

Allocations were made from the Hogg Foundation for Mental Health and Ima Hogg Foundation to the following institutions and agencies:

1. Children's Resource and Information Service
Houston, Texas

Advocacy to Protect Children - \$15,000

The Ima Hogg Foundation recommends for approval a second-year grant for the period September 1, 1984 to August 31, 1985. This funding will serve as a challenge grant to aid CRIS in securing support from other foundations. CRIS will develop and distribute a Family Advocacy Directory and will institute a Family Advocacy Internship Program. The internship program will provide a ten-week training experience in the area of child abuse for the staff of concerned community agencies.

Ms. Alberta Anderson, the Executive Director of Children's Resource and Information Service, will be responsible for the administration of the grant.

2. Meadowbriar Home For Girls

Prevention--Early Intervention Program for Pre-Delinquent Youngsters - \$18,534

The Ima Hogg Foundation is recommending for approval a second year of support for the period May 1, 1984 to April 30, 1985. This grant will continue to provide the salaries for key staff involved in the after-care program, as well as student stipends for the training component.

Mr. Mel Kaufman, Executive Director of Meadowbriar, will be responsible for the administration of the project.

3. Project ABC, Santa Rosa Children's Hospital
San Antonio, Texas

Kaleidoscope '84:

A Second Look at the First Three Years of Life Conference - \$1,000

The Hogg Foundation Executive Committee is recommending for approval a one-time grant to support a statewide conference. The conference will be held June 14-15, 1984, and is being co-sponsored by Project ABC of the Santa Rosa Children's Hospital and The University of Texas Health Science Center School of Nursing.

Project ABC is funded by the Hogg Foundation, Texas Developmental Disabilities Program, United Way, City of San Antonio, and private donations from the corporate and business sectors. Linked with the Santa Rosa Children's Hospital, Project ABC works closely with in-hospital clients and their families and with community-based organizations that comprise a unique network of early childhood service providers.

Dr. Marian Sokol will be responsible for the administration of the grant.

4. Settlement Club Home
 Austin, Texas

Vocational Placement Program for Emotionally Disturbed Adolescents - \$5,000

The Hogg Foundation Executive Committee is recommending a third and final years funding. These funds will go primarily for the support of staff who are providing leadership and daily counseling for the teenagers entering the Vocational Placement program.

Ms. Bobbie Mae Matthews will continue to serve as director of this project.

5. Stephen F. Austin State University, Department of Psychology

Children's Suicide Risk Program - \$6,871

The Hogg Foundation recommends for approval a one-year grant for the period of June 15, 1984 to June 14, 1985. This grant is for a research project designed to obtain information concerning suicidal ideation in children.

The Children's Suicide Risk Project is concerned with differences in children's projected suicidal ideation across age groups. The researchers are specifically concerned with two ages at which it appears there is a greater probability that children consider suicide as an option. They also plan to determine whether the data they have collected on rural children is replicated with an urban sample.

Dr. Bruce E. Bailey, Associate Director of Psychology, is responsible for the administration of the program.

6. Urban Affairs Corporation
 Houston, Texas

Fifth Ward Enrichment Program -\$30,000

The Executive Committee of the Ima Hogg Foundation is recommending for approval a one-year grant for the period June 1, 1984 to May 31, 1985. The purpose of the program is to provide developmental activities for a high-risk population of adolescent males in the fifth ward of Houston. The activities are designed to enhance the self-esteem of the participants and to expose them to more viable life styles.

Ms. Sharon Lovick, Executive Administrator of the Urban Affairs Corporation, will be responsible for the administration of the project.

7. U.T. Austin, School of Social Work

Rural Environment and Its Stressors - \$36,114

The Hogg Foundation Executive Committee recommends for approval a second-year grant for the period June 1, 1984 through May 31, 1985. Second-year goals include rigorous analysis of data collected in the project's first year, development of assessment guides, production of a stress management manual, and assemblage of packets of educational materials for use by service providers in conjunction with the stress management manual. These data collected from extensive interviews and questionnaires over the past year can be utilized for multiple purposes by various organizations concerned with rural population.

Dr. Michael L. Lauderdale, Director of the Center for Social Work Research and Professor of Social Work is responsible for the administration and supervision of the project. (RBC H25)

Perceived Parental Responsibilities to Dual Working Families - \$225

The Hogg Foundation recommends for approval a supplementary grant for the period June 1, 1984 through June 30, 1984. The funds will be used to complete a manual that will enable other researchers and practitioners to use the scales developed by the researchers.

Dr. Lucia A. Gilbert, Associate Professor of Educational Psychology, is administrator of the project. (RBC H28)



PROPOSED NEW DEGREE PROGRAM

The following summarizes the proposed Master of Arts in Art Education degree program in the College of Fine Arts. The proposal has been passed by the Graduate Assembly, approved by me, and approved by the Executive Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs. The proposal has been forwarded by the Chancellor's Office to the Coordinating Board for staff review, in accordance with established procedures for review and approval of nonsubstantive requests for new degree programs. The complete text of the proposal can be found in the Documents and Proceedings of the Graduate Assembly, pages 1817a-1817b.

MASTER OF ARTS IN ART EDUCATION

BACKGROUND OF PROPOSAL

When the M.F.A. degree was originally approved for studio and art education, both majors were thirty-hour programs. In order to be competitive with similar programs throughout the country, the M.F.A. in studio art was increased to 60 hours. The M.F.A. in art education was also increased to 60 hours at the same time, although the intention was only to increase the hours required for studio art. The art education program has its greatest appeal for the professional teacher and the prospect of taking one or two courses at a time, semester-by-semester for 60 hours is a genuine deterrent. A return to an M.A. with a thirty-six hour requirement will make our program competitive and comparable with other graduate programs in art education nationwide.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Master of Arts with a major in art education (Plan A with a teaching certificate or Plan B without a certificate) program offered through the Graduate School and the Department of Art consists of a minimum of 36 semester hours of course work, including a thesis. The purpose of the program is to enhance art teaching skills via courses both in the discipline of art (studio art and art history) and in related art teacher preparation. The course work outlined below is both theoretical and practical, and it culminates in a thesis or project reflecting the student's original investigation. Courses already offered in the department will constitute the degree program; there will be no need for new course offerings.

The Master of Arts curriculum (Plan A or B) includes at least 15 hours of studio art and/or art history, 12 semester hours of art education courses, 3 semester hours of elective credit in a supportive area, and 6 semester hours of thesis.





PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

The Parking and Traffic Regulations recommended for approval by the U.T. Board of Regents have been approved by an attorney in the Office of General Counsel and are based on model regulations approved by that office. These regulations supersede all prior Parking and Traffic Regulations.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

SECTION I
QUICK REFERENCE TO PARKING
AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

1. PERMITS REQUIRED FOR ACCESS & PARKING: Only vehicles conspicuously displaying proper University permits (as specified in Section VI, infra) may enter or park on the campus (as shown by the boundaries on the map accompanying the regulations) [Motorcycles, mopeds, motor-assisted bicycles and motor scooters may park only in areas designated for such vehicles or in motorcycle areas or in bicycle racks/concrete parking blocks as specified in Section IV, infra.]
2. DISPLAY OF PERMITS: Parking permits must be properly affixed to the vehicle(s) as described in Section IV. Decals which are taped or affixed by unauthorized materials or displayed on a vehicle other than the vehicle to which issued will subject the holder to a citation. Additionally, the permit will be revoked and the holder may lose all parking privileges (Section VIII, infra).
3. REMOVAL OF PERMITS: Permits (decals) shall be removed when there is a change of vehicle ownership; when association with the University is terminated; when a replacement permit has been issued to take the place of a previously issued permit; or upon expiration or revocation (Section VI).
4. CLASSES OF PARKING PERMITS:
 - A. Class A, Members of the faculty and staff-BLUE
 - B. Class B, Students-ORANGE
 - C. Class C, Disabled-GREEN
 - D. Class D, Motorcycles, motorscooters, mopeds and motor-assisted bicycles-YELLOW
 - E. Class E, Active Alumni Association-MAROON
5. Registered vehicles may park in any designated parking area other than parking spaces designated for VISITORS. Vehicles bearing blue faculty/staff permits may park in spaces marked ADM. in the underground parking garage.
6. BICYCLES, MOPEDS (MOTOR-ASSISTED BICYCLES) AND SKATES: Bicycles and mopeds must be operated in accordance with, and skaters must conform to, the ordinances of the City of Odessa, the specific applicable provisions of these regulations, all provisions of these regulations concerning parking restrictions and traffic control IV and applicable state law.
7. PARKING LOTS: On occasion during the year, certain parking lots may be closed upon recommendation by the Chief of University Police and approval by the President of the University.
8. SPEED LIMIT: The speed limit on all parts of the campus, whether on streets or in parking areas, is 10 m.p.h. unless otherwise posted. (Section IV, infra)
9. POSTED SIGNS: Posted signs, whether permanent or temporary, must be obeyed at all times and take precedence over painted curbs, pavement markings and designations shown on any University maps.
10. PARKING IMPROPERLY: A vehicle shall not park in a backed in position in any parking lot, nor shall a vehicle be parked opposite the flow of traffic in traffic lanes where parallel parking is required. Parking wholly within the marked boundaries of the parking space is required at all times. Vehicles shall not park in a manner that obstructs walkways, driveways, ramps, loading docks, marked cross-walks or inflicts damage to shrubbery, trees, grass, grounds or structures. Additionally, no vehicle may park on any unmarked or unimproved ground area which has not been marked or designated for parking.
11. REGISTRATION OF TWO VEHICLES: An alternate vehicle may be registered by faculty or staff at no extra cost. Students may

register one additional vehicle upon separate application and by paying the required additional fee.

12. ENFORCEMENT AND IMPOUNDMENTS: Failure to abide by these regulations may be the basis for disciplinary action against students, and faculty/staff (Section V, *infra*). Upon notice, violators may be subject to impoundment of their vehicle(s) pending payment of overdue charges (Section VIII, *infra*). Students may also be barred from readmission and have grades, degree, refunds or official transcripts withheld pending payment of overdue charges (Section VIII, *infra*). Vehicles may also be impounded for specific impound violations.
13. APPEAL OF CITATION: University parking and traffic citations may be appealed within ten (10) working days from date of citation by filing a Citation Appeal Form with the University Police Department. (See Section VIII for detailed procedures.) Court Appearance citations are handled by the appropriate state or municipal court.
14. VISITORS: All visitors need permits to park on campus UNLESS parked at designated visitor parking areas. OFFICIAL VISITORS are those who conduct important business with or who render an important service to the University and who are not otherwise eligible for annual parking permits. Official Visitors may obtain temporary parking permits from the University Police Department. These permits entitle the holder to park only in a space designated "Visitor." Permits must be conspicuously displayed on the driver's side of the vehicle. (Section VI, *infra*)
15. PEDESTRIAN RIGHTS AND DUTIES: Pedestrians must obey all traffic control devices. They have the right-of-way at marked crosswalks, in intersections and on sidewalks extending across a service drive, building entrance or driveway. Pedestrians crossing a street at any point other than within a marked crosswalk or within an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles on said street. Pedestrians shall not leave the curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is impossible for the driver to yield. Pedestrians may cross an intersection diagonally only where permitted by special pavement marking.
16. INOPERABLE VEHICLES: If a vehicle becomes inoperable, a telephone call shall be placed to the University Police Department at EXT. 2123. The police will either render assistance or authorize temporary parking. Temporary parking shall not exceed 24 hours and must not create an obstruction or hazard.

SECTION II GENERAL PROVISIONS

Pursuant to the authority granted by Sections 51.201 *et seq.*; 54.005, 54.503, 65.31 and 72.01 *et seq.* of Title 3 of the Texas Education Code, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System has promulgated Parking and Traffic Regulations to regulate and control parking and traffic and the use of parking facilities, to provide for the issuance of vehicle identification insignia (parking permit), and to provide for jurisdiction over offenses. This booklet contains those regulations and procedures applicable to any person who walks or drives and parks a motor vehicle or bicycle on the campus of The University of Texas of the Permian Basin. These rules and regulations are supplementary to the ordinances of the City of Odessa and the statutes of the State of Texas which govern pedestrians and the use of motor vehicles and bicycles.

The operation of a motor vehicle or bicycle on The University of Texas of the Permian Basin campus is a PRIVILEGE granted by the University and is not an inherent right of any faculty/staff member or student. All faculty, staff and students who have motor vehicles in their possession or control for use, operation or parking on the University campus must register said vehicle with the University Police Department. Registration of a motor vehicle does not guarantee a parking place on campus.

The University is not responsible for fire, theft, damage to, or loss of vehicle parked or operated on the University campus. No bailment is created by granting of any parking or operating privileges regarding a vehicle on any property owned, leased or otherwise controlled by the University.

The administration and enforcement of the regulations contained in this booklet are as follows:

PARKING AND TRAFFIC COMMITTEE: The parking and traffic committee shall consist of members of the faculty and staff as appointed by the President of the University. The members of this committee are appointed by the President prior to the beginning of the University's fiscal year with their terms expiring at the end of the fiscal year.

The Parking and Traffic Committee shall be concerned with all University matters pertaining to parking and traffic and make recommendations to the President.

The Parking and Traffic Committee shall be the first step in the appeals from University citation(s) process.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC APPEALS PANEL: The Parking and Traffic Appeals Panel shall consist of one faculty member, one staff member and one student. Members of this panel are appointed by the President of the University. The members of this committee shall be appointed after the start of every fall semester.

The Parking and Traffic Appeals Panel shall be the second and final step in the appeals from University citation(s) process. All decisions made by the parking and traffic appeals panel shall be final.

UNIVERSITY POLICE: The University Police have the responsibility and the legal authority for the enforcement of the Parking and Traffic Regulations listed in this booklet. University police officers may issue University citations or Court Appearance citations ENFORCEABLE IN COURT. (See Section VIII.) On special occasions and emergencies, such parking limitations may be imposed by the Chief of the University Police as are required by the conditions which prevail. When conditions warrant such action, the Chief may waive parking limitations.

The University reserves the right to enforce parking and traffic regulations:

1. through the issuance of University citations and the collection of administrative enforcement charges for offenses;
2. through the impoundment of vehicles interfering with the movement of vehicular or pedestrian traffic or blocking a sidewalk, ramp, loading dock, cross-walk, entrance, exit, fire lane or aisle and through the impoundment of vehicles for unpaid charges after proper notice as provided by these regulations;
3. by the suspension or revocation of permits;
4. by requiring either the vehicle owner or the person who has registered the vehicle with the University Police Department to appear in court or at a University hearing for non-payment of outstanding charges;
5. by barring the readmission and withholding the grades, degrees, refunds and official transcripts of any student for non-payment of outstanding charges;
6. by disciplinary action against employees or students who fail to abide by these regulations;
7. by denying parking permits to those with overdue charges;
8. by the issuance of Court Appearance Citations requiring an appearance in the appropriate state or municipal court; and

9. by such other methods as are commonly employed by city governments or state agencies in control of traffic regulation enforcement.

Proof of the fact that any parking or traffic control device, sign, parking meter, signal or marking was actually in place at any location on campus of The University of Texas of the Permian Basin, shall constitute prima facie evidence that the same is official and was installed under the authority of applicable law and these regulations.

When any person is charged with having stopped, parked and left standing a motor vehicle on the campus of The University of Texas of the Permian Basin, in violation of any provision of the Parking and Traffic Regulations of The University of Texas of the Permian Basin, proof that said vehicle was, at the date of the offense, bearing a valid University of Texas of the Permian Basin parking permit shall constitute prima facie evidence that said vehicle was then and there stopped, parked and left standing by the holder of the parking permit. However, if the vehicle does not bear a valid University of Texas of the Permian Basin parking permit, proof that said vehicle at the date of the offense alleged, was owned by an individual is prima facie proof that said vehicle was then and there stopped, parked and left standing by said individual.

