(40-1)3893, by which the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission, Oak Ridge, Tennessee, extends the period of the contract through August 31, 1971, and provides additional funds of \$17,900 for continuation of a traineeship program for graduate students in nuclear engineering. The program continues under the direction of Dr. Stephen J. Gage, Associate Professor of Mechanical Engineering.

- 30. Contract AT-(40-1)-4023, by which the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission, Oak Ridge Operations, Oak Ridge, Tennessee, provides \$30,000 for support of research entitled "Studies of Drosophila Dispersal and Migration by Neutron Activation and Genetic Techniques." The grant is effective for the period January 1, 1970 through December 31, 1970, and the research is under the direction of Dr. R. H. Richardson, Associate Professor of Zoology.
- 31. Modification No. 1 to Contract AT-(40-1) 3919, by which the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission, Oak Ridge Operations, Oak Ridge, Tennessee, provides additional funds of \$6,900 for the purchase of two fuel elements and extends the period of the contract through June 30, 1971. The program continues in the Nuclear Reactor Teaching Laboratory under the direction of Dr. Stephen J. Gage, Associate Professor of Mechanical Engineering.
- 32. Award Letter dated March 16, 1970, by which the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Office of Education, Washington, D. C., provides ten 2-year fellowships in Junior College Administration for 1970-1971. The program will be under the direction of Dr. C. C. Colvert, Professor of Educational Administration.
- 33. Modification No. 6, Supplemental Agreement to Contract OEC-5-85-063, by which the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Office of Education, Washington, D. C., increases the contract funds by \$58,800 and extends the contract period through February 14, 1971. The cross-national study of work-motivation and problem-solving behavior in school children continues under the direction of Dr. Robert F. Peck, Professor of Educational Psychology.
- 34. Grant OEG-0-70-2868(508), by which the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Office of Education, Washington, D. C., provides \$22,138 for support of research entitled "Attitudinal Correlates of Children's Speech Characteristics." The grant is effective for the period April 1, 1970, through March 31, 1971, and the research will be under the direction of Dr. Frederick D. Williams, Professor of Speech.
- 35. Health Professions Institutional Grant ME 00479-01, by which the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Public Health Service, Bethesda, Maryland, provides \$214,251 for support of Health Professions Educational Improvement Program for a period effective July 1, 1970 through June 30, 1971. The training program will be under the direction of Dr. Joseph B. Sprowls, Dean, College of Pharmacy.
- 36. Training Grant 5 T01 GM00836-08, by which the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Public Health Service, Bethesda, Maryland, provides \$88,612 for support of training in the field of physiology and biophysics. The grant is effective for the period July 1, 1970 through June 30, 1974, and the \$88,612 now appropriated is for the period July 1, 1970 through June 30, 1971. The program continues under the direction of Dr. A. R. Schrank, Professor of Zoology.
- 37. Grant AI 07184-05, by which the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Public Health Service, Bethesda, Maryland, provides \$36,743 for support of research entitled "Immunochemical Properties of a New Serum Factor." The grant is effective for the period April 1, 1970, through March 31, 1972, and the \$36,743 now appropriated is for the period April 1, 1970 through March 31, 1971. The research will be under the direction of Dr. William J. Mandy, Associate Professor of Microbiology.

38. Revised Grant HD 02669-03 by which the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Public Health Service, Bethesda, Maryland, allows carry-over of \$1,429 from HD 02669-02. The research entitled "Experimental Phenylketonuria in Infant Rats" is under the direction of Dr. J. B. Longenecker, Professor of Home Economics.

Grant PM00038-02 by which the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Public Health Service, Bethesda, Maryland, provides \$13,151 for support of research entitled "Internal Migration of Physicians in the United States." The grant is effective for the period April 1, 1970, through March 31, 1971, and the research will be under the direction of Dr. David L. Huff, Professor of Resources and Marketing Administration and of Geography.
- 40. Modification No. 9, Supplemental Agreement to Contract PH-43-64-557, by which the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Public Health Service, Bethesda, Maryland, establishes final fixed overhead rates of 52% of salaries and wages for the period September 1, 1964 through August 31, 1965; 40% of salaries and wages for the period September 1, 1965, through August 31, 1966; and 40.6% of salaries and wages for the period September 1, 1966 through April 12, 1967. - 42. Amendment No. 1, Supplemental Agreement to Grant No. 515-T-70, by which the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Rehabilitation Services Administration, Social and Rehabilitation Service, Washington, D. C., increases the grant funds by \$6,200. The program for support of teaching grants and traineeships in rehabilitation counseling continues under the direction of Dr. Giles D. Carnes, Associate Professor of Special Education.
- 43. Modification No. 8 to Contract NAS5-10387, by which the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, Goddard Space Flight Center, Greenbelt, Maryland, provides additional funds of \$20,000 for the period ending August 31, 1970. The investigation of millimeter wavelength radiation from solar system bodies continues in the Electrical Engineering Research Laboratory under the direction of Dr. A. W. Straiton, Ashbel Smith Professor of Electrical Engineering.

