

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ODOP History



Created by the State of Texas Legislature in the wake of the active shooter event of August 1, 1966, The University of Texas System Police charter was to '...employ and commission peace officers for the purpose of protecting life and property...' at the campuses of The University of Texas System or wherever else U. T. interests or assets were represented or present. This decision was followed by the creation of the Office of the Director of Police and The University of Texas System Police Academy in 1968 and thus began the 55+ year legacy of which we are a part today.




ODOP History

U. T. System Police Academy

- Four full-time staff members
- Basic Academy 23 weeks (920 hours)
- 16 Consecutive Basic Academy classes passing State Peace Officer licensing exam at rate of 100% on first attempt
- In-Service Training
- Advanced Rapid Response Emergency Scenario Training (ARREST) including firearms simulator, use of force/ de-escalation, ambush and breaching training
- Advanced Officer Course 4 weeks





U. T. System Policy 170 – Oversight of Law Enforcement and Security for the U. T. System

ODOP Responsibility – Director of Police, Agency Administrator and Chief Law Enforcement Officer

- Texas Commission on Law Enforcement (TCOLE) considers the U. T. System Police as one state law enforcement agency made up of the Office of the Director of Police and 13 full-service campus police departments
- Law enforcement and security standards and practices, staffing levels, training requirements, professional qualifications, police academy, commissioning/revocation authority, inspections, System Rapid Response Team, administrative and criminal investigations, executive and special protection, major crimes team, counterterrorism, intelligence, crime analysis, command & control, promotional process, all police policy

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



UTSP/ODOP Significant Initiatives & Events – 2020

- Conversion of Crime Data Collection from the FBI Uniform Crime Reporting System (UCR) to the FBI National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) - Completed
- Development and Adoption of Revised Formal UTSP Policy on Use of Force
- Basic Peace Officer Class #103 Delayed for All of 2020 Due to Covid-19 Pandemic
- The first ever Basic Peace Officer Course Scholarship Program established to reduce the financial burden to institution police departments and broaden Academy participation
- Most significant unplanned capital investment in UTSP Academy in history to install Pandemic mitigation and remediation measures
- \$18,000 expended for Covid-19 Pandemic Personal Protective Equipment (PPE); permanent PPE Program established

- Distance learning technology and protocols adopted for use at UTSP Academy, after approval by TCOLE, another unprecedented step in Academy history
- Assistant Chief Adan Cruz (Texas DPS, Retired) selected as the new UT Rio Grande Valley Chief of Police
- Given the political volatility of the November 2020 Presidential Election, special security steps were taken at the eight campuses with polling places (10) to ensure unimpeded voter access without disruption
- Developed and adopted the Covid-19 Service Medal awarded for service during the pandemic and public health emergency to UTSP members, both sworn and professional staff.