The University assumes no responsibility for any vehicle or any duty to protect any vehicle or its contents at anytime the vehicle is operated or parked on the campus.

The University may deem a motor vehicle including a motorcycle, or motor scooter, or moped or bicycle parked on the University campus for more than 48 hours to be abandoned and may dispose of such vehicle as provided in Article 6687-9 of Texas Revised Civil Statutes.

SECTION III DEFINITIONS

- A. University - The University of Texas of the Permian Basin.
- B. Campus - The property under the control of The University of Texas of the Permian Basin.
- C. Chief of Police - The Chief of the University Police of this University.
- D. University Police - The University Police Department of this University acting directly or through its duly authorized officer and agents.
- E. Driver - Every person who drives, operates or is in physical control of a vehicle.
- F. Vehicle - For the purpose of these regulations, the term vehicle or motor vehicle includes automobiles, buses, trucks, trailers, motorcycles, motorscooters, motorbikes, bicycles and tractors.
- G. Passenger Vehicle - For the purpose of these regulations includes only trucks and automobiles.
- H. Motorcycle - For the purpose of these regulations includes motorcycles, motorscooters, mopeds, and motor assisted bicycles.
- I. Visitor - A person who is neither a student nor an employee of the University nor is he a person who uses University facilities for the benefit of any student or employee of the University.
- J. Student - Every person duly registered, enrolled and attending classes at the University.
- K. Decals - Parking permit decals issued by the University to be affixed on vehicles.

The defined terms are in addition to the definitions and terms of the Texas Motor Vehicle laws which shall apply on the campus.

SECTION IV
GENERAL TRAFFIC REGULATION

1. Pedestrians have the right-of-way at all times. The designated speed limit is 30 m.p.h. on paved roadways, 20 m.p.h. on improved dirt roadways, and 10 m.p.h. in parking lots, unless otherwise controlled by posted sign. Notwithstanding the posted speed limit, any speed in excess of that which is safe for prevailing conditions is prohibited.
2. All vehicular traffic is restricted to improved roadways and parking areas. Restrictions upon use of such areas may be imposed by posted sign.
3. All posted signs will be in force at all times. Failure to comply with posted signs will result in enforcement action.
4. Bicycles shall be operated in conformity with the applicable ordinances of the City of Odessa and the following:
 - A. Pedestrians at all times shall have the right-of-way over bicyclists.
 - B. Bicycles may not be ridden on pedestrian ramps, walkways, and sidewalks.
 - C. Operators of bicycles on the university streets shall comply with all stop signs, yield signs and other general traffic regulations.
 - D. Bicycles may be parked only in university parking racks or in areas designated for bicycle parking.
5. Persons operating a motor vehicle as defined by these regulations on university property must be licensed to operate such vehicle as required by state law. Such license must be displayed upon request of any peace officer.
6. No vehicles are to be driven into any barricaded area or parked in violation of any barricade or any other posted traffic sign. Operation of any motor vehicle upon pedestrian ramps, walkways, or other inter-campus pedestrian ramps will result in arrest of the offender. Vehicles parked upon such walkways will be impounded at owner's expense.
7. The University of Texas of the Permian Basin assumes no responsibility for the care and/or protection of any vehicle or its contents at any time it is operated or parked on the campus. Furthermore, the university reserves the right to impound any vehicle which is parked improperly or in a manner dangerous to vehicular or pedestrian traffic or which is left parked and unattended in excess of 48 hours without written approval of the university police department. The university assumes no responsibility for cost of removing, impounding and storing such vehicle or any other costs involved in impoundment procedures.
8. Abandoned vehicles may be disposed of pursuant to state law. The University will not be liable for damages resulting from removal of vehicles.
9. Traffic control not specifically discussed in the rules may be imposed by the chief when, in his or her opinion, circumstances on the campus require such control.
10. Driving lanes within parking lots shall have right-of-way over vehicular traffic operating upon parking aisles. Driving lanes are roadways within parking areas which are designed solely for movement of traffic. Parking aisles are areas between rows of parking spaces which permit direct access to parking spaces.

SECTION V
PARKING REGULATIONS

The various classes of parking permits and their eligibility requirements, privileges and limitations are described in detail in Section VI.

On University holidays, only those parking restrictions which regulate parking at all times shall remain in effect.

Failure to abide by parking and traffic regulations may be the basis for disciplinary action against students and employees. Students may be subjected to penalties ranging from disciplinary probation to expulsion from the Institution as outlined in Section 3.13 of the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System, Chapter VI, Part One. Employees may be subjected to disciplinary penalties including termination of employment. When an employee has accumulated three or more unpaid parking or traffic violations and/or charges of \$25.00 or more, the employee's Dean, Director or Administrative Official shall be notified by the Chief of Police. When a student is placed on the bar list for unpaid parking or traffic violations, the Dean of Students shall be notified by the Chief of Police.

SECTION VI
PARKING PERMITS

- A. **FACULTY AND STAFF:** A parking permit will be issued upon application to the University Police Department located in CR 101. Permits will be issued to the vehicle for which the faculty or staff member, spouse or parent is the registered owner. If the registered owner is other than above, (1) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must be either related to or domiciled with the applicant, and (2) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must not be otherwise eligible for a University Parking Permit.

Holders of Class A permits may register an alternate vehicle at no additional cost provided that both vehicles are owned by the applicant or another person as specified above.

- B. **STUDENTS:** A parking permit will be issued for a vehicle owned by the student, spouse, parent, or guardian. If the registered owner is other than above, (1) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must be either related to or domiciled with the applicant, and (2) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must not be otherwise eligible for a University Parking Permit. Students may register additional motor vehicles, motorcycle, motor-assisted bicycle, or motor scooter upon separate application and payment of the required fee to the University Police Department. In addition, students must present a paid fee receipt for the current semester.
- C. **DISPLAY OF PERMITS:** Permit(s) must be displayed on the vehicle to which it was issued. Permits (decals) shall be affixed on the vehicle according to the instructions furnished on the decal. Taping or otherwise affixing the decal will result in citations being issued.
- D. **REMOVAL OF PERMITS:** Permits (decals) shall be removed:
1. whenever there is a change of vehicle ownership;
 2. when association with the University is terminated;
 3. when a replacement permit (decal) has been issued to take the place of a previously issued permit (decal); or
 4. upon expiration or revocation of the permit or decal.

- E. **CLASSES OF PERMITS AND ANNUAL FEES:**

1. Parking permit fees as follows:

- A. Faculty/Staff - Passenger vehicles and trucks \$10.00 per year, \$7.50 Spring semester through end of Summer session, \$5.00 Summer session (June through August).
- B. Students - Passenger vehicles and trucks \$10.00 per year, \$7.50 Spring semester through end of Summer session, \$5.00 Summer session (June through August).
- C. Motorcycles, motorscooters, mopeds, and motor-assisted bicycles \$5.00 per year, \$3.00 Spring semester through end of Summer session, \$1.00 Summer session (June through August).
- D. Replacement or additional vehicle fees \$3.00.
- E. Temporary (Monthly) permits may be issued for \$1.00 per month or any portion of a month in excess of 14 calendar days.
- F. A separate charge shall be made for each class of permit issued.
- G. Alumni - Permit issued upon presentation of paid receipt from Alumni Association showing membership for current school year.

2. Parking permits will be issued as follows:

- Class A - BLUE - Members of the faculty and staff
- Class B - ORANGE - Students
- Class C - GREEN - Issued at discretion of Chief of Police to faculty, staff and students whose physical conditions warrant and as specifically covered by Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, VCS 6675a.5e, and VCS 6675a.5e.1.
- Class D - YELLOW - Motorcycles, motorscooters, mopeds and motor-assisted bicycles.
- Class E - MAROON - Active Alumni Association

PERMITS (DECAL): A Class D Parking Permit (decal) will be honored only after it has been properly and completely affixed on the front fender of the vehicle so that it may be readily seen when viewed from the front of the vehicle. NOTE: If no front fender is available, mount permit on right front fork so that it may be readily seen when viewed from the front of the vehicle. Permits (decals) may not be affixed by tape or any other unauthorized method. The permit (decal) is not transferable and must be affixed to the vehicle for which it was issued. (A fee of \$3.00 AND the remnants of the old permit are required for any permit (decal) replacement.)

PARKING:

- A. Motorcycles and Motor Scooters shall park ONLY in designated Class D parking areas at all times.
- B. Motor-Assisted Bicycles and Mopeds (with a total engine displacement of less than 50cc) may park in either designated Class D areas or in bicycle racks/blocks provided that a current Class D permit is affixed.

NOTE: Motorcycles, Motor Scooters, Mopeds, and Motor-Assisted Bicycles shall NOT be parked or otherwise secured in unauthorized places e.g. sidewalks, posts, railings, trees, etc. Neither may these vehicles use spaces marked for passenger cars or trucks.

OPERATION:

Motorcycles, Motor Scooters, Mopeds and Motor-Assisted Bicycles shall NOT be ridden or operated on pedestrian walkways or sidewalks. On University streets, operators shall comply with ALL traffic control devices e.g. one-way signs, stop signs, etc.

All disabled veterans whose vehicles display the specially designed license plates issued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the words "DISABLED VET" printed thereon in accordance with the provisions of Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes Article 6675a-5e and all permanently disabled persons whose vehicles display the specially designed symbols, tabs or other devices (to include a vehicle in which a temporarily disabled person identification card is placed in the lower left-hand side of the front windshield) issued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the word "DISABLED" printed thereon in accordance with the provisions of Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes Article 6675a-5e.1 are exempt from parking permit fees and from parking meter fees and time limits. These

exemptions permit parking only in spaces where parking would otherwise be appropriate and do not permit the parking of a vehicle at a place where parking is restricted or prohibited.

- F. **PAYMENT OF FEES:** When an application is made for a permit, the fee charged will be for a complete year or for the entire unexpired portion of the University's permit year. Payment of the fee must be made before the permit will be issued.
- G. **REPLACEMENT CHARGES:** Any time replacement permits are issued there will be a \$3.00 charge made. Remnants of old permits are to be returned at that time. If remnants are not returned, replacement permit(s) will be at the REGULAR RATE.
- H. **REFUNDS:** A request for refund will not be honored unless it is filed with the Accounting Office during the University's fiscal year in which payment for the permit was made. A request for refund must be accompanied by the remnants of the appropriate permit. Refunds will be made to members of the faculty and staff upon request and only in the event service is terminated by a resignation or leave of absence without pay. The refund will be based on the number of full months remaining in the University's permit year. No refunds will be made after the end of the spring semester. Refunds will be made, upon request, to students who withdraw from the University at the end of the fall semester, but refunds will not be made to students who withdraw from the University at the end of the spring semester. A request for a refund will not be honored when a person's privilege to park and drive on campus has been suspended nor if outstanding charges or other debts remain unpaid. Requests for refunds of the entire amount paid will be subject to a \$2.00 administrative and handling charge.

SECTION VII DRIVING AND PARKING OFFENSES

- 1. Traffic citations may be issued for:
 - A. Any violation of Odessa City Ordinance or Texas State Law relating to the operation, registration or inspection of vehicles
 - B. Driving in a reckless or imprudent manner
 - C. Operation of any vehicle in disregard of any posted regulatory sign
 - D. Failure to yield right-of-way to pedestrian
 - E. Driving vehicle into barricaded or restricted area
 - F. Driving vehicle upon or across any pedestrian ramp or sidewalk
 - G. Failure to comply with directional signs or pavement markings
 - H. Failure to comply with the lawful order of a police officer
 - I. Operation of any vehicle off of paved or improved roadways
 - J. Exceeding designated or posted speed limits
 - K. Operating motor vehicle in prohibited direction on one way street or parking aisle
 - L. Failing to come to a complete stop before passing a stop sign
- 2. Parking citations may be issued for:
 - A. Parking an unregistered vehicle
 - B. Parking in areas not designated for permit issued
 - C. Parking in crosswalk, sidewalk or other restricted area (impounding violation)
 - D. Parking in driveway or aisleway (impounding violation)
 - E. Parking in any area not specifically designated by posted sign as parking area (impounding violation)
 - F. Parking off paved surface
 - G. Failure to park within lines of individually marked space
 - H. Over parking in time limited zone
 - I. Parking in any manner that impedes the legal flow of traffic or creates a hazard (impounding violation)
 - J. Parking in back-in position
 - K. Display of parking permit in location or manner other than that prescribed by regulations

- L. Transfer and/or display of permit on vehicle other than vehicle to which permit is issued
- M. Parking on campus when parking privileges have been suspended (impounding violation)
- N. Displaying forged or altered permit

A vehicle may also be impounded where the driver or owner of the vehicle has been found in violation of University Parking and Traffic Regulations and has received notice that the vehicle is subject to impound.

SECTION VIII ENFORCEMENT

- A. **PARKING AND TRAFFIC CITATIONS:** University Police are authorized to issue two types of citations for violation of University parking and traffic regulations:
 - 1. **UNIVERSITY CITATIONS** - Those handled by the University, subject to University administrative enforcement charges and a right to appeal within the University (Paragraph E below).
 - 2. **COURT APPEARANCE (CA) CITATIONS** - Those issued by the University Police constituting a summons to appear in either municipal court or a justice court.
- B. **POLICY WITH RESPECT TO COURT APPEARANCE (CA) CITATIONS:** The University reserves the right to issue a CA citation for any violation. It is the general policy of the University, however, to issue CA citations at the University's option as follows:
 - 1. for moving violations;
 - 2. for any violation when the individual's driving or parking privileges has been suspended (See Paragraph E below); or
 - 3. when an individual receives a University citation and all reasonable attempts at collection have failed.
- C. **PROCEDURE FOR UNIVERSITY CITATIONS:** University citations are issued for offenses described in Section VII. The administrative enforcement charges shall be \$1.00 for the first violation, \$5.00 for the second violation, and \$10.00 for the third violation occurring within a one year period. Additional tickets may result in the loss of all parking privileges. If the charge is not paid within ten (10) calendar days after issuance of the citation, a \$2.00 late charge will be assessed.

Every person receiving a University citation shall remit the amount of the charge to the Accounting Office. Payment must be received within ten (10) calendar days after issuance of the citation, to avoid a late charge.

If a person desires to appeal a University citation, he/she shall comply with Paragraph D below within ten (10) working days after issuance of the citation.

Requests for exceptions to the above referenced working days, will be considered on an individual basis, if mitigating or unusual circumstances exist. Such requests shall be submitted in writing to the Chief of Police and shall detail the reason(s) such a request is being made. Requests based solely on alleged non-receipt of a copy of the citation will not be honored.

Unpaid charges for parking offenses are recorded either in the name of the person in whose name the vehicle is registered with some official state motor vehicle registration department or agency, or in the name of the person who has registered the vehicle with the University Police Department.

NOTE: If a student has the same family name and/or home address as the registered owner, then the unpaid charges will also be recorded in the student's name. Unpaid charges for other offenses (such as moving violations) may be recorded in the name of the person driving said vehicle, in the name of the person who has

registered it with the University Police Department or in the name of the registered owner.

When Court Appearance citations are issued, the University citations will be cancelled. Failure to discharge CA citations may result in the issuance of a warrant for the arrest of such person.

Persons with unpaid charges recorded in their names shall be ineligible to receive parking permits while such charges remain unpaid. To obtain a permit, a person shall either pay the charge or timely request a University hearing.

