Listed below are Central Administration items which I recommend for your approval.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COMPTROLLER

1. Appoint Mr. Oliver G. Moore on a month-to-month basis as Clerk-of-the-Works effective July 24, 1961, at a monthly salary of \$590, to work on the Art Building and Museum, Main University, and to be paid from account for Architectural Supervision of this building. To provide funds for this employment, including Social Security and Workmen's Compensation Insurance payments, an account has been set up in the amount of 1% of the total construction contracts, with the understanding that if the full 1% is not used for this purpose, the balance will be paid to the Associate Architect, Kuehne, Brooks, and Barr, because their fee was set at only 4% to provide for employment by the University of the Clerk-of-the-Works.

2. Approve Change Order to contract with W. K. Jennings Electric Company, Inc., for electrical work on Business Administration-Economics Building, Main University. At the Regents' meeting held March 18, 1961, authorization was given for the use of money already in the allotment account of the Business Administration-Economics Building at the Main University for finishing of certain space in the basement, which was left unfinished on the original plans, and for some other work. Approval was also given to use part of this basement space for the expanded telephone exchange and switchboard facilities to be installed by the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company. In connection with the use of this space for the telephone exchange and switchboard facilities and for other communications purposes, it will be necessary to install an additional duct bank to take care of the wiring for these facilities.

A quotation has been received from the Electrical Contractor on this building, W. K. Jennings Electric Company, Inc., in the amount of \$8,854.20 to cover the cost of furnishing and installing this duct bank, to serve this building and many other buildings. The amount of money available for additive change orders to this contract, because of an earlier deductive change order, is \$4,481.33. Since the work to be performed actually involves an extension of utility lines, it is

recommended that the additional amount needed for the change order, plus architects' fees thereon, totaling \$4,635.25, be appropriated from Account No. 91250 - Expansion of Utilities Distribution Systems - Allotment Account to the appropriate accounts for the Business Administration-Economics Building.

CLASSIFIED PERSONNEL VACATION - HOLIDAY SCHEDULE FOR 1961-62

The University Personnel Office recommends the following vacation-holiday schedule for classified personnel of Central Administration and Main University. The allotted time corresponds to the provisions of the State Appropriation Bill and has been approved by President Smiley and the Chancellor.

GIFTS

The following gifts have been received and accepted for the purposes noted:

1. Gift of \$2,400 from the Gottesman Foundation of 100 Park Avenue, New York, as a contribution toward acquisition of a collection of Judaica and Hebraica books and manuscripts for studies in the Humanities. The collection is to be designated as "The Gottesman Collection," and an appropriate plaque will be displayed in the Academic Center.
2. The sum of \$197.34 has been received by the Endowment Officer, representing distributable income from the Estate of Hattie E. Gaines for the period April 1, 1961, through June 30, 1961, for deposit in the Current Restricted Account in Central Administration authorized by the January, 1960, meeting of the Board of Regents. These funds are being held in the Endowment Office pending settlement of certain details concerning this estate.

GRANTS

1. Grant of \$1,600 from the Ford Foundation, New York City, accepted by the Chancellor, to support exchange visits of six staff members each of The University of Texas and of The Institute of Technology and Higher Studies at Monterrey, Mexico, to observe educational television installations. The Institute,

which is inaugurating closed-circuit television, is sending a faculty team to observe production, examine equipment, and study the University's microwave inter-college project. University faculty experienced in television teaching will visit the Institute to meet with their staff and exchange information regarding possibilities of the Institute's joining the microwave circuit at Laredo. The funds will cover transportation and subsistence expenses of the participants. The program is directed by Professor R. F. Schenkkan, Director of Radio/Television and is effective until completed.

2. Grant #NSF-G18304, accepted by the Chancellor, by which the National Science Foundation has appropriated \$26,924 to the University System as the first NSF institutional grant for strengthening research and research-training activities in science. The grant has been prorated among three of the University's component institutions in the amounts itemized below. The allocation is based upon a percentage of basic research grants previously awarded during the year ending March 31, 1961.