C., provides \$223,472 additional funds and extends the period of the grant through August 31, 1970. The Lunar Laser Ranging Experiment at McDonald Observatory continues under the direction of Dr. Harlan J. Smith, Professor of Astronomy, and Director, Research in Astronomy (McDonald Observatory).
- 47. Grant GA-16822, by which the National Science Foundation, Washington, D. C., provides \$65,300 for support of research entitled "Meteorological Studies of an Urban Atmosphere." Colvin, whereby the University through its Computation Center will make available services and equipment for computer work. The contract begins March 13, 1970, and terminates August 31, 1970, and the total amount is not to exceed \$18,000.
- 2. Interagency Cooperation Contract No. IAC(70-71)-272 with the Texas State Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, signed by Vice-President J. H. Colvin, whereby the University through its School of Nursing, will conduct a conference on "The Dynamics of the Interviewing Process" for personnel of the Austin State Hospital. The period of the contract is May 18 31, 1970, and the total amount is not to exceed \$575.00.
- 3. Interagency Cooperation Contract No. IAC(70-71)-277 with the Texas Rehabilitation Commission, signed by Vice-President J. H. Colvin, whereby the University through its Division of Extension, will conduct an intensive training program for the employees of the Commission. The period of the contract is June 7 August 31, 1970, and the total amount is not to exceed \$2,400.
- 4. Contract with the Texas State Department of Public Welfare, signed by Vice-President J. H. Colvin, whereby the University through its Graduate School of Social Work will establish and maintain field instructional units and other educational services and programs related to social work in accordance with provisions of House Bill No. 2 which appropriated \$30,000 in line item 23 for the Department of Public Welfare to use for such purposes. The period of the contract is February 27, 1970 August 31, 1971.
- 5. Supplemental agreement to the Cooperative Highway Research Program for the period September 1, 1969 August 31, 1970, with the Texas Highway Department, signed by President Norman Hackerman, which increases the study cost of \$20,000 to \$35,000 on "Study of Expensive Clays in Roadway Structural Systems," resulting in a new program total of \$688,700.
- 6. Contract for Archeological Investigation No. 2 with Texas Antiquities
  Committee, signed by Mr. C. L. Lindahl, Assistant to the Vice-President
  for Business Affairs, whereby the University is permitted to undertake archeological investigation of an area on lands owned or controlled by Harris County.
  The period of the contract is in effect for a period of one year from date of signing,
  namely, March 11, 1970.
- 7. Amendment No. A003 to Basic Agreement No. DABD07-68-C-0053 with the United States Department of the Army, signed by Vice-President J. H. Colvin, which extends the period of the contract which provides for training of military personnel through the Division of Extension for the period July 1, 1970 to July 1, 1971.

FACULTY LEGISLATION: The following legislation has been passed by the University Council and/or General Faculty. I recommend approval.

1. At its meeting on March 16, 1970, the University Council approved the recommendation of the Educational Policy Committee to readmit former students who left the University on scholastic probation or on enforced withdrawal under certain conditions (D&P) 4581). The student who has not attended

a college or university for two or more years and who was not in the status of provisional admission at the time of leaving the University may be readmitted, at the discretion of the dean, on scholastic probation. If the student at the end of the first semester of readmission completes 12 or more hours with a grade point average of at least 2.0, he will be continued on scholastic probation for a second semester. If he completes a second semester of 12 or more hours and earns a cumulative grade point average on all work since readmission of 2.0 or more, then such student, upon petition to his dean, shall have his record prior to readmission eliminated from consideration in computing his grade point average. The intent of the regulation is to give students who have done poor academic work and who have left the University, a second chance upon readmission.