- D. IMPOUNDMENT OF VEHICLES, BARRING OF READMISSION AND WITHHOLDING OF GRADES, DEGREES, OFFICIAL TRANSCRIPTS AND REFUNDS: When unpaid charges are recorded, the University Police Department shall send a return receipt letter to the last known address of the person in whose name the charges are recorded.

Such letter shall state that unless (1) payment of all accumulated charges is made within ten (10) calendar days after the date of such letter or (2) a written request is made within ten (10) calendar days to appear before a University hearing committee concerning impoundment of the vehicle in case of faculty, staff, student or visitor, or for barring of readmission and/or withholding of grades, degree, official transcripts and refunds in the case of students as authorized in the Regents' Rules and Regulations, Part One, Chapter VI, Section 9 and state law, the appropriate enforcement action will take place without further notice.

Such a hearing is not an appeal of the Parking and Traffic citations but is a limited hearing to allow the individual an opportunity to show that the vehicle in question was not owned, registered or used by the individual or to show that the individual receiving notice of impending sanctions does not have unpaid Parking and Traffic charges.

At such hearing, which will be held after a reasonable period of time, the person requesting the hearing will assume the burden of showing why the appropriate enforcement action should not take place.

If timely payment is not received and either the registered owner or the person who has registered the vehicle with the University has failed to appear at the requested University impoundment hearing or has appeared and has failed to meet his or her burden of proof, the vehicle may be impounded pending payment of all outstanding charges, including towing and storage charges, without further notice.

If timely payment is not received from a student and the student has failed to appear at the requested hearing or has appeared and has failed to meet his or her burden of proof, the student may be barred from readmission and grades, degrees, official transcripts and refunds may be withheld, without further notice. Additionally, the vehicle registered to the student may be subject to impoundment.

- E. APPEALS FROM UNIVERSITY CITATION(S): Any person who has received a University citation may file a request to have the citation reviewed. This appeal must be filed with the University Police Department no later than ten (10) working days after the citation was issued. If an appeal is not filed within this time the citation is deemed final.

Appeals shall be prepared in writing on the "Citation Appeal" form provided by the University Police Department. Appeals may be based solely on the written statement or the appealing party may also request a personal appearance. Failure to request a personal appearance or failure to appear at the hearing (as requested) will result in the decision being rendered on the basis of the written statement (including any supporting material submitted) and the information as shown on the citation(s).

Each "Citation Appeal" form will be reviewed by the Parking and Traffic Committee for a decision and the appealing party will be

notified, in writing, of the decision. The committee may order the payment of the administrative enforcement charge(s) in whole or in part or the cancellation of such charge(s). If the appeal is denied and the appealing party fails to pay the charge(s) or to request a review of the appeal (See Paragraph F below) within ten (10) calendar days after date of notification, a \$2.00 late charge will be assessed on the citation(s).

- F. REVIEW OF APPEAL FROM UNIVERSITY CITATION(S): Any person who has appealed a University citation(s) and who is not satisfied with the decision by the Parking and Traffic Committee, may have the decision reviewed by the University Parking and Traffic Appeals Panel. Such request shall be submitted in writing to the University Police Department within ten (10) calendar days from the date of the original decision.

This written request shall set forth the grounds on which the appealing party believes the decision was improper or inequitable. Such written request shall be submitted in an original plus three (3) legible copies (reproduced copies are acceptable) and include the following:

1. citation number(s);
2. license number of vehicle(s);
3. date of notification of original decision;
4. date review requested; and
5. printed or typed name, address, and signature of person requesting the review.

Each review will be considered by a (University Appeals Panel) consisting of faculty, staff and student members. The Panel may uphold the decision of the (Parking and Traffic Administrator) or they may reverse the decision in whole or in part, as deemed appropriate.

The decision of the (University Appeals Panel) shall be final.

- G. SUSPENSION OF PRIVILEGE TO DRIVE AND PARK ON CAMPUS: The loss of the privilege of driving or parking a motor vehicle on campus shall commence ten (10) days after the Chief of Police mails a letter to the person, at the address of such person as shown in the records of that office, stating that such person's privilege of driving or parking a motor vehicle on campus has been suspended. Such letter shall state the term of the suspension and will give notification of possible impoundment for parking offenses committed during the period of suspension and shall state the reason for such suspension.

Any person who (a) forges or alters a permit; (b) uses a forged or altered permit; (c) transfers a permit, affixes a permit to a vehicle other than for which it was issued, or fails to destroy a permit when required to do so by these regulations with the intention of providing any person with parking privileges he/she is not entitled to under these regulations; (d) provides false information to obtain a parking permit with knowledge thereof; or (e) parks or drives a vehicle to which there has been affixed a permit which the registered owner, or regular driver, did not purchase, shall lose the privilege of driving or parking on the University campus for six (6) months. While a person's privilege of driving or parking a vehicle on campus is suspended, it is unlawful (1) for that person to drive or park any motor vehicle on the campus and (2) for any person to drive or park a vehicle registered in the name of such person on the campus.

If a person whose privilege of driving or parking on campus has been suspended receives a University citation by reason of having a vehicle on campus during the period of his/her suspension, the period of suspension shall be extended so that it expires twelve months from the date the person received such additional citation. In addition, the violation of the suspension shall be reported to the Dean of Students if the person is a student, or to the appropriate Dean, Director or Administrative Official for possible disciplinary action if the person is a faculty or staff member.


A person receiving notice that his/her privilege of driving or parking a vehicle on campus has been suspended may appeal the suspension within twelve calendar days on the grounds that the imposition of such suspension is improper or will create serious and substantial hardship. Such appeal shall be governed by the provisions of Part D above. No appeal shall be considered if there are any unpaid citations outstanding at the time such appeal is filed, unless special arrangements are made with the Chief of Police.

- H. **DESTRUCTION OF PERMIT WHEN SUSPENDED:** Every person receiving notice that his/her privilege of driving or parking on the campus has been suspended shall remove the parking permit(s) from every vehicle registered in his/her name and return the remnants thereof to the University Police Department within twelve (12) days after date of such notice. Failure to do so shall be reported to the Dean of Students if the person is a student, or to the appropriate Dean, Director or Administrative Official, if the person is a faculty or staff member.
- I. **ELIGIBILITY TO OBTAIN NEW PERMIT DURING PERIOD OF SUSPENSION:** A person whose privilege of driving and parking on the campus is suspended and not reinstated, shall be ineligible to receive a parking permit of any type during the period of suspension.
- J. **IMPOUNDMENT:** The term "impoundment" includes towing, removal, immobilization, and storage of the vehicle in question.

In addition to any charge that may be levied by the University for an offense resulting in removal or immobilization, the owner of an impounded vehicle must also pay a commercial wrecker service fee and storage charges after the first 24 hours. When an IMPOUND VIOLATION occurs and the owner or driver of the vehicle appears on the scene before the arrival of the wrecker, the vehicle will not be impounded. If the owner or driver appears on the scene after the arrival of the wrecker and the wrecker driver has made a hookup, the following will apply:

1. the vehicle will not be impounded; and
2. the owner or driver will be expected to pay the wrecker a fee, in lieu of towing.

If the vehicle is impounded, the registered owner or permit holder will be sent notice at the address on file with the University Police Department or the registrar.



1984-1985

SECTION 1

QUICK REFERENCE TO PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

. PERMITS REQUIRED FOR ACCESS AND PARKING (visitors excepted)

Only vehicles conspicuously displaying proper University permits (as specified in Section VI, infra) may enter or park on the campus (as shown by the boundaries on the map accompanying the regulations). Special parking areas are provided for the handicapped and for two-wheel vehicles.

. DISPLAY OF PERMITS

Parking permits must be properly affixed to the vehicle(s) as described in Section VI. Permits which are taped or affixed by unauthorized materials or displayed on a vehicle other than the vehicle to which issued will subject the holder to a citation. Additionally, the permit will be revoked and the holder may lose all parking privileges (Section VIII, infra).

. REMOVAL OF PERMITS

Parking permits shall be removed when there is a change of vehicle ownership; when association with The University is terminated; when a replacement permit has been issued to take the place of a previously issued permit; or upon expiration or revocation (Section VI, Item 3.H.).

. CLASSES OF PERMITS (Section VI, infra)

CLASS A General (Faculty and Staff)

CLASS G General (Student)

CLASS C Motorcycles, Motor Scooters, Motorbikes, Mopeds

CLASS K Mini-Car (Faculty and Staff)

CLASS M Mini-Car (Student)

CLASS P Carpool (Faculty and Staff)

CLASS S Carpool (Student)

CLASS T Vendors, Salespersons, Technical Representatives, and Other Servicing Personnel

. PERMIT RESTRICTIONS

A. Parking permits are available for GENERAL parking or MINI-CAR [vehicles fifteen (15) feet or less in length] parking for both students and employees.

- B. Disabled students and/or employees who qualify for handicapped parking privileges in accordance with Section VI must obtain a Handicapped parking permit before parking in specially designated HANDICAPPED parking areas.
- C. All two-wheel vehicles must be parked in those areas specially designated for TWO-WHEEL vehicles except for bicycles which should be parked in any of the BICYCLE parking areas.
- D. RESERVED parking areas are restricted to faculty members and authorized staff members. All vehicles parked in the RESERVED parking areas must display a Reserved parking permit.
- E. CARPOOL parking permits are available for two or more students or employees. All members of the carpool must be present when requesting carpool parking privileges (see Section VI, Item 7, for rules and regulations regarding carpool).
- F. Spaces marked for VISITOR parking are restricted to individuals who are not currently affiliated with either The University of Texas at San Antonio (UTSA) or The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio (UTHSCSA) and should not be utilized by students, employees, or persons who use the facilities on a regular basis. Individuals who need to park on the UTSA campus for purposes of using any of the facilities should contact the University Police Traffic Office, MS 1.02.04 (691-4246), for parking instructions.

. LOADING ZONE PARKING

Permission to utilize the loading dock areas must be obtained from the University Police Dispatcher upon entering the service drive through any of the controlled access gates. Parking in any of the service drive areas not otherwise marked is restricted to a 30-minute time limit. Any vehicle parked in excess of the 30-minute time limit will be subject to receiving a parking violation citation.

. BICYCLE REGISTRATION

Bicycles operated or parked on the campus shall be registered with the University Police Department (see Section VI for registration information).

. BICYCLES, MOPEDS (MOTOR-ASSISTED BICYCLES) AND SKATES

Bicycles and mopeds must be operated in accordance with, and skaters must conform to, the ordinances of the City of San Antonio, the specific applicable provisions of these regulations, all provisions of these regulations concerning parking restrictions and traffic control, and applicable state law.

. PARKING LOTS

On occasion during the year, certain parking lots may be closed upon recommendation by the Chief of Police and approval by the President of The University.

. SPEED LIMIT

Unless otherwise posted, the speed limit on roads and streets of the campus is 20 mph and the speed limit on all parking lots and service drives is 15 mph (Section IV).

. POSTED SIGNS

Posted signs, whether permanent or temporary, must be obeyed at all times and take precedence over painted curbs, pavement markings and designations shown on any University maps.

. PARKING IMPROPERLY

A vehicle shall not be parked on a street where angle parking is required, with the back of the vehicle toward the curb, nor shall a vehicle be parked opposite the flow of traffic in the traffic lane where parallel parking is required. Parking wholly within the marked boundaries of the parking space is required at all times. Vehicles shall not be parked in a manner that obstructs walkways, driveways, ramps, loading docks, marked cross-walks or inflicts damage to shrubbery, trees, grass, grounds or structures. Additionally, no vehicle may park on any unmarked or unimproved ground area which has not been marked or designated for parking. Parking is not allowed where prohibited by signs either permanently or temporarily posted, red or yellow curbs, or other markings on streets and parking lots. The fact that other vehicles are parked improperly shall not constitute an excuse for parking with any part of the vehicle extending beyond the marked boundaries of the parking space.

. REGISTRATION OF ADDITIONAL VEHICLES

Persons who pay the required fee for one vehicle may obtain an additional parking permit for other vehicles which they own by presenting to the University Police Traffic Office the PROOF OF OWNERSHIP (license plate receipt or copy of the title) and a copy of the receipt which shows that the initial parking fee has been paid. The fee for each additional vehicle registered is \$2.00 per vehicle provided that the first vehicle registered is a four-wheel vehicle. NO MORE THAN ONE VEHICLE REGISTERED TO AN INDIVIDUAL MAY BE PARKED ON CAMPUS AT ANY ONE TIME. (Section VI, infra)

. ENFORCEMENT AND IMPOUNDMENT

Failure to abide by these regulations may be the basis for disciplinary action against students, faculty and staff (Section V, infra).

Upon notice, violators may be subject to impoundment of their vehicle(s) pending payment of overdue charges (Section VIII, infra). Students may also be barred from readmission and have grades, degree, refunds or official transcripts withheld pending payment of overdue charges (Section VIII, infra). Vehicles may also be impounded for specific impound violations.

. APPEAL OF CITATION

University parking and traffic citations may be appealed, within five (5) working days from date of citation, by filing a "Citation Appeal" form with the University Police Traffic Office (see Section VIII for detailed procedures). Court Appearance citations are handled by the appropriate state or municipal court.

. VISITORS

Official visitors are those who conduct business with or who render a service to The University and who are not otherwise eligible for parking privileges (Section VI, infra).

Persons who will be on campus for the purpose of using UTSA facilities should contact the University Police Traffic Office for parking information. Students and employees are NOT allowed to park in areas designated for VISITOR parking at any time.

. PEDESTRIAN RIGHTS AND DUTIES

Pedestrians must obey all traffic control devices and signs. They have the right-of-way at marked crosswalks, in intersections and on sidewalks extending across a service drive, building entrance or driveway. Pedestrians crossing a street at any point other than within a marked crosswalk or within an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles on said street. Pedestrians shall not leave the curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is impossible for the driver to yield. Pedestrians may cross an intersection diagonally only where permitted by special pavement marking. No person shall stand in the roadway for the purpose of soliciting a ride.

. INOPERABLE VEHICLES

If a vehicle becomes inoperable while on the UTSA campus, the driver of said vehicle shall notify the University Police Dispatcher by using one of the parking lot emergency telephones. The police will either render assistance or authorize temporary parking. Temporary parking shall not exceed twenty-four (24) hours and the vehicle must be parked so as not to create an obstruction or hazard.

. BORROWED VEHICLES

Whenever an unregistered vehicle is used due to an emergency, the driver shall notify the University Police Dispatcher by calling 691-4242, or by using one of the parking lot emergency telephones (see attached map). Persons that have not paid for the privilege of parking a vehicle on campus MAY NOT utilize this unregistered vehicle procedure.