Grant #NSF-G19128, accepted by the Chancellor, by which the National Science Foundation furnishes matching funds of \$17,100 toward construction costs of research facilities at the Institute of Marine Science, Port Aransas, Main University. The grant is effective for approximately one year. The construction program which it helps support is the responsibility of the University Comptroller and is detailed in information furnished to the Regents through their Buildings and Grounds Committee Agenda, meeting of September 29-30, 1961.

COTTON RESEARCH COMMITTEE OF TEXAS, AGREEMENTS FOR YEAR BEGINNING SEPTEMBER 1, 1961

In the Chancellor's capacity as a member of the Cotton Research Committee of Texas, the following agreements have been entered into for the year beginning September 1, 1961. The agreements were signed on behalf of the Chancellor by Vice-Chancellor Lanier Cox, Acting.

Memorandum Agreement with The University of Texas providing \$31,500 for research, surveys, and other investigations relating to the marketing of cotton fiber, cottonseed, and other cottonseed products.

Memorandum Agreement with Texas Technological College providing \$56,431 for research, including surveys and other investigations relating to use of cotton fiber and products resulting therefrom.

Memorandum Agreement with the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College System providing \$16,573 for research, including surveys and other investigations relating to use of cottonseed and the products resulting therefrom.

Memorandum Agreement with Texas Woman's University providing \$32,960 for research including surveys and other investigations relating to the marketing of cotton fiber, cottonseed, and cottonseed products.

CONTRACT FOR VENDING MACHINE SERVICE - DENTAL BRANCH

Dean John V. Olson, Dental Branch, has recommended approval of a contract with the Kwik Kafe Coffee Service, Houston, Texas, to be effective September 1, 1961, for at least a two-year period, for vending machine service at the Dental Branch. The vending machines will be furnished and installed in the type, quantity, and locations designated by the Dental Branch Business Manager. The Dental Branch will provide 110-volt power outlets and fresh water connections in the designated locations. Kwik Kafe will provide all service and 24-hour emergency service. The contract contains the customary clauses for liability for negligence and unwholesome conditions, as well as provision for cancellation by either party thirty days after written notice is given. The contract stipulates the following schedule of commissions on gross receipts and Kwik Kafe agrees to render monthly accounting related thereto.

Dean Olson certifies that invitations to submit proposals for this service were extended to several local firms, and Kwik Kafe Coffee Service offered the most desirable proposal. The Dental Branch has dealt with this firm for several years in the past, and Kwik Kafe has proved to be reliable and trustworthy in all business transactions.

The agreement has been approved as to form by University Attorney Burnell Waldrep, and it has been approved by the Chancellor for recommendation to the Regents. The official executed copy of the contract will be filed in the Office of the Board of Regents. (This item was received too late for inclusion in the Dental Branch Docket.)

AUTHORIZATION TO REFUND STUDENT SERVICE FEE ON A PRO RATA BASIS:

Mr. G. C. Starnes, Auditor, has called attention to the fact that there is no provision made to refund any part of the required student service fee of \$9.00 to a student who withdraws from the University. A resident student who withdraws from the University during the first week of school now loses 30% of the registration and tuition fee or \$15.00, plus all of the student service fee of \$9.00, or a total of \$24.00; a non-resident student would lose a total of \$69.00. Since the student service fee is a charge for services for a full semester, I recommend approval of Mr. Starnes' proposal, concurred in by Business Manager Landrum, that the same basis be adopted for refunding this fee as is used for refunding registration and tuition fees and fine arts supplemental fees, such action not being contrary to the provisions of S. B. No. 6.

Registration and tuition fees are refunded for the Long Session according to the following statement in the General Information Catalogue:

Any student withdrawing officially (a) during the first week of classwork of a semester will receive a refund of 70 per cent of the applicable portion of the fee; (b) during the second week, 60 per cent; (c) during the third week, 40 per cent; (d) during the fourth week, 20 per cent; (e) during the fifth week and thereafter, nothing.

Registration and tuition fees are refunded for the Summer Session according to the following statement in the Summer Session Catalogue:

A resident or non-resident of Texas who withdraws officially on one of the first three days after registration day, exclusive of Sunday, will receive a refund of 60 per cent of the applicable portion of the fee paid, on the fourth, fifth, or sixth day after registration day, 50 per cent; and thereafter, nothing.


