



ODOP History



Created by the State of Texas Legislature in the wake of the active shooter event of August 1, 1966, The University of Texas System Police charter was to '...employ and commission peace officers for the purpose of protecting life and property...' at the campuses of The University of Texas System or wherever else U. T. interests or assets were represented or present. This decision was followed by the creation of the Office of the Director of Police and The University of Texas System Police Academy in 1968 and thus began the 50-year legacy of which we are a part today.




ODOP History

Major Initiatives/Accomplishments – 2017

- Advanced Rapid Response Emergency Scenario Training (ARREST) (Firearms Simulator, Breaching Training Platform) program matures
- Successfully completed state audit of U. T. System Police Academy
- Policy on Officer Encounters with Mentally III completed
- Drafted 457(f) Peace Officer Retirement Supplement Plan for consideration
- Applied for and subsequently awarded a State Grant for \$561,000 to purchase Rifle Resistant Body Armor for all UT System Police Officers
- Continued to present "The Blueprint for Campus Police: Responding to Sexual Assault" nationally as a model practice for Law Enforcement

- Invested 12 months research with the publication of Use of Force policy to ensure currency
- Criminal investigation of active stabbing incident and murder on U.T. Austin campus, May 1, 2017; one victim deceased, three wounded; suspect taken into custody immediately
- Mobilized 50 University of Texas System Police Officers from across the state to provide patrol support to U. T. MDACC, UT Health Houston, the Marine Science Institute in Port Aransas and Lamar University in the wake of Hurricane Harvey; Rescue 170 (Mine-Resistant Ambush Protected) deployed to Houston for high water rescue and humanitarian missions; awards given to those deployed including two Life Saving awards

- Published Training Advisory on Officer Exposure to Opiates
- Successfully acquired a full-sized Robotic Unit from the Department of Defense for use in Bomb Threats, Armed Intruder, Active Shooter, Barricaded Gunman encounters at no cost
- Published guidance to Officers on SB 4 and the issue of Sanctuary Cities
- ODOP Inspectors Lemmonds and Patnode graduated from the FBI National Academy
- ODOP provided Critical Incident Stress Debriefing and De-Escalation Training at Institution Police Departments

- UT System Police Academy showcased by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement to visiting delegation of senior law enforcement leaders from Mexico
- UT System Police Recruiting Video surpasses 10,000 hits
- UT Houston PD responded to an active shooter incident at Ben Taub Hospital, Texas Medical Center on February 21, 2017
- UT Rio Grande Valley PD, in support of the U.S. Border Patrol, over the course of three separate dates/incidents, seized 318.25 pounds of marijuana being trafficked across the border adjacent UT Rio Grande Valley and valued at \$234,445