SECTION II
GENERAL PROVISIONS

ursuant to the authority granted by Sections 51.201 et seq., 54.005, 54.503, 5.31, and 71.01 et seq. of Title 3 of the Texas Education Code, the Board of agents of The University of Texas System has promulgated parking and traffic regulations to regulate and control parking and traffic and the use of parking facilities, to provide for the issuance of motor vehicle identification and insignia (parking permit), and to provide for jurisdiction over offenses.

his booklet contains those regulations and procedures applicable to any person who walks or drives and parks a vehicle on the campus of The University of Texas at San Antonio. These rules and regulations are supplementary to the ordinances of the City of San Antonio and the statutes of the State of Texas which govern pedestrians and the use of motor vehicles and bicycles.

he operation of a motor vehicle or bicycle on The University of Texas at San Antonio campus is a PRIVILEGE granted by The University and is not an inherent right of any faculty/staff member or student. All faculty, staff and students who have vehicles in their possession or control for use, operation or parking on The University campus must register said vehicle with the University Police Traffic Office. Registration of a vehicle does not guarantee a parking place on campus.

he commissioned University Police Officers are vested with all the powers, privileges and immunities of peace officers while on the property and are empowered to enforce all of these laws and the UTSA Parking and Traffic Regulations.

he University is not responsible for fire, theft, damage to, or loss of any vehicle parked or operated on The University campus. No bailment is created by granting any parking or operating privileges regarding a vehicle on any property owned, leased or otherwise controlled by The University.

he administration and enforcement of the regulations contained in this booklet are as follows:

HE UNIVERSITY STANDING COMMITTEE ON PARKING AND TRAFFIC is composed of eight members consisting of two faculty, two staff members, and two students (one graduate and one undergraduate), the Physical Plant Director (ex officio with vote), and the University Police Chief (ex officio without vote). Faculty and staff shall serve two-year terms. Students serve a one-year term. The charge is to review the Parking and Traffic Regulations for The University of Texas at San Antonio and to develop recommendations for revisions in these regulations as are necessary to an efficient parking and traffic system as it relates to differential parking zones, parking fees, penalties for violations of regulations, arrangements for bicycle and motorcycle traffic, and arrangements for pedestrian paths. The major responsibility of the Committee is to meet monthly, or more often as needed, in order to hear the appeals for parking and traffic violations at The University. The Committee shall also meet prior to early registration and regular registration or each semester.

HE CHIEF OF POLICE, University Police Department, shall review all appeals before forwarding the appeals to the chairperson of the Parking and Traffic Committee.

HE TRAFFIC OFFICE, University Police Department, receives and processes all appeals received within five (5) working days of the date of the ticket and submits all valid appeals to the Chief of Police for review. The Traffic Office maintains files of all registered vehicles and all campus traffic tickets.

HE UNIVERSITY POLICE DEPARTMENT has the responsibility and the legal authority for the enforcement of the parking and traffic regulations listed in this booklet. University police officers may issue University citations or court appearance citations ENFORCEABLE IN COURT (See Section VIII). For special occasions and emergencies, such parking limitations may be imposed by the Chief of the Universi-

Police Department as are required by the conditions which prevail. When conditions warrant such action, the Chief may waive parking limitations.

The University reserves the right to enforce parking and traffic regulations:

- . through the issuance of University citations and the collection of administrative enforcement charges for offenses;
- . through the impoundment of vehicles interfering with the movement of vehicular or pedestrian traffic or blocking a sidewalk, ramp, loading dock, crosswalk, entrance, exit, fire lane or aisle and through the impoundment of vehicles for unpaid charges after proper notice as provided by these regulations;
- . by the suspension or revocation of permits;
- . by requiring either the vehicle owner or the person who has registered the vehicle with the University Police Traffic Office to appear in court or at a University hearing for nonpayment of outstanding charges;
- . by barring the readmission and withholding the grades, degrees, refunds and official transcripts of any student for nonpayment of outstanding charges;
- . by disciplinary action against employees or students who fail to abide by these regulations;
- . by denying parking permits to those with unpaid charges;
- . by the issuance of court appearance citations requiring an appearance in the appropriate state or municipal court; and
- . by such other methods as are commonly employed by city governments or state agencies in control of traffic regulation enforcement.

Proof of the fact that any parking or traffic control device, sign, parking meter, signal or marking was actually in place at any location on campus of The University of Texas at San Antonio, shall constitute prima facie evidence that the same is official and was installed under the authority of applicable law and these regulations.

When any person is charged with having stopped, parked and left standing a vehicle on campus, in violation of any provision of the UTSA Parking and Traffic Regulations, proof that said vehicle, at the date of the offense, was bearing a valid UTSA parking permit shall constitute prima facie evidence that said vehicle was then and there stopped, parked and left standing by the holder of the parking permit. However, if the vehicle does not bear a valid UTSA parking permit, proof that said vehicle, at the date of the offense alleged, was owned by an individual is prima facie proof that said vehicle was then and there stopped, parked and left standing by said individual.

The University assumes no responsibility or duty to protect any vehicle or its contents anytime the vehicle is operated or parked on the campus.

The University may deem a vehicle parked on The University campus for more than 48 hours without prior authorization to be abandoned and may dispose of such vehicle as provided in Article 6687-9 of the Texas Revised Civil Statutes.

SECTION III
DEFINITIONS

The following defined terms are in addition to the definitions and terms of the Texas Motor Vehicle Laws which shall apply on the campus.

UNIVERSITY or UTSA

The University of Texas at San Antonio, Texas.

CAMPUS

The property under the control of The University of Texas at San Antonio.

CHIEF OF POLICE

The Chief of the University Police Department of The University of Texas at San Antonio.

UNIVERSITY POLICE

The University Police Department of The University of Texas at San Antonio acting directly or through its duly authorized officers and agents.

DRIVER

Any person who drives, operates or is in actual physical control of a vehicle.

VEHICLE

Includes automobiles, buses, trucks, trailers, motorcycles, motor scooters, motorbikes, mopeds, bicycles, and tractors.

VISITOR

Any person who is neither a student nor an employee of The University of Texas at San Antonio or the UT-Health Science Center at San Antonio; nor is said person someone who uses University facilities for the benefit of any student or employee of either aforementioned institution.

STUDENT

Any person duly registered, enrolled and attending classes at The University of Texas at San Antonio or the UT-Health Science Center at San Antonio (including special students, part-time students and auditing students).

EMPLOYEE

Any person employed by The University of Texas at San Antonio or the UT-Health Science Center at San Antonio, regardless of whether the person is employed with salary or without salary; to include those persons who perform services on campus.

PARKING PERMIT

Either a temporary card or self-adhering decal issued by The University of Texas at San Antonio to be displayed on all vehicles authorized to park on campus.

SECTION IV
GENERAL TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

- . The purpose of these regulations is to provide for the safety and welfare of students, employees and visitors and to provide for the control of traffic and parking.
- . If any part of these parking and traffic regulations is held to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions which can be given effect without the invalid provision, and to this end the provisions of these regulations are declared to be severable.
- . The provisions of these regulations shall be cumulative of all other laws.
- . The driver of an authorized emergency vehicle, when responding to an emergency call or when in pursuit of an actual or suspected violator of the law, or when responding to a fire alarm, may exercise the privileges set forth in this section, but subject to conditions stated.
 - A. The driver of an emergency vehicle may:
 - (1) park or stand, irrespective of the provisions of these regulations and Texas Motor Vehicle Laws;
 - (2) proceed past a red or stop signal or stop sign, but only after slowing down as may be necessary for safe operation;
 - (3) exceed the maximum speed limits so long as life or property is not endangered; or
 - (4) disregard regulations governing direction of movement of traffic or turning in specified directions.
 - B. The exemptions herein granted to an authorized emergency vehicle shall apply only when such vehicle is making use of audible and visual signals, except that an authorized emergency vehicle operated as a police vehicle need not be equipped with or display a red light visible from in front of the vehicle.
- . On special occasions and in emergencies, the Chief of Police may impose temporary parking and traffic control restrictions. These temporary restrictions shall have all the force of other written and approved regulations and shall be subject to the same penalties.
- . It shall be a violation to commit any act prohibited by these regulations or to fail to do any act required by these regulations.
- . The operation of a vehicle shall be restricted to the campus drives, streets and parking lots.
- . Vehicles operated or parked on the campus must comply with all State Laws, City Ordinances and the Parking and Traffic Regulations of The University of Texas at San Antonio.
- . The speed limit on roads and streets of the campus is 20 miles per hour. The speed limit on all parking lots and service drives is 15 miles per hour, unless otherwise specified.
- 0. The driver of any vehicle involved in a collision shall immediately stop at the scene of such accident or collision, and by the quickest means of communication report such accident or collision to the University Police Department.

1. No person shall fail or refuse to comply with any lawful order or direction of any University police officer invested by law with the authority to direct, control and regulate traffic.
2. Any person who willfully or through negligence causes damage to The University of Texas at San Antonio property shall be liable for any damage done to said property.
3. All vehicles operated or parked upon the campus shall properly display a current parking permit (Visitors refer to Item No. 23, this section).
4. All vehicles are required to stop completely at each STOP sign, and then proceed cautiously without creating a hazard to vehicles not required to stop.
5. Bicycles shall not be operated on pedestrian walkways or sidewalks. Operation of bicycles is regulated by Texas Motor Vehicle Laws.
6. The operator of a vehicle shall yield right-of-way to pedestrians in crosswalks.
7. Pedestrians shall cross streets at designated marked pedestrian crosswalks.
 - A. Every pedestrian crossing a roadway at any point other than within a marked crosswalk or within an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles upon the roadway (VCS 6701d, Art. IX, Sec. 78a).
 - B. Pedestrians shall not leave the curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is impossible for the driver to yield.
 - C. Pedestrians may cross an intersection diagonally only where permitted by special pavement marking.
 - D. No person shall stand in the roadway for the purpose of soliciting a ride.
8. No operator of a vehicle shall drive beyond a barricaded area, or where prohibited by temporary or permanent signs and no operator or person shall remove such barricades or signs. University employees whose job is to deliver, install or pick up such barricades or temporary signs upon request by the Chief of Police are excepted.
9. No driver or operator of any vehicle shall back any vehicle into an intersection or back upon any shoulder or any traffic lane.
10. No person driving a vehicle shall cross, drive in or on a sidewalk, parking lot, driveway or entrances at an intersection for the purpose of making a right or left turn from one street or roadway to another street or roadway as a shortcut or to avoid any traffic control device.
11. No person in control or possession of a motor vehicle shall bring the same to a sudden start or stop in a parking lot or street, or accelerate or race the motor so as to cause a loud noise in a manner calculated to disturb the person or persons present.
12. No person may throw or deposit any trash, litter or other waste on any parking area, street or sidewalk.
13. Visitors are those individuals who conduct business with or who render a service to The University and who are not otherwise eligible for parking privileges. Persons who will be on campus for the purpose of using UTSA facilities should contact the University Police Traffic Office for parking information (Section VI, infra).

SECTION V
PARKING REGULATIONS

- . The various classes of parking permits and their eligibility requirements, privileges and limitations are described in detail in Section VI.
- . Parking and traffic regulations on campus are in effect at all times with the exception that Lot 3 and Lot 9, CARPOOL and RESERVED only, are open to vehicles displaying GENERAL parking permits AFTER 4:30 p.m. weekdays and on weekends.
- . Failure to abide by parking and traffic regulations may be the basis for disciplinary action against students and employees.

A. STUDENTS

Students may be subjected to penalties ranging from disciplinary probation to expulsion from the institution as outlined in Section 3.13 of the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System, Part One, Chapter VI, and the UTSA Institutional Rules on Student Services and Activities. When a student has accumulated four (4) or more unpaid parking or traffic citations and/or charges of \$25.00 or more, the Dean of Students shall be notified by the UTSA Parking and Traffic Committee. See Section VIII (infra) for rules regarding disciplinary action.

B. EMPLOYEES

Employees may be subjected to disciplinary penalties including termination of employment as outlined in the Handbook of Operating Procedures. When an employee has accumulated four (4) or more unpaid parking or traffic citations and/or charges of \$25.00 or more, the employee's Dean, Director or Administrative Official shall be notified by the UTSA Parking and Traffic Committee.

. GENERAL PARKING REGULATIONS

- A. Only vehicles which have a valid parking permit issued by The University may park on campus.
- B. Parking is restricted to lined parking spaces. Vehicles shall be parked within the boundaries of the designated lined spaces. The fact that other vehicles are parked improperly shall not constitute an excuse for parking with any part of the vehicle over the line.
- C. Bicycles shall not be parked anywhere except in the bicycle parking areas.
- D. Parking is not allowed where prohibited by signs either permanently or temporarily posted, red or yellow curbs, or other markings on streets and parking lots.
- E. Parking is prohibited on any lawn, curb, sidewalk, or any area not designated as a parking space or lot, or in any restricted or unauthorized area.

- F. It is prohibited to park a vehicle in any place where it may create a traffic hazard or where it blocks or impedes pedestrian or vehicular traffic.
- G. Parking a vehicle on campus for more than twenty-four (24) continuous hours requires approval of the University Police Department. Vehicles which are the property of The University are excepted.
- H. VISITOR parking areas may NOT be utilized by UTSA faculty, staff members, or students at any time. See Section VI for permit information.
- I. When four-wheel vehicles are parked diagonally or perpendicular to a curb the front wheels must be within twelve (12) inches of the face of the curb.
- J. Parking spaces designated for the handicapped may be used only by persons who have a parking permit for that space.
- K. Every vehicle parked upon a two-way roadway shall be so parked with the right-hand wheels parallel to and within eighteen (18) inches of the right-hand curb.
- L. Every vehicle parked upon a one-way roadway shall be so parked parallel to the curb in the direction of authorized traffic movement, with its right-hand wheels within eighteen (18) inches of the right-hand curb, or its left-hand wheels within eighteen (18) inches of the left-hand curb.
- M. Vehicles found parked in violation of any State Law, City Ordinance or in violation of these regulations or parked in such a manner as to create a traffic hazard may be impounded, relocated or immobilized at the expense of the violator. The University shall not, nor shall any of its authorized personnel, be liable or assume any responsibility for any loss or damage suffered because of such impoundment, immobilization or relocation.
- N. Passenger vehicles or trucks shall not be parked in spaces reserved for motorcycles or bicycles.
- O. Motorcycles, motor scooters, motorbikes or bicycles shall not be parked in spaces designated for passenger vehicles or trucks.
- P. Vehicles shall not be parked so as to obstruct the entrance or exit of a building.
- Q. Vehicles shall not be parked in any area other than that designated by the permit on the vehicle.
- R. On special occasions and during emergency periods, the Chief of Police may prohibit or extend parking and traffic regulations or any portion thereof.
- S. No person shall stop, park or leave standing any vehicle within an intersection, on a crosswalk, or on a sidewalk.
- T. Temporary parking in the Student Health Service parking lot is restricted only to students requiring emergency or scheduled medical assistance at the Student Health Service facilities.
- U. Parking in loading zones and service drives is restricted to a maximum time limit of thirty (30) minutes and will be allowed only for the actual process of loading and unloading equipment, supplies, and merchandise.

SECTION VI
PARKING PERMIT REGULATIONS

FACULTY AND STAFF

- A. A parking permit will be issued upon application to the University Police Traffic Office located in MS 1.02.04. Permits will be issued to the vehicle for which the faculty or staff member, spouse or parent is the registered owner. If the registered owner is other than above, (1) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must be either related to or domiciled with the applicant, and (2) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must not be otherwise eligible for a University parking permit.
- B. New faculty and staff members must register their vehicle on their first day of employment. Parking permit fees are due and payable at the time of vehicle registration.
- C. Any faculty or staff member who is unable to pay for the parking permit at the time of vehicle registration must obtain a temporary parking permit from the University Police Traffic Office on their first day of work. This temporary permit shall expire on the fifth day following the first pay period of said faculty or staff member. All parking permit fees must be paid and the vehicle properly registered upon expiration of the temporary parking permit.
- D. When both spouses are employed by The University, or if one spouse is a student at The University, and they need to park two vehicles on campus on or about the same time, each spouse shall register each vehicle separately and pay the appropriate parking fees. Additional decals of the same class may be purchased for the other spouse's vehicle and both decals shall be displayed on each vehicle. When one of the two decals is for a specially designated parking area, then only that vehicle which is operated by the person eligible for said permit shall be parked in the specially designated parking area.
- E. Employees on staff at the beginning of the fiscal year will be required to pay the annual rate for a parking permit regardless of when they apply for the permit during that fiscal year. Employees hired after the beginning of the fiscal year will be charged for the entire month in which their employment begins and for each full month remaining in the fiscal year.
- F. Faculty and staff members may register additional vehicles provided that the vehicles are owned by the applicant or another person as specified above, with the understanding that two vehicles shall not be operated or parked on campus at the same time. Proof of ownership (license plate receipt or copy of title) must be presented at the time of registration for any additional vehicle. A charge of \$2.00 will be assessed for each additional vehicle registered providing that the first vehicle registered is a four-wheel vehicle.