- 2. The University Council on March 31, 1970, by the circularization procedure approved the proposal to reduce the physics requirement and to increase the number of hours in architecture required for the degree of Bachelor of Science in Architectural Studies (D&P 4601). The physics requirement substitutes Physics 609 for Physics 801, and the legislation raises the semester hours in architecture from 53 to 55. The physics requirement is intended for enrichment rather than for technical preparation, and the faculty of Architecture believes that a more comprehensive survey of the art and profession of architecture is essential at the earliest possible time in the curriculum to provide the entering freshman with an understanding of architecture as it is practiced today. With a significant number of students able to achieve credit in freshman courses by examination for advanced standing, it will be possible for them to take Arc. 608L (substituted for 408L) in the first year. Thus entering students will be able to maintain a reasonable course load in the first year including, in many cases, Arc. 608L.
- 3. The University Council at its meeting on April 20, 1970, approved the recommendation of the School of Communication in regard to a uniform statement concerning the foreign language requirement in the degrees of Bachelor of Journalism, Bachelor of Science in Radio-Television-Film, and Bachelor of Science in Speech (D&P 4602). The legislation states that the foreign language requirement is the attainment of certain proficiency rather than completion of a specified number of hours and can be satisfied by taking 406, 407, and six hours beyond, the satisfactory completion of these courses giving the proficiency equivalent. The legislation also provides that instead of the language courses, a student may take fifteen hours of course work chosen from the areas of computer sciences, linguistics, mathematics, philosophy (logic and symbolic logic courses), statistics, or from an established area studies program such as Asian Studies, European Studies, Latin American Studies, or Middle Eastern Studies, this requirement to be satisfied within one area when possible. The purpose of the legislation is to standardize the foreign language requirement in the departments of the School of Communication (one department presently requires only three hours beyond 407) and to provide an alternative to it.
- 4. The University Council at its meeting on April 20, 1970, approved the Summer Session 1971 calendar and the 1971-72 Long Session calendar (D&P 4584-85). This provides for the summer session to begin Monday, May 31, with registration scheduled for that day and June 1, and classes to begin June 2, Wednesday. Examination days for the first term are July 8-10, Thursday-Saturday, and no nine-week or twelve-week classes will be held on those days. Monday, July 12, is registration day for students in attendance second term only, with classes beginning July 13. Exams for the second-term and twelve-week courses will be August 19-21, Thursday-Saturday, with August 21 designated as Graduation Day (no public exercises.) Examinations for nine-week courses are on July 31-August 3, Saturday-Tuesday.

The 1971-72 Long Session will open August 24, 1971, Tuesday, with orientation August 25. Registration will occur on August 25-27, Wednesday-Friday, and classes will begin Monday, August 30. The twelfth class day, on which official enrollment count is taken, is September 14. December 13-15, Monday-Wednesday 2058are no class days, and fall semester final exams are on December 16-22, with December 22 designated Graduation Day (no public exercises). Holidays scheduled within the first semester are Monday, September 6, Labor Day, and Thanksgiving holidays November 24-27, beginning at 1:00 p.m., Wednesday through Saturday. Registration for spring semester is on January 12-14, Wednesday-Friday, and classes begin Monday, January 17. February 1 is twelfth class day. Spring vacation is March 24-April 1, Friday, 1:00 p.m. - Saturday, inclusive, April 2 being Easter Sunday. No class days are Monday-Wednesday, May 8-10 and final examinations in all but School of Law, May 11-17. Law School exams are May 5-17 but it was agreed that the beginning date for the examinations could be changed by agreement between Mr. Shipp and Dean Keeton if desirable. Saturday, May 20, is commencement day.

#### BUSINESS CONTRACT ITEMS

I recommend approval of the following proposed contracts:

- 1. Contract with Associated Food Services, Inc., P. O. Box 18235, Dallas, Texas, to provide food service in the new Commons Building of the new Dormitory Complex for the dormitory students for the year beginning September 1, 1970, at a rate of \$1.58 per day per student for the first and second semesters and at cost for dormitory students during the Summer Session. The contract will also provide that the University will receive 15% of the regular cash sales, 15% of cash or charge sales for banquets, special groups, etc., and 10% of cash sales from meal tickets sold to students, faculty and staff. This contract has been negotiated as in prior years at the same rate as in the current year. It was considered advantageous to do so in the first year of the new expanded operation, especially with planning assistance from the contractor. Plans are to secure quotations from several food service contractors next year and then make the decision whether to use a food service contractor or a University operated food service.
- 2. Contract with Associated Food Services, Inc., P. O..Box 18235, Dallas, Texas, to provide food service for students on athletic scholarships for the year beginning August 15, 1970, at a rate of \$2.10 per student per day.

RESEARCH AND OTHER ACADEMIC CONTRACTS: The following contracts, grants and amendments have been signed by the appropriate official upon the recommendation of the respective technical directors, fiscal officers, and the Director of Research Support.

Expenditures from these contracts and grants will be made in accordance with regular University operating procedures and contractual limitations. Personnel appointments and changes will be in accordance with University salary rates and approvals. Travel and purchasing conform to established procedures.

# CONTRACTS AND GRANTS (Federal):

- Grant 5 R01 GM16212-03 PC by which the Department of Health, Education and Welfare awards \$54,985 for the continuation of research on "The Transfer of Biological Information" for the period January 1, 1970 through December 31, 1970. This research is under the direction of Dr. D. James McCorquodale, Associate Professor, Division of Biology.
- Grant 5 R01 A108262-04 GEN by which the Department of Health, Education and Welfare awards \$67,133 for the continuation of research on "Structure and Growth of Bacteriophage" for the period February 1, 1970 through January 31, 1971. However, due to the absence of the principal investigator who is now in Europe on a Guggenheim Fellowship, \$56,791 of this is restricted pending her return. This research is under the direction of Dr. Yvonne T. Lanni, Associate Professor, Division of Biology.