STUDENTS

- A. A parking permit will be issued upon application for a vehicle owned by the student, spouse, parent, or guardian. If the registered owner is other than above, (1) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must be either related to or domiciled with the applicant, and (2) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must not be otherwise eligible for a University parking permit.
- B. Students may register ONE additional vehicle upon separate application and payment of the required fee to the University Police Traffic Office

provided that the vehicle is owned by the applicant or another person as specified above with the understanding that both vehicles may not be operated or parked upon the campus at the same time. In addition, students must present a paid fee receipt for the current semester and proof of ownership (license plate receipt or copy of title).

A charge of \$2.00 will be assessed for the additional vehicle providing that the first vehicle registered is a four-wheel vehicle.

- C. Students must present a current student identification card when making application for a parking permit.
- D. Students may pay their parking fees at the time of academic registration; however, parking fees MUST be paid at the time of vehicle registration and may be purchased any time during the semester. Student parking fees are not prorated and are assessed at the time of purchase according to the semester fee in effect at the time of vehicle registration.
- E. Special students, part-time students and auditing students shall be treated as regular students and must pay the appropriate fee for the type of permit issued.

GENERAL INFORMATION AND REQUIREMENTS FOR FACULTY, STAFF AND STUDENTS

A. DISPLAY OF PERMITS

- (1) The parking permit must be displayed on the vehicle for which it was issued.
- (2) Permits shall be affixed on the vehicle according to the instructions furnished with the permit.
- (3) Taping or affixing the permit in any other manner will result in citations being issued.

- B. Proof of ownership may be required of any vehicle registered, but is required for registration of any additional vehicle. Persons who want to register more than one additional vehicle must obtain approval from the Chief of Police.
- C. Persons who need to register a company or leased vehicle for parking privileges must contact the University Police Traffic Office. Fees will be assessed for the classification of parking permit issued.
- D. The license plate number of the vehicle is required at the time of vehicle registration.
- E. A valid driver's license must be presented by the person registering the vehicle before authorization to drive or park the vehicle on campus can be given.
- F. Any change affecting the registration or ownership of a vehicle shall be reported promptly to the University Police Traffic Office. Permits should be removed from a vehicle whenever said vehicle is sold.
- G. Any person who registers a vehicle when said vehicle is not eligible for registration in accordance with these regulations shall be subject to appropriate disciplinary action and/or cancellation of parking privileges.

H. REMOVAL OF PERMITS

(1) Permits shall be removed:

- (a) whenever there is a change of vehicle ownership;
- (b) when association with The University is terminated; or
- (c) upon expiration or revocation of permit.

(2) When a replacement permit is needed, the previously issued permit must be removed from the vehicle and the remnants must accompany the application for the replacement permit.

NO CARPOOL PERMITS ARE AVAILABLE FOR STUDENTS DURING THE SUMMER SESSION. CARPOOL PARKING AREAS IN LOT #3 AND LOT #9 ARE OPEN FOR GENERAL PARKING PERMITS DURING SUMMER SESSION ONLY.

D. VENDORS, SALESPERSONS, TECHNICAL REPRESENTATIVES AND OTHER SERVICING PERSONNEL

CLASS T FEE: \$ 2.00

Valid in any undesignated, lined parking space. Permit valid through August 31, 1985 unless otherwise specified on permit. Permit fee in effect if purchased anytime during the academic year. (Note: No refund available for Class T permit.)

PERMITS

- A. The permit is not transferable and must be affixed to the vehicle for which it was issued. A fee of \$2.00 AND the remnants of the old permit are required for any permit replacement.
- B. One parking permit will be issued for each vehicle registered.
- C. A parking permit will be issued after the vehicle has been properly registered, as required by this section, and the parking permit fees paid.
- D. Parking permits are effective from the date of purchase through August 31 of the current fiscal year unless otherwise specified on the permit.
- E. The parking permit must be properly displayed on the registered vehicle no later than Census Date in any given semester.
 - (1) The self-adhering decal for four-wheel vehicles is to be completely and properly affixed to the inside of the glass on the lower right corner (passenger side) of the front windshield.
 - (2) The temporary card-style permit is to be hung from the rear-view mirror in the manner described on the permit. A temporary parking permit must be displayed only on the vehicle for which the permit was issued.
 - (3) Permits for motorcycles, motor scooters, motorbikes, mopeds, and bicycles are to be affixed to the rear fender, or on a tab, or in a case specially designed for use on such vehicles.

MOTOR-ASSISTED TWO-WHEEL VEHICLES

A. Parking

- (1) Motorcycles, mopeds and motor scooters shall park ONLY in designated motorcycle parking areas at all times.
- (2) Motorcycles, motor scooters, mopeds and motor-assisted bicycles shall NOT be parked or otherwise secured in unauthorized places, e.g. sidewalks, posts, railings, trees, etc. These vehicles may not use spaces marked for passenger cars or trucks.

B. Operation

Motorcycles, motor scooters, mopeds and motor-assisted bicycles shall NOT be ridden or operated on pedestrian walkways or sidewalks. On University streets, operators shall comply with ALL traffic control devices, e.g. one-way signs, stop signs, etc.

CARPOOL RULES AND PERMITS

- A. Carpools shall consist of at least two vehicles, each owned by persons not having the same domicile.
- B. Each vehicle must be registered and will be issued a carpool parking permit. Permit shall be affixed according to instructions issued with the permit.
- C. Persons forming a carpool are authorized to bring the carpool vehicle on campus only during the times specified on the permit.
- D. All members of each carpool must be together in the vehicle when parking in the carpool area. If, for any reason, a member of the carpool is absent, the driver of said vehicle shall notify the University Police Dispatcher by calling 691-4242.
- E. Only one vehicle in each carpool shall be parked on the campus.
 - (1) Should two cars of the same carpool need to be on campus at the same time, the second vehicle must park in GENERAL parking and both drivers are required to notify the University Police Dispatcher immediately upon arrival.
 - (2) Two cars of the same carpool will be allowed to park on campus at the same time only twice during each semester; any abuse will result in cancellation of the carpool.
 - (3) The reason for parking two carpool vehicles on campus at the same time is subject to verification by the University Police Department.
 - (4) If either driver fails to notify the University Police Dispatcher of two carpool vehicles on campus at one time, that driver will be issued a carpool violation citation. Two violations issued to any one member of a carpool for two cars on campus without authorization will result in cancellation of that carpool, and all members must return their carpool permits and obtain new parking permits from the University Police Traffic Office.
- F. Whenever an unregistered vehicle is used due to an emergency, the driver shall notify the University Police Dispatcher by calling 691-4242.

- G. If, for any reason, a person withdraws from a carpool, the entire carpool shall be considered cancelled and all persons in that carpool must return their parking permits to the University Police Traffic Office and make other parking arrangements.
- H. When there are any changes in vehicles, such as adding or removing any vehicle, a new carpool card must be secured from the University Police Traffic Office.
- I. No student carpool will be authorized after the Census Date in any given semester.
 - (1) Student carpool permits are valid for one semester.
 - (2) Student carpool permits will NOT be available during the summer session.
- J. Faculty and staff carpool permits are valid for one academic year.
- K. Cancellation of any carpool requires each carpool member to return their carpool permits to the University Police Traffic Office and obtain new parking privileges. The full amount of the regular parking fee in effect at the time of cancellation will be charged in addition to any enforcement fees.

Vendors, salespersons, technical representatives and servicing personnel who regularly conduct business on this campus must register their vehicle at the University Police Traffic Office. Upon completing the registration, a fee of \$2.00 must be paid for a special parking permit. The special parking permit must be properly displayed on the vehicle.

Eligibility for mini-car parking permits will be based on the size of the vehicle. Any vehicle which measures fifteen (15) feet or less from front to rear and has been measured and/or approved by authorized representatives of the University Police Department will qualify for the mini-car parking permit. Any vehicle authorized for mini-car parking will be issued a mini-car parking permit. Mini-car parking areas are located in Lot 1 (north end near Margaret Tobin Drive) and Lot 6 (entire lot) for convenience to either side of the campus.

The mini-car measurement site is located in Lot 6. Special arrangements may be made for obtaining mini-car authorization by contacting the University Police Traffic Office.

TEMPORARY PARKING PERMITS

- A. Temporary parking permits for unregistered vehicles may be obtained at no cost from the University Police Traffic Office provided that the person requesting the temporary parking privilege has duly registered a first vehicle and paid the appropriate fee for campus parking privileges.
- B. Temporary parking permits shall not exceed fourteen (14) days. Extensions may be obtained with the approval of the Chief of Police.
- C. Any alteration to a temporary parking permit shall be cause for the issuance of a traffic citation.
- D. If the temporary parking permit is for a vehicle that is eligible for registration as an additional vehicle, an additional parking permit must be purchased in lieu of a temporary permit.

E. Temporary parking permits for parking in restricted areas may be obtained from the University Police Traffic Office upon presentation of details explaining need for such parking privileges.

F. Whenever an unregistered vehicle is used due to an emergency, the driver shall notify the University Police Dispatcher by calling 691-4242, or by using one of the parking lot emergency telephones (see attached map).

Note: Persons that have not paid for the privilege of parking a vehicle on campus MAY NOT utilize this unregistered vehicle procedure.

G. Any department or organization requiring parking privileges for groups of visitors should contact the Chief of Police for specific parking instructions. On occasion, the Chief of Police may deem it necessary for the visitors to obtain temporary parking permits.

HANDICAPPED QUALIFICATIONS

A. Acceptable medical proof that the operator or regularly transported person (faculty, staff, or student) is currently disabled must accompany the application for a handicapped permit.

B. All disabled veterans whose vehicles display the specially designed license plates issued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the words "DISABLED VET" printed thereon in accordance with the provisions of Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes Article 6675a-5e and all permanently disabled persons whose vehicles display the specially designed symbols, tabs or other devices (to include a vehicle in which a temporarily disabled person identification card is placed in the lower left-hand side of the front windshield) issued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the word "DISABLED" printed thereon in accordance with the provisions of Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes Article 6675a-5e.1 are exempt from parking permit fees. These exemptions allow parking only in spaces where parking would otherwise be appropriate and do not allow the parking of a vehicle at a place where parking is restricted or prohibited.

C. Temporary handicapped permits may be obtained from the University Police Traffic Office by presenting a letter from the attending physician indicating the nature of the short-term disability.

PAYMENT OF FEES

When an application is made for a permit, the fee charged will be for a complete year or the entire unexpired portion of The University's permit year. Payment of the fee must be made before the permit will be issued.

REPLACEMENT CHARGES

Any time replacement permits are issued there will be a \$2.00 charge made. Remnants of old permits are to be returned at that time. If remnants are not returned, replacement permit(s) will be at the REGULAR RATE.

REFUNDS

A. Students, faculty and staff members may apply for a refund of parking fees by completing the "REFUND REQUEST FORM" available in the University Police Traffic Office, MS 1.02.04.

- B. A request for refund will not be honored unless it is filed with the University Police Traffic Office during The University's fiscal year in which payment for the permit was made. A request for refund must be accompanied by the remnants of all permits issued to the person requesting the refund.
- (1) Refunds will be made to members of the faculty and staff upon request and only in the event service is terminated by a resignation or leave of absence without pay. The refund will be based on the number of full months remaining in The University's permit year from the date the request form and decal remnants are received in the University Police Traffic Office.
 - (2) Refunds will be made, upon request, to students who withdraw or graduate from The University at the end of the fall semester, provided the request is received in the University Police Traffic Office before Census Date of the following Spring Semester; but refunds will not be made to students who withdraw or graduate from The University at the end of the Spring Semester. A student who registers and withdraws during the same semester will be refunded in accordance with current academic catalog refund policies.
- C. A request for a refund will not be honored when a person's privilege to park and drive on campus has been suspended nor if outstanding charges or other debts remain unpaid.
- D. No refund is available for bicycle or Class T parking permits.

SECTION VII
DRIVING AND PARKING OFFENSES

the penalty fee of \$5.00 will be assessed to each ticket that is not paid, mailed, or otherwise cleared within five (5) working days of the date of the ticket. The University Police Department is not responsible for a ticket being removed from a vehicle after said ticket has been placed on the vehicle by an officer.

SS A ENFORCEMENT FEE: \$15.00 each violation - Student
\$24.00 each violation - Faculty/Staff

VIOLATION: Code 1001 Parking Without a Permit. (Impounding violation)

ENFORCEMENT FEES will be assessed for each violation of parking a vehicle on campus without a valid parking permit. The student, faculty or staff person will be given the opportunity to register the vehicle in lieu of the FIRST ticket issued for parking without a valid parking permit, provided such registration is done at the University Police Traffic Office within five (5) working days from the date the ticket was issued. Each subsequent violation for parking any vehicle without a valid parking permit is subject to the full enforcement fee.

SS B ENFORCEMENT FEE: \$25.00 each violation, OR suspension/cancellation of parking privileges by the UTSA Parking and Traffic Committee, OR both.

VIOLATION: Code 2001 Displaying a fraudulent or fictitious parking permit. (Impounding violation)

Code 2002 Obtaining a parking permit through fraud or false pretenses. (Impounding violation)

Code 2003 Obtaining a parking permit for another person through fraud or false pretenses. (Impounding violation)

Code 2004 Displaying a parking permit which has been cancelled or revoked. (Impounding violation)

Code 2005 Displaying a parking permit which has been reported lost or stolen. (Impounding violation)

Code 2006 Removing immobilization device from an immobilized vehicle.

Code 2007 Altering parking permit. (Impounding violation)

In addition to the classes of violations referenced in this section, officers of the University Police Department shall issue traffic citations for any violations defined in the Texas Motor Vehicle Laws. University Police Officers, at their discretion, may issue court tickets which shall be adjudicated in a Justice of the Peace Court.

SECTION VIII
ENFORCEMENT

PARKING AND TRAFFIC CITATIONS

University Police are authorized to issue two types of citations for violation of UTSA Parking and Traffic Regulations.

- A. UNIVERSITY CITATIONS - Those handled by The University, subject to University administrative enforcement charges and a right to appeal within The University (Paragraph 5 below).
- B. COURT APPEARANCE (CA) CITATIONS - Those issued by the University Police constituting a summons to appear in either municipal court or a justice court.

POLICY WITH RESPECT TO COURT APPEARANCE (CA) CITATIONS

The University reserves the right to issue a CA citation for any violation. It is the general policy of The University, however, to issue CA citations at The University's option:

- A. for moving violations;
- B. for any violation when the individual's driving or parking privileges have been suspended (See Paragraph 6 below); or
- C. when an individual receives a University citation and all reasonable attempts at collection have failed.

PROCEDURE FOR UNIVERSITY CITATIONS

University citations are issued for offenses described in Section VII. The administrative enforcement charges are as shown. If the charge is not paid within five (5) working days after issuance of the citation, a \$5.00 late charge will be assessed.

- A. All outstanding campus traffic citations are retained as part of the permanent records. Multiple violations within one academic year will result in increased fines and/or disciplinary action.
- B. Every person receiving a University citation shall remit the amount of the charge to the University Police Traffic Office. Payment must be received within five (5) working days after issuance of the citation to avoid a late charge.

If a person desires to appeal a University citation, he/she shall comply with Paragraph 5 below within five (5) working days after issuance of the citation.

Requests for exceptions to the above referenced working days will be considered on an individual basis if mitigating or unusual circumstances exist. Such requests shall be submitted in writing to the Chief of Police and shall detail the reason(s) such a request is being made. Requests based solely on alleged nonreceipt of a copy of the citation will not be honored.

Unpaid charges for parking offenses are recorded either in the name of the person in whose name the vehicle is registered with some official state motor vehicle registration department or agency, or in the name of the person who has registered the vehicle with the University Police Traffic Office.

NOTE: If a student, staff or faculty has the same family name and/or home address as the registered owner, then the unpaid charges will also be recorded in the name of the student, staff or faculty. Unpaid charges for other offenses (such as moving violations) may be recorded in the name of the person driving said vehicle, in the name of the person who has registered it with the University Police Traffic Office, or in the name of the registered owner.

- C. When Court Appearance citations are issued, the University citations will be cancelled. Failure to discharge CA citations may result in the issuance of a warrant for the arrest of such person.

Before a Court Appearance ticket is issued, a written notice shall be sent via certified mail advising the person of the number of campus tickets issued, the violations, enforcement fees due, and that Court Appearance tickets for each campus ticket shall be issued if the campus ticket enforcement fees are not paid within ten (10) working days of the date of the notice.

- D. Persons with unpaid charges recorded in their names shall be ineligible to receive parking permits while such charges remain unpaid.

- E. The enforcement fees assessed for violation of these regulations constitute an indebtedness to The University of Texas at San Antonio. In the event that a person fails to pay such fees, The University will:

- (1) suspend the privilege of driving or parking on the campus for up to one year from the date of suspension;
- (2) withhold any remuneration, refund or monetary payment to which the person may otherwise have been entitled;
- (3) deny readmission to The University of Texas at San Antonio;
- (4) withhold the individual's grades and/or official transcript;
- (5) withhold any degree to which the person may be entitled; and/or
- (6) take appropriate disciplinary action.

See Section V for additional information concerning disciplinary action.

IMPOUNDMENT OF VEHICLES, BARRING OF READMISSION AND WITHHOLDING OF GRADES, DEGREES, OFFICIAL TRANSCRIPTS AND REFUNDS

When unpaid charges are recorded, the University Police Traffic Office shall send a return receipt letter to the last known address of the person in whose name the charges are recorded.

Such letter shall state that unless (1) payment of all accumulated charges is made within ten (10) calendar days after the date of such letter or (2) a written request is made within ten (10) calendar days to appear before a University hearing committee concerning impoundment of the vehicle in case of faculty, staff, student or visitor, or for barring of readmission and/or withholding of grades, degrees, official transcripts and refunds in the case of students, as authorized in the Regents' Rules and Regulations, Part One, Chapter VI, Section 9 and state law, the appropriate enforcement action will take place without further notice.

Such a hearing is not an appeal of the parking and traffic citations but is a limited hearing to allow the individual an opportunity to show that the vehicle in question was not owned, registered or used by the individual or to show that the individual receiving notice of impending sanctions does not have unpaid parking and traffic charges.

At such hearing, which will be held after a reasonable period of time, the person requesting the hearing will assume the burden of showing why the appropriate enforcement action should not take place.

If timely payment is not received and either the registered owner or the person who has registered the vehicle with The University has failed to appear at the requested University impoundment hearing or has appeared and has failed to meet his or her burden of proof, the vehicle may be impounded pending payment of all outstanding charges, including towing and storage charges, without further notice.

If timely payment is not received from a student and the student has failed to appear at the requested hearing or has appeared and has failed to meet his or her burden of proof, the student may be barred from readmission and grades, degrees, official transcripts and refunds may be withheld, without further notice. Additionally, the vehicle registered to the student may be subject to impoundment.

APPEALS FROM UNIVERSITY CITATION(S)

Any person who has received a University citation may file a request to have the citation reviewed by submitting an appeal to the University Police Traffic Office no later than five (5) working days after the citation was issued. If an appeal is not filed within this time, the citation is deemed final.

- A. Appeals shall be prepared in writing on the "Citation Appeal" form provided by the University Police Traffic Office. Appeals may be reviewed based solely on the written statement or the appealing party may also request a personal appearance. Failure to request a personal appearance or failure to appear at the hearing (as requested) will result in the decision being rendered on the basis of the written statement (including any supporting material submitted) and the information as shown on the citation(s).
- B. The appeal must include the following:
 - (1) Citation number(s)
 - (2) License number of vehicle(s)
 - (3) Faculty, staff, or student identification number
- C. The Chief shall review all appeals before forwarding the appeals to the chairperson of the Parking and Traffic Committee.
- D. The Parking and Traffic Committee may order the payment of the administrative enforcement charge(s) in whole or in part or the cancellation of such charge(s). If the appeal is denied and the appealing party fails to pay the charge(s) within ten (10) working days after date of notification, a \$5.00 late charge will be assessed on the citation(s).
- E. If the Parking and Traffic Committee rules in favor of the appellant, said appellant shall be entitled to any enforcement fee that has been paid as a result of such alleged violation.
- F. The decision of the Parking and Traffic Committee shall be final.

SUSPENSION OF PRIVILEGE TO DRIVE AND PARK ON CAMPUS

The loss of the privilege of driving or parking a motor vehicle on campus shall commence ten (10) days after the University Police Traffic Office mails a letter to the person, at the address of such person as shown in the records of that office, stating that such person's privilege of driving or parking a motor vehicle on campus has been suspended. Such letter shall state the term of the suspension and will give notification of possible vehicle impoundment

for parking offenses committed during the period of suspension and shall state the reason for such suspension. Persons who have had their parking privileges cancelled shall lose the privilege of driving or parking on The University campus for six (6) months. While a person's privilege of driving or parking a vehicle on campus is suspended, it is unlawful (1) for that person to drive or park any motor vehicle on the campus and (2) for any person to drive or park a vehicle registered in the name of such person on the campus.

- A. The Parking and Traffic Committee may prohibit a person from operating or parking a vehicle on campus if that person has received four (4) or more tickets in an academic year or has been guilty of a Class B or Class C violation.

Such suspension of the privilege of driving or parking on the campus may be imposed for a period not to exceed six (6) months from the date of suspension.

- B. Any person who has had his or her operating and parking privileges on campus cancelled or suspended and who continues to operate or park a vehicle on campus is subject to having the vehicle towed off campus at the expense of the operator.
- C. If a person whose privilege of driving or parking on campus has been suspended receives a University citation by reason of having a vehicle on campus during the period of his/her suspension, the period of suspension shall be extended so that it expires twelve (12) months from the date the person received such additional citation. In addition, the violation of the suspension shall be reported to the Dean of Students if the person is a student, or to the appropriate Dean, Director or Administrative Official for possible disciplinary action if the person is a faculty or staff member.
- D. A person receiving notice that his/her privilege of driving or parking a vehicle on campus has been suspended may appeal the suspension within ten (10) working days on the grounds that the imposition of such suspension is improper or will create serious and substantial hardship. A reinstatement fee of \$10.00 must accompany the request for reinstatement. This will be in addition to any other fees due for traffic violations.

Such appeal shall be governed by the provisions of Item 4 of this section. No appeal shall be considered if there are any unpaid citations on record at the time such appeal is filed.

DESTRUCTION OF PERMIT WHEN SUSPENDED

Every person receiving notice that his/her privilege of driving or parking on the campus has been suspended shall remove the parking permit(s) from every vehicle registered in his/her name and return the remnants thereof to the University Police Traffic Office within ten (10) working days after date of such notice. Failure to do so shall be reported to the Dean of Students if the person is a student, or to the appropriate Dean, Director or Administrative Official if the person is a faculty or staff member.

ELIGIBILITY TO OBTAIN NEW PERMIT DURING PERIOD OF SUSPENSION

A person whose privilege of driving and parking on the campus is suspended, and not reinstated, shall be ineligible to receive a parking permit of any type during the period of suspension.

TWO VEHICLES ON CAMPUS

When an applicant who has registered two vehicles is found to have both vehicles parked on campus at the same time in violation of the additional vehicle policy (Section VI), the following shall apply.

- A. First offense - The University Police Traffic Office shall notify the permit holder that he/she has violated these regulations and that any further violation will result in the loss of the permit for all additional vehicles. Furthermore, any citation(s) which may have been issued are due and payable.
- B. Second offense - The University Police Traffic Office shall notify the permit holder that he/she has again violated these regulations. Such written notice will inform the permit holder that he/she must surrender the permit(s) from all additional vehicles and make payment for any citation(s) which may have been issued for this offense. Furthermore, the permit holder shall not be able to register an additional vehicle for the remainder of the current permit year. Failure to abide by this second notice will subject the permit holder to all enforcement sanctions including those described in Section V.

IMPOUNDMENT

The term "impoundment" includes immobilization, towing, removal and storage of the vehicle in question.

- A. Any vehicle which has been issued two (2) or more campus tickets and which does not display a valid parking permit while parked on campus shall be immobilized until the operator of said vehicle is properly identified.
- B. The identified operator of an immobilized vehicle shall be held liable for all unpaid tickets which have been issued to the immobilized vehicle unless the operator shows proof of someone else driving said vehicle.
- C. When a vehicle has been immobilized for being parked on campus without a valid parking permit, the operator of said vehicle shall be required to register the vehicle in accordance with the UTSA Parking and Traffic Regulations.
- D. The University of Texas at San Antonio reserves the right to remove and impound all vehicles parked so as to (1) obstruct ingress or egress to buildings, or (2) obstruct vehicular or pedestrian traffic. The University also reserves the right to impound vehicles registered to individuals with unpaid traffic fees after notice has been given as outlined in this section.
- E. Neither The University nor its authorized personnel shall be liable for any loss or damage resulting from such impoundment.
- F. In addition to any charge that may be levied by The University for an offense resulting in impoundment, the owner of a vehicle that has been towed, removed and stored must also pay a commercial wrecker service fee and storage charges after the first twenty-four (24) hours. When an IMPOUND VIOLATION occurs and the owner or driver of the vehicle appears on the scene before the arrival of the wrecker, the vehicle will not be impounded. If the owner or driver appears on the scene after the arrival of the wrecker and the wrecker driver has made a hookup:
 - (1) the vehicle will not be impounded; and
 - (2) the owner or driver may be required to pay the wrecker a fee in lieu of towing.

If the vehicle is impounded, the registered owner or permit holder will be sent a notice at the address on file with the University Police Traffic Office.

SECTION IX
RECIPROCAL PARKING RULES

THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS AT SAN ANTONIO
AND
THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS HEALTH SCIENCE CENTER AT SAN ANTONIO

PURPOSE

- A. The purpose of this agreement is to provide limited, temporary parking for UTSA faculty, staff and students at The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio (UTHSCSA). Employees at either institution must register their vehicles at their primary place of employment.
- B. Any individual having questions concerning parking at UTHSCSA should contact the University Police Department.


ENFORCEMENT

- A. Vehicles bearing UTSA permits are required to abide by the UTHSCSA Parking and Traffic Regulations while on the UTHSCSA campus.
- B. Student's academic records will be placed on hold at UTHSCSA and UTSA for unpaid tickets on record at either institution.
- C. UTSA faculty and staff with unpaid UTHSCSA tickets are subject to UTSA Parking and Traffic Regulations concerning the renewal of parking permits.

DESIGNATED PARKING BY PERMIT

- A. Numbered reserved spaces are reserved for the UTHSCSA President, Vice President, Academic Deans, and Department Chairmen who have paid the fee for these spaces. These numbered reserved spaces are designated for UTHSCSA type "A" permits only. Vehicles displaying UTSA parking permits are not permitted to park in these numbered reserved spaces.
- B. Vehicles bearing UTSA Class O Executive Officer and Class R Reserved parking permits must park in spaces marked "RESERVED." Should the reserved spaces be full, the driver of said vehicle should contact the nearest UTHSCSA guard and request a temporary pass for another parking area.
- C. Vehicles bearing UTSA Class A or K Faculty and Staff parking permits must park in any unrestricted parking lot marked for C permits.
- D. Vehicles bearing UTSA Class G or M Student parking permits must park in any unrestricted parking lot marked for D permits.
- E. Two-wheel vehicles bearing UTSA Class C Motorcycle parking permits must park in any restricted areas marked E parking for two-wheel vehicles.
- F. UTSA carpool permits are not valid for parking in UTHSCSA carpool spaces.
 - (1) Vehicles bearing UTSA CLASS P Carpool Faculty/Staff parking permits must park in any unrestricted parking lot marked for C permits.
 - (2) Vehicles bearing UTSA CLASS S Carpool Student parking permits must park in any unrestricted parking lot marked for D permits.

- G. Vehicles bearing UTSA Class H Handicapped parking permits may park in any handicapped or reserved spaces. Should the handicapped and reserved spaces be full, the driver of said vehicle should contact the nearest UTHSCSA guard and request a temporary pass for another parking area.





PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

The Parking and Traffic Regulations recommended for approval by the U.T. Board of Regents have been approved by an attorney in the Office of General Counsel and are based on model regulations approved by that office. These regulations supersede all prior Parking and Traffic Regulations.

SECTION I

QUICK REFERENCE TO PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

1. PERMITS REQUIRED FOR ACCESS & PARKING: Faculty, staff and students may purchase a parking permit to park on campus. Vehicles without a parking permit will pay the daily parking fee charged visitors.
2. DISPLAY OF PERMITS: Parking permits must be properly affixed to the vehicle(s). Decals which are taped or affixed by unauthorized materials or displayed on a vehicle other than the vehicle to which issued will subject the holder to a citation.
3. REMOVAL OF PERMITS: Permits (decals) shall be removed when there is a change of vehicle ownership; when association with the University is terminated; when a replacement permit has been issued to take the place of a previously issued permit; or upon expiration or revocation.
4. PARKING INFORMATION (Subject to change with sufficient notice)

AACC BUILDING - restricted to UTHSCD patients only

PARKING LOT #1 - restricted to authorized persons who have been issued Lot #1 gate cards and to UTHSCD patients. Students, employees, faculty and visitors are not permitted to park on this lot, with or without a regular parking permit.

PARKING LOT #4 - all students with parking permits are required to park on this lot unless special privileges have been approved to park in the other parking areas. Employees, students, faculty and visitors may park on this lot. Vehicles without parking permits will be required to pay the daily parking fee.

PARKING LOT #5 - closed due to construction

PARKING LOT #7 - employees, faculty, visitors and authorized students. Vehicles without parking permits will be required to pay the daily parking fee.

GARAGE #1 - restricted to faculty, carpoolers with three (3) or more persons, visitors and persons with reserve spaces. Students and employees are not permitted to park in this garage until after 6:00 p.m. on weekdays. Students and employees may park in this garage on Saturday, Sunday and holidays. Vehicles without parking permits will be required to pay the daily parking fee.

GARAGE #2 - restricted to employees, faculty and authorized students. All vehicles without a parking permit will be required to pay the daily parking fee.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS - continued

LOCKE MEDICAL BLDG. (6011 Harry Hines Blvd.) - employees, faculty, authorized students, tenants and visitors. All vehicles without a parking permit will be required to pay the daily parking fee. The same Rules and Regulations for the U.T. campus applies to this parking area.

SERVICE BUILDING (NAPA Bldg.) 4600 Harry Hines Blvd. - parking permits required for UTHSCD personnel's vehicles. The same Rules and Regulations for the UTHSCD campus applies to this area.

BICYCLES - to be parked only in areas designated for bicycle parking. Bicycles are not to be taken into any buildings.

MOTORCYCLES - unless a parking permit has been purchased, all motorcycles will be required to park in Lot #4 in the designated motorcycle area.

PARKING WITHOUT A PERMIT - visitors, job applicants and faculty without a parking permit may park in Garage #1, Lot #4 or Lot #7 and pay the daily parking fee.

5. Regular parking permits do not permit parking on Lot #1 or the AACC parking lot.
6. **LOADING ZONE AREAS:** To be used only for loading and unloading. Rules enforced at all times.
7. **BICYCLE REGISTRATION:** Bicycles operated or parked on the campus should be registered with the Dallas Police Department.
8. **BICYCLES, MOPEDS (MOTOR-ASSISTED BICYCLES):** Bicycles and mopeds must be operated in accordance with the specific applicable provisions of these regulations, all provisions of these regulations concerning parking restrictions and traffic control and applicable state law.
9. **PARKING LOTS:** On occasion during the year, certain parking lots may be closed upon recommendation by the University Police Department and approval by the President of the University.
10. **SPEED LIMIT:** The speed limit on all parts of the campus, whether on streets or in parking areas, is 20 mph unless otherwise posted.
11. **POSTED SIGNS:** Posted signs, whether permanent or temporary, must be obeyed at all times and take precedence over painted curbs, pavement markings and designations shown on any University maps.
12. **PARKING IMPROPERLY:** A vehicle shall not park where angle parking is required, with the back of the vehicle toward the curb. If street parking is permitted, a vehicle shall not be parked opposite the flow of traffic in the traffic lane where parallel parking is required. Parking wholly within the marked boundaries of the parking space is required at all times. Vehicles shall not park in a manner that obstructs walkways, driveways, ramps, loading docks, marked crosswalks or inflicts damage to shrubbery, trees, grass, grounds or structures. Additionally, no vehicle may park on any unmarked or unimproved ground area which has not been marked or designated for parking.
13. **REGISTRATION OF TWO VEHICLES:** Alternate vehicles may be registered by faculty, staff or students at an extra cost of \$1 each. No more than one vehicle with the same decal number shall be parked on campus at the same time.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS - continued

14. **ENFORCEMENT AND IMPOUNDMENTS:** Failure to abide by these regulations may be the basis for disciplinary action against students, faculty and staff. Violators may be subject to impoundment of their vehicle(s) pending payment of overdue charges. Students may also be barred from readmission and have grades, degree, refunds or official transcripts withheld pending payment of overdue charges. Vehicles may also be impounded for specific impound violations.
15. **APPEAL OF CITATION:** University parking and traffic citations may be appealed within 10 working days from date of citation by filing a Citation Appeal Form with the University Police office. Court Appearance citations are handled by the appropriate state or municipal court.
16. **VISITORS:** All visitors will park in Garage #1 unless directed otherwise by an officer. Visitors will pay the daily parking charge.
17. **PEDESTRIAN RIGHTS AND DUTIES:** Pedestrians must obey all traffic control devices. They have the right-of-way at marked crosswalks, in intersections and on sidewalks extending across a service drive, building entrance or driveway. Pedestrians crossing a street at any point other than within a marked crosswalk or within an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles on said street. Pedestrians shall not leave the curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is impossible for the driver to yield. Pedestrians may cross an intersection diagonally only where permitted by special pavement marking.
18. **INOPERATIVE VEHICLES:** If a vehicle becomes inoperable, a telephone call shall be placed to the University Police Department at Extension 2081. The police will either render assistance or authorize temporary parking. Temporary parking shall not exceed 24 hours and must not create an obstruction or hazard.

SECTION II
GENERAL PROVISIONS

Pursuant to the authority granted by Sections 51.201 et seq.; 54.005, 54.503, 65.31 and Sections 65.02 and 74.101 of Title 3 of the Texas Education Code, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System has promulgated Parking and Traffic Regulations to regulate and control parking and traffic and the use of parking facilities, to provide for the issuance of vehicle identification insignia (parking permit), and to provide jurisdiction over offenses. This booklet contains those regulations and procedures applicable to any person who walks or drives and parks a motor vehicle or bicycle on the campus of The University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas. These rules and regulations are supplementary to the ordinances of the City of Dallas and the statutes of the State of Texas which govern pedestrians and the use of motor vehicles and bicycles.

Approved by the President of The University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas and the Board of Regents.

The operation of a motor vehicle or bicycle on The University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas campus is a privilege granted by the University and is not an inherent right of any faculty/staff member or student. All faculty, staff and students who have a motor vehicle in their possession or control for use, operation or parking on the University campus must abide by these rules and regulations.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS - continued

Registration of a motor vehicle does not guarantee a parking place on campus.

The University is not responsible for fire, theft, damage to, or loss of vehicle parked or operated on the University campus. No bailment is created by granting of any parking or operating privileges regarding a vehicle on any property owned, leased or otherwise controlled by the University.

1. The purpose of these regulations is to provide for the safety and welfare of student and employees, control of traffic and parking, and protection of institutional property.
2. If any part of these traffic, parking and security regulations is held to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions which can be given effect without the invalid provisions, and to this end the provisions of these regulations are declared to be severable.
3. The provisions of these regulations shall be cumulative of all other laws.
4. On special occasions and in emergencies, Police Officers may impose temporary parking and traffic control restrictions. These temporary restrictions shall have all of the force of other written and approved regulations and shall be subject to the same penalties. On special occasions and in emergencies they may also waive parking restrictions.
5. It shall be a violation to commit any act prohibited by these regulations, or to fail to do any act required by these regulations.
6. The words "motor vehicle or vehicle" as used in these regulations shall include automobiles, buses, trucks, trailers, mopeds, motorcycles, motorscooters and motorbikes.
7. The operation of a motor vehicle shall be restricted to the campus drives, streets, and parking lots.
8. Employees, faculty and students are prohibited from parking in the reserved visitor parking spaces at any time.
9. Motor vehicles operated or parked on the campus must comply with all State Laws, City Ordinances of Dallas, Texas, dealing with traffic and security, and the Parking, Traffic and Security Regulations of The University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas.
10. "Parking Permit" includes gate cards and decals issued by The University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas.

UNIVERSITY POLICE: The University Police have the responsibility and the legal authority for the enforcement of the Parking and Traffic Regulations listed in this booklet. University police officers may issue University citations or Court Appearance citations enforceable in court. On special occasions and emergencies, such parking limitations may be imposed by the Chief of the University Police as are required by the conditions which prevail. When conditions warrant such action, the Chief may waive parking limitations.

The University reserves the right to enforce parking and traffic regulations:

1. through the issuance of University citations and the collection of administrative enforcement charges for offenses;
2. through the impoundment of vehicles interfering with the movement of vehicular or pedestrian traffic or blocking a sidewalk, ramp, loading dock, crosswalk, entrance, exit, fire lane or aisle and through the impoundment of vehicles for unpaid charges after proper notice as provided by these regulations;

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS - continued

3. by the suspension or revocation of permits;
4. by requiring either the vehicle owner or the person who has registered the vehicle with the University Police Office to appear in court or at a University hearing for non-payment of outstanding charges;
5. by barring the readmission and withholding the grades, degrees, refunds and official transcripts of any student for non-payment of outstanding charges;
6. by disciplinary action against employees or students who fail to abide by these regulations;
7. by denying parking permits to those with overdue charges;
8. by the issuance of Court Appearance Citations requiring an appearance in the appropriate state or municipal court; and
9. by such other methods as are commonly employed by city governments or state agencies in control of traffic regulation enforcement.

Proof of the fact that any parking or traffic control device, sign, parking meter, signal or marking was actually in place at any location on campus of The University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas, shall constitute prima facie evidence that the same is official and was installed under the authority of applicable law and these regulations.

When any person is charged with having stopped, parked and left standing a motor vehicle on the campus of The University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas, in violation of any provision of the Parking and Traffic Regulations of The University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas, proof that said vehicle was, at the date of the offense, bearing a valid University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas parking permit shall constitute prima facie evidence that said vehicle was then and there stopped, parked and left standing by the holder of the parking permit. However, if the vehicle does not bear a valid University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas parking permit, proof that said vehicle at the date of the offense alleged, was owned by an individual is prima facie proof that said vehicle was then and there stopped, parked and left standing by said individual.

The University assumes no responsibility for any vehicle or any duty to protect any vehicle or its contents at any time the vehicle is operated or parked on the campus.

The University may deem a motor vehicle including a motorcycle, or motorscooter, or moped, or bicycle parked on the University campus for more than 48 hours to be abandoned and may dispose of such vehicle as provided in Article 6687-9 of the Texas Revised Civil Statutes.

SECTION III DEFINITIONS

"Campus", as used herein, shall include all the property under the control of the University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas.

"Motor Vehicle" or "Vehicle", as used in these regulations, shall include automobiles, buses, trucks, trailers, motorcycles, motorscooters, motorbikes, bicycles with motor, and mopeds.

"Parking Permits" include gate card and decals issued by the University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS - continuedSECTION IV
PARKING REGULATIONS

On University holidays, only those parking restrictions which regulate parking at all times shall remain in effect.

Failure to abide by parking and traffic regulations may be the basis for disciplinary action against students and employees. Students may be subject to penalties ranging from disciplinary probation to expulsion from the Institution, as outlined in Section 3.13 of the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System, Chapter VI, Part One. Employees may be subjected to disciplinary penalties including termination of employment.

SECTION V
PARKING PERMITS

A. REGISTRATION OF VEHICLES

1. Students, employees and faculty may purchase a University of Texas Health Science Center parking permit for any vehicle they own, lease or have legal possession of. The UTHSCD decal issued must be properly displayed on the vehicle registered for a parking permit. It is not permissible for a parking permit to be purchased for the same vehicle by more than one person. It will be a violation for any vehicle to display more than one current UTHSCD parking decal.
2. Only one vehicle per permit holder shall be parked on the campus at one time.
3. The motor vehicles must be registered during the period designated for all students, and on the first day of work for new employees and faculty.
4. Falsification of information on registration of a motor vehicle will result in cancellation of parking privileges.
5. Faculty and employees must register motor vehicles at the place and period designated.
6. Registration of a motor vehicle does not entitle a person to park that vehicle on campus unless a valid parking decal is properly displayed on the vehicle.
7. Any change affecting the registration or ownership of a vehicle shall be reported promptly to the University Police Office so the change may be recorded. Failure to do so may result in the cancellation of parking privileges.
8. If a replacement decal is required, it will be necessary to destroy the old decal and give written notice to that effect to the University Police Office.
9. Only after a motor vehicle has been properly registered and the parking fee paid may a parking permit decal be issued.
10. The parking fees are paid through the Cashier's Office for the fiscal year or balance of the fiscal year. The fiscal period is from September 1 through the following August 31.
11. Parking fees for students, employees and faculty must be paid during the designated period at the beginning of the school term. New employees and faculty must obtain parking permits on their first day of employment.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS - continued

12. Parking permit decals must be permanently affixed to the inside of the windshield in the area designated so the decal is easily visible and the number of the decal easily read.
 13. Parking permit decals for motorcycles, motorbikes and motorscooters with windshields shall be permanently affixed to the windshield. Vehicles without windshields will affix the decal to the gas tank or in a location in which the decal may be easily seen and the number on the decal easily read.
 14. Parking permit decals and gate cards are not transferable. Gate cards must be turned in to the University Police Office upon termination of employment or when requesting a refund.
 15. The person in whose name the parking permit is issued is responsible for all the traffic violations of that motor vehicle for which the permit is issued. If the operator of a motor vehicle involved in a violation is not the person in whose name that parking permit decal was issued, then both the operator and the person in whose name the permit was issued are responsible for the violation.
 16. Refund will be made for the unexpired portion of the parking period upon surrender of parking gate card to the University Police Office.
 17. Approval on Terminal Clearance form is required on all employees before final paycheck is received. Gate cards must be turned in to the University Police Office and all outstanding citations paid before the Terminal Clearance forms will be cleared by the University Police Department.
 18. Parking permits may be restricted to designated parking areas.
 19. Parking permit replacement decals or decals for additional vehicles may be obtained for an additional fee of \$1.
 20. Upon restoration of cancelled parking privileges, re-registration and payment of a \$1 registration fee will be required.
 21. Parking, traffic and security regulations shall be in effect 24 hours per day, 7 days per week.
 22. Specific parking space may be assigned on a temporary basis under special and unusual circumstances; otherwise, all vehicles are to be parked in parking lots or parking garages.
- B. **DISPLAY OF PERMITS:** Permit(s) must be displayed on the vehicle to which it was issued. Permits (decals) shall be affixed on the vehicle according to the instructions furnished on the decal. Taping or otherwise affixing the decal will result in citations being issued.
- C. **REMOVAL OF PERMITS:** Permits (decals) shall be removed:
1. whenever there is a change of vehicle ownership;
 2. when association with the University is terminated;
 3. when a replacement permit (decal) had been issued to take the place of a previously issued permit (decal); or
 4. upon expiration or revocation of the permit or decal.

 - o. Locke Medical Bldg. Visitor and General Parking \$ 1 per day
2. Parking permits that include the garages do not guarantee that a space will be available in the garages. All permits are sold on a first-come, first-serve basis.
3. Motorcycles and Motorscooters shall park ONLY in Lot #4 in the spaces designed for this type vehicle unless a parking permit is purchased for the vehicle.

Motor-Assisted Bicycles and Mopeds may park in the area designated for bicycles. They cannot be taken into any building.

NOTE: Motorcycles, Motorscooters, mopeds and motor-assisted bicycles and bicycles shall NOT be parked or otherwise secured in unauthorized places, e.g. sidewalks, posts, railings, trees, etc. Neither may these vehicles use spaces marked for passenger cars or trucks.

Operation: Motorcycles, motorscooters, mopeds and motor-assisted bicycles and bicycles shall NOT be ridden or operated on pedestrian walkways or sidewalks. On University streets, operators shall comply with all traffic control devices, e.g. one-way signs, stop signs, etc.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS - continued

4. **Disabled Veterans - Disabled Persons**
All disabled veterans whose vehicles display the specially designed license plates issued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the words "DISABLED VET" printed thereon in accordance with the provisions of Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes, Article 6675e, and all permanently disabled persons whose vehicles display the specially designed symbols, tabs or other devices (to include a vehicle in which a temporarily disabled person identification card is placed in the lower left hand side of the front windshield) issued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the word "DISABLED" printed thereon in accordance with the provisions of Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes, Article 6675-5e.1, are exempt from parking permit fees and from parking meter fees and time limits. These exemptions permit parking only in spaces where parking would otherwise be appropriate and do not permit the parking of a vehicle at a place where parking is restricted or prohibited.
- E. **PAYMENT OF FEES:** When an application is made for a permit, the fee charges will be for a complete year or for the entire unexpired portion of the University's permit year. Payment of the fee must be made before the permit will be issued.
- F. **REFUNDS:** A request for a refund will not be honored unless it is filed with the University Police Office during the University's fiscal year in which payment for the permit was made. A request for refund must be accompanied by the remnants of the appropriate permit. Refunds will be made upon request and only in the event service is terminated by a resignation or leave of absence without pay. The refund will be based on the number of full months remaining in the University's permit year. A request for a refund will not be honored when a person's privilege to park and drive on campus has been suspended nor if outstanding charges or other debts remain unpaid.

SECTION VI
DRIVING AND PARKING OFFENSES

NOTE: If a vehicle is found parked in violation of any State Law or City Ordinance of Dallas, Texas, dealing with traffic and security or in violation of these regulations, or is parked in such a manner as to create a traffic hazard, such vehicle may be impounded, relocated or immobilized at the expense of the violator. The University shall not, nor shall any of its authorized personnel, be liable or assume any responsibility for any loss or damage suffered because of such impoundment, immobilization or relocation.

It shall be a violation of these regulations for any person to:

1. Drive and operate a motor vehicle or bicycle on any street, drive, alley or sidewalk in excess of 20 miles per hour, which is the speed limit on all parts of the campus.
2. Park a motor vehicle so that it is not wholly within the lines or boundaries of a lined parking space.
3. Park a motor vehicle in a space marked for visitor parking when the operator of the vehicle, or parking permit holder, is either a student, employee or faculty member of the University.
4. Drive or park a motor vehicle in an area prohibited by a "No Parking" sign or signs, or by a barricade or barricades.
5. Park a motor vehicle, or any part thereof, next to a red curb which shall designate a "No Parking" zone.
6. Park a motor vehicle, or any part thereof, on a lawn, curb, sidewalk, or any area not designated as a parking space, or in any restricted or unauthorized area.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS - continued

7. Park a motor vehicle in a loading zone or service drive. Parking in a loading zone or service drive by a truck or trailer is allowed only during the time the truck or trailer is being loaded or unloaded. Parking in a loading zone or service drive by a passenger vehicle is allowed only if in the actual process of loading or unloading, and then only if a written parking permit to do so is displayed on the windshield.
8. Park a motor vehicle on the campus for more than 24 hours, without being moved, or at any time for the purpose of storing, washing, greasing, or repairing such vehicle (except emergency repairs). Vehicles which are the property of The University of Texas, parked in their proper spaces, are excepted.
9. Park a motor vehicle at an angle or perpendicular to a curb in such a manner that the front wheel or wheels are more than 12 inches from the curb or park a motor vehicle parallel to a curb in a manner whereby either of the curbside wheels is more than 18 inches from the curb.
10. Drive and operate a motor vehicle or bicycle and fail to stop said motor vehicle or bicycle at a stop sign facing the vehicle or bicycle when said stop sign is officially placed in its location by the University Police Chief or his delegate. Authority is herein granted to the University Police Chief or his delegate to erect and place stop signs as well as other traffic control signs and markings at any location on campus he shall deem appropriate.
11. Park a motor vehicle in a reserved parking area when the vehicle does not display a proper parking permit for the area. Temporary exception may be granted by the University Police Chief.
12. Park a motor vehicle in a space reserved for disabled or handicapped, unless the vehicle properly displays a current parking permit decal permitting such parking.
13. Park a passenger vehicle or truck in the space or spaces reserved for motorcycles, motorscooters and motorbikes.
14. Park a motorcycle, motorscooter, or motorbike in a space designated for passenger vehicles unless a parking permit has been purchased for the motorcycle, motorscooter or motorbike.
15. Park a motor vehicle so as to obstruct the entrance to any building.
16. Drive, operate or park a motor vehicle to which is affixed a forged or altered parking permit or decal.
17. Drive, operate or park a motor vehicle to which is affixed a parking permit or decal that was not officially issued for the vehicle.
18. Drive a motor vehicle into or exit out of a parking lot other than through the designated entrance or exit.
19. Transfer a parking permit without the permission of the University Police Chief.
20. Permit another person to use a parking gate card to gain entrance or to exit a parking area.
21. Drive, operate or park a motor vehicle which displays a parking permit in an unauthorized area of the vehicle.
22. Park a motor vehicle in a time-limited zone for longer than the prescribed time limit without moving the vehicle.
23. Drive and operate a motor vehicle the wrong way on a one-way street.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS - continued

24. Park a motor vehicle within ten feet of a fireplug.
25. Park a bicycle or motorcycle in an area or space not officially designated for bicycle or motorcycle parking.
26. Park a motor vehicle in any place where it may create a traffic hazard or where it blocks or impedes pedestrian or vehicular traffic.
27. Drive and operate a motor vehicle and fail to yield the right-of-way to a pedestrian. Pedestrians have the right-of-way over motor vehicles and bicycles at all times.
28. Operate a motor vehicle that is involved in a collision on campus and fail to immediately report said collision to the nearest University Police Officer or to the police dispatcher.
29. Drive and operate a motor vehicle and fail to have a valid operator's, commercial operator's, or chauffeur's license in one's immediate possession. It shall be a defense to any charge filed under this section that the person so charged produce in court an operator's, commercial operator's, or chauffeur's license theretofore issued to such person and valid at the time of arrest.
30. Drive and operate a motor vehicle and fail or refuse to display a valid operator's, commercial operator's or chauffeur's license to a University Police Officer when requested to do so. It shall be a defense to any charge filed under this section that the person so charged produce in court an operator's, commercial operator's or chauffeur's license theretofore issued to such person and valid at the time of arrest.
32. Move or remove a traffic sign or barricade without permission of a University Police Officer.
33. Fail to follow the orders, directions or signals of a University Police Officer in the direction of traffic.
34. Park a regular size vehicle in a space or area designated for a subcompact or compact vehicle.

SECTION VII
ENFORCEMENT

- A. **PARKING AND TRAFFIC CITATIONS:** University Police are authorized to issue three types of citations for violation of University parking and traffic regulations:
 1. **UNIVERSITY (CAMPUS) CITATIONS** - Those handled by the University, subject to University administrative enforcement charges and a right to appeal within the University (Paragraph E below).

Campus traffic citations may be issued by the University Police Officers for a violation of State Law, City Ordinances of Dallas, Texas, dealing with traffic and security or these rules and regulations.

 - a. The enforcement charge for such violation shall be as follows:
 1. First violation - \$3
 2. Second violation within fiscal year - \$5
 3. Third violation or more within fiscal year - \$10 each

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS - continued

4. More than three violations per year may result in loss of parking privileges for up to one year.
 5. Habitual violation (five or more violations per year) may result in suspension, withdrawal or termination of parking privileges.
 2. COURT APPEARANCE (CA) CITATIONS - Those issued by the University Police constituting a summons to appear in either municipal court or a justice court.
 - a. Court appearance citations may be issued by commissioned University Police Officers; such tickets shall constitute a summons to appear in justice court or municipal court in the same manner as traffic citations issued by the Texas Highway Patrol.
 - b. Penalties, as provided by law, may be imposed by the justice or municipal court for violation of these regulations as well as for violations of State Law, and where appropriate, City Ordinance of Dallas, Texas.
 3. WARNING CITATION - A warning that you have violated a University traffic regulation. This citation will be kept on file for one year.
- B. POLICY WITH RESPECT TO COURT APPEARANCE (CA) CITATIONS: The University reserves the right to issue a CA citation for any violation. It is the general policy of the University, however, to issue CA citations at the University's option, as follows:
1. for moving violations;
 2. for any violation when the individual's driving or parking privileges have been suspended; or
 3. when an individual receives a University citation and all reasonable attempts at collection have failed;
 4. for certain parking violations.
- C. PROCEDURE FOR UNIVERSITY CITATIONS: University citations are issued for offenses described in Section VI. The administrative enforcement charges are as shown.

Every person receiving a University citation shall remit the amount of the charge to the University Cashier's Office. Payment must be received within 10 working days after issuance of the citation.

If a person desires to appeal a University citation, he/she shall comply with Paragraph E within 10 working days after issuance of the citation.

Requests for exceptions to the above referenced working days will be considered on an individual basis if mitigating or unusual circumstances exist. Such requests shall be submitted in writing to the University Police Office on an appeals form and shall detail the reason(s) such a request is being made. Requests based solely on alleged non-receipt of a copy of the citation will not be honored.

Unpaid charges for parking offenses are recorded either in the name of the person in whose name the vehicle is registered with some official state motor vehicle registration department or agency, or in the name of the person who has registered the vehicle with the University Police Office.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS - continued

When Court Appearance citations are issued, the University citations will be cancelled. Failure to discharge CA citations may result in the issuance of a warrant for the arrest of such person.

Persons with unpaid charges recorded in their names shall be ineligible to receive parking permits while such charges remain unpaid. To obtain a permit, a person must pay the charge.

- D. **IMPOUNDMENT OF VEHICLES, BARRING OF READMISSION AND WITHHOLDING OF GRADES, DEGREES, OFFICIAL TRANSCRIPTS AND REFUNDS:** When unpaid charges are recorded, the University Police Office shall send a letter to the person in whose name the charges are recorded.

Such letter shall state that unless payment of all accumulated charges is made within 5 working days after the date of such letter further action will be taken. In the case of students, barring of readmission and/or withholding of grades, degree, official transcripts and refunds as authorized in the Regents' Rules and Regulations, Part One, Chapter VI, Section 9 and state law, the appropriate enforcement action will take place without further notice.

If the person receiving the letter believes an error has been made, does not own the vehicle, the person has 5 working days from the date of the letter to show that the vehicle in question was not owned, registered or used by the individual or to show that the individual receiving notice of impending sanctions does not have unpaid parking and traffic charges.

If payment is not received and either the registered owner or the person who has registered the vehicle with the University has failed to pay the charges or has failed to meet his or her burden of proof, the vehicle may be impounded pending payment of all outstanding charges, including towing and storage charges, without further notice.

If payment is not received from a student and the student has failed to meet his or her burden of proof, the student may be barred from readmission and grades, degrees, official transcripts and refunds may be withheld, without further notice. Additionally, the vehicle registered to the student may be subject to impoundment.

- E. **APPEALS FROM UNIVERSITY CITATION(S):** Any person who has received a University citation may file a request to have the citation reviewed. This appeal must be filed with the University Police Office no later than 10 working days after the citation was issued. If an appeal is not filed within this time, the citation is deemed final.

Appeals shall be prepared in writing on the "Citation Appeal" form provided by the University Police Office. Appeals may be based solely on the written statement or the appealing party may also request a personal appearance. Failure to request a personal appearance or failure to appear at the hearing (as requested) will result in the decision being rendered on the basis of the written statement (including any supporting material submitted) and the information as shown on the citation(s).

Each "Citation Appeal" form will be reviewed by the Traffic Rules & Regulations Committee for a decision and the appealing party will be notified, in writing, of the decision. The Committee may order the payment of the administrative enforcement charge(s), the cancellation of such charges or change the citation to a warning.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS - continued

- F. **SUSPENSION OF PRIVILEGE TO DRIVE AND PARK ON CAMPUS:** The loss of the privilege of driving or parking a motor vehicle on campus shall commence 12 days after the University Police Office mails a letter to the person, at the address of such person as shown in the records of that office, stating that such person's privilege of driving or parking a motor vehicle on campus has been suspended. Such letter shall state the term of the suspension and will give notification of possible impoundment for parking offenses committed during the period of suspension and shall state the reason for such suspension.

Any person who (a) forges or alters a permit; (b) uses a forged or altered permit; (c) transfers a permit, affixes a permit to a vehicle other than for which it was issued, or fails to destroy a permit when required to do so by these regulations with the intention of providing any person with parking privileges he/she is not entitled to under these regulations; (d) provides false information to obtain a parking permit with knowledge thereof; or (e) parks or drives a vehicle to which there has been affixed a permit which the registered owner or regular driver did not purchase, shall lose the privilege of driving or parking on the University campus for six months. While a person's privilege of driving or parking a vehicle on campus is suspended, it is unlawful (1) for that person to drive or park any motor vehicle on the campus and (2) for any person to drive or park a vehicle registered in the name of such person on the campus.

If a person whose privilege of driving or parking on campus has been suspended receives a University citation by reason of having a vehicle on campus during the period of his/her suspension, the period of suspension shall be extended so that it expires twelve months from the date the person received such additional citation. In addition, the violation of the suspension shall be reported to the Dean of Students if the person is a student, or reported to the Dean, Director, or Administrative official for possible disciplinary action if the person is a faculty or staff member.

A person receiving notice that his/her privilege of driving or parking a vehicle on campus has been suspended may appeal the suspension within twelve calendar days on the grounds that the imposition of such suspension is improper or will create serious and substantial hardship. No appeal shall be considered if there are any unpaid citations outstanding at the time such appeal is filed, unless special arrangements are made with the University Police Office.

- H. **DESTRUCTION OF PERMIT WHEN SUSPENDED:** Every person receiving notice that his/her privilege of driving or parking on the campus has been suspended shall remove the parking permit(s) from every vehicle registered in his/her name and return the remnants thereof, along with the parking gate card, to the University Police Office within twelve days after date of such notice. Failure to do so shall be reported to the Dean of Students if the person is a student, or to the appropriate Dean, Director, or Administrative official, if the person is a faculty or staff member.
- I. **ELIGIBILITY TO OBTAIN NEW PERMIT DURING PERIOD OF SUSPENSION:** A person whose privilege of driving and parking on the campus is suspended and not reinstated shall be ineligible to receive a parking permit at any time during the period of suspension.
- J. **TWO VEHICLES ON CAMPUS:** When an applicant who has registered two vehicles is found to have both vehicles parked on campus at the same time in violation of the Alternate Vehicle Policy, the following shall apply:
1. **First Offense** - The University Police Officer shall notify the permit holder that he/she has violated these regulations by issuing a citation to each vehicle.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS - continued

2. Second Offense - The University Police Office shall notify the permit holder that he/she has again violated these regulations. Such written notice will inform the permit holder that he/she must surrender the permit from the alternate vehicle in addition to making payment for any citations which may have been issued for this offense. Additionally, the permit holder shall not be able to register an alternate vehicle for the remainder of the current permit year.
- K. IMPOUNDMENT: The term "impoundment" includes towing, removal, immobilization, and storage of the vehicle in question.

In addition to any charge that may be levied by the University for an offense resulting in removal or immobilization, the owner of an impounded vehicle must also pay a commercial wrecker service fee and storage charges. When an IMPOUND VIOLATION occurs and the owner or driver of the vehicle appears on the scene before the arrival of the wrecker, the vehicle will not be impounded. If the owner or driver appears on the scene after the arrival of the wrecker and the wrecker driver has made a hookup, the following will apply:

1. The vehicle will not be impounded; and
2. the owner or driver will be expected to pay the wrecker a fee, in lieu of towing.

If the vehicle is impounded, the registered owner or permit holder should contact the University Police Dispatch Office, extension 2081, for location and telephone number of impounded vehicle.

SECTION VIII
AMENDMENTS TO REGULATIONS

As conditions and necessity dictate, the parking, traffic and security regulations may be revised or amended by the President of The University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas, subject to the approval of The University of Texas System Board of Regents.



Mr. Scott Thornton, Research Assistant I, on leave without pay, in the Program in Infectious Diseases and Clinical Microbiology, to travel beginning June 1, 1984 through August 31, 1984 to Cairo, Egypt. Mr. Thornton will be conducting research at the epidemiology study center funded by the Thrasher Foundation and the National Institutes of Health. Mr. Thornton will receive a direct stipend funded by the Thrasher Foundation as well as travel expenses

2. Jonathan Ophir, Ph.D., Associate Professor of Radiology to travel to Irvine, California from January 15, 1984 through January 14, 1985. Dr. Ophir is a Visiting Professor in the Department of Radiological Sciences at the University of California, Irvine. UCI is the principal research facility for Philips Ultrasound, Inc., a leading ultrasound equipment manufacturer. During this reassignment he will have access to unique facilities for ultrasound research. The knowledge and experience that he can gain from this opportunity will be applied to patient care at Hermann Hospital and will contribute to the School's teaching programs for medical students and residents. Dr. Ophir's participation in this work will enhance the image and reputation of The University of Texas and improve the ability of the Department to garner further major grant awards. 




